ARGENTINE SENDS ULTIMATUM TO GERMANY

PIERCE COUNTER ATTACKS MADE BY THE GERMANS TO REGAIN LOST POSITIONS

GERMAN ATTACKS CONTINUE FOR LOST GROUND

Powerful Counter Attacks Are Made by Germans to Regain Their Lost Positions Without Avail.

(Special to The Daily News.)
London, Sept. 24.—The German troops last night launched heavy counter attacks against the new British lines to the east of Ypres on the Belgian front. The German losses were terrific. The British artillery and machine guns inflicted an awful toll on the attacking Germans, who utilized their favorite method of mass formation in making the attacks. Notwithstanding their losses, they returned to the attack time and time again, which shows the importance they placed upon the positions taken from them. All along the Ypres front yesterday, the hostile counter attacks continued, without any result being achieved. On a wide front east of Ypres, powerful counter attacks in massed formation were made, which were broken up by the British artillery fire.

Petrograd, Sept. 24.—The Teutonic troops again started an offensive in the Iliga region before the Russian troops have been forced back on the right bank of the Dvina.
Whom Soldiers Can Trust.
General Alexiief has resigned his position of chief of the General Staff under Premier Kerensky. His successor will be Minister of War Verkhovskiy. All the high positions in the Russian army are being refilled with men "whom the soldiers can trust."

The Revolt.
Revelations made today regarding the Korniloff rebellion elucidate the fact that General Korniloff was merely a tool in the hands of his chief of staff, General Lokotchovskiy. The facts brought out show the extreme carefulness with which the conspiracy was prepared.

More Allies.
Peking, Sept. 24.—The President and Cabinet have agreed to a plan for sending a trial division of twenty thousand Chinese troops to France, if the money for their equipment and transportation is made available.

Ultimatum.
Buenos Ayres, Sept. 24.—Unless Germany immediately makes a satisfactory explanation of the Duisburg incident, Argentina will declare war. An ultimatum serving notice to this effect is already on the way to Berlin.

GENERAL ELECTION FOR DECEMBER 10TH

(Special to The Daily News.)
Toronto, Sept. 24.—The World's Ottawa correspondent says that the general election throughout Canada has been called for December 10th. This will necessitate the holding of the nominations on November 12th. It is expected that the campaign will be a straight party fight, with the "Win-the-War" candidates and others, who may come along, left ragging in the rear. Meantime, Sir Joseph Flavelle is silent on his resignation.

Much Bitterness.
The Winnipeg Daily Tribune says that the National Government fusion of parties is now unlikely. The disenfranchisement of the Teutonic electors has developed much bitterness in the prairie provinces.

HORRIBLE TREATMENT OF PRISONERS OF WAR

Washington, Sept. 22.—Another chapter is added to the story of the tortures of German prison camps by a Russian soldier, who escaped by tunneling with a knife under the electrically charged fence along the Antwerp-Rosendaal line. It has been forwarded to the State Department from Petrograd.
Brutal treatment and poor and insufficient food have cost Germany the labor of thousands of prisoners, he says. One labor battalion on the western front, consisting of 2,000 men, has been reduced by starvation, exposure, beatings and death to less than 500. The daily rations for a prisoner, he reported, consists of a small amount of bread and turnip soup, the soup enriched occasionally by a bit of horse meat.

The unfit, the wounded and those who have lost members of their body were kept in invalid camps until they died, but never, he says, returned to camps in Germany because the officers in command feared the psychological effect upon the people of the sight of the maimed men, often little more than animated skeletons.

Stern and implacable methods were used to compel prisoners to work. Ingenious tortures that ended only short of death were inflicted on some, while others were shot outright. Punishments varied from enforced standing at attention for a day at a time without food, to beating with rifle butts and to hours of suspension in the air, with ropes being tied to wrists, while prisoners' hands were held behind the bodies, the result being to throw the weight on the unnaturally twisted muscles of arms and shoulders. Such methods in his own battalion, once 2,000 strong, had reduced it to 350 at the time he escaped.

Before Magistrate Carss at the police court this morning, Bo Kee, of the Java Cafe, who was accused of selling "near beer" to Indians, which made them intoxicated, was brought up. The case was dismissed.

There was one other charge of drunk and disorderly preferred against Tom Barrow, who was fined \$5.00.

The sudden death is reported of Rod McCrimmon, of Hazelton, one of the best known miners in the Omineca country. He burst a blood vessel and succumbed before he could reach the hospital. His friendly disposition had won for him a host of friends, who will regret his loss.

DEMAND RESIGNATION OF FLAVELLE AND HANNA

(Special to The Daily News.)
Toronto, Sept. 24.—The Riverdale Conservative Association tonight at a meeting, passed resolutions calling upon Sir Robert Borden to demand the resignations of Sir Joseph Flavelle, chairman of the Imperial Munitions Board, and Food Controller Hanna, and urging the Government to appoint a supply and food price regulator, and to take over the cold storage plants in Canada and operate them for the people.

SIR ROBERT BORDEN INTENDS VISITING WEST

Ottawa, Sept. 21.—While no definite arrangements have been made, Sir Robert Borden is planning a tour of Canada from Halifax to Vancouver. It will likely be taken late in October. Hon. Arthur Meighen will probably accompany Sir Robert on his western tour. He will speak in all the leading cities. Sir Robert left today with Mr. Speaker Rhodes on a fishing trip up the Gatineau. He will be absent about ten days. Sir George Foster is acting-premier.

RUSSIA WILL SELL KAMSCHATCHA TO U.S.

(Special to The Daily News.)
Petrograd, Sept. 24.—The Volia says there is a strong rumor in circulation to the effect that the Russian government would sell the peninsula of Kamschatcha, on the northeastern coast of Siberia, to the United States for several billions of roubles. This project is prompted by the financial difficulties of the treasury and the desire of the government not to increase the national debt.

SMOKEBOX SAVES SHIPS FROM SUBMARINES

London, Sept. 22.—The Press Association hears on high naval authority that the new defensive measures against submarine warfare are meeting with success, justifying the hope of a further reduction in the losses, and says it can be stated on official authority that the results of the methods adopted during the past month give cause for growing confidence.

According to an admiralty statement dozens of ships have been saved by the smokebox system, with which the admiralty, during the past few months, has supplied a majority of British merchantmen.

THE FRANCHISE ACT A POLITICAL EXPEDIENT

Ottawa, Sept. 15.—The party of "good sports" is now engaged in railroad through Parliament—under closure—a War Time Election Act which, under one guise or another, proposes to disfranchise over two million people. The underlying idea is to increase the Borden Government's chance of winning by stealing as many votes as possible from the Liberals.

The War Time Elections Act, which should really be called an act to Promote Annexation Sentiment in the Dominion of Canada, disfranchises in two ways—directly and indirectly. It is most dangerous when it disfranchises indirectly. Its indirection consists in letting a hand-picked minority in and leaving an overwhelming majority out. To be explicit, there are perhaps two million women voters in Canada who would be entitled to cast a ballot at the next general election, if they were admitted to the franchise. The War Time Election Act chooses, out of these two million possible, about half a million soldiers' wives, widows, mothers, sisters, and daughters, but bars the door to the other million and a half women who have not had the bitter joy of sending their menfolk to the war, but who have been doing their bit just the same, helping the Red Cross, collecting funds and one way or another assuming their share of the burden of war.

The War Time Elections Act—such are the cold figures—enfranchises half a million women but leaves a million and a half out. When one comes to compare the half million women who are taken in with the million and a half women who are deliberately left out, one is constrained to admit that the patriotism, loyalty, zeal for the war and moral character of the three quarters who are left out is at least equal to that of the one quarter who are taken in. One surmises that a popular amendment to the bill would be to give every adult woman in Canada the vote on the same terms as the men. If this is not done, about one million and a half good wholesome Canadian women will rest under the imputation that they were not loyal enough to be trusted with the vote in war time. Will they sit still under this odium?

It is true that many of these women who are excluded would vote Liberal, but a Government, as conscious of right as the Borden Government says it ought not to fear anything like that. Being "good sports" all they ought to ask is fair play. The women of Canada will be able to decide whether a War Time Election Act that leaves a million and a half women out and takes half a million in, is fair play or not.

The bill to disfranchise a million and a half Canadian women meets with nothing but disgust and indignation from all the Liberals. On conscription there were honest differences of opinion in the Liberal party in the House of Commons, but on this iniquitous curtailment of liberty there is no difference at all. With one or two exceptions the Opposition is agreed that the bill is essentially vicious and an outrage on our democracy.

As one member put it, "Freedom under the Borden Government, broadens down from precedent to precedent until it shrinks to Arthur Meighen's size." And there is much truth in the paradox.

When conscription looked like an issue, and union government was in the air, certain Liberals

POLISH NATIONAL ARMY FIGHTS FOR FRANCE

Paris—The French Government are organizing, by their decree of June 4, the Polish army in France which is intended to cooperate in the formation of the future Polish army. The Polish army in France was created under the direction of General Archinaid, and the Franco-Polish Military Mission was charged to form units as volunteers were enrolled. It is anticipated that Polish detachments from Allied countries will come to France to fight the common enemy. The French Government are arranging an understanding with the Allies with a view to the forming of All-Polish troops in France—a single Polish National Army, autonomous and homogeneous, organized in the spirit of the decree of June 4, under the patronage of all the Allied Powers. In order to facilitate the organization of the Polish army in France the Government have authorized all the Poles serving in the French army, even those who are French citizens, to enrol in the Polish Army. Such enlistment is strictly voluntary.

PROFITEERING

Recently, Premier Lloyd George declared in a speech at Dundee: "Profiteering I believe to be unfair in time of peace; in war it is an outrage." Unfair and outrageous are milder terms than Premier Lloyd George would have used fifteen years ago, but they serve to indicate the manner of his thoughts. "Unfair in peace time!" This will strike the average individual, who mostly accepts things as they come, as something new. That the whole system of modern business is unfair, on the word of Premier Lloyd George, is something which might stir up some thought among people who have hitherto not regarded the matter in that light. That the present system is unfair to the majority will be admitted, when the matter is examined logically, and reasonably. The chief trouble is that so few people are either logical or reasonable in their conclusions. Prejudices and pre-conceived notions are too often taken as premises, which, of course, lead nowhere. "What is war profiteering?" pertinently asks the Toronto Globe, in a recent issue. "If in days of peace, men accumulate large profits and their action is commended as an evidence of their diligence in business, is it not rather unreasonable to expect the methods of business that passed muster in days of peace to be roundly condemned in time of war? A man may legitimately increase his profits by increasing his turnover, and accumulate millions by the simple process of extending his business. Hitherto the world has held such men up to public approval and pointed to them as examples of success in life. Is not the fault to be found in the system rather than in the man? So long as the State declines to interfere with the law of supply and demand the country will produce millionaires alongside want and poverty. The question is not whether a company made so many millions a year out of cold-storage stocks, but whether a system can be right that offers to the cold-storage operator a free field for the exploitation of the food of the people. If the system is an out-

rage in days of war, it should not be forgotten that it has been legalized in days of peace. In the British House of Commons it was seriously suggested by the Attorney-General that a book should be issued annually giving the income tax return of every person in the United Kingdom. The publication of the incomes of the heads of the Big Interests of Canada would go a long way to hasten the solution of the profiteering problem by striking at the system, and not at the individual only, who had come to regard that recognized and legalized system as justifying all his legitimate business enterprises."

When the people of Canada, and of other nations as well, have a governing body composed of men who really and truly represent the people, and not their own particular and private interests, then it may be possible that some change in the present iniquitous system, whereby it is legal for one man to take advantage of the others' necessity, may be obtained. But in the meantime, "Canada is at war, heavy and unprecedented burdens are being laid on the backs of the people. Prices of everything in common use have risen to prohibitive rates. Staple articles of food bring famine prices in a country most favorably circumstanced in the production of foodstuffs. That war is making an unprecedented demand on the nation's resources explains to some extent the rise in prices. But the average consumer, who in ordinary times finds it hard to make ends meet, cannot understand why Canadian cheese and bacon sell for less in England than in Canada, and why cold-storage men, who draw millions in profits at a time of great national stress, are not compelled to share with the general public the advantages in purchasing prices which is a practical monopoly they virtually control. Who gets the difference between the price of the hog paid to the farmer and the present prohibitive price of bacon? That is the question the public insists on knowing. Let the light in on this problem of the high cost of living."

were asked to join company with the Borden Government. They are one and all rejoicing now that they did not throw in their lot with the tempter and associate themselves with people who could cook up such infamous legislation. They are also glad, as many men, that they didn't tie up with the combination which is now trying to hide behind half a million women's skirts.

The chances are, too, that the half million women will disappoint them. Most of them are of the class who are deeply affected by the high cost of living which is primarily due to the Borden Government's alliance with food profiteers like Sir Jos. Flavelle. They will hardly vote for the Government that grants them a separation allowance only to hand it over to the cold storage pirates who are waiting to pounce upon it.

Having disfranchised a million and a half women, simply by not mentioning them, the War Time Election Act next proceeds to disfranchise about fifty thousand

THE FRANCHISE ACT A POLITICAL EXPEDIENT

presumably loyal male citizens for the sole reason that they are of foreign birth. The clauses which exclude naturalized aliens of fifteen years standing as British subjects is not only a direct assault on our free institutions, but also a gross breach of faith.

These men came to this country under the promise that they would have rights here which were denied them in their native land—and the chief right of all was the right to vote, to exercise a citizen's duty in electing a responsible government. Another thing, these men came to Canada for, was to escape the curse of war which has hung over Europe for centuries. They thought that Canada, guarded on three sides by the inviolable sea, and on the fourth by the greatest democracy in the world, would be free of it. Moreover, they did us the compliment to choose Canada in preference to the better advertised virtues of the United States, because no doubt they considered British institutions more stable than the American ones, and life and property safer under the Union Jack than under the Star Spangled Banner.

All these years they have been law abiding citizens of the country which they sought as a refuge. Their views on war did not change when they changed their skies. The hate and fear of it was in their blood, put there by the horrors of a thousand years. And now because they still hate war, their constitutional rights are to be taken away. On the pretext that they are not to be trusted, they are deprived of their votes but are still allowed to pay the taxes which make the continuation of the war possible.

That they are disloyal, because they are not keen on war, is not a final statement. Many of their sons have enlisted and are fighting for freedom, Canada and the British Empire. There are many Canadian citizens with German names offered, and many were refused. Many who succeeded in enlisting were sent back when they got to England. The enemy-aliens, so-called, were at least as eager to do their duty as the native-born Canadians.

It is a safe guess that any enemy-alien who is bad enough not to be allowed to vote is bad enough to be interned. Nobody would object to a Franchise Act which would exclude interned aliens or such as refuse to take the oath of allegiance when asked. To go further than that is to trespass on our charter of freedom. Uncle Sam, who has had experience with all sorts of aliens for a hundred and forty years back, has never dealt with them by taking away their votes. His belief is that the cure for democracy is more democracy, but the Borden Government thinks the other way about. Its idea of rule is the horsewhip.

After the war is over Uncle Sam will be able to say, "I took away nobody's vote." Canada will have to say, "I did, but it was because Sir Robert Borden wanted to win an election." The new friend from Europe, hesitating

between Canada and the United States will say, "Me for the United States where my vote is safe."

The War Time Election Act is fraught with apprehensions for the immigrant from Europe. He will naturally say, "If they take away my vote, they may take away my property next." And indeed, what's to prevent? A Government that will do the one would hardly stick at the other.—H. F. Gadsby.
