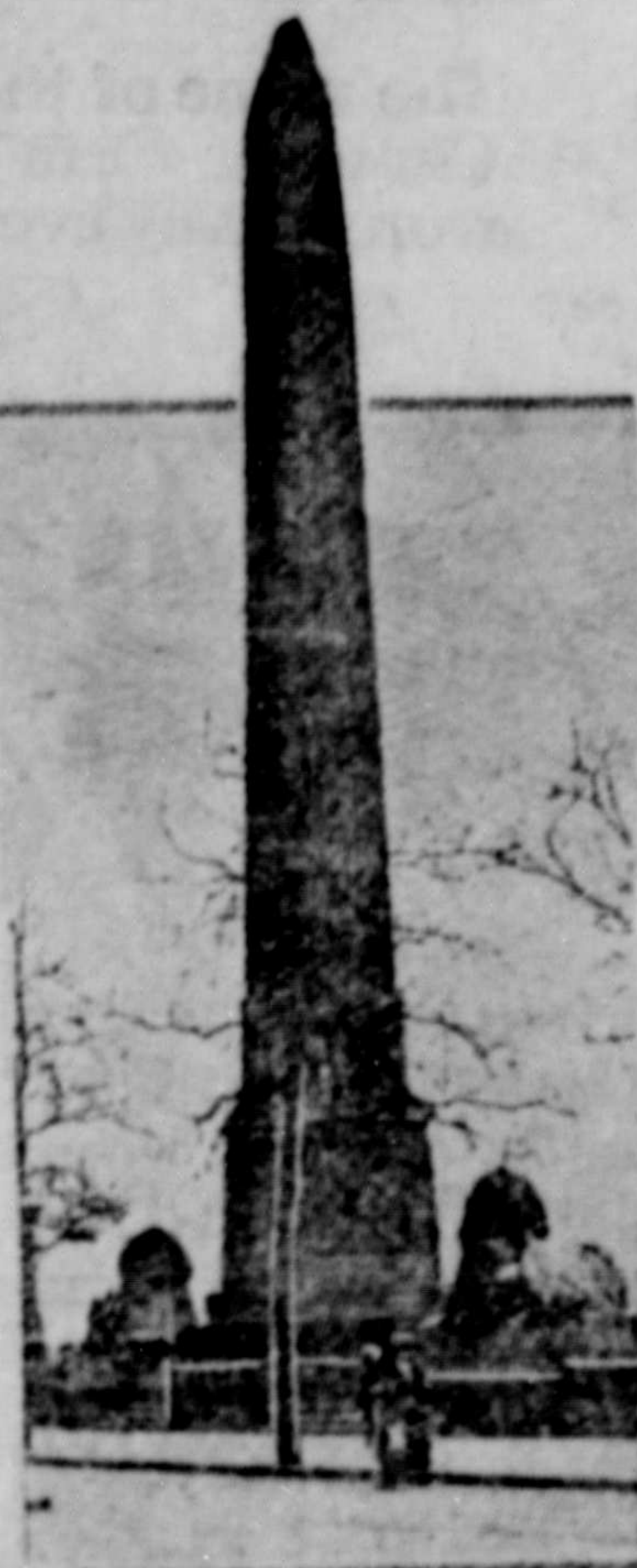
WESTHOLME THEATRE

GERMANY TALKS PEACE BUT NOT RESTORATION

London, Sept. 25.—On inquiry at the British Foreign Office regarding the Austro-German replies to Pope Benedict's peace proposal, the Associated Press today received the following unofficial statement:

"It seems hardly necessary, especially in view of President Wilson's reply to the Pope, to comment at length on the German reply beyond pointing out that it contains not one word as to restoration or reparation.

"Recent history, and especially the correspondence between the Kaiser and the former Czar published a few days ago, form an interesting commentary on the Kaiser's contention that preservation of peace has been his 'principal and most sacred task.'

"The sympathy which the German Government expresses toward moral power and right does not come well from those whose bloodstained records include the ravaging of Belgium, the murder of peaceful citizens, the sinking of passenger and merchant ships, the dropping of bombs on undefended towns, the murder of Miss Cavell and Captain Fryatt, and the torpedoing of hospital ships, the bombardment of hospitals, deportation from Belgium and Northern France, connivance in wiping out by their ally, the Turk, of the Armenian nation, and countless other crimes.

"Nor does talk of moral right come well from those who were responsible for the organization of intrigues and espionage in the United States since the beginning of the war, which are revealed in today's newspapers."

MAXIMILIAN HARDEN IS HOWLED DOWN

Montreal, Sept. 25.—A special cable to The Gazette from The Hague says:

"For the first time in his public career, Maximilian Harden for a time was unable to make himself heard at a big public meeting in Berlin yesterday afternoon. The Philharmonic Hall was crowded when he began to speak on Belgium. He declared himself convinced that peace was obtainable this year if Germany would publicly renounce all claims to Belgium."

"Hereupon a tumult arose in the hall, a large number of people shouting 'No peace by renunciation'; 'Hurrah for Hindenburg,' while others demanded that the disturbers be turned out. Harden's voice was drowned."

"When order finally was restored, many people left the hall. Afterward Harden got as far as arguing that Germany must either announce intentions to annex Belgium or to evacuate and to cease 'shilly-shallying' when he fainted owing to his exertions."

LADYSMITH SMELTER CEASES OPERATIONS

Nanaimo, Sept. 24.—After running for five weeks the Ladysmith smelter has closed down, owing to the shortage of ore. The length of the stoppage depends altogether upon the ore supply and while the plant is closed the management will make a number of improvements, but extensive additions are not contemplated.

BISHOP DU VERNET VISITS POUCE COUPE

After an absence of nearly a month, Bishop Du Vernet has returned from a visit to the Quesnel district, one hundred miles down the Fraser river from Prince George, and also to the Pouce Coupe district east of the Rocky Mountains in the B. C. Peace River country. The harvest of wheat and oats has on the whole been very good. Prairie fires are burning in many places and a great forest fire is raging between the Cuthbert and the Pine Rivers. The bank of smoke was so dense that the afternoon sun was obscured for a time in Pouce Coupe, though the fire was fifty miles away to the west.

The sawmill on the Dawson creek was burnt by another forest fire. The Bishop arrived in Pouce Coupe eight days before the Premier and his party, though they left Prince George the same day—the Bishop going round by Edmonton and the Premier and his party down the Crooked, the Pack, the Parsnip and the Peace rivers. All took the same train on the return trip, arriving in Edmonton last Sunday evening.

This morning's steamer carried a party of Serbians, who are on their way to Point Levis, in Quebec, to undergo training for service at the front. They were under the command of Captain Fuller and Lieut. Blakely. The last steamer from the north also brought three big husky Serbians, who left for the same place.

COMMITTEE TO ARRANGE WIN THE WAR MEETING

There was a meeting held in the city hall last night. It was called by the Rev. Canon Rix, not in the usual fashion, by a public announcement, but by postal cards sent to certain citizens through the mail. Any, however, who did not receive an invitation, were not denied admission. There were between forty and fifty present.

Mr. Fred W. Peters, K.C., was chairman, who briefly explained the object of the meeting. It was called in response to a telegram received from the president of the Win the War League of B. C., and its purpose was to appoint a committee to make arrangements for holding a mass win the war meeting, to which the Win the War League would send prominent speakers from the south. This mass meeting was to be of an educational nature—to educate the electorate to vote for none but a win the war candidate.

The Rev. Canon Rix, who was also in possession of a telegram to the same subject, referred to the present times as being crucial. Adverting to matters political, he could see no prospect now for the coalition government he had hoped for, and stated that party lines were being drawn. "From Montreal to the Pacific," he declared, "every man should support the Military Service Act and stand by to 'win the war.' He hoped to see both Liberals and Conservatives in such a majority after the election that nothing else but the successful prosecution of the war could be thought of."

There were many interested enquiries made regarding the proposed meeting, particularly as to its necessity. It was pointed out that everything possible is being done in northern B. C. to win the war. It was also pointed out that the Government's organization was already practically perfected to its own satisfaction towards that end. The names of Principal Vance, of Latimer Hall, and Mr. E. P. Davis were given as being at the head of the movement. The mention of a proposal to form a local branch of the Win the War League did not receive much support; there being quite enough organizations already.

What is the Object?

Mayor McCaffery said he believed every man present was in favor of winning the war. "We must win the war," he repeated. "But what concrete proposals will this meeting act on. Is it to get the men enlisted in a body, or subscribing capital?" He pointed out that no candidate who did not heartily support winning the war would have any chance at the election, yet the object of this mass meeting was to educate the electorate to vote for candidates who were in favor of winning the war. "Having that in mind and the fact that the election is bound to be held in the near future; that is politics," said the mayor.

The simultaneous exclamation by the chairman and Mr. M. M. Stephens, "there can be no party in this," brought shouts of incredulous laughing.

"Explain to me how you can get men from Vancouver here to educate the electorate to vote along certain lines, without its being party politics and I'll withdraw," said the mayor.

Win the War Platform.

GERMANS MAKE STILL ANOTHER RAID ON LONDON

Last Night Hostile Aeroplanes
Attempted to Renew the At-
tack on the Capital—
Were Driven Off.

London, Sept. 26.—Notwithstanding the severe handling received by the German aeroplane squadrons during their attack on the city of London of two days ago, the enemy aircraft returned to the fight last night. Under cover of darkness they had slipped over the coast unnoticed, but were immediately detected upon their approach to the city. They were halted at the outskirts and could not make further progress over the capital. The anti-aircraft guns were very active, and after brisk fighting, the raiding machines were driven off, their mission unaccomplished. Two bombs were reported to have been dropped on the outskirts of the city and no report of any casualties or material damage being done has yet been received. It is not known whether any of the raiding machines were brought down.

Get After Quebec.

A much more effective criticism, however, of this invitation to divide Canada racially was an address by Mr. P. A. O'Farrell, a journalist of international repute. Mr. O'Farrell, in stirring words called for unity, of Canada, of the Empire, of the English-speaking peoples and of the Allies. Mr. O'Farrell is a widely travelled gentleman and his words were listened to with great pleasure even by the chairman after the first few minutes.

A motion had been made by the Rev. Canon Rix appointing a committee consisting of the mayor, representatives of the Returned Soldiers Association and the Liberal and Conservative Associations, together with the chairman, be appointed to arrange for this mass meeting. This was seconded by the Rev. Dr. Grant. Mr. M. Stephens, however, objected to the political associations being represented upon an alleged non-partisan business such as this and as an amendment proposed a committee of three, consisting of the chairman, Mr. Peters, the Rev. Canon Rix, and the Rev. Dr. Grant. This amendment being put to the meeting, it was carried unanimously.

GREATER SACRIFICES

In commenting upon the laudable efforts of the Government during this last session of the Dominion Parliament to ensure their return to power after the coming election, most of the remarks made by the Tory press contain nothing but praise for the manner in which the situation has been handled. Such remarks of course, are not unexpected. Indeed it would be surprising were they otherwise. This however, does not detract from the littleness of the praise. For any constructive legislation, of course, praise for the duty done is obvious, but censure for that which has not been done, of course, is lacking. This also was to be expected. Nevertheless, there is so much more calling for censure than praise.

In speaking of the session just closed, the Victoria Colonist says that "it has been marked by the passing of legislation designed to consecrate the country's manhood to victory in the world struggle," and goes on to talk of the ravages of war robbing many of their fondest illusions, and the Colonist is quite sure that the country as a whole is ready to undergo even greater sacrifices than any of the past to ensure victory. Which is all very well so far as it goes.

This, however, does not seem to have been the idea of the Borden Government, in all respects. The "country as a whole" would seem to carry a restricted meaning with them. The "country as a whole" apparently from their point of view does not include the profiteer, nor the possessors of the big incomes. These classes of the community are doubtless ready to undergo the greater sacrifices which the Colonist speaks of, but such is not the opinion of the Borden Government, for they have not seen fit to ask that they should even undergo that portion of the sacrifice which the other classes of the community have been compelled to shoulder.

On the other hand, the Borden Government have given them every opportunity to get as much as they can from the wage earners and the soldiers' dependents in the shape of

higher prices. The poor man with a small monthly wage or salary has had the bulk of the sacrifice to bear so far. This, of course, is nothing new, and so far the Borden Government has afforded no relief. One of the facts that the Colonist in its apology is silent about. The great achievement of the Borden Government is the consecrating of the country's manhood to victory. The consecration of the country's wealth is a different thing.

What practically all Canada demands, except the Tory party men, is the equalization of the burden of the war and the sacrifice which it entails. Having consecrated the manhood of the country, it has been left to their successors to put the principle of conscription into force on a much wider scale. It is all very well for the Colonist to tell the women who have not received the vote that Sir Robert Borden promises a nation-wide measure of women suffrage before long. But that will not permit them to record their opinion of Sir Robert and his colleagues at the coming election, as the women of Canada would like to do. They would like to let him know how they regard the government responsible for the Ross rifle, the graft scandals, and Sir Joseph Flavelle and his fifty-two cents a pound bacon. No doubt the soldiers' wives, mothers, widows and female relatives who are to be permitted to vote will take these little matters into consideration before dropping a ballot.

The Colonist "damns with faint praise" the C. N. R. steal. It says: "The cost to the country is not known. From our viewpoint such a move in the direction of national ownership should have not been attempted in war time, as we are under so many other financial obligations." But not one word does the Colonist make regarding the iniquity of paying good money for worthless stock, to the friends of the Finance Minister.

The Colonist gets away off, however, when it says that the war Liberals are coming to the conclusion that he is the only logical leader in the country. The Liberals have come to the

THE FIGHTING FUND

Ottawa, Sept. 24.—Propaganda among Germans in western Canada to raise a "campaign fund" for the preservation of their language and to elect members to parliament, has been unearthed in documents transmitted from police headquarters in the west to the government.

At a meeting recently in Regina of the Moxon-Canadian bond (union) of Saskatchewan, the subject was discussed and the foundation of a "propaganda" was laid. The amount called for was from \$5,000 to \$10,000, and "unity is power" was adopted as the device for what was styled "the fighting fund."

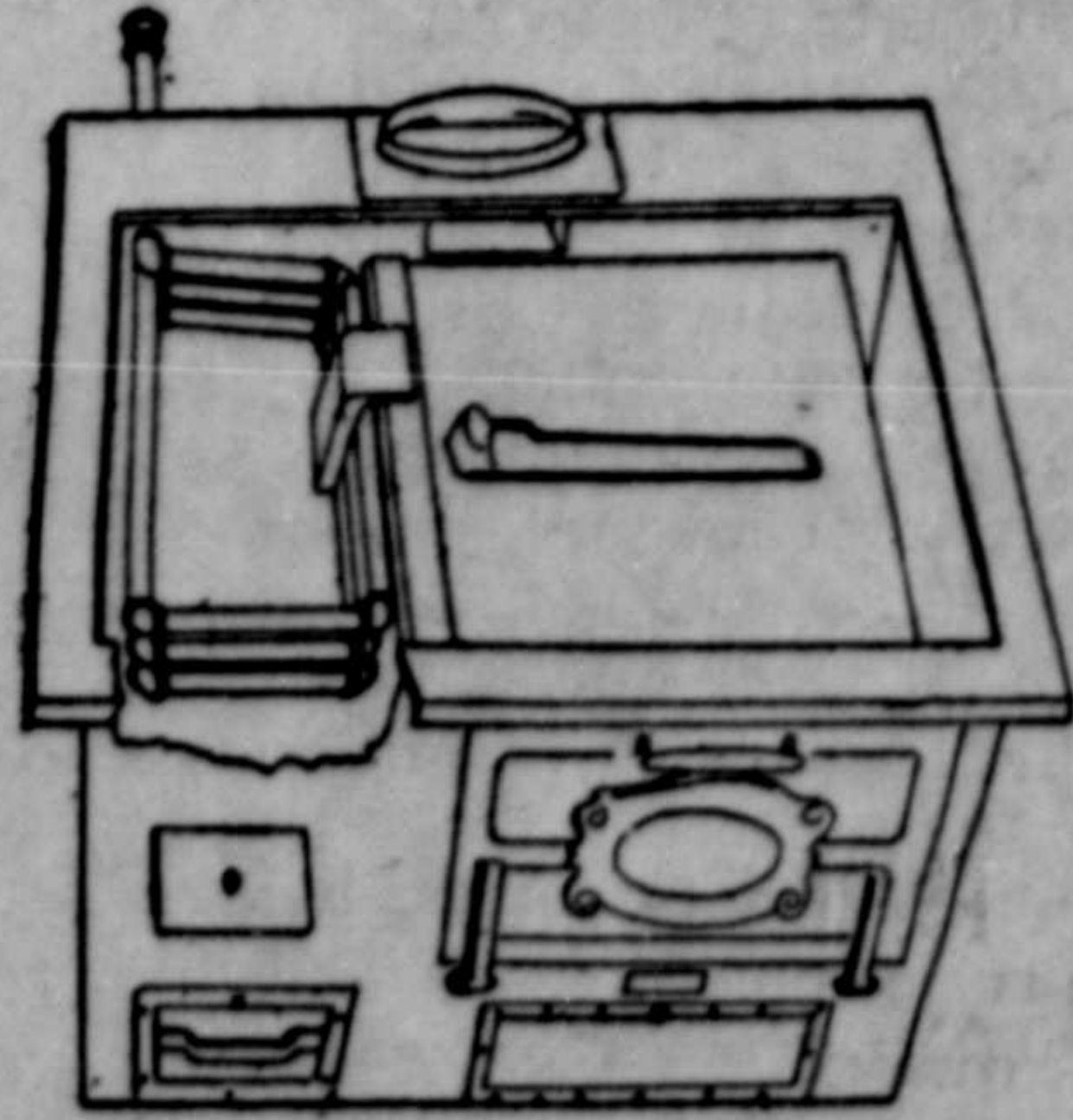

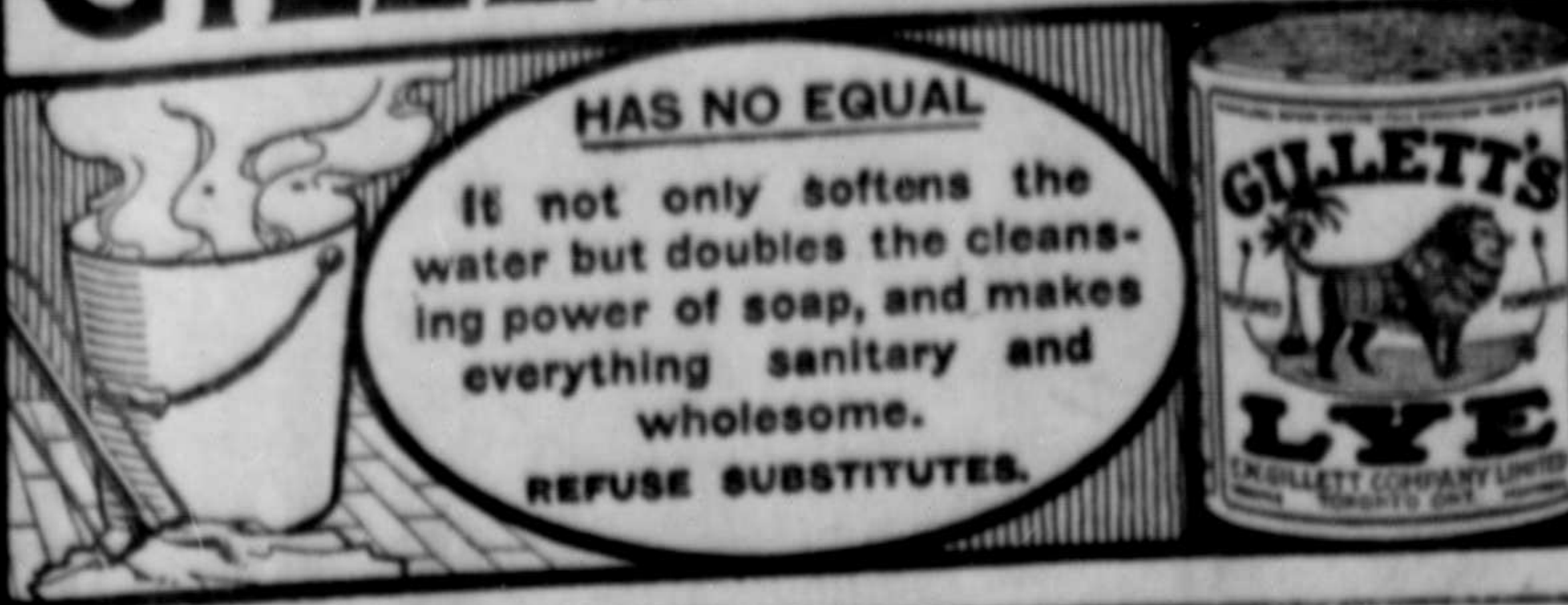
The Society acknowledges with thanks the receipt of the sums of \$200 from the Seal Cove branch and of \$50 from the Alice Arm branch.
