GERMANS CANNOT SHAKE OFF BRITISH GRIP

COUNTER ATTACKS ARE STILL CONSTANTLY MADE ON NEW BRITISH POSITIONS

GERMANS MAKE GREAT EFFORTS TO OUST BRITISH

Repeated Counter Attacks on the New British Lines are Completely Smashed—Air Men are Busy.

(Special to The Daily News.) London, Sept. 29.—The British have successfully held every position captured along the Ypres front against frenzied German attacks today. From Tower Hamlets Ridge to the St. Julien road, fighting has been in progress constantly. At Zennebeke, a German counter attack was made in great strength, which was completely smashed. This was a desperate effort on the part of the enemy. The British positions around the town make the town itself untenable and the utmost efforts were made to dislodge the British from their lines. This is the last ridge lying between the British forces and the plains of Flanders, from which their possession of the high ground will give them a great advantage.

Airmen Do Good Work. The British airmen have been exceedingly busy and have caused the Germans great apprehension. They will come flying a bare hundred feet above the German lines, using their machine guns effectively.

Germany and Peace. Rome, Sept. 29.—It is reported that Germany has secretly communicated with the Pope to the effect that the Central Powers will go much further to obtain peace than is indicated in their formal reply to the proposals for peace put forward by His Holiness.

Wen't Say Much. Amsterdam, Sept. 29.—Chancellor Michaelis has abandoned his plan to speak plainly before the Reichstag on peace questions.

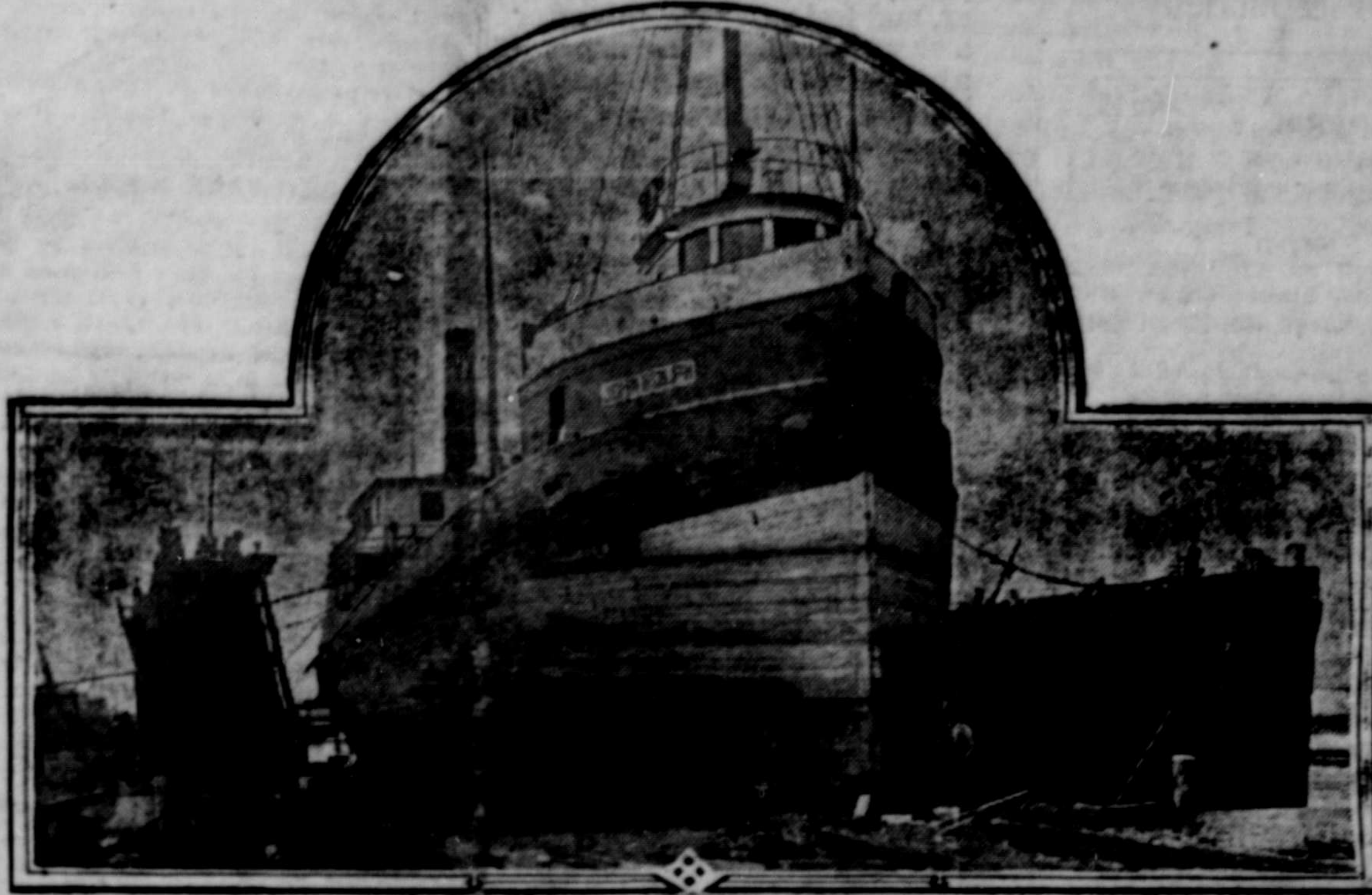

ORGANIZE POOL OF ALLIED RESOURCES

Washington, Sept. 28.—American and British officials are working on a programme providing for closer co-operation with a view to uniting for war purposes the entire resources of this country, Great Britain and her possessions.

As confidential agent of the British Government, Viscount Reading, Lord Chief Justice of England, is handling negotiations here. While tremendous in its scope, Lord Reading's mission here is only part of the comprehensive structure of unity of resources which Great Britain is building.

The resources of all Dominions and those of the Allies are to be formed, as far as possible, into a compact whole, providing a mammoth reserve on which the Allies may draw to make more effective the war against the common enemy.

The programme under consideration is the manufacture on a large scale of munitions here for the Allies.

The munitions requirements, however, form but a slight part of the total. Coal, copper, iron, and steel, foodstuffs and clothing are still needed in tremendous volume. Co-ordination of these requirements is one of the chief topics under consideration in the proposed programme.

HAZELTON POSTMASTER DIES VERY SUDDENLY

The news was received in town this morning of the sudden death of Mr. Harry McVittie, postmaster at Hazelton. Mr. McVittie has been in this northern country for many years and was very well known. He was engaged in surveying when he came north, and about five years ago was appointed postmaster in Hazelton. He had two brothers, surveyors also, Mr. Archibald McVittie, of Victoria, and Mr. Tom McVittie, of Fort Steel in Cranbrook, who are known to many of Prince Rupert people.

PREDICTS A GREAT FUTURE FOR NORTH

Edmonton, Sept. 26.—A recital of the great natural resources of northern British Columbia and the Peace River country in Alberta was the feature of an address given at a luncheon in the MacDowell hotel this afternoon by Premier Brewster, of British Columbia. The luncheon was an impromptu affair given by prominent Liberals of the city to the visiting prime minister and the British Columbia minister of lands, Hon. Mr. Pattullo, of Prince Rupert. Premier Sifton, speaking first, welcomed the guest of honor who, he said, had completed the work of bringing Canada from the Great Lakes to the Pacific coast under good government.

Premier Brewster dealt almost entirely with his trip through northern British Columbia. It has been made to ascertain the needs of a section that was little known formerly, and the tour had been an eye opener. In an almost unknown land herds of 300 head of cattle had been found, and wheat that graded number one northern.

Mr. Brewster mentioned that at Fort St. John the Peace river was covered with placer claims, filed by men who had rushed in from the east and west as a result of the reports of gold being found. Three weeks' travel on that great water course had given them an experience that would be hard to excel in pleasure for the lover of outdoor life. Referring to the Pouce Coupe country on the British Columbia side, Mr. Brewster said that a conservative yield was 750,000 bushels. He told of their welcome at Grande Prairie and outlined the tremendous possibilities before that part of the north.

LANSING WILL EXPOSE MORE GERMAN INTRIGUE

Washington, Sept. 28.—While there is no indication of what will be the State Department's next disclosure of German intrigue in the United States or elsewhere, it is known that disclosures as sensational as those which have been held in reserve and may be made at any time. One of the things the State Department has is a list of persons who received German money in the passport frauds, the munition plots and practically all the other activities of German intrigue here which took place between the beginning of the war in August, 1914, and the entry of the United States into the conflict. This list is said to contain scores of names and amounts of money represented to run very high.

From time to time the Department also probably will make public certain evidence to dispose of the denials of those who have been involved in the disclosures already made.

LINER RAMS SUBMARINE

An Atlantic Port, Sept. 28.—Passengers arriving here today on a steamship from a British port told of the sinking of two German submarines, one of which had attacked a transport convoyed by British destroyers. The transport was fired on by a U-boat late at night September 14, according to the story, off the Irish coast. It was a bright moonlight night and officers on the troop ship saw the silvery path of the torpedo. Shots were fired at the hostile craft by the gunners on the transport but the submarine was finally sunk by a destroyer.

The second U-boat reported sunk attacked a steamship of the same line carrying a large number of passengers and a heavy cargo. When the periscope of a submarine was sighted the steamship immediately made for the craft, ramming it as it rose to the surface, cleaving it in two. As the U-boat sank, a number of sailors were seen in the water. It was said, but the work of rescuing them was left to the destroyers.

GETTING READY FOR PEACE NEGOTIATIONS

(Special to The Daily News.) Washington, Sept. 29.—The State Department announces that Colonel House has been designated by the President to compile data preliminary to the commencing of peace negotiations. Col. House will head the peace mission when one is named.

German Propaganda. Atlantic City, Sept. 29.—Secretary McAdoo, in a speech here to the American Bankers Convention said that the money left in the United States by Count von Bernstorff, the German Ambassador, who was dismissed, is still financing the German propaganda in the country.

U. S. Warship Aground. Washington, Sept. 29.—The Navy Department confirms the report of the grounding of an American warship in home waters. The ship is resting easily and it is expected that there will be little or no difficulty in floating her.

Prosecute I. W. W.'s. A nation-wide prosecution of the I. W. W. leaders is planned. They will be charged with conspiracy to hamper war plans.

The Slush Fund. The House Rules Committee votes against investigating the truth of Helfin's remarks on the Bernstorff slush fund.

GET ON OR GET OUT!

"I now am able to limit the profits derived by those engaged in the food industries of the United Kingdom. We examine the books, and apply a system of cost and expense. I expect to hear that Mr. Hoover and Mr. Hanna have taken similar steps, so that we will be able to assure the people that the existing high prices of imported food do not represent profiteering."

"In this connection I am anxiously watching the price and the available supply across the water of foodstuffs for cattle, upon which depends largely the price of meat and bacon. Unless the existing high levels are reduced, the poorer classes in the United Kingdom, France and Italy are faced with many privations."—Lord Rhondda, British Food Controller.

There is food for thought in every line of this statement, says The Globe, which continues:

The co-ordination of Allied effort, so far as this is at all practicable, is one of the chief considerations of those responsible for the carrying on of the war. Responsibility for the success of the Allies is not confined to those in charge of combatant services. The Department of War Service, that concerns the conservation and regulation of food supplies, is as necessary to victory as the Munitions Department. This seems to be the view of Lord Rhondda, who looks to Canada to co-operate with the Mother Country in maintaining food supplies at a level of prices that will remove all anxiety during the continuance of the war. With one eye on the firing line and one on the profiteers of Canada and the United States, the British Food Controller goes straight to the point when he challenges Mr. Hanna and Mr. Hoover to friendly rivalry with himself in making war on the profiteers. Can Mr. Hanna, on behalf of Canada, give Britain assurances that this country is doing all it might in controlling and regulating the food market?

Is Canada fighting this war for great principles or for Big Interests? This is the question which, with an increasing volume of indignation, the public is asking day after day. If Mr. Hanna cannot, for some reason not known to the public, regu-

late and control the profits on foodstuffs, then it is his bounden duty to let the public know what difficulties stand in the way. As at present constituted the office of Food Controller is a sham. What is the Food Controller controlling? Has anything been done to meet the outrageous demands made by profiteers on the slender earnings of the masses of the people of Canada? If Lord Rhondda's department can apply a system of cost and expense to firms engaged in food industries in a country of forty-five million people, what insuperable obstacles in Canada prevent Mr. Hanna from protecting in similar manner the eight million consumers of Canada? Is it easier and more advantageous for the Government at Ottawa to protect the profiteers than to do the right thing by the nation and the Empire? Unless Mr. Hanna is impervious to criticism he must know that public opinion will not long tolerate the present policy of masterly inactivity that enables the Big Interests to lay heavy burdens on the backs of the people who already bear the burdens and the sacrifices of a terrible war.

There will be no peace for Mr. Hanna until he makes peace with the consumer. The profiteer must be forced to give up his ungodly calling. The Food Controller of Canada is remiss in his duties if he lays this country open to the charge brought against it by Lord Rhondda, of harboring and protecting land sharks that prey not only upon the citizens of the Dominion, but who force Britain to pay famine prices at a time when the German submarine makes it imperative that Canada should lend all the aid in her power to the British people. Profiteering under the war conditions that now prevail in Canada and in the United States means lending aid and comfort to the enemy. The patience of the public is almost exhausted. When does Mr. Hanna propose to begin in earnest the task of Food Controller?

NOTES AND COMMENTS

The "win the war" wave was started in Eastern Canada by Dr. Michael Clark, of Red Deer Alta. Which gentleman has since been repudiated by his late constitu-

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ency. Instead of devoting attention to winning the war, this movement has developed into one of slamming Sir Wilfrid Laurier and the Liberal party. This fact is sufficient to show the origin of the movement. Knowing full well that Conservatism as it has been known in Canada is damned forever, the party machine has adopted another title, namely, "the Win the War Party." The same old gang hopes to put blinkers over the electorate. At the last election, the people were deceived by the flag wagging campaign. The issue which defeated Sir Wilfrid was necessarily adopted by the Borden Government, namely reciprocity.

The British Government have at last come round to consider that a little retaliation upon the German cities might be a good thing in reply to the air raids which have been made on London. Once the Germans are convinced that their cities will receive a swift and sharp taste of aerial bombardment for every time they appear in England, they would not cross the water so often.

One Italian aviator arrived in London having flown from Turin, carrying an observer in about seven hours. The distance is nearly seven hundred miles. Although this is not a record for long distance flight, it indicates that the express travel of the future will be by air.

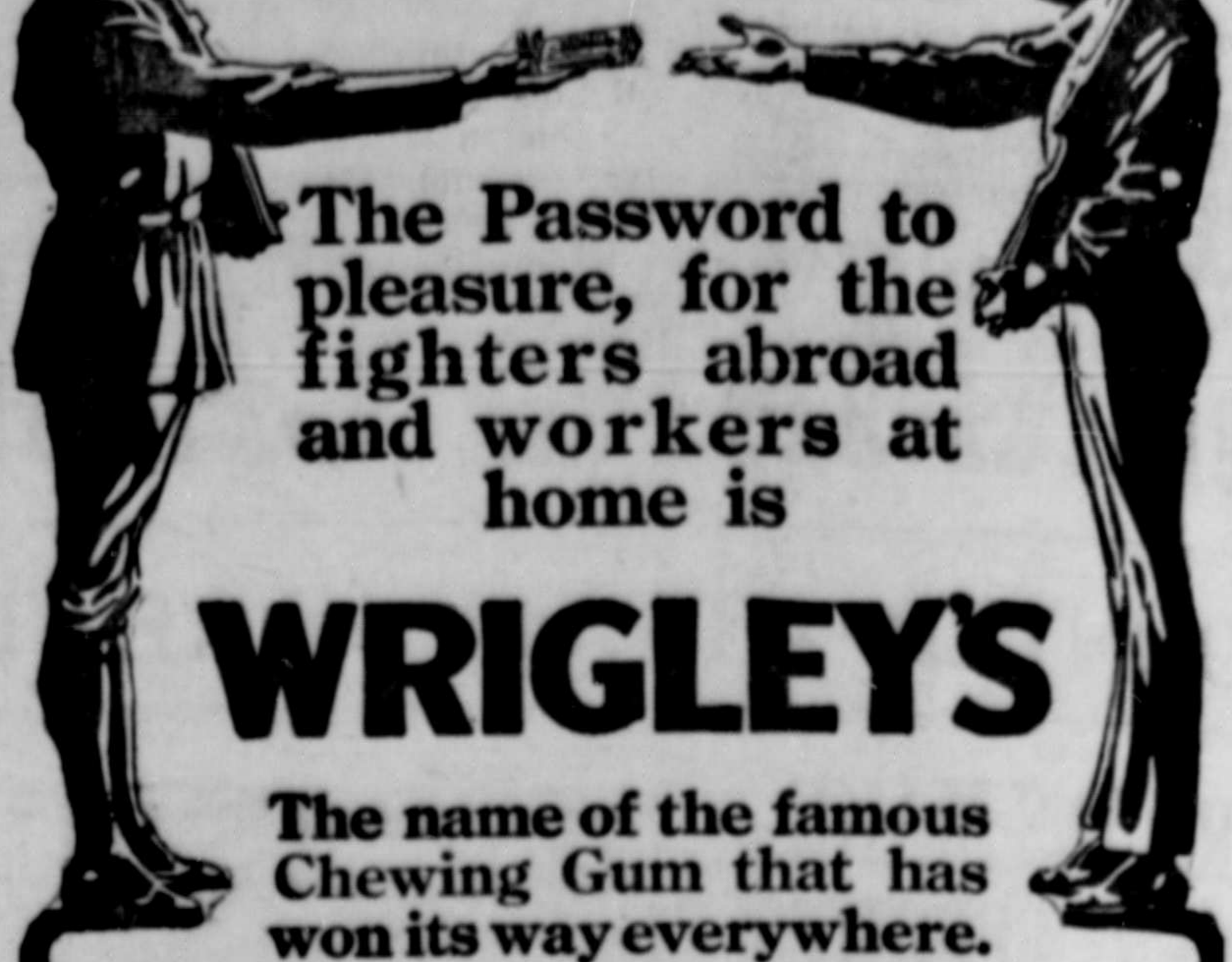

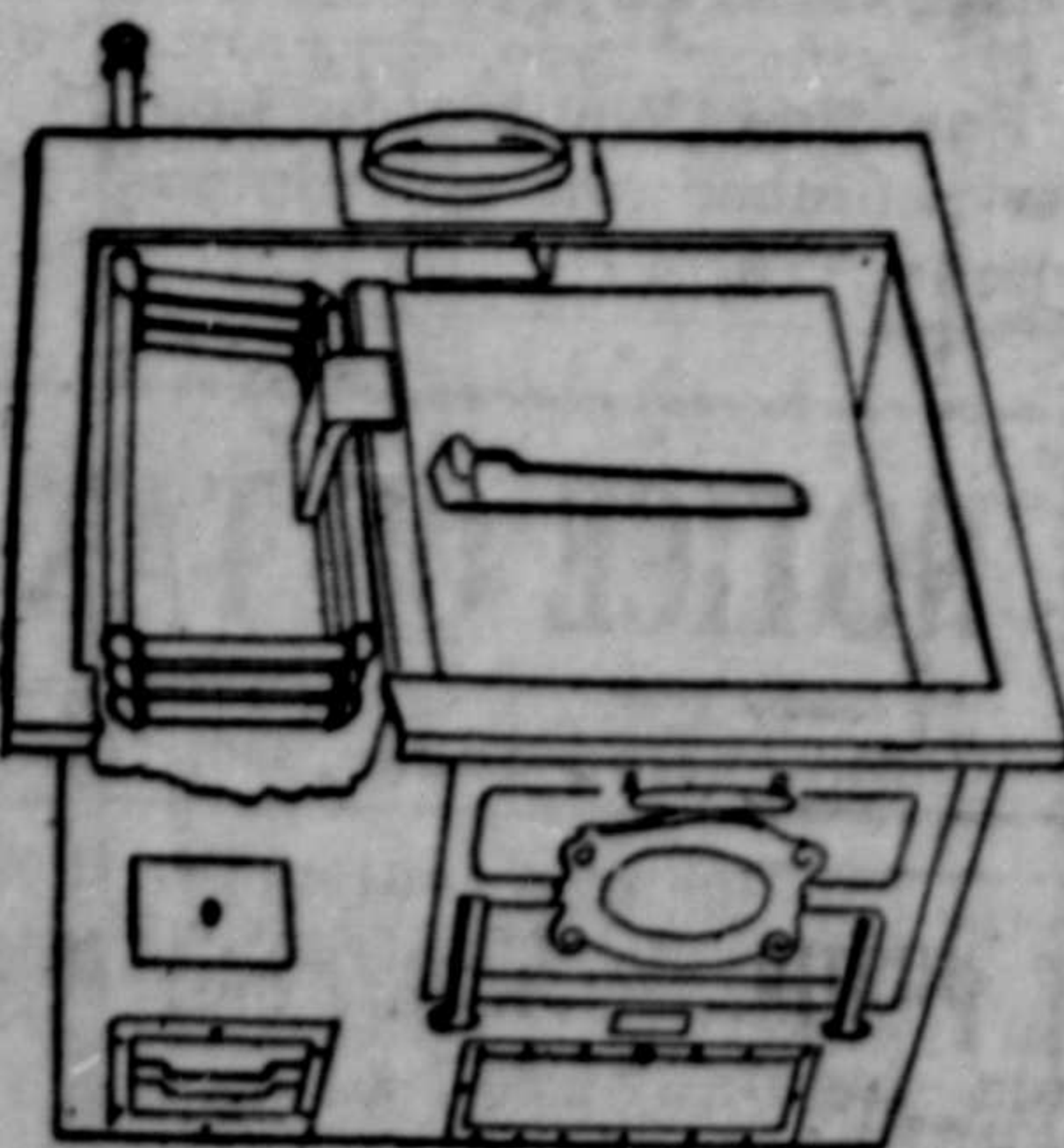
