ITALIANS CARRY OUT A SURPRISE ATTACK

NO DISPATCHES FROM THE WESTERN FRONT -- ARTILLERY FIGHTING ON AISNE

ITALIANS MAKE A SUCCESSFUL SURPRISE MOVE

Another Forward Step Taken With Complete Success—Machine Guns and Prisoners Are Captured.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Rome, October 1.—A surprise attack was carried out with complete success. The Italian troops have been able to rectify their line south to their advantage between Sella di Dol and the northern slopes of Monte San Gabriele. Two hundred and twenty-four machine guns were captured during the operations, and great casualties were also inflicted upon the defending Austrians. The new line was solidly maintained against several and repeated counter attacks by the enemy, who was unable to make any impression upon the Italian defence.

Air Operations.

The Italian airmen are again proving their superiority over the Austrian fliers, and important operations have been carried out. The Italian air squadrons have again swept over the Austrian naval base at Pola. Many Italian machines took part in this bombing attack and extensive destruction to the Austrian military and naval establishments was noticed. In the Carso zone, the Austrian military establishments were also successfully attacked.

Censored!

London, October 1.—Up to a late hour last night, the ban on the press dispatches from the Franco-Belgian front was not relaxed. No war information of any kind has been allowed to come through. The world is left to guess the reason for this censorship.

French Front.

Paris, October 1.—There have been no infantry actions of any importance, but artillery action has been quite intense on the Aisne front, particularly on the sectors Pantheon and Hurtebise. On the right bank of the Meuse, the bombardment continued violently on both sides north of the Bois le Chaume.

What Berlin Says.

Berlin, Oct. 1.—On the Ypres-Paschendaele road yesterday, the British advanced line was driven from the crater line.

Casualties.

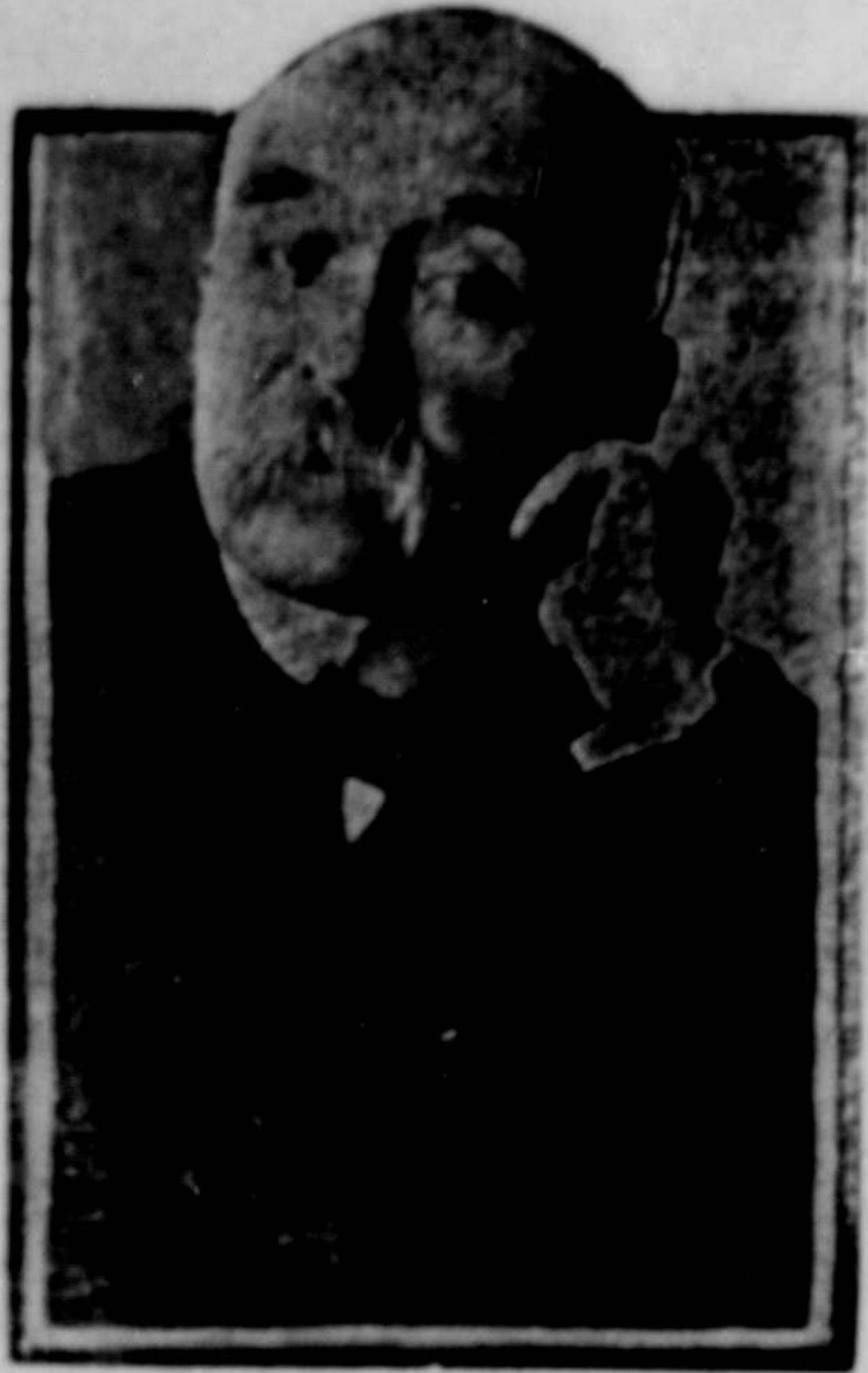
London, October 1.—The British casualties during September are reported to total 104,598 in killed, wounded and missing.

Another Air Raid.

Hostile aeroplanes again raided London last night. No details have yet been received of any casualties or material damage.

MR. NICOL THOMPSON VISITS HAZELTON

Mr. Nicol Thompson, the Fuel Controller, returned to the city last evening from Hazelton. He was accompanied by Mr. Alexander Sharp, one of the best known mining engineers in the province. The purpose of their visit up river was to inspect the property of the New Hazelton Gold Cobalt Mines, Ltd., of which company Mr. Thompson is a director. He is very enthusiastic regarding this property in particular as well as the other prospects on the Rocher de Boule.

The tunnel is now in 650 feet and has passed through three creeds containing 170 feet of high grade ore. The first shoot of 81 feet is gold-cobalt which averages \$100 to the ton in gold. The next shoot is high-grade molybdenite and is twenty feet long and two feet wide. They are now working on a raise and also on a winze on this shoot. Twenty tons of this ore is all ready sacked and ready for shipping. The tram line will be finished in the course of a week, when regular shipments from this property will commence.

Both Mr. Thompson and Mr. Sharp are highly pleased with the manner in which the development work has progressed. They are assured that the time is close at hand when this property can no longer be regarded as a prospect, but will be a producing mine. Mr. Sharp regards it as one of the best he has seen in the province. As a result of this visit to Hazelton, Mr. Nicol Thompson is the more convinced of the tremendous future for this district in Central British Columbia.

Mr. Sharp left this morning for Vancouver, but Mr. Thompson has been engaged today in investigating into the fuel situation here in his official capacity as Fuel Controller.

COAL SCOW CAPSIZES—450 TONS OF COAL LOST

This morning at the Albert & McCaffery wharf, four hundred and fifty tons of perfectly good New Wellington Coal were dumped into the water. Needless to say, with coal at \$12 per ton, it was not done on purpose. So far as can be learned, the scow was in a leaky condition on arrival here, when it was tied up at the wharf. It gradually filled with water, and finally capsized. The heavy water-logged scow hit the wharf and damaged it rather severely. The fender piling has been smashed, but the total damage will not be known until the wharf is thoroughly examined.

This is one of the contingencies which has to be allowed for in fixing coal prices.

THE GOVERNMENT AND THE ELECTIONS

Ottawa, Sept. 13.—The great Conservative party which claims to number in its ranks all the good sports, all the thoroughbreds, all the hearty fellows who refuse to do certain things because it "isn't cricket," is now engaged in putting through Parliament a Franchise Act which kicks the other contender in the ankle, strews tacks on the track and then tells him to go in and run the race.

For some reason or other the Borden Government wants to win the next election. Whether by hook or crook—but mostly by crook—it has set out to win. Why it wants to win is a mystery. It is not because it has made a record for good government. The Ross Rifle, the paper shoes, the spavined horses, the fuse scandals, the profiteering by Sir Jos. Flavelle and other of its cold storage friends, all say no to that. It must be that the country hasn't been bled white enough yet. There must still be a few dollars in this distracted land for the looters to get. The goose hasn't reached its limit of golden eggs. Being a goose it goes on laying. When it quits laying the high cost of living will quit too, and the Borden Government and its friends will be willing to quit also, satisfied, that there is nothing left worth taking.

Another reason why the Borden Government may wish to remain in is to see the C. N. R. deal through. The C. N. R. deal, not to put too fine a point on it, is a deal to take over an insolvent railway, which the people of Canada own already, and give Mackenzie and Mann and a band of Toronto pirates sixty million dollars for a block of six hundred thousand shares of watered stock which is worth considerably less than nothing. Financial institutions with which Sir Joseph Flavelle is connected, and whose man Finance Minister White is said to be, are intimately connected with this deal. Most of the plans revolve around E. R. Wood, another planet in the Flavelle system. In fact, a C. N. R. train can't run off the track without spilling Mr. Wood out of Sir William's private car.

The Borden Government wants to remain in to see this highly important C. N. R. deal through. The loose ends can't be gathered up until after the next general election. Hence these desperate attempts of a rotten government to remain unburied for a few years longer. Meanwhile there is a big campaign fund in the C. N. R. Deal as soon as it gets past Parliament, but the Borden Government must earn the money by sticking around long enough to get it past the arbitrators who are to be called upon to value the worthless stock. A deal like that requires a lot of guidance.

There are many ways by which the Borden Government can linger superfluous on the stage for some time to come. The extension lapses this coming October, but a Government that wants to wait and see may very well spring things along till next spring by one trick or another. If money gives out, that is to say if the appropriations voted by Parliament are exhausted, the Government can manage on orders-in-council, governor-general's warrants, and other constitutional subterfuges. It will be a dead government of course, and it will stink up the face of the earth against the will of the people, but it will serve. Yet, it is like Mercutio's wound—it will serve. At the very shortest it aims to hang on till next January and then

G. T. P. OFFICIAL PARTY LEAVE FOR THE SOUTH

Yesterday afternoon about ten minutes to four, the special train carrying the officials of the G. T. P. pulled into Prince Rupert. Slides on the G. T. P. are no respectors of persons and this one happening near Hole-in-the-Wall yesterday played Prince Rupert a nasty trick. All arrangements had been completed for a dinner being given to the railroad magnates on Saturday night on board the "Prince George." It is not every day that Mr. Alfred W. Smithers, chairman of the board of directors in London, England, Mr. H. A. Kelley, the newly appointed president, and Mr. Hinton vice-president and general manager of the G. T. P., can be got together all at once, in Prince Rupert. Captain Nicholson, of the G. T. P. Steamship Co., was also in town, having come up from Vancouver on Saturday. But Prince Rupert's post praudial orators were denied their opportunity on this occasion. The forces of nature proved too strong.

In speaking with the president yesterday about this, his first trip over the entire system, Mr. Kelley said that what he had seen on this excursion more than justified the faith he has always had in B. C. The vast potentialities of the hinterland tributary to the line of the G. T. P. are more apparent now than ever. Having been over the ground himself now, Mr. Kelley can appreciate the enthusiasm of Mr. Hinton for Central British Columbia.

On their arrival, automobiles were in readiness to convey the party over the city. An inspection was made of the drydock, under the guidance of Mr. Pillsbury, the drydock superintendent.

In the fine weather, Prince Rupert looked its best yesterday and the distinguished railroaders left for Vancouver this morning with the knowledge that Prince Rupert is "some city."

THE FIRST NECESSITY

For the second time in one month, a special train carrying notable parties has been seen in Prince Rupert. On the first of September, Premier Brewster, his ministers and several members of Parliament were here, at the commencement of their educational tour through Central British Columbia. Yesterday, the 30th of September, saw the arrival of the men that matter in the affairs of the railroad that serves the same district, at the end of their tour through Central British Columbia.

The interest displayed in this part of the province by both the agencies that can either retard or accelerate its development, during the same month may be an accidental occurrence. If so it is a happy coincidence. It is possible, however, that the visits of both these distinguished parties have more than a chance bearing upon each other. Both of them are intimately concerned with the progress and development of the country adjacent to the line of the G. T. P. Their interests in this matter are identical. The development of the vacant lands in Central British Columbia means increased revenue both to the Government and to the G. T. P. Such would enhance the prosperity of the whole province.

It has remained for a Liberal Government to adumbrate such legislation as will make this possible. Under the old regime it was fine and dandy that the land remain in the hands of the speculators awaiting enhanced prices. The first necessity for Central British Columbia is development. The essentials are here in abundance. Fertile land and a splendid climate, but the curse of the speculator has withheld that land from use. To remove that curse and to bring under cultivation these fertile valleys is the intention of Premier Brewster and his ministers. And they will do it. Prince Rupert and the National Transcontinental was the project of the Liberal Government at Ottawa. Prince Rupert, however, has been a city

"under a curse" also. Sir Geo. Foster, minister of trade and Commerce, said so. Its development has been retarded by the inactivity of its two million dollar drydock. What ought to be humming with the wheels of industry lies silent and deserted. The far-sighted plans of Sir Wilfrid Laurier and his Government for developing this northern harbor into a great entrepot for the commerce of the East have not been carried out. Sir George Foster was perhaps more correct than he wot of when he said Prince Rupert was under a curse, but the curse consisted of the Borden Government. Prince Rupert has made no progress as a result of their six years in office. The progressive Liberal policy of development has been arrested. Every attempt to get the drydock plant set agoing has been nullified. As the provincial Conservative Government was quite content to permit the land being withheld from use, so is the Dominion Conservative Government apparently content to see Prince Rupert drydock remain idle. What have they done to get it going? Nothing, so far as anyone ever heard.

The necessities of Prince Rupert demand the return of a Liberal Government at Ottawa. Six years' experience of the Conservative regime is sufficient justification for this demand.

murder Sir Wilfrid Laurier with a winter campaign.

After these good sportsmen done their damndest to dodge consequences until next January or later, they have one last card up their sleeve. The franchise is not only a means of delay, because, if a new franchise is created it implies new voters' lists and new voters' lists imply plenty of time in which to compile them, but it may also be a means under Providence—a long way under—of re-electing the Borden Government if it can be so handled as to let everybody vote but the Liberals. The excuse that will be offered for a new franchise is that the Canadian Parliament is the only assembly of similar size and dignity in the world that lacks a franchise of its own.

Up to the present the Canadian Parliament has got along fairly well by making use of the franchise employed to elect the provincial legislatures. But the Borden Government wants to change all that because seven out of nine of the provincial legislatures are now in the hands of the Liberals. Consequently the Borden Government wants a special franchise that will hand-pick public opinion in its favor, if such a thing is possible.

The outrage to freedom is so flagrant that even the Borden Government is constrained to announce that it is merely a war-time franchise for a war-time election. That is to say it promises never to do it again if the people will only elect it this once. After that it will allow Canada to be good again and get back to the old, honest franchise.

The first thing this outrageous Borden Government proposes to do with its new Franchise Act is to skulk behind the skirts of a few women. The women who are to have the vote are the adult female relations—wives, mothers daughters, sisters—of the soldiers, whether they are in Canada, in England or at the front. There are thirty thousand dead soldiers and their womenfolk are to have the vote too. The argument is that these men who fought and died for their country have every right to be represented by their female proxies at the next general election. And so they have. The men have done their bit by fighting for their country and the women have done their bit by giving up their men to do the fighting. But what about all the other women in Canada who have done their bit by helping the Red Cross, collecting funds, making comforts for the soldiers in the trenches, not to mention bearing the ills that the high cost of living due to the Borden Government's profiteering friends, have imposed upon this country.

This hand-picked women vote may disappoint the Borden Government after all because the separation allowances have never been able to keep pace with Sir Joseph Flavelle's bacon and naturally some women may feel sore. But such as it is, it works out strangely enough. Take a case in point. Mr. F. B. Carvell's daughter is married to a soldier who is at the front. She will have a vote, but her mother, who is presumably as good a patriot, will not. Many similar complications could be cited. And what about a German or an Austrian woman who may be married to a soldier? Fearful though it is of aliens the Borden Government gives her a

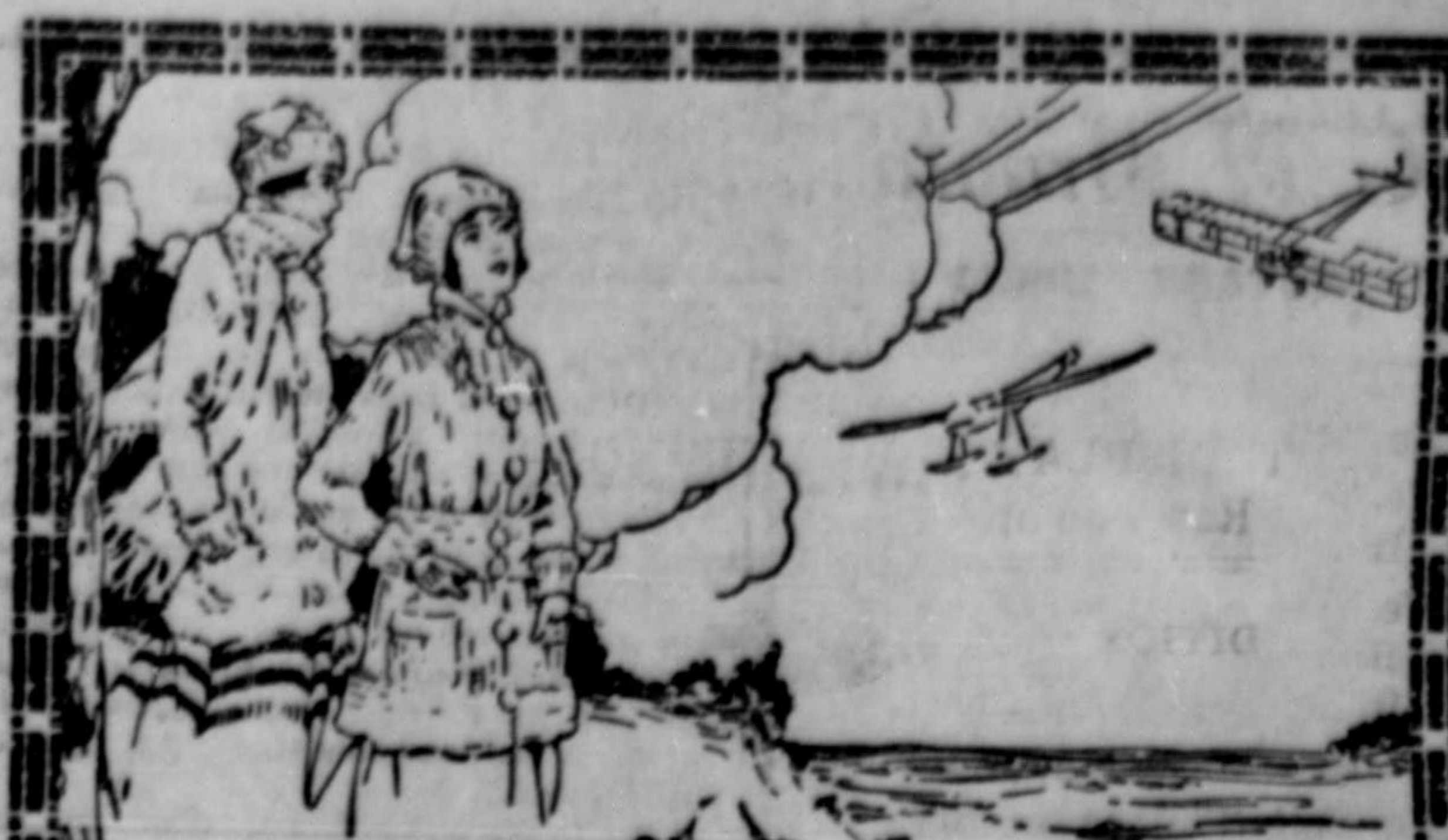

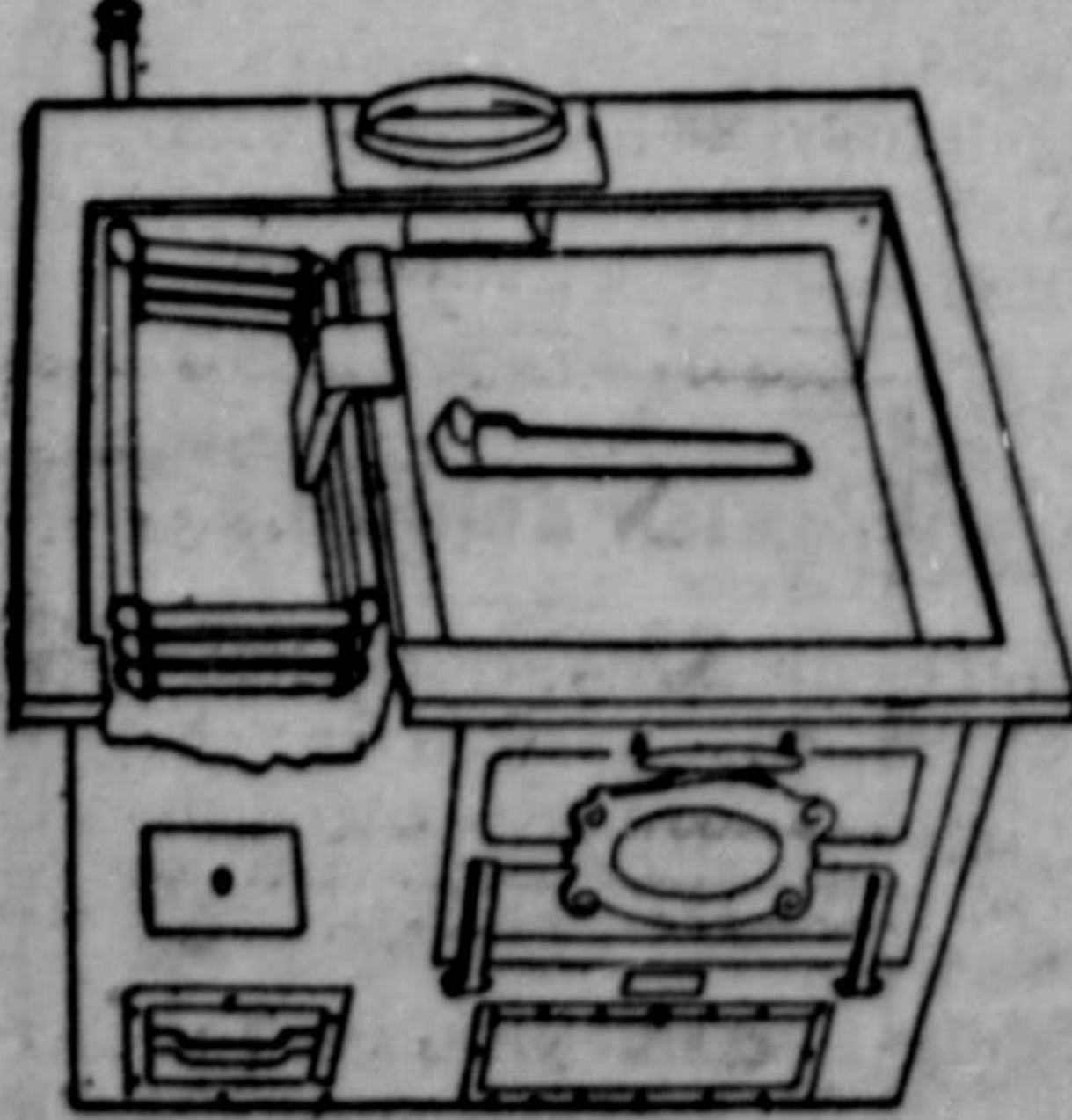

vote but excludes Canadian women who haven't the soldier relations necessary to give them a look in.

Lately some of the provinces have given women the vote on the same terms as men. Other provinces have gone in for a more restricted franchise for women. In some provinces the women voters are already on the list and have voted in elections. In other provinces, notably Ontario, they have been given the vote but are not yet on the lists and are consequently not available for the next election. Under these circumstances most fair minded people would say "If you must have a Franchise Act of your own which will bring the suffrage up to date, give everybody a vote, men and women alike, and let it go at that."

But this does not suit the Borden Government's book. It is taking no chances with women who might vote the way their Liberal husbands or brothers or fathers, or sweethearts, tell them, not to mention the other women who might vote against the Borden Government on its record of graft and its alliance with the high cost of living in the shape of Sir Joseph Flavelle and others of his kindred. The plain truth is that the Borden Government's Franchise Act disfranchises thousands more women than it enfranchises, but that will not prevent the vote-stealers from making a big holler about enlarging the boundaries of freedom and taking another stride along the road of equal rights. Listen to the mocking bird!—H. F. Gadsby.
