FRENCH AIRMEN RETALIATE FOR AIR RAIDS

BIG VICTORY IN MESOPOTAMIA --- RUSSIANS BREAK THROUGH ON RIGA SECTOR

COMPLETE SUCCESS OF THE MESOPOTAMIA OFFENSIVE

MAIN POSITION AT RAMADIE TAKEN, WITH FOUR THOUSAND PRISONERS AND AN IMMENSE QUANTITY OF WAR MATERIAL—RUSSIANS BREAK THROUGH GERMAN LINE ON RIGA SECTOR ON A MILE FRONT

London, October 3.—The British offensive in Mesopotamia has met with complete success. The main Turkish position at Ramadie was stormed with astonishing little loss to the attackers. Four thousand Turks were taken prisoners, and innumerable guns and an immense quantity of munitions and war materials. The remainder of the Turkish forces are in full flight across the desert.

Flanders Front.

London, October 3.—(British official.) The Germans have made five distinct and separate attacks on the British positions along the Ypres-Menin road. Each attack was preceded by a storm of shell fire, but notwithstanding, each attack ended in failure. The attackers were unable to shake the hold of the British troops. The northeast corner of the Polygon Wood was also attacked severely, but the defenders were able to withstand all the pressure brought to bear upon them.

Another Air Raid.

London, October 3.—In last night's air raid, there were ten killed and thirty-eight injured.

French Front.

Paris, Oct. 3.—Heavy artillery fighting prevails all along the front sectors. Two attacks were made by the enemy in force, and both were repulsed. Heavy losses were inflicted upon the enemy.

Russian Front.

Petrograd, October 3.—At a point on the Riga sector, our troops were successful in breaking through the German lines and pushed forward for about a mile, taking many prisoners. The Russian attack was unexpected by the Germans, who retreated precipitately.

Austrian Front.

London, Oct. 3.—The German Supreme Command, apparently alarmed at the success of the Italian drive on the Bainsizza Plateau, have ordered the transfer of a large number of Austrian troops from France, Galicia and the Bukovina to the Italian front to meet the renewed offensive now starting by General Cadorna.

The German Morale.

London, Oct. 3.—The morale of the German troops is steadily deteriorating, while the spirit of the British and the Allies is daily rising. Serious admissions have been made by prisoners taken in recent battles. The effect of the British drumfire and the failure of the German attacks are having their due effect upon the German troops. They are becoming dispirited. All their forward defences have been badly demoralized by the ceaseless bombardment.

OFFICE STAFF OF COLD STORAGE CO. ON STRIKE

The second meeting of the newly-formed Clerical Workers was held last night in the Carpenters' Hall. The president, Mr. F. T. Bowness, was in the chair. There was a good meeting and several new members were received.

The matter of the staff of the Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Company being on strike on a question of wages was discussed. The office staff there had applied for a ten per cent increase which is made necessary by the increasing high cost of living. As this was not forthcoming at the end of the month, their resignations being in, they did not start work yesterday.

The Trades and Labor Council have taken up the matter now, and the Trades and Labor Councils of Vancouver and Victoria have been notified of the strike being on, with the intention of keeping others from coming here to take their positions.

PEACE DEMONSTRATION IN FRANKFORT-ON-MAINE

Amsterdam, October 3.—Details of a great peace demonstration which was held in Frankfort-on-Maine on Sunday have just reached here. The demonstration was an extraordinary one and in the speeches delivered, "Peace without annexation" was the text. The organized demonstration was not interfered with by the authorities and full latitude was allowed the speakers.

Mr. Don Yelf was among the passengers arriving back again this morning in the city. He has been as far east as Rochester N. Y., to undergo an operation to have a piece of shrapnel, which he received in France, removed.

On account of the high water and the high winds yesterday, the passenger train from the east was delayed at Tyee. The river was backed up to the track, and the train had to wait until the tide fell. It was a double header and pulled into Prince Rupert depot about half past nine last night.

GALE BLOWS TREE ON TRANSMISSION LINE

As a result of the high winds prevailing for the last day or two, a tree was overturned and falling, broke the transmission line from Shawatians yesterday afternoon. The accident happened a little after two o'clock, just before the newspapers went to press. With no power to operate the machines, publication yesterday was unavoidably delayed. Several insulators were broken. The department's men were soon on the job, and managed to get the line connected up before dark.

RED CROSS NOTES

The Red Cross sale of home-cooking to be held in the Third Avenue tent on Friday this week will be under the charge of Mrs. Hogan and Mrs. Kergin.

Another plea is made to the public for remembrance of the prisoners of war in Germany. They are suffering hardships, and except for the parcels of food-stuffs sent from their friends and the society, would often have to go hungry. Exchanged and escaped prisoners say that the parcels do reach them and are their salvation.

The amount realized at the sale of home-cooking held last week amounted to \$42.00. The articles drawn for and won are as follows: Mrs. C. L. Monroe presented a tray, which was won by Mrs. Vickers; Cyril Orme, bathing cap, won by E. F. Doyle; Mrs. Deasey, Indian spoon, won by Mrs. G. A. Taylor; Table Supply, tea, won by E. F. Doyle. The bad weather affected the sale last week very materially, and probably accounted for the very few donations of home cooking received. Nevertheless, the men in the trenches are being wounded every day, and the demand for medical appliances does not fluctuate according to the weather.

The twenty dollar paid piece is still held over and will again be put on this week.

RIGA TO REMAIN GERMAN

Amsterdam.—The German press comment extensively upon the fall of Riga. The "Rheinische Westphalische Zeitung" says that "Riga is a German town, and with God's help, will remain so eternally. Our Riga is German, and thus it must remain." The "Koelnische Volkszeitung" hails Riga also as a German city, and says that it will cause indescribable joy throughout Germany that the German flag now waves over the famous port. The "Tageblatt" says: "Our pleasure over the capture of this old German city is augmented by the speed with which the capture was effected. The 'Lokalanzeiger' says that Riga has now returned to itself, and its inhabitants can in future themselves determine their lot. The 'Rundschau' says that an old Baltic dream is now fulfilled.

GERMANY WOULD QUIT BELGIUM ON CONDITIONS

London, Oct. 2.—Germany has agreed to evacuate Belgium on certain conditions, it is declared in a German official statement, according to a despatch from Berne today given out by the wireless press.

Germany, it is stipulated, must have the right to develop her economic enterprises freely in Belgium, especially in Antwerp.

This proposal was made in a supplementary note to the Vatican, replying to the peace initiative of Pope Benedict. It was in the form of a verbal communication made by Foreign Secretary Kuehlmann to the Papal Nuncio at Munich, wherein the Foreign Secretary specified the conditions under which Germany was willing to conclude peace on the basis of the evacuation of Belgium.

Pay Part of Compensation.

The verbal note to the Papal Nuncio said Germany would contribute a share of the compensation to be paid to Belgium for war damages. Belgium would be required, it said, to give a guarantee that any such menace as that which threatened Germany in 1914 would in future be excluded. Belgium must undertake to maintain administrative separation of the Flanders and Walloon districts introduced by Germany, the verbal note says, because this separation corresponds to the wishes of a majority of the Belgian people, and because Germany desires such separation on account of racial sympathy.

A semi-official communication in the German press in explanation of the new German proposal says the Government intentionally avoided stating more clearly the conditions thus outlined. These conditions are said to be compatible with the dignity of Belgium. Germany avoided mentioning the question of the Throne, because this was a Belgian domestic matter. Germany, the communication says, will agree to any government in Belgium which accepts the conditions set forth. The principle question is how the guarantees enumerated can be formulated.

ITALIANS FIGHTING ARABS IN TRIPOLI

Washington, Oct. 1.—While carrying forward the Italian offensive beyond the Isonzo and conducting campaigns in the Balkans, the Italian army is also engaged in vigorous military operations against German and Turkish forces in Tripoli. A despatch received here today from Rome says that the Italians are again fighting the Turk-Arab forces in Tripoli, where the enemy is using arms of German make, and German officers are leading the natives.

"The Italian forces in Tripoli," says the despatch received here, "are again fighting the Turco-Arab forces, which are armed with machine guns and rifles of German make. How these arms got to the African coast is not known. German officers are leading the rebellious native tribes, which, however, have been attacked and defeated by the Italian troops. Six hundred enemy dead have been counted and a thousand prisoners taken. The Italian losses have been insignificant."

Last evening at the Central Hotel, Mr. John Clark, of Girvan, Scotland, was united in matrimony to Miss Margaret Jeppy, of Buckie, Scotland. The bridesmaid was Miss Jeannie Strachan, while the groom was supported by Mr. Harry Menzies.

The ceremony was performed by the Rev. W. W. Wright of the Baptist Church, and the bride was given away by her father, Mr. Alexander Jeppy. After the knot was tied, a happy wedding party sat down to table, where supper was served in the fine style indigenous to the Hotel Central. After supper, dancing was started. The violins were there and first-class music was provided. And the proceedings were kept up to a late hour.

FRENCH AIRMEN BOMB MANY OF GERMAN CITIES

Retaliation for Raids on Open French Towns—The British Press is Critical re German Raids.

Paris, October 3.—The French air squadrons have bombed the German cities of Frankfurt-on-Main, Stuttgart, Treves, and Coblenz in retaliation for the German raids on French cities which were unfortified.

Airmen's Record.

London, Oct. 3.—British aeroplanes have dropped one hundred and twenty-five tons of bombs over the German lines during the month of September. So far this quantity is a record for one month's doings.

British Press Critical.

New York, Oct. 3.—The London press is very critical over the predictions regarding air raids. It is being asserted that the Germans have proved that they are able to attack London at will, during any kind of weather.

An Air Combat.

London, Oct. 3.—Vosse, the noted German aviator, has been slain during a spectacular air combat. The successful British aviator, whose name is not given, triumphed in a fight over the German lines. His skill and pluck brought him the victory. Captain Guynemer lost his life about the same time.

Hospitals Bombed.

German airmen dropped bombs on two hospitals behind the British lines. Three of the nurses were killed outright and several were wounded besides a number of patients, who were wounded further.

SASKATOON STREET CAR SMASH INJURES MANY

Saskatoon, October 3.—Two street cars collided here today in a head-on smash. Several passengers have been severely hurt, although no lives were lost. Both the street cars are badly damaged.

THE GOLD-STORAGE INQUIRY

Pending the report of the Cold-storage commission on the trading figures supplied by the manager of the William Davies Company, the public will not rest satisfied with vague and indefinite replies to questions that demand an answer. Facts have been brought to light in the course of the inquiry that involve the Minister of Finance as well as the William Davies Company in responsibility for the writing off in the past two years of \$547,594, not charged to costs, on which no war tax was levied. A searching scrutiny must be made of the justice of this transaction. For the five years, 1913-17, the company set aside a total of \$834,000 for reserve fund, in addition to very considerable sums written off against depreciation of plant and buildings. The transfer in war times of three-quarters of a million dollars to reserve fund in two years is a startling disposal of excessive profits which the Finance Minister as well as the William Davies Company must be asked to justify. It is not overlooked by the public that beneath the maze of figures salient facts emerge that place the William Davies Company on its defence. What were the net profits of the company for 1917? This is the point on which the public eye is fixed. The deductions made by the company under the head of reserve fund, depreciation, bonuses, etc., are well known methods of disposing of excessive profits. Are these "deductions" warranted in view of the sacrifices which other citizens are called upon to make for the Allied cause, and in view of the prohibitive prices of bacon which have gone to swell these bloated profits? The whole question at issue between the Davies Company and the public is summed up in the profits for 1917, which the Commission's auditor reports to have been \$1,827,494, or ninety per cent. of the company's capital of \$2,000,000. Just what deductions could legitimately be made from this sum for depreciation and other charges is a question the commission must decide, in view of its bearing upon the profits tax. The next point on which the public calls for searching investigation is the question of the relations between the Davies Company and its "worst-competitors," the

Harris Abattoir Company. So far as these relations have been revealed by the evidence of Mr. Fox it appears to the public as a case of competition between the right hand and the left. The case presented by the Davies Company is unsatisfactory in the extreme.

But the William Davies Company does not stand alone at the bar of public opinion. Had Canada followed the lead of other belligerent countries it would have been impossible for this cold-storage monopoly to set aside half a million dollars as a reserve fund in this fourth year of war. The failure of the Borden Government to conscript excessive profits, and to place wealth as well as men at the service of the nation in this war, is responsible for the huge profits made out of the food of the people. The Cold-Storage Commission is a Government order to shut the stable door after the horse has been stolen. The public will await the finding of this commission, but will that report, like the report on the high cost of living, pigeon-holed two years ago, be followed up by Government inaction? There does not seem to be much hope of obtaining any redress from the present Government, if its attitude as to the duties of the Food Controller may be taken as a guide to its intentions. There would have been no need for a Cold-storage Commission were the Government sincere in its professions of sympathy with the harassed consumer. All that the country insists upon in the protection of the public from the profiteers could have been carried out by a Food Controller who lived up to his autocratic and high-sounding title. As matters stand the control of food in Canada is in the hands of owners of cold-storage plants.

What has the Government done to relieve the consumer and to restore freedom of trade? It appoints a Food Controller to whom is delegated the power to regulate prices. Has this Food Controller done enough to alleviate the distress, beyond an appeal to the public to eat less bacon? When is the Food Controller going to tackle the only practical plan for controlling the cold-storage controllers—the regulation of prices? In no other way can the law of supply and demand be released

from cold-storage, where it has been incarcerated for years. Why has the Government failed to make the delegated functions of the Food Controller operative? Can any valid excuse be offered for the remissness of Sir Robert Borden in the urgent matter of the high cost of living? Are he and his Government so completely under the thumb of the Big Interests that no action dare be taken to alleviate the hardships under which the people are suffering at the hands of war profiteers? These are questions that must be answered.—The Globe.

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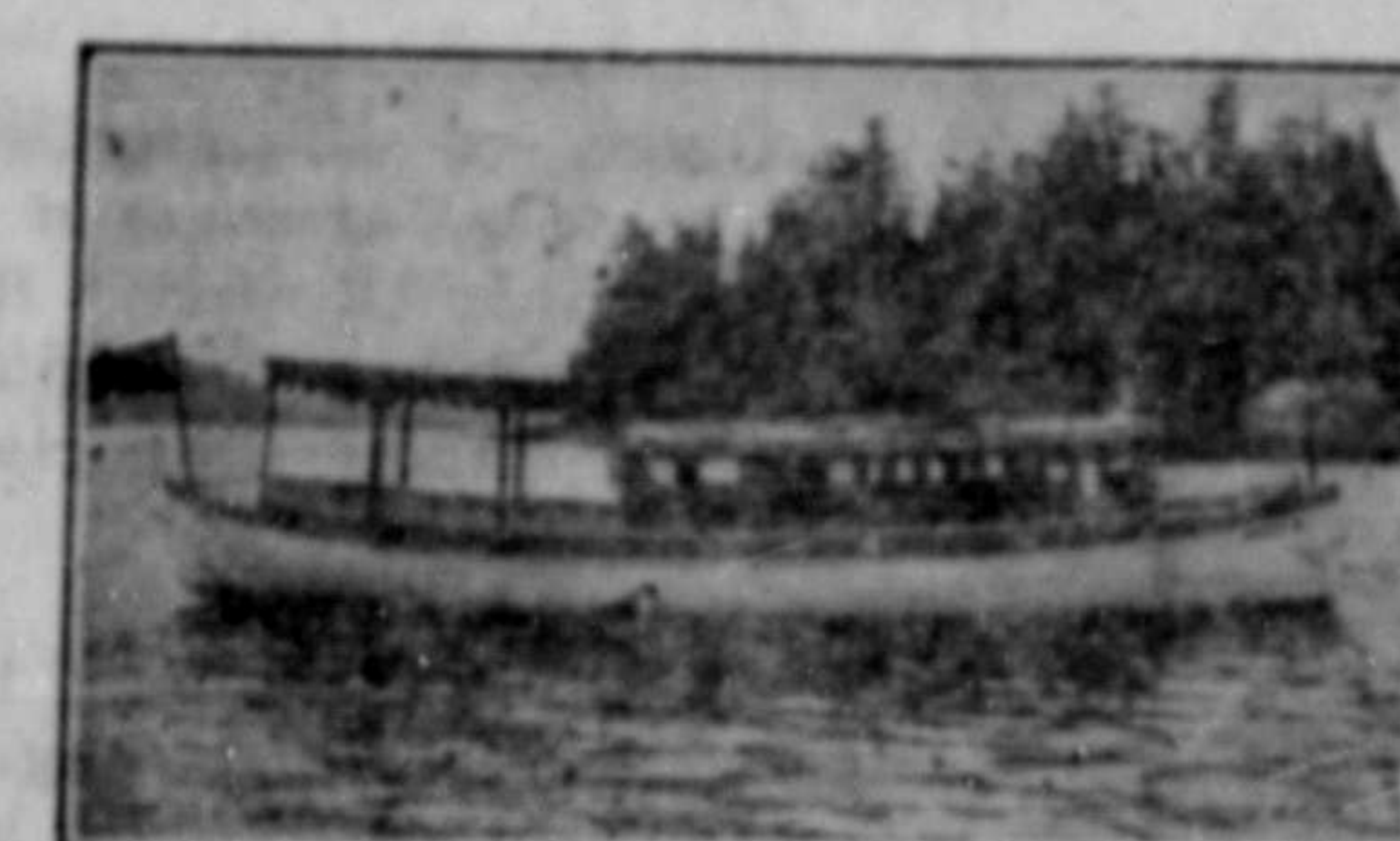

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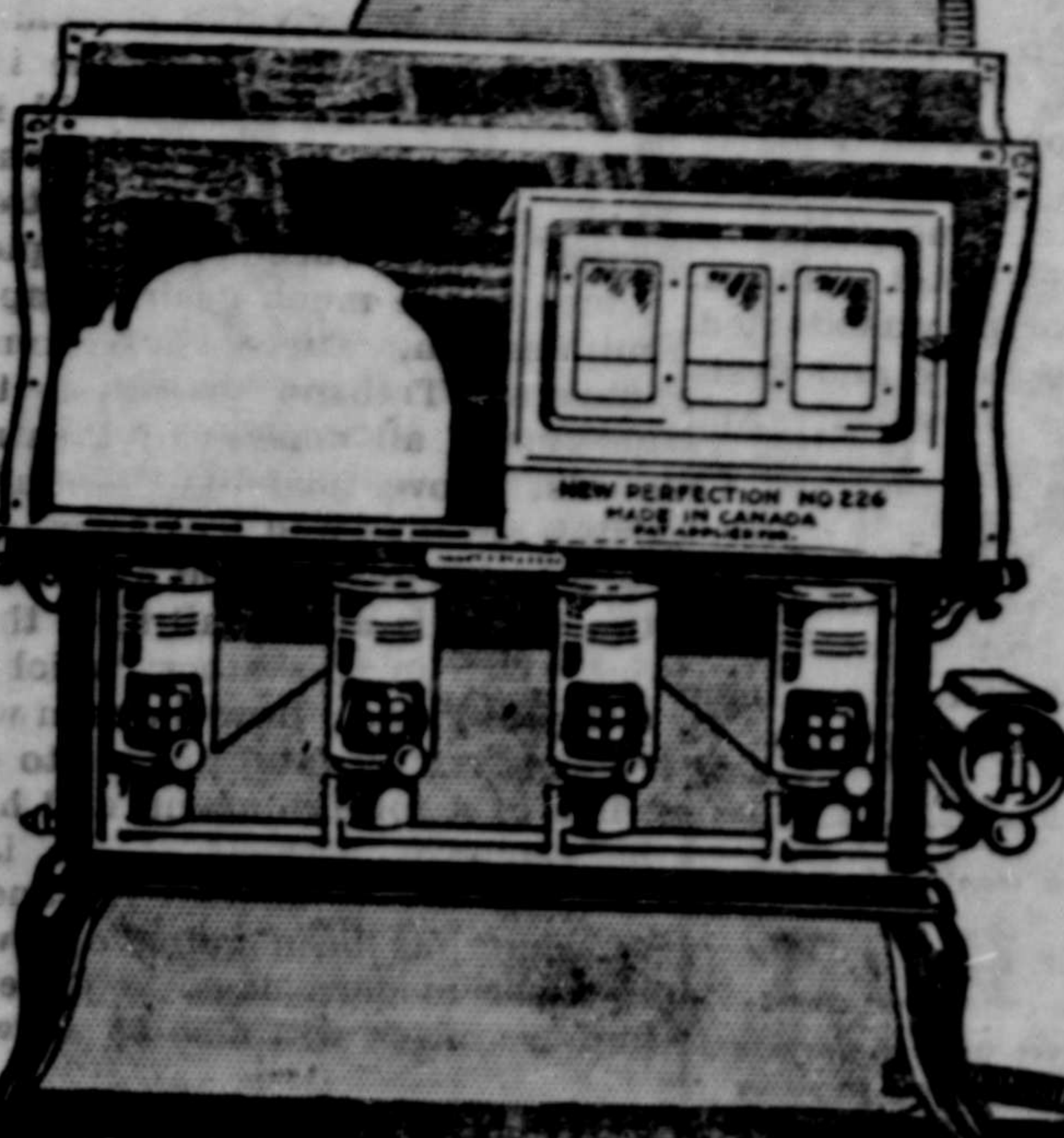

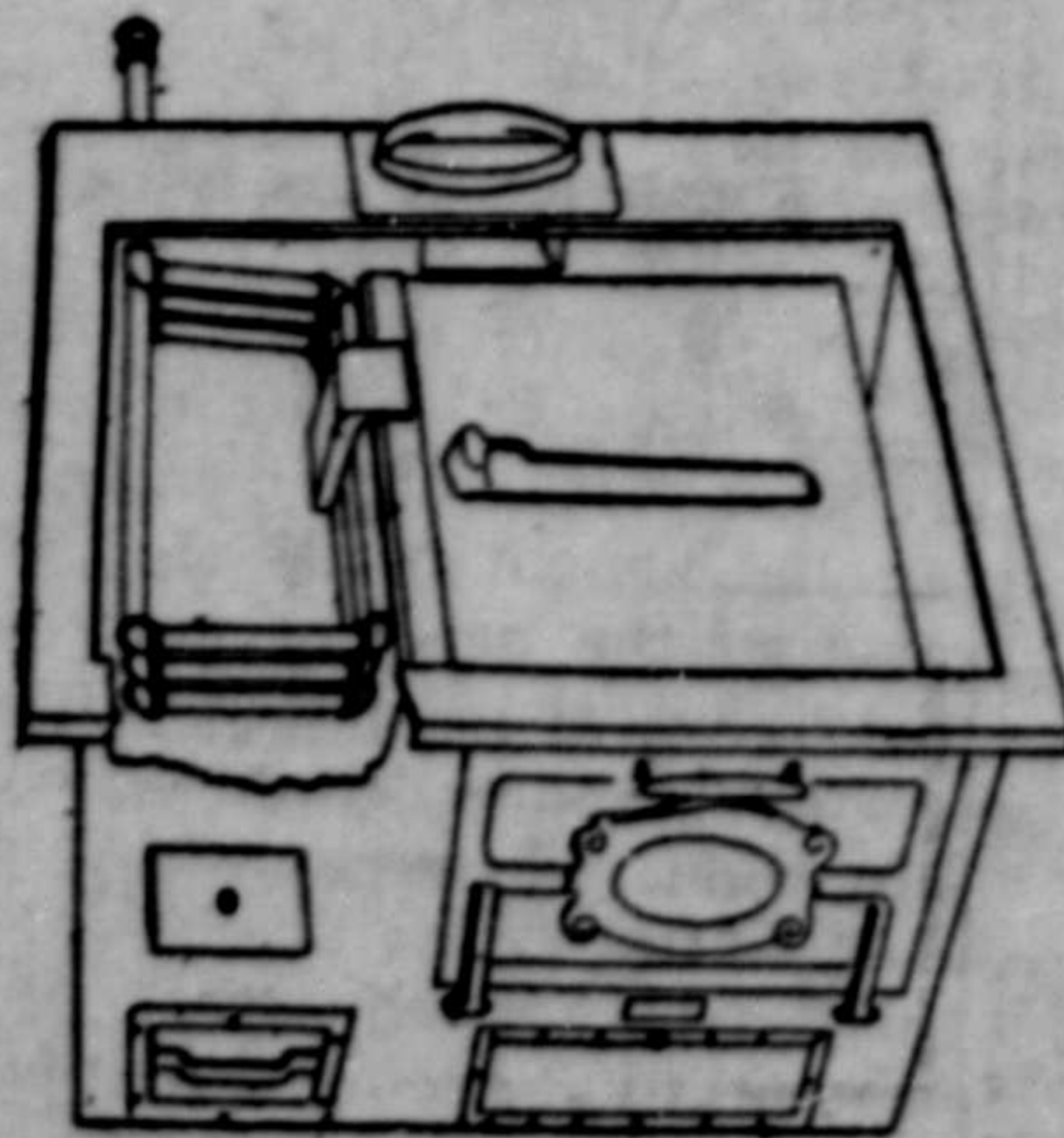
