ANOTHER BRITISH VICTORY IN FLANDERS

ALL OBJECTIVES GAINED --- BRITISH CASUALTIES ARE LIGHT --- MANY PRISONERS

NEW OFFENSIVE STARTED BY BRITISH EAST OF YPRES

GENERAL HAIG'S TROOPS SMASH THEIR WAY FORWARD OVER
A MILE ON A NINE-MILE FRONT—KEY POSITIONS TO THE
WHOLE GERMAN DEFENCE SYSTEM CAPTURED—
GERMANS SURRENDER BY HUNDREDS

(Special to The Daily News.)
London, October 5.—A new offensive was started by the forces under General Haig yesterday to the east of Ypres. The attackers penetrated for a distance little better than a mile into the German positions on a nine-mile front. The crests of the Paschendaele and Gheluvelt ridges were covered by the British and the advance was carried beyond the hamlet of Broedseinde and Cambrin Covert, among strongholds comprising crucially important positions to the German defence system.

The capture of these ridges places the last of the higher ground in this region in the hands of the British, from which they will be in a position to menace the Germans on the Flanders plain. The attack was launched under heavy clouds of mist following a night of drizzling rain.

Caught in a Barrage.
Three enemy divisions who were ordered to retake the recently captured positions near Zonnebeke, were caught in the British barrage when preparing to attack. They could not get back, and they could not advance in face of the rifle and machine gun fire of the British, and they were glad to surrender in hundreds.

Advance 2,589 Yards.
London, October 5.—In our offensive east of Ypres, the British gained all their objectives. General Haig's troops advanced on a front of sixteen thousand yards and to a depth of 2,589 yards. The War Office announced today the capture of the village of Kroadseinde. Everywhere the British have done splendidly in one of the most brilliant offensives ever attempted at the front.

An unusual feature of the battle was that at Zonnebeke three German divisions which had been ordered to retake positions captured by the British last week, were caught in the British barrage cut off by the British barrage from retreat, they had no alternative but to surrender. The British casualties today were comparatively small.

British Official.
London, Oct. 5.—The British launched another offensive at 6 a.m. this morning. The attack is making satisfactory progress and prisoners are coming in.

French Official.
Paris, Oct. 5.—Artillery fighting is in progress on both sides of the Meuse. French aviators bombed Frankfurt and Rastatt.

German Tanks.
The Germans have been experimenting with tanks armed with three-inch cannon and machine guns. The forward end of the tank is fitted with a spur-like ram, while the upper part bears a superimposed cupola and armor plates descend sufficiently to protect the caterpillar wheels which are almost invisible.

Russian Front.
Petrograd, October 5.—At the northern end of the Russian front in the region of Kronstadt, an artillery duel of great severity is in progress. On the Roumanian front, in the region of Poliani, the enemy left his advanced trenches and has retired to more favorable positions.

Austrian Regiment Deserts en Bloc.
Geneva, Oct. 2.—The Journal Azzet, of Budapest, says that during the visit of Kaiser Wilhelm to the Roumanian front recently, an entire armed Austrian regiment, consisting chiefly of Bohemian Slavs, deserted en bloc to the Roumanians. The men asked to be incorporated as volunteers with the Serbians. Their request was granted.

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EARTHQUAKE IN JAPAN
(Special to The Daily News.)
Tokio, October 5.—Great damage has been done to the district adjacent to Tokio by a tremendous earthquake. Very meagre reports have been received so far from the outside districts, but the damage is estimated at five millions. Over a thousand people are missing. Relief measures have been undertaken by the army.

OCTOBER THIRTEENTH!
(Special to The Daily News.)
Ottawa, Oct. 5.—The call to the colors will go forth on October 13th. Several weeks will then elapse before the men actually have to report. During the intervening period, appeals for exemption may be made. Only class "A" men will then actually start their military training. This class is composed of fit men for overseas service.

PERUVIAN MINISTER DISOBEYS ORDERS

Lima, Oct. 5.—The Peruvian Government has discovered that the Peruvian minister to Germany has disobeyed instructions "sent him on September 26 to present to the German Foreign Office an ultimatum demanding, under threat of breaking off diplomatic relations, that a satisfactory explanation be made within eight days, of the sinking of the Peruvian barque Lorso."

VERY SUDDEN DEATH OF MRS. CAPTAIN MUSGRAVE

Early yesterday morning, Capt. Musgrave of the "Lilloet" received the sad news from Victoria of the death of his wife. Mrs. Musgrave was a well known lady in Prince Rupert. She had many friends here since the early days of the city, who will be shocked to hear of her death. Only last Saturday, she left Prince Rupert for the south by the Princess Alice having been visiting in the district for some weeks previous.

Captain Musgrave, as he is more popularly called, holds the rank of Lieutenant Commander, Royal Navy. He is very well known on the coast for many years, and has a host of friends in this city. Captain Musgrave left for Victoria last night.

PROPOSES INDEPENDENT CANADIAN NATION

Brantford, Oct. 5.—A Canadian nation, independent of the British Parliament or the House of Lords' Legal Committee, yet a member of the British Empire, which would be composed of five nations was the proposal advanced at the luncheon of the Rotary Club here by Arthur Hawkes. He declared that the British Empire should sit at the peace conference table as five united nations. He urged that Canadians in politics acquit themselves like Canadians at war—as free men in every sense of the word.

PRINCE RUPERT MAN KILLED AT THE FRONT

Word has been received in town by Mrs. Matt Donald telling of the death of her husband, Mr. Matthew Donald, who has been killed at the front.

Mr. Matt Donald left here with the 18th Battalion and was well known in Prince Rupert. He leaves a wife and one child, to whom the sympathy of the community will go out in their bereavement.

SHIPPING LOSSES LESS

(Special to The Daily News.)
London, Oct. 5.—Fewer tons of Allied shipping is being destroyed every month. Last month's losses were the lightest since the ruthless U-boat warfare began, according to an Admiralty statement. Only thirteen British merchant ships over sixteen hundred tons were sunk last week.



GREAT FLYER DEAD

Captain George Guyonmer, the French aviator, who is thought to have been killed during a reconnaissance flight over Flanders in which he left Dunkirk on September 11th. Nothing has been heard of him since.

BALKAN ALLIES WILL DRIVE ON SOPHIA

Allies Will Cut Off Turkey From All Communication With Central Empires.

Washington, Oct. 4.—The delay in the mobilization of the Greek army for use on the Entente side of the war has been due to lack of equipment, which is to be furnished by France, Britain and the United States. This explanation of the delay was communicated to the Greek Legation today by the Foreign Office at Athens. When the necessary equipment has been obtained Greece will be able to furnish 300,000 men for use in the war.

The plan of the Allies in the Balkans, as partially disclosed today, is to advance upon Sofia, the capital of Bulgaria, and thus to cut off communications between Germany and Turkey. Germany was said to be drawing great quantities of supplies, especially oil and wheat, from Turkey, and this traffic cannot be interrupted until the line is cut by the international army now operating in Macedonia.

It is learned that an almost absolute equilibrium has been created in the Balkans between the Allied forces and those of the Central Powers, Turkey and Bulgaria. The 300,000 men Greece will add to the Anglo-French troops will give the Allies a preponderance of strength which is expected to overcome the enemy in that theatre of the war. It was explained at the Greek Legation today that he mobilization carried out by the former King Constantine emptied the warehouses and used up all military stores and equipment, leaving available for military employment only 80,000 troops raised by the Provisional Government of Venizelos at Saloniki, which are now fighting side by side with the Anglo-French army in Macedonia.

Britain and France have advanced to the Greek Government a loan of 1,000,000 francs, and Greece has ample assurance from the United States that it will do everything possible to assist Greece in making ready, and although there has been granted no loan as yet, it is not doubted that America will render financial aid when it is necessary. All of the money would be expended for the purchase of war supplies and for their transportation to Greece.

"THE VIXEN"

In this play, "The Vixen," she plays the part of a young society girl, who wrecks the life of her own sister by ingenious plots and false statements. She lures her sister's lover away, and then throws him aside when he loses his money. Her next move is to take another of her sister's lovers. This time the man keeps his money, so she keeps the man. The denouement comes some years later, when the deceit which she has practised upon her sister is proven. And then she is only saved from bringing ruin upon her home by the forbearance of the wronged sister.

The title role in this play is one that Theda Bara has made peculiarly her own, and the gripping power of her acting holds the audience from start to finish. In addition to the play, a fine comedy will also be shown.

AIR MINISTRY ESTABLISHED IN GT. BRITAIN

New Ministry Will Have Charge of Air Reprisals Against Germany—To Get After Essen and Berlin.

(Special to The Daily News.)
London, Oct. 5.—The British Air Ministry, which will have charge of the air reprisals against Germany, is to be created, according to a newspaper announcement today. It is supposed that an effort will be made to damage the Krupp works at Essen, and that Berlin will come in for the same treatment that Germany has accorded London.

Decided Upon.
This Standard this morning says that a vigorous policy of reprisals has been decided upon, and will be put into effect immediately.

Germany Raided.
A raid over Germany was made last night by French aviators. The cities of Frankfurt-on-Maine and Rastatt were bombed and much damage was observed by the attacking machines.

In the Balkans.
A successful raid was made by the British aviators on the Macedonian front is reported in the official statement published today.

AN ALLIANCE OF THE SOUTHERN REPUBLICS

Buenos Ayres, Oct. 4.—President Irigoyen is making a renewed effort to bring about a conference of South American republics to consider international affairs. Deputy Castellanos has introduced in the Chamber of Deputies the administration's bill approving the proposal of the President to invite the sister republics to meet at Buenos Ayres and to adopt a joint policy in regard to the world conflict.

President Irigoyen's programme is for the American republics jointly to demand that Germany end the war or else suffer a solid American boycott and a declaration in favor of the Entente Allies. Persons in the confidence of the President declare that he wishes to lead the South American republics against Germany rather than appear as if he had been pushed into the conflict by the United States.

The President is preparing a proclamation declaring that the Count von Luxburg incident is closed, and disapproving the action of congress favoring a rupture.

Deputy Castellanos, in presenting his resolution to the Chamber, said that Argentina should send von Luxburg to Germany as a prisoner on board an Argentine warship. Argentina has not requested a safe conduct for the former German minister, Senor Castellanos said, and he added that Germany's explanation of the Luxburg incident was insufficient because it failed to express an intention to punish the diplomat.

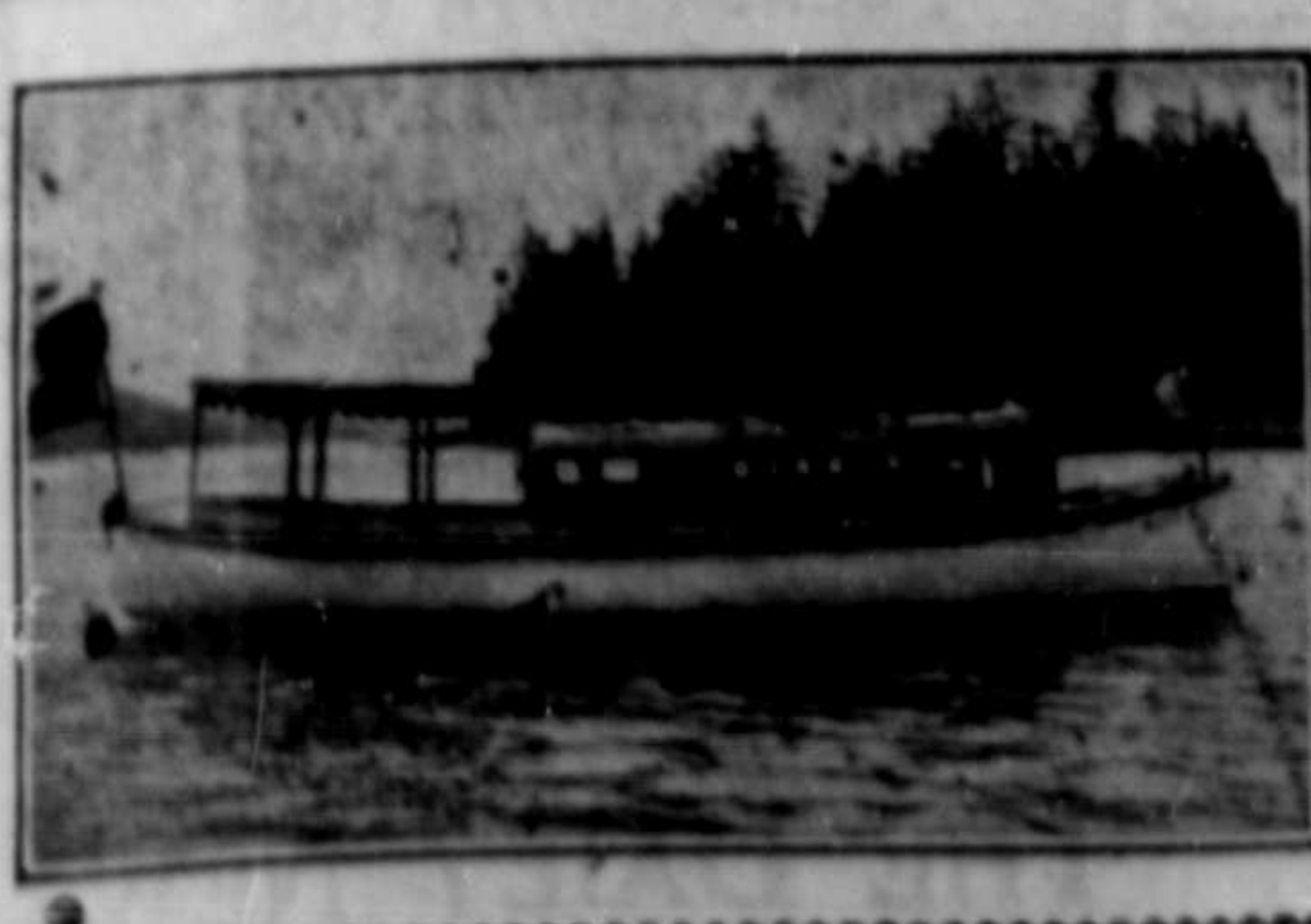

THE HIGH COST OF LIVING

The Food Controller gives little hope of being able to make his office serve the pressing needs of the people. The consumer asks for cheaper food and Mr. Hanna lectures him on basic economic laws. There have been no reforms in the world's history that have not been fought from behind laws that were held to be as unchangeable as the laws of the Medes and Persians. Mr. Hanna puts up men of straw and then knocks them down. But this method of meeting the grave problem of the increased cost of living does not get rid of the fact that, in accordance with our economic laws, one packing company in one year of war piled up gross profits equivalent to ninety per cent. of their capital, and that the Food Controller has not yet taken action in the matter. In this case, be it noted, the profiteers are not to be classed as "inefficient middlemen." It is the efficient middlemen who are restricting competition and suspending the law of supply and demand.

There is considerable unrest and apprehension throughout the country regarding the failure of the Government at Ottawa to protect the interests of the people of Canada, as Lord Rhonda is protecting the interests of the British people, against the predatory activities of middlemen and monopolists. Mr. Hanna has not yet explained why he is unable to do the things which have been undertaken by the British Food Controller with the consent of the British Government. In war time difficulties exist only to be overcome. Are the difficulties in the way of Mr. Hanna insuperable? No one has suggested that all middlemen should be eliminated, or that the Food Controller should recklessly undermine the fabric of society. Nor does the public clamor for food at cost, or expect supplies to be maintained by abolishing distributing agencies. But the public has a right to demand that the system which enables any company to pile up enormous profits and to fix prohibitive prices shall be subjected to drastic restrictions in time of war. Would it not have been

more in keeping with the spirit of these war times had Mr. Hanna informed the public of the causes that enable the British consumer to obtain Canadian bacon and other Canadian foodstuffs at prices below those that obtain on the Canadian market? "Radical measures" have been taken in Britain to control prices, but none of the dreadful things feared by Mr. Hanna have taken place. Why? Because in Britain the whole nation and all its resources have been impressed into the national service. Every middleman and profiteer who is found to be a clog on the wheels of military progress at the front is compelled to place his services at the disposal of the nation. The failure of the Government at Ottawa to conscript the excessive wealth and the resources of the country essential to successful war is the fundamental heresy that lies at the root of the food problem, and explains the failure of the Food Controller to protect the consumer against the demand of profiteers for excessive prices for staple foodstuffs. The public does not overlook the fact that the Finance Minister, who in his letter to Sir Joseph Flavelle approved of the exemption of a large amount of excessive profits from taxation, is the same Sir Thomas White who prefers to raise money for war purposes by way of public loan rather than by increased taxation of the profits of the Big Interests. So long as Canada is governed by the Big Interests it will be impossible to find a Finance Minister or a Food Controller to grapple with problems of war that affect the relations between the profiteers and the consuming public.—Globe.

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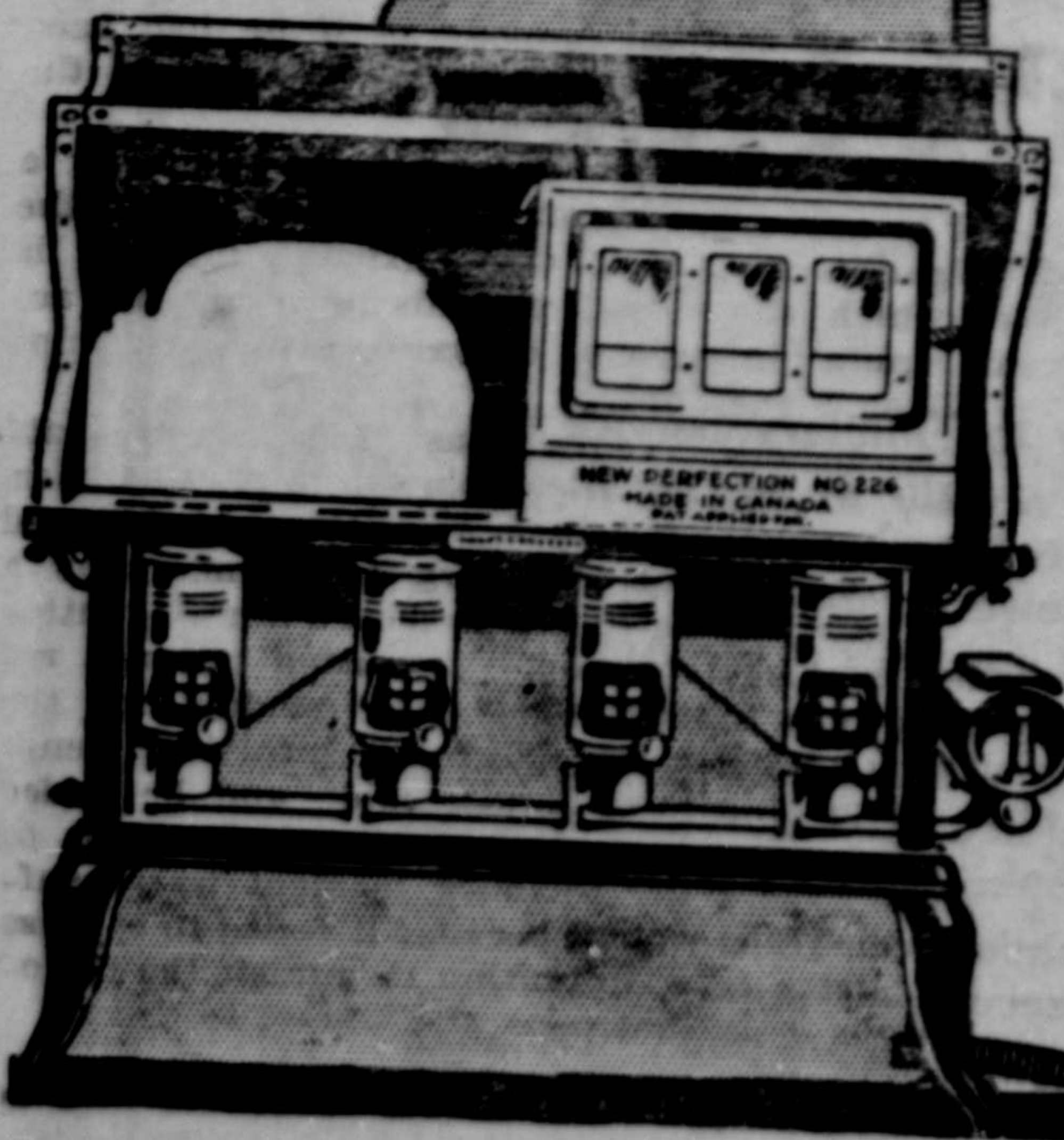

CONTROL SUGAR PRICES

Washington, Oct. 2.—Plans for an international control of sugar prices and distribution were announced tonight by the food administration. The aim is to stabilize trade through an international sugar committee which will arrange for refiners' prices in the West Indies and in the American insular possessions.

"This co-operative buying between the refiners and those purchasing raw supplies for England, France, Italy and Canada, with the resultant elimination of competitive buying," said the announcement, "is expected to save consumers many millions of dollars and to prevent the rapid fluctuations of prices that we have seen since the outbreak of the European war."

They will tell you in a very short time whether your physical condition absolves you from the call or makes you liable for selection.

A certificate of unfitness from a Medical Board will secure for you freedom from responsibility under the Military Service Act from any Exemption Tribunal. A certificate of fitness will not preclude an appeal for exemption on any ground.

In order that you may be able to plan your future with certainty, visit a Medical Board as soon as possible and find out if you are liable to be selected. Your family and your employer are interested as well as yourself.

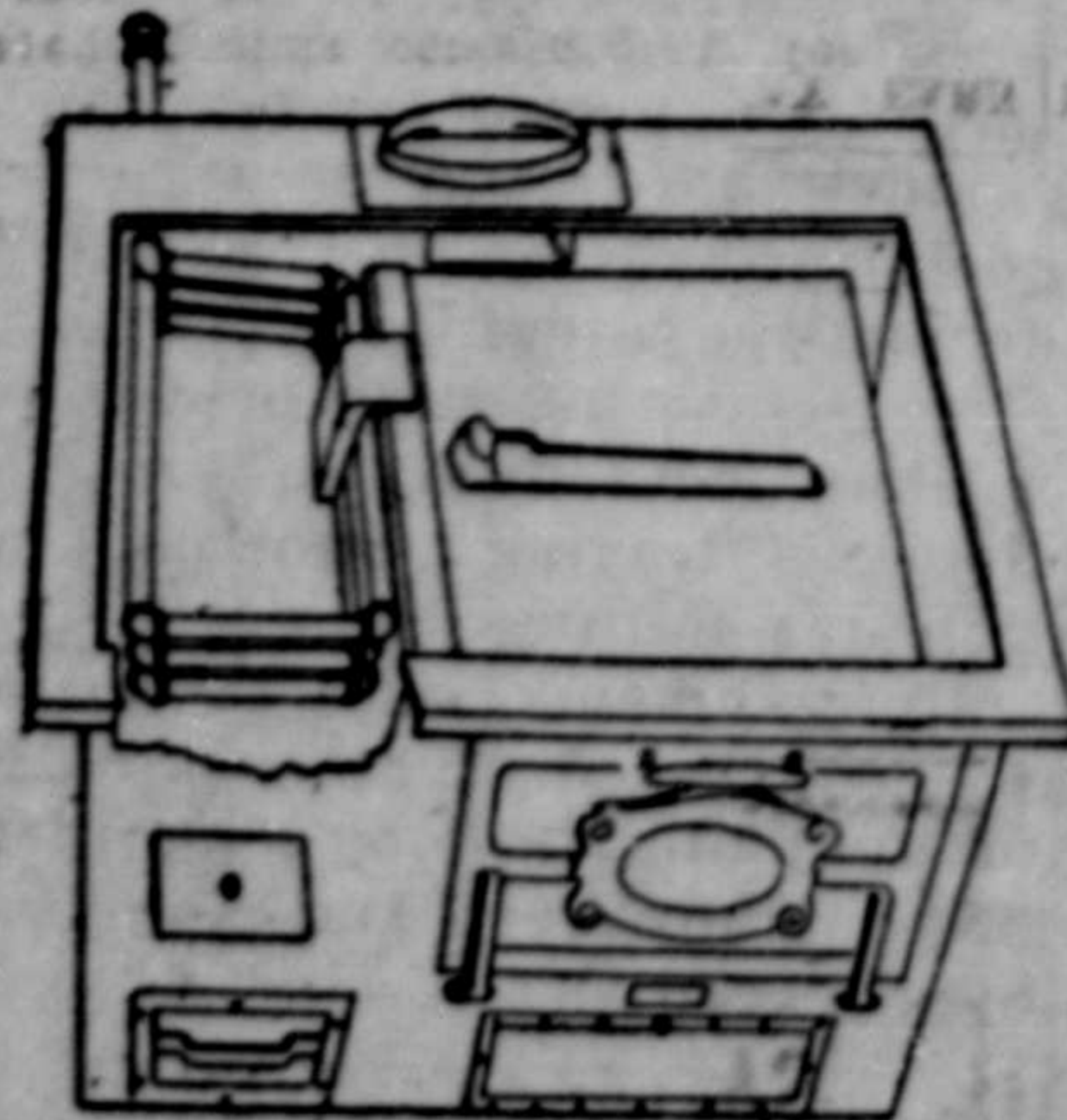
