STORMY WEATHER ON THE WESTERN FRONT

GREAT ARTILLERY ACTIVITY ALL ALONG THE LINE -- RUSSIANS TAKE PRISONERS

STORMY WEATHER HOLDS UP OPERATIONS NEAR YPRES

ALTHOUGH INFANTRY OPERATIONS TEMPORARILY SUSPENDED ARTILLERY ACTION PROGRESSES UNCEASINGLY — BRITISH, FRENCH, AND ITALIANS REPULSE ATTACKS—AEROPLANES ACTIVE

London, October 9.—The big guns have been active on the western front despite the bad weather. Gold rainstorms have turned the scarcely dry ground into a veritable sea of mud once again, and all infantry operations have again been hung up on this account. Nevertheless, the artillery battle is described in the official report as "considerable." During Saturday, Sunday and yesterday, the guns have been pouring destruction upon the German lines unceasingly, and the German artillery has not been silent either.

Aeroplanes Busy.

The British gunfire brought down two German aeroplanes and other three were forced to land uncontrollable. One British machine is missing. The weather has not lent itself to aerial activity, but the British aviators, notwithstanding the drawbacks, are able to direct the British artillery fire successfully.

French Front.

Paris, October 9.—The Germans delivered a strong surprise attack against the French trenches in the Champagne region. The enemy was repulsed and severe casualties were inflicted. Artillery activity is particularly severe in the vicinity of Hurbise and Craonne. The French infantry, supported by aeroplanes, repulsed the enemy lines near Douze, and partially destroyed the defences of the enemy position.

Russian Front.

Petrograd, October 9.—North of the Pskov high road and Pauske Farm after elaborate artillery preparation, the German forces made an attack in force, which the Russian troops repulsed. On the Romanian front, the Russians take many prisoners and guns.

Italian Front.

Rome, Oct. 9.—Italian patrols on the Bainsizza plateau captured a few Austrians. In the Carso region, the enemy patrols were repulsed. A serious Austrian surprise attack was delivered to the south, which the Italians successfully resisted. The Italian artillery shelled moving motor lorry columns of the enemy.

Captain Johnson, of the Salvation Army, came in from the Yukon on Sunday. Captain Johnson is an old timer here, having been instrumental in the establishment of the Army headquarters in Prince Rupert many years ago.

GRANBY COMPANY'S LARGE EARNINGS

Montreal, Oct. 5.—At the annual meeting of the Granby Company the financial statement for the year ending June 30 was presented to the shareholders. Gross earnings amounted to \$12,259,000, being an increase of \$2,959,000. Total income \$3,966,000, being an increase of \$140,000, equivalent to \$26.44 a share earned, against \$25.46 last year.

ELEVATOR STRIKE AT LAKE HEAD ENDED

Fort William, October 9.—The strike of the elevator men at the Lake ports is now ended. The Grain Board Chairman has been appointed director of elevators as a war measure. By a unanimous vote the men agreed to return to work as in the meantime their union is recognized. Co-operation is promised by the managers. The Minister of Labor will visit Fort William from Ottawa.

THE CHAMPIONSHIP OF THE WORLD SERIES

The world's championship game has had to be called off at New York on account of the continued bad weather.

On account of the continued good weather at Prince Rupert, Ben Self is negotiating for the transfer of the game to Prince Rupert to be played here.

FAILED TO REPORT AND WAS FINED \$10

This morning at the police court, before Magistrate McMullin, Robert Malkow, an Austrian subject, was charged with failing to report his whereabouts to the police department. He was fined \$10. The fine was paid.

RAIDER'S BOAT FOUND

London, Oct. 9.—A small boat from the "Seadler," the mysterious German raider, which has been heard from at long intervals, has been picked up at Fiji in the southern Pacific. It is expected that an end has been put to this commerce raider's activities.

DIPHTHERIA AT WINNIPEG

Winnipeg, Oct. 9.—Diphtheria is epidemic now at Winnipeg. There are already between one hundred and thirty and one hundred and forty cases of the dread disease admitted to the King George Hospital.

KORNILOFF MAY ESCAPE COURT MARTIAL TRIAL

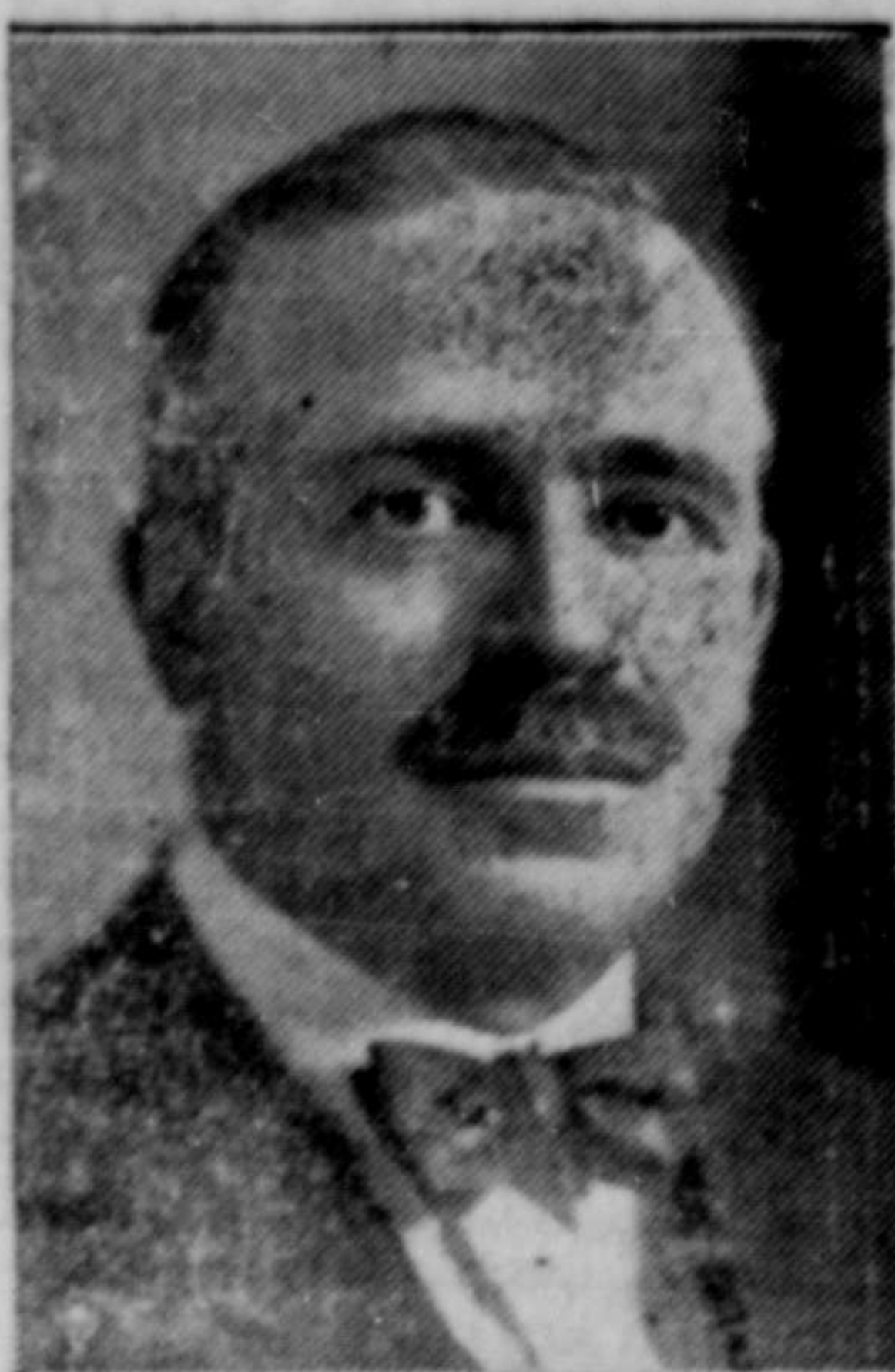
Petrograd, October 9.—General Korniloff may yet escape a court martial trial. On technical grounds he may be sent to the civil tribunal, and will receive judgment in the civil court.

JAPANESE DESTROYERS SAVE PASSENGERS

London, Oct. 5.—Reuters' News Agency learns that a Japanese Admiral reports that Japanese destroyers were escorting a liner and transport when the liner was torpedoed. The Japanese destroyers produced smoke screens to protect the liner from further attack. The others rushed to discover and attack the submarine. The Japanese alternately protecting the liner and firing in the direction of the submarine rescued 550 persons from the liner, including women and children, in less than an hour, and brought them and the transport safely to port.

GERMANS FORTIFY THE BELGIAN-DUTCH FRONTIER

Amsterdam — The "Telegraaf" learns from the frontier that the Germans are everywhere fortifying the northern frontier of Belgium near the bend of the Scheldt. In the village of Santvliet very large guns have been erected on cement bases. In the village of Hofvankamps there are not less than thirteen guns, all hidden by oak trees. The number of reserve troops in Antwerp is estimated at 50,000. Considerable reinforcements have been added to the Dutch troops stationed at the sugar refinery at Barendrecht, close to the Belgian frontier.

JAPAN'S GOVERNMENT CONTROLS SHIPPING

Tokyo, Oct. 5.—An imperial ordinance, which has been promulgated, prohibits, without permission of the Government, the selling, chartering or mortgaging of Japanese ships to foreigners. The edict, which contains thirteen articles, applies also to vessels building or contracted for.

The Minister of Communications is given control over steamship routes and passenger and cargo rates, and is also given authority to commandeer shipping yards and material. The decree will become effective today.

GERMAN SCIENCE DISCOVERS NEW FOOD

Amsterdam—Commenting on a report in the Zurich "Neueste Nachrichten" that German science had succeeded in discovering a new foodstuff, the wholesale manufacture of which had already begun at Dusseldorf, the "General Anzeiger" says that if the worst comes to the worst they may one day save Germany from death by starvation, but for the present it will be wise to rely on trustworthy potatoes, bread, cabbage, and other food things, and await patiently the advent of the scientific Vienna schnitzel.

A FEW THOUGHTS ON THE HIGH COST OF LIVING

Ottawa, October 2.—The five hundred thousand women enfranchised under the War Time Election Act are no doubt taking a great interest in the Flavelle investigation now in progress in Toronto. In spite of a corps of highly-paid lawyers and a Royal Commission whose object is to paint the lily and gild refined gold, Sir Joseph is being more and more discovered by his fellow citizens.

The evidence will bite despite the efforts of the best counsel to draw its teeth. Perhaps this is due to the presence of Mr. Gordon Waldron, a good Liberal, a lover of the people, and the legal representative at this trial of "Saturday Night," the one Toronto paper that was fearless enough to come to grips with a big advertiser like Sir Joseph Flavelle.

Of course the evidence would be more revealing if the Royal Commission included one expert cost accountant instead of two auditors, with Flavelle affiliations in Big Business which they must take care of. These two auditors do not go behind the figures presented to them by Sir Joseph's crack mathematician, General Manager Fox.

Naturally, Mr. Fox does not make out a bad case for his employer, and just as naturally two auditors looking for future commissions, do not disagree with him. They say, "These figures check, therefore they must be all right." An expert cost accountant on the other hand would say, "Figures cannot lie, but some liars can figure. How do you make up this item?" Then he would enter into a searching analysis of the cost elements.

However, murder is coming out in spite of handicaps, and the five hundred thousand women who have been given the vote by the Borden Government would do well to keep a sharp eye on the evidence from day to day and see what it means. It is not too much to say that of the five hundred thousand soldiers' women folk who have been enfranchised, four hundred thousand belong to the working class which feels the high cost of living most acutely. They are on short commons most of the time and very little would push them over the dead line into actual starvation. Their separation allowances have not been able to keep pace with the price of Sir Joseph Flavelle's bacon.

Sir Joseph is more responsible than any other man in Canada for the high cost of living. It is his calculating brain that has built up the pork trust and perfected the system by which the fourteen cent hog became the fifty-seven cent bacon. The high cost of butter, eggs and other staple products can also be traced to his pernicious activities. Sir Joseph is not only the guide philosopher and friend of the Borden Government, but he is said to own Finance Minister White, who runs chores for him. Sir Joseph has such a hold on the Borden Government that he hasn't even offered to resign from the chairmanship of the Munitions Board while he is being investigated. Sir Sam Hughes did it, and Bob Rogers did it, but the pious Sir Joseph, who deplores everybody's profits but his own, refuses to do it.

He makes the excuse that he doesn't do it because his is an imperial appointment, but the general opinion is that if the man had any decency he wouldn't let a little thing like that stand in his way. The fact seems to be that Sir Joseph has associated with hogs so long that he caught some of their manners. Anybody but Sir Joseph would have taken it as (Continued on Page Two)

HOW AUSTRIA HOLDS DOWN HER PEOPLE

Amsterdam, Oct. 7.—Copies of the Vienna Arbeiter Zeitung reaching here, and which contain articles designed to prove the need of a general amnesty, state that in September, 1914, a young woman clerk wrote a letter to her uncle, enclosing a copy of a proclamation by the Russian Emperor Nicholas, and General Rennenkampf, the Russian commander, which was dropped on the Austrian lines by a Russian airplane. The girl was sentenced to death by an Austrian military court. Her uncle read the proclamation to a bank official who, in turn gave copies to three friends.

The uncle and the bank official were sentenced to death and two of the friends were sentenced to penal servitude. The third of the friends, who passed a copy of the proclamation on to a colleague, who made two copies, was sentenced to death also. A man who was present when some of the copies were made received three years' penal servitude and the man who made the copy was sentenced to death.

A boy took one of the copies which came to his hands to school with him, with the result that twenty other boys, from 15 to 18 years of age, were sentenced altogether to 24 years' penal servitude.

The total of the sentences was six capital sentences and 91 years penal servitude.

WOUNDED IN FRANCE

Mrs. J. C. Knight has at last received word of her brother, Pte. William White, of the 119th Battalion, who was wounded very severely at the battle of Lens on August 25th. The first information that came through was that he was wounded severely, and little further information could be obtained. Last mail, however, brought word from him from a hospital in England. He was wounded severely and has lost the use of his right hand and arm, which were completely shattered. He was also wounded in the head and in the back, which latter is still considered dangerous.

Knowing that her brother was hurt and being unable to locate him in Europe, and with no further word coming from him, has caused Mrs. Knight and her family some anxiety for his welfare. Knowing now that he is in hospital and receiving the best treatment possible, they are much relieved in mind.

They have just learned now that he has been wounded once before, last Easter at Vimy Ridge, when a German shell blew him fifteen feet in the air. This, however, was only regarded as an incident and not considered worthy of mention.

SHOULD FACE THE ISSUE

When the compulsory military service legislation was adopted by Parliament the National Service Board went out of business. In his vaudeville R. B. Bennett, the director, declared that the functions and duties of the Board were not clearly enough defined at the outset and added that the initial mistake of the Government was in not making the signing of the cards sent out compulsory. He applied to his own case the words of the Director of National Service in England in regard to a similar condition as follows:

"It is apparent that the rock upon which the department split was the fact that a local habitation and a loud-sounding name was given to it, and then it was launched with a roving commission to discover its functions and duties, but left without any statutory powers and no boundaries delimiting its sphere."

The Canadian National Service Board cost the country hundreds of thousands of dollars, and the result of its operations was practically nothing. This was anticipated from the beginning by most people who investigated the status of the Board. More than that, the initial defects were aggravated by the composition of the Board which made it an exclusive political party organization. Then, to make matters worse, National Service speakers labored the novel idea that the campaign had less to do with recruiting than with home war effect; indeed, in some places it was declared that the National Service Board had nothing to do with recruiting. The inevitable result was that the National Service campaign actually injured recruiting, and it failed along the whole line. This sequel justified Sir Thos. Tait's resignation to the hilt.

The tendency to tell the people that the war measures it adopts do not mean what they say has been Ottawa's besetting weakness. And it is a habit that dies hard. For instance, ever since the compulsory military service law was passed we have had numerous inspired articles from the Capital, and in some of the Government

newspapers, showing how this or that class of the population would not be liable for military service, or that this or that man need not fear he is going to be sent to the fighting front if he qualifies as so-and-so. Indeed, one would imagine from some of these pronouncements, taken in conjunction with the extraordinary exemption clauses, that the object of the bill was to make it as convenient as possible for people to avoid military service. The result of this has been the diversion of a large number of eligibles to some of the classes or occupations which it has been intimated would be exempt. The Times called attention to this danger some weeks ago and pointed out that unless every application for exemption was dealt with on its merits, without regard to class or employment, the purpose of the Military Service Act would be defeated. An Ottawa dispatch announces that this course will be pursued. That announcement should have been made weeks ago.—Times.

a hint to quit his chairmanship of the Imperial Munitions Board when the British Government stopped buying his bacon, but his hide is thick and he didn't feel it. Sir Joseph is also said to have an appetite not unlike his favorite animal. So far as Big Business goes Sir Joseph has long been known as one who had all his feet in the trough at once, but since the war started he has done even better. Rumor has it that his beef stew contract will net him thirty million dollars and that, what with other enterprises, shells, fuses, munitions, carried on under various aliases, he will be in the Rockefeller class when the war is over.

Unluckily all the Royal Commission is authorized to do is to look into his bacon. All his other grafts escape inspection. A Royal Commission that would thoroughly investigate Sir Joseph Flavelle would need to investigate every spot where a dollar shows its head in Canada, not to mention choice



spots in the United States and England. A Royal Commission with these plenary powers would also find him and his Toronto group of looters up to the neck in the C. N. R. deal, by which they hope to fleece this country of \$135,000,000.—\$75,000,000 for the bonds they bought up in England, and \$60,000,000 for the watered stock. They would also find Sir Clifford Sifton somewhere in ambush. This is why Sir Clifford is so anxious to continue the (Continued on page three.)

A FEW THOUGHTS ON THE HIGH COST OF LIVING

(Continued from Page two.)

Borden-Flavelle Government in office. Where the treasure is there shall the heart be also. One hundred and thirty-five million dollars is worth gambling for. You see now why Flavelle and the other big fellows are all playing the same game. As long as there are so many dollars in sight the Borden Government can't lose Sir Joseph. What he gave to the campaign fund in 1914—rumor says it was a cool million—he wants back a hundred fold.

The Borden Government has given five hundred thousand more or less poor women the vote. They asked for cheaper food and they got the vote instead. The Borden Government said, "Here are your pretty little votes. Use them to keep Sir Joseph and us in power and you'll feel better."

This is the old story of the bread and the stone over again. You can't eat votes. They won't keep the children from starving. Food Controller Hanna issues an inspiring manifesto ever and anon, but soft as his words are they don't fill an empty stomach. Votes from the Borden Government and kind words from Mr. Hanna—these are pretty thin diet. It will be interesting to see how many of the five hundred thousand women vote for Borden and fifty-seven cent bacon.

Meanwhile housewives all over the country who have been trying to make a dollar do fifty cent's work, will be interested to learn that Sir Joseph Flavelle's company made two million dollars this year on the bacon sold to England. As the William Davies Company, it made a million on the bacon on this side of the ocean, and as Sheed-Thompson & Co.—another disguise of Sir Joseph—it made a million on the other side of the ocean.

This is what you might call working both ends for the middle. The process of collecting twice for the same article is very simple according to Sir Joseph. As the William Davies Company he puts on a profit on this side of the water and then sells to himself as Sheed-Thompson & Co., on the other side of the water, which Company puts on another profit, adds a commission and hands the bacon over to the British Government. It is well that the bacon has only one ocean to cross. Apparently the number of profits increase in geometrical progression. That is to say, if one ocean means two profits, four would mean sixteen.

This probably explains how the Davies Company made two hundred and fifty per cent profit during one year of the Boer war. The bacon had a number of oceans to cross and doubtless Sir Joseph, in some disguise or other, was waiting at all the strategic spots where another profit might be expected to happen. Incidentally there is a rumor afloat that the bacon Sir Joseph sold to the British army in South Africa was bad, and that a lot of it was condemned. If the Commission had full powers it might inquire into that.

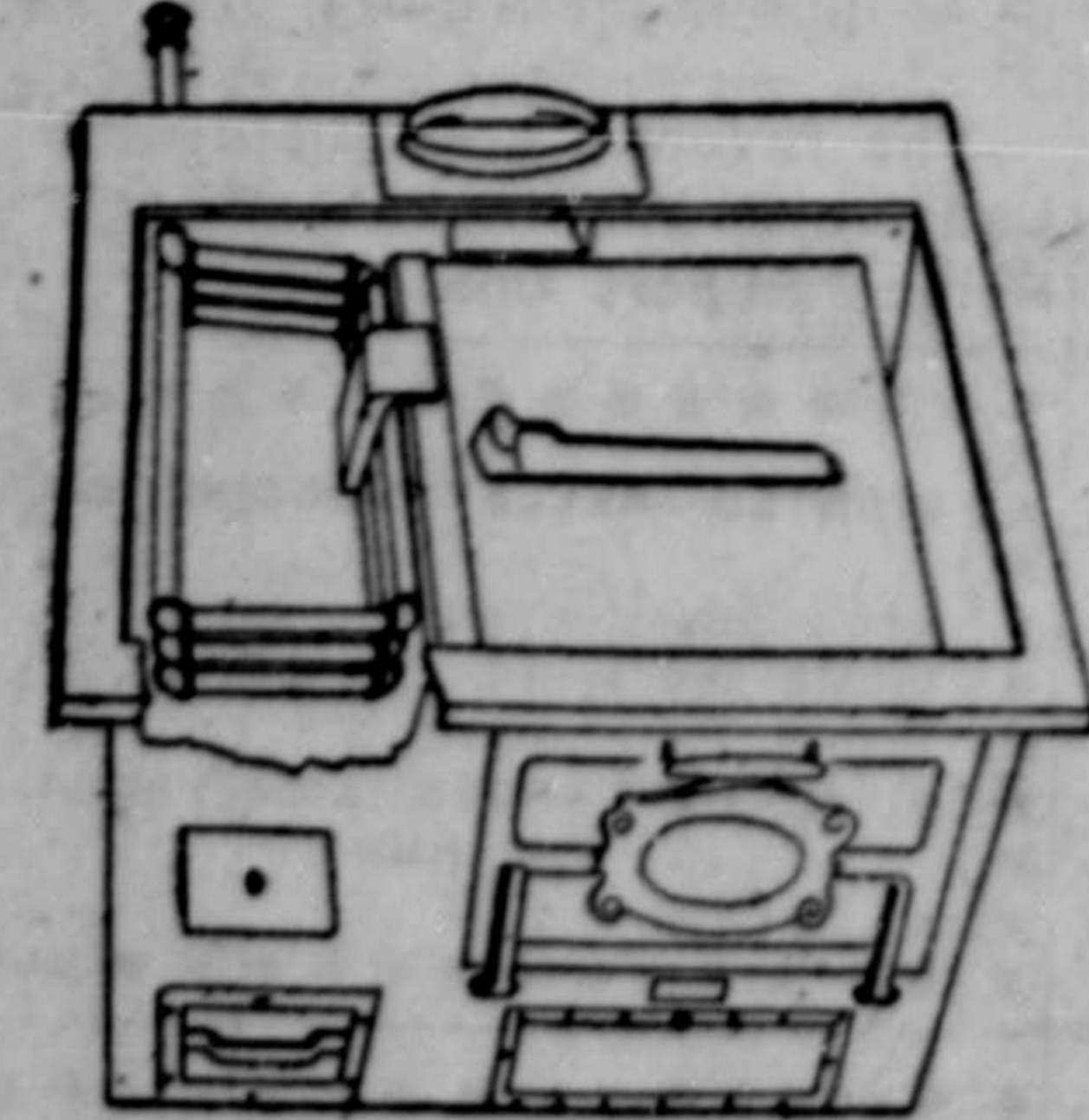

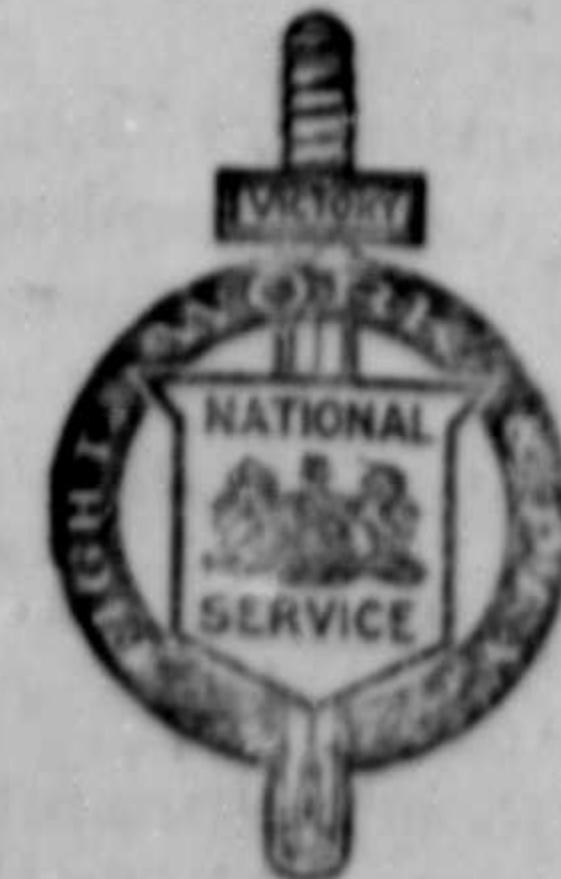
