## ALLIES ACHIEVE ANOTHER GREAT VICTORY

### IN STORMY WEATHER OFFENSIVE IS CONTINUED — PRISONERS BY THOUSANDS

#### BRITISH HAVE PUSHED THE GERMANS THROUGH POELCAPELLE

ANOTHER ADVANCE OF NEARLY A MILE PUTS POELCAPELLE IN THE HANDS OF THE BRITISH TROOPS — THOUSANDS OF PRISONERS CAPTURED — GERMANS COUNTER ATTACK — FRENCH SUCCESSFUL

(Special to The Daily News.)  
London, October 10.—The British have pushed the Germans through the town of Poelcapelle and are now fighting on the eastern outskirts of the city, around the former premises of a large brewery. In many places the French and the British have advanced to a depth of twelve hundred yards or more. From the Gavetafel Ridge the British troops advanced to Paschendaele and tested a thousand yards southwest of the town. The French crossed the Jansbeik and the Brownbeek rivers. Strong resistance was made by the Germans just north of Broodseinde at the Daisy Wood. At an early hour, other attackers reported heavy fighting about Mangelar, which is fifteen hundred yards beyond their original line. Several thousand German prisoners have been captured. At the Polderhoek Chateau, the British also met with strong resistance. The latest reports from the front are very meagre, but tell of the Germans counter attacking heavily to try to regain the important positions which have been wrested from them. Astride the Ypres-Roulers railway, very heavy counter attacks were made. Large numbers of prisoners have been sent back from the British front. The weather is still stormy and wet.

**French Front.**  
Paris, October 10.—The French troops, in conjunction with the British attacked the German positions this morning south of the forest of Hovholt between Draibank and Weindendref. The battle continues favorable to us. On the Aisne front, artillery activity is marked, notably in the Pantheon region. In the Champagne country, we were successful in penetrating the German lines near Butte de Tahure. On the right bank of the Meuse on the Verdun front, artillery duels continue and in the sector of the Cahune Wood with particular ferocity.

**Italian Front.**  
Rome, Oct. 10.—The Austrian troops are gathering in great force on the southern boundary of the Bainsizza plateau in anticipation of the renewal of the Italian drive over that territory. The Italians have planned a great campaign. If the other allies can supply coal, steel, munitions and guns, Italy will supply the finest troops for a great drive on Leibach.

#### THE RUSSIAN CABINET REMAINS IN POWER

Petrograd, Oct. 10.—The Provisional Government apparently has won complete victory over the preliminary parliament which was an outgrowth of the Democratic Congress. Tsiretelli, one of the leaders of parliament today informed Premier Kerensky that the preliminary parliament has withdrawn all its demands; that the Government will be responsible to it, and it has acceded to the government's plan that parliament act merely in an advisory legislative capacity.

#### THE ALLIES HAVE A COMMERCIAL CONFERENCE

#### CENTRAL EMPIRES AND ANOTHER PEACE OFFER

Amsterdam, Oct. 10.—Germany and Austria-Hungary have agreed to make another peace offer to the Allies. This offer will have as a basis no territorial aggrandizement, the surrender of Belgium and French territory, the renunciation of positive acquisition for payments in money and no indemnity on either side.

#### CRISIS IN ROUMANIA

Jassy, October 10.—The crisis in Roumania which threatened to force the evacuation of a large amount of ground has been solved and a food supply sufficient for sixteen months has been guaranteed.

#### NOTES FROM THE COUNCIL CHAMBER

The weekly meeting of the city council took place last night. Its conduct was rational. The first matter was referred to the utilities committee, which was a request from the residents of Bacon St. and Tenth Ave. for more lights. Then the request of the Great War Veterans' Association for free light, water and telephone was granted, and a recommendation from the finance committee that Mr. E. A. Woods be appointed auctioneer at the city's tax sale today was agreed to.

#### Junior Counsel.

A report was read by the city clerk embodying a resolution adopted by the committee of the whole last Monday that the city solicitor be authorized to employ junior counsel at the hearing of the court of a litigious matter now pending. The committee considered that the fees of such an eminent counsel as Mr. S. S. Taylor would be out of proportion to the sum involved. This resolution was adopted by the council, Aldermen Montgomery and Casey dissenting.

#### Tenders.

Tenders for the supplying of paint and the painting of the city garbage scow were then opened. There was only one tender for each. George Bard would apply the copper paint for \$75, which Mr. A. W. Edge would supply for \$3.50 per gallon. One tender was received during the session of the council which, being late, was not considered. This matter was left in the hands of the committee with power to act.

#### The City Market.

Applications for the market clerkship were then considered. There were four applicants, Messrs. A. E. Anderson, J. A. Smith, D. G. Glenny and Jas. Hampton. The applications were read and voted upon. On a second ballot, Mr. D. G. Glenny received a majority vote of the council and was declared elected.

Before adjourning, Ald. McClymont enquired whether the city council had had any word from Mr. Nicol Thompson, the fuel controller, officially regarding his visit here. There was not. Ald. Montgomery was curious to know why cause should not be shown for the discharge of the coal committee.

There being nothing further on the agenda, the motion for adjournment was then in order.

Mr. E. Gunderson, of New Hazelton, was among the arrivals from up river on last night's train.

#### PRINCE RUPERT TRADES AND LABOR COUNCIL

The regular meeting of the Prince Rupert Trades and Labor Council was held last night and it was one of the largest meetings which has been held since the organization was started. This is significant of the interest taken in collective action by the different unions.

The question of the Clerical Workers strike at the Cold Storage was discussed at considerable length and a committee representing several of the unions will endeavor to meet the management with a view of arriving at a settlement.

Political action at the forthcoming Dominion election was also discussed. There were many speakers to this question and the consensus of opinion was that the opportune time had now arrived for Labor to take action, as they had as a prospective candidate, a bona fide Labor man. The question was referred back to the different unions for their further and definite decision as to whether they were in favor of taking political action in the interests of Labor at this forthcoming election. Upon ascertaining how the different unions feel towards this matter, which will be learned by the next meeting of the council, the attitude of Organized Labor on the matter will then be decided.

Mr. W. Reid, who was delegate to the Car Workers Convention, held recently at Fort Worth, Tex., gave a short resume of what had passed there.

Judging from last night's meeting the outlook for organized labor in the Prince Rupert district looks very promising.

#### THE FORMATION OF A UNION GOVERNMENT

Ottawa, Oct. 10.—Messrs. Sifton, Calder and Crerar are again being mentioned as likely members from the West in the Union Cabinet. Sir Robert Borden refuses to give out any information regarding the Union pour-parlers. A. A. McLean, M.P. for Queens, P. E. I., has been appointed Controller of the R. N. W. Mounted Police. The first of the new army will be called to the colors on December 10. The issue of the proclamation will be made on Saturday. There will be no chance of delay by exemption claims. Men guilty of trying to evade the service by bribery may get five years.

#### BOATING TRIP IN THE HARBOR ENDS FATALLY

Miss Ina Christian is Drowned When Canoe Overturns—Her Companion is Saved.

Yesterday afternoon about five o'clock, cries for help coming over the water drew the attention of the boatmen on the waterfront to an overturned canoe and two heads appearing above the water, more than half way across the harbor. Skipper Swanson in the Regal put out at once and reached the scene of the accident about the same time as a boat from the Revalli, lying at anchor, but they only rescued one survivor. Other launches came up and although a close search was made no trace of the missing girl could be found.

Under a blue sky and cloudless, brilliant sunshine and a sea like glass, and no wind, four of Prince Rupert's younger girls took advantage of the weather conditions to go boating. Two of them, the Misses Lillian Christian and Nora Gillespie, hired a row boat and Misses Ina Christian and May Kelly a canoe. The tide was flowing and their intention was to pay a visit to the creek across the harbor. The canoe forged ahead of the row boat and when about two-thirds of the way across, its occupants noticed that the row-boat had turned back. They then turned back also, when Miss Ina Christian, sitting in the bow of the canoe, evidently made a mistake, or else lost her paddle, according to one story, causing the canoe to rock. In endeavoring quickly to recover the balance of the canoe, the jerk apparently threw her out, overturning the canoe and throwing Miss May Kelly into the water also.

Their cries for help reached the Government wharf and Davis' float at Cow Bay, whence launches immediately rushed out to the rescue. The Revalli, lying at anchor also put out a boat, but by the time they arrived Miss Christian had let go her hold of the overturned canoe, and had disappeared. Miss Kelly was picked up and immediately rushed to her home, and barring the shock of her sudden immersion and the knowledge of the loss of her companion, is none the worse.

On enquiries being made at Miss Kelly's home in the Levine Apartments last night, she told of their noticing their friends in the row boat returning to Prince Rupert instead of making for McNicol Creek, as had been arranged. "We turned the canoe," she said, "and were going quite slowly. In making a stroke, Ina's paddle did not strike the water squarely, but seemed to twist round in her hand and slipped through the water edgeways." Not finding the expected resistance naturally caused the unfortunate girl to sway suddenly, causing the canoe to rock, and losing her balance, she was thrown out into the water the canoe overturning.

Miss Kelly luckily was able to swim and ceased shouting when she saw assistance coming. Miss Christian, however, kept on crying out and everytime swallowed more sea water. Clutching to the edge of the canoe, it turned over several times and the last time it turned over her and the poor girl was unable to renew her hold.

Although a search was kept up for a long time no trace of the body was found last night.

Miss Christian was a daughter of the late Milton Christian, who for years was game warden in this district. She was quite young, being not long left school. Mrs. Christian, her mother, is prostrated at this second bereavement this year and the hearts of all will go out to her in her grief.

#### TERRACE RANCHER WEDS AT THE HOTEL CENTRAL

Bride Comes From Manchester, England Through the Submarine Zone to Rupert.

Last evening there arrived in the city from Terrace Mr. Henry Evans, of Remo, accompanied by Miss Ada Dawson, of Rawtenstall, Manchester, England. Mr. Evans is a well known rancher at Remo, near Terrace. Miss Dawson came from Manchester via Liverpool and Montreal in the Metagami, escorted by five torpedo boats and a battleship across the Atlantic. The vessel was a transport, and besides carrying fourteen hundred women and children, had four hundred soldiers on board as well.

Miss Dawson came right through to Terrace, where she was joined by Mr. Evans, and at the Central Hotel last evening, the knot was tied by the Rev. Dr. Grant. Only a few friends of the bridegroom were present at the ceremony. This morning the happy couple returned to Terrace, where they will receive the congratulations of the groom's many friends.

#### GERMAN SUBMARINES MENACE U. S. VESSELS

New York, Oct. 9.—Germany's submarine menace is now being concentrated against American military supply ships. A German submarine base has probably been established off the French coast in the American transport lane. There is no real decrease in the total allied submarine sinkings. America can only fulfill her gigantic army requirements in France by depending on her own shipping and making the issue with Germany personal.

This is the interpretation of the submarine situation today as expressed in an interview with Lord Northcliffe, head of the British War Mission.

"The most urgent news that has crossed the Atlantic since I arrived in this country at the beginning of June," Lord Northcliffe said, "is the official statement by Sir MacLay, the British Controller of Shipping, to the effect that unless the United States faces the shipping problem and constructs 6,000,000 tons of shipping annually the military efforts of the United States will be crippled from the start."

**GOVERNMENT**

In that year of unrest in old Europe, 1848, when dissatisfaction with the existing state of affairs found its expression in rebellion in many countries there, the Vienna mob yelled under the palace windows of a terrified archduke. His Serene Highness asked of Metternich, "In God's name, what is that fearful row?" "That, Sire," was the answer of the cynical Minister, "is what Messieurs the Republicans call the voice of God."

In 1848 the voice of God was finally stifled, after the shedding of much blood. Since that time, the voice of the people in the English-speaking countries has been given more heed to, otherwise something of the same nature might have happened.

Here in Canada, since the beginning of the war, and during the past three years, the vox populi has been raised against the existing Government, for many reasons. Nearly three years late, the tardy proposal for the formation of a union government was made, but the de facto government could not get the men they wanted. Representative Liberals would not join in a government which had permitted the existing state of affairs to culminate as they had done; the more so, as the then Government wanted and asked for another year's extension. The people of Canada hoped to make a change at the coming election. The Borden Government would have to go before the people with their record; and at the hands of the people would receive judgment.

Now that Parliament is dissolved, rumors are rife of the retreat of Sir Wilfrid Laurier. If this takes place, although Sir Wilfrid has made no public statement on the matter, it will create an entirely new situation for Sir Robert Borden. The new leader of the Liberal party will be none the less insistent upon the application of the principle of Conservation to that wider area than the Borden Government saw fit to apply it to. Already two new members have been admitted to Sir Robert's Cabinet in the persons of Messrs. Baltantyne and Hugh Graham. Both are

Liberals, but be they Liberals or Conservatives, or what they will, "if they are willing to perpetuate such monstrosities as the Canadian Northern or Quebec Railway deals; the extortions of the Food Barons, now clearly exposed by the sworn testimony before a Royal Commission; the unlicensed play of political patronage, the last specimen of which is the substitution of a Government member of Parliament for the non-partisan Dr. Adam Shortt on the Dominion Civil Service Commission, they will not be wanted by the Canadian people."

What Canada wants in the first place is the placing of the country upon a proper war basis, which is what the Borden Government has failed to do after more than three years of war. The very fact of the "win the war" meetings over the country is a severe indictment of the manner in which the Government has mishandled the situation. It is all very well for Tories and the Tory party to come out now to win the war. They have had a three years' opportunity—which they failed to seize.

The conscription of the excess war profits, the increase of the pensions of our soldiers and their dependents and legislation to reduce the over-high cost of living are three things which the Borden Government have consistently played with. The voice of the people has demanded these things in no uncertain terms, but the Borden Government paid no attention. They were more concerned with other things. What Canada demands is a Government that will be representative of the people, and not of a certain class. Canada demands a Government which will be free from the control of the big moneyed interests. A Government which will place the burden of the war where it can best be borne.

closed their doors, according to estimates made today by excise officials. Yesterday when the license fee of \$1,500 which must be paid in advance, became due hundreds of places failed to open their doors.

In smaller cities the operation of the new state law, providing that after Sept. 30th there could only be one saloon to every 500 inhabitants in political subdivisions having less than 55,000 population will result in the closing of about 1,500 saloons in the state this month, according to Wm. McClenahan, president of the Retail Liquor Dealers' Association. If the present situation continues, Mr. McClenahan said, three thousand saloons in the state will have to close their doors in the next six months.

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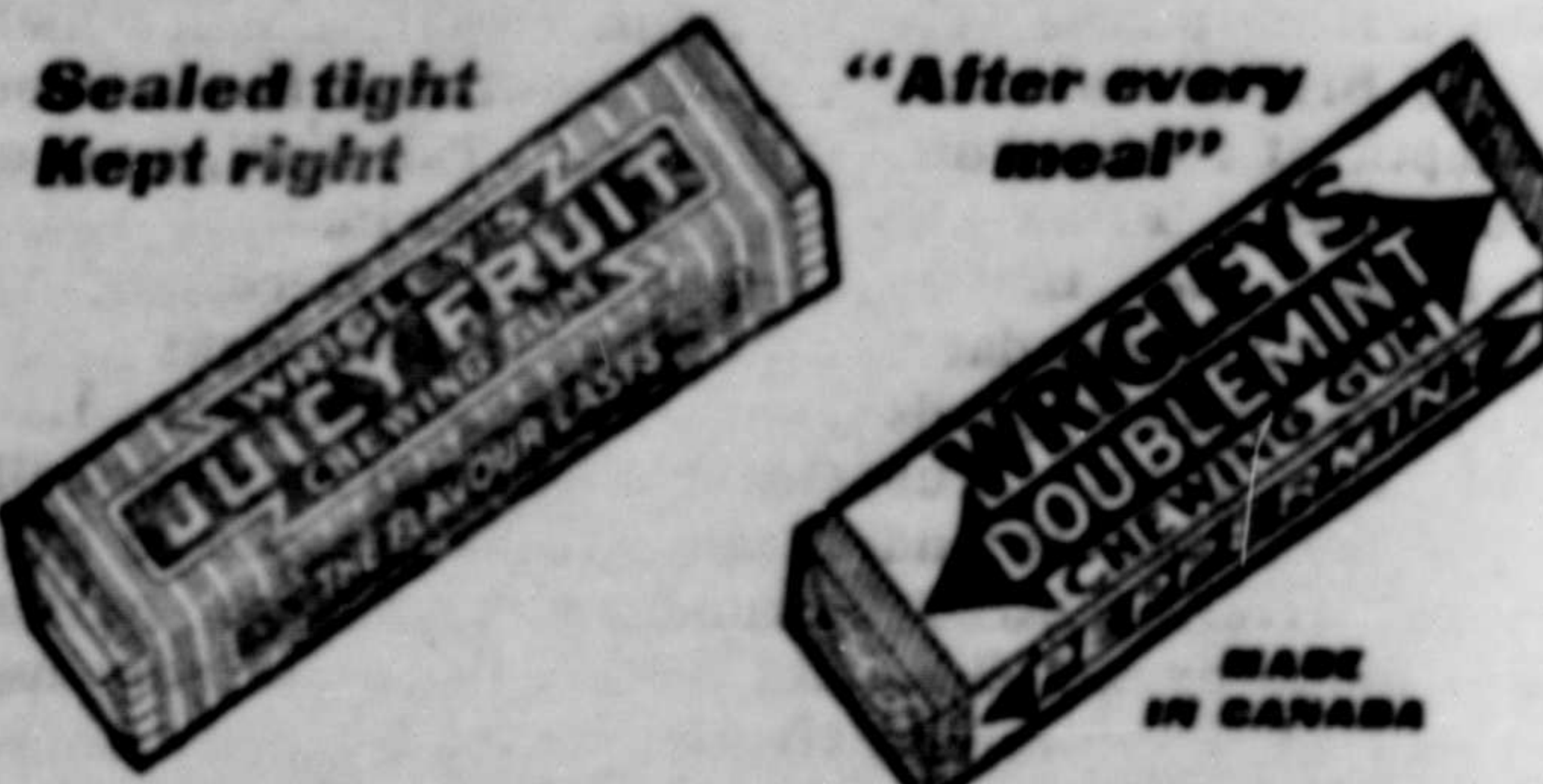

These Boards will examine, free of charge and obligation, all men who wish to be examined as to their physical fitness for military service. They will tell you in a very short time whether your physical condition absolves you from the call or makes you liable for selection.

It is important that you obtain this information as soon as possible. A certificate of unfitness from a Medical Board will secure for you freedom from responsibility under the Military Service Act from any Exemption Tribunal. A certificate of fitness will not preclude an appeal for exemption on any ground.

In order that you may be able to plan your future with certainty, visit a Medical Board as soon as possible and find out if you are liable to be selected. Your family and your employer are interested as well as yourself.

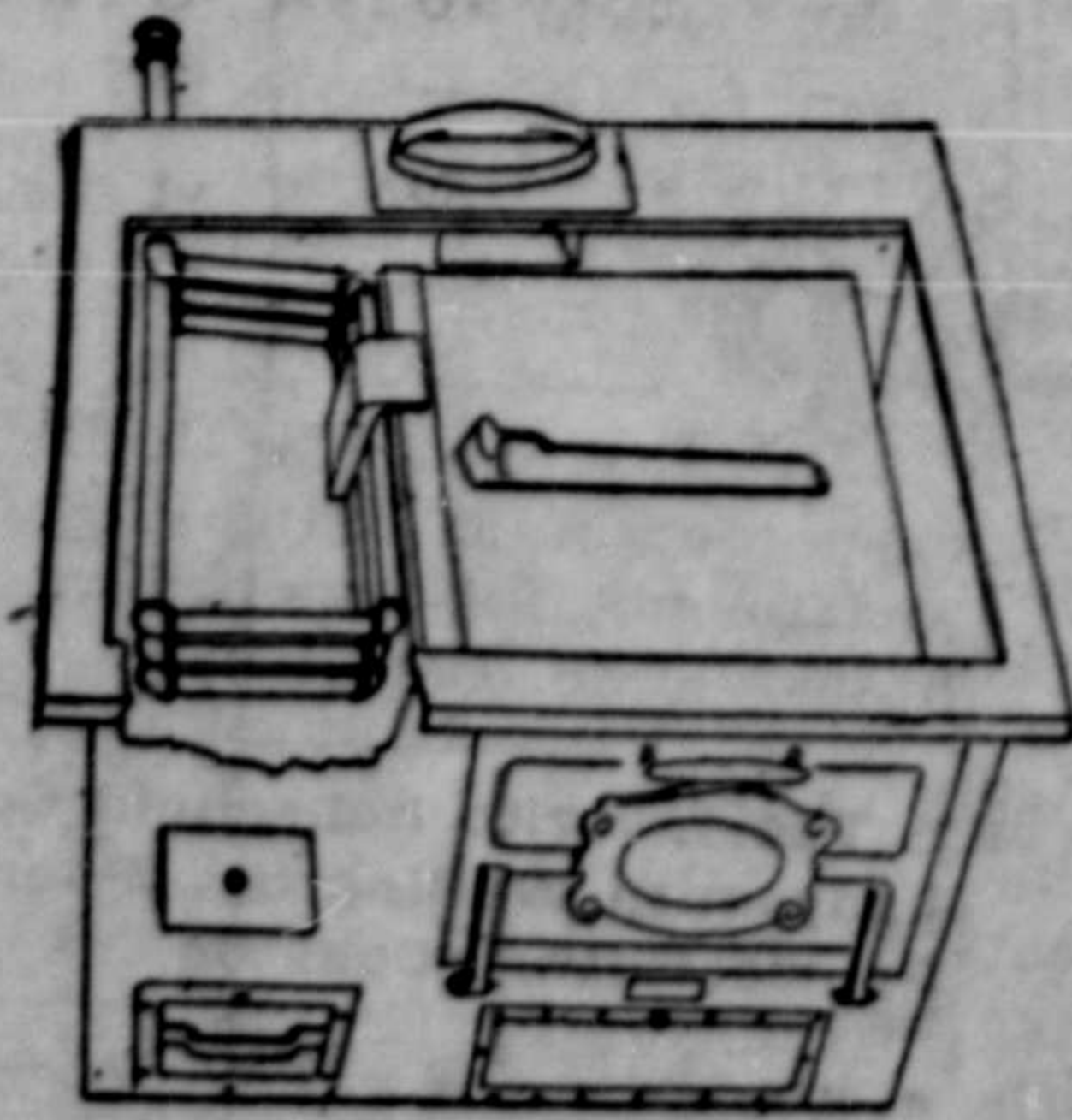
