GERMANS COUNTER ATTACK IN FLANDERS

HEAVY RAIN RETARDING OPERATIONS IN FRANCE — SUCCESSFUL RAIDS MADE

GERMANS ARE ATTACKING FURIOUSLY

Counter Attack is Succeeding
Counter Attack on the West-
ern Front—Very Heavy
Losses Inflicted.

(Special to The Daily News.)
London, Oct. 11.—Several coun-
ter attacks were made by the
Germans last night in the neigh-
borhood of the Ypres-Staden rail-
way. The attacks were repulsed
but south of the railway, on a
front of two thousand yards, the
British troops were forced back
for a short distance. Other coun-
ter attacks were made by the
enemy northeast of Broodseinde
during yesterday's fighting, which
were repulsed with very heavy
losses to the attackers.

We carried out several success-
ful raids south of the Scarpe
river. Heavy rain is falling today
all along the line.

French Front.
Paris, Oct. 11.—The French
troops have made further pro-
gress to the east of Draibank.

FURTHER PLOT REVELATIONS BY STATE DEPT.

Sabotage Proposed by the German
General Staff Disclosed—
German Millions Lost
by Speculation.

(Special to The Daily News.)
Washington, Oct. 11.—In Janu-
ary, 1916, the German General
Staff proposed that the Canadian
Pacific Railway be destroyed at
several points, and other sabotage
was also proposed at several im-
portant points in the United
States. It was Count von Bern-
storff's idea to get a majority in
both houses of Congress favor-
able to Germany in September,
1916, according to fresh revela-
tions of the plotters, made by the
State Department here yesterday.

Millions Lost.
New York, Oct. 11.—The mil-
lions entrusted to Dr. Heinrich
Albert for the payment of Ger-
man spies and other propagandists
in the United States were lost in
speculation in New York and Chi-
cago. Dr. Albert, working with
Bernstorff, directed Germany's
spy system in North America and
had the handling of between sixty
and seventy-five million dollars.
With this fund he was to place
spies, buy newspapers and lec-
turers, and also to prevent the
shipment of munitions to the
Allies.

THE UNION CABINET NEAR COMPLETION

(Special to The Daily News.)
Ottawa, October 11.—The new
Union Cabinet is practically com-
pleted now. Messrs. Calder, Stif-
ton, Crerar and Clark will repre-
sent Western Liberalism, while
the choice of a representative
from British Columbia has not
yet been made. It is not known
here yet whether Premier Brew-
ster will be included, although
everything points that way.

It is proposed to create a War
Council, composed of five mem-
bers, who will have complete con-
trol of the prosecution of the war,
and also the mobilization of all
the resources of the country. Pre-
mier Murray, of Nova Scotia, is
said to be likely to enter the cabi-
net without portfolio.

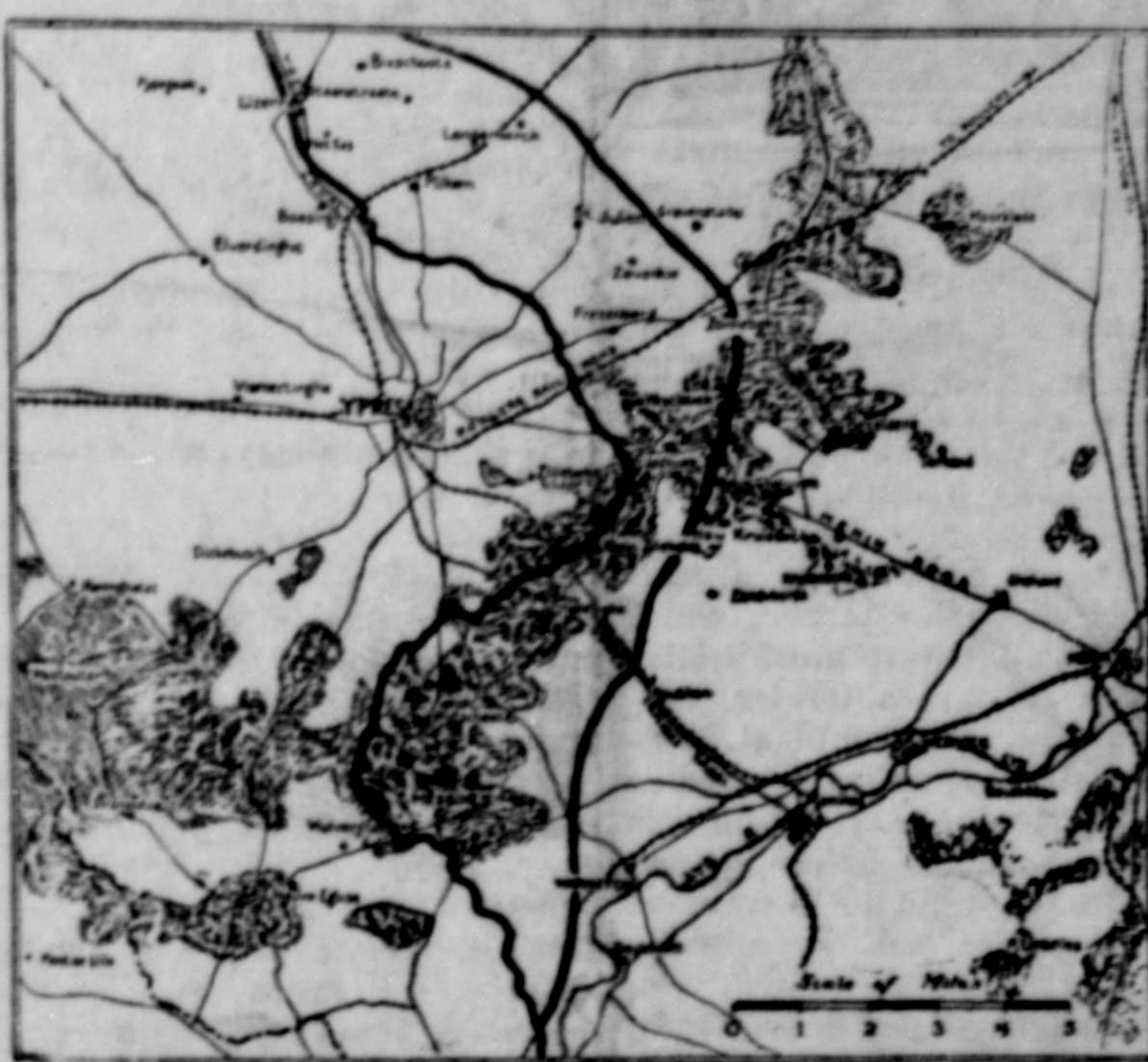

FRENCH SOCIALISTS CONVENE AT BORDEAUX

(Special to The Daily News.)
Bordeaux, Oct. 11.—The So-
cialist Congress now convening
here voted by 1,552 to 1,336 in
favor of their continuance in
supporting the War Budget in
Parliament. The convention also
voted on a resolution demand-
ing the revision of the Allied war
aims.

HUN MONARCHS TO MAKE OTHER PEACE OFFERS

Emperor William and Emperor
Karl to Meet Soon—Definite
Peace Offer Expected
Within a Month.

(Special to The Daily News.)
London, Oct. 11.—Despatches
received here indicate that a
meeting of the Emperors Wilhelm
and Karl of the Central Empires
has been arranged for the im-
mediate future. The object of their
meeting is to talk peace, and a
definite peace offer is said to be
coming from them to the Allied
Governments within a month.

The ruling classes in Germany
are reported to be fighting now
for their lives. The common peo-
ple are at last beginning to learn
the truth and are now in no mood
for swallowing any more stories
of further German victories,
which exist only in the imagina-
tion of the Government. The
Junkers are realizing that their
privileged position is very pre-
carious. Germany's allies are
said to be holding a gun to the
Kaiser's head, and relations be-
tween Turkey, Bulgaria, Austria
and Germany are not nearly so
cordial as they once were.

WILL STOP ALL SUPPLIES FROM REACHING GERMANY

Washington, Oct. 9.—Officials
here see in the action taken by
Great Britain in announcing the
complete embargo on shipments
to the northern neutrals of Eu-
rope one of the most important
developments since the United
States entered the world war, and
one which shuts the doors of its
commerce to the Central powers
and nations like Holland, Sweden,
Denmark and Norway, which have
been accused of helping to feed
and arm the Germans.

It is understood here that the
United States had for some time
urged upon Great Britain the
necessity for taking this step, and
that negotiations have been car-
ried on by this Government with
France, Italy and other countries
in the alliance against Germany
to induce them to take a similar
course.

Great Britain, according to the
understanding in official circles,
has consented to abrogate all of
its trade agreements with the
northern neutrals, thus probably
forfeiting the share of their pro-
ducts, which it has heretofore ob-
tained. This share, in almost
every instance, was far below the
amount received from the same
neutrals by Germany, and where-
as Germany has to depend almost
entirely upon these neutrals for
the essentials involved, Great
Britain and the other allies of the
United States will be able to ob-
tain them from other fields.

The United States Government
has agreed to bend every effort
to aid its allies in obtaining these
supplies, which may be cut off
by the abrogation of the agree-
ments with the neutrals of Europe.
Shipping will be directed and the
commerce of the United States
regulated with this point always
in view.

MUTINY AMONG CREW OF GERMAN BATTLESHIPS

Captain of "Westfalen" Thrown
Overboard and is Drowned—
Marines Refuse to Fire
Upon Crews.

(Special to The Daily News.)
Amsterdam, Oct. 11.—A mutiny
among the crews of four battle-
ships of the German High Seas
Fleet has occurred at Wilhelmsh-
haven. The captain of one of the
battleships, the "Westfalen," was
thrown overboard and has been
drowned. The crews of the four
big ships came ashore, when Ma-
rines who were ordered to fire
upon them refused. The mutinous
sailors were thereupon surround-
ed by soldiers hastily summoned,
when they surrendered to super-
ior force.

The Kaiser immediately jour-
neyed to Wilhelmshaven and on
his arrival there, ordered the
mutinous sailors to be shot forth-
with. Chancellor Michaelis made
a vigorous protest against this
action, and the Kaiser was con-
tent to have only three of the
ringleaders shot in the meantime.
The men will be tried by court
martial, and it is only conjectural
whether their grievances will be
heard.

THE CITY TAX SALE

The sale of the city lots for
arrears of taxes was held yester-
day, and completed. Mr. E. A.
Woods was the auctioneer, and
the sale was under the direction
of Mr. E. D. Johnson, the city
treasurer. Over twenty-two thou-
sand dollars was the amount real-
ized, and for inside property bid-
ding was brisk. For one lot, 71
bids were received before it was
finally knocked down. The cheap-
est lot went for the sum of \$6.00.

Yesterday's sale is said to have
comprised the fewest number of
lots put up than at any other tax
sale, and likewise the amount real-
ized was the smallest also. Quite
a number of lots in Section one
were taken up by the city.

THE WAR

One of the peculiarities of the state of mind which is to be found prevalent in Germany is the hatred of Great Britain and the British Empire, which has found expression as the result of the Empire's entry into the conflict. This is not the result of the gradual German defeat, but was noticeable from the very start of hostilities. The hatred evinced by Germany and the Germans can be no sudden growth nor outburst of feeling, but must have been carefully nurtured throughout long years. Another reason for such a state of mind on the part of a great nation such as modern Germany was in 1914, other than national jealousy, is hard to find.

At the end of the war, when Germany has been conclusively shown that jealousy among nations does not pay in any single way, it is possible that that hatred may be a long time in dying out, most especially against Great Britain. The reasons for this is shown in the recent writings of M. J. M. Rosny, senior member of the Goucourt Academy, who in a striking article contributed to "Le Pays" recently shows the superiority of Great Britain's position in regard to the war as compared with Germany.

"In 1915," says M. Rosny, "Britain's participation in our offensive was still of a minor character. In 1916 it became formidable on the Somme. In 1917 it is mowing down the Teuton legions unrelentingly. Britain can say to the enemy, 'We have taken 110,000 German prisoners; you have only 53,000 British.' She can also say, 'You have not taken one yard of our Continental or Colonial territory. You mean to invade Egypt, but our soldiers are now advancing towards Palestine. You threatened India, but we are invading Mesopotamia. You had opened your mouth wide to swallow up the Belgian, French, and Portuguese Colonies and a good part of our own, but the French, Belgian, Portuguese, and British occupy nearly all your African lands. You have been banished from Asia. Your carefully secreted strategic islands are occupied by our sol-

diers and those of the Dominions. Spite of your submarines our fleet is blockading you and immobilizing your Dreadnoughts. Vanquished on the battlefield, swept from the seas, driven out of the colonies, what have you taken in exchange? Your greatest exploits against Britain have been the cowardly murder of women and children with the aid of Zeppelins and avions, the drowning of crews and innocent passengers by your pirates. We, however, have wrested from you your share of the universe."

"That is what Britain can say to Germany, and what well-informed Germans know only too well, from that brute Reventlow down to the most insignificant Parliamentarians and journalists. And this is not all. France, Italy, and Britain are to have their strength increased. A new champion whose resources and energy are inexhaustible has come forward.

"The loss of her Colonies has particularly embittered Germany's hatred against Britain. Although she has been beaten by the French more than by any other Entente nation, she consoles herself with the thought that she still holds several French departments within her clutches. Nothing can console her for Britain's successes. She has nothing to compensate for either her pride or her material interests. It is consequently comprehensible that her fierce hatred has hesitated at no transgression, no act of cowardice, no crime. The Germans will not occupy a single British islet. They will see the whole world cherish heroic, humanitarian France when they themselves will be the reviled horde, the nation accursed on all the continents and throughout all the archipelagoes. Their only hope of redemption is to destroy the dynasty."

Knowledge of human nature and the natural or unnatural jealousy which will still rankle in the German mind for years make it all the more necessary that she be thoroughly beaten and put into such a position that she can no more menace the peace of the world or of the British Empire.

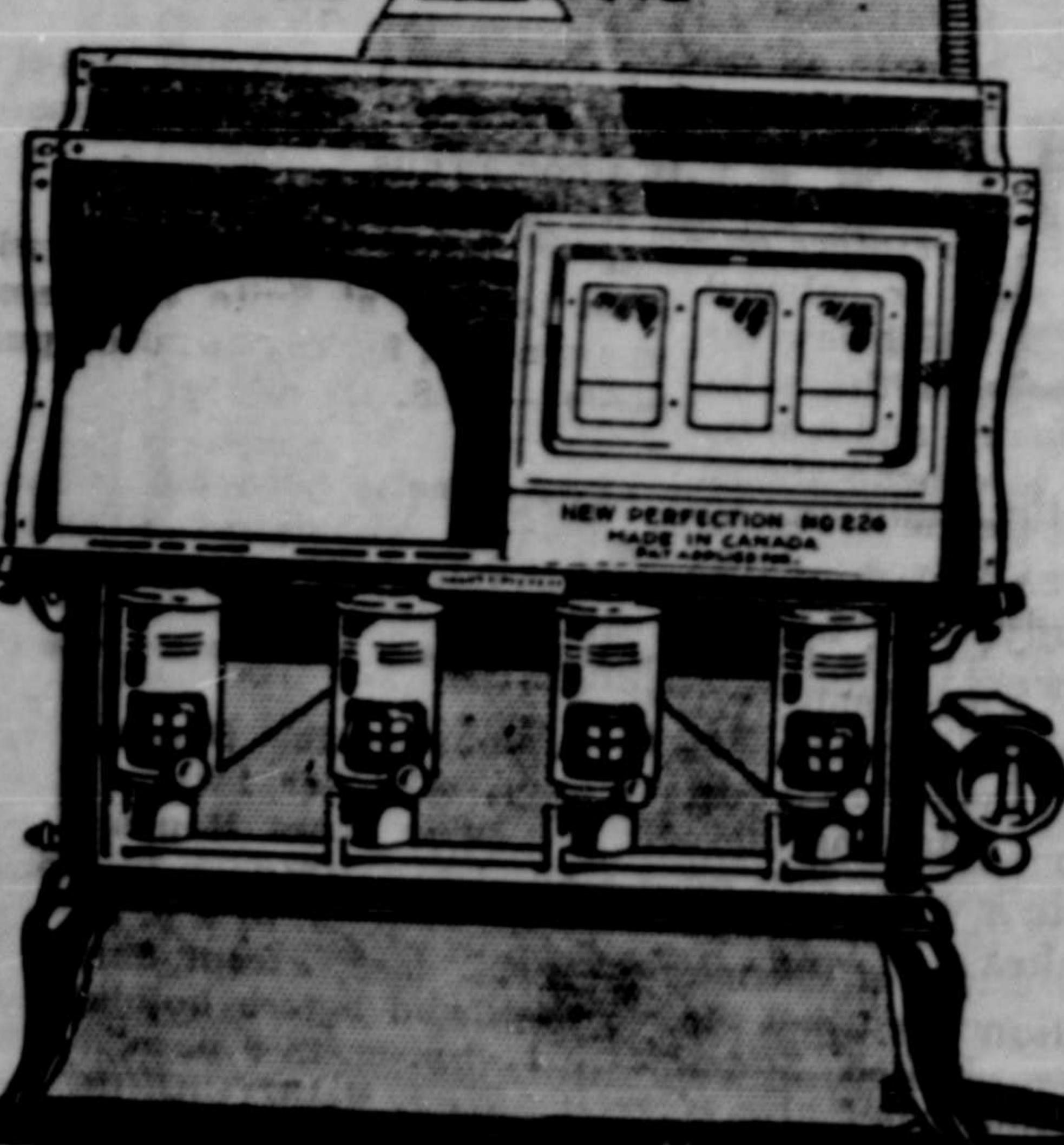

HELP FROM THE PATRIOTIC FUND

Ottawa—It is now known that, so far back as June, 1917, the executive committee of the Canadian Patriotic Fund had decided to grant the same assistance to the men selected under the Military Service Act as to the men already enlisted, in the matter of payments to dependents. On June 14, 1917, at a meeting in Ottawa, the executive committee of the Fund passed a resolution providing that, in the event of the Government's passing and enforcing legislation providing for a measure of selective drafting, the dependents of the men so selected "be entitled to the same assistance as the dependents of the men who have volunteered." Under the Military Service Act of 1917, of course, with the first class unmarried men and widowers without children, not a great many are expected to require assistance for dependents from the Patriotic Fund, although each case will be considered carefully.

With assistance, where needed, from the Patriotic Fund, the men selected under the Military Service Act will receive every convenience and right of the men already enlisted. Their status will be assured.

SPEEDY SHIPBUILDING IN THE UNITED STATES

Washington, Oct. 10.—Such remarkable progress has been made in the quick building of the immense flotilla of American destroyers to cope with the submarine campaign that the Navy Department now is assured of much quicker delivery of the ships than was contemplated at the last estimate, which in itself was far ahead of the original time. Progress on the ships now building and arrangements for others to follow, it was said today at the Navy Department, are such that the American navy will lead the world with its destroyers within eighteen months.

It is now certain that all destroyers now building will be delivered ready for duty in European waters early next year. Many of them had not been expected until the winter of 1918. Approximately, ten months has been saved.

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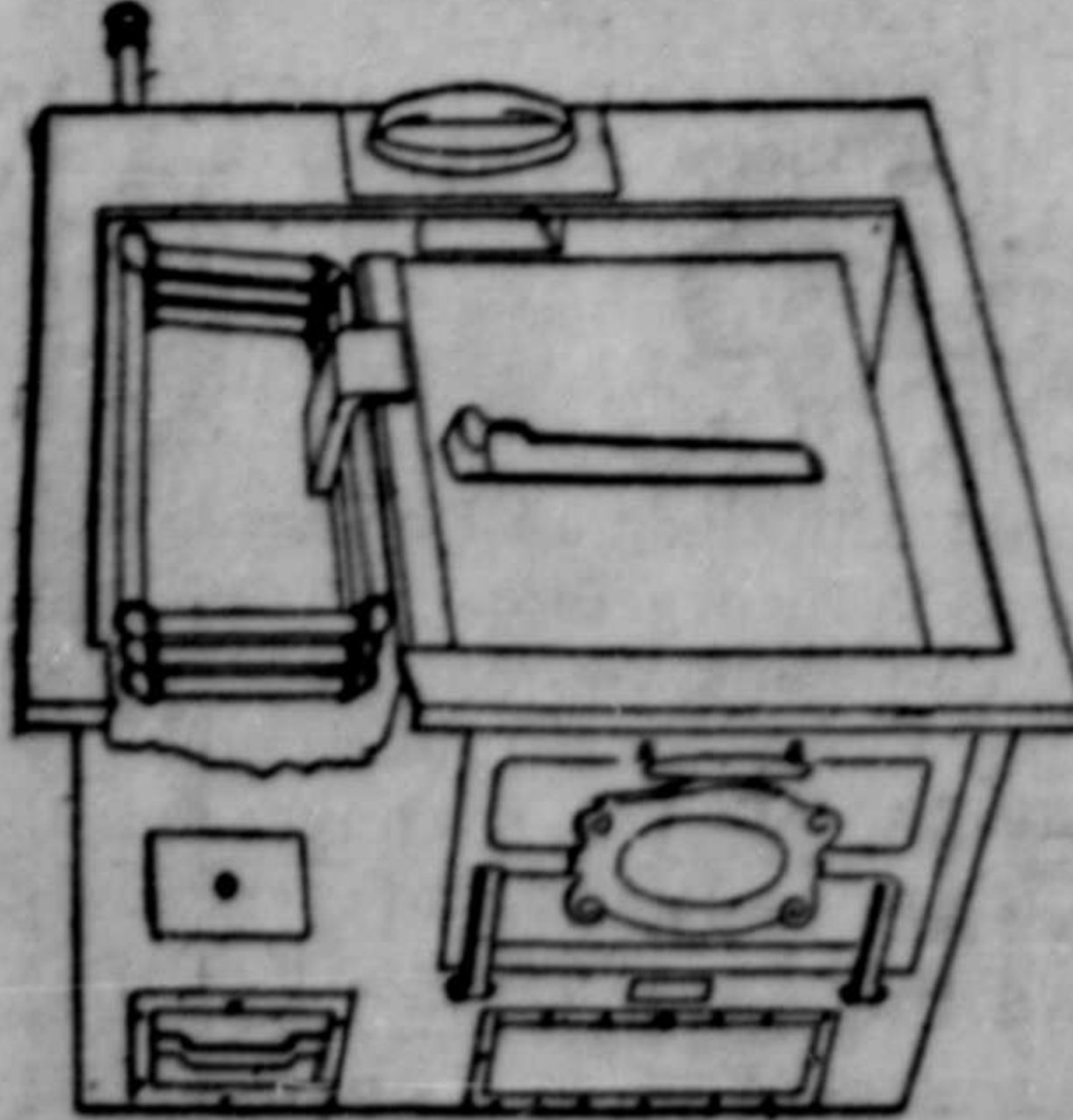
