CANADIAN WAR FINANCE

One of the imperative duties of a new Parliament will be the reshaping of war finance on more equitable and democratic principles. An opportunity to deal immediately with one branch of the question will be offered by the expiration of the Business Profits War Tax Act at the end of the current year. The Minister of Finance had announced positively that the tax would not be renewed, but he changed his mind when public protests began to pour in. It may have dawned upon him that his prospects of being in a position to write next year's financial program would not be brightened by giving the profiteers free rein.

In 1915 and 1916 the business tax was twenty-five per cent. of a company's profits above seven per cent. to any height. For over two years of the war many Canadian industries, new and old, made abnormal earnings, until the Government war forced by the scandal of profiteering into framing a higher scale of taxation. Under the new schedule the treasury takes twenty-five per cent. of a company's profits exceeding fifteen per cent., but not exceeding twenty per cent., and seventy-five per cent. of the profits beyond twenty per cent. In view of recent disclosures showing how excessive profits may be screened by a comparatively moderate dividend, the new schedule may not be nearly so drastic in practice as it appears on paper. The Big Interests are still touched too lightly. All over the country there are many businesses, great and small, earning more than in peace times, to say nothing of industries that have been created by the war.

These Men Will Help You Decide

Are you liable to be selected for service under the Military Service Act? The answer to this question is being made readily available for you.

Remember that the first class to be called includes only men between the ages of 20 and 34, both inclusive, who are unmarried or widowers without children, those married after July 6, 1917, being deemed single for the purposes of the Act.

Medical Boards are now being established throughout Canada. These Boards will examine, free of charge and obligation, all men who wish to be examined as to their physical fitness for military service. They will tell you in a very short time whether your physical condition absolves you from the call or makes you liable for selection.

It is important that you obtain this information as soon as possible. A certificate of unfitness from a Medical Board will secure for you freedom from responsibility under the Military Service Act from any Exemption Tribunal. A certificate of fitness will not preclude an appeal for exemption on any ground.

In order that you may be able to plan your future with certainty, visit a Medical Board as soon as possible and find out if you are liable to be selected. Your family and your employer are interested as well as yourself.


