## ANOTHER ATTACK ON LONDON BY AIRSHIPS

### FOUR RAIDERS RETURNING BROUGHT DOWN IN FRANCE --- FIGHT IN NORTH SEA

#### ANOTHER AIR RAID MADE ON LONDON CITY

Four German Airships Pass Over Coast, But Only One Reached London—Bombs Kill and Injure Many.

London, Oct. 22.—The Germans made another raid over the eastern counties of England. Fifty-seven lives have been lost and fifty-three persons injured. The material damage done is considerable. At eight o'clock in the evening, at least seven airships were seen crossing the North Sea, flying high. The raid was immediately sent to the capital, and the people took to their homes, but the Zeppelins did not make the expected attack. The people traveling had waited so long that they tried to go home, when without warning and without any airship being visible, a bomb fell in the streets. Several more fell in the suburbs of London. The Zeppelins were flying so high that their position could not be perceived. Several other bombs were dropped on the coast towns.

#### RAY McDONALD GETS THE MILITARY MEDAL

The many friends and acquaintances of Corporal Raymond McDonald, of Prince Rupert, will be pleased to learn of his being awarded the Military Medal "for bravery on the field." With characteristic modesty when writing home, Corporal McDonald does not disclose for what particular action he has been awarded this distinction, but all who knew Corporal Ray will know that he was well deserved.

Corporal Raymond McDonald is the younger brother of Wilfrid McDonald, who is equally well known in Prince Rupert and who was also at the front. Before joining up with the 1st Pioneers, he was employed in the engineering department of the G. T. P. here, and he received this honor on the 15th of August.

#### MR. W. A. WILLISCROFT DIES IN VICTORIA

Old Time Resident of Hazelton District Meets With Accident in Shipyard.

The sad news has been received in town of the death of Mr. Walter A. Williscroft, who for about ten years past has been located in the Quineca country in the Public Works Department. About three months ago, Mr. Williscroft left Telkwa, and after paying a visit here in Prince Rupert, left for Victoria, where he had received an appointment in one of the shipyards there. Apparently on Friday afternoon, he met with an accident, the nature of which is not stated, and he died later from the injuries received.

Mrs. and Miss Williscroft arrived in town last night from Telkwa on their way south to Victoria, where Mr. George Williscroft, son of the deceased, is also located. The Masonic order, of which Mr. Williscroft was a member, will take charge of the funeral arrangements. Mr. Walter A. Williscroft was an uncle of Mr. Wm. E. Williscroft, Summit Ave., in this city.

The numerous friends of Mr. Williscroft, and he had many, will be sorry to hear of his demise. He was widely known along the coast and in the interior, having been with the Public Works Department of the provincial government for nearly twenty-five years. Some of the first trails in the Skeena District were built by him many years ago, and for the last ten years, he had been road superintendent in the Quineca. He was in his sixty-fourth year, and his loss will be regretted by a wide circle of acquaintances.

#### FAMOUS TUG LORNE PURCHASED BY G. T. P.

Victoria, Oct. 20.—The Grand Trunk Pacific has purchased the tug Lorne and two barges for operation in the coastwise trade between the Queen Charlotte Islands and Prince Rupert. Capt. C. H. Nicholson, manager of the G. T. P. coast steamships, is in the city completing the details of the purchase.

The Lorne is a famous towboat and in her day was the most powerful craft used for deep-sea towing purposes along this section of the coast. About three years ago the Lorne, while towing the barge America across the Gulf, was blown ashore with her tow on the reefs of San Juan Islands and was badly battered by successive storms. She was eventually salvaged and towed to Victoria, being acquired by Alexander McDermott, of the Victoria & Vancouver Stevedoring Co.

In confirming the deal this morning, Capt. Nicholson stated that the Lorne will be rebuilt and used in towing lumber between the Queen Charlotte Islands and the northern terminal of the G. T. P. Each of the barges will have a carrying capacity of about 500,000 feet.

The Lorne, which since her misadventure of three years ago, has been lying at Eagle Harbor, has been surveying during the past few days, and Capt. Nicholson decided that she was worth rebuilding. The engines and boilers are in good shape, but her hull and superstructure will require a lot of attention before she can be made ready for service.

#### FLAG OF POLAND ON THE WESTERN FRONT

Autonomous Army of Poles is Already in Course of Organization.

French Front in France, Oct. 20.—A new national flag is shortly to be unfolded on the French front—that of Poland. The silver eagle on a maroon field is to take its place beside the French tricolor, the Union Jack, the Stars and Stripes, and the battle flags of the other allies, and beneath its folds will fight Polish volunteers from all parts of the world.

An autonomous Polish army is already in course of organization on French soil, and its ranks have been opened to Polish citizens who have wandered abroad in search of freedom from the oppression to which the Polish nation has so long been subjected.

This force is to be entirely independent of any other army, all its officers and men being of Polish birth or descent. The nucleus of the new army is composed of Poles who have served in the French army since the beginning of hostilities. All grades of society are represented among these Polish volunteers. In the ranks nobles have fought side by side with artisans, men of the liberal professions with farm laborers, and boys not yet sixteen shoulder to shoulder with grey-haired veterans of sixty.

Some of them have served in special Polish companies of the Foreign Legion; others were dispersed among their French comrades in line regiments. Everywhere they have gained by their bravery throughout the three years' fighting the appreciation of their chiefs. Losses in their ranks appeared to have such a favorable effect on recruiting that it was recently decided to give the Poles an organization of their own.

#### SAYS PROFITEERING IS THE REAL ISSUE

Hartley Dewar Declines to Fight Cut the Election on Conscription.

Toronto, Oct. 20.—Not conscription, but profiteering, will be the issue in the forthcoming election, declared Hartley Dewar, K. C., M.L.A., at a meeting last night of Ward One Liberal Association. Mr. Dewar, who is one of the men in the running for the Liberal leadership in Ontario, declared that the fight was between the profiteer and the people.

The Military Service Act was now the law of the land, and must and would be obeyed by the people. It should not be made an issue in the coming campaign.

The meeting put on record its continued confidence in the leadership of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, and condemned "the makeshift Union Government as a means of preventing the people of Canada from expressing their verdict at the polls on its stewardship."

#### HIGH COST OF LIVING THE ELECTION ISSUE

Gadsby Tells the Food Controller What He Thinks of Him, With \$1.00 Worth Only 50c.

Ottawa, Oct. 15.—Up to date food control in Canada has been a ghastly joke. Food Controller Hanna has issued a statement, a remarkable example of clear thought and wrong conclusion, in which he says he can do nothing about it. To fix prices would be to bring about commercial ruin—that is Food Controller Hanna's verdict. He promises us other kind words to the same effect ever and anon. We must make up our minds to starve until the war is over and then some.

The food profiteers are too strong for Food Controller Hanna. Even if he were disposed to do anything they wouldn't let him do it. The Food Trust is probably the strongest trust in Canada, and Sir Joseph Flavelle, the guide, philosopher and friend of the Borden Government, is the keystone of their system of pillage. Food Controller Hanna is the paid representative in Canada, and a large shareholder of the biggest trust in the world—The Standard Oil Company. It is not the policy of one trust to buck another—consequently Standard Oil does not quarrel with Cold Storage. They are both in the conspiracy to get all the traffic will bear. The most Sir Joseph Flavelle and his friends will get from Controller Hanna is a love tap.

Not to put too fine a point on it, Food Controller Hanna is a bluff. Mr. Hanna has given his services for nothing. For nothing he is expected to do nothing. His services are commensurate with the salary he gets. It is true that Food Controller Hanna, in pursuit of the thrift, which he advocates for the nation, has two assistants in his office at four thousand dollars each, neither of whom knows anything about food control but Food Controller Hanna doesn't get any money himself. All he gets is the advantage of being in a strategic position where he can tell the public from time to time that absolutely nothing can be done about it. One almost wishes that Mr. Hanna would take money for his services—then we might expect action.

Ever since Sir Joseph Flavelle, our greatest gratuitous patriot, was discovered making four profits on bacon and dodging taxes in three countries, the average Canadian has his suspicions of the high minded gentlemen who come forward and offer to do something for nothing.

Food Controller Hanna is several shades better than Sir Joseph Flavelle. He doesn't take profits, but he enjoys privileges—the main privilege being to stop the hands of the clock from moving forward. Food Controller Hanna's specious negatives stand between the food, pirates and destruction.

Food Controller Hanna's idea of food control is really self control. From time to time he issues a manifesto full of kind words. He tells the people to draw their belts tighter and face starvation cheerfully. What if bacon does cost fifty-seven cents a pound? Do without it. Chew gum instead. Gum increases the flow of saliva and aids digestion. If there is nothing to digest it stands to reason it will aid digestion that much more. Gum will soon be ten cents a package instead of five.

At one stage of the game Food Controller Hanna mentioned that spinach and other green stuff was a good substitute for real food. The net result of Mr. Hanna's good advice was that spinach at (Continued on Page Two)

#### TONS OF BOMBS DROPPED ON THE HUN POSITIONS

British Airmen Carry Out Daring Raids on Enemy Positions in Flanders—French Get Zeppelins.

London, Oct. 20.—An official statement issued by the War office states that, "On Thursday morning the weather was brilliant and fine, but at 9 o'clock, low, thick clouds lifted up from the west. Artillery work and photographic work were carried out by our airplanes and in the course of the day two and a half tons of bombs were dropped on a large gun position in the rear on railway sidings near Ghent and on various hostile billets. At night another ton of bombs was dropped on the Courtrai station and a German airfield in the vicinity.

"In air fighting six hostile machines were downed and four were driven down out of control, while another was shot down by anti-aircraft gunfire. Seven of our machines are missing."

#### French Get Zeppelins.

Paris, Oct. 20.—A large number of German airships, mostly dirigibles, made an excursion into France in the direction of the Vosges Mountains. Four of the enemy raiding fleet were brought down by the French gunfire. It is said that this squadron of Zeppelins was composed of the same machines which earlier in the evening had raided the Eastern Counties of England. A report has been received of the capture of a fifth German airship at Bourbonne les Bains.

#### Destroyers Sunk.

London, Oct. 20.—While conveying a number of neutral vessels across the North Sea, two protecting British destroyers were attacked by two large, fast and heavily-armed German raiders, which had eluded the British patrols further south. The British destroyers immediately engaged the enemy vessels, and fought a delaying action, to give the convoy time to make good their escape. Both destroyers were sunk by the more heavily armed enemy vessels, as well as nine of the neutral vessels. The Germans made no attempt to save any of the crews of the sunken ships, but fled, leaving the men struggling in the icy waters. The total complement of the two destroyers were lost.

#### SCARCITY OF SUGAR THREATENS IN U. S.

Washington, October 20.—The Food Administration today appealed to the American people to reduce their consumption of sugar, in order to mitigate the effects of the shortage which threatens to extend over the eastern states. No relief is in sight before late in November when the Hawaiian and Western beet crops reach the market.

**LET US HAVE IT ALL**

"Compulsory military service is only one aspect of national war organization. It is only one cog in a machine. It deals with what Sir William Robertson estimated to be only twenty-five per cent. of the force of a nation at war. The other seventy-five per cent. remains to be mobilized and this must be on the compulsory basis. A nation at war cannot operate on compulsion for field service only. It cannot take men by force and put them on the battlefield and leave everything else on a voluntary basis. If it nationalizes its manpower it must," says the Times, "nationalize its material resources; it must nationalize its food services, its munition services and the several funds now being maintained by voluntary effort."

"The Government Cost-of-Living Commissioner reports that in many items the cold-storage establishments of Canada carry larger stock this fall than they did last year. Now is the time for the Union Government to protect the public against food profiteering during the winter by taking over those concerns. This affects a very important part of the seventy-five per cent. of a nation's war organization and there should be no hesitation in carrying it out. Indeed, it concerns the most important aspect of a nation at war, not even excluding the army and navy."

"The Government should also ensure an adequate supply of fuel for the people. Prices are being fixed by the Fuel Controller, but whether this will solve the fuel supply problem time will tell. If it will not do so, the Government must take over the coal mines of the country and operate them. And it should nationalize its munition industry. Incredible though it sounds, it is a fact that here is not a national munition plant in operation in the Dominion today. Even Serbia had several such plants, and, if we are not mistaken, Montenegro had one also. Canada's magnificent machine shops were

handed over to private firms because, forsooth, it would never do for the country to go into competition with private capital!

"And, most assuredly, now that the state is making military service compulsory it must make the surrender of all excess war profits compulsory. Sir Joseph Flavelle's company last year made about ninety per cent. on the capital invested. The state should take every cent above and beyond a fair peace profit from every firm which has been enhancing its wealth out of the agony of its country and its country's allies and use the proceeds in making adequate provision for soldiers' dependents, increasing the pension scale and lowering the burden of taxation and cost on the country generally."

"These are a few essential features of national organization for war. They imply compulsion all along the line and in some instances to an extreme measure, but they constitute the necessary and inevitable complement of compulsory military service. All Canada should be in the war—Canada at home as well as Canada in the trenches."

the horrid things off, for lemonade and an easy chair on the clubhouse verandah.

"This has caused the real potato growers to buck up and talk again of four dollar potatoes, although the crop is an enormous one and a fat profit could be made at a dollar and a quarter. In fact a dollar and a quarter has been mentioned as the right price, albeit timorously and under one's breath, because the Government doesn't like to do anything that will frighten anybody. As for Food Controller Hanna, he doesn't seem to have heard anything about potatoes at all. The chances are that the potato pirates will do their worst again. Nothing will be done until the general election is over, which will be in December, or at latest next January."

Food Controller Hanna has not only neglected to fix the price of potatoes, but also the price of bread. The price of bread has done nothing but go up. In fact, going up is the best thing it does. Meanwhile the quality goes down. Controller Hanna was foolish enough to suggest war bread which is made largely of bran. War bread is now the same price as white bread. Controller Hanna's good intentions have accomplished nothing save to make the bran mash too expensive for the lower

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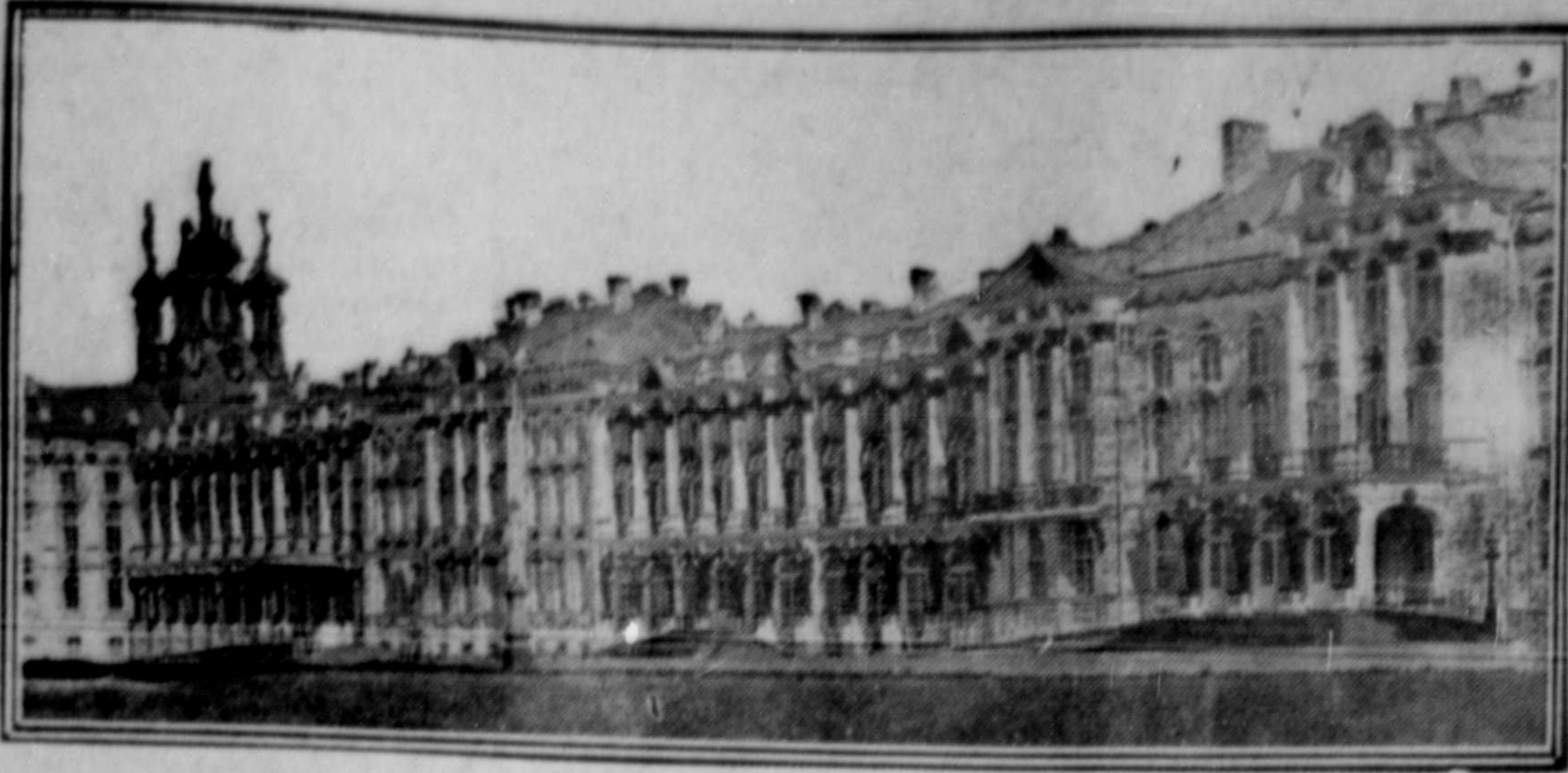

animals. Who would think of feeding his horse bran at eleven cents the small loaf?  
Food Controller Hanna's latest embargo was on canned vegetables. The public must not buy them. They are reserved for the army. If people want canned stuff they must do their own canning. They can't eat they can can. A merry dance the Food Controller leads us—right up to the can can. The canners will sell all their stuff abroad and at war prices. They can do this with perfect impunity, because our forty per cent tariff prevents us buying cheap from the United States. The home market will be intact whenever the canners choose to come back to it.

Baron Rhonnda can fine a man \$27,500 for charging too much for potatoes, but Food Controller Hanna doesn't pull any of that rough stuff in Canada. It isn't done here. It's bad form.

Food Controller Rhonnda keeps the cable hot telling Food Controller Hanna to fix prices at his end of the line and help him out. Nothing doing. Food Controller Hanna has a good excuse. He gets nothing and he does nothing. Nothing for nothing, as it were.

Food Controller Hanna will ultimately have to make up his mind to discipline the greed of people who have things to sell and who think they can sell them for three prices because there's a war on. Canada, I should say, is within two weeks of a Dominion-wide food riot if something is not done. The people can not be put off with meatless days much longer. Some millions of people are on the verge of starvation, and it will take only one more little push to send a considerable section of them travelling in the direction of Sir Joseph Flavelle's house in Queen's Park, Toronto, with weapons and torches. As for the proud bacon baronet he will be lucky to escape with his life.

The signs multiply that even Sir Joseph is beginning to quail. The price of bacon tumbles. Rapacious as Sir Joseph is he feels sick at the stomach when he thinks of what the people might do to him if they caught him out at night. Sir Joseph is afraid to go home in the dark. The difference between him and the thief on the cross is that the thief repented whereas Sir Joseph is merely scared.

He has bled the country for three years, and is full of plunder. Bacon—Sir Joseph's bacon—will be the issue at the next general election—not conscription. The votes of five hundred thousand women, mostly poor women, the wives, daughters, mothers and sisters of the soldiers, will not save a Government which is hand in glove with Sir Joseph Flavelle, the man who takes every dollar they can scrape together for food to put into the mouths of their little children. The man is at the front, earning his dollar ten a day, with blood and toil. The woman at home finds that dollar worth only fifty cents, largely through the efforts of the Horden Government and its profiteering friends. How will these five hundred thousand votes go? You have one guess.—H. F. Gadsby.

## Medical Boards are Ready!

Medical Boards are now ready to examine all men who apply as to their physical fitness for military service. These boards are established throughout this district.  
Upon examination, the medical board will classify each applicant according to his fitness; into Category A if he is fit for service in overseas fighting units; Category B if fit for service overseas in Army Medical Corps, Forestry Battalions, etc; Category C if fit for service in Canada only, etc.  
Only men whose medical examination places them in Category A will be included amongst those required to join the colours in the first instance; the man placed in any other category will remain at home until men in the category to which he has been assigned are called to the colours. The men placed in Category A may still apply for exemption on any ground.  
Men between the ages of 20 to 34 inclusive, who were unmarried or widowers without children on July 6th, 1917, are strongly advised to report before a Medical Board at once. This is the quickest and surest way for them to find out their status under the Act.  
Parents and employers are also urged to have those in whose cases they are specially interested visit a Medical Board and undergo examination. The methods of examination are simple and will result in no discomfort or inconvenience.  
Now is the time for employers to obtain facts of the greatest value to them in making their calculations. The Medical Boards will determine how many of their employees will be left at home for physical reasons and how many will be selected for service unless an application for exemption be made with success.

The ladies of the Prince Rupert Hospital Auxiliary wish to thank all those who so kindly helped to make the ball on Friday a success.

Mayor Perry of Prince George was among the passengers arriving from the east on last night's train. He is on his way to the south.

Mrs. W. S. Sargeant, of Hazelton, arrived in the city last evening and leaves for the south today. Mrs. Sargeant will spend several weeks in Seattle.

Miss Humphries, and Miss Gladys Humphries, sisters of Mr. Humphries, of Orme's, Ltd., arrived in the city yesterday from Anxox. They are booked through to Victoria.

The total sum collected on Saturday, "Our Day" for the British Red Cross, was \$1,275.88. This amount includes \$86.00 from the Seal Cove society, and \$70.00 from Alice Arm.

The Thelma is the only fishing boat in port today. Yesterday, the Convention had 17,000 pounds of halibut; N. and S., 6,000 lbs., and the Ruria, 4,000 lbs. The price realized was 18 1/2 cents.

This morning, Wm. Susa, a Russian, was admitted to the general hospital. He was rushed to Prince Rupert from the Surf Inlet mines on board the "Full Moon," and was suffering from a fractured leg below the knee.

The fire department had a call after midnight last night to the house of Mr. H. F. McRae on 4th Avenue. The roof was burnt through and considerable damage done to the kitchen before the blaze was extinguished. The loss is covered by insurance.

Mrs. H. P. Plumpre, Honorary Corresponding Secretary of the Central Council of the Canadian Red Cross Society, who will address a Red Cross meeting in the Council Chamber tomorrow evening, arrived in the city by the Princess Alice this morning.

Among the arrivals in town this morning by the Princess Alice were Lieutenant H. W. Phillips, of the Royal Flying Corps, and Air Mechanic Mawby, of the Industrial Staff at Toronto. They are here at present recruiting. Lieut. Phillips hopes to remain here for about a week. Cadets are required to train as pilots, and between the ages of 18 and 30, will be accepted provided the tests are passed. Aviator mechanics are also required, and men between the ages of 19 and 40 are eligible for this branch of the service.

**HOW DARING BRITISH OFFICER PUT END TO ENEMY SNIPERS' WORK**

London, Oct. 20.—Reuter's correspondent on the British front in France and Belgium telegraphs the following:—

"The weather cleared up today, renewing opportunities for aerial activity. Nevertheless, the battle-front is a vast weltering panorama of mud islets and countless green shell holes.

"A remarkable instance of the most cool individual daring is being told of an officer who became enraged because a nest of German snipers was firing on British stretcher-bearers, although enemy stretcher-bearers were working alongside for a considerable time unmolested. After a number of British stretcher-bearers had been shot down, the officer, carrying a Red Cross flag, walked boldly to the snipers' hiding place and proceeded in the most vigorous German to tell the snipers what he thought of them and their barbarity. He then returned safely and not a single shot came afterward from the enemy snipers."

**HUNS CONFISCATE ALL IRON AND STEEL**

Copenhagen, October 18.—The growing difficulty of obtaining iron and steel for war purposes in Germany is indicated by an Imperial regulation just promulgated in Berlin confiscating all stocks of structural iron and steel, common tubing, sheeting, cast-iron and cast steel. The order prohibits the use of any of these kinds of steel or iron except by special permission. The order goes far beyond the original regulation issued last July, which applied only to certain kinds of structural iron.
