OSTEND IS BOMBARDED BY NAVAL FORCES

HAIG PREPARING FOR ANOTHER DRIVE --- TURKS ARE ROUTED IN MESOPOTAMIA

LOCAL ATTACKS PRECEDING THE BIG OFFENSIVE

British Artillery is Exceedingly Active in Flanders—French Troops Co-operate in Local Attacks.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Oct. 23.—Local attacks were made by the British troops on both sides of the Ypres-Staden railway. For five or six days, the British artillery has been exceedingly active on this sector, indicating the resumption of General Haig's Offensive. The assault notified today, however, is specifically notified as one of the local attacks in advance of the general offensive blow.

French Co-operate.

Paris, October 23.—Co-operating with the British troops on our left, we advanced on a front of one kilometre in Belgium this morning. All our objectives were gained. Appreciable advances were made north of Bieltet. On the Aisne front, severe artillery actions are in progress. Two German attacks were repulsed.

Air Raids.

London, October 23.—France's coup in destroying four of the leading German Zeppelins on Saturday and crippling two or three more gave a powerful impetus today to the demand for the immediate assumption of the aerial offensive by Great Britain. The King and Queen are said to be in favor of reprisals. Yesterday, six German aeroplanes were brought down by the British naval aeroplanes. Numerous attacks were made from the air by the British fliers in many parts of Belgium during the last two days, causing much damage to the enemy.

Zeppelin Secrets Known.

Paris, Oct. 23.—Among the German Zeppelins brought down by the French aviators on Saturday, one came to earth intact. The machinery and all the instruments were undamaged. It was a Zeppelin of the newest type. By the study of the apparatus, all the secrets of the German airship are now known.

Germany Gets Ready.

Germany is preparing for a great air offensive to forestall the entry of the United States into the war, Le Temps declares. Prisoners newly captured state that the production of aeroplanes from German factories during the month of July totalled two thousand.

Bombard Ostend.

London, Oct. 23.—British naval forces have again bombarded Ostend yesterday. Much damage was done to enemy military establishments.

In Mesopotamia.

London, October 23.—Near the Persian border, northeast of Bagdad, the British forces made an enveloping drive upon the enemy, forcing them across the Diala river. Many casualties were inflicted upon the Turks, and prisoners taken.

German Deserters.

Paris, Oct. 23.—Over twelve thousand German deserters have found refuge in Switzerland, according to reports.

The French Ministry.

The French ministerial situation here remains uneasy. Opposition to M. Ribot in the Cabinet still persists.

Lloyd George Speaks.

London, October 23.—Premier Lloyd George delivered an inspiring speech in the Albert Hall. He declared that there will be no peace until the shrine of war is shattered. Time, he said, is no longer a neutral, but is now on the side of the Allies.

NOTES FROM THE COUNCIL CHAMBER

The meeting of the city council held last evening was a short one. Mayor McCaffery was again back in the chair. Possibly with the knowledge that there was not much business, such as there was was attended to in a businesslike way and was soon disposed of.

A letter was read from Mrs. McIntosh, secretary for the Red Cross Society, requesting that the city make a grant to the Red Cross Society. Which matter was referred to the finance committee.

Then the board of works committee brought in a report from the city engineer recommending the grading of a stretch of Eighth Avenue near Conrad Street. This was to take the place of redecking, and owing to the ease of this particular piece of work, it would cost but little more than the cost of the proposed redecking. On the motion of Ald. McGlymont, seconded by Ald. Smith, this report was adopted. Ald. Casey also drew the attention of the council to the lack of drainage for surface water on Eighth Avenue. This was caused by the guardrail not having any outlet for the water to run off.

The board of works had another formal recommendation to make regarding the renting of the city's tools. This is not to be done in future unless with the permission of the council. Regarding the sale of tools or material during this year, Ald. Casey enquired for the report from the heads of the departments which the council had requested at their previous meeting. Ald. McGlymont, the chairman of the board of works committee, informed the council that no tools nor material had been sold this year. Whereupon both Aldermen Casey and Montgomery rejected this manner of doing things. The heads of the departments had been requested to report on the matter, not Ald. McGlymont.

The public utilities committee reported upon a petition received from B. A. Webster, et al, E. Van Gastel and also a report from the superintendent of utilities recommending the installation of street lights on Bacon Street, Ninth and Tenth Avenues.

The health report was received from Dr. Cade for the months of August and September. Births for the two months numbered 28, deaths 6. During the same period there had been 70 cases of whooping cough, 1 German measles, and 1 chickenpox. These cases were all of a mild character, and otherwise the general health of the community remained good. One sample of milk had been tested which had been found to be slightly below the standard.

A communication was also read from Messrs. Spitzer, Roerig & Co. regarding the purchase of the city's bonds for \$10,000 @ 6%. In speaking on this matter the mayor said that it was a matter of congratulation that the city was able to borrow at this rate, as the Government had recently to pay more.

After this, supplies were passed and the council adjourned.

WOULD START SHIPYARD WITH FREE SITE AND GUARANTEE OF BONDS

City Council Requested to Assist Vancouver Man to Establish Plant.

At the city council meeting last evening, the first matter brought to the attention of the councillors was a letter from one S. E. Landry, of 25 Hastings Street Vancouver. The letter referred to the establishment of a shipbuilding plant in Prince Rupert. The writer would undertake to establish a branch of a well known eastern shipbuilding firm, who are now building large ocean-going ships for the Imperial Government. However, Mr. Landry did not state just which of the eastern firms he had in mind.

This proposal of course was conditional. The consideration is to be the gift of a site, on the railroad, and with a deep-water frontage, and the guarantee of the bonds of the company for \$100,000. The security of the city would be the first mortgage of the proposed plant, which the writer assures the council will be valued at \$50,000, and which will employ 300 men. The writer was also careful to stipulate that the company should dispose of its own bonds at cost, not at par.

When the city can see its way clear to meet the request of Mr. Landry, he says that the company will start in immediately to build wooden ships for the Imperial Government.

Conditional upon this shipyard being established, the writer has other enterprises in view, and would induce capitalists to invest in a pulp mill, to use up all the small hemlock in this district. The reading of this letter would infer that if the shipbuilding plant fell through, so would the pulp plant project.

There was a little discussion upon the matter. The city, of course, had no sites on the waterfront at all, and the guaranteeing of bonds for \$100,000 on the security of plant worth \$50,000

GREAT FLOODS IN BELLA COOLA VALLEY

Roads and Bridges Washed Out for Sixty Miles—Townsite a Scene of Desolation.

The last published number of the Bella Coola Courier, dated Saturday, October 6, arrived in Prince Rupert yesterday. It tells of the havoc wrought by flood in the beautiful Bella Coola Valley. The damage done has been enormous, and the near approach of winter will make the task of getting back to a normal state a slow piece of work. All means of transportation in the valley are at an end, for the present. Every bridge for sixty miles or so has been swept away and the roads are all washed out. The townsites presents "a scene of desolation and wreckage."

Practically every inhabitant in the valley has suffered loss through the high waters.

The Courier does not give any details of when the floods took place and owing to the difficulties experienced, has suspended publication until the spring.

SOLDIER CANDIDATES AND THEIR PLATFORM

Vancouver, Oct. 23.—A platform has been formulated, and has been submitted to the Great War Veterans' Association for its approval, on which it is proposed that soldier candidates will contest the constituencies of Burrard and South Vancouver. The proposed platform provides for hearty support for the Union Government in the prosecution of the war, heavy taxation of war profits, administration of the Patriotic Fund by the Government, increased pensions for N. C. O.'s and men, universal enfranchisement of women, elimination of war profiteers and utilization of the labor of alien enemies in Canada.

CHIEF PURPOSES OF UNION GOVERNMENT NOT YET ACHIEVED

Nevertheless, Hon. W. S. Fielding Says Union Idea Commends Itself to the People.

Montreal, Oct. 22.—The Journal of Commerce, of which Hon. W. S. Fielding, former Dominion Minister of Finance, is editor, discussing union government says:

"If a Union Government had been formed in Canada in the early months of the war, as took place in Britain, many of the troubles that have since arisen would in all probability have been averted. The Union Government now formed comes late, but better late than never probably will express the opinion of the large majority of the Canadian people, and therefore the new administration will have their best wishes for success. It will be well, however, if the circumstances under which the union comes are remembered, so that there may be an appreciation of the difficulties of the situation and modifying of the expectations. What union government was required for was:

"First, the stoppage of party strife; second, the avoidance of an election by an extension of the parliamentary term; third, the uniting of the Canadian people into one party for all purposes during the war. A moment's reflection will show that not one of these purposes can now be effected by the formation of the Union Government. The very personnel of the new administration makes it clear that differences, which unhappily have arisen, are now much accentuated. So it is clear that the good purposes for which most people desired a Union Government are not attained by the recent appointments at Ottawa. Nevertheless, the union idea will in a way commend itself to the people."

HUNS' SUCCESS LEAVES GERMAN PEOPLE COLD

No Enthusiasm Displayed by the Hungry Population—Russian Prisoners are Starved and Fired Upon.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Copenhagen, Oct. 23.—The German success on the Gulf of Riga causes no enthusiasm among the long-suffering German people. They are now past rejoicing at what they see to be an empty victory.

Germans Retire.

Petrograd, Oct. 23.—On the Russian northern front the Germans have been executing the manoeuvre of retiring to their main positions in the region of Skuli and Lemberg. The Russian vanguard pursued the retreating enemy forces.

At the Islands.

German submarines have been observed in the Gulf of Finland. Russian patrols watching the Gulf of Riga saw large enemy forces, also transports, landing on the Werder Peninsula. The enemy forces pressed back the Russian advanced posts and occupied the western part of the peninsula.

Fire on Prisoners.

Washington, Oct. 23.—A Petrograd telegram just received says that Oesel Islanders, who escaped from Oesel Island and Moon Island, recently reported to the Russian officials that the prisoners taken by the Germans were being loaded in boats, after being starved. When they asked for food, the Germans replied, "We have nothing with which to feed you." When the boats left the shore, they were fired upon.

Now Berlin Puts It.

Berlin, Oct. 23.—More than twelve hundred prisoners, a number of guns, and a large quantity of stores and material have been captured on Dagoe Island. In nine days, Oesel, Moon and Dagoe Islands, the key positions to the Eastern Baltic have been acquired by our forces. Osten has been bombarded from the sea and the houses damaged.

Russia's Peace Programme.

Petrograd, Oct. 23.—The peace programme of the Council of Soldiers and Workmen is out. The Soldiers' delegates issued instructions to the ex-Minister of Labor Skobeloff, for presentation at the Paris Conference. There are fifteen articles, which cover much ground. The Alsace-Lorraine difficulty they would solve by a vote of the population after the troops had withdrawn. Their programme would be easy of acceptance by Germany, no indemnities are stipulated for. The programme supports compensation to Belgium from an international fund.

THE PLATFORM

Sir Robert Borden has announced to the electorate of Canada the plans of his new Government so far as time has permitted these to be considered. Few honest men can find fault with it. It is a comprehensive platform. If this platform can be carried into effect, the present Government will prove its superiority to the last one. But, "there's the rub."

The announcement of a platform is only the starting point. There have been so many electoral policies scrapped in the past that the ordinary elector may be excused oftentimes for being just a little bit dubious regarding such. What is more to the point is the inclination and the ability of the Government to carry its policy into effect.

The vigorous prosecution of the war is the first plank. This is a fundamental principle without which no candidate could be elected. The reform of the Civil Service is also proposed. The principle of the present Civil Service Act is to be applied to the outside Service as well, whereby, through competitive methods, patronage will be abolished. The non-partisan Dr. Adam Shortt, heretofore the capable chairman of this commission, however, has been replaced there by the Hon. Dr. Roche, late Minister of the Interior, to whom, hitherto, the adjective "non-partisan" could not, by any stretch of the imagination, be applied.

The extension of the franchise to women is also to be dealt with, which is one thing the late Government was afraid of, as well as the "adequate" taxation of war profits. This, and the increased taxation of incomes, is what the Finance Minister of the late Government flatly refused to do. Instead of governing, the late government was governed by the big interests in this matter, and radical changes in the present system of taxation will show whether the new Government is in the same position or otherwise.

Immigration and colonization are to be attended to, and a

vigorous policy adopted. Effective arrangements for demobilization of the army, and for "adequate pensions for those who have been disabled and for the dependents of those who have fallen" is another of the things that the late government jibbed at, and which the new Cabinet promises to attend to.

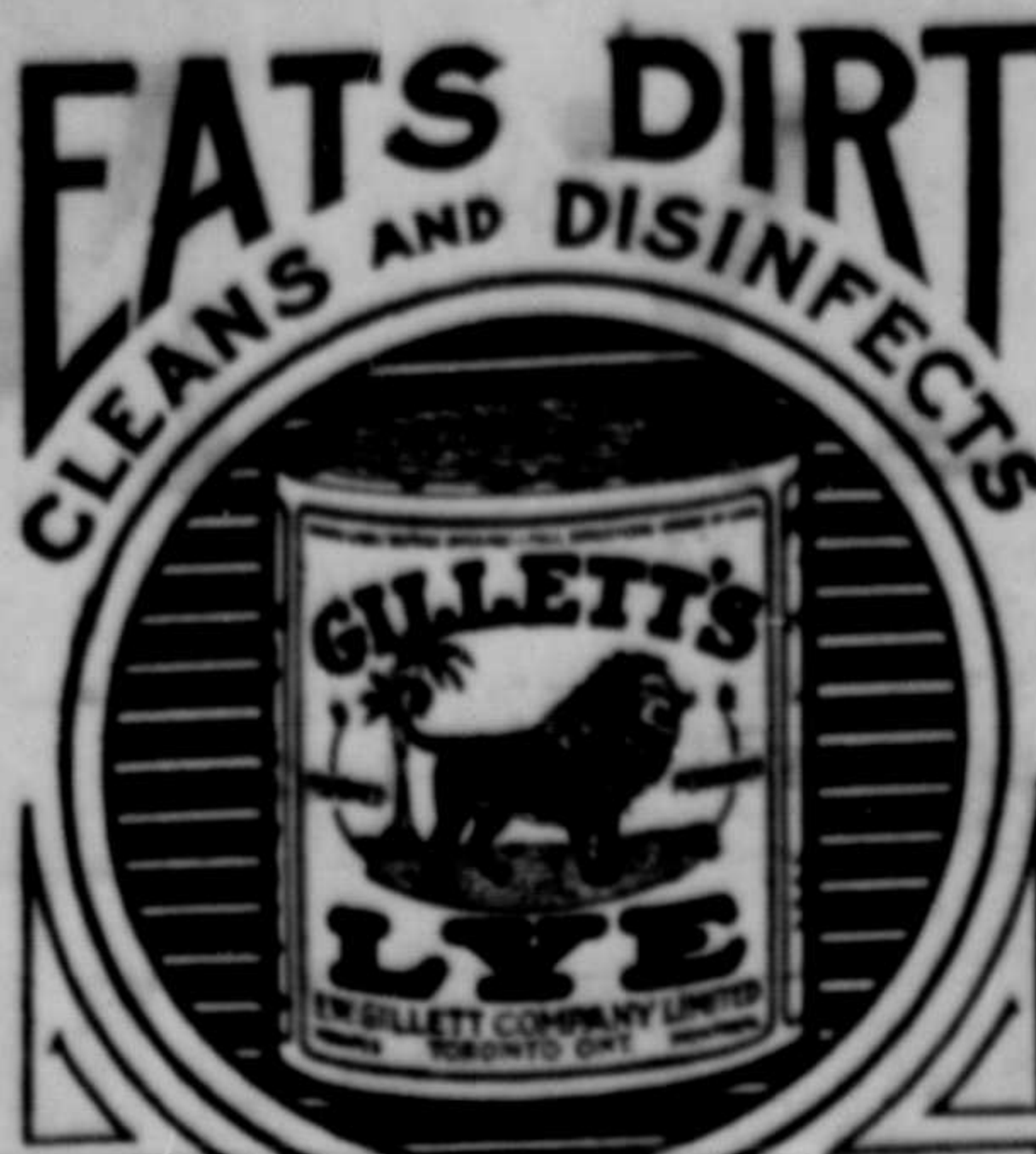
The Laurier policy of the development of transportation facilities, and the establishment of steamship lines upon both oceans, together with the development and the encouragement of shipbuilding, is also to be undertaken by the new Government. Possibly something may happen yet in Prince Rupert.

The reduction of public expenditure, and effective measures to prevent excessive profits, and to prevent combinations for the increase of prices, and thus reduce the cost of living, is another plank in the platform of the new Government's platform. The outcome of the adoption of this policy will be watched with considerable interest by the people of Canada. Adequate consideration of the industrial population, and such conditions of employment as will ensure suitable standards of living among the laboring classes, if it means anything at all, means radical changes. The adoption of many of the planks of this new platform are equally conducive towards progress.

Yet equally good platforms have been placed before the electorate. There is a wide difference between election pledges and the carrying of them out. This platform is one which the people of Canada have been demanding for some little time back. Legislation along these lines is overdue. The signs of the times all point to the necessity for a forward movement, a move for progress.

When is camphorated oil not camphorated oil? The answer given in court is when it's cottonseed oil camphorated. Although olive oil can hardly be procured to inoculate with camphor, it cost one Victoria man \$5, although cottonseed oil is commonly used. How many people would know the difference? The same thing is going on in many other lines, even in food stuffs, and the perpetrators get away with it just because the people "don't know the difference."

The Provincial Executive of the Conservative Association in British Columbia are pleased. They had an executive meeting in Vancouver last week, when they passed a resolution expressing entire confidence in Sir Robert Borden and his Union Government, pledging him their entire support. Wonder if they are equally confident of winning the election?

The high cost of living threatens to become one of the chief issues at the next election. "No truck nor trade with the Yankee" which was the false war cry of six years ago is never heard these days. The benefits of a measure of reciprocity are already being appreciated in Canada. The defeat of reciprocity six years ago is the chief reason for higher prices of foodstuffs and other commodities on this side of the line. A case in point is Flavelle's bacon which costs over fifty cents in Canada and thirty-eight cents in the United States. And you may be sure it pays Joe a profit even at thirty-eight cents.

There was one thing that was omitted from the platform of the new Government in the recent statement of the Premier. That is any mention about the revision of the tariff. The ranks of the protectionists in the Cabinet have been strengthened by the inclusion of the Hon. C. C. Ballantyne. He is an ex-president of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association, and any reduction of the present high tariff which the people of Canada have to pay to the Manufacturers of Eastern Canada would not be acceptable to him. They call him a Liberal, too.

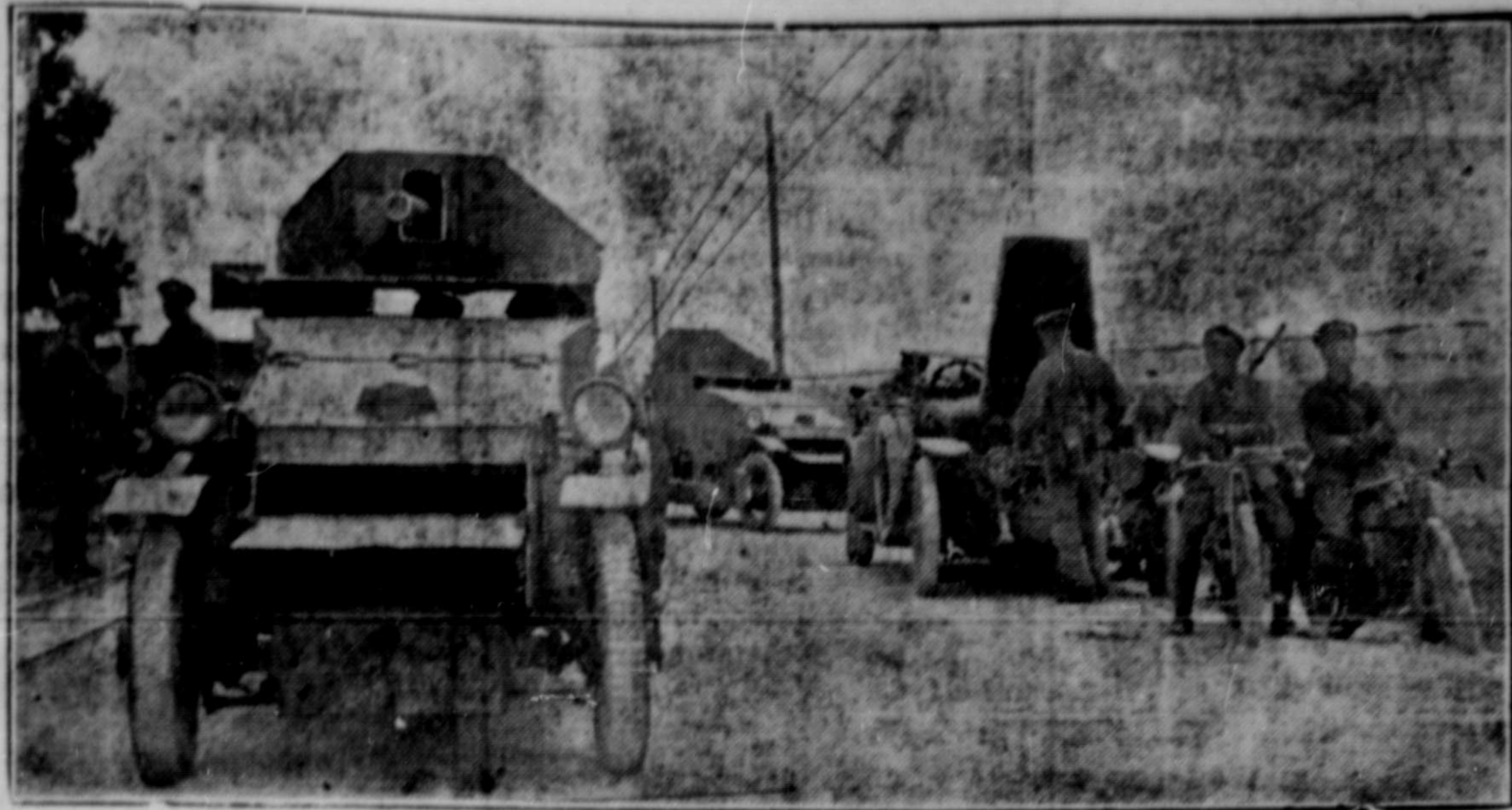

FLAVELLE TRIUMPHS, SAYS GENERAL HUGHES

Lindsay, Ont., Oct. 20.—That
union government was not neces-
sary and that party government
in Canada has not had a fair show
in the past is the opinion of Lieut.
General Sir Sam Hughes in a long
interview published today in The
Lindsay Warder, of which Sir
Sam at one time was editor. Per-
sonally, the former Minister of
Militia thinks the Union Govern-
ment is a "splendid triumph for
the plans laid long ago by Sir
Joseph Flavelle and Sir Thomas
White."

Sir Sam said:
"It is more than a year since
the movement to form a National,
or 'National Trust' Government as
it is sometimes called, was pro-
posed by Sir Joseph Flavelle and
his friends. It is understood that
the undertaking at that time in-
volved the replacement of Sir Rob-
ert Borden by Sir Thomas White."

"The Government had done its
full duty during the last year,"
said Sir Sam, "and there was no
pressing need for coalition or
union." He admitted that, as
men, the new Cabinet had good
qualities.

"Some weeks ago," he said,
"when General Mewburn and Col.
Ballantyne, both my boys, were
individually condemning condi-
tions under Borden, and when
each asked me why I did not break
out and take hold of things my-
self, I thanked them for their con-
fidence and loyalty, but showed
that the results might be the
placing of Sir Wilfrid Laurier in
power."

Sir Sam said he would give his
support to Liberals or Conserva-
tives who are advocating active
and not passive war measures.
He had himself received and re-
fused from tens of thousands of
sources requests and demands to
come out and lead an aggressive
fight for the war.

Medical Boards are Ready !

Medical Boards are now ready to examine all men who apply as to their physical
fitness for military service. These boards are established throughout this district.

Upon examination, the medical board will classify each applicant according to his fitness;
into Category A if he is fit for service in overseas fighting units; Category B if fit for service
overseas in Army Medical Corps, Forestry Battalions, etc; Category C if fit for service in
Canada only, etc.

Only men whose medical examination places them in Category A will be included amongst those
required to join the colours in the first instance; the man placed in any other category will remain at home
until men in the category to which he has been assigned are called to the colours. The men placed in
Category A may still apply for exemption on any ground.

Men between the ages of 20 to 34 inclusive, who were unmarried or widowers without children
on July 6th, 1917, are strongly advised to report before a Medical Board at once. This is the quickest
and surest way for them to find out their status under the Act.

Parents and employers are also urged to have those in whose cases they are specially interested
visit a Medical Board and undergo examination. The methods of examination are simple and will result
in no discomfort or inconvenience.

Now is the time for employers to obtain facts of the greatest value to them in making their
calculations. The Medical Boards will determine how many of their employees will be left at home for
physical reasons and how many will be selected for service unless an application for exemption be made
with success.

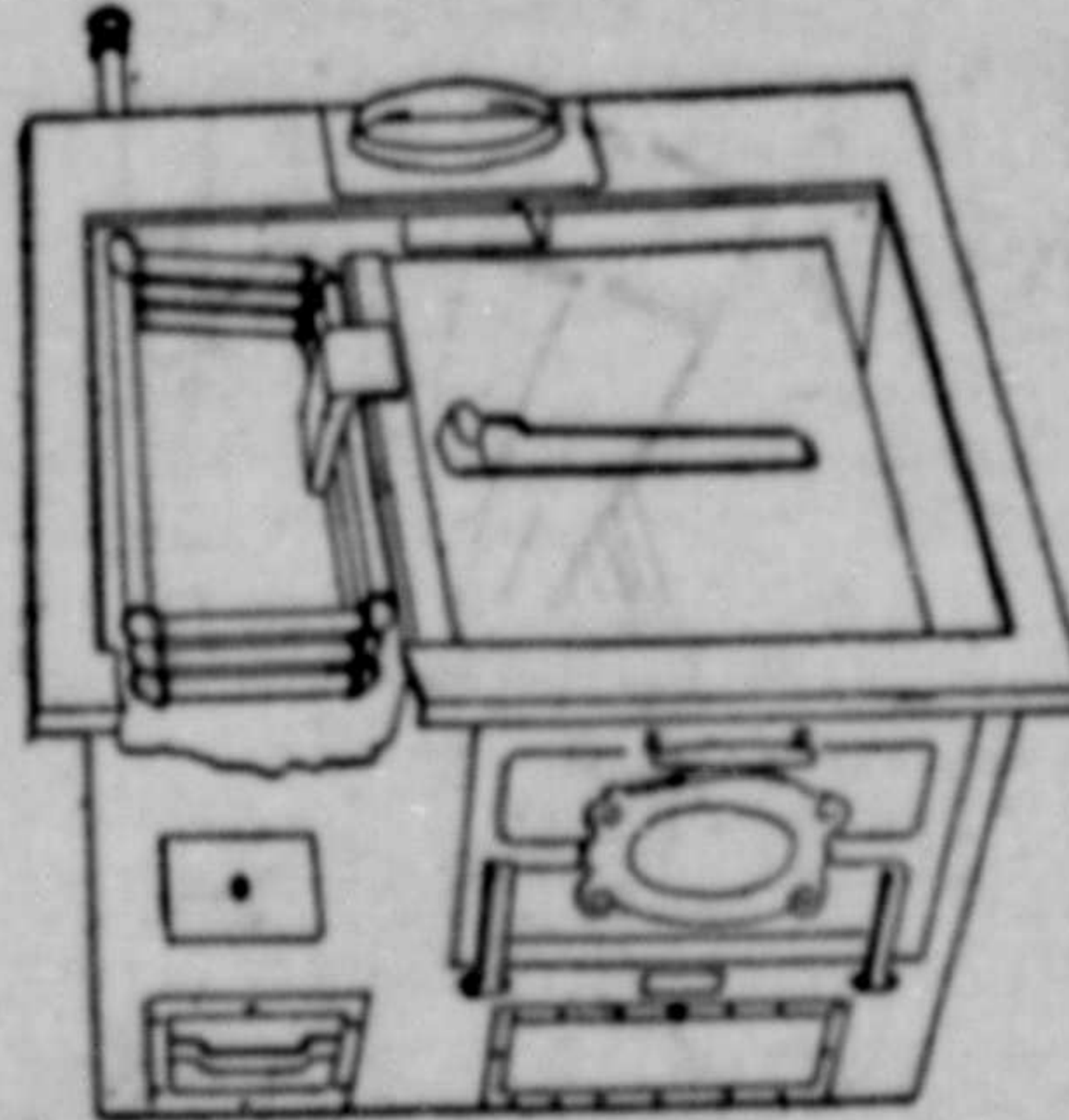
