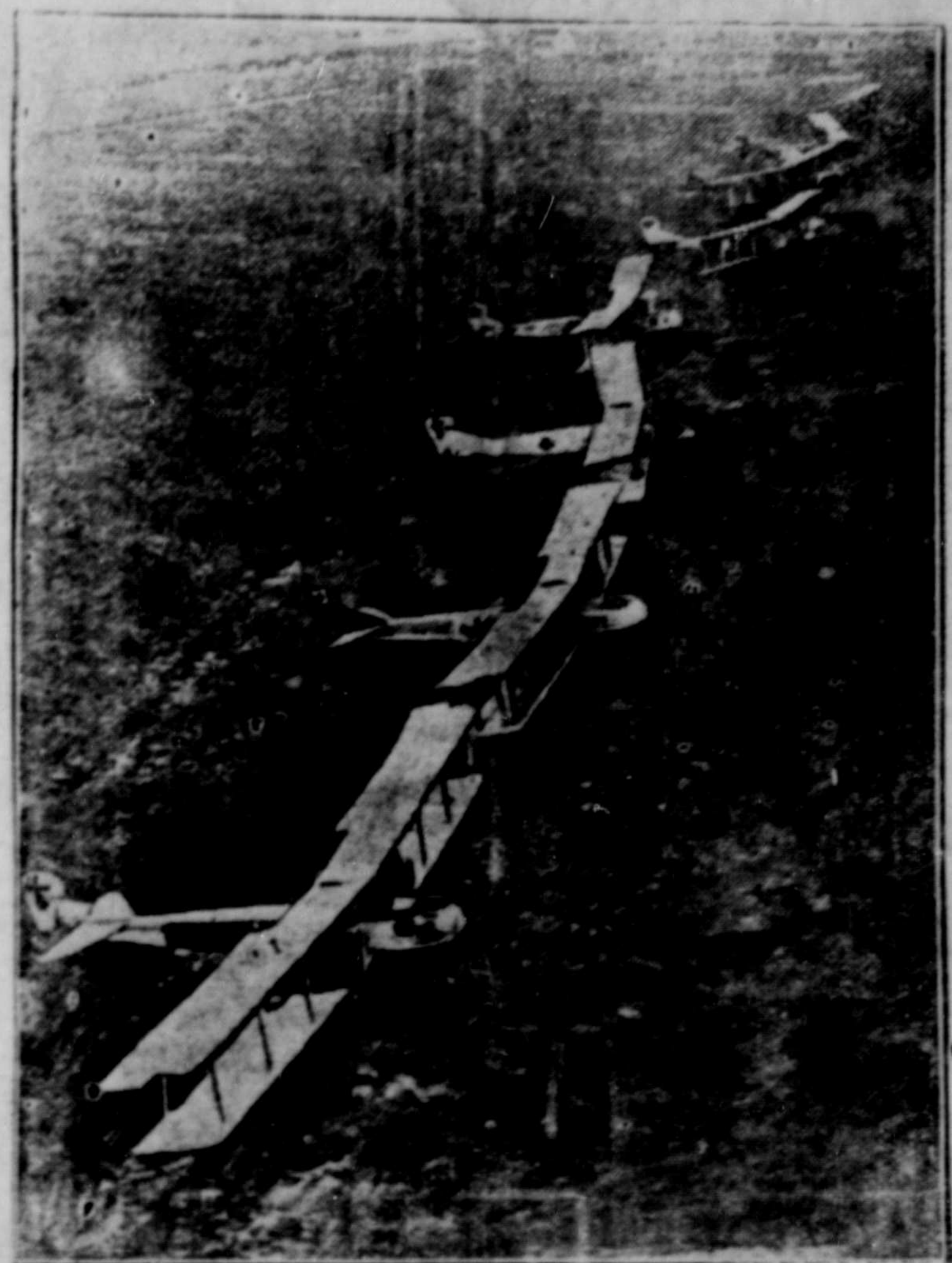
GERMANS RETIRE ON RUSSIAN FRONT — AUSTRIANS PREPARE FOR OFFENSIVE

FRENCH TAKE EIGHT THOUSAND PRISONERS IN GREAT DRIVE

GERMAN GENERAL STAFF TAKEN UNAWARE — VICTORY SAID TO BE MOST IMPORTANT SINCE THE MARNE — FRENCH ARTILLERY SMASHED GERMAN FORTRESSES WITH SIXTEEN-INCH SHELLS

(Special to The Daily News).
Paris, October 25.—The number of prisoners taken by the French troops in yesterday's great drive northeast of Soissons is now estimated at eight thousand. All France is afire over this latest victory. The German General Staff is thought to have been taken unaware. The French forces are now overlooking the plains of Laon and have considerably straightened out the salient which the Germans have held for many months in the French lines. Malmaison Fort, Allemant, and Vandesson which have been captured were fortresses built carefully and supposed by the Germans to be impregnable. All the engineering skill which the Huns possessed had been put into the construction of the defenses at these points, but French valor overcame them.

British Press Joyful.
London, October 25.—The press here today is full of praise for the great French drive at Soissons. The victory achieved is said to be the most important one for France since the battle of the Marne in 1914, and is an exposition of the French and German troops at real grips. Both sides had been making preparations for an attack at this point for months past, and the finest of the German troops were massed there. The command of the whole of the valley of the Ailette has now passed into the hands of the French. The vast fortresses which the Germans had constructed were demolished by the sixteen-inch shells of the French big guns and in many cases the whole garrisons were buried in the ruins.

AUSTRO-GERMAN OFFENSIVE ON ITALIAN FRONT

Large Proportion of Troops Concentrated on Battlefront Are German—Berlin Claims Success.

(Special to The Daily News).
Rome, October 25.—The Austrians have concentrated strong forces on the Italian front for offensive purposes. A large proportion of the troops are German.
Per Berlin Wireless.
Berlin, Oct. 25.—An Austro-German offensive has been instituted on the Italian front. The German and Austrian infantry this morning have captured the foremost Italian positions near Flitch and Tolmino, and also the northern portion of the Bainsizza plateau.

Russian Front.
On a wide front between the Gulf of Riga, the German troops have been withdrawn without interruption from the enemy.
Chancellor Resigns.

London, Oct. 25.—According to a message from Amsterdam received here today, Dr. Michaelis, the German Chancellor, has placed his resignation in the hands of the Kaiser. Kaiser Wilhelm is returning to the capital to take a hand in the straightening out of matters.

British Front.
London, October 25.—Violent German counter attacks against the newly won British and French positions in Flanders around Houthuist Wood have been fruitless.

Kill Their Officers.
On the redoubts captured by the British northwest of Ypres, British troops found a German officer who had been executed by his own soldiers.

U. S. Ship Sunk.
Ottawa, Oct. 25.—The American steamer Santa Elena, 7,415 tons, which was formerly one of the interned German ships, has been sunk near Ferrol, a port on the west coast of Spain. Twenty four lives were lost.

HON. MARTIN BURRELL DIRECTS CAMPAIGN

Ottawa, Oct. 24.—Hon. Martin Burrell, Secretary of State leaves tonight for British Columbia to prepare for the election campaign in the Coast Province.
Mr. Burrell will consult with the Coast politicians in regard to candidates. An effort will be made to secure only one win-the-war candidate in each riding.

KERENSKY AUTOCRAT OF RUSSIAN REPUBLIC

The Premier May Appoint a New Commander-in-Chief in Gen. Boukhouin by Weekend.

Petrograd, Oct. 25.—The newspapers state that Kerensky will probably relinquish the post of commander-in-chief of the Russian armies to General Boukhouin at the end of the week.
The Minister of the Interior, M. Nidkin, has issued a proclamation to all commissioners through out the Russia exhorting all classes of the population "to unite against the increasing anarchy which is driving the country to ruin." "Though the nation is a republic, Kerensky is an autocrat," says President Trotsky of the Workmen's and Soldiers Congress.

WHAT TO DO WITH THE P.G.E.

R., arrangements for the purchase of the undertaking by the latter company have not been successful. The C. P. R. is hesitating to assume any new obligations at present.

SEARCH PARTIES OUT FOR MR. WM. ANGLE

Well Known Citizen Went Hunting From Shawatlans Monday and Has Not Returned.

Owing to the continued absence of Mr. William Angle who went out hunting on Monday from Shawatlans, several of his friends became anxious on his account and although they searched all day yesterday, could find no trace of him. His intention on Monday when he left the power house at Shawatlans Lake was to return, that night, according to what he told the staff there. He did not return on Tuesday, and it is feared that some accident may have overtaken him.

Mr. Angle is well acquainted with the country around Shawatlans, having hunted over it for years past. He has a cabin there, where he often camps. On account of his knowledge it is considered hardly likely that he got lost in the bush, which might happen to one with less experience.

Last evening, the provincial police sent a launch up Tucks Inlet, where it was thought that he might have come out through the valley there, but no luck attended this trip. Today, the same party is searching again but up till noon, no word has been received. They are Messrs. Thompson, W. W. Wright, R. H. Shockley, J. Hampton and Moore. If on their return this evening, they have not found any trace of Mr. Angle, a larger party will take up the search tomorrow.

BORDEN'S PROGRAMME WILL TAKE 25 YEARS

Bourassa Thinks it Contains Too Much State Socialism for Mediocre Cabinet.

Montreal, Oct. 24.—Henri Bourassa, the Nationalist chief, discussing the manifesto issued on Friday by the Union Government, said:

"The first act of the ministry is to launch on the public a programme which covers the whole political, social and economic activities of the country. Certain matters, such as the promise of woman suffrage, comprise a veritable social revolution, the consequences of which are incalculable. A half dozen others, at least, are inspired by state socialism of a most advanced nature, without any indication, however, that the farceurs who have produced this piece of jargon comprehend the first word of the problems which they are facing. It will require at least 25 years of arduous, intelligent labor to execute the revolutionary reforms and changes proposed by a ministry largely composed of mediocrities, incompetents and political adventurers associated for the unique object, it is pretended, to further the war effort of Canada."

BIG DEAL IS MADE IN COPPER MINES

Seattle, October 24.—Louis G. Dillman, Seattle mining capitalist, today announced his sale of the Westover group of copper mines in southwestern Alaska to the Alaska-Chitina Exploration Co., of Seattle for \$416,000 in bonds and cash.

The sale is said to be the largest in years in Alaskan copper properties and is believed to promote activity in northern copper. F. A. Seiberling, president of the Goodyear Rubber Company, of Akron, Ohio, is reported interested in the purchasing company.

HON GEORGE GRAHAM DEFINES ATTITUDE

Says Cabinet Programme Displays Liberal Principles Which He Advocated.

Ottawa, Oct. 23.—It was learned that Hon. G. P. Graham made a speech in which he stated that since the beginning of the war he had favored union government. He had favored it when Sir Robert Borden made proposals for union to Sir Wilfrid Laurier, and which, owing to conditions and circumstances could not be accepted because it was too late. Later on, when individual Liberals were asked to join the Government he had adopted the idea that the formation of a union government on the eve of an election was not desirable, but that it would more properly come after the people had spoken.

Mr. Graham deprecated criticism of the motives of the Liberals who had joined the Borden Administration. They were still Liberals, he said. No one in Ontario would question the loyalty and sincerity of Hon. N. W. Rowell.

Referring to the Prime Minister's manifesto, Mr. Graham said that the platform as announced showed an infusion of Liberal principles. Some of the planks announced were identical with proposals which had been made by himself. He intimated that if this programme were adhered to by the Government he would give it his support, but he would leave himself free to oppose to the full extent of his powers any attempt on the part of financial pirates to plunder the public treasury. Referring to the Military Service Act Mr. Graham, it is said, stated that he had voted for conscription, and still believed it desirable. He had not changed his views.

MAY PERMIT SALE OF OLEOMARGARINE

Ban Upon Its Manufacture May Be Removed to Meet the High Cost of Living.

Ottawa, Oct. 23.—Although the question has not yet been definitely decided, it is altogether likely that within a few days an order in council will be passed lifting the ban off the sale and manufacture of oleomargarine. This will be the first real act of the new Government towards meeting the high cost of living. The matter was under consideration today at a conference between the heads of the Agriculture and Food Controller's Departments with their experts.

The present high cost of butter bound to be still higher during the coming winter, makes it almost impossible for poor people to buy it. The popular demand that oleomargarine should be made available as a substitute for butter has been brought forcibly to the attention of the Government for months past. The Food Controller has been studying the problem for some weeks past, and it is understood has strongly recommended that the ban be lifted.

The question, however, is a complicated one. There is already a scarcity of fats in Canada and if oleomargarine is manufactured the result might be to increase the already high price of lard and other similar commodities manufactured from the same by-products from which oleomargarine is made. Moreover, it is feared that, in consequence of the scarcity of farm help, farmers will not increase their present dairying output, especially if oleomargarine comes on the market as a substitute for butter. Food economists and live stock experts are not certain as to the economic wisdom of allowing the manufacture and sale of oleomargarine even under present conditions, but the weight of opinion at today's conference was in favor of it.

THE GOVERNMENT'S DUTY

A change of Government will be justified only by a change for the better. Candid friends of the late Administration will admit that it was not riotously popular. The highly critical state of the public mind has not been charmed away by Cabinet changes. Having lost faith in the old Government, people look to the new one with hope, but not with a boundless charity. It has a stock of good-will which its predecessor lost, but this will not serve it long unless it is justified by its works.

Many faults were imputed to the Borden Government, says *The Globe*, but it was attacked chiefly on the ground that it was too dependent on large financial and industrial interests, or too fearful of them, to compel them to carry their proportionate share of the burdens of the war and subordinate their selfish interests to the service of the country. The present Government can better afford to be courageous: it cannot afford to be anything else. Its first duty must be to strike at the cause of popular discontent by demonstrating that it has the intention and the will to lay a firm hand on the machinery of Big Business, and make it work for the State. The war has poured fortunes into the pockets of many great industrial and distributing enterprises. Some of these have been lately placed under direct Government control, but there is need of widely extending State regulation in the interest of the public exchequer and of the masses. Fiscal reforms are necessary, especially a stiffening of the new income tax, and direct imposts on luxuries. It cannot have escaped the notice of the Minister of Finance that the amended income tax in the United States will touch a greater number of people, relatively, than the corresponding tax in Canada, and that the larger American incomes derived from professions and occupations will pay double the Canadian rate. Above and beyond these things the Government can do

much to curb extravagance and stimulate thrift. It can be not only economical itself, but the cause of economy in others. A great many people must be shaken out of their present habits of spending. It is difficult to modify custom in a hurry. But Canadians must be made to realize that they face an industrial emergency. The amount of money needed to market the crops and establish British credits so as to keep factories busy and labor employed on British war orders will be beyond the resources of the country unless the people are smitten with a zeal for saving. One way in which the Government can aid in this laudable object is to change, as far as practicable, the direction of industry. The employment of more labor and material in the production of essentials would reduce their price. This can be effected only by the transfer of labor and material from the production of the non-essentials on which too many Canadians are spending money that should be invested in war bonds so as to keep essential industries at work. In the realm of food control and regulation the Government, through the Food Controller, must go much farther in plans for conserving and distributing supplies, for stimulating production, and for protecting the public against speculators and profiteers.

The country looks for a bold and progressive program from the Union Government as a justification for union.

NOTES AND COMMENTS

The high cost of living and the high cost of coal remains much about the same, notwithstanding the efforts of a Food Controller and a Fuel Controller.

"Oh! For a business Government," was for a long time the heart-broken cry of "John Bull," edited by Horatio Bottomley, the Ishmaelite. His hand was mostly against everybody in power, and often with good reason, too. The same cry might well be adopted by the people of Canada, if it

were not too much to hope for.

The Montreal newspaper *Le Canada* says that "the manifesto issued on behalf of the Borden Union Government is the program offered by Sir Robert Borden in 1904 and not yet accomplished." Thirteen years and nothing accomplished! Canada needs a government who will do something—and quick, too.

Sir Joseph Flavelle is at great pains to explain that his expression "to hell with profits" had no reference to the William Davies Co., Ltd. The which company is apparently one of the greatest profiteers in Canada. "Consistency's a jewel" and Sir Joseph has been consistent in grabbing as many profits as possible, like most Tories. He has even disciples in Prince Rupert. What's the difference between political graft and profiteering, anyway?

Prince Rupert has had six years experience of what to expect from a Conservative Government at Ottawa. That should be enough to make every voter desire a change. The difference between a Borden Unionist and an old-time Conservative is apparently nil. The net result of these six years is an idle drydock and a hole in the ground. The gross result is too gross to go into detail meantime.

With one smashing blow after another on the western front, heavy naval losses in the Baltic, defeat staring the Austrians in the face on the Italian front, Bulgaria demoralized, Turkey making overtures for a separate peace, and all expensive colonies gone, Kaiser William must be feeling up against it. His is another lost cause, but with no romance attached. No wonder his hair has turned grey.

At the coming election the winning of the war, nor the Military Service Bill are neither of them issues. But what will be real live issues are, the high cost of living, the conscription of wealth, which is not such a vague term as some folk would have us believe—and finally the record of the late Borden Government. Three strong arguments for a complete change of policy.

AEROPLANES CLEAN UP TURKS ON EUFRATES

Bagdad—A novel use for aeroplanes was found the other day when two of our machines were the cause of the surrender of a small enemy detachment at Diwanayah on the Euphrates.
 The garrison had been left there in charge of sick and stores by the Turkish Euphrates force in the second week of March during their retirement from Samara to Ramadi at the time of our occupation of Bagdad. They held out for some months at Diwanayah in the hope that the Euphrates might be recaptured by the Turks. At the end of July a number of the garrison surrendered to the townspeople and were handed over to us, but a single officer and some 30 men refused to yield until the aeroplanes came and bombed the house in which they had taken refuge. The lieutenant and his detachment formed a last batch of the isolated Turks who have hung out in the remote districts between Nasiriyah and our posts further north on the Euphrates.

Medical Boards are Ready!

Medical Boards are now ready to examine all men who apply as to their physical fitness for military service. These boards are established throughout this district.

Upon examination, the medical board will classify each applicant according to his fitness; into Category A if he is fit for service in overseas fighting units; Category B if fit for service overseas in Army Medical Corps, Forestry Battalions, etc; Category C if fit for service in Canada only, etc.

Only men whose medical examination places them in Category A will be included amongst those required to join the colours in the first instance; the man placed in any other category will remain at home until men in the category to which he has been assigned are called to the colours. The men placed in Category A may still apply for exemption on any ground.

Men between the ages of 20 to 34 inclusive, who were unmarried or widowers without children on July 6th, 1917, are strongly advised to report before a Medical Board at once. This is the quickest and surest way for them to find out their status under the Act.

Parents and employers are also urged to have those in whose cases they are specially interested visit a Medical Board and undergo examination. The methods of examination are simple and will result in no discomfort or inconvenience.

Now is the time for employers to obtain facts of the greatest value to them in making their calculations. The Medical Boards will determine how many of their employees will be left at home for physical reasons and how many will be selected for service unless an application for exemption be made with success.

The case against Wong How, the Chinaman, who was brought before Judge Young yesterday on a charge of larceny, was adjourned until Monday.

Mr. L. D. Templeman, of Vancouver, was among the arrivals in town yesterday and he left at midnight by the Prince John for the Queen Charlotte Islands.

The fishing boat arrivals are rather light today. The Ila brought in 4,000 lbs. halibut; Karl F., 4,000 lbs., and the Rainier 5,000 lbs. The price realized was 17% cents.

The tug "Dola" brought into port this morning the American barkentine "Venicia" of San Francisco. The sailing vessel is light and is on her way to Masset, where she will load lumber.

Sympathy will be extended to Mr. and Mrs. F. W. Doherty, whose little daughter Mary died yesterday afternoon. The child was but three months old. The funeral will take place today and will be private.

Word was received in the city yesterday that an accident had befallen a man named Chris Peterson, at Alice Arm. Dr. Hyde, accompanied by Constable Shiels, have left Anxox for Alice Arm to investigate.

No further word has been received in town regarding the disappearance of Mr. Walter Warner of the "Lillooet." The vessel was at anchor in Refuge Bay on Porcher Island, where Mr. Warner had a ranch. He got leave to go ashore, which he did about five o'clock on Sunday afternoon. He spent some time with Mr. Miller, the postmaster, and at 9:20 p.m. asked the use of Mr. Miller's boat to take him out to his vessel. Next morning he had not turned up on the Lillooet and on enquiries being made these facts were ascertained. Mr. Miller's boat is missing, which leads to the assumption that an accident must have taken place. A search was made by the Lillooet all around but no trace could be got of either the missing man or the boat. Mrs. Warner resides in Prince Rupert.

For each \$21.50, \$43 or \$86 lent now, the Government issues a Certificate, payable in three years, for \$25, \$50 or \$100. This means that interest is added at over 5% per annum. Certificates may be purchased at any Bank or Money Order Post Office.
