## ANOTHER GREAT DRIVE ON WESTERN FRONT

### TO OFFSET HUNS ATTACK ON ITALY, ALLIES START SOMETHING IN FLANDERS

#### ITALIAN TROOPS EVACUATE THE BAINSISSA PLATEAU

OFFICIAL ANNOUNCEMENT MADE IN ROME—BERLIN CLAIMS THE CAPTURE OF THIRTY THOUSAND ITALIANS AND THREE HUNDRED GUNS—FIGHTING IS NOW ON ITALIAN TERRITORY

(Special to The Daily News.)  
Rome, October 27.—The evacuation of the Bainsizza Plateau by the Italian troops which had been won by so much hard and costly fighting, is officially announced here today.

Premier Boselli has also announced the resignation of the Italian Cabinet.

Per Berlin Wireless.

Berlin, Oct. 27.—The Austro-German forces in their offensive on the Isonzo front have captured more than thirty thousand Italian troops, and more than three hundred guns. In many places the Germans are now fighting on Italian territory.

The northern wing of the Italian army has been defeated and is retiring. The German divisions are advancing beyond Kurfret and Ronzina.

London Optimistic.

London, Oct. 27.—Germany's offensive against Italy looked serious at the start, but the season is bad for such a campaign. Italy is well equipped and provided with troops. Military critics here have complete confidence in Italy's ability to weather whatever storm the Germans may raise.

Western Front.

London, Oct. 27.—The British and French forces in Flanders have joined in another great drive today.

Position in Germany.

Amsterdam, October 27.—The Kaiser has not considered that the resignation of Dr. Michaelis as Chancellor is yet necessary. Considerable uneasiness is being displayed in the German newspapers over the latest advance by the French on the Aisne.

It is considered probable that the German troops, under the pressure of the French victory will endeavor to effect a general retirement to a new Hindenburg line, well in the rear of the present position.

Russian Front.

Petrograd, Oct. 27.—The Russian forces on the Werder Peninsula, on the coast of Esthonia successfully repulsed a German detachment.

Brazil at War.

Rio de Janeiro, Oct. 27.—It is considered very probable that Brazil will be compelled to enter hostilities against Germany on account of the sinking of the fourth Brazilian ship. The latest Congressional message leaves little doubt on this question.

#### FUNERAL SERVICE OF MR. WM. ANGLE MONDAY

Accidentally Shot Himself While Coming Through Bush—Leg Was Badly Shattered.

Early yesterday afternoon, the search party which had been scouring the country around Shawatians for the past two days, arrived back in Prince Rupert, bearing with them the body of Mr. William Angle. Alone in the woods which he loved so well, this old hunter and woodsman passed away. Coming down the mountain side packing a deer, traces on the ground show where he had slipped and where possibly his rifle had accidentally been discharged. He had almost reached the end of his journey and was within easy reach of his cabin when the accident must have happened. The charge had entered his leg, shattering the bones. From the point where he left the deer to where he was found yesterday morning was only about two hundred feet, which he had crawled, and was apparently by that time too weak to move any further. Death was apparently caused by hemorrhage.

A Masonic burial service will be held tomorrow afternoon and the last rites in Prince Rupert will be conducted in the parlors of the B. C. Undertakers on Monday morning at 10:30, the Rev. Dr. Grant officiating, assisted by the Rev. W. W. Wright. Thereafter the body will be conveyed by rail to Fingal, near St. Thomas, Ont., for interment.

The deepest sympathy will be felt for Mrs. Angle in her bereavement, and the many friends of the deceased will have a distinct sense of loss. He was one of the first pioneers in Prince Rupert and as a building contractor was extensively known.

#### INTERNAL SITUATION IN AUSTRIA IS WORSE

London, Oct. 26.—The Austrian Swiss frontier has been closed owing to the serious internal situation in Austria, according to an Exchange Telegraph dispatch from Berne today. Several munitions factories were wrecked in recent food riots in Vienna, Pressburg, Brunn and Laibach, the rioters being mostly women, the advices state. The police, according to the reports, fired on the crowds, killing many persons.

#### SINN FEINERS WANT MILITARY SERVICE

All Members of the Organization Should be Trained in the Use of Arms.

Dublin, October 27.—The Sinn Fein Conference which is being held in Dublin just now, at its session last night decided that all members of its organization should be trained in the use of arms, although this will not be compulsory.

Where the Arms Come From.

London, Oct. 27.—The Irish situation becomes more disquieting day by day. Reports received from different parts of Ireland indicate that a very grave situation may arise on short warning. Rumors are going around that German submarines have been again landing arms on the coast of Ireland at pre-arranged points.

#### MR. G. M. HANSON ON KIPLING THE POET

Last evening the St. Andrew's Society turned out a large audience to hear Mr. Hanson, United States Consul here, speak on the poetical works of Kipling. Mr. Hanson is a lecturer of no mean order and he delighted his hearers. Illustrating his subject, he gave many extracts from the works of the poet. He showed how Kipling was the poet of the present. His vivid way of describing brought the action right before the reader. Altogether, after this lecture by Mr. Hanson, Kipling will appear in a new light to most of his hearers.

At the conclusion of the lecture, a vote of thanks was moved by the Rev. Dr. Grant and seconded by Mr. J. G. Steen, after which the evening was further enlivened by music.

#### STRAIGHT PARTY FIGHT IN SOUTH RENFREW

Ottawa, Oct. 26.—The Ottawa Journal says:

"It is almost a certainty that Hon. George P. Graham will not be given the Liberal nomination in South Renfrew again. It is understood that the Liberals will nominate I. E. Pedlow, of Renfrew, as a straight Laurier candidate and that the fight in that constituency will be on straight party lines. There is no indication as yet where Mr. Graham will find a seat."

#### TO HANDLE CUBAN SUGAR

Washington, Oct. 25.—Through co-operation of the British Admiralty with the United States Food Administration, a plentiful supply of jute bags for handling the coming Cuban sugar crop is now assured.

The Cuban crop begins to come in about December 15. Bags are to be sent from India to Cuba, the British Admiralty to furnish the necessary shipping facilities.

An Atlantic Port of the United States, Oct. 26.—A sailing vessel brought a cargo of wool from South Africa valued at more than \$1,000,000 to this port yesterday. The vessel was nearly a week overdue.

#### GREAT FIRE IN QUEBEC MUNITIONS FACTORY

Shell Loading Plant Destroyed by Fire Near Vaureuil—No Loss of Life.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Montreal, October 27.—A shell loading plant belonging to the Canadian Explosives, Ltd., at the Isle of Perrot near Vaureuil was destroyed by fire and explosions yesterday morning. The fire was started from a spark from an electric motor and as it spread from building to building, each was blown up as the powder ignited. The loss is estimated at a million and a half dollars. Fortunately, there was no loss of life.

#### UNABLE TO DECEIVE THE RANK AND FILE

How Attorney-General of Alberta Speaks of the Union Government.

Vancouver, Oct. 25.—As to the Win-the-War movement, Hon. C. W. Cross, Attorney-General of Alberta, who is in the city, said that he knew of no one in either political party who was not anxious to win the war. It was not an issue. A vigorous effort had been made to make it an issue for political purposes, but had failed. The motive was too transparent.

The Union Government, although it contained some Liberal Ministers, was not non-partisan. A non-partisan Government with the recognized head of the Conservative party as Prime Minister was unthinkable.

The whole Union Government scheme, Mr. Cross declared, was a dying attempt of an irresponsible Government to retain power. If they had been able to fool a few leaders in the provincial politics, they had not fooled the rank and file. The rank and file in every province was down on the Borden Government and the iniquitous franchise measure. The Union Government lure proved to a certainty that the Borden party had no confidence in its ability to win on its own record.

#### MUST BUY CEREALS IN LARGER QUANTITIES

Ottawa, Oct. 25.—In order to eliminate the waste in packages and the increase in the cost to the consumer involved in the trade in small packages of breakfast foods, cereals and cereal products, an Order-in-Council has been passed upon the recommendation of the Food Controller, prohibiting the sale, after a specified date, unless licensed, of such foods in original packages of less weight than 20 pounds. In special cases the Food Controller may license sale in small packages if necessary in the interest of the public.

Manufacturers and wholesale dealers are given until November 1st to dispose of their stock, but on and after that date they must not offer for sale in Canada "any foods known as breakfast foods or cereals or flour, or other foods which are the product of wheat, oats, barley, rye, rice, peas, beans, buckwheat, Indian corn (maize), or lentils in original packages of less weight than 20 pounds."

In the case of retail dealers, the prohibition of sale is effective on and after December 1.

#### ELECTION THROUGH BEFORE CHRISTMAS

December 17th Probably the Day; Great Work of Making Preparations.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Ottawa, Oct. 25.—It is now certain that the Dominion general election will be over some days before Christmas. Monday, Dec. 17, is the most likely day for the polling.

The work of organization is proceeding rapidly. No election was ever held in Canada before under similar conditions and it is unlikely that such conditions will ever present themselves again. Not only the ordinary election machinery has had to be set in motion, but complete new machinery has to be provided for the holding of military and naval polls in France, Belgium and the United Kingdom, the West Indies, Canada, and on the high seas near Europe and North America. Contemporaneously with the operation of getting ready for the taking of votes in so many places, new lists of voters have to be prepared in every province and the Yukon. A million or so of female voters will have to be located, identified as qualified and for the first time registered as entitled to vote. The names of many aliens must be struck from the lists. All these operations will proceed under authority of two Acts of Parliament, one of which was still under discussion on the last day of the session in September. For the purpose of the election, thousands of new ballot boxes and bags have had to be made in Canada and in England. Minute instructions have had to be cabled overseas. Millions of ballots, ballot envelopes and other election forms have had to be prepared and printed.

Ordinarily the mere revision of the voters' list in any of the eastern provinces usually consumed about three months. The operation of making new lists in Canada, adding the names of qualified female voters, striking out the names of disfranchised aliens and nominating and polling for candidates will cover a period of 28 days. There will be a period of three weeks allowing for the returning officers' preparations. Thus, the writs of the election can be issued seven weeks before the date set for the election, giving ample time for all the purposes of the Military Voters' Act and the War-Time Election Act. W. F. O'Connor, K. C., better known as the Cost-of-Living Commissioner, who has been appointed general returning officer, is in charge of the operation of the whole electoral machinery in Canada and overseas, civil, military and naval.

#### ASKS "FEDERATIONIST" BE BARRED U. S. MAILS

Seattle, October 26.—Assistant United States District-Attorney Donald A. McDonald asked the Post Office Department at Washington to bar from the United States mails the British Columbia Federationist, a Socialist publication of Vancouver, B. C. Government agents have charged that the Federationist is fostering anti-draft propaganda in Seattle and other Pacific Northwest points.

#### NON-PARTISAN UNION GOVERNMENT APPOINTS TORIES TO THE SENATE

Conservative Members for Victoria and New Westminster are Promoted to the Gilded Chamber.

Ottawa, October 26.—Four rank Conservatives appointed to the Senate is one of the first deeds to be consummated since the Union Government took office. Dr. F. L. Schaffner will sit for Manitoba, and Mr. W. S. Willoughby for Saskatchewan. The British Columbia members are Colonel J. D. Taylor, Conservative member for New Westminster, and Mr. G. H. Barnard, present Conservative member for Victoria in the House of Commons. This coming on top of the removal of Dr. Adam Shortt, the admittedly non-partisan head of the Civil Service Commission, whose place has been filled by the Hon. Dr. Roche, late Minister of the Interior, just prior to the announcement of the reform of the outside civil service, is causing some little fluttering in the dovecots here. The opinion expressed here is that if the Liberals throughout the country fail to see anything of a non-partisan nature in these appointments, they may be excused.

#### BONAR LAW WANTS TWO BILLION DOLLARS

**CIVIL SERVICE REFORM**

In the platform of the Union Government is a plank which must strike machine politicians of all stripes with dismay and wrath, The Times affirms. This is the provision for complete Civil Service reform. In the face of that fearful menace we may expect to see a union of the political machines—a sort of double-sexuple contrivance, in press phraseology—to wage an aggressive fight to bring to its knees the ministry which threatens to close the gates of this paradise of the "practical" politician. Of what use would political life be to men like Mr. Rogers and Mr. Bowser, on one side, or that so-called Liberal Association in Vancouver which would not include Mr. Brewster among its officers because he declined to be dominated by their machine, on the other, if merit were the only key to position in the public service? What are we coming to when a Federal Government actually talks about making candidates for employment in the country's service prove their eligibility before a board of examiners? What new calamity will the Kaiser's war inflict upon the country?

In 1908 the inside, or administrative, service of the country was placed on the merit system by the Laurier Government. It would have been better if the legislation had been extended to the outside service, but the obstacles in the way of this were too formidable at the time. As it was, the change was a long step towards Civil Service reform. When the late Government assumed office it played havoc with the outside service. It made 24,000 appointments to 10,000 jobs and in some departments the cost of administration was doubled. That is one reason why Canada today has no reserve for financing British war orders. The millions were thrown into the patronage pot. Mr. Rogers and Mr. Pelletier were in their element.

The new Government could not avoid adopting that plank even if it wanted to, for the

simple reason that this can be the only compromise between the two wings of the ministry in the matter of further appointments. Thus Canada never had a better opportunity of placing her public service on a basis of merit and efficiency than she has now. Certainly such a policy would be beyond the power of a purely party Government for the simple reason that the political pressure in the party ranks against it would be too strong. It was this pressure which limited the reform of 1908 to the inside service.

**NOTES AND COMMENTS**

The very same hall in which Hon. Col. W. K. McNaught made his arrogant statement that "the Conservatives are doing most of the fighting in this war" was the scene of a free-for-all fight among the Toronto Conservatives last week. The wrangling commenced right at the beginning of the meeting, in the description of which the Toronto Globe heads, "Fists Fly and Blood Flows at Ward Four 'Donnybrook.'" Conservative meeting ends in battle royal. Four free fights. President shoved half-way downstairs. The end of a two-column report says: "The rival factions then seemed as if they would reach an agreement but a fight started in the middle of the hall, and the meeting broke up in a free-for-all." Politics in Toronto must surely be interesting.

Agricultural prejudices die hard! It has been generally believed impossible to grow No. 1 hard wheat in British Columbia. In fact British Columbia mills have been in the habit of paying a lower price for the soft wheat of this province on the ground that it was necessary to import No. 1 Hard from the eastern provinces to mix with the local product for successful milling. That this is not the case is shown by the fact of a car load of No. 1 Marquis wheat being shipped to the B.-K. mills at Nelson from Enderby, samples of which the Dominion Government graders at Calgary unhesitatingly graded as No. 1 Hard. Further proof of

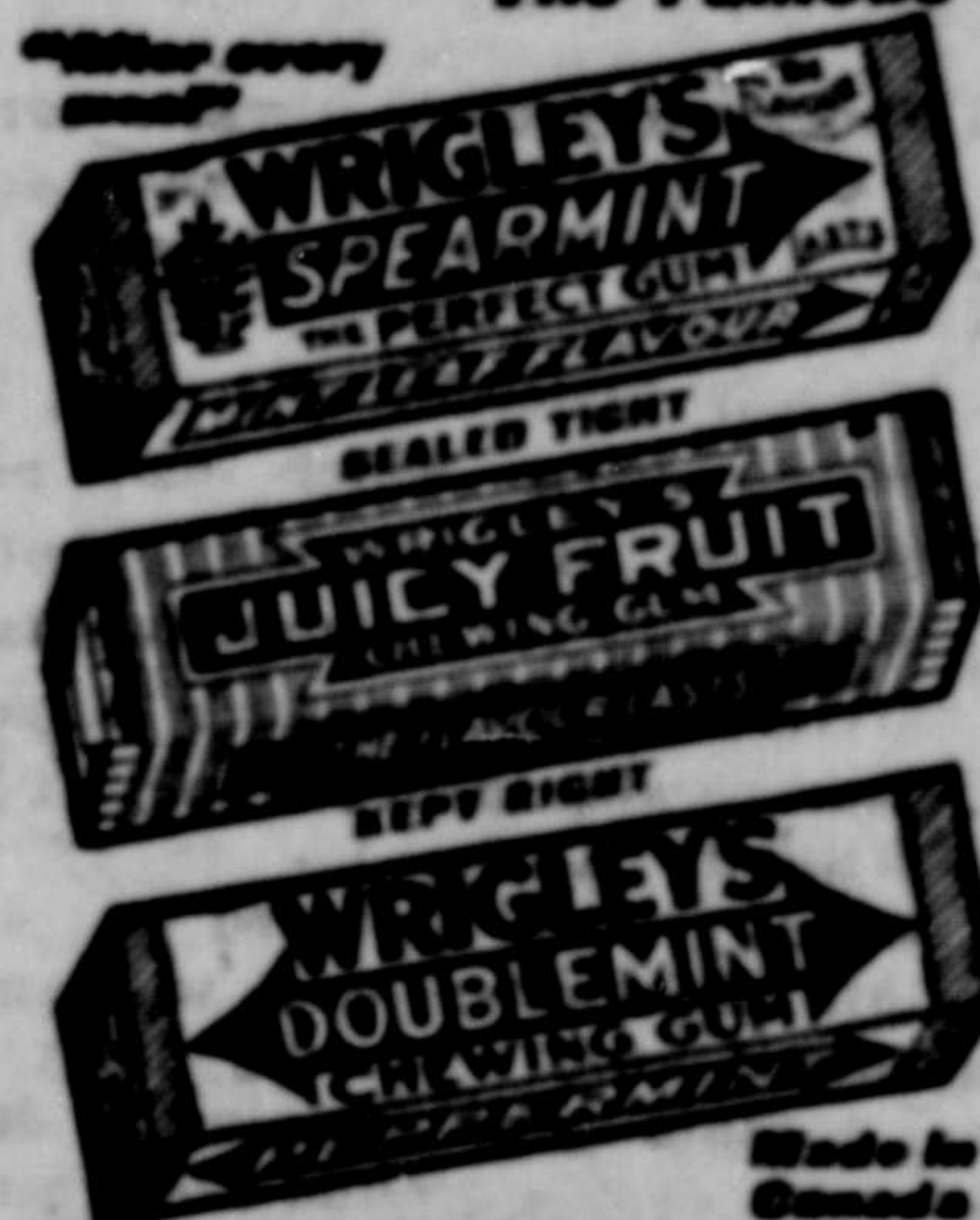

## PLANS FOR AERIAL TRANSIT AFTER WAR

**British Government Making Arrangements for Inter-Empire Air Travelling.**

London, Oct. 24.—The Daily Express says that as soon as the war is ended aerial navigation plans which are being drawn up by Lord Northcliffe's committee, appointed by the Government, will be put in operation step by step, and the ends of the world will be brought together by long-distance airplane service.

The Express says it has information that if favorable weather conditions prevail it is likely that the Atlantic will be crossed by an airplane before the end of this year. It understands that the flight will be made by way of the Azores, so that the journey may be broken.

### London to Cape Town.

The bridging of the Atlantic by airplane, it says, will be only the beginning of things. Plans are being laid for regular air service, not only to America, but to India, South Africa, and Australia. If they are brought within eight and one-half days of London; India three days, and Cape Town, four or five. The bee-line to Cape Town would, of course, cross the Sahara, but the winds of the desert raise obstacles to this route, and the route chosen is by way of Malta, Cairo, Khartoum and Victoria Falls.

The Express says that the machine which will be used for these world-journeys will be of the type developed by Handley Page, will travel 200 miles an hour, will have multiple engines, to avoid the necessity of descending if one engine gives out, will carry four or five passengers, and will be able to cover about 3,000 miles in fifteen hours. Two pilots will take turns at the wheel. There will be comfortable enclosed quarters, and the journey will not be more exhausting than a railway trip of similar duration.

# Will Class One Provide The One Hundred Thousand Men?

It will be greatly to the advantage of Canada if the entire quota of 100,000 men to be raised under the Military Service Act can be secured from the first class; that is, from the men between the ages of 20 and 34 who were unmarried or widowers without children on July 6th, 1917.

This is almost self-evident for the following reasons:

it is admitted that, between the ages of 20 and 34, the average man is at the height of his physical strength and is most adaptable to the change of conditions from civilian life; the military Service of unmarried men and widowers without children would occasion less distress than that of most others, since they are largely without dependents. Also, it would entail less financial burden for Canada, through separation allowances, etc.

Authorities estimate that, after all proper examinations have been allowed, Canada should be able to produce from the first class 100,000 men fit for service, so the drain upon the man power of the country will not be severe.

Members of Class One will be well advised to present themselves for examination immediately to the Medical Board in their district. Upon examination as to their physical fitness, they will be placed in one of the following categories:

- Category A—if fit for service in overseas fighting units.
- Category B—if fit for service overseas in Army Medical Corps, Forestry Battalion, etc.
- Category C—if fit for service in Canada only.
- Category E—if unfit for military service of any nature.

If not placed in category A, the applicant will know that he is not liable for immediate service, but will go to the Post Office and send in a claim for exemption with his Medical Certificate attached, when he will receive in due course a certificate of exemption until those in his medical category are summoned for service.

Where a man, who is placed in category A, feels that exemption should be allowed, an application form can be secured from the postmaster. This form, when filled in, will be forwarded by the postmaster to the registrar of the district, and the applicant will be informed by mail as to the time and place for the consideration of his application by the Exemption Board.

**NEW YORK SCHOOL CHILDREN IN RIOTS**

New York, Oct. 25.—Rioting by school children in protest against the Gary system of instruction in some of the city schools became so serious this afternoon that reserves were summoned from three police stations and fifty branch detective bureaus.

Ten boys and one man were arrested during the forenoon, in which the children, armed with stones and clubs and bottles, battled with the police and smashed windows at a number of schools in Harlem and the Bronx. The man arrested, the police say, denounced the Gary system and urged the boys on to further disturbances.

This is the third day of demonstrations against the Gary system which, approved by Mayor Mitchel, is opposed in the local political campaign by John F. Hylan, the Democratic candidate for Mayor.

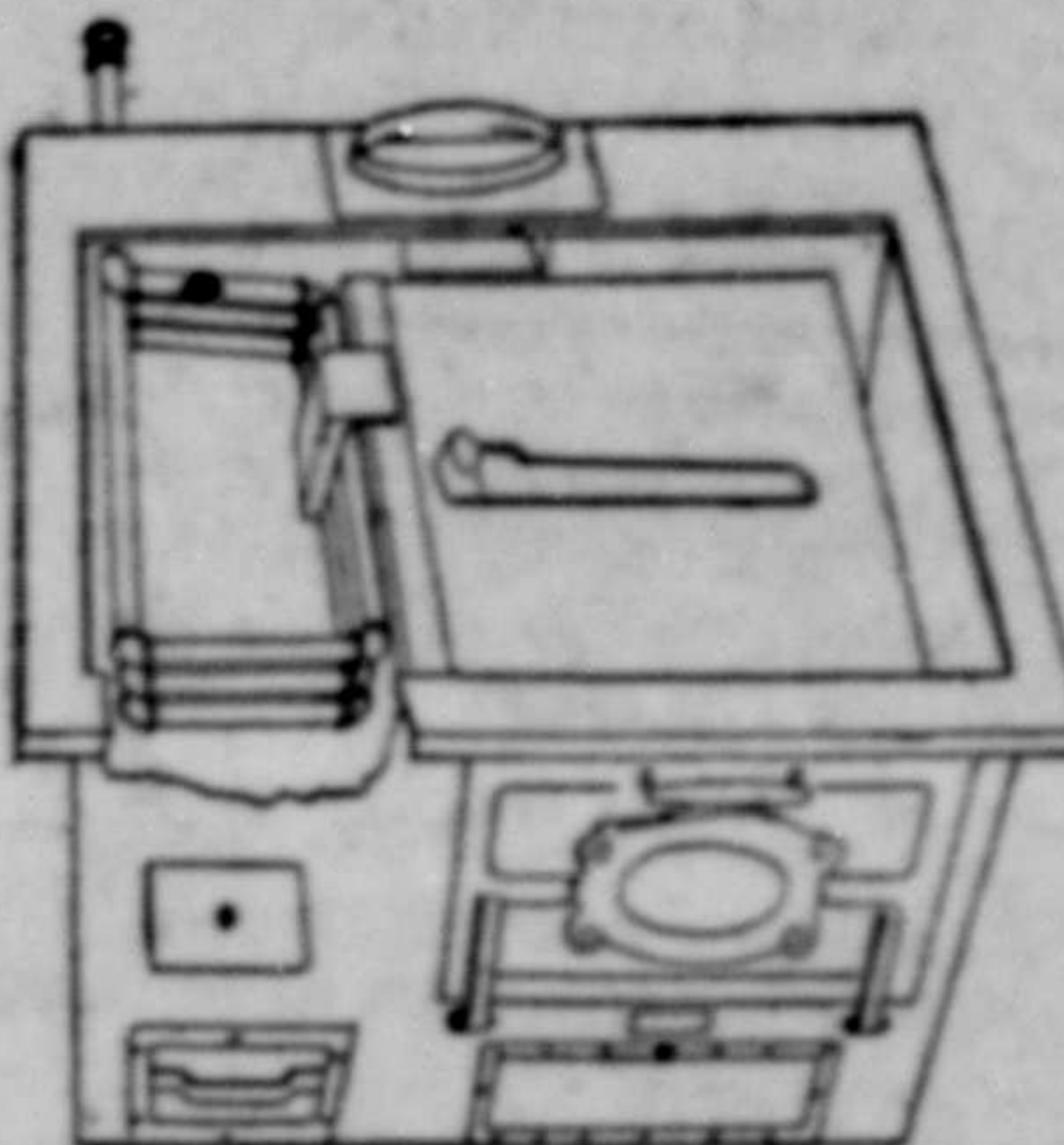
