SLIDE AT KWINITSA BLOCKS THE RAILROAD

ORGANIZED LABOR ENDORSES SIR WILFRID LAURIER'S DEMOCRATIC STAND

ORGANIZED LABOR ENDORSES LAURIER

Resolution Passed Unanimously Endorsing Sir Wilfrid on Democratic Methods.

A convention was held in the Carpenters' Hall last evening of all union men in the city. The matter up for decision was the course of political action to be pursued in view of the forthcoming Dominion election. The Legislative Committee of the Trades and Labor Council brought in the following resolution, which, after some considerable discussion, was unanimously adopted.

Whereas, the Dominion election is being fought on a war policy basis, and whereas the war policy of the present Government or the proposed Union Government is not acceptable to the working class, due to the sacrifices we are asked to undergo, through the institution of military autocracy, combined with industrial proffering, and whereas the war policy as perfected by Sir Wilfrid Laurier in his speech before the House of Parliament, in opposition to the Military Service Act, and in support of the referendum principle, rang true to the spirit of Democracy and freedom.

And whereas the opponents of the referendum principle and like-wise democracy and freedom are seeking election through the formation of a Union Government based on autocratic military seritude.

Therefore be it resolved that this convention of workers assembled reaffirm our allegiance to and in support of the principles of organized labor and democracy and endorse the stand taken by Sir Wilfrid Laurier on the issues of conscription and future war policy, and further, that we elect a campaign committee and select a standard bearer, but delay for no standard days the prosecution of the campaign, awaiting the arrival of Sir Wilfrid's manifesto, and if the manifesto is sufficiently democratic to conform with the principles of organized labor and if it embodies the previous attitude of Sir Wilfrid on conscription and the prosecution of the war, that we proclaim ourselves as his supporters in the forthcoming election.

COUNCIL OF DELEGATES TO DEFEND PETROGRAD

Want Supreme Power in Russia and Have no Use for Kerensky—Suggest Armistice.

Petrograd, Oct. 30.—The Petrograd Council of Soldiers' and Workmen's Delegates on Monday adopted a resolution proposed by Leon Trotsky, President of its Executive Committee, and a leading Maximalist, declaring the salvation of the country lies in the conclusion of peace as quickly as possible.

The resolution contains declarations accusing Premier Kerensky of a desire to deliver Petrograd into the hands of the Germans and their imperialist allies, and also of openly favoring the German Emperor. The resolution demands that all power pass into the hands of the Councils of Soldiers and Workmen, and instructs the Executive Committee to propose an armistice to all the nations. So long as peace is not concluded, however, continues the resolution, the committee must defend Petrograd, and restore the army to the status of a combative force.

In consequence of this resolution the Petrograd Council of Soldiers' and Workmen's Delegates has decided to form a Revolutionary General Staff for the defence of Petrograd.

PLEASANT DANCE BY ST. ANDREW'S LADIES

Last evening the large St. Andrew's Hall was thronged at the Halloween dance given by the Ladies Auxiliary of the St. Andrew's Society. There was a large attendance, nearly a hundred couples being present and a very pleasant time was spent. Refreshments were served in the course of the evening, their daintiness appealing greatly. The music was provided by the Westholme Orchestra, and dainty feet kept time to the rhythmic strains until long after midnight. Everyone present had a thoroughly enjoyable time.

SLIDE AT KWINITSA

Owing to a slide having occurred near to Kwinitsa, some forty-six miles up the Skeena, the railroad is blocked and the wires are all down. As a result, the train scheduled to leave for the east this morning at 11:30 has had to be put back for twenty-four hours. A special train carrying ten cars of fish for the eastern market was despatched this morning, and it has had to return. More important still, the telegraph wires are also down, thus cutting off Prince Rupert from outside communication. On this account, we have no alternative but to go to press without our usual telegraphic dispatches.

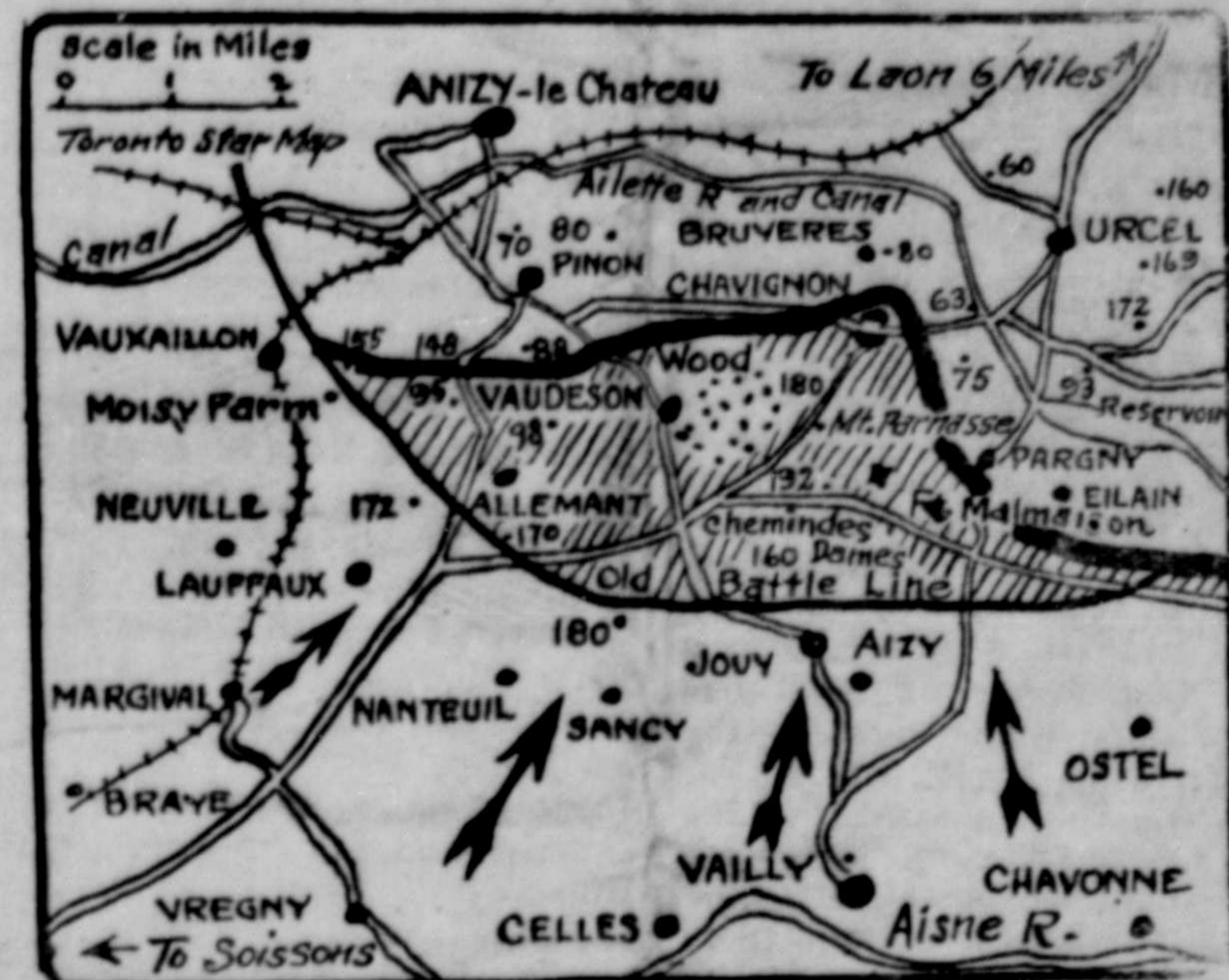

In the Letter Box

Dear Editor,—In the Vancouver World of October 24th appears a preliminary report of the findings of the Fisheries Committee composed of Messrs. Evans, Thompson and James, who visited this district a short time ago.

There is hardly anything in the report that the Department could not have learned without having gone to the expense of sending a commission out here. In fact, so far as exporting fresh salmon goes, it is not conceivable that any Government would attempt to prevent fishermen from selling the product of his labor in the highest market. The American cannery men have no protection, such as boat ratings, exclusive seining territory, etc., and if they can pay more than our packers for salmon it must be because they are better business men and the Government should not be asked to legislate to assist incompetence. You don't hear the American packers putting up any kick because our packers come over there and buy salmon.

The recommendation that the Commission has made, advising the licensing of fresh fish buyers is one that we want to watch, as it is the thin edge of the wedge, and if allowed to go through will mean that in a few years we will have a combine of fresh fish buyers with the Government refusing to license any more.

This report should be noted for its omissions, as it touches on nothing that is of importance to the north, therefore it is time that we were formulating plans to obtain what we want. An election is near at hand, so strike while the iron is hot. If we go after it seriously we can break up this cannery combine as the people all over Canada are with us. To my mind the bacon trust has not got much on the cannery trust and it is time that the food controller did a little investigating in that direction. If the fishermen and others interested agree with me, let's get together and start something.

GERMAN SOLDIERS MUTINY AT COLOGNE

London, Oct. 30.—Two thousand German infantrymen at Cologne mutinied when ordered to the Flanders front last week and destroyed their rifles and equipment, according to a dispatch from Amsterdam to The London Daily Express. A general who tried to calm them was stoned. The mutineers were arrested and 26 of the ring-leaders were court-martialed.

London, Oct. 30.—The Reuter correspondent at British Headquarters in Belgium in a dispatch received here says:—

"The Bavarians appear to be bearing the brunt of the fighting in Flanders and are openly complaining that the Prussians are sacrificing them."

PEACE AGAIN TOPIC IN TEUTONIC PRESS

Copenhagen, October 30.—The Austro-German press has eagerly seized the occasion of the statement regarding a basis of peace announced by the Russian Workmen's and Soldiers' Deputies to reopen the discussion of peace, which they had declared closed after the reply to the Pope. In this the newspapers follow the example of their respective governments, which von Reventlow sarcastically declared "rival Poles" in the number of their absolutely last farewells, to peace proposals, and which "miss no opportunity to attempt to open pour-parlers in the hope of getting out of the war."

Vorwaerts says the points in the Russian statement which are mentioned in the semi-official replies as unacceptable are probably the demands for plebiscites respecting Alsace-Lorraine and the Italian enclaves, Austria wittingly ignoring the fact that the German announced programme for "securities" as to Belgium is incompatible with the demand of the Workmen's and Soldiers' group for the full restoration of Belgium.

The convention of Austrian Socialists now in session has adopted a resolution providing that under no circumstances shall members of the party enter the government. Another resolution demands that Austria be converted into a federated state of free and independent nationality, each regulating its own affairs, agreements on matters of common interest to be reached through a federal council.

Ella Hall appears in the Bluebird photoplay "The Little Orphan," and pictures will also be shown of the scenes enacted during the great Russian revolution, when a great nation threw off the yoke of an ancient regime. These pictures of the doings of the revolutionists in Petrograd, at a time when that capital was sending out no news of what was happening, are of great interest. The events are so recent that they are still quite fresh in the memory of everyone.

FEWER ALDERMEN FOR PRINCE RUPERT

New Bylaw Introduced by Council Will Effect Great Saving in Citizen's Money.

A very important bylaw was introduced on Monday night, and in the discretion of the council should receive its final passage on Monday next. The object of the bylaw is to allow the electors to pass upon the question as to whether or not the number of Aldermen should be decreased to four. The Aldermen do not finally pass upon this question; they being only able to pass the bylaw in order that the electors may vote upon it.

At the meeting of the council one of the Aldermen stated his intention not to vote for this bylaw, unless the time of taking the vote was put off until the municipal elections in January next. The effect of this action would be to leave the council with eight Aldermen during the whole of next year, whereas if the vote is taken now as the bylaw proposes it should be taken, the change would take effect at the next election and only four Aldermen would be elected.

It is hardly necessary to state that a very considerable saving in cash will be made if this bylaw becomes law and we feel that we are not saying too much when we believe that the voters of this city will support the proposition, more particularly in strenuous times like those now existing.

We have the example of the British government concentrating all its enormous expenditure and efforts in the hands of a small number of men. We see in the United States that the expenditure of some seventeen billion dollars is placed in the hands of not more than six men, and we may have stated that in the city of Vancouver there are eight Aldermen, that city having wisely reduced its former board, which consisted of sixteen Aldermen, to eight.

We venture to hope that the council will pass this bylaw at as early a date as possible and give the electors a right to decide this question for themselves. After all, it is the electors' money that is to be spent and they should be (Continued on Page four.)

REACTION

A very apt comparison of the methods of the late Borden Government in Canada and those of Oom Paul Kruger, late of the Transvaal, particularly with regard to the Franchise Bill which was railroaded through Parliament during the last days of the dying session, is made in the latest number of the Canadian Liberal Monthly. Both in Canada and in the Transvaal in Kruger's time there was a large foreign-born population. Great Britain went to war with Kruger in 1899 for the enfranchisement of the foreign-born population. But Oom Paul's reactionary principles have been adopted by the late Borden Government in 1917. The Monthly says:—

Depriving naturalized citizens of the franchise for political purposes is not a new device. It has at least one striking precedent in our own time. The recollection of this incident may prove embarrassing to the political party in the Dominion which has attempted to prostitute patriotism to the exigencies of the hour and to retain power by suppressing the legitimate voice of the qualified electors of the Dominion, but it should be again brought to public attention, for the motives underlying both instances were exactly the same, viz., the desire to hold office against the wish of the people.

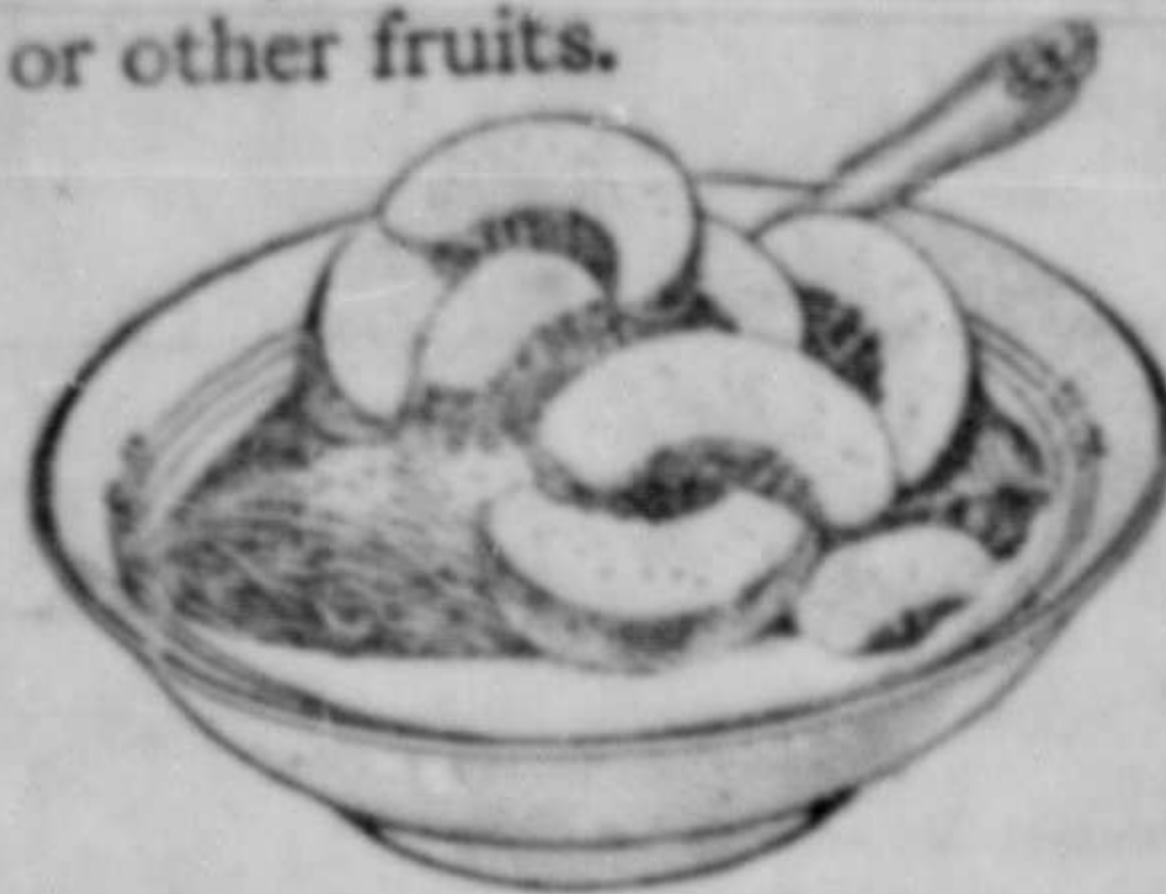
In the famous Pretoria Convention of 1881, which settled the dispute between Britain and the South African republic, President Kruger consented to grant the franchise to all bona fide residents of the republic who had resided within its limits for a period of one year. In 1885 this period was raised to five years, which was reasonable enough, but, nevertheless, a violation of the spirit of the compact of 1881. In 1890, however, Oom Paul went to the extreme. He decided that no Uitlander would be given the vote unless resident within the republic for a period of fourteen years. Britain went to war with Kruger because the Boer president in-

sisted upon disfranchising naturalized Britishers for fourteen years in South Africa. Kruger feared the votes of these new citizens of his republic, he realized that many of the injustices of his administration would be impossible if the vote were given these clear-thinking and loyal people of foreign extraction who had come to South Africa to carve out a home for themselves and take part in the government of the country as well as in its material growth and progress.

But in the midst of another great struggle we find the same attempt as characterized the conduct of the autocratic old Boer president being made in the free democracy of one of the foremost of the British dominions. We find Premier Borden assuming the role of Oom Paul. We see the reactionary councillors of the Boer cabinet of Pretoria in 1898 outdone by the burghers of narrow vision and prejudice in the Borden cabinet today. We see thousands of loyal citizens—Uitlanders, if you will,—disfranchised, not for a period of fourteen years but for one of fifteen years. We see some, many, in fact, who have worked loyally and faithfully for the cause of empire at this critical time branded as suspected characters unworthy to have a voice in the government of the day. We see an element in our citizenship analogous to the Uitlander element in South Africa in 1898. 1899 treated worse than Oom Paul treated his citizens of foreign birth. Yet this action on the part of the Borden administration is defended on the grounds of national necessity and safety—the same grounds as adopted by President Kruger in 1890 when he passed his reactionary measure stipulating a residence of fourteen years for newcomers.

We ask in what respect are we in Canada today better off than were the Uitlanders under Oom Paul? How can the administration reconcile its action in this regard with its professions of loyalty and democ-

cracy? Britain went to war twenty years ago with the South African republic over the very principle which Premier Borden and his cabinet prostitute to party ends today. This time there is no Jameson raid to obscure the issue, but there is an attempt, and a dangerous one, to becloud the vision of the people by cowardly and unjustifiable accusations and insinuations of latent disloyalty or worse against the disfranchised citizens of the Dominion and against the Liberal party, which has unmasked this political camouflage, and has undertaken to defend British principles, as did the British government in 1899 when it went to war with President Kruger—a war in which Canada participated but a war which, if we accept the present attitude of the Borden government, we now repudiate. For, if we are to acknowledge the justice of Premier Borden's disfranchisement of Canadian Uitlanders, we cannot condemn President Kruger's action in a similar position. In effect, Premier Borden and his administration range themselves on the Boer side, after twenty years, and virtually tell Canadians that both this country and Britain were wrong in 1899 and that British and Canadian blood shed then was spilled in an unjust cause.

EXEMPTION TRIBUNAL. Illustration of a tribunal with a judge and two men. Text: Exemption Boards have been chosen in such a way as to make them absolutely independent and removed from all influence. There are over 1,250 boards throughout the country, each composed of two men, one appointed by the county judge in the district concerned and one selected by a joint committee of Parliament. Being familiar with local conditions where they sit, the members are well-fitted to appreciate such reasons for exemption as are put before them by men called up. Exemption will be granted to those who can establish that it is in the national interest that they remain in civilian life. This is for the Exemption Board to decide after having received full information in each case. The grounds on which exemption may be claimed (which are similar to the grounds recognized in Great Britain and the United States) are as follows: (a) That it is expedient in the national interest that the man should instead of being employed in Military Service, be engaged in other work in which he is habitually engaged. (b) That it is expedient in the national interest that the man should instead of being employed in Military Service, be engaged in other work in which he wishes to be engaged and for which he has special qualifications. (c) That it is expedient in the national interest that, instead of being employed in Military Service, he should continue to be educated or trained for any work for which he is then being educated and trained. (d) That serious hardship would ensue, if the man were placed on active service, owing to his exceptional financial or business obligations or domestic position. (e) Ill health or infirmity. (f) That he conscientiously objects to the undertaking of combatant service and is prohibited from doing so by tenets and articles of faith, in effect on the sixth day of July, 1917, of any organized religious denomination existing and well recognized in Canada at such date, and to which he in good faith belongs. (g) That he should be exempt because disfranchised under the War Time Election Act. No Claim for Exemption should be put forward unless one or other of these grounds in fact exists, and no loyal citizen should assist in, or allow himself to be made a party to, any Claim for Exemption unless thoroughly satisfied that it is made in good faith. Exemption may be applied for by the men selected themselves or by their parents, near relatives or employers. Application for exemption must be made on printed forms, to be found at every post office, which are to be filled in and left with the postmaster if exemption is desired. The present council will find themselves in the position where they will be liable to be greatly misunderstood if this bylaw is turned down, owing to the fact that it is coming very near election time and the reduction to four aldermen might possibly effect the personal ambitions of some of the council.

The reduction in Aldermen will, we believe, benefit the administration of the city's business. It has long been apparent that business is done better with a little talk as possible and that long debates in Council do not tend to the rapid transaction of business nor to its satisfactory conduct. What is wanted in this city is good management and that can be done better in a small rather than a large board.

**U. S. SUB-TREASURY
BURSTING WITH GOLD**

New York, Oct. 29.—Never in the world's history has there been such a quantity of gold under one roof as is stored today in the United States sub-treasury in Wall street. A corridor in the basement, through which little iron-wheeled trucks used to roll, has been shut off by steel gates and the gold stacked up for all the world like bricks awaiting the mason's hand, until the front tier presses against the gates. In that one pile is 1,200 tons of pure gold, much of it representing British coins sent here in payment of war supplies, and melted down in the furnace of the Assay Office next door. Each brick is worth approximately 88,000, and the pile is valued at considerably more than 800,000,000. In a neighboring vault are 86,000,000 silver dollars, and overhead so many gold certificates that a miser, allowed to run them through his fingers, might easily die of ecstasy before he had finished with the yellow certificates contained in a single one of the many steel chambers.

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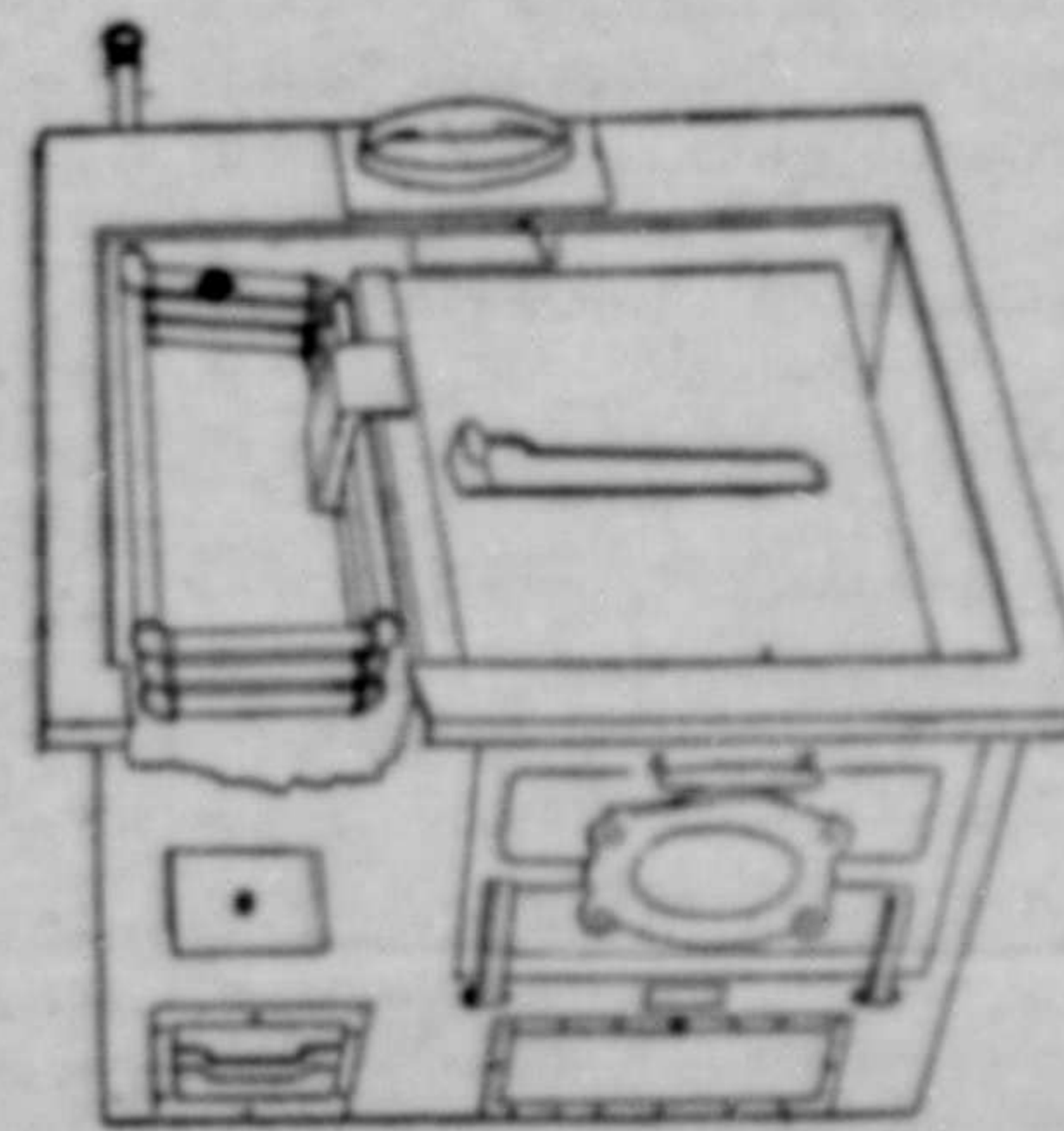
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
