## BRITISH GAIN ANOTHER MILE NEAR YPRES

### GERMANS CONTINUE ADVANCE THROUGH ITALY—CANADIANS HAVE HARD TASK

#### BRITISH ARTILLERY SAVED IN RETREAT FROM ISONZO

GERMANS STILL ADVANCING ON PLAIN OF NORTHERN ITALY  
—ITALIAN TROOPS FIGHTING HEROICALLY AND RE-  
TARDING ENEMY PROGRESS—CANADIANS CLEAR-  
ING HUNS FROM PASCHENDAELE

(Special to The Daily News.)  
London, Oct. 31.—(Delayed).  
The Italian troops are apparently  
unable to retard the progress of the  
German armies on the plain of  
Venetia, although they are still  
advancing today. More Italian  
villages have been taken. Most of  
the newspapers express satisfac-  
tion with the decision of Britain  
and France to send assistance to  
Italy. They urge that assistance  
must not be delayed.

**Batteries Saved.**  
The Italian soldiers are fighting  
heroically in the valleys of their  
own land this afternoon, accord-  
ing to correspondents at the front.  
The British batteries were saved  
in the precipitate retreat of the  
Italians from the Isonzo.

**The Turning Point.**  
Washington, Oct. 31.—(De-  
layed). The turning point in the  
great struggle between General  
Cadorna and the invading Teutons  
on the plains of Northern Italy  
will come within a week, official  
cables from Rome declared today.  
Germany is trying to force her  
way to peace through Italy. The  
great German drive has had the  
effect of ending the Italian Cab-  
inet crisis.

**Retreat Continued.**  
Rome, Oct. 31.—(Delayed). The  
Italian retreat continued yes-  
terday. Our cavalry is in contact  
with the vanguard of the advanc-  
ing enemy. The Italians destroyed  
the bridges over the Isonzo and  
fought rearguard actions by which  
they checked the Austro-German  
advance.

**Per Berlin Wireless.**  
Berlin, Oct. 31.—(Delayed).  
Edine, formerly the Grand Head-  
quarters of the Italian army, has  
been occupied by the Austro-  
German forces. The retirement  
of the defeated Italian army is  
being stemmed at a few crossings  
of rivers, which are greatly swol-  
len. The Austrians and Germans  
are pressing forward irresistibly  
in the northern plains towards  
the course of the Tagliamento  
river.

#### IN THE LETTER BOX

To the Editor, Daily News:—  
An article appeared in yesterday's  
edition elaborating upon a bylaw  
introduced at the council meeting  
on Monday night regarding the  
reduction of the number of alder-  
men. This is quite an important  
matter. Under the proposed new  
arrangement, the affairs of the  
city of Prince Rupert are to be  
placed for the space of one year  
in the hands of four aldermen and  
one mayor. Now this might be  
all right, provided the right men  
stand for election, but on the  
other hand, it may not, should the  
wrong men be elected. And speak-  
ing generally, the public are poor  
judges, but of course the electors  
can only vote upon the men who  
run as candidates.

Many, many years ago a wise  
man recorded his opinion that  
"in the multitude of counsellors  
there is wisdom." While no one  
in Prince Rupert would object to  
halving the cost of the council,  
still it may be regarded as a kind  
of insurance. Four men might  
get together and slip something  
over which could not be done were  
other four to be considered. At  
the same time four men of proven  
integrity and business ability  
could doubtless run the city more  
satisfactorily than a fortuitous  
combination of eight. It is up to  
the citizens to decide whether the  
premium of other four aldermen  
is too heavy to insure the in-  
tegrity and ability of the first  
four.

The objection which was taken  
to a plebiscite before the munic-  
ipal election is easy to meet. Let  
the vote be taken on election day.  
If this bylaw be approved by the  
citizens, the four aldermen poll-  
ing the heaviest votes will be  
elected. If the bylaw be not ap-  
proved, the next four may be also  
declared elected. There is usually  
no dearth of candidates.  
"CALLISTHENES."

The Editor:—With regard to  
your article favoring a reduction  
in the number of aldermen from  
eight to four, the chief reason ad-  
vanced seems to be economy. The  
estimated saving will be \$1,200  
per annum which is a considerable  
item. I ask you how long it would  
be until the four aldermen would  
seek legislation enabling them to  
draw \$100 per month for their  
services. This would amount to  
\$4,800 a year as against the pres-  
ent \$2,400. This is a reasonable  
way to look at the matter. The  
city would lose the services of  
four men, equal in all respects to  
the other four, at an extra cost of  
\$2,400, which would appear to be  
poor business. Looking at the  
question from the point of view  
of democracy, for which the Allies  
are fighting today, such a policy  
is absurd. To reduce the num-  
ber of representatives is a step  
backward.

You quote the policy of the  
British and United States Govern-

#### ONLY CLASS "A" MEN GO TO THE TRENCHES

Ottawa, Oct. 31.—Soldiers in  
training for active service, or fully  
trained and held in reserve, are  
most carefully inspected as to  
their physical condition. Only  
men in the category technically  
known as "A-1" may be with-  
drawn from the reserves to serve  
in the trenches in France, how-  
ever pressing may be the call from  
the front for reinforcements.  
Canadian troops in England are  
divided into fourteen categories,  
or stages of physical condition,  
as follows: A, five categories; B,  
three categories; C, three cat-  
egories; D, two categories, and E,  
one category. Thus, when the  
call comes for reinforcements at  
any time, the men in thirteen of  
the categories are not available.  
However pressing the call may be,  
all the men to go forward must be  
drawn from category "A-1."

#### CANADIANS TO GET HUNS OUT OF PASCHENDAELE

British Force Germans Back more  
Than a Mile on Ypres Front  
—French Attack Also  
Successful.

(Special to The Daily News.)  
London, Oct. 31.—(Delayed).  
The Germans have been driven  
back in places to a depth of more  
than two thousand yards in to-  
day's drive by the British troops  
on the Ypres front. The drive was  
entirely successful although se-  
vere fighting was experienced. The  
British artillery barrage wrought  
tremendous havoc with the Ger-  
man defences.

**On the Aisne.**  
Paris, Oct. 31.—A strong at-  
tack was made by the German  
forces on the Aisne front near  
Cerny last night. The attack was  
repulsed with heavy losses to the  
Germans. South of St. Quentin,  
French troops made a successful  
attack upon the German trenches,  
bringing back many prisoners.  
The attack took the Huns by sur-  
prise.

**The Crowning Task.**  
The crowning task of the war  
has been given to the Canadians.  
The men from the Dominion have  
been deputed to clear the enemy  
from the Paschendaele heights.  
Possession of this, the last of the  
high ground between the British  
lines at present and the flat plain  
of Flanders will permit the Allies  
to operate from a sector domi-  
nating the whole country. Last  
Friday's battle again proved the  
superiority of the Canadians over  
the Germans, when the overseas  
troops swept through the suppos-  
ed impregnable defences and took  
all their objectives.

**More Money.**  
London, Oct. 31.—The Hon. A.  
Bonar Law, Chancellor of the Ex-  
chequer, has asked the House of  
Commons for a vote of £400,000,  
000, or two thousand million dol-  
lars. He declares that Great  
Britain will not lose the war for  
lack of finances. The daily ex-  
penditure of the war is now set at  
£6,414,000.

#### ROUMANIA IN GREAT DANGER OF STARVATION

Death Rate Among Children is  
Appalling—Germans on the  
Offensive at Jauzerne on  
the Russian Front.

(Special to The Daily News.)  
Jassy, Oct. 31.—(Delayed). The  
whole population of Roumania  
not yet under the domination of  
the German forces, is in great  
danger of starvation and destitu-  
tion, unless urgent steps are taken  
to relieve the situation with re-  
gard to food and clothing. The  
death rate among the Roumanian  
children due to mal-nutrition is  
appalling.

**Russians Retire.**  
Petrograd, Oct. 31.—The Teu-  
tonic troops in the Juanzerne sec-  
tor of Russia started a sudden at-  
tack yesterday afternoon and  
forced the retirement of the Rus-  
sian forces.

**No Separate Peace.**  
In a speech here today, M. Ter-  
estchenko, the Russian Foreign  
Minister, declared that notwith-  
standing the position of the Rus-  
sian armies in the field, the con-  
clusion of a separate peace with  
the Germans and their allies was  
impossible for the Russian peo-  
ple. Russia will yet reform her  
armies and will again sweep the  
Germans over the border into  
their own place.

**STEWARDSHIP — NOT OWNERSHIP!**

That Public opinion in Canada is agitated by the disclosures in relation to war profiteering is not to be wondered at, having regard to the times in which we live and to all the issues involved. The refusal of the public to look at profiteering from the point of view of Sir Joseph Flavelle brings into sharp conflict opposing standards of conduct which are wholly irreconcilable. As Sir Joseph Flavelle is a public man who has set a high standard of conduct for others, it is not unreasonable that his individual standpoint should be critically examined in the light of the awakened conscience of the world. He represents the spirit of modern commercialism, which is in a transition stage, and which is out of harmony with the spirit of these war times. That he is able to square his actions with his own sense of what is right and just and honorable does not debar the public from joining issue with him in a matter that so profoundly affects the moral outlook of this country in days when conflicting ideals are tested in the fiery crucible of military strife.

The points in dispute between Sir Joseph Flavelle and the public relate primarily to the facts of the case as brought out in the investigation before the Cold-Storage Commission. It is contended by the President of the William Davies Company that the profits were made in open competition. This is the turning point in the case. Was the bacon sold in open competition? The facts brought out in evidence show that the purchasing agents for the British Government were William Denny & Company, and that through their relations with these agents the Davies Company gradually acquired privileges which were denied to other firms anxious to do business with the War Office. It is seriously contended by Sir Joseph Flavelle that these exceptional advantages over all their competitors, which the William Davies Company enjoyed in their dealings with the British

War Office through the purchasing agents, can by any stretch of imagination be regarded as open competition?

Sir Joseph Flavelle, in his dealings with munitions contractors has fearlessly and resolutely set his face against the munitions profiteer, claiming, and rightly so, that the abnormal profits that were made before he took over control, and which were pocketed by a few individuals, should, in the peculiar circumstances of these tragic days, be eliminated in the interest of the British people, who with such splendid fortitude are bearing the burdens of an unparalleled war. It was given to Sir Joseph Flavelle to interpret the business relations between his own firm and the British War Office in the spirit in which he interpreted the relations between the munitions contractors and the Imperial Munitions Board at Ottawa, representing the British Government. In both cases open competition was eliminated. But while this was of advantage to the British nation in the case of munitions, the advantage went to the William Davies Company in the case of bacon exports. The failure of Sir Joseph Flavelle to apply to his own firm the higher ethics of war contracts which he imposed upon munitions manufacturers is not lessened in gravity by his inability, in his own case, to distinguish between the commercial traditions of pre-war days and the moral obligations of disinterested patriotism at a time when men are cheerfully surrendering their lives in the outer defences of civilization.

Stewardship, not ownership! This is the insistent call of War to the men of trade and commerce and Big Interests as the portals of a new era open before the gaze of a suffering and a reborn world. Ten years ago the Bishop of London stood before the "bulls" and "bears" and bankers of New York at Trinity Church, Wall Street. "To you all," was his ringing challenge to the New World—"to you all, whether you be financial king or pauper, I send out this message: 'Give an account of your stewardship!' Stewardship, not ownership! This is the keynote William Davies Company enjoyed in their dealings with the British



**REAL FOOD CONTROL IN GREAT BRITAIN**

London, Oct. 30.—Right Hon. G. N. Barnes, member of the British war cabinet, has issued a statement by the food ministry on steps taken to meet the food shortage and to limit the profits on food. He points out all the principal foodstuffs are now under control, namely, bread, flour, meat, potatoes, sugar, milk, cheese, bacon, jam, oatmeal, peas, beans, chocolate and feeding stuffs for livestock. Regarding profits and prices which have been or are being fixed, he mentions every stage of production and distribution of controlled commodities from the stockyard or barnyard to the shop counter.

Mr. Barnes says the speculative middleman has been eliminated, and the charges that may be made by the necessary middlemen are being defined and regulated by fixing prices or profits.

### AUSTRIAN FLEET GOES TO FIUME FOR SAFETY

As a Result of the Activity of the Italian Airmen, Austrian Fleet Seeks Greater Safety.

London—A point of special interest in connection with the Italian navy is the recent means taken for chasing and destroying submarines. The Italians are now using motor boats made by the Fiat Company, which each carry 10 men and have a gun at each end. They are small and light, and consequently their speed is very great. They have already been found most effective in chasing submarines, which can be located with the usual assistance of aeroplanes, and in destroying them when located. This particular method of dealing with submarines is possible in the waters of the Adriatic, but would scarcely be possible in the rougher waters of the Channel or the North Sea.

It is well that students of the war in this country should realize that Italy is making her contribution to the general cause of the Allies not merely with her magnificent land forces, which within the last few weeks have done such excellent work, but also by means of her navy, which co-operates most completely and effectively with the land forces, and which also is called upon to perform the even more difficult task of staving and waiting.

A recent message from the Italian front tells us that as a result of the continual and successful activity of the Italian airmen the Austrian fleet, which has remained so long inactive in the harbor of Pola, is coming out! But it must not be supposed that it is coming out to fight! It is merely being transferred from Pola to the even more sheltered and more distant harbor of Fiume where it will be safer for the time being from the Italian "danger that lieth by night." There could scarcely be any more obvious testimony of the effective work of the Italian Navy and the Italian Air Service.



## EXEMPTION TRIBUNALS.

Exemption Boards have been chosen in such a way as to make them absolutely independent and removed from all influence. There are over 1,250 boards throughout the country, each composed of two men, one appointed by the county judge in the district concerned and one selected by a joint committee of Parliament. Being familiar with local conditions where they sit, the members are well-fitted to appreciate such reasons for exemption as are put before them by men called up.

Exemption will be granted to those who can establish that it is in the national interest that they remain in civilian life. This is for the Exemption Board to decide after having received full information in each case.

The grounds on which exemption may be claimed (which are similar to the grounds recognized in Great Britain and the United States) are as follows:—

- (a) That it is expedient in the national interest that the man should instead of being employed in Military Service, be engaged in other work in which he is habitually engaged.
- (b) That it is expedient in the national interest that the man should instead of being employed in Military Service, be engaged in other work in which he wishes to be engaged and for which he has special qualifications.
- (c) That it is expedient in the national interest that, instead of being employed in Military Service, he should continue to be educated or trained for any work for which he is then being educated and trained.
- (d) That serious hardship would ensue, if the man were placed on active service, owing to his exceptional financial or business obligations or domestic position.
- (e) Ill health or infirmity.
- (f) That he conscientiously objects to the undertaking of combatant service and is prohibited from doing so by tenets and articles of faith, in effect on the sixth day of July, 1917, of any organized religious denomination existing and well recognized in Canada at such date, and to which he in good faith belongs.
- (g) That he should be exempt because disfranchised under the War Time Election Act.

No Claim for Exemption should be put forward unless one or other of these grounds in fact exists, and no loyal citizen should assist in, or allow himself to be made a party to, any Claim for Exemption unless thoroughly satisfied that it is made in good faith.

Exemption may be applied for by the men selected themselves or by their parents, near relatives or employers. Application for exemption must be made on printed forms to be found at every post office, which are to be filled in and left with the postmaster if exemption is desired. The postmaster will forward the form to a Registrar, who will send it to the appropriate Exemption Board. In due time, then, the Applicant will get notice as to when he must present his case before the Board.

 ments concentrating their expenditure. The lands of a few men. This has been the policy of monopolies and big corporations, which never have studied the interests of the people, nor is it likely that the Government's experiment will work out any different as the few men chosen are successful monopolists. We have the fruits of the Imperial Munitions Board as an example, also the Bowser regime in B. C., and the Manitoba Cabinet, etc., to refer to when we are thinking of taking steps in concentrating power in few hands.

The reason why the one alderman opposed the submission of this bylaw until the January election was to save expense and inconvenience to the electors, as well as to obtain a better representation of the property holders at the polls. The insinuation that the aspirations and monetary side of the question would influence some of the Aldermen can be well left out of the question as well as the motives of the supporters of the bylaw.

If the electors approve of the bylaw, it would be a mandate to the council of 1918 to reduce the salaries of the mayor and councillors sufficient to meet the amount involved, viz., \$1,200. This, I consider, would be better for the city than reducing the number of representatives. I am opposed to this bylaw from my experience of cliques being formed in council as now constituted, which would be accentuated under this change. Regarding the expediting of business in our council, surely the editor must be poking fun at the council, as I believe that thirty minutes is the average length of the meetings.

### GERMANS TAKE NOTICE OF CANADIAN EVENTS

Ottawa, Oct. 31.—A newspaper found on a German prisoner who was taken by the Canadians on the western front recently shows how close a watch the Huns keep on Canadian affairs. The paper contained a news despatch, purporting to come from Ottawa, which told of the passing of the Military Service Act just two days after the Act was passed by Parliament here.

This little discovery is regarded here as proof of the importance Germany places upon the military benefit to the Allies which will flow from the adoption by Canada of the Military Service Act. Experience has proved that Germany is a close observer of enemy countries and that every sign of strengthening or weakening is noted with the keenest interest by the Huns.

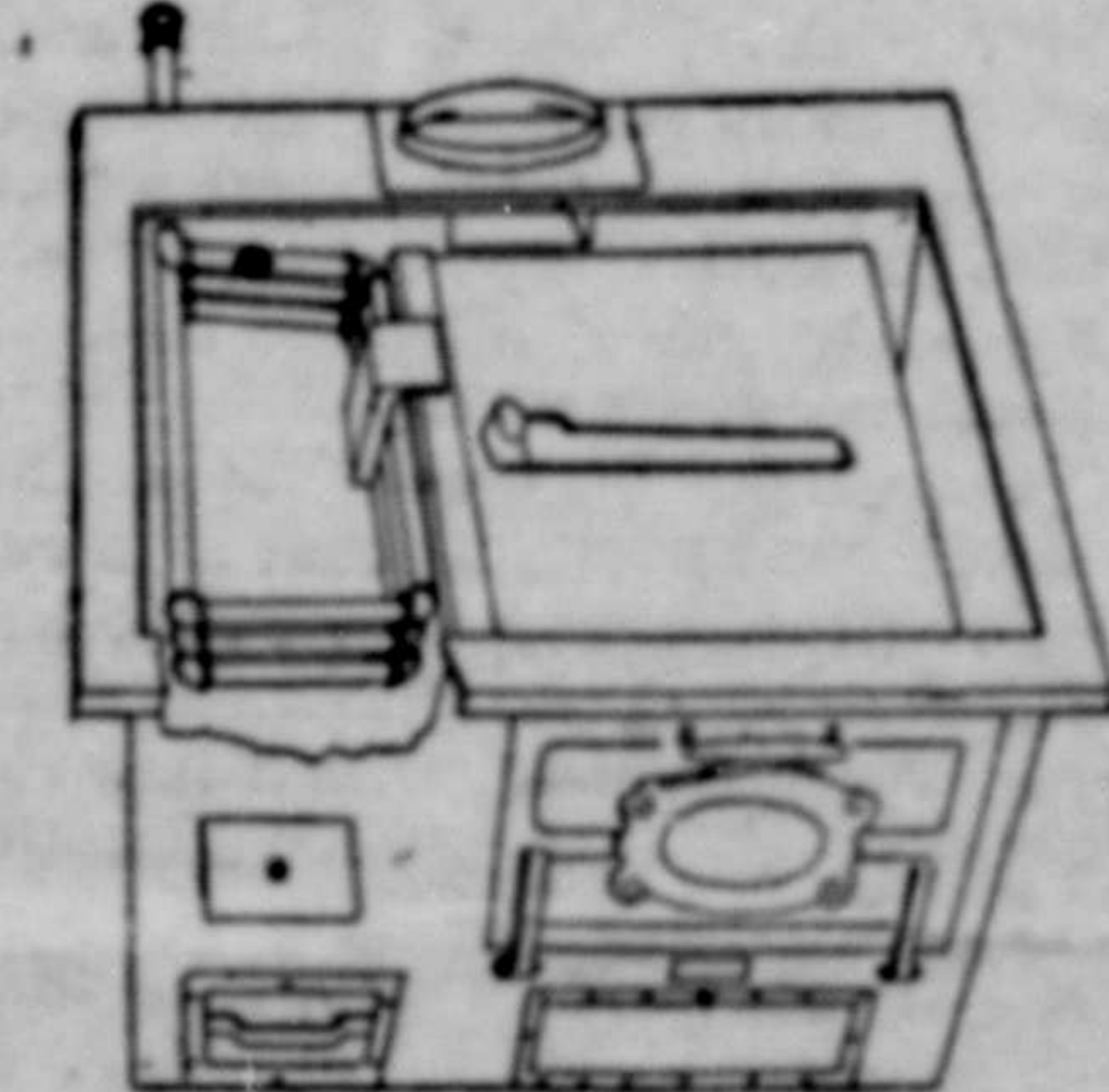
