BRITISH NAVAL VESSELS IN THE CATTEGAT

TAGLIAMENTO RIVER STOPS HUNS IN ITALY --- GERMANS RETIRING IN FRANCE

BRITISH NAVAL FORCES GET GERMAN RAIDER IN CATTEGAT

VESSEL OF THOUSAND TONS ARMED WITH SIX-INCH GUNS IS SUNK IN ENTRANCE TO BALTIC—TEN GERMAN PATROL VESSELS ALSO SUNK—ON WEST FRONT HUNS CLAIM AMERICAN PRISONERS

London, Nov. 5.—British naval forces operating in the Cattegat discovered an armed German raider, which they sunk. Ten armed German patrol craft were also sighted and sunk. Sixty-four of the crews were rescued. The raider was armed with six-inch guns. No British losses are reported.

Landed at Elnore.
Elnore, Nov. 5.—The wounded men from the sunken German raider have been landed here. The name of the raider was "Crocodile," of nearly a thousand tons. She carried a crew of one hundred men.

Sunk off Belgium.
London, Nov. 5.—The British naval patrols operating off the coast of Belgium have destroyed an electrically propelled high-speed boat, which attacked them yesterday.

Germans Retire on Aisne.
Paris, Nov. 5.—The enemy are retiring on the north bank of the Aisne, north of the Aisne. They are cutting all bridges and are wrecking the whole country side along the entire front. Since the 22d of October, we have taken 200 guns, 222 trench mortars, 720 machine guns. Between the 21st and 31st, twenty-three enemy aeroplanes have been brought down.

Russians Fraternize.
Petrograd, Nov. 5.—The Russian troops on the Vishnel sector commenced again yesterday to fraternize with the German troops.

Italian Front.
Rome, Nov. 5.—The enemy pressure was more noticeable yesterday on the left wing of our forces defending the line of the Tagliamento river. On several occasions the enemy attempted to reach the right bank of the river, but each time he was repulsed.

Per Berlin Wireless.
Berlin, Nov. 5.—The total number of prisoners taken on the Italian front totals nearly 200,000. There was no important fighting yesterday.

American Prisoners.
Amsterdam, Nov. 5.—Berlin says the German forces have taken some American prisoners on the western front on the Rheims-Mare Canal in France.

MORALE OF GERMANS REMAINS UNBROKEN

San Francisco, Nov. 3.—The German people are not starving and have everything they need, except butter fats, Edward F. Tref, personal representative of Food Administrator Hoover, said here last night in reference to an investigation made by him recently in Europe.

"There is not going to be any revolution in Germany," he continued. "The German morale is unbroken."

He pointed out that Germany was the first country to put its people on a war food basis and the question of supplying the Allies with food was of vital importance in determining the length of the war.

FISH ARRIVALS

On Saturday the Albatross had arrived with 18,000 lbs. halibut; Tahoma, 1,000; Nellie, 4,000 lbs. Yesterday the Alameda brought in 4,000 lbs.; Saturn, 5,000. The Foster and the Kelly belonging to the Cold Storage Company had 14,000 lbs. each. The price realized was around 17 1/2 cents. Today the Tordenskjold had 10,000 lbs. halibut.

Most of these boats are capable of carrying thousands of pounds more fish, the light catches are a very good indication of the weather prevailing outside.

REV. DR. GRANT RECEIVES A CALL TO CHILLIWACK

At the services in the Presbyterian Church last evening the intimation was made by the Rev. Dr. Grant that he had received a call from Cook's Church, Chilliwack. Dr. Grant has not yet accepted this call, the matter being at present in the hands of the Presbytery.

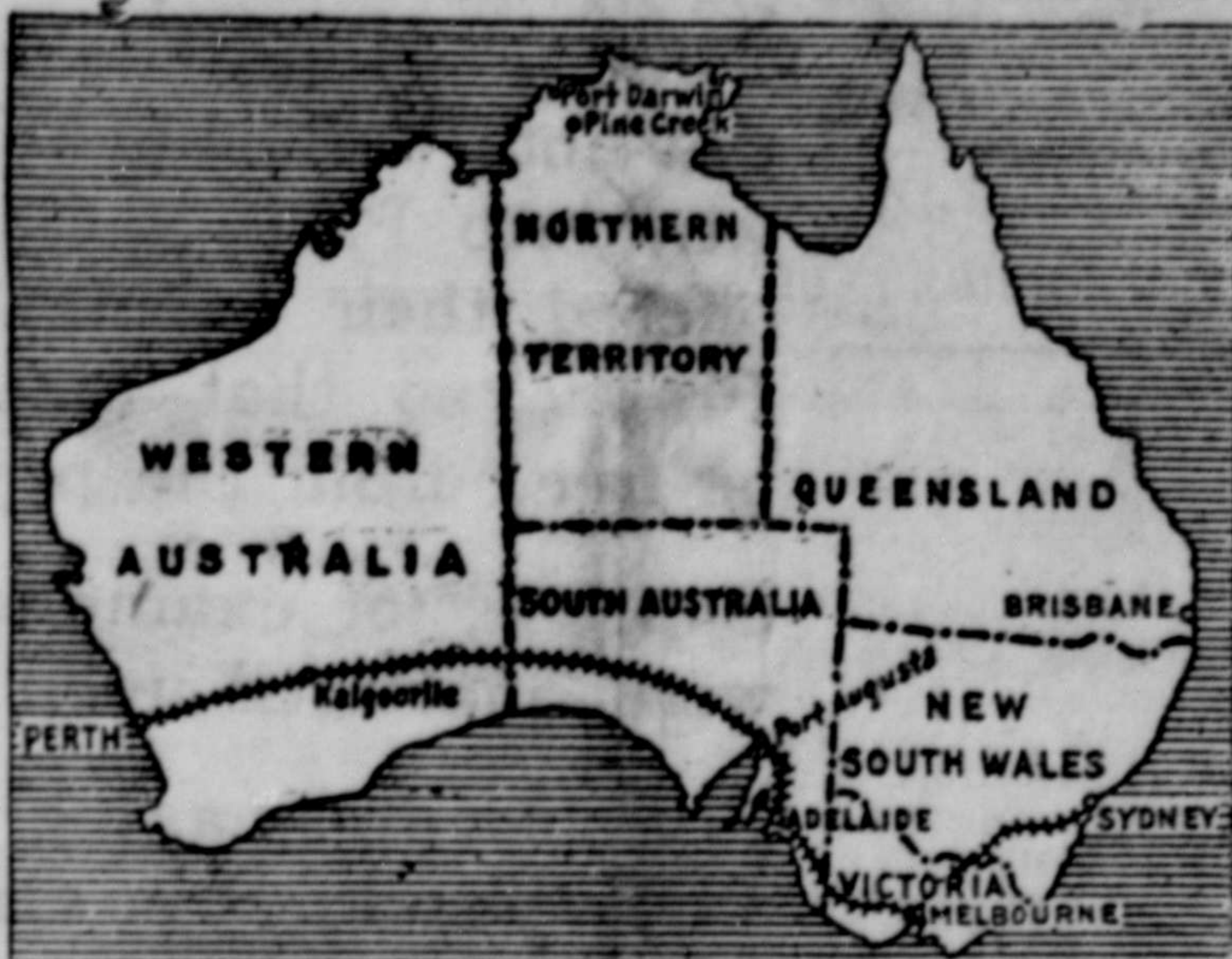

Baker, Ore., Nov. 3.—Fate Wilson, aged 25, a shepherd, arrested at Fossil, Ore., as a draft evader yesterday, did not know the United States was at war, or anything about the registration law, according to his story to Deputy United States Marshal Kitchener, who made the arrest.

Wilson said he had been with sheep in the hills twenty months, and had heard no news. He had saved \$1200, which he desires to invest in Liberty bonds. He told Kitchener he wanted to join the navy. He will be taken to Portland for examination by federal authorities.

SIR WILFRID ISSUES MANIFESTO TODAY

Ottawa, Nov. 3.—Sir Wilfrid Laurier will issue his manifesto on Monday morning. The Liberal leader will speak in Winnipeg on November 15, but will not visit other western points.

Winnipeg, Nov. 3.—The Free Press Ottawa correspondent says: "Sir Wilfrid Laurier contemplates visiting the west in about a fortnight's time and probably will speak at some of the most important points."

TO DIVIDE THE BLAME BUT KEEP THE JOBS

If the Borden Government Were Sincere it Would Not Dis-pense Tory Patronage.

Ottawa, Oct. 30.—Cynics who regard politics as a game pure and simple are agreed that it is a game which the Borden Government plays anything but purely and simply. So far from being contented with fair play the Borden Government goes into the general election with the cards stacked. They have rung in a cold deck in the shape of a provision by which they can apply fifteen thousand loose votes to the weak spots all over Canada—which is bad enough. But what is worse they hold certain cards out in the shape of a disfranchisement clause which deprives fifty thousand law-abiding citizens of their votes.

That their friends do not think they can win even with the stacked cards is amply provided by the wild scurry for safe Government jobs in which cabinet ministers and Conservative M. P's who consider their seats as good as lost, are taking part. That the Borden Government does not believe that union government will save them is proved by the pains they take to provide certain of their faithful but timid supporters with life jobs before union government begins to get its work in. If the Borden Government were really sincere about union government, it would not be dispensing Tory patronage while the union government negotiations were going on.

It looks as if union government were a scheme to coax certain weak-kneed, Vicar-of Bray-Liberals to help the Borden Government out of a hole, rather than a fifty-fifty plan by which Liberals would hereafter get half the offices. In other words Union Government is the Borden Government's plan to divide the blame with the Liberals, but keep all the jobs for the Tories. It reminds one of the Indian and the white man who had shot six crows and six ducks. When it came to sharing the bag the white man said to the Indian, "You take the crows and I'll take the ducks." A similar element of generosity appears to characterize the union government negotiations as conducted by the Borden Government.

So far the union government negotiations have drawn no big cards. Mr. C. C. Ballantyne is spoken of as a face card, but if he is he is a card with two faces, front and back. The last time his face was anyway noticeable it was turned against reciprocity. Mr. Hugh Guthrie—since cards are the metaphor—may be regarded as the joker. He will be whatever the hand demands. Premier Borden is having a hard time making a trump hand out of the discards and the two spots. The general opinion is that he can't do it—even with a cold deck and a campaign fund snatched from the prospective profits of the C. N. R. deal. When the Borden Government comes to cash in its chips at a general election it will find that a campaign fund is about as much use as a doughnut to resist a landslide of public opinion.

One observes that a group of Toronto looters—some of them hang-overs from the noble eighteen who knifed the Liberal party in the back in 1911, and some of them members of the Flavell group of pious pirates—are very keen on union government. This group is interested in about four hundred million dollars worth of munition and supply contracts, and naturally wants a union gov-

GERMANS JUBILANT AT ITALIAN RETIRAL

Shouts of Triumph from German Press—School Holiday Proclaimed.

Amsterdam, Nov. 2.—The battle on the Isonzo evoked shouts of triumph in the German and Austrian press, particularly the latter. According to a dispatch from Vienna the Fremdenblatt goes so far as to declare that Italy will go the same way as Roumania, Serbia and Russia, paying "a terrible price for the guilt of her unscrupulous treachery and rapacious statesmen."

The Neue Wrener Tageblatt talks of the "Sudden destruction of the Entente's last hope on European battlefields."

Karl and Willie Meet.

London, Nov. 3.—A school holiday has been proclaimed throughout Germany in celebration of the Austro-German victories against Italy, and the display of flags has been ordered, the Amsterdam correspondent of the Exchange Telegraph Company cables. Emperor William and Emperor Charles are expected to meet on the Isonzo front in a few days.

How Germany Deludes Austria.

Zurich, Nov. 3.—Austrian hopes of a "speedy and honorable peace" have been raised by the Austro-German successes on the Italian front, the president of the Reichsrat said in an address to the Deputies, as quoted in Vienna despatches. He admitted there had been great anxiety in regard to Trieste, which had now been removed.

The reports of the proceedings in Parliament adds that the German and Polish Deputies arose and cheered the Emperor and the army, implying that the Czechs did not join in the demonstration.

The safety of Trieste seems to be the chief cause of rejoicing in Austria. The Neue Freie Presse of Vienna says that ever since Italy declared war the monarchy has not ceased to be anxious for that city. It speculates as to whether British and French influence will prove strong enough to prevent the collapse of Italy's war policy, or whether the mass of the population, recognizing the seriousness of the situation, will become convinced peace is necessary.

A FAR, FAR BETTER THING

Now that the date of the election is fixed for December 17, the electorate have just six weeks in which to consider the political situation, before recording their opinions at the polls. Six years ago, a section of this community stood in the streets with bared heads and reverently (?) sang "God Save the King." The reason for this repetition of the words the prophet Samuel instructed the people of Israel to cry at the coronation of King Saul was on this occasion, because Sir Robert Borden had been returned to power at Ottawa with a parliamentary majority, and the wicked Grits, who wanted to "trade with the Yankees" had been ousted. Canada, which with the introduction of reciprocity, was alleged to be in danger of being annexed presumably by the United States, and lost to the Empire, by the return of the Conservative party was saved.

On that occasion six years ago, the issues of the day were so misrepresented to the electorate, that these issues were brought down to a matter of which flag shall fly in Canada. Vote for a Liberal and reciprocity and the Stars and Stripes, or vote for a Conservative and a high tariff and the Union Jack. That was what was finally put up to the people.

On the present occasion, the Conservative party has raised such a howl throughout the country by their mismanagement of the national affairs that as plain Conservatives they have their fears of winning the election again. In fact they know it to be impossible, as plain Conservatives. Hence the "win the war" cry. The Conservative party is that party which is out to win the war! A statement of this kind is one which leaves the inference that there are Canadians who do not want to win the war. Which is absurd. Arrogating to itself and denying it to others, the virtue of wishing to win the war is quite in keeping with the statement of that Ontario Conservative who had the hardihood to state that it

was the Conservatives who were doing the most of the fighting, too.

Knowing that the name Conservative was not going to get them anywhere, that has been changed to Borden Unionist. Any other kind of Unionist would not, shall not do. It must be Borden Unionist. This coupled with the fact that the Conservative Association are all Borden Unionists now, and no longer Conservative makes one wonder just what is the difference between a straight Conservative and a Borden Win-the-War Unionist. Apparently there is none. With the Conservative party machine out working for the Borden Unionist the difference is all the harder to distinguish.

It is hoped by these methods to disguise the same old party under a new name, so that the electorate will not recognize the Tory underneath.

The electors were fooled in 1911, but all the people can't be fooled all the time.

ernment with the Borden Government on top so that their graft will not be disturbed. They are in favor of union government or any other old government that will leave them with their feet in the trough. They are willing to yell win-the-war or anything else that will divert the public mind from their profiteering transactions. Their idea is that if they talk rapidly about patriotism the people will not notice them getting away with the money. Sir Joseph Flavelle had the same idea when he said "to hell with profits" and watered the Ottawa Canadian Club with his tears.

Sir Joseph, by the way, treats the Borden Government or any union government that the Borden Government may form with fine disdain. The appointment of a Food Controller has no effect on him, save to cause him to raise the price of bacon again. Bacon in Sir Joseph's home town of Toronto is now fifty-six cents a

SIR WILFRID LAURIER MAY RUN IN TORONTO

Ottawa, Nov. 2.—The capital may see a political battle royal with the two leaders as candidates—Sir Robert Borden and Sir Wilfrid Laurier. There is trouble in the Win-the-War ranks in Ottawa over the nomination of A. E. Frapp and Dr. Chabot, the members of the last House. It is claimed they were nominated and no attempt was made to invite Win-the-War Liberals. As a result there is an agitation on foot for Sir Robert to run as the English-speaking candidate for Ottawa as well as in a Nova Scotia seat. It is said now that if this is done by the Unionists the Laurier men will nominate Sir Wilfrid. So far no Liberal convention has been called. In 1908, when there was trouble in the Liberal ranks in Ottawa, Sir Wilfrid was the candidate.

pound, and the Food Controller says he can do nothing about it. The Food Controller is quite right. He can't do anything about it because Sir Joseph owns the Borden Government, and how can a Food Controller be more independent than the Government that appointed him? The answer is that he can't, for the simple reason that the part cannot be greater than the whole. Food Controller Hanna doesn't have to go to Euclid to feel that that is his unfortunate position.

Sir Joseph snaps his fingers at the Borden Government in other ways. For instance he refuses to resign his job as chairman of the Imperial Munitions Board, to which he was appointed on the recommendation of his friend and protégé, Sir Thomas White, backed by the O. K. of the Borden Government. On the Borden Government's recommendation, Sir Joseph could be removed just as expeditiously as he was appointed, but so far the Borden Government has failed to make the recommendation. The reason it has failed is because Sir Joseph won't let it until he is good and ready. Sir Joseph may resign, but it will be in his own good time and in his own way. He may resign before a general election—which will be too late to save the Government's bacon—but his resigning won't do the people of Canada much good. It won't give Canada back the money he has leeched during the last three years. The man is bloated with it. It shows red through his face. The five hundred thousand women who are given the vote—most of them poor women—may well ask why Sir Joseph, the Borden Government's friend, looks so ruddy. He appears to be full of blood. He is—your blood, my blood, our blood, the blood of the soldiers at the front, whose hard-earned dollar he has made worth forty cents by his infamous manipulation of prices. The women folk of five hundred thousand soldiers, who have handed every dollar of separation allowance and patriotic fund over to Sir Joseph and his tribe for the necessities of life, are free to wonder if the vote the Borden Government gives them is any compensation for the way the Borden Government's friends, including Sir Joseph, have fleeced them. They asked for bread and Premier Borden gave them a scorpion—that is to say they asked for cheaper food and he gave them votes. After all a vote is a scorpion—the women can sting with it. They certainly will not vote for Borden and fifty-six cent bacon.—H. F. Gadsby.

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Directions for Employers

Who Purpose Claiming Exemption for Class One Men in Their Employ

THE following course is recommended for employers who have in their employ any number of men—bachelors and widowers without children (not otherwise excepted) who were 20 years old on the 13th October, 1917, and whose 34th birthday did not occur before Jan. 1st, 1917, and who propose claiming exemption for any of these men, to continue in work which is deemed to be in the National interest:

First, it will simplify matters for you and for the exemption tribunals if you instruct Class One men in your employ to go up for medical examination at the nearest Medical Board Centre.

Only Class One men, who upon medical examination are placed in Category A are liable for immediate service under the Act. Class One men placed in Categories B, C or E satisfy immediate requirements if they attach their medical report to their claim for exemption.

Employer's Statement and Schedule

Second, prepare a full statement of the total number of your employees grouping them according to their respective occupations and qualifications and stating the number in each group. Indicate the possibility or otherwise of replacing the labour of Class One men with the labour of those unavailable for military service, or outside the statutory class called up; the extent to which the withdrawal of men in the statutory class would affect the business, the reason for considering that the carrying on of the business is in the National interest, and such other facts and circumstances as may appear to be relevant.

Append to this general statement and classification, a schedule of the names, ages and occupations of all men in Class One, indicating as to those who have been medically examined, the medical Category in which they have been placed, noting against each name whether or not you propose to claim exemption on behalf of the man.

Where exemption is claimed employer should state his opinion whether such exemption should be conditional on the man's continuing to follow his present occupation and whether it would suffice if exemption were granted for one, two or more months, as the case may be. A copy of both statement and schedule should be prepared for each man for whom the employer is applying for exemption.

Forms for Exemption

These forms may be obtained on request from any Post Master, who will transmit the forms when filled in, to the Registrar. Claims for exemption must be made not later than November 10th.

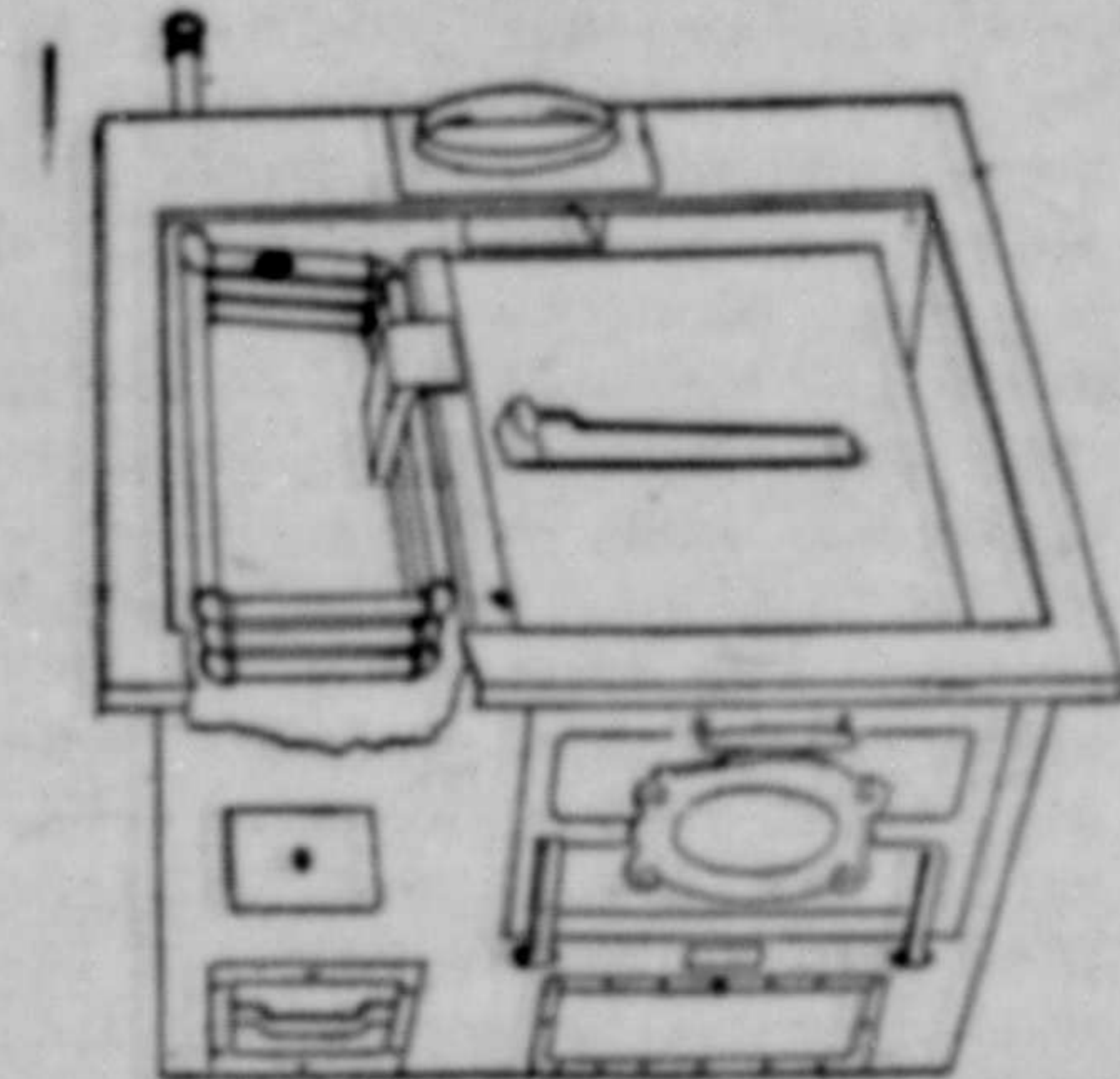
