BRITISH NOW OPEN THE WAY TO JERUSALEM

CITY OF GAZA IS CAPTURED FROM TURKS — ITALIANS TAKE UP ANOTHER LINE

ITALIANS TAKE NEW POSITIONS IN GOOD ORDER

British Capture City of Gaza in Palestine—Germans Fail to Counter Attack at Paschendaef.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Nov. 8.—The German forces have made no effort during the night to regain the ground captured yesterday on the Ypres front. The German morale is evidently very badly shaken. At the other points on the front, intermittent artillery operations are in progress.

Italian Front.

Rome, Nov. 8.—The Italian forces have withdrawn in good order from the Tagliamento river towards Livensea. The Tagliamento river is now running very low, rendering the defence of the western bank a matter of great difficulty. Yesterday and last night, our airships and aeroplanes repeatedly bombed the enemy troops at work in repairing the bridges over the Tagliamento and the movement of troops across the river. Four of the enemy machines have been downed.

French Front.

Paris, Nov. 8.—The German forces made a strong attack on the La Chauxe Wood on the right bank of the Meuse and around St. Quentin, also northwest of Rheims. The enemy attacks were successfully repulsed and very heavy losses were inflicted.

Par Berlin Wireless.

Berlin, Nov. 8.—The German troops in Flanders are now holding their line along the eastern edge of the Paschendaef Ridge. The Germans are continuing their pursuit of the Italians and have taken many prisoners.

In Palestine.

London, Nov. 8.—The British troops have captured the city of Gaza in Palestine. This victory opens up the way for an advance upon Jerusalem from both Gaza along the coast and from Beer-sheba.

Finland a Republic?

Petrograd, Nov. 8.—Finland may be made a republic. The Government is said to be willing to give wide powers to the new state, conformable to fundamental laws.

Kerensky's Job.

Negotiations between the General Staff in the Petrograd District and the Military Committee of the Council of Workmen's and Soldiers' Delegates, looking forward to the strengthening of the staff by the inclusion of democratic members, has been broken off. The situation is more complicated by Kerensky's action in suspending three Maximilist and two Conservative papers.

THE KAISER IS WARNED OF IMPENDING RUIN

(Special to The Daily News.)

Copenhagen, Nov. 8.—The loss of trade after the war is now greatly feared in Germany. The tremendous difficulty in re-establishing foreign markets after peace is declared is recognized plainly. The danger that German shipping may be barred from the ports of the present allies has caused seafaring to give place to genuine fear of impending economic disaster.

The Hamburg magnates are said to have warned the Kaiser Wilhelm of financial ruin.

COMMON SENSE TO GOVERN TRIBUNALS

Economic Necessities of the Dominion to be Kept in View.

Ottawa, Nov. 7.—All preparations have been completed for the opening of exemption boards tomorrow.

It is announced that the tribunals will proceed with their work on "broad principles." No particular occupation will be exempted. The men comprising the tribunals will view the economic necessities of the country and their relationship to winning the war. In this latter regard it may be said in the most general terms that the maintenance of the supply of food, with particular reference to fish, wheat and meat; of coal, steel and certain kinds of metal, and of timber of certain kinds, may be looked upon as of primary importance. The same is also true of certain manufactured articles, and of the operation of railways, telegraph, telephones, light and power and heat plants. The machinery of finance must also be kept in full efficient operation.

Protect War-Shattered Family.

A claim made on the ground of domestic position will be considered in its relation to any financial support the man has been unable to provide for his relatives or others who, as a result of withdrawal for military service would be in want. The instructions proceed: "Where from a given family one or more are already members of the Canadian Expeditionary force, every humane consideration would point to the propriety of a single remaining member being granted exemption on this ground. These reasons might also apply to more than one member of a family from which voluntary enlistment has already taken two or more members, especially if one or more had already been wounded or killed."

TAMMANY HALL IN NEW YORK IS TRIUMPHANT

(Special to The Daily News.)

New York, Nov. 8.—Judge Hylan has been given the largest plurality ever accorded in New York. The Socialist vote was surprisingly large. Tammany will now again control the administration of the city. The vote stands, Hylan, Democrat, 297,282; Mitchell, Fusion, 129,307; Hilquist, Socialist, 152,178; Bennet, Republican, 53,678.

G. T. P. WILL OPERATE BARGES FROM RUPERT

Vancouver, Nov. 6.—It is expected that about January 1 two barges will be operated by the G. T. P., said officials of that company today. One of these will probably be converted into a car barge while the other will be for the transportation of lumber to the extent of approximately 400,000 to 500,000 feet. The orders for spruce continue to pour into the north country, it was stated, and the barge that will handle this business will ply between the Queen Charlotte Islands and Rupert.

Large shipments of spruce continue to be taken by the Albert and these are being transported eastward as fast as possible, the orders being from the Government.

UNITED STATES HAS FAITH IN RUSSIA

As a Mark of Confidence U. S. Government Immediately Advances \$31,700,000.

Washington, Nov. 6.—Premier Kerensky's warning that Russia's allies will have to bear her burden of the conflict while the war-weary nation regains its strength, exhausted in the three years of fighting enemies without and within, has aroused new expressions of confidence in Russia's future and assurances of support from the United States government and the representatives of all the allies.

The Russian embassy made the premier's statement of Russia's position the occasion to reiterate that she has no intention of quitting the war, and the state department, in an authorized announcement declares that in no way could the premier's statement nor any of its official advices be construed to mean that Russia seeks a separate peace.

31 Millions to Russia.

As another mark of confidence in the Russian government, the treasury today authorized the immediate advance of \$31,700,000 out of the credits of \$325,000,000 already authorized.

This would bring the total actually paid the Russian government out of credits previously authorized to \$196,900,000.

Credits totalling \$325,000,000 of Russia have been authorized by the treasury. Including today's transaction there remains available for Russia here \$134,100,000. Apparently there is no intention to withdraw any of the unexpended credits. Indications are that the attitude of the American government toward Russia, so far as the extension of financial aid is concerned, is unchanged by Premier Kerensky's statement.

FEARED LOSS OF THREE METLAKATLA MEN

Eight days ago three Metlakatla men, named Peter Robertson, and his son Richard, and Stephen Ryan, set out from Metlakatla in the launch Deeban. Their intention was to seek for some other men, who had not returned then, but who have since got back.

The weather was very rough and stormy outside, but notwithstanding, the three men put out to search for their friends. They had intended going towards Stephens Island. They had arrived at Lucy Island at 2 p. m. last Wednesday and since that time, have not been heard from. They did not arrive at Stephens Island and the worst fears are entertained for their safety.

They only had food for one day. The launch Victor II, has been out for the last three days in the neighborhood of Dundas Island, but she has not returned yet either. Telegrams have been despatched both to Massett and to Ketchikan in case any of the boats making these places had picked them up, but so far no information has been received.

One peculiar thing in connection with this case is that when Richard Robertson, the son, was leaving Metlakatla, he dressed himself in all his best clothes and when saying goodbye to his mother, exclaimed "This is the last time you will see me." Evidently he had some premonition of danger.

Both the older men have large families.

Unanimous Endorsement of Sir Wilfrid and Mr. Stork by Executive.

At a meeting of the Prince Rupert Liberal executive held yesterday, a resolution was passed unanimously endorsing Sir Wilfrid Laurier, as leader of the Liberal party.

A resolution was also passed expressing unanimous confidence in Mr. Fred Stork, as the Liberal candidate.

On Monday evening, November 12, at the committee rooms on Second Avenue, a general meeting will be held, at which the candidate, Mr. Fred Stork, and others will speak. All supporters of Sir Wilfrid Laurier and the Liberal party are invited to attend.

NO INFORMATION YET OF MR. CECIL FLEWIN

On enquiries being made this morning, no further information could be got regarding the safety of Mr. Cecil Flewin, of Port Simpson, where he was postmaster and customs officer. He went out early on Sunday morning, and as he did not return search parties were sent out, who found the boat overturned at Cunningham Passage. Dragging operations have been undertaken near to where the boat was found, and search parties have been out continuously but so far no word of any kind has been received as to any success, and the worst is now feared.

WANT CONSCRIPTION OF ALL ALIEN LABOR

Winnipeg, Nov. 7.—Conscription of alien labor at a fair wage was discussed before the Kiwanis Club at their noon-day luncheon in the Fort Garry yesterday by K. Magee. Kiwanians passed a resolution favoring such conscription at a recent meeting.

The speaker stated that these aliens had been brought to Canada under different conditions than existed today. They had been treated well and had prospered. Now that their labor was urgently needed to perform many tasks formerly done by our boys now fighting at the front for \$1.40 per day, these same aliens were demanding anything up to \$15 per day.

In the speaker's opinion it was time the Dominion government took action to conscript this labor, for which they should pay them a fair wage only. Mr. Magee then proceeded to contrast the great difference between the alien labor treatment meted out in the central empires and in Great Britain.

UNION GOVERNMENT

Among the Liberal newspapers in British Columbia which have been strongly advocating for a Union Government, the Victoria Times has taken a first place. That already the doings of this alleged Union Government does not savor too sweetly in the nostrils of the Times is evidenced editorially in the last issue to reach here. Commenting upon the statement of Premier Brewster which was recently published, in which he states his position with regard to the coming election, and upon the other prominent Liberals who have joined the Union Government, the Times says:

It is very hard for these men to break with the chieftain they honor so much and of whose distinguished record they are justly proud, but in justice to their consciences and their conceptions of the needs of the country in its gravest emergency they could not adopt any other course. Had they been political opportunists merely they would have hedged and set their sails for the air waves of public sentiment. Instead, they have played the better part. They have shown their willingness to put their country above partisanship; to make sacrifices for the sake of national unity.

The readiness of prominent Liberals to put country above partisanship and to give the Union Government a trial, however, imposes upon Sir Robert Borden and his colleagues the obligation of showing a similar disposition of political unity.

Being done in British Columbia, in this Province political manipulation is going on which represents anything but real unity. What sort of unity is denoted by an arrangement dictated by R. F. Green, under which eight Conservatives, four Liberals and one Independent are to be anointed of Ottawa? It was to this manoeuvring that Mr. Brewster alluded when he urged the Union Government to reflect the true spirit of unity in

the direction of its political interests in British Columbia and to divorce itself wholly from these associations which had brought the previous administration into disrepute here. If this is not done the Union Government as far as British Columbia is concerned will suffer in prestige and influence; and it will suffer at the polls in spite of all its advantages. Mr. Brewster's warning is timely and should be acted upon. Public opinion will not tolerate any topsided, cut-and-dried arrangement by a disguised political machine which outrages the spirit of that unity the country so urgently desires.

WASHINGTON, D. C., IS NOW IN THE DRY BELT

Washington, October 31.—The lid was clamped down tight on the National Capital tonight at the stroke of twelve, when the Sheppard law, passed by Congress last winter, went into effect. After tonight there will be no more flaunting of sparkling champagne, cocktails or highballs in the Capital. That goes into the dead past.

After more than 100 years of openness, Washington became at midnight a "dry" city, and whoever gets his "nip" after today does it in his own way. Washington will not be "bone dry," for the Sheppard law allows the entry of wet goods into the town. It may be done by import from neighborhood communities, accompanied by an affidavit that the liquor is not to be used for an illegal purpose, or it may have already been provided by provision that has given a supply to underground cellar.

SAYS PROFITS PUT BEFORE PATRIOTISM

Montreal, Nov. 5.—President J. C. Watters, of the Dominion Trades Congress, in an address tonight before the Montreal Trades and Labor Council, asserted that the union government's patriotism is to be measured in dollars and cents. According to his view it is difficult to find a real patriot outside of the ranks of labor. To a large proportion of the employers the war was a

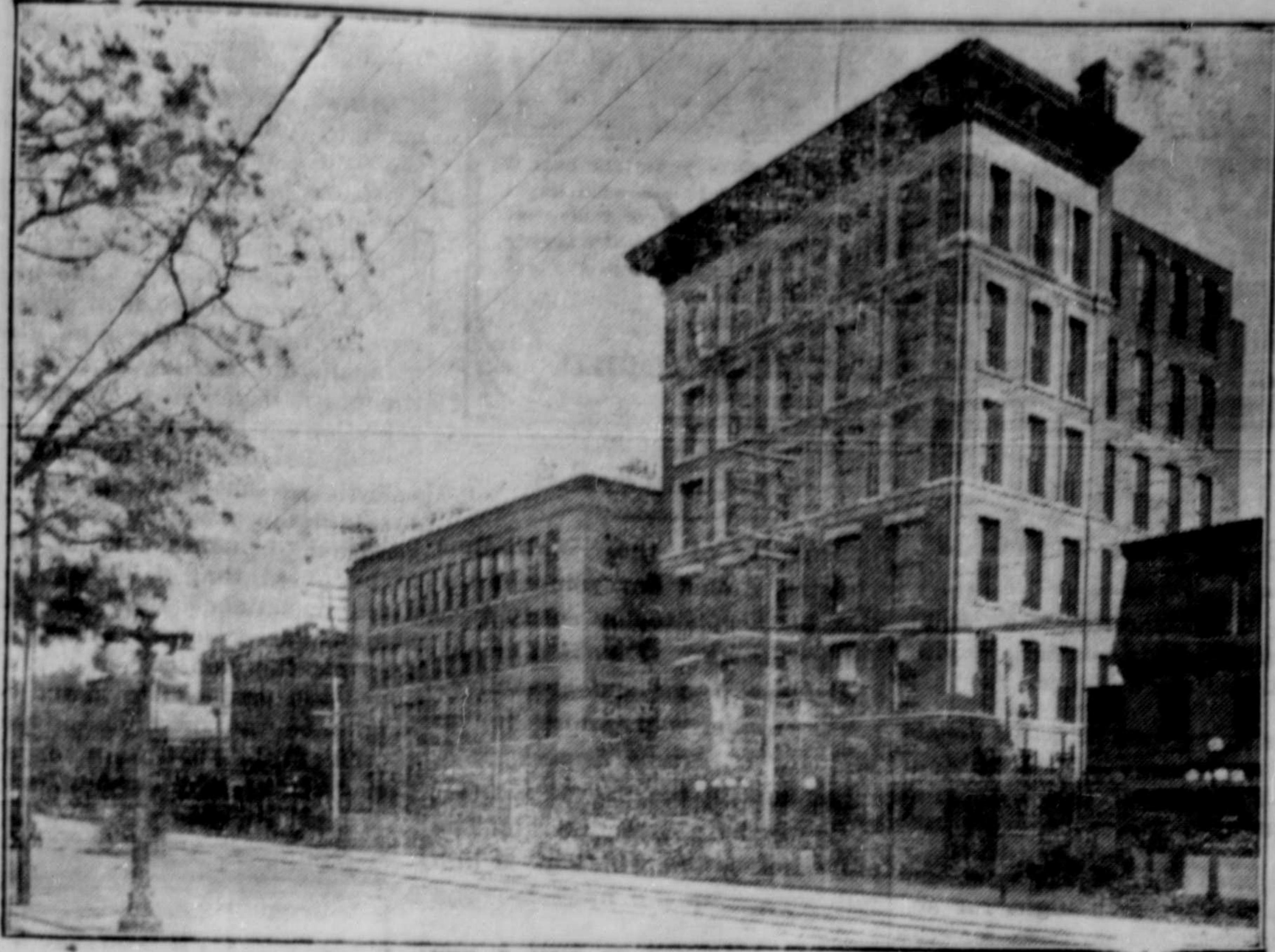

In this commonplace building on Wellington Street in Ottawa more money is "made" than anywhere else in Canada. Last year the American Bank Note Company printed \$300,000,000 worth of bonds and \$150,000,000 of paper money (Dominion notes and chartered bank notes). After the loan opens in November, there will probably not be a house in Canada without one or more of these bonds—plus the signatures that make them binding.

THE NEW CHANCELLOR LIKED THE BACK STAIRS

Amsterdam, November 6.—The "Old Fox" is the soubriquet by which Count von Hertling is known in Bavaria, according to the Berlin Tageblatt. This descriptive name, the newspapers say was given to the Count because of the "backstairs" methods that have characterized his five and a half years of Bavarian premiership.

Little is expected from Von Hertling in the direction of internal reform, the Tageblatt declared. He always opposed parliamentarism, although he acted like a parliamentary minister.

Von Hertling has not felt the spirit of the new era, the newspaper says, in conclusion, but "his philosophical spirit long recognized that tish war must end otherwise than by annexations and the war indemnities that characterized small wars in the past. He is permeated by the spirit that is to bring about a new order of things in regard to the mutual relations between the nations of the world."

CANADA

Will Class One Provide The One Hundred Thousand Men?

It will be greatly to the advantage of Canada if the entire quota of 100,000 men to be raised under the Military Service Act can be secured from the first class; that is, from the men between the ages of 20 and 34 who were unmarried or widowers without children on July 6th, 1917.

This is almost self-evident for the following reasons: it is admitted that, between the ages of 20 and 34, the average man is at the height of his physical strength and is most adaptable to the change of conditions from civilian life; the military Service of unmarried men and widowers without children would occasion less distress than that of most others, since they are largely without dependents. Also, it would entail less financial burden for Canada, through separation allowances, etc.

Authorities estimate that, after all proper examinations have been allowed, Canada should be able to produce from the first class 100,000 men fit for service, so the drain upon the man power of the country will not be severe.

Members of Class One will be well advised to present themselves for examination immediately to the Medical Board in their district. Upon examination as to their physical fitness, they will be placed in one of the following categories:

- Category A—if fit for service in overseas fighting units.
- Category B—if fit for service overseas in Army Medical Corps, Forestry Battalion, etc.
- Category C—if fit for service in Canada only.
- Category E—if unfit for military service of any nature.

If not placed in category A, the applicant will know that he is not liable for immediate service, but will go to the Post Office and send in a claim for exemption with his Medical Certificate attached, when he will receive in due course a certificate of exemption until those in his medical category are summoned for service.

Where a man, who is placed in category A, feels that exemption should be allowed, an application form can be secured from the postmaster. This form, when filled in, will be forwarded by the postmaster to the registrar of the district, and the applicant will be informed by mail as to the time and place for the consideration of his application by the Exemption Board.
