RUSSIANS PROPOSE AN IMMEDIATE PEACE

KERENSKY FLEES FROM PETROGRAD -- BRITISH SUCCESSFUL IN MESOPOTAMIA

KERENSKY OVERTHROWN BY ANOTHER UPHEAVAL IN RUSSIA

MAXIMALISTS OBTAIN CONTROL OF PETROGRAD WITHOUT BLOODSHED—ARREST OF KERENSKY ORDERED, WHO HAS FLED FROM THE CITY—IMMEDIATE PEACE IS NOW PROPOSED

(Special to The Daily News.)
London, Nov. 9.—Semi-official News Agency has announced that the Maximalists, with the assistance of the garrison in Petrograd have obtained control of the city, without bloodshed. A proclamation has been issued which declares that the new government has the intention of proposing an immediate peace with the Central Empires. The proclamation has been transmitted from the Russian Government's wireless stations stating that the garrison and the proletariat of Petrograd have deposed the Kerensky government.

The new powers in control of the situation have ordered the arrest of Kerensky, who has fled from the city and his present whereabouts are unknown. The Maximalist element comprises the most extreme class of the Russian revolutionary Socialists.

Economic Reorganization.
Petrograd, Nov. 9.—Russia is in the throes of another political convulsion following upon the seizure of the government and the arrest of several of its ministers by the executive council of the Soldiers' and Workmen's Council. The coup d'etat was accomplished without bloodshed, and the city is orderly, the streets being patrolled regularly and guarded by the soldiers and workmen.

NEW KING OF GREECE IS FOR THE ALLIES

Washington, November 7.—Despatches from Athens to the Greek Legation today told of a visit by King Alexander to the barracks yesterday to witness drill and get into personal touch with the soldiers training to join the allies at the front. In a speech to the officers the King said:

"I am very happy realizing that you are working hard. I want to recommend you to be all heart with your service and to keep away from politics. You must keep on working more and more, because we have to be ready the earliest moment possible so as to participate in this war with our allies to try to break down our enemies."

DOMESTIC FIRES ARE VERY FEW IN BERLIN

Copenhagen, Nov. 7.—According to The Vorwaerts of Berlin, many residents of that city are shivering in unheated homes, owing to their inability to obtain even the scanty allowance of a quarter of a ton of coal per room. Full delivery was promised by November 1, but the only hope expressed is that it may be all delivered by the new year. Lines of persons waiting to purchase coal are now a regular feature of life in Berlin. Buyers are compelled to stand in line all day to obtain a few scoopsful, which they have to carry home themselves. To the scantily-clad and miserably-shod women and children of the poor this is a severe strain.

ONE GENERAL STAFF FOR ALL THE ALLIES

(Special to The Daily News.)
London, Nov. 9.—The Allies may select a general staff to have supreme control of the war, as the unification of commands of considered essential. With the concentration of resources for one single front being urged, one supreme commander in chief is not considered practicable. The need of a collectively considered war policy is emphasized.

The Allied Conference.
Several commissioners to the allied conference arrived in London last night, headed by Colonel House, who ranks as special American ambassador.

BRAZIL WILL ACT AGAINST GERMANS

Rio Janeiro, Nov. 8.—Popular manifestations against German business houses in this city assumed a violent character Sunday. The damage was heavy. Anti-German outbreaks also are reported from Curitiba and Sao Paulo. The guard detachments over the Central Railway of Brazil have been doubled, all officers have been recalled to their garrisons and furloughs suspended. In response to the demand for reprisals against German aggressions the President has sent to Congress a message containing the following recommendations: "First, annulment of contracts for public works entered into with Germany; second, prohibition of new land concessions to German banks and eventual annulment of their licenses; the extension of these measures to German commercial firms; fourth, prohibition of the transfer of ownership of German property; fifth, the internment of German suspects.

Various measures were presented in the Chamber, one of which proposes that the crews of the merchant marine be utilized in the war. The Chamber adopted a vote of 97 to 17, a motion for the inclusion in the order of the day of all projects of a military nature.

IMPORTANT SUCCESS IN MESOPOTAMIA

Turks Hurriedly Retreat North-West of Bagdad Before General Maude.

(Special to The Daily News.)
London, Nov. 9.—The British forces under General Maude have pushed forward on both banks of the river Tigris from Samarra and have captured the town of Tekri. The enemy troops did not stay to fight, but retired hurriedly after the capture of the town, and are now in full flight towards Mosul, which lies one hundred and twenty miles north.

In Palestine.
London, Nov. 9.—The British forces are now pushing on towards Jerusalem today by both the coast route from Gaza and through the valley from Beer-sheba. There is every indication of a general retirement of the Turks northward in Palestine.

GERMAN SUBMARINES SHELL LIFEBOATS

Hun Atrocities on the High Seas Continue no Regard for Lives of Sailors.

An Atlantic Port, Nov. 7.—A German submarine torpedoed and sank the British steamship East Wales, of 4,321 tons gross, off Queenstown on October 14, according to a survivor who arrived here today. One of two U-boats which took part in the attack shelled the open lifeboats and four of the crew perished and five others were wounded.

The survivor, a passenger on a British steamship, is George W. Finnegan of Baltimore, the port from which the East Wales sailed for England with mules and steel. The vessel had discharged its cargo at Southampton and was on her way to Queenstown when, at 6:30 a.m., a submarine, believed to have been the one which had been observed the night before sinking a freighter, approached unexpectedly.

On the East Wales were fifty-one men. The U-boat's third shell carried away the wireless and wounded the operator. Steering gear and bridge were destroyed and the crew then took to small boats. A second submarine joined in the shelling and a shot decapitated one man in a small boat, killed two others and wounded four. British patrol vessels were in sight, but the East Wales was sent to the bottom with two torpedoes before the submarines fled, escaping the patrols.

STATE CONTROL OF SCOTCH WHISKEY

London, Nov. 7.—The British government, according to the Daily Express, is considering making its first experiment in state control of the liquor trade by assuming control of the manufacture and supply in Scotland. On the success of the test would depend the extension of control to England, Ireland and Wales.

GERMANY'S LAST HOPE

London, Nov. 9.—Germany is now calling out her last reserves. All men, who have been previously rejected are now being reexamined and large numbers have been hurried to the training centres.

GERMAN SHIPS ARE MENACING HELSINGFORS

French and British Engage in Local Attacks on Western Front—Italy Loses Many Prisoners.

(Special to The Daily News.)
London, Nov. 9.—Welsh troops made a daring raid upon the German positions and brought back prisoners. Very heavy losses were inflicted upon the enemy during this raid, which was in the neighborhood of Armentieres.

French Front.
Paris, Nov. 9.—During the night we made two surprise attacks upon the enemy trenches. One attack was made to the east of Rheims and the other in the Woeuvre, east of Mouilly. Prisoners were captured in both cases.

The German Navy.
Stockholm, Nov. 9.—A large German squadron of warships is off the Finnish naval station at Helsingfors. Germany apparently intends to continue her naval operations in the Baltic.

Per Berlin Wireless.
Berlin, Nov. 9.—The Austro-German naval forces in north-western Italy have crossed the Livorno River. Seventeen thousand Italian troops were cut off from the Tagliamento river and were taken prisoner. The total number of prisoners taken by the Austro-Germans is now over two hundred and fifty thousand, together with twenty-three hundred guns.

Ships Lost.
London, Nov. 9.—A new low level has been established in the losses of ships by German submarines and mines. Only twelve vessels of all tonnages were sunk last week.

GERMAN EFFORTS TOWARDS PEACE

Washington, Nov. 8.—Germany and Austria are making strong efforts to further the pacifist conference to be held at Berne, Nov. 12 to discuss a basis for an honorable peace, according to an official cablegram received here today from Zurich, Switzerland. Even the Swiss, the despatch said, regard this solicitude of the Central Powers as in strange contrast to their recent declarations that they were entirely satisfied with their military status.

Germany will be represented at the conference by Dr. Bernhardt Dernberg, expelled from the United States for spreading German propaganda; Pastor Frederick Naumann, director of the Review Die Hilfe, one of the defenders of the ambitious "Middle Europe" German expansion doctrine; Walter Rathenau, director of the Allgemeine Elektrizitaet Gessel, and Dr. Frestner, director of the Allgemeine Elektrizitaet Gessel Chافت.

U. S. STEAMER ROCHESTER SUNK BY SUBMARINE

Washington, November 9.—The United States vessel Rochester has been sunk by a German submarine. Four of the sailors have been killed and fourteen are still missing.

When the Germans instituted their alleged blockade of the allied coasts, the Rochester was the first American vessel to pass through the dangerous zone on her voyage to France.

THE ELECTION

In view of the coming election, there is one thing which will weigh largely with the electors in this parliamentary division in the recording of their votes. We put it up to our readers a few days ago to consider how much better off Prince Rupert would have been had a Liberal Government been in power during the past six years. This is one of the local issues. The people of Prince Rupert have had the experience for six years of what to expect from the Borden Government. If the Borden Government is returned, they need expect nothing more than what has been done during that time.

Prince Rupert has the object lesson in front of them in the shape of an intermittently-working drydock. It is only used when the other drydocks on the coast cannot handle one of the largest vessels. The largest and best equipped drydock and shipbuilding plant on the coast has been allowed to stand idle since its completion three years ago. Every attempt to get it agoing somehow or other has led back to Ottawa, and the failure of all these attempts are on record.

The whole project of the National Transcontinental Railway, with Prince Rupert as its western terminus was evolved by the last Liberal Government. It certainly had no intention of tying up so many millions of money in a drydock and shipbuilding plant and then letting it stand idle.

For these six years past, the Borden Government apparently has made no attempt to carry out the farsighted plans of Sir Wilfrid Laurier in connection with Prince Rupert. Judging by experience, has Prince Rupert any hope for anything better, should he be, perchance, returned again?

In fact rather than let the plant already assembled at Prince Rupert do its duty in the manufacture of munitions and war material to "win the war" contracts were let to the southern cities, where ship-

yards and shops had to be built from the grass roots up. With regard to war contracts, it is impossible to believe that the Borden Government and the Imperial Munitions Board do not co-operate with regard to war orders.

The Borden Government has failed to utilize the resources of Prince Rupert in the effort to win the war, to the detriment of Prince Rupert and therefore, to the Dominion. From an economic standpoint—and the Government is always preaching economy—Prince Rupert cannot afford another term in office to the government of Sir Robert Borden.

ONE MILLION TONS OF SHIPS BY MARCH

Washington, Nov. 7.—Answering the Allies' call for 6,000,000 tons of new American shipping in 1918, Chairman Hurley, of the United States Shipping board, today said the country's yards will deliver 7,500,000 tons.

The "punch" was put into the government's anti-submarine campaign at a meeting today of representatives of all steel ship building plants on the Atlantic seaboard. Mr. Hurlley called upon employers and employees to place the yards on a three-shift night and day basis.

"We have just begun to fight," he said. "It is my hope that today will establish a milestone in America's war progress. Between now and March 1, this country will turn out one million tons of ships. In the whole of 1916, we turned out little over 750,000."

THE HIGH COST OF LIVING IS STILL BEING CONSIDERED

Ottawa, Nov. 7.—Cold-storage and the whole question of the cost of living are now under consideration, it is understood, by a sub-committee of the Cabinet. Important recommendations will probably be made shortly. In its statement of policy, issued a couple of weeks ago, the Union Government declared its belief in the necessity of "effective measures to prevent excessive profits, to prohibit hoarding, and to prevent combination for the increase of prices, and thus to reduce the cost of living."

BATTLE STORIES FROM THE WESTERN FRONT

"Two of our fellows had rather a startling wounded the other day," said a avoured pilot. "They left the aerodrome for a patrol stunt over the Boche lines. They saw something doing in the rear of the Hun lines and flew down to have a closer look, and they came under the fire of some 'archies.' Of course they paid little attention to the fire until a direct hit smashed the engine, and the pilot had barely time to turn the 'bus' for home when most of the engine fell clear. He didn't lose control, but planed down as much in the direction of the British lines as he could. They came to earth with a bit of a crash inside the Boche lines, but neither the pilot or his observer was hurt. They nipped out of the ruined 'bus' pretty quick and started running like blazes in the direction of the British trenches.

"There didn't seem to be any Boches about where they came down, and after running for some time they dropped to have a breather. While they lay on the ground out of breath, they spotted a sort of erection affair, banking and that sort of thing, covered with camouflage—looked like a big gun pit. They crept up closer to the pit and got near enough to hear the Boches talking, but not near enough to be spotted. It was a gun-pit and a jolly big one at that, so they squatted there and then made a sketch map of it, with a bearing or two to get the proper range. Afire that they crept and ran and crawled until they got to the bank of the Canal. They had to swim for it and they took off as much dunnage as they could—stripped to their shirts, and one of them stuck the sketch in his tobacco pouch to keep it from getting soaked. Then they started off to swim for it. As they left the bank a couple of Boche snipers got a bead on them and they had just time to locate the beggars hiding in sunken barrels before they dived for it. They swam under water, coming up for a breather now and then, with the Boche snipers blazing away all the time.

"When they got to the other side, there was a bit of a slope to get up and then one of our own sentries started to fire at them. They didn't want to kick up too much of a row, and he pipped by the Boche after getting so far, but they managed by signals to show that the sniper chap had made a mistake and they got through all right.
 "The first thing they did while still drenched only in wet shirts, was to get on the 'phone to ur heavies, and by the help of the Infantry O. C.'s map to give the exact location of that big gun pit, as well as the two barrels. Next thing that happened was a series of direct hits on that gun emplacement, and the two snipers' barrels sent sky-high. It was a complete wash-out for the Boche."

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CANADA

Will Class One Provide The One Hundred Thousand Men?

It will be greatly to the advantage of Canada if the entire quota of 100,000 men to be raised under the Military Service Act can be secured from the first class; that is, from the men between the ages of 20 and 34 who were unmarried or widowers without children on July 6th, 1917.
 This is almost self-evident for the following reasons:
 it is admitted that, between the ages of 20 and 34, the average man is at the height of his physical strength and is most adaptable to the change of conditions from civilian life;
 the military Service of unmarried men and widowers without children would occasion less distress than that of most others, since they are largely without dependents. Also, it would entail less financial burden for Canada, through separation allowances, etc.
 Authorities estimate that, after all proper examinations have been allowed, Canada should be able to produce from the first class 100,000 men fit for service, so the drain upon the man power of the country will not be severe.
 Members of Class One will be well advised to present themselves for examination immediately to the Medical Board in their district. Upon examination as to their physical fitness, they will be placed in one of the following categories:
 Category A—if fit for service in overseas fighting units.
 Category B—if fit for service overseas in Army Medical Corps, Forestry Battalion, etc.
 Category C—if fit for service in Canada only.
 Category E—if unfit for military service of any nature.
 If not placed in category A, the applicant will know that he is not liable for immediate service, but will go to the Post Office and send in a claim for exemption with his Medical Certificate attached, when he will receive in due course a certificate of exemption until those in his medical category are summoned for service.
 Where a man, who is placed in category A, feels that exemption should be allowed, an application form can be secured from the postmaster. This form, when filled in, will be forwarded by the postmaster to the registrar of the district, and the applicant will be informed by mail as to the time and place for the consideration of his application by the Exemption Board.
