ALLIES FORM NEW MILITARY COMMITTEE

WILL CO-ORDINATE ALL MILITARY OPERATIONS -- TURKS RETREAT IN SYRIA

ALLIES IN WEST HAVE CENTRAL GENERAL STAFF

Command of Allied War Operations is Confided to One Permanent Inter-Allied Military Committee.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Nov. 10.—The conference of the British, Italian and French representatives has resulted in the creating of a permanent inter-allied military committee. New leadership of the Italian army is provided for, Gen. Diaz has been appointed first in command, with General Badoglio second, and General Gradina third. General Foch, chief of staff in the French War Ministry, and General Wilson, sub-chief of the British staff, will serve on the inter-allied war committee with General Cadorna.

Western Front.

London, Nov. 10.—British and French troops are moving to the Italian front. Premier Lloyd George and other Entente leaders conferred with the King in Rome yesterday. The British troops made a successful raid to the east of Margicourt last night. The enemy's artillery is active in the neighborhood of Paschendaele. Otherwise there is nothing new on the western front.

In Palestine.

The entire Turkish army in Palestine is retreating towards the north. British aviators are following up the retiring Turks and bombing them. Forty Turkish guns were captured. The British and French naval forces are co-operating with the troops against the Turkish communications along the Mediterranean.

Per German Wireless.

Berlin, Nov. 10.—The Austro-German forces have crossed the Livena river and are overcoming the resistance of the Italian rear guards. We are advancing ceaselessly on the mountain roads and plains amidst driving snow and pouring rains towards the Piave river.

MANY ARE REPORTING FOR SERVICE IN QUEBEC

Montreal, Nov. 10.—The eligibles in Quebec under the Military Service Act are rushing to file applications. Seventy thousand are still to hear from. From now on, flat feet may not be considered a bar to service.

VENICE IN DANGER OF HUN ARTILLERY

Amsterdam, Nov. 7.—Commenting on the Austro-German advance in the direction of Venice the semi-official Berlin news agency prepares the public for an attack on the famous art centre. It contends that Venice has developed into an important centre of war industries. The city has already been visited on several occasions by Teuton aviators but no damage to ancient buildings and monuments has been reported. The Germans are already far into the Province of Venetia and if they reach the Piave line will be almost within cannon shot of Venice.

Toronto, Nov. 8.—The tackling of nine Gothas single-handed and the sending of two crashing down into the sea after a thrilling fight at a height of 12,000 feet was the gallant deed for which Squadron Commander Gerald Hervey, of the R. Commander Hervey was in the employ of the Bank of Montreal at High River and Calgary before his enlistment.

GERMANS FINE EAST FLANDERS \$10,000,000

London, Nov. 9.—A dispatch to the Exchange Telegraph from Amsterdam says that according to a frontier correspondent the German authorities in Belgium have imposed a fine of ten million francs on the province of East Flanders because it failed to place forty thousand laborers at the disposal of the Germans by Nov. 1st.

SIR WILFRID LAURIER THE SAVIOR OF QUEBEC

The One Man Who Can Unify the Discordant Elements in the Dominion.

Coming from a writer who has never given the great Canadian statesman a vote during all the long years that he has been a political leader in Canada, the following article culled from the editorial columns of the Calgary News-Advertiser is significant. It is significant of the deep impression which the stand the Liberal chief has taken at this present juncture in a most critical period in the history of the Dominion, has made not only among his own followers, but even among those who heretofore have been of a different political faith:

Sir Charles Hibbert Tupper, of Vancouver, once a member of a Conservative Dominion government, but of late years a supporter of the Liberal party in British Columbia, makes the statement that Sir Wilfrid Laurier will carry practically all of the sixty-five seats in the province of Quebec at the forthcoming election, and he therefore warns other parts of Canada, particularly the West, against casting a vote the same way as the people of Quebec are expected to cast theirs. The Vancouver man professes to see in this Quebec vote a grave danger to Canada just at this time, and fears that, as a result, "Canada may be convulsed in a terrific revolution."

The outlook for the country, it must be confessed, is certainly not a promising one, if Sir Hibbert's predictions should come true. But we are not prepared to accept any such gloomy picture as he painted.

It is possibly true that Quebec is likely to give Sir Wilfrid Laurier an almost solid support at the coming election; yet we look for no "terrific revolution," not even if Sir Wilfrid should win not only every seat in Quebec, but in the whole of Canada.

The News-Telegram holds no brief for Sir Wilfrid Laurier. We have never given him a vote during all the long years that he has been a political leader in Canada. But we desire to do justice to every Canadian, especially at this time, and we think that the people of Canada, irrespective of creed or race, should do justice to every Canadian public man in these trying times, and that Sir Wilfrid should be no exception to the rule.

CAPT. BARNEY JOHNSON IS AWARDED THE D. S. O.

The Distinguished Service Order has been awarded to Captain Barney Johnson, late of the G. T. P. Steamer Prince Rupert. Those in Prince Rupert who knew Capt. Barney have been expecting something of this kind ever since he went overseas. Captain Johnson was skipper of a submarine. He made a voyage in his underwater craft across the Atlantic and has been in the war zone since then.

No details have been received as for what particular action this distinction was conferred, as Capt. Johnson has had many experiences. On one occasion, his submarine hit a mine while submerged off the German coast but he managed to make the surface and bring the damaged vessel to port safely. His many friends will be pleased to know of this honor being bestowed upon him.

RIO IS CLOSED

(Special to The Daily News.)
Rio de Janeiro, Nov. 10.—The port of Rio de Janeiro has been closed by the order of the Brazilian Government.

The events of the past few months in Canada, we can arrive at no other conclusion than that Sir Wilfrid Laurier saved Quebec to Canada.

Three months ago, because of the Bourassa propaganda, which was begun in the first instance for the purpose of defeating Sir Wilfrid and of helping the Borden party in Quebec, and which has been permitted to continue, almost without interruption, by the Prime Minister since the outbreak of the war, the whole Canadian Confederation structure was threatened when the Military Service Act was introduced in Parliament. Sir Wilfrid was menaced, on the one hand, by the Bourassa-Laverge Nationalists, and, upon the other, by the extreme elements from the Province of Ontario. No other Canadian public man was ever placed in the same dangerous position as that in which Laurier found himself, and perhaps no other man had the same realization of the gravity of the situation as had Laurier. One false step on his part would not only have destroyed the influence and the usefulness of Sir Wilfrid Laurier among his own people, at the most critical moment in the history of Canada, but it would, in all probability have brought about that "terrific revolution" which Sir Hibbert Tupper has painted.

ALDERMAN McClymont LECTURES BEFORE THE ST. ANDREW'S SOCIETY

Last evening in the St. Andrew's rooms, there was a large turnout of the society to hear Alderman McClymont discuss the monetary question. Alderman McClymont spoke for three-quarters of an hour particularly with reference to Canadian finance, and his remarks were of a most instructive nature. Very great interest was taken in the views which were placed before the meeting.

Remarks were also made by Mr. Fred Stork, the Rev. Dr. Grant, and Mr. McNeish, late mayor of North Vancouver, and the evening was enlightened with music.

GRAIN MUST NOT BE USED FOR DISTILLING

Ottawa, Nov. 9.—No grain of any kind and no substance that can be used for food shall be used in Canada after November 30 for distillation of potable liquors. An Order-in-Council to this effect has been passed upon the recommendation of the Food Controller. It will remain in force "until the Governor-General-in-Council has by order declared that the present abnormal conditions have ceased." The penalty for violation of the regulation is a fine of \$5,000 or imprisonment of a term not exceeding six months or both fine and imprisonment.

Under an Order-in-Council of August 9th the use of wheat for distillation or manufacture of alcohol was prohibited, except that the Food Controller may license the use of wheat for distillation of alcohol for manufacturing or munitions purposes.

The new order will save for food purposes considerable quantities of barley, corn and rye, although for months the distillers have been using these grains in the manufacture of industrial alcohol only.

LENINE NOW IN POWER IN PETROGRAD

Belief that Coup in Russia was Concerted Plan of Berlin and the Bolsheviks—North Army Joins.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Nov. 10.—The pro-German Lenin is now firmly in power in Petrograd. Ex-Premier Kerensky is now en route to Moscow. The recent Teuton naval operations in the Gulf of Finland fosters the belief that the coup was a concerted plan made between Berlin and the Bolsheviks. It is feared that there is a plot to open the way to the Germans towards Petrograd. A telegram from Amsterdam says that the Russian army on the northern front has joined the Maximalists and is now marching upon Petrograd.

Women Fight.

The Women Battalions of Death fought valiantly until they were overwhelmed by the revolting troops who were aided by the guns of the warships. The Maximalists have decided to imprison and try Korniloff.

Expecting News.

Charles A. Hanson, inaugurated yesterday as the new Lord Mayor of London, expects to hear from General Korniloff. It is believed here that the Soviet will not be able to hold power long. Some believe that Kerensky is now paying the price for his weakness, although it is realized that it is Petrograd, and not all Russia, that has fallen. With the lines controlled, it is difficult to get unbiased news of what has actually taken place. A dispatch from Stockholm says that Kerensky has been arrested.

Will Stop Funds.

Washington, Nov. 10.—The balance of the loans authorized for Russia, amounting to \$111,100,000, may not be turned over by the United States Government, if the Lenin-Trotsky peace faction gain complete control of Russia.

IN ASIA

The continued success of the forces of General Maude in the operations of the Anglo-Indian forces in Mesopotamia are continuing. From the latest dispatches received from this theatre of the war, there now seems to be little standing in the way of the British troops in their march to Mosul. This important Eastern city is the terminus at present of the famous projected Berlin to Baghdad railway, which was the dream of the Kaiser's. From Mosul, the railway line runs almost due east to Aleppo, which possibly is the most important Turkish city east of Constantinople still in the hands of the Turks. The British forces are already well to the north of the armies operating in Palestine and the threatening of Aleppo by either General Maude from Mesopotamia, or by General Allenby in Palestine, would be a serious menace either of the Turkish forces east or south of that point.

Whatever may happen to Germany or Austria-Hungary as the outcome of the peace negotiations, when they do materialize—which may possibly take place some day—there seems to be little doubt that the unspeakable Turk will no longer be permitted to misrule over any other subject nations. With the greatest and the richest parts of his provinces gone, and no place left for him in Europe, the Turkish empire will be a thing of the past. Which is one thing that will cause few regrets in almost any other country.

revolution" spoken of by Sir Chas. Hibbert Tupper. Had Laurier adopted any other course than that these sixty-five Quebec seats, which Sir Hibbert so greatly fears, would have been turned over in their entirety to Bourassa and Lavergne, and the next Parliament instead of having a French-Canadian force under a high-

minded, moderate, patriotic French leader, would have had a Bourassa element that might easily have brought about a revolution not only in Quebec, but probably within the Canadian Parliament.

But not for a moment did Sir Sir Wilfrid lose his hold upon his Quebec followers, though he has lost the support of many of his old-time English-speaking colleagues, every one of whom, while they may differ with his policy, at the same time bear testimony to the personal patriotism and lofty character of the leader from whom they have parted.

And we believe that every Canadian has reason to feel grateful to Sir Wilfrid for the part he has played. Any other course than that which he took would have meant his passing from a political field in which just such a man as he is sorely needed today, and at the same time it would have meant that the entire province of Quebec would have been thrown into the Nationalist fold, and, under the fiery and irrational leadership of Bourassa and Lavergne, it would ere this have become a hotbed of disorder and defiance of the law.

The result today is the very reverse, however. While Sir Wilfrid and his followers in Parliament opposed the Military Service Act on the ground that, a far-reaching principle being involved through the most drastic piece of legislation ever placed on the Canadian statute books, a vote of the people should have been taken before it went into force, it is nevertheless a fact that not a single one of Sir Wilfrid's responsible Quebec followers have offered an unfair or irrational criticism of it, and no attempt has been made by his party to inflame the people of his province against it. Virtually all disorderly hostility has come from the ranks of Bourassa and his Nationalistic group—the same group that have opposed Laurier for the past ten years and helped, in 1911, to place in power Sir Robert Borden.

Instead of the rioting and disorder expected in Quebec following the passage of the Act, we have today a quiet and order that is, to say the least, as surprising

as it is welcome to a large section of the loyal Canadian people who a few months ago had their misgivings as to the outcome. This condition of affairs is undoubtedly due, in a very large measure, to the personal influence of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, who, through the confidence reposed in him by his French-Canadian compatriots, has been able to hold the impulsive ones in check and has brought out of a threatened chaos an orderliness and a respect for the law that, on the part of the French-Canadians, could not have been conceived by English-speaking people in these western provinces three months ago.

Not only has the aged French leader refused to listen to the demands of some of his followers from Quebec that the Military Service Act be repealed if he is returned to power, but he has counseled the utmost loyalty to the government of Canada in the words: "Obey the Military Service Law." And that his people are obeying that law is the most outstanding tribute that any Canadian can have today as to his worth to his country at this critical time.

Whether or not we agree with either the past or the present policies of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, no well-wisher of Canada can gainsay his value to this Dominion at a moment when anything might have happened had it not been for his great influence over his own people, who have since demonstrated—possibly to the disappointment of some few extremists in Eastern Canada who have done their utmost to spread dissension

in Quebec—their loyalty to their country and their respect for the law of the land.

The government of Sir Robert Borden having forbidden certain criticism of the Military Service Act, the next step should be, as Sir Thomas Shaughnessy suggests, to prevent "frothy jingoists" from attempting to stir up trouble in the country by unfair or mischievous references to any one section of it, such as is the habit of some of our Canadian patriots (?) when speaking about Quebec and Laurier. If there is one thing more than another that

OBEY THE LAW!

Report at once for Service or Claim Exemption

Under the Military Service Act, all men in Class One are soldiers today, absent with leave and without pay. Failure to obey the law amounts to **DESERTION** and can be punished as such.

Class One includes bachelors and widowers without children (not otherwise excepted) who were 20 years old on the 13th October, 1917, and whose 34th birthday did not occur before January 1st, 1917.

DO IT TODAY!

The rush in the last few days may be such that in the hurry and stress a number of men may fail to comply with the requirements under the Act. That will not be recognized as an excuse, as every man is being given ample time to report for service, or claim exemption.

GO TO YOUR POST OFFICE TODAY and ask for a form for reporting for service or for claiming exemption. Understand, it is a matter of **LAW** that all the men in Class One must report for service or claim exemption not later than November 10th, 1917.

is needed in Canada at the present time, it is National Unity. We may all have our differences with respect to the government and the policies of that government, but they should be criticized, not from

the racial or sectarian viewpoint, but solely and wholly upon their merit. If we are going to do justice to Sir Robert Borden or to Sir Wilfrid Laurier, we will criticize them upon their records as Canadian leaders, not because of their sectional or racial likes or dislikes. And when we English-speaking people are criticizing Laurier, as

we have a perfect right to do as Canadians, let it be not as a French leader from a French province, but as a Canadian leader who, in the years to come, we believe, will be known as the "Savior of Quebec"—the man who saved it for Canada at the most critical time in our history. And the fact that he has been able to save Quebec is about the best

argument that can be cited in his favor and against the false theory that he would be unsafe as Prime Minister under any circumstances. It is well, too, to give some little thought of conditions within our own English-speaking provinces before "throwing stones" at Quebec. The fact that 95 per cent of our own men of military age have applied for exemption

shows how extremely "popular" among our own people is the law which Sir Wilfrid opposed in Parliament, but to which, once law, he offered no further opposition. It will be strange—very, very strange—if more than 95 per cent of the young men of Quebec ask for exemption. We had better examine our own house before finding fault with others.

TO PREVENT BRIBERY

Ottawa, Nov. 8.—In setting up the machinery for the operation of the Military Service Act, special care has been taken to select only officials of the most trustworthy character. In the operation of the Act, attempts at bribery are always possible, in Canada no less than in other countries.

Attempt to bribe any member of an exemption tribunals or medical board, or a military representative, means a term of imprisonment of not less than one year and not more than five years. It will be very difficult for anyone so inclined to get aside the regulations of the Military Service Act by corruption.

Not all of the preparations made to guard against venality and unfairness in the operation of the Act can be made public, but it may be announced that attempts to bribe officials, in view of the checks and supervisions to be imposed, will be an exceedingly hazardous business.
