

BRITISH ARTILLERY SUPPORTS ITALIANS

ENEMY ADVANCE IS CHECKED --- FURTHER BRITISH SUCCESS AT PASCHENDAELE

BRITISH GUNS NOW FACE THE HUNS IN ITALY

Further British Success at Paschendale—British Artillery is Supporting the Italian Rear.

(Special to The Daily News.) London, Nov. 12.—The British troops in Flanders are continuing their hammering at the German lines and have just won another decided success by straightening out the salient in the newly acquired Paschendale region.

In Italy. The fact that the British guns are now facing the Austro-Germans on the Italian front is taken here to mean that the advance of the enemy has now been definitely checked. The British commanders are assumed to have taken up strategic positions from which they will be able to halt the enemy.

Satisfaction in Rome. Rome, Nov. 12.—British batteries have taken up positions along the front line and are prepared to give support to the Italian rear guard in an effort to stay the Austro-German advance. The fact that the fighters from Great Britain have come to the aid of Italy is regarded here with great satisfaction.

The Russian Coup. Copenhagen, Nov. 12.—The first German newspapers to arrive here containing comment upon the coup in Russia by the Maximalist faction have made no attempt to jump to the conclusion of or predict a speedy peace with Russia. On the other hand, the impression prevails that the Maximalists may be compelled to follow the same policy as the Kerensky regime as soon as they find that a non-annexation peace is not to be attained early, notwithstanding their readiness to conclude such a peace. Peace without annexations may suit Russia, but it will hardly be accepted by Germany.

A BUMPER CORN CROP Washington, Nov. 10.—A corn crop larger by more than 86,000,000 bushels than ever grown in the history of American agriculture is the production of the United States this year. The department of agriculture today, in its preliminary estimates of the crop, placed the quantity at 3,191,083,000 bushels.

EXPLAIN WORKMANS' COMPENSATION ACT

Mr. Wynn and Parker Williams Describe Safeguards Provided for Workmen.

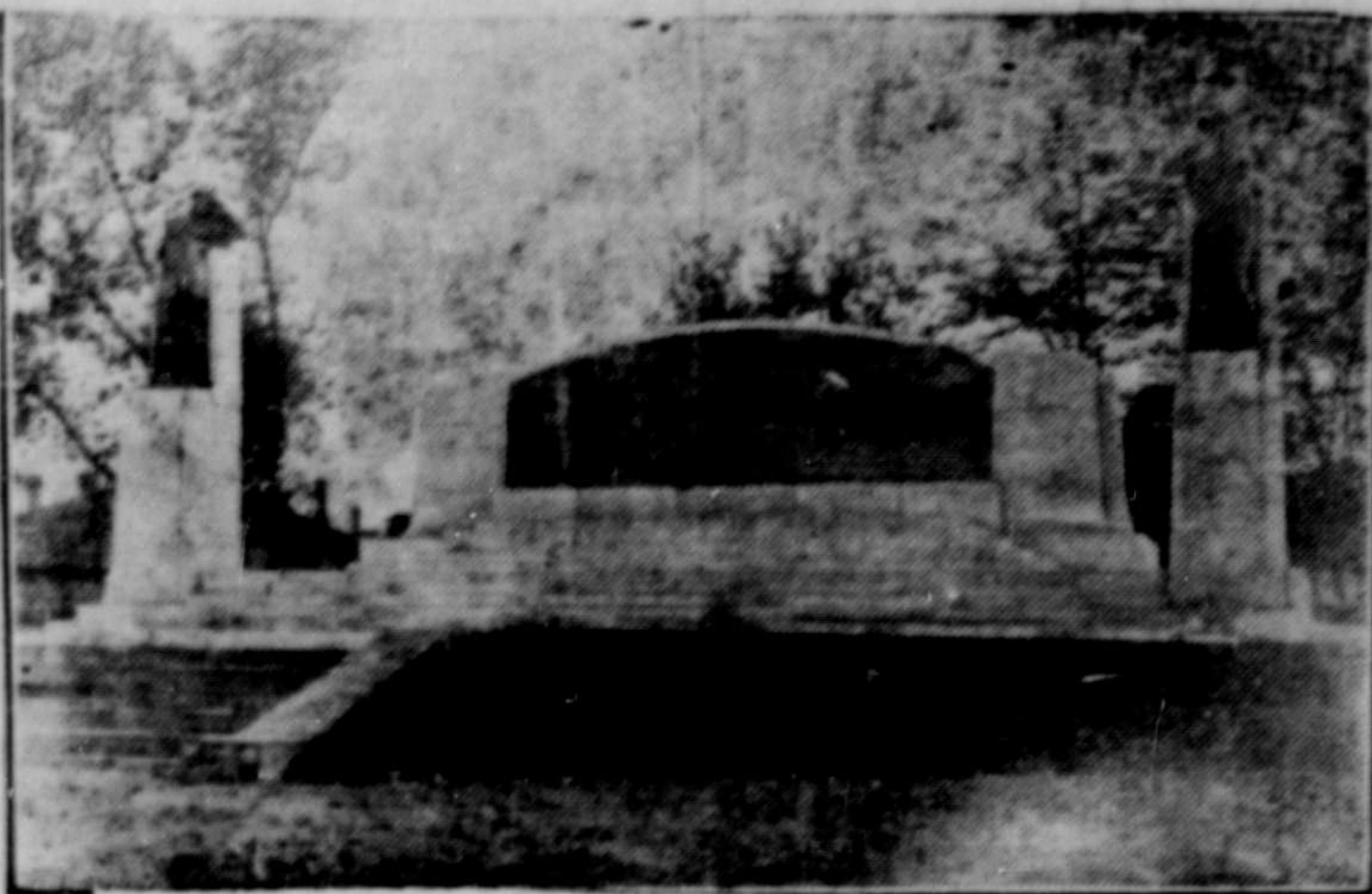
A large and interested audience gathered at the Empress Theatre on Saturday evening to hear the provisions of the Workmans' Compensation Act, as introduced at the last session of the Provincial House of Parliament. Mr. Wynn, the chairman of the Workmans' Compensation Board, and Mr. Parker Williams, also a member of the Board, gave very interesting addresses upon the matter, in which the Government has made compulsory upon both employers and employees alike certain safeguards for the workmen in the event of accident.

Alderman Casey presided over the meeting, at which Mr. Parker Williams was the first speaker. Mr. Williams explained how the board came into being, what it is for, and how its operations are conducted. He showed where all the money for compensation to workmen came from and how it was collected. Mr. Williams was explicit in showing what the Compensation Board could do for workmen incapacitated through accidents happening in the course of and out of their employment, and also what the board could do towards the prevention of accidents.

Mr. Wynn, the chairman of the board, followed Mr. Williams and took up some of the other points. He explained what the duties were which devolved upon the workmen themselves in this connection; how they must notify their employers in writing in the event of accident, however slight. Mr. Wynn's speech was rich in illustrations which carried his points well home. Mr. Wynn paid a splendid tribute to Mr. Gilmour, the third member of the board, who is more commonly known as "Square Deal" Gilmour. Mr. Wynn showed that since the inception of the board they have had twelve thousand claims to deal with. At the close of his speech questions from the audience were invited upon any points which were not clear. This invitation was largely taken advantage of, which showed the lively interest taken by the audience in this matter.

The sympathetic manner in which both Mr. Williams and Mr. Wynn spoke regarding their subject was much appreciated. They demonstrated fully that they were there for the benefit of the workmen, in whose interests the board was appointed. The impression their speeches conveyed to their hearers was that they were, as they should be, the servants of the people, and not, as is too often the case with officials, primarily the servants of the Government.

VATICAN ABANDONS ALL PEACE EFFORTS

Seriousness of Italian Situation and Unity of People Make Efforts Useless.

Rome, Nov. 10.—The gravity of the situation and the fusion of all parties into one national entity determined at all odds to drive the enemy from the mother soil, apparently, according to high officials, has reached even the Vatican, where it is realized it is advisable to abandon any efforts toward peace, for the present at least.

The leaders in the Catholic party have made declarations of their support to united Italy in the supreme crisis, and it is said in official quarters that the Vatican has been informed that for the moment any attitude which might be considered to run counter to the national aspirations would be most unwelcome.

CLEMENCEAU AND CAILLEUX ARGUE

(Special to The Daily News.)

Paris, Nov. 12.—Joseph Cailleux, former premier of France, having denied the statement of Georges Clemenceau that he had a conference with the principal Italian pacifists at Rome last December, Clemenceau maintains his assertions.

By way of further confirmation, Clemenceau adds that the Italian Government was obliged to protest against these manoeuvres as dangerous for both Italy and for France and informed the French Government that it was disposed to expel Cailleux from the kingdom.

FISH ARRIVALS

The arrivals of fishing boats in port have been rather light for the past few days, on account of the stormy weather which is being experienced outside. Yesterday the Carruthers arrived with 75,000 lbs. halibut for the Cold Storage Co.; the Alaska had 40,000 lbs., which was sold for 17 1/2 cents. Today the only vessel in is the Lumen with 6,000 lbs., which up till noon had not been sold.

ALL RUSSIA NOT TO BE JUDGED BY PETROGRAD

Ambassador Says the Majority of Russians are With Kerensky Still.

Memphis, Tenn., Nov. 10.—In an address here tonight Boris A. Bakhmeteff, the Russian Ambassador, said that if Russia is to achieve her political freedom the Maximalists who revolted against the Kerensky Provisional Government at Petrograd must be overthrown. Immediate peace such as the Maximalists propose, he said, could result only in Russian oppression.

While not attempting to belittle the gravity of the situation in the Russian capital, Ambassador Bakhmeteff said the Maximalist revolt was a revolt of the few against the many.

"The majority of the Russians who followed Kerensky since the Romanoffs were overthrown last March," the Ambassador said, "are heart and soul with the Kerensky Government. They fully understand that the freedom of Russia is assured only through an allied victory against Prussian autocracy. They will fight to the end."

Soon after his arrival here from Washington, Ambassador Bakhmeteff was informed by the Associated Press of the overthrow of the Kerensky Government. His reply to the disquieting news was that "the intent and spirit of Russia as a whole can in no way be judged by the news from Petrograd," and he added that the spirit prevailing in the capital is not representative of the Russian spirit as a whole.

Ambassador Bakhmeteff tonight was without official advices from Petrograd regarding the new revolution.

SIR WILFRID LAURIER WELCOMED BY THOUSANDS

Montreal, Nov. 9.—Sir Wilfrid Laurier arrived in Montreal this morning, getting a big reception at the Windsor station, where he was met by Lemieux, Senators Dandurand and Wilson and prominent Liberals. He spent the day at the Windsor hotel receiving deputations, and will leave for Quebec at five o'clock, receiving deputations there tomorrow and speaking there tomorrow night.

Sir Sam Was Mistaken.

The same train also brought Sir Sam Hughes who, when he saw the big crowd of about two thousand people, remarked: "I did not think there would be a reception like this for me." "It's not for you, it's for Laurier," remarked E. W. Tobin, M.P. Sir Sam just smiled and kept walking.

U. S. GET READY FOR SECOND CALL SELECTIVE DRAFT

President Wilson Writes a Foreword to Regulations—U. S. Loans Unrestricted.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Washington, Nov. 12.—President Wilson has formally chartered the new machinery for carrying out the Selective Draft Bill into operation tonight with the publication of a foreword he has written to the regulations under which the second call will be made. The regulations themselves and the questions and answers which more than nine million registrants will be required to fill out are being forwarded to the local boards, but have not yet been made public.

The restrictions of the loans made by the United States to the Allies have also been removed. The United States Government may now lend money without the stipulation that it shall be spent in the United States. This will help to relieve the stress upon ocean tonnage. By this means the long haul across the Atlantic will be obviated and the money spent where it will have the most economic value.

POPULAR GOVERNMENT

One of the fundamental principles which has characterized always the British idea of responsible government is that it be with the consent of the governed. A people governed without consenting or without having the power of making effective their dissent in the acts and actions of their government are no longer a free people. The essence of such freedom exists in popular government—in the making effective of the will of the people. The wish of the majority goes. And in no part of the Empire can any government withstand that wish.

The unanimous desire of every Canadian is that the Dominion put forth its every effort in the prosecution of the war. Even Col. Blondin, who a few years ago was prepared to shoot holes in the Union Jack is now overseas and in karkhi. All Canada is at one on that point, notwithstanding that one political sect claims this virtue in excelsis.

The serious differences which have arisen among Canadians, all equally loyal, is as to the methods which shall prevail in the prosecution of the war. The late Borden Government, besides deliberately encouraging profiteering in war supplies for the benefit of its own partisan followers, thus robbing the people, made a complete change of policy with the introduction of the Military Service Act. When the same Government was elected in 1914, it opposed Laurier's naval policy on the grounds that such a policy meant conscription. Up to about a month before the Military Service Act was introduced, the people of Canada were assured that conscription would not be introduced. On one occasion Sir Robert Borden repeated his former statement to this effect "with emphasis." But Sir Robert's word was no good.

This reversal of the Premier's assurances was sprung upon the nation. The excuse was that the voluntary system had broken down, whereas the fact is that the voluntary sys-

tem had not been thoroughly tried out. Quebec was held up as a province of slackers while in that same province thousands of French-Canadians had never seen a recruiting officer.

In addition to this, the voluntary system was discouraged by the manner in which the soldiers' dependents were and are still being penalized by the failure of the Government to make adequate provision for their welfare by checking the rapacity of the food profiteers. The high cost of living shows no signs of decreasing, while certain men are heaping up millions.

The Borden Government apparently wanted this state of affairs to continue. That the few should benefit out of the misery of the many. Which is a good Tory doctrine. If the workmen would not go and fight for the profiteers' profits as well as for the Empire, Sir Robert would make it compulsory, notwithstanding his past promises, and without giving the people a chance to say yea or nay. Let the poor men sacrifice all they've got and let the rich keep all theirs. The consent of the governed does not matter. The will of the people is of no account. That's autocracy! Just what the Allies are fighting against.

To be fair to the soldier, conscription, if applied at all, must go all round. Compulsory service should not be imposed upon men of military age only.

INTERNATIONAL UNION OF ENTENTE SOCIALISTS

London, Nov. 10.—The executive committee of the National Socialist party of Great Britain, which favors the continuance of the war until Germany is beaten, has sent an appeal to the National and International Socialists in America to found an international organization of Socialists for the Entente countries.
