ITALIANS PREPARING FOR BIG OFFENSIVE

KERENSKY'S MEN MARCHING ON PETROGRAD---QUIET PREVAILS ON WEST FRONT

ITALIAN LINE STIFFENING BEFORE THE HUN INVADER

AUSTRO-GERMAN FORCES FAIL IN OPERATIONS TO ENCIRCLE ITALIAN LEFT WING—STAND BEING MADE ON LINE OF PIAVE RIVER—PREPARING FOR OFFENSIVE—GOOD PROGRESS IN PALESTINE

(Special to The Daily News).
Rome, Nov. 13.—The operations of the enemy in the north and east in an attempt at the encirclement of the Italians has not succeeded. The menace on the Italian left wing is also virtually past. The Austro-Germans are holding the Piave River. The enemy action on the Asiago Plateau on the Trentino front is also a complete failure.

Line Stiffening.
London, Nov. 13.—Italy is preparing for her greatest offensive. Her battle of the Marne is expected to take place within a few days. The whole Italian line is stiffening like a wall before the invaders. A shrewd blow was struck at the enemy along the extreme northern front, and the vanguard of von Huegel's army was captured in the Sugano Valley sector.

What Berlin Says.
Berlin, Nov. 13.—Ten thousand Italian soldiers surrendered to the Austro-German forces in the upper Piave Valley. The German troops have reached Feltre on the left wing of the Italian positions along the Piave.

In Palestine.
London, Nov. 13.—The British forces in Palestine are continuing their northward drive along the coast of the Mediterranean and have made an advance of fourteen miles in three days.

British Front.
Beyond the usual artillery activity on both sides there is nothing to report on the western front.

French Front.
Paris, Nov. 13.—On the front between Chaume Wood and Bazancourt on the Verdun front, active artillery fighting continued during the night. The remainder of the front is calm.

The War Council.
London, Nov. 13.—Chancellor Bonar Law said in the House of Commons yesterday that he hoped that the United States would participate in the deliberations of the inter-allied War Council. The Council will meet once or oftener every month at Versailles with the military action. Big events are viewed to the better co-operation of looked for this week.

NOTES FROM THE COUNCIL CHAMBER

The regular meeting of the city council took place last evening, Mayor McCaffery presiding. Upon the meeting being called to order, Mr. G. W. Nickerson was heard upon the subject of Cow Bay and the city receiving the four hundred and sixty-five feet of waterfront which will be created by its being filled in.

An application was received from the staff of the fire department requesting an increase of 10 per cent in salaries. The application was recommended by the fire chief. The matter was referred to the public utilities committee for report.

An application for an increase in salary was also received from Mr. E. A. Woods. He had been in the employ of the city since 1910 and during these seven years had filled practically every office in the city hall. The finance committee were left to consider the application.

In the matter of the Prince Rupert Hydro-Electric Company's property in the water rights of Falls river, a letter from Mr. G. A. Winter, of Vancouver, was read. It stated that the offer made by the city was not satisfactory to the bond holders. The property was offered to the city for the sum of \$55,000 net—in cash—anyway not in city bonds. Were this unsatisfactory, Mr. Winter proposed arbitration.

Ald. Montgomery was not in favor of Mr. Winter's proposal, neither for the amount of \$55,000 nor for arbitration. Ald. McRae was not any more so and moved that Mr. Winter's letter lie upon the table for a week. This was seconded by Ald. Nelson. Alderman Casey also opposed the proposal, emphatically.

Recommendations were made by the utilities committee for raises in salary to Mr. G. W. Waddell and Mr. B. McDaniels. Mr. H. Smith, cemetery caretaker, and Mr. J. Carroll likewise received increases.

The Brackman-Ker Milling Co. had in an application for the construction of a garage on First Avenue, adjoining their present premises. Upon the motion of Ald. Montgomery this was laid upon the table for one week to allow time for any protest which might be made.

The old telephone building now being used by the returned soldiers being in need of roofing repairs, it was decided to put in a tar and gravel roof. The city engineer was also authorized to sell five yards of gravel at \$2.75 per yard.

The lumber situation also came up again. It transpired that one hundred thousand feet of the quantity ordered during the month of August was not yet delivered. Upon the recommendation of the city engineer it was decided to call for tenders for 100,000 feet of 2-in. fir to be delivered not later than February, 1918.

GERMANY WANTS BELGIUM

Amsterdam, Nov. 13.—Admiral von Tirpitz made a violent annexation speech at the meeting of the Fatherland Party. He declared that Germany must hold Belgium and that the country must hold Antwerp. He dilated upon the struggle of Germany with the tyranny of Anglo-Americanism.

PRINCE RUPERT LIBERALS ENDORSE MR. FRED STORK

ENTHUSIASTIC MEETING IN LIBERAL ROOMS LAST EVENING ENDORSES THE CANDIDATURE OF MR. FRED STORK AT THE COMING ELECTION AS REPRESENTATIVE TO THE DOMINION PARLIAMENT

A large and enthusiastic gathering of Liberals thronged the Liberal rooms last evening to hear Mr. Fred Stork, the Liberal candidate, discuss the issues before the electorate at the coming election. Mr. F. G. Dawson, president of the Association, occupied the chair.

Mr. Stork, who was received with a burst of hearty cheering, opened his remarks by referring to the many changes and new issues which had arisen during the past three years. "At the Winnipeg convention," stated Mr. Stork, "I supported a resolution to the effect that Sir Robert Borden had forfeited the confidence of the people of Canada. I voted for another resolution that Sir Wilfrid Laurier was the greatest of all Canadian statesmen. And I have not seen anything since then to make me change my mind."

Mr. Stork showed the analogy between the present campaign and that of six years ago, when reciprocity, aimed at a reduction in the cost of living, was not discussed upon its merits. He showed how race, religion, passion and prejudice were all utilized to cover up and distort the real issues.

Conscription.

Mr. Stork showed how the fear of conscription was used to defeat the Laurier naval policy, which was to build battleships in Canada with Canadian materials. At the last election the people were told that their sons would be conscripted to fight upon Laurier's battleships and that Laurier naval policy means conscription. In diverting the attention of the people from reciprocity, the real issue, by such arguments, the "ory-Nationalist combination were successful. Their campaign was financed by the big interests, who since that time have controlled the Government. Immediately prices began to rise. They have been rising ever since. And since the war broke out profiteering broke out on a large scale, which was a disgrace. On the top of an already bad record the Government proposes to pay a sum which will in all likelihood amount to \$10,000,000 for the worthless stock of the C. N. R. Knowing that their record was too bad to place before the electorate, a new issue had to be placed before the public in order to divert attention. This new issue was found in conscription. Mr. Stork referred to the curious fact of the newspapers throughout the Dominion forgetting the C. N. R. steal and all screaming for conscription.

Many people were under the impression that conscription was brought in to make Quebec do her duty. Mr. Crothers, a cabinet minister, had said that had Quebec done her duty, conscription would not have been necessary. That the Borden Government was not sincere in this matter was shown by the circular letter sent by Mr. Rainville, the deputy speaker, who was a Frenchman, sitting for a French-speaking constituency. This letter informed his constituents that farmers' families and "industrials in good faith" would be exempt. "Without any fear you may present your unmarried sons before the tribunals," the letter said.

Sir Robert Borden was asked in the House if this was a correct

statement of the intention of the Government. But Sir Robert did not know whether it was correct or not. He would investigate, and so far was presumably investigating still.

When the Military Service Act was introduced, Sir Wilfrid opposed it because the principle of conscription did not go far enough. It did not touch the big interests. But the Military Service Act became law, and is now the law of the land. Sir Wilfrid counselled that the law be lived up to. The Act calls for the enrollment of 100,000 men. "If I am elected," said Mr. Stork, "I would vote that wealth and resources be added to the conscription of any further number of men, and that the question be put to the people. When the common people believe that their sacrifice is being met with equal sacrifice, when conscription is on a basis that we all share and share alike and becomes a square deal, when all the burdens are equally divided, the people of the country will go through with any measure required."

"Is it any wonder that there would be objection taken to a one-sided measure of conscription like this?" continued Mr. Stork, "when millionaires are made in Canada overnight; when bacon costs more in Canada than it does in England, and when every meal set upon the table suggests exploitation? Under such conditions you can never get the people wholeheartedly, but when the people are all sharing equally, you will get a better spirit in this country. We can only regard the grafters at home as Huns in disguise."

Mr. Stork recommended the plain people to figure out for themselves what was the matter when the newspapers of the country all suddenly become silent at the \$10,000,000 steal of the C. N. R. and at the same time all become hysterical for conscription. This was only thrown to the people to fight over when someone else was getting away with the money.

Win the War.

This movement was characterized as another attempt to line up the country behind the Borden Government. Every one was in favor of winning the war, but it is a question as to methods. Each town can figure out for itself how it can best help to win the war and in Prince Rupert there are many opportunities. Take for instance (Continued on page three.)

FREEDOM

It has been the proud boast of the English-speaking peoples that they have always enjoyed a larger and wider measure of freedom than most other nations. We have hitherto been free from irksome interference by authority in the form of Government officials. In fact lack of Governmental control has been the one conspicuous thing distinguishing British Government from most others. Self Government for her overseas dominions is the one thing which has distinguished the British Empire from all preceding empires. In former centuries centralization was the rule. Within the British Empire, it is not the rule. We in Canada have the right to decide for ourselves what the course of action the Dominion shall pursue. In five weeks' time, the people of Canada will have an opportunity to decide whether they are in favor of the maintenance of the rights of the people in deciding of the great questions of the day; whether they are in favor of the abolition of profiteering, and whether they are in favor of the principle of conscription being applied to the man power of the country alone, while the other resources of the Dominion are left upon the voluntary basis.

It is only fair to the soldiers who have volunteered, and to those who will be conscripted that the same principle be applied to the other resources of the nation in order to win the war. We have the spectacle of war profiteers and food profiteers heaping up huge profits, which a tender Government handles very delicately. In all probability large sums of these profits will be placed with the popular loans, the Victory loan and others, which are free of taxation. If the excess profits are not taxed when they were made, they cannot be taxed when they are invested in the Victory Loan. This doubtless is some of the consideration shown by Sir Thomas White, the late Finance Minister of the Borden Conservative Government and the present Fi-

nance Minister of the Borden Union Government, to his friends the profiteers. The Government may change, ostensibly, but Sir Robert Borden and Sir Thomas White remain, and the large profits remain untouched as heretofore. The policy of these gentlemen is to conscript the working men. They only make wages. But to conscript the swollen profits made out of war orders and the food of the people and of the soldiers is another thing. That would be discrimination—against the friends of the late Government.

With the Union Government in power, controlled by the Tory crowd who have looted Canada for the last six years, little improvement may be looked for. The people of Canada require a reduction in the high cost of living, the people of Canada require that the burden of taxation be equalized, the people of Canada require that the iniquitous tariff be revised, Prince Rupert requires orders for the building of ships, Prince Rupert requires something more than holes being dug in her main avenues, Prince Rupert requires that her resources be utilized to the fullest in the winning of the war. These are things which Sir Robert Borden has had an opportunity to do since the war broke out, but which he consistently ignored.

By voting for the Borden Government, there is little hope that the desires of Prince Rupert will be realized.

There is, therefore, every reason to believe that the investor might be in the happy position of being rewarded for merely doing what is incumbent upon him as a citizen, of having a "Scrap of paper" typical of Britain's pledge, worth \$135 to \$140 within a short period after peace is declared. Your bond is not a worthless pledge like Germany's pledge to Belgium, by the breach of which Britain was drawn into this struggle in which Canada and the overseas dominions have played such an important part.

PRINCE RUPERT LIBERALS ENDORSE MR. FRED STORK

Continued From Page One.

stance, the rentals of the post office, the custom house, telegraph office, etc., in which there was graft. We should make it so hot for the people who draw down this graft money, and for the Government which permits it, that we would soon have the country in much better shape for the winning of the war. Men are now drawing pay who have no right to draw pay, and not one pay only, but in some cases two and three pays, which is a public scandal.
 "About two years ago, word came back from France that the Germans had thirty machine guns to every one our boys had. The people of Canada arose, and of one mind purchased machine guns. In Prince Rupert, one of the banks received subscriptions for the purchase of a machine gun, and in a few days the money was raised. You may look in vain over the lists of the men who contributed for the names of those men who were so loud mouthed a few weeks ago for winning the war. They are now writing over to the boys at the front asking them to vote Tory, and these are the same men who made no contributions for the guns, which in the first place should have been provided by the Minister of Militia, but were not.

Trusts.

"We hear a lot about trusts and Sir Joseph Flavell these days," continued Mr. Stork, "but I am going to leave him to the people of Toronto. We have Flavells here. We have combines on this North Pacific coast. We have a cannery combine, which is just as big and powerful as any in the city of Toronto. I believe that any man who has the money and wants to, should be permitted to build a cannery. We have no restrictions as to the number of sawmills nor hardware stores. There should be equal rights to all and privilege to none.
 The Borden Government found that on their record they had no chance with the people of Canada, of being re-elected. They invited some of the Liberals to join them. Sir Wilfrid Laurier is being villified, but Sir Robert Borden was most anxious to have him as a partner. The Conservatives want a Union Government, but it must be a Union Borden Conservative Cabinet who does the running. Their idea of an equitable divide is 125 Borden supporters and 35 Union Liberals. Mr. Stork instanced the idea of Union as displayed at a recent meeting at Victoria. All classes were invited, when Mr. Barnard told them that the primary object was to defeat Sir Wilfrid Laurier. Mr. Barnard being the man who won the last election by means of a forged telegram, for which he was rewarded with a senatorship. "I am in favour of a Union Government," said Mr. Stork, "Sir Wilfrid Laurier will form a Union Government, but I am opposed to any Union Government headed by Sir Robert Borden. I am in this campaign for the purpose of endeavoring to give to this constituency a representative in Parliament which it is sadly in need of. We have never yet had a representative of this northern country since it was put on the map. I realize that this is an uncommon campaign. I am satisfied that it is a fight between the common people and the financial interests. Do not misunderstand it. It is a fight between the classes and the masses, and in such a case, I am out to fight for the masses.
 "I am confident that Sir Wilfrid Laurier is the best leader for Canada at the present time. He will do every thing possible to win the war. I have more confidence

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in him than I have in the present Government."
 Mr. Stork was followed by Mr. Alex. M. Manson, M. P. for Omineca, who delivered a sparkling speech. Commenting upon the complex political situation as it today exists, Mr. Manson said that notwithstanding the adhesion of certain Liberals to the Borden Government, he did not find it necessary to follow them. "There is no need to argue as to the necessity of winning the war," said Mr. Manson. "There is already too much of that blatant lip-loyalty. And some of these people here are only typical of those elsewhere. To win the war, Sir Joseph Flavell said 'to hell with profit'; yet he is the man who in the space of the three years of war has taken a personal profit of \$1,634,000. The late Minister of Militia thought he was winning the war, as he thought he won the South African War. He patented a trench shovel, with which every soldier was supplied and which was scrapped as soon as the soldiers arrived overseas. Yet he took his profit just the

same. These in their big way are aped by some men here in town who tell so much of the winning of the war.
 "Carvell, Pardee, Graham, and the other Liberals who have joined the Borden Government, all have declared that Sir Wilfrid Laurier is the greatest Canadian statesman, and as such I see no reason why we should leave him. "The first duty of the Laurier Administration would be to find the men, money and resources. With Sir Wilfrid living up to his pledge, Canada will take her real share in the war. I will throw it in the teeth of anyone who says we want Canada to quit, if we support Sir Wilfrid. What more can we ask than the statement of Sir Wilfrid? The record of Sir Wilfrid Laurier is something to trust in for the future. His life has been spent in an effort to blend the diverse elements which make up Canada as a nation, into one solid whole. Compare his record with the record of the other side!"
 Mr. Manson traced in detail the operations of the Conservative party in the winning of the last

election, and their connection with the financial group in Toronto, who have obtained control of Canada. These were the men who wanted no truck nor trade with the Yankees, and they used every means possible to accomplish their ends.
 Discussing the Elections Act, whereby many naturalized Canadians are to be deprived of their vote, Mr. Manson said that the Borden Government had treated the pledge given to these new citizens in the Naturalization Act as a "scrap of paper" and when history came to be written they would be classed with the German Chancellor.
 With regard to the Union Government, Mr. Manson did believe in a Union Government, but not in this Union Government, nor so long as such men as Borden, White, Seigny and Blouin were part of it. These men had to be judged upon their past, the same as Sir Wilfrid Laurier was to be judged. "We have only their promises for the future," Mr. Manson said, "and their promises are easily broken, as we have

found. We know what Sir Wilfrid Laurier has stood for for the past fifty years, and when he says his duty is to find the men, money and resources to support the boys at the front, we may believe that he will."
 Mr. Manson moved the unanimous endorsement of Mr. Stork, which was seconded by Mr. A. W. McLean with the remark, "Sir Wilfrid to win the war and Fred Stork to win the election." The motion was unanimously and enthusiastically carried, to which Mr. Stork suitably replied.
 Mr. H. F. McRae addressed the meeting shortly and moved a resolution expressing confidence in Sir Wilfrid Laurier to win the war and in his ability to dispel the stagnation which for want of his guiding hand has overtaken the city of Prince Rupert. This was seconded by Mr. J. G. Steen. The meeting then closed with the singing of the National Anthem.

 Mr. Wm. E. S. Dudoward, of Port Simpson, is paying a visit to the city.

 Mr. J. W. Stewart, of Stewart, B. C., has arrived in Prince Rupert. He is proceeding south and will return in a few weeks' time.
 At the police court this morning before Magistrate Cars, Nick Rodis was fined in the sum of \$50.50 for an offence, under the provisions of the prohibition act.
 The league billiard tournament of the St. Andrew's Society finished on Saturday. The prize winners were, Mr. S. D. Macdonald, who won thirty games out of thirty-four; Mr. T. G. McEnamou made the highest break of 40; and the best average per game was made by Mr. S. D. Macdonald with 145 points out of a possible 150.

VANCOUVER MEAT PACKERS ON STRIKE

Vancouver, Nov. 9.—In an effort to enforce their demands for increased pay and shorter hours, the packing-house employees, union members of the butchers, meat-cutters and packing-house employees, went on strike this morning at the P. Burns and Vancouver-Prince Rupert (Swift Canadian) packing plants. Any attempt on the part of the packers to operate their establishments with non-union help, it was stated by labor men this morning, will be met with a further strike of the meat-cutters in the retail stores throughout the city.
 The union men are demanding an eight-hour day with a 10 per cent. increase over present wage schedules, and time and a half for overtime. Failing to secure these demands, the strike was called late last night to go into effect this morning, and pickets were assigned to duty about the plants. Over 200 men are said to have been affected by the dispute, while as many more are employed in the retail establishments as meat-cutters and will hold themselves in readiness to go on strike at a moment's notice.

INCREASED IMMIGRATION INTO WESTERN CANADA

Winnipeg, Nov. 10.—Immigration into western Canada during the 10 months of the present year has more than doubled the returns for the same period in 1916 and more than tripled the 1915 figures.
 A statement secured from the department of immigration today shows that 33,134 persons have migrated from the United States up to October 31, this year. In the first 10 months of 1916, 15,960 persons crossed the line, and in 1915 only 9,191.

WHAT B. C. HAS LOST!

Ottawa, Nov. 10.—That twenty-two times as much timber has been destroyed by fire in British Columbia as has been cut by the lumbermen is the conclusion reached by officials of the Commission on conservation, who have been inquiring into the fire losses in various provinces.
 The investigation shows that on 95,000 square miles the timber has been uselessly destroyed, mostly many years ago. The amount of timber so destroyed is estimated to be not less than 650,000,000,000 feet.
 The destroyed timber is equivalent to almost twice the amount of saw lumber now standing in the Province, and to nearly as much saw lumber as is now standing in the forests of all Canada.
