KERENSKY RETURNS TO PETROGRAD AGAIN

BOLSHEVIKI MOVEMENT IS SUPPRESSED -- GEN. KORNILOFF IS WITH KERENSKY

KERENSKY COMES OUT ON TOP IN THE RUSSIAN UPHEAVAL

**KORNILOFF, KALEDINE AND KERENSKY FORM A TRIUMVIRATE
AND HAVE ALL THE RUSSIAN TROOPS WITH THEM--
BOLSHEVIKI ARE OVERTHROWN AND IN
HIDING--ORDER PREVAILS**

London, Nov. 14.—It is reported that Premier Kerensky's troops are again in control of Petrograd, including the Nevsky Prospect. The members of the Bolsheviki have taken refuge in the Smolny Institute. The Finnish newspapers state unreservedly that the Bolsheviki party is definitely overthrown.

Messages from Southern Russia state that the country is in control of the Cossacks, who are following Kerensky. The Government, by Kerensky's orders will remove to Moscow.

A proclamation has been issued by Korniloff and Kaledine summoning the people to unite against the Bolsheviki. It is reported that Korniloff entered Petrograd at the head of Kerensky's troops, where the entire garrison, except the sailors, joined him.

Travellers reaching Sweden state that Kerensky has gained a decisive victory over the Bolsheviki party. Kerensky, Korniloff and Kaledine have formed a triumvirate and have all the troops in Russia with them.

All indications point to the speedy settling down of the disturbing elements in the new Russian republic and that active hostilities will again be taken up against the common enemy.

BRITAIN WILL HAVE AN AIR MINISTRY

London, Nov. 12.—It is understood that the bill for the establishment of the Air Ministry which will be introduced in the House of Commons in a few days will provide for the co-ordination of the successful stages of work in the naval and military air services and the Air Board. The Ministry will assume complete control of the new arm gradually. Its first duty will be to set up a central organization of policy and a central organization of supply. It will also be given power over discipline and pay. It is expected that Lord Cowdray, President of the Air Board, will be the first Air Minister.

MINING NOTES FROM STEWART DISTRICT

The Fish Creek Mining Company, under the management of Mr. W. R. Tonkin, who is also president of the company, drove some four hundred feet of tunnels on the different leads on the property. Several veins were stripped and their continuity proven over considerable distances. The ores met with are silver-lead, carrying gold and copper in veins from two to five feet in width and copper-gold ore up to twenty-five feet in width. The ores are of good grade. A few men will continue at work during the winter and a small trial shipment of high-grade ore will be made.

The Bush property on Salmon River under bond to R. K. Neill, maintained a force of men on development work all summer, which will be continued throughout the winter. Shipments of ore will go forward when the road now under construction is completed.

The Big Missouri property, which consists of some fourteen claims, has been bonded to the Granby Co. The discovery of a large body of good grade ore near the Big Missouri was made late in the summer. It was bonded by Messrs. Martin and Carter, who are operating a property near Seven Mile.

The Lakeview group of claims on Glacier Creek was bonded early in the summer by the Alice Arm Mining and Development Co., Ltd. Two hundred feet of cross-cut tunnel were driven and the work will be continued throughout the winter.

The Prince John group of copper claims on the Bear River were bonded by the Granby Company in July. A large force of men have been engaged in the erection of mine buildings and other work in connection with the installation of diamond drilling outfits. The drilling has now started and will be continued throughout the winter.

Some prospecting work was done on the Molly B. group of molybdenite claims at the mouth of Bear river. The lead was traced several hundred feet. It averages from two to four feet in width and carries from five to fourteen per cent. molybdenite.

The Maple Bay mines owned by the Granby Co., upon which development work has been going on during the past three years, commenced shipping to the smelter at Anxox in August. A new limestone quarry has been opened up at Swamp point and a short line of railway installed. The quarry, which is also owned by the Granby Co., supplies the smelter at Anxox with 4,000 tons of limestone per month.

FINANCIAL MAGNATES AND NATIONAL LOANS

The People of Canada Alleged to be Financing the Business of War Profiteers.

At the Trades and Labor Council meeting last evening, Mr. W. E. Thompson criticized the manner in which the big interests would profit most by the Victory and other loans made by the people to the Government of Canada.

While in no way detracting from the value of the Victory Loan to those who subscribed for it, Mr. Thompson pointed out that it was the big interests and the moneyed classes who were in the best position to get all the advantages. The middle classes who had to work, Mr. Thompson thought would only be able to absorb about \$50,000,000, which of this last loan would leave \$100,000,000 for the big interests.

This whole \$150,000,000 would be paid to them and from which they would derive large profits, which were inadequately taxed. Canada must give Britain credit because the big interests must have the cold cash for their products, while to redeem the loans made for the purpose of paying these big interests cash for their products, the people would have to be heavily taxed in the years to come.

HARTLEY DEWART, K. C., STATES PLAIN TRUTHS

Toronto Liberals are out Strong for Sir Wilfrid Laurier—Denounce Borden.

Toronto, Nov. 13.—A large and enthusiastic meeting was held here in support of the candidature of Mr. James Ballantyne, the labor candidate. The meeting was addressed by Mr. Hartley Dewart, K. C., M. P., and Mrs. Prenter.

Mrs. Hector Prenter was warmly applauded. It was little use, she said, to complain and rail against prices and war profiteering. "The profiteers just sit back and smile," she said. "They've got their baronetcy and they've got their profits, and they don't care. The only thing for a people of brains to do is to get rid of them both, them and the Government that made them possible." (Cheers.) She thought a union between Labor and Liberal principles was earnestly to be desired in the public interest.

Alluding to an editorial in the Conservative press stating that Sir Wilfrid Laurier was unalterably opposed to conscription, Mrs. Prenter declared the statement to be untrue. "He is for conscription if the people want it, which is a very different thing," the lady declared, "and we should keep our heads level, and not be carried away by all the nonsense that is written."

Conglomerate Elements.

Mr. H. H. Dewart, M. P. P., got a rousing reception. He paid eloquent tribute to Mrs. Prenter and her message, and scored "the aggregation of conglomerate elements falsely named a Union Government." The Liberal press, began Mr. Dewart, when he was interrupted by cries of "Our press is bought" and "The big interests have it." Mr. Dewart did not think that was fair, and just, but he believed that Liberalism could well afford to join hands with Labor in the pending struggle against the common enemy of a Government of the big interests and profiteers.

Mr. Dewart alluded to Premier Borden as the man who had headed the Government which for six long years had mismanaged the country's business and its war efficiency. He characterized Sir Thomas White as the tool of the corporations and trusts, who had opposed all efforts to make wealth pay its adequate share of war and income taxation. Sir Edward Kemp was the weakening Minister of Militia, while the two Nationalists retained their seats in the Cabinet as their reward for appealing to the basest and meanest sentiments in Quebec to beat Laurier." Mr. Meighen was passed over by Mr. Dewart as "a cheap apologist and artifice."

Hisses and Cries of "Shame!"

As to the added mixture of so-called Liberalism, Mr. Dewart said that eastern Canada, with the exception of one man, Hon. Frank B. Carvell, had no real representation from the ranks of Liberalism. Who represented Ontario Liberalism—Guthrie, Rowell and Mewburn. (Hisses, and cries of "Shame!") "We do not propose to accept such representatives," he said. He thought it also unfortunate that General Mewburn was a brother-in-law of Hon. Dr. Reid, the Minister of Railways and a member of the Borden Cabinet for the past six years, and that another brother-in-law was assigned to duty on the Pensions Board at a salary of \$10,000. "Family compact influence isn't good Liberalism," exclaimed Mr. Dewart, amid more cheers.

LANDSLIDE WRECKS CANNERY BUILDINGS

Dwelling House and Bunkhouses at Inverness Cannery are Carried Away.

During the early hours of this morning, the mountain side which towers above the cannery at Inverness, loosened by the heavy rains of the past few weeks, started moving downward. The huge mass of muskeg, trees and rock gathered momentum as it moved and meeting in its way certain of the buildings around the cannery took them with it.

The dwelling house of Mr. A. Bailey, the accountant, and the mess house, together with the bunkhouses, received all the damage. Luckily, there was only one man on the premises at the time. Mr. R. G. Johnston, the manager of Inverness, arrived in town last evening, accompanied by Mrs. Johnston and family and although their house was not threatened, they have escaped a rather alarming experience. Mr. and Mrs. Bailey left for the south only last week for a few months, and as the cannery was closed down for the season, there were few men around at the time. Dick Cruise was the only one in the building at the time of the slide, and he had a narrow escape. He managed to hack his way through the roof and escaped with a bad shaking.

The slide came right down to the railroad track, blocking it for a distance of between five and six hundred feet, and tearing down the telegraph wires in its course. The train was unable to leave this morning on account of the slide, although the work of clearing the track is being done with all expedition.

UNION GOVERNMENT

The pressing necessity of Canada today is a Union Government which does not include Sir Robert Borden nor Sir Thomas White. The events of the past six, may even three years is enough to prove that these gentlemen being continued in office is not conducive to the best interests of Canada. Sir Robert as premier has proved that he has been unable to restrain his henchmen. As a leader, Sir Robert does not lead. It is the other way about. Sir Robert makes a good follower. He follows, not the dictates of his own heart, necessarily, but rather the bidding of the coterie of financial magnates, headed by Sir Joseph Flavelle, for which Toronto is famous. This is claim to fame of which the city of Toronto may not approve of.

Most of the doings of Sir Thomas White as Minister of Finance, or rather the things he did not do, have been in the interests of his masters, Sir Robert Borden is not, neither are the people of Canada, who by their suffrage have elected him to misrepresent them. His delicacy with regard to the income tax and the war profits tax is sufficient to brand him as no friend of the people of Canada.

In the interests of the manufacturers, and the moneyed classes who draw their unearned incomes from the labors of other people, Sir Thomas White refuses to think about any reduction of the present tariff, which would tend to make the food of the people and the implements for such food production cheaper. He would rather that the manufacturing interests would be permitted to soak the people all the time. Sir Thomas as a financier may be able—he would not have held his job down were he otherwise—but the more able he is in working against the true interests of the Canadian people, the more necessary there is for a more honest man in the responsible position he holds.

The real issue before the people at this coming election

is not conscription. The Military Service Act is the law of the land. It is being obeyed, and the first class to be called have to report for duty before the date of the election. They will then be in uniform. That is not an issue. The real point for the consideration of the voters is whether they are going to permit the scandalous circumstances which have prevailed during the past six years continue. The people of Canada are being robbed in every bite they eat and in wherewith they shall be clothed. If the excess profits realized were going to win the war, few would have any objection. But most people have a very strong objection to being mulcted in these strenuous times for another man's private profit. The late Borden Government encouraged war profiteering. The late Borden Government has done nothing for the people of Canada in the way of reducing the increasing cost of living. The chief concern of the late Borden Government has been for its own friends.

They have regarded the masses of the working people as a likely field for exploitation. And we have been exploited, sure enough. There is no one but must admit it.

So long as the men who are responsible for this state of affairs are permitted to retain the direction of the nation's affairs, then just so long will this state of affairs continue.

Let the voters regard things as they really are. The real thing is whether it is possible to have a better administration of the affairs of the nation. Canada could hardly have worse than she has had lately. Sir Wilfrid Laurier, the Canadian Statesman, has pledged himself to provide the men, money and resources necessary for the support of the men at the front. His policy is to accord the first place to the soldier and the sailor in the concern of the State. His policy is to invite the ablest men in the country to form a Union Government. His policy is the organizing of the entire nation for the prosecution of the war. His policy

WILL ATTEMPT TO SALVE BARQUE SUNK IN 1874

Victoria, Nov. 10.—In a venture made profitable by war prices for copper and coal, William Benjamin, diving expert of Seattle, is salvaging the remnants of the old barque Union, which foundered in San Juan Island waters forty-three years ago while bound from Nanaimo to San Francisco.

Benjamin's records are said to set a new record on the Pacific. As far as is known, the Union wreck is the most ancient to figure in salvaging operations on this coast. For the past five years Benjamin has been casting about in an endeavor to locate the old vessel, and now that he has found it the actual salvage operations will be proceeded with rapidly.

The hulk contains 600 tons of the best Nanaimo coal, all in as good condition as when the Union sailed from the Coal City in '74.

**TRADES AND LABOR
ENDORSE SIR WILFRID**

Labor Has Nothing to Hope for
From Sir Robert Borden—
Vote for Fred Stork.

A largely attended meeting of the Trades and Labor Council was held last night. When the regular routine business was disposed of, the adjourned meeting of the union card men took place in order to decide what line of political action organized labor in the Prince Rupert district would adopt at the coming election.

There was considerable discussion and finally a resolution was moved by Mr. S. D. Macdonald, president of the Trades and Labor Council, seconded by Mr. W. E. Thompson, as follows:
"Resolved that your committee recommend that the Trades and Labor Council endorse Mr. Fred Stork, as the standard bearer in support of the Laurie policy in the coming elections, but that we do not recognize any political party." This resolution carried unanimously.

There was a very free and full discussion of the situation, Ald. Casey, Mr. W. E. Thompson, Mr. F. Shaw, Mr. R. O. Roberts, Mr. G. Rudderham, Mr. Geo. Waddell, Mr. S. V. Cox, and Mr. S. D. Macdonald being the speakers. The unanimous opinion of the meeting was that Labor had nothing to hope for from a Government under Sir Robert Borden's leadership, judging from past experiences.

The stand taken by Sir Wilfrid Laurier upon the public questions of the day in relation to real freedom and democracy promised more for the working people of Canada, and therefore it was decided that Organized Labor stand behind Mr. Fred Stork, the Liberal candidate.

TELKWA HAPPENINGS

The Hudson's Bay ranch is very busy with branding operations. They have more than a hundred head of cattle to go over.

A large bunch of cattle arrived in town on Sunday. A Blayne of Burns Lake brought them in for Broughton & McNeil.

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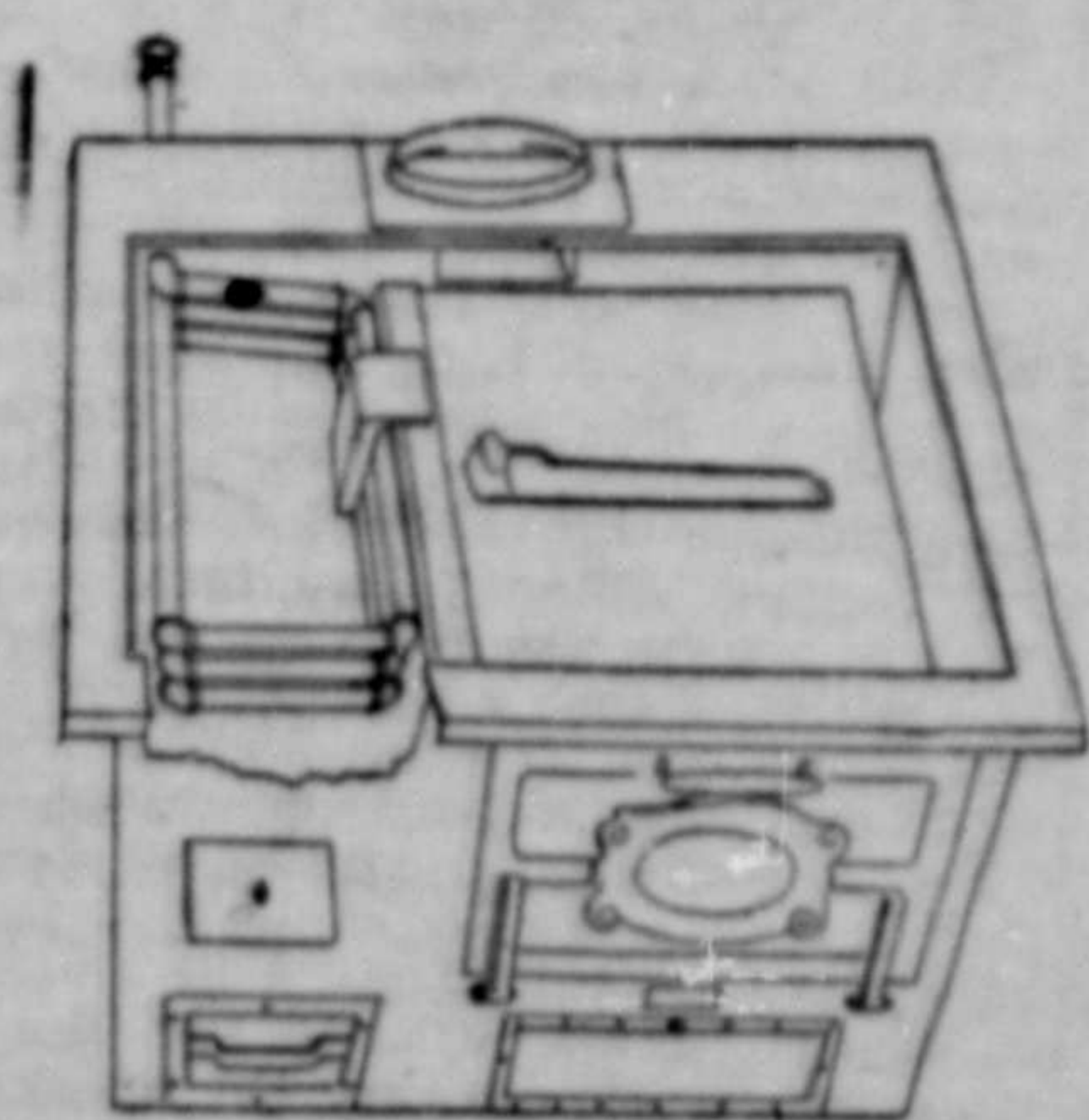
