## KERENSKY NOW DOWN AND OUT IN RUSSIA

### BRITISH GAINS AT PASCHENDAELE AND IN PALESTINE --- HUN CRUISERS CHASED

#### BRITISH MAKE FURTHER GAINS ON PASCHENDAELE RIDGE

**ENEMY DEFENCES CAPTURED AND PRISONERS CAPTURED—BRITISH LINE IS ADVANCED—IN ITALY BRITISH ARTILLERY OUTRANGES GERMAN GUNS AND CAUSES GREAT HAVOC TO THE HUNS**

London, Nov. 19.—"A successful operation was carried out late yesterday by detachments from the Highland, Berkshire and Lancashire Battalions in the vicinity of Paschendaele. Further portions of the enemy's defenses on the main ridge north of the village, including a strongly fortified farm, were captured by us. We also took a number of prisoners."

West of this locality also we have advanced our lines slightly at certain points. The enemy's artillery has again been active throughout the night on the battlefield. The German shelling has been particularly severe in the Paschendaele sector."

**Italian Front.**  
Rome, Nov. 19.—On the line of the Piave river, British artillery is in action, and the accuracy of their fire has caused the upsetting of the Hun plans for advance. The German guns are outranged and outmanned, and in many cases, their batteries have been put out of action. In the mountainous region of the Northern Alps, the enemy has also been able to enter Italian territory for a distance of four miles, and in this sector the fighting is of a particularly fierce character.

The Austro-German forces are continuing their efforts to break through the Italian line from the Asiago plateau to the sea. British monitors are operating against the enemy for the defence of Venice.

**Turks on the Run.**  
London, Nov. 19.—Another severe defeat has been inflicted

upon the Turkish forces in Palestine, which are now in headlong flight. Their supposedly impregnable positions were abandoned although they were equipped with guns, ammunition and supplies. Eleven hundred prisoners were captured.

**French Front.**  
Paris, Nov. 19.—Raids continue to be successfully made upon the German lines, in every case, resulting in the capture of prisoners, and in one case of war material. Raids took place south-east of St. Quentin, in the Champagne, east of Teton and in the Woevre. North of Courtecon and in Upper Alsace, artillery engagements were heavy. Otherwise everything is calm.

#### RETURNED SOLDIER SUPPORTING LAURIER

**Trail Liberals Nominate Revelstoke Soldier, for the West Kootenay Riding.**

Trail, Nov. 17.—Laurier Liberals of West Kootenay at a convention here nominated J. H. Maxwell, of Revelstoke, a returned soldier. He won on the second ballot. In his speech of acceptance he thanked the convention for the honor it had conferred upon him and praised Sir Wilfrid Laurier's policy. Sir Wilfrid's recent manifesto should be acceptable to anybody, he declared, amidst the applause of the delegates. John Keen, M. L. A., of Kaslo, was in the chair.

Mr. Maxwell is president of the West Kootenay Liberal Association.

Speakers at the convention spoke strongly in favor of Sir Wilfrid Laurier's policy and declared their belief that it was the best policy to win the war. Mr. Maxwell, after having been nominated, paid a strong tribute to the Liberal leader and stated his approval of Sir Wilfrid's recent manifesto.

Marcus Martin, president of the Nelson Miners' Union, and one of the chief supporters of Alderman Austin, the candidate who is running on the Labor platform, addressed the convention.

#### GERMAN REPUBLICANS ENCOURAGE DESERTION

**German Soldiers Deserting to the French use Password "Republic."**

Washington, Nov. 17.—"Republic" is their password and hundreds of German troops are surrendering voluntarily on the west front, the American Government is semi-officially informed. These surrenders are the result of the French Government's "follow-up" campaign since President Wilson's democratic appeals were showered over the German lines from Allied airplanes.

Those surrendering do so with the understanding that they are to be treated not as enemy prisoners but permitted to work for a German republic.

"The advocates of a republic of Germany," said a report to the American Government, "who are conducting a brilliant campaign from the security of a neutral neighbor state, are distributing among German homes and all through the German armies this important information: "Let 'Republic' be your password."

"To the comrades on the west front: We have secured the issue of the following general order to the French army: Whoever surrenders himself and gives the password 'Republic' will not be treated as an enemy prisoner of war. If he desires he will be permitted to work with us and with our countrymen in the same cause, for the freedom of Germany."

#### KERENSKY BEATEN BY THE BOLSHEVIKI

**His Officers Propose Giving Him Up to His Enemies as Prisoner, But He Escapes.**

Petrograd, Nov. 19.—The forces of Premier Kerensky were defeated by the soldiers of the Bolsheviki after a series of protracted battles around Gatchina and Tsarkoe-Selo. Premier Kerensky after being informed that his officers were against him and that his remaining soldiers were upon the point of deserting, had agreed to go to Petrograd to negotiate with the revolutionary committee as head of the Government, but while a guard was being arranged for him, he managed to make good his escape. His present whereabouts are unknown.

The new Government has established an eight-hour day in all industries and has abolished all night work unless in work of national defence.

The laxity with which Kerensky permitted the activities of the Bolsheviki to culminate unchecked by him, and his failure to maintain his authority in Petrograd is said to be the reason of the soldiers turning against him.

#### LAND SETTLEMENT BOARD ACQUIRE SQUARE MILE NEAR FRANCOIS LAKE

Victoria, Nov. 17.—During the recent ministerial tour into the Peace River country and that section of the trip taken in by Hon. John Oliver, the Minister of Agriculture and Railways, acquired the opportunity to purchase a tract of extremely good land, comprising 640 acres, in the Francois Lake region, about half a mile from Tatalaska Lake. The price offered to Hon. Mr. Oliver was \$5 per acre, and the completion of the deal was brought about this morning, the whole tract having been purchased by the Land Settlement Board for \$3,200, or in other words the Government price for second-class land.

In connection with this purchase, with which the Minister of Agriculture is particularly pleased, it should be noted that \$349 of the purchase price become immediately returnable to the Government for taxes owing.

Hon. Mr. Oliver states that there is an excellent road suitable for all traffic, including automobiles, from the land in question to Burns Lake, a distance of some 25 miles, which makes the transaction a particularly valuable one in conjunction with the many other development schemes now being reviewed by the board.

The 640 acres is well situated and adjoins other tracts admirably suited for mixed farming, and it is upon these sections that the Minister is keeping his weather eye for the Land Settlement Board. As yet no decision has been arrived at as to the precise disposition of the newly acquired tract, the establishment of a farm however, will doubtless be undertaken at an early date.

**QUEBEC AND CONSCRIPTION**

A dispatch published on Wednesday last from Ottawa disclosed the information that at that time, the Military District of Montreal led the whole of Canada in the percentage of Class A men who had registered, under the provisions of the

Military Service Act. And further than that, the Military District of Quebec came second. The dispatch stated that gratification had been expressed at Ottawa at the manner in which Quebec had "obeyed the law" in this respect.

This gratification is doubtless because of the fears which were held in many quarters being unfounded that Quebec would resist the law of the land. The people of Quebec were mistrusted. Their loyalty as Canadians was doubted. This mistrust and doubt has been expressed and doubtless generated in the hearts of the French-Canadians in Quebec a similar mistrust and doubt of the late and the present Borden Government, it is not to be wondered at. Such is only to be expected. But notwithstanding, the people of Quebec "obey the law."

**UNION GOVERNMENT**

One of the peculiar things to be noticed among the discussions of many people who advocate Union Government is that their desire for a United Canada is lost in their desire for a Union Government. To them doubtless, the two things are the same. But first things must come first. When we have a United Canada there will be a much greater chance for a true and real Union Government. The whole trouble is that a great number of the rabid flagwaggers, and they exist in Prince Rupert as elsewhere, have no desire to unite with the other parties. They want the other parties to unite with them. That is their idea on union as applied to government as to other things.

The same idea was in the mind of Sir Robert Borden when he asked Sir Wilfrid Laurier to join him last June. He did not say to Sir Wilfrid, "Join with me in a Union Government and together we will evolve a policy for the good of Canada." Instead he said in effect, "Join with me in a Union Government and help me to carry out my policy." Borden would not join with Laurier, but he wanted Laurier to join with him. That is Sir Robert's

**IN THE LETTER BOX**

To the Editor—I wish to more fully explain to those whom it may concern what I said at the Trades and Labor meeting about the Victory Loan.

I am an international union man and I claim the right to express my views before an assembly of my class, on any question that directly or indirectly affects their interests, and I am not easily swayed by popular waves of public sentiment. I am not a public speaker and was not at the time aspiring publicly, yet our press committee was acting entirely within their rights and the statements they published were in the main correct, but are not self explanatory.

I was speaking at the time in support of Sir Wilfrid Laurier's manifesto and referring to the part on war profiteering where he says he would not hesitate to take over factories and industries supplying war material and food production, in order to stop this evil following along the lines of wealth conscription. I made the statement that the policy of issuing Victory loans for such a cause as this only encouraged war profiteering. Hence followed the criticism as appeared in the press. principle of assisting Great Britain and our men at the front. I am prejudiced against any system of rendering assistance to our boys in uniform that offers as an inducement profits (inflated profits) in return. Canada under the voluntary system furnished 400,000 men at \$1.10 per day, and when another 100,000 was needed did they raise wages? Or family allowances? No. The law came into effect that made it compulsory for men of certain age to serve at the same old rate. But what of the other great essential in carrying on this war. The Almighty Dollar? When the public treasury of Canada is exhausted (thanks to Flavelle and Allison for their able assistance

and more money is urgently needed, does a compulsory law come into effect which would wrench from the grasp of a few selected parasites—the ill-gotten wealth they have in their possession? No. While the 400,000 brave Canadian boys are suffering all the tortures of hell on the battlefield, and while their loyal blood is washing the sands of the plains of Europe, the Manufacturers' Association, composed principally of the parasites mentioned, ably assisted by a few cheap politicians are manipulating a scheme to loan their wealth to the Government at 5 1/2 per cent. with the agreement that it must be spent in Canada to assure its going back into their grasp, and in order to hoodwink the general public the disease of war profiteering is sewn broadcast through the Dominion. At high tide, he had great difficulty in holding on to the rock, as he was all but submerged. He was much wasted with privation and exposure, but was still alive when rescued.
