

GERMAN TROOPS MOVE WEST FROM RUSSIA

KERENSKY HAS TWO LOYAL ARMY CORPS STILL WITH HIM--U.S. DESTROYER SUNK

GERMAN TROOPS BEING WITHDRAWN FROM RUSSIAN FRONT

RAILROADS IN GERMANY CONGESTED WITH TROOP TRAINS MOVING FROM EASTERN FRONT TO FLANDERS AND TO ITALY--RUSSIAN ARMY HEADQUARTERS STILL SILENT AS TO CONDITIONS

London, Nov. 21.—Dispatches received here from Holland tell of a great movement of troops in Germany. The Russian front is being denuded of all soldiers except the ordinary frontier guards. Some of the troop trains are said to be going to the western front and some to Italy. It is considered probable that some arrangement has been entered into with the de facto powers in command of the Russian capital which justifies the German High Command in taking this step. It is evident that Germany expects to do no more fighting with the Russian armies.

Russians Silent.

The Russian army headquarters are still silent as to the state of affairs existing in Russia. One report received here is to the effect that Kerensky is some ninety miles south of Petrograd with two remaining loyal army corps, but this report lacks confirmation. Famine is afflicting the Russian cities, and overshadows the interest taken in the fighting. Petrograd itself is badly provisioned, and it is considered probable that the threatened strike of the railroad men and the telegraphists have tied things up in the meantime.

CONSTANTINOPLE IS RAIDED BY AIRMEN

London, Nov. 20.—During a recent air raid over the Gallipoli Peninsula and Constantinople by British naval air service aviators, the former German cruiser Goeben, now the Turkish warship Sultan Selim, was hit and a heavy explosion caused, it was officially announced here today. A vessel named the General and reported to be the German headquarters at Constantinople, was twice hit by bombs the raiders dropped. Two hits also were obtained upon the Turkish War Office.

U. S. DESTROYER IS SUNK IN COLLISION

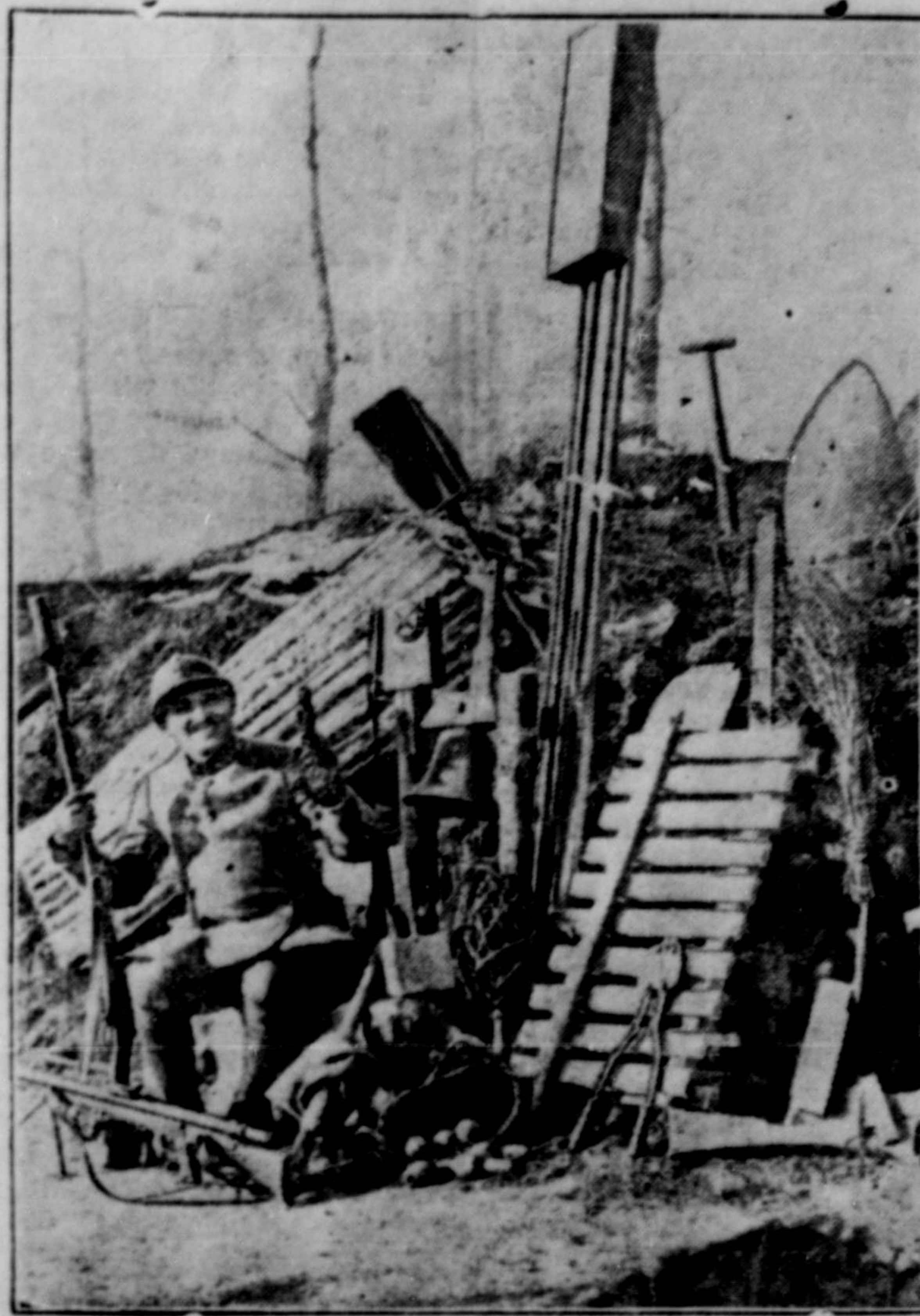
London, November 21.—It is officially reported from Washington that the United States destroyer Chauncey has been sunk in a collision in the war zone. Twenty-one of the crew are lost.

BRIGHT PROSPECTS FOR ALICE ARM DISTRICT

Vancouver, Nov. 20.—General mining conditions in the Alice Arm district are good, with great promises for big development during the next year, according to Mr. G. R. Elliott of Alice Arm, who is visiting Vancouver. The building of the Dolly Varden railway, a 20-mile stretch of road way, being installed under a special legislative act passed at the last session of the provincial house, will materially assist in the development of that section, he said.

The Spanish Group, located almost on the Alice Arm townsite, according to Mr. Elliott, appears to have a big future. It is owned by two Swedish miners who acquired the property through proceedings subsequent to a labor lien which they filed four or five years ago when unable to secure pay for work they performed there. After obtaining ownership the Swedes went onto the property and took out between \$5000 and \$7000 worth of ore in a very short time.

Mr. R. B. McGinnis, superintendent of the Dolly Varden Group, is also optimistic regarding the future of the group which he believes will become an important silver producer when rail communication with tidewater is established. The railway is supposed to be completed next summer, by which time the company expects to be in a position to operate upon a large scale.

It is reported that the Dolly Varden people have more ore on the dump now than will be necessary for the cost of building the railway.

It is also stated that some of the properties adjoining the Dolly Varden are so rich that silver ore running as high as 1000 ounces to the ton is literally sticking out.

POLITICAL CRISIS IN GREAT BRITAIN

Premier Lloyd George Retains the Confidence of Parliament After Paris Speech.

London, Nov. 21.—Premier Lloyd George has emerged unscathed from the severe test of his statesmanship during the past few days. His policy has been put under the severest criticism particularly with regard to the formation of the new Inter-Allied War Council. Mr. Asquith, the late Premier, was exceedingly severe with regard to Premier Lloyd George's speech in Paris at the Council. The new Inter-Allied War Council he said would interfere with the work of the General Staff of each of the allies and its independence, and the responsibility for its own forces.

Notwithstanding the severe opposition, the premier vindicated his position bravely and came through the ordeal victorious. Newspaper comments here today indicate that the threatened crisis has been averted, and that Lloyd George is now in a stronger position than ever.

MILITARY SERVICE ACT IS LAW AND MUST STAND

Mr. Fred Stork, Liberal Candidate, Stands for Conscription of Everything.

Discussing the issues before the voters at the coming election last evening, before leaving on a campaign tour, Mr. Fred Stork, the Liberal candidate, declared that the Military Service Act is now the law of the land, and would have to be lived up to. It was up to the Government to see that the law was enforced. "There is no question in my mind," continued Mr. Stork, "of the repealing of the Military Service Act. This Act calls for the conscription of 100,000 men, to make good Canada's promised quota, and I am in favor of the present military Service Act being carried out as it stands on the statute book."

"But," Mr. Stork went on, "if any further proposal is brought forward for the conscription of any further number of men, I will endeavor to see that the principle of conscription is applied all round, and that wealth and the conscription of all the resources of Canada are included, as well as our man power. I consider that it is a question that may well be put to the people."

"With man power only being put upon a compulsory basis, it is not fair to the soldiers that the utilization of all the other resources of Canada should be left under the voluntary system. I repeat that our soldiers are not getting a fair show. I am firmly of the belief that when the policy of conscription is put up to the people—and by conscription, I mean conscription of everything, not merely compulsory military service—I believe that it will be overwhelmingly endorsed. With the people in favor of real conscription, and Canada doing all she can, the Dominion will then be on a proper war basis for lending the most efficient aid to the Empire."

MR. G. M. HANSON ON KIPLING THE POET

Last evening in the Presbyterian Church Hall, Mr. G. M. Hanson, the United States consul, delivered an address on Kipling, the poet. The lecture was made under the auspices of the Queen Mary Chapter of the Daughters of the Empire. The Rev. Canon Rix presided and in introducing Mr. Hanson, said that it gave him a double pleasure to be present to hear Mr. Hanson, as Mr. Hanson was the man, who in the time of test, had stood up for what was right and in the interests of decency in Prince Rupert.

Mr. Hanson's lecture on Kipling was listened to by a crowded house, with very great appreciation. He gave many illustrations from the works of the poet, showing the vividness and closeness of the poet to the reader. Kipling's was not the voice of a man apart, but rather one close at hand, and friendly.

The large audience expressed its appreciation of the lecture in no uncertain manner. The evening was further enlivened with music.

DRASTIC REGULATIONS FOR ALIENS IN U.S.

Not Permitted to Approach Water Front, Docks nor Wharves in United States.

Washington, Nov. 20.—All alien enemies are required to register and to obtain permits for travel, under a proclamation issued today by President Wilson. Enemies also are prohibited approaching within 100 yards of waterfronts, docks, railroad terminals or storage houses, and are forbidden to enter or reside in the District of Columbia.

The proclamation issued as a supplement to the one declaring a state of war with Germany provides further that an alien enemy shall not, except on public ferries, be found on "any ocean, bay, river or other waters" within the United States. They are forbidden to fly in airplanes, balloons or airships, and to enter the Panama Canal zone.

This prohibition also extends to grain elevators, warehouses, railroad depots, yards or terminals which are used in connection with the docks and piers.

The attorney-general is given authority to issue orders excluding alien enemies from the vicinity of warehouses, elevators, railroad depots, yards or terminals, which are not already within prohibited areas.

Regulations also are to be prepared by the attorney-general requiring reports to federal, state or local authorities by all alien enemies after they have registered.

No alien enemy is to be permitted to move or to change his occupation without first reporting to designated authorities and receiving permission.

GREEK PEOPLE ARE WITH THE ALLIES

London, Nov. 20.—Premier Venizelos of Greece, who came to London from Italy with Premier Lloyd George said today that the spirit of the Greek people was rising and that they were preparing to participate more wholeheartedly in the war.

The premier said that only the faint hearted could be affected by the vicissitudes of the conflict, and that the determination to win the war could not be shaken.

NORWEGIANS BOYCOTT EVERYTHING GERMAN

Christiania, Nov. 20.—The Tidens Tegn says the Norwegian Water Association has passed a resolution proclaiming a complete boycott of Germany. German shipping, German trade and German citizens in Norway. The chairman of the association said that if German ships were unable to load or unload in Norway, the prohibition against exports could be abolished, and that if food should be refused to German subjects they would soon leave the country. Thus the lives of Norwegian sailors would not be exposed to the present dangers. Similar resolutions have been adopted in other Norwegian towns.

A SQUARE DEAL

In the incidence of the Military Service Act and the provisions contained therein, there is one aspect which Sir Robert Borden and his supporters prefer to leave in the background, and for which they have made no provision for dealing with. That is the conscription of men for the military forces with pay at the rate of \$1.10 per day, and the leaving of their more highly paid positions in civil life to, in many cases, the foreign born resident of the Dominion. There seems little reason for the man of military age being taken away and paid \$1.10 per day to fight for the others who are pulling down the big money. Labor is already scarce, particularly on the Pacific coast. And more labor is required. Wages are high, and will possibly go yet higher. The alien born whom the Government will not conscript, remains at home to enjoy the high wages.

In common and ordinary justice to the men in uniform, conscription must be equalized. There is no necessity for one class of the community bearing the greater burden than the other. The men who are getting the high priced jobs owing to the absence of our men at the front are war profiteers as well as Sir Joseph Flavelle.

That the working man cannot see the fairness of this deal is not to be wondered at. Most people do not see wherein lies the square deal either. If the man power of the country is to be conscripted, the principle must be extended much further. And whatever Government refuses to do something to equalize this state of affairs will assuredly have to give place to one that will.

The high wages which are paid in British Columbia reflect the demand for labor at home. The Government reiterates the demand for more men to the front, yet does nothing to equalize matters between the two demands. No one would complain were the Government to make the pay of the soldier \$5 per day. The soldier is worth it, and much

more, also. Few would complain, even among the men at work at home were the workman's and the soldier's pay equalized, while many are extremely dissatisfied at the present state of affairs.

The late Borden Government made no attempt to deal with the question of war profiteering. Instead, it openly encouraged it. Sir Sam Hughes, who was once high in the councils of the Borden Government, says that with "White lining up everything here for the benefit of the institutions, with which he and Flavelle are allied, one would almost be led to believe that the desire was to prolong the war for the benefit of certain people and institutions in Canada." That is Sir Sam's frank opinion of Sir Thomas White, and a square deal for the people of Canada need not be looked for from him.

The whole project of the National or rather "National Trust" government as Sir Sam called it, was planned long ago by Sir Joseph Flavelle and Sir Thomas White, according to the late minister of militia. And he ought to know!

No one who has the true interests of Canada at heart desires to see the return to power of Sir Robert Borden, who apparently is helpless in the grip of Sir Joseph Flavelle, and his National trust friends.

The people of Canada want a square deal all round. They want a square deal for the soldiers, who have gone to the front, and who are going. And at the same time, they want a square deal for those who are left behind. The crowd who are running Sir Robert Borden have no objection for conscription being applied to other people, but it is to be applied to themselves, that is another story. The profiteers' millions are of more importance than the lives of Canadian soldiers. Canada cannot afford to have people with such a kink in their reasoning as that directing the affairs of a great nation.

NOTES AND COMMENTS

The new Union Government is said to be a strictly non-partisan one. Liberal, Tory, Labor and Socialist are all the same and are alleged to be regarded equally by the Government. This is exemplified by the appointment of the returning officers in British Columbia. The Tory idea of a fifty fifty deal is displayed in these appointments. Out of thirteen returning officers, thirteen were formerly good Tories.

Since the days of the patriarch Abraham, Jerusalem has been an inhabited city. It has been besieged, and captured and in the possession of nearly all the old world powers one after another during the past centuries. Egyptian, Roman, Greek, Persian and Arab have successively put its population to the sword. And last of all the British are closing in on the historic city. Notwithstanding the approach of the election, there has not been any sign of any reduction in the high cost of living. An election dodge of that kind might be too costly to the profiteers.

CABINET PURCHASES
VICTORY BONDS

Victoria, Nov. 19.—On the recommendation of Hon. John Oliver, Minister of Agriculture and Railways, the Executive Council of the Provincial Government at its special sitting yesterday afternoon, agreed that the sinking funds of the Land Settlement Board should be invested in the present issue of the Victory Loan. The sum at the immediate disposal of the Board is \$26,000, and the necessary steps have been taken this morning to secure the allotment.

Before the subscription lists are closed Mr. Oliver anticipates that a similar sum will also be available for investment, authority having been obtained from the Cabinet in this connection. The Minister of Agriculture sees in the investment an opportunity for a doubly patriotic service, since the rate of interest the money can earn in the new channel will not only practically balance the rate originally paid for it by the people of British Columbia, but the capital will also help swell the Dominion coffers for the fight in the nation's cause.

The funds of the Land Settlement Board so invested will secure an advantage of some two per cent. over the present interest earning capacity, and it is with this view, as well as the service it will render to the Federal treasury, that Hon. Mr. Oliver has recommended the sum so allocated to be doubled during the life of the loan subscription lists.

CANADIAN SOLDIERS

"As the press will have told you this morning, we attacked all afternoon yesterday, and succeeded in taking all our objectives and doing it on time. The village of Passchendaele is ours. This has been the goal fought for so hard all summer. Yesterday's fight made the third successful battle we have fought since coming up here.

Before we came, the situation was that certain tactical features had to be taken. The Canadians were brought up to do the job; so far they have done it mighty well. Our success means everything to those who have to hold the line.

"The cost has been severe, but I believe the results more than justify the cost. We came at a bad season as far as weather is concerned, and a bad season for roads, trails, tramways and other communications."

ITALIAN POET-AVIATOR
IS REPORTED MISSING

London, Nov. 21.—Gabriele d'Annunzio, the famous Italian writer and poet, who has also attained to fame as an aviator of great skill and daring, is reported from Rome to be missing. In the operations against the invaders, his machine did not return from his last flight.

THE STRIKE AT
TRAIL SMELTER

No Truth in Victoria Dispatch
That Smelter Men Object
to Obey the Law.

Nelson, Nov. 19.—The situation at the Trail smelter, where 1,500 men went on strike last week is unchanged today. A proposal to arbitrate has been made by the company, but the men so far have refused.

The question at issue is said to be the demand for an 8-hour day by 450 men at the plant who have been working nine hours. The other men are out in sympathy. It is denied that the operation of the Military Service Act has caused the men's action.

The Trail Board of Trade has made a vigorous protest against the widespread and erroneous statements given out to the press that the smeltermen have walked out in protest to the Military Service Act. The demands of the men are for an eight-hour day and that alone. The statement that the Victory Loan literature was made into a bonfire is deliberate falsehood.

PERSECUTION OF
THE POLISH JEWS

The Hague, Nov. 20.—The Jewish correspondent bureau hears grave complaints from the Jews in Polish territory occupied by the Austrians. The occupying power is declared to have become daily more and more anti-Jewish, despite its promises of deliverance from "Russian tyranny," made when the Austrian army entered Poland. The use of Yiddish is forbidden, and none of the ordinances made by the Germans regulating the status of Jews in German occupied territory has been made operative in the Austrian section, where in fact the Jews possess no rights whatever.

The Austrian excuse is that old Russian discriminative law governing the position of the Jews in Poland can not be abolished, even though they are no longer operative in Russia itself, and all efforts to remedy this state of affairs have failed.
