GERMAN AVIATORS NOT AFRAID OF U.S. FLIERS

Think American Idea of 20,000 Aeroplanes on the Western Front Nonsense

Copenhagen, Nov. 20.—Captain Baron von Richthofen, Germany's leading aviator, expresses himself as unconcerned over the reported preparation to place 20,000 American aviators on the western front. He believes it will be impossible to get together so many trained pilots, as the training is long and costly and involves heavy casualties. The newcomers, he says, will, particularly at first, be unable to judge the military conditions and at least 25 per cent. of the machines will be disabled

during the long transport. Lieut .- General von Ardinne, of The Berliner Tageblatt, who reports this conversation with von Richthofen at the Flanders front, adds that the German air service. which evidently has been forewarned by newspaper discussion of the American plans, is steadily increasing its number of aviators and machines.

German fighting aeroplanes, General von Ardenne says, now carry wireless receiving outfits which enable them to engage in combat promptly with enemy fliers. This is necessitated by the German lines in a surprisingly short time. German squadrons starting from the ground to the front lines either flying or ready for flight.

German aviators say they have noted recently that a majority of stead of the region of Passchen-

General von Ardenne discusses developments of the Flanders fighting, among them the decrease in the use of hand grenades, which in close fighting are as dangerous to friends as to light machine guns and special units whose task is to seek out enemy batteries by sight or hearing. The muzzle flash of a gun, he says, is observed by from three to five stations connected by telephone and the position of the gun is determined easily. Special apparatus has been designed to determine the distance and direction from which the sound of a cannon's discharge comes



"A fundamental objection to the Government's policy of conscription is that it conscripts human life only, and that it does not attempt to conscript wealth, resources, or the services of any persons other than those who come within the age limits prescribed by the Military Service Act. This is manifestly unjust. The man who is prepared to volunteer his services and to risk his life in his country's defence is entitled to first consideration. Those dependent upon him and who spare him from their midst are the next most deserving upon the state's solicitude and care."

Sir Wilfrid Laurier has declared that he will adopt such a policy as will accord to the soldier and the sailor the first place in the concern of the state. To a great extent, the Borden Government has left the welfare of the soldiers' dependents upon the voluntary contributions of the people. So far as the Borden Government is concerned, the separation allowance is considered quite sufficient to meet the needs of the family of the soldier who has volunteered to fight for Canada.

In the leaving of this most important matter to private hands, the Borden Government has come in for some severe criticism. And rightly so, too, for permitting others to do that which is their right and duty. It has been pointed out time and again that "the measure now in force for the maintainance, care and comfort of the soldiers' dependents and families are not adequate or equitable." The matter has been brought up in Parliament. but was opposed by the Borden Government. Sir Wilfrid pertinently points out that "the necessity for action still exists and prompt action must be taken to put the soldiers and their dependents beyond any possibility of want, after the public subscriptions have ceased, and the glamor and excitement of the war have worn away."


