

RUSSIAN GOVERNMENT ASKS FOR PEACE

BRITISH ADVANCE IN WEST CONTINUES -- ITALIANS WITHSTAND HUN ATTACKS

BRITISH ADVANCE PENETRATES DEEPER INTO GERMAN LINES

GERMANS FIGHTING FIERCELY AT POINTS ON THEIR LAST LINE OF DEFENCES--ALL COUNTER ATTACKS REPULSED--VILLAGE TWO MILES FROM CAMBRAI CAPTURED--GERMAN ADMISSIONS

(Special to The Daily News.)
London, Nov. 23.—(Delayed.) The six-mile wedge driven into the German defences by the British offensive in the Arras-St. Quentin front is penetrating still deeper and spreading out. On some stretches of the front, the British troops have broken into the enemy's final lines of defence. All the German counter attacks have been repulsed.

The village of Fontaine Notre Dame has been captured in the British offensive. This village lies two and three-quarter miles southwest from the city of Cambrai, on the main road from Bapaume.

Berlin Admissions.
Berlin, Nov. 23.—The battle southwest of Cambrai is continuing. The enemy did not succeed in breaking through although he did gain a little ground beyond the German front lines. Several British tanks were shot to pieces.

No Limit.
London, Nov. 24.—The British forces have not yet reached the limit of their victory and their success is growing hourly. The total number of prisoners counted up to date is nine thousand, and great stretches of new country and fresh villages have been captured. The British advance was made in the most unfavorable weather, the heavy mist preventing the successful co-operation of aeroplanes. The latest villages to be captured are Bourlon and Moerres, while fighting is in progress in the region of Rumilly. The enemy attempted only a few counter attacks between Humilly and Noyelles, but were repulsed.

Two hundred tanks were used by the British in the great drive. The Germans were using companies of cripples and convalescents, who were forced to fight under the lash.

Stripping Cambrai.
The Germans are stripping Cambrai of its stores today, as the British and Teuton armies are locked in violent grips less than three miles from the city's outskirts. The full strength of the

U.S. STEAMER SPOKANE ON ROCKS AT IDOL POINT

Vessel Resting Easily and Hoped to Get Her Off With This Morning's Tide.

The steamer Spokane, trading between Seattle and Alaskan ports ran ashore yesterday afternoon on her way south. She took to the ground about half a mile west of Idol Point, a little distance down the coast. She had on board a large complement of passengers coming out of Alaska for the winter. The Princess May on her way north stood by the stranded vessel and transferred the passengers, who numbered two hundred and sixty-nine. There is also said to be a large quantity of bullion on board, which was successfully transferred as well.

The passengers were brought to Prince Rupert, arriving late last evening, and this morning many were taken on their voyage south by the Princess Sophia, which arrived from the north today.

When the Prince Rupert passed the stranded vessel during the night, her lights were all burning, and she appeared to be resting easily, with lots of water astern. From her position, it appears that she would be able to float with the high tide this morning. Even if her hull is holed forward, her bulkheads should be sufficient to permit of her being beached in a more accessible position.

AN ARMISTICE REQUESTED BY RUSSIAN GOVT.

Commander in Chief Ir Ordered to Negotiate With German Army Commanders—Peace is Proposed.

(Special to The Daily News.)
Petrograd, Nov. 23.—(Delayed.) The Russian Government yesterday ordered General Dukowin, the commander in chief, to open negotiations for an armistice with the commanders of the enemy armies. A proposal to negotiate peace was officially conveyed to the ambassadors of the allied nations at Petrograd.

Peace Notes.

Petrograd, Nov. 24.—Trotzky has handed peace notes to all the Embassies represented at Petrograd. He thinks that it is now time for all the exhausted nations to stop the unexampled slaughter. The soldiers have all been warned not to allow any of their generals to defeat the aims of the Maximalists.

WHOLE OF CANADA IS UP AGAINST BORDEN

Opposition to Borden Union Government Evidenced all Over the Dominion.

Ottawa, Nov. 23.—The extreme dissatisfaction of the people of Canada with the regime of Sir Robert Borden and his alleged Union Government is evidenced by the fact that in ninety-five per cent. of the constituencies the Union Government candidates will meet with opposition at the polls at the coming election. The seats which go by acclamation are very few, and the fact of so many in opposition to Sir Robert Borden is proof that his idea of Union Government is not being endorsed unanimously by the electors.

Even in the late Tory strongholds in Ontario, the Liberal and Labor candidates are receiving the support of the leading citizens, and the chances of the Government's nominees are not considered good, even by their own supporters.

The fact of the Government practically nominating their own candidates instead of leaving it to the electors themselves has turned many electors against the Government on account of its autocratic manner of trying to fix up things to suit itself. The supremacy of the Tory party in the affairs of the alleged Union Government is becoming more and more apparent every day in their manner of doing things.

THE NEW QUEBEC BRIDGE

MR. A. M. MANSON ON THE BRITISH CONSTITUTION

Striking Address Delivered to the St. Andrew's Society Last Evening.

The St. Andrew's Society had an open night last evening, when before a large gathering of members and friends, Mr. Alex. Manson, M.P.P., delivered an address upon "Some phases of the British Constitution." The comfortable club rooms were filled to overflowing and a most entertaining and instructive time was enjoyed by all present. Mr. Manson referred to the British Parliament as an emblem of the evolution of Democracy among a liberty loving people. The supremacy of Parliament was and is the one thing that is unquestioned. Mr. Manson went into the past and quoted the sonorous language of Coke and Blackstone, whose dignified words are equally significant to the generation of today as to that in which they were written. The British Parliament is the mother of Parliaments and has formed the model for many others.

In a democracy, Parliament is supreme. Its powers are unlimited, and should perchance misgovernment fall from its dictum the subject has no remedy. Mr. Manson also dealt with government by order-in-council and Royal Proclamations.

Both before and after Mr. Manson's address, musical numbers were rendered by the members, which were much appreciated. Mr. J. H. McMillan gave some violin solos, and songs were rendered by Mr. A. Clapperton, Mr. Sinclair and Mr. R. Dowther.

During the course of the evening, Mr. J. G. Steen, the first vice-president, presented the prizes to the winners at the St. Andrew's Billiard Tournament, Messrs. S. D. Macdonald, T. McNameon, Irwin and G. Russell being the recipients. The meeting was closed with the singing of the National Anthem.

FIGHTS STORMS IN GULF OF ALASKA

Juneau, Nov. 23.—Twenty-two days out from Kodiak, the little cannery tender Minnie B., which had about been given up for lost, arrived here Sunday night showing the effects of a hard battle fought for existence while crossing the Gulf of Alaska. Except for a few empty oil drums forward, the little vessel was light and encountered storm after storm, being in the blinding snowstorm in which the fishing steamer Manhattan was wrecked.

The Minnie B. stopped at Hoonah, where she picked up the six missing members of the crew of the Manhattan. They had previously been rescued by the Canadian fishing steamer James Caruthers and brought to Hoonah. The men reported they were well inside the cape at Icy Straits and in safe waters, but were suffering badly from exposure and want of food and water. On their arrival at Hoonah they were immediately arrested by Deputy U. S. Marshal H. E. Morton and brought here on a charge of looting the wrecked steamer Al-Ki November 1.

SHIPPING LOSSES

(Special to The Daily News.)
London, Nov. 24.—The shipping losses are again showing an increase. Ten large vessels over 1,600 tons and seven vessels under this tonnage were sunk by submarine last week. Of the French losses, one was a large steamer, and two fishing craft were also sunk.

Within the last five days, German destroyers have sunk five Dutch fishing boats.

HUN EFFORTS FRUSTRATED BY ITALIANS

Attempt to Encircle the Italian Northern Wing Failed—Repeated Attacks Made—Tear Shells Used.

(Special to The Daily News.)
Rome, Nov. 24.—A great encircling attack was made yesterday by the Austro-German forces against Monte Melita, but the Italian troops held on to all their positions. The action was preceded by a heavy bombardment of tear producing shells. During the attacks the enemy forces were constantly renewed, and several positions were taken and retaken more than once. The casualties on both sides were heavy.

Piave Safe.

The battle of the Piave river is near to a finish. The gigantic struggle is gradually developing to the disadvantage of the invaders, who now move slowly. The Italians are offering a tenacious resistance. The Austro-Germans have reached only a few of the outstanding positions on the Monte Serra line.

Suits Berlin.

Berlin, Nov. 24.—Fighting is progressing favorably for the Austro-Germans in the Italian mountains between the Brenta and Piave rivers.

French Front.

Paris, Nov. 24.—Artillery fighting continues active in the sectors of Cerney and Juvin-court. An attempt of the Germans to recapture ground taken by the French on the Aisne front has been repulsed.

MUST NOT ABANDON THE POLITICAL OFFENSIVE

DO SOMETHING

For a long long time, the people of Canada have been appealing to the Government for some relief from the always increasing high cost of living. Since ever prices took such a great jump, coinciding with the outbreak of the war, the ordinary man who has to work, whether in receipt of wages or salary, has felt the pinch. Wages have increased to a much greater extent than salaries, but even at that, the man who works has practically no margin left at the end of the month. The increasing costs of all commodities always keep pace with any increase in the wages.

The late Borden Government did nothing in the way of protecting the people against the rapacity of the plunderers, the people who made the prices to show excess profits. They appointed a Food Controller, but there has been no result evident to the man who works that his appointment has brought about any definite result. Appointing a Food Controller means nothing so long as he does not or cannot control prices.

The new Borden Union Government have done nothing in the matter either unless to issue a few "vague promises." With regard to food prices "it was natural to expect that the reconstructed government would give serious attention to the situation of the country, which is admittedly critical. There is no allusion to it except the vague promise of 'effective measures to prevent excessive profits, to prohibit hoardings, and to prevent combinations for the increase in prices.' The economic problems have to be grappled with at once in no such vague general terms, but in vigorous and concrete proposals."

For the man who works, the high cost of living is one of the factors which will influence the manner in which he votes at the coming election. In order to live, at present he has to pay away practically all he can make in order that he and his family may live. There is but little margin for the investing

in the Victory Loan out of the present rates.

In distinction from the "vague promises" put forth by Sir Robert Borden, there are the concrete proposals of Sir Wilfrid Laurier. Sir Wilfrid is not afraid to face the facts as they are. The consumers at present have to pay too much. The profiteer at present is getting away with too much, of which he is robbing the consumer. Sir Robert Borden is content that the profiteer should exploit the people to his heart's content. To Sir Robert's way of thinking, that is as it should be. To the way of thinking of Sir Wilfrid Laurier and the great mass of the people it is not as it should be.

What is up to the voters at the election is to say whether they are content with the present state of affairs. If they prefer to have to pay two prices to the profiteer for their food and clothing, and almost every thing else they buy, Sir Robert Borden and his Government they will vote for. If they are content that the profiteer be allowed to get away with his excess profits, Sir Robert Borden will see to that.

If the voters have liked the conditions which have arisen in Canada during the past six years; if they are content that things would slide along in the same old way, Sir Robert Borden can be depended upon. But if on the other hand, the voters think that there is room for improvement in the handling of Canadian affairs, if they want to see a reduction in the high cost of living, if they want to see the whole resources of the Dominion utilized to their fullest extent in the winning of the war, they will not vote for Sir Robert Borden. And if the Prince Rupert voters want to see any progress in the city of Prince Rupert, they will vote for Sir Wilfrid Laurier, the man who put Prince Rupert on the map.

NOTES AND COMMENTS

Organized Labor in Canada sees the difference between Conscription and Compulsory Military Service. Compulsory Military Service only conscripts the man power of military age. That is only part conscription. Both Labor and Laurier are together in that the principle of Conscription should be applied to a much greater extent than to mere man power. The necessity is equally great, and even greater.

The other evening Prince Rupert's Civic Finance Minister made a little slip, which enabled the public to see something of what had been going on for a while back. Mr. Nelson informed the meeting he was addressing in the interests of the Union Government Candidate that as far back as June last he had been in correspondence with General Currie and with Colonel Peck. He had been corresponding further back than that too, although he did not say so. And who heard of Union Government last June?

The same reason exists in Prince Rupert for defeating the machinations of Sir Robert Borden and the Tory party, even if they do call themselves Unionists for the time being, as exists in Ontario. In that province there are straight Liberal candidates in at least seventy-five ridings, and Labor candidates in the remainder. The "National Trust" cabinet—there is no fifty-fifty divide with imported Liberals—has no longer got the confidence of the people.

Notwithstanding the alleged Union Government, the chief apostle of profiteering still holds down his job. There is no sign of Sir Joseph Flavelle getting the go-by yet.

BRITISH SOLDIERS ARE CONFIDENT OF VICTORY

London—Reuter's representative has had an interview with Lord Robert Cecil, who has just returned from a visit to the British front. He said he was immediately impressed by the wonderful organization and also by the general atmosphere. From general to private the feeling is that the British army is invincible, and that it can do anything and go anywhere. It is literally true of the British soldier that he is sans peur et sans reproche. This is partly due to the British nature and partly to the spirit of the men. They believe at the bottom of their hearts in the cause for which they are fighting, and they realize that their enemy is "Kaiserism." There is a complete absence of crime, which in itself is unique, and it is a remarkable fact that after three years' sojourn in a foreign country the inhabitants have nothing but good to say of the British. Every soldier profoundly realizes that victory is necessary as the foundation of peace, and before this can be achieved we have got to convince the German military caste that we are the victors. The Germans think that might is right. We have already beaten them, and shall complete our victory, because we know that right is right. In conclusion, Lord Robert said a visit to the British front is a great mental and moral tonic, but it is not less a confirmation of the horrors of war. It makes the difficulties, hardships, and even dangers of those at home assume their proper proportions.

POINTS OF INTEREST FOR INTENDING VOTERS

There are many points about the Dominion elections act as affected by the war time elections act and the new provisions which will be applicable to the voting in the coming elections.

The following are some points which will be of interest to the voters in the coming federal election:—

Where provincial requirements as to residence cannot be applied at the time of making the lists the residential qualifications of voters is one year in the province and thirty days in the electoral district prior to the issuance of the writ of election.

Wives, widows, mothers, sisters and daughters of persons, male or female, alive or dead, who are serving or who have served outside of Canada in any of the military forces of Canada or Great Britain or within or without Canada in any of the naval forces, excepting such female relatives of persons who have ceased service in otherwise than an honorable manner are entitled to vote. No such relatives of persons who have joined the naval forces of Canada since the passing of the war time election act on September 20, 1917, will have the vote.

Lists to be Posted.

Fifteen days before the polling day (Dec. 17) lists of the voters in each polling subdivision will be posted in said subdivision. The enumerators then sit two hours p.m. day for ten days preceding polling day to revise the list, answer inquiries and execute transfers of votes of election officers and agents whose duties may take them away from the polling subdivision on election day. Up to five days before election the enumerator may upon the representation of any credible person add or strike off the lists any name.

There are no printed lists. On election day electors whose names are not on the lists may appear before the enumerator who sits within or near the polling place. If they are entitled to vote they are given certificates. Any person who is refused a certificate may demand and obtain a written refusal which entitles him to a ballot which is sealed in a non-velope and not counted excepting in case of a recount and then only upon proof of his right to vote. Votes of persons challenged are treated in the same manner.

There is an enumerator in each polling subdivision. Entirely new lists are being made out in Prince Rupert. The lists when completed will be posted outside the polling booths or outside the postoffice.

May be Sworn.

Every person, whose name is on the list, can be sworn by candidate, agent, or elector, and if the oath is refused the voter loses the right to cast a vote in the election. The oath is:

"You swear that you are legally qualified to vote at this election, that you are of the (male or female) sex, a British subject, resident of Canada, and of the full age of 21 years. (In case of a female voter the following is added): You do further swear that you are the (wife, widow, mother, sister or daughter as the case may be) of a person who is serving or has served without Canada in the military forces (or within or without Canada in the naval forces) of Canada or of Great Britain in the present war."

The following people are unqualified to vote:

Those judges of every court whose appointment rests with the governor-in-council;

Persons disenfranchised for corrupt practices under the act; Criminals, lunatics, inmates of poor houses and such institutions;

Any person who has applied for exemption from military service on conscientious grounds and who has not been refused;

All Mennonites and Doukhobors excepting those who may have enlisted;

Every naturalized British subject who was born in an enemy country and naturalized subsequent to March, 1902, excepting those who have enlisted and served out of Canada in the Canadian or British armies, or in or without Canada in the navy; or have tried to enlist and been refused because medically unfit; or those who are grandparents, parents, sons, or brothers of such as who have so enlisted or tried to enlist; or those who are or

have been during the present war members of the parliament of Canada or any province; or those Syrians and Armenians who are Christians; or those who are females entitled to the vote through relationship to a soldier.

Every person who has been convicted of an offense against the military service act has no vote.
