GERMANS FIGHTING HARD FOR CAMBRAI

ITALIAN LINE UNSHAKEN--COSSACKS ARE CONTROLLING RUSSIAN GRANARIES

GERMANS COUNTER ATTACKING FIERCELY WITHOUT AVAIL

BRITISH POSITIONS ON HIGH GROUND DOMINATING CAMBRAI ASSAILED REPEATEDLY--ALL ATTACKS REPULSED HEAVY BOMBARDMENTS AT PASCHENDAELE AND AT VERDUN AND YPRES

(Special to The Daily News.)
London, Nov. 28.—New attempts have been made by the Germans to drive the British from their positions on the high ground dominating the Cambrai region and in the Bourlon wood have failed. General Byng's men have repulsed another enemy counter attack on the northeast corner of the wood. Fighting has been particularly severe around Moeuvres, west of Bourlon, and in the outskirts of Montaine Notre Dame, immediately east of the wood and in the direction of Cambrai. German artillery has been particularly severe in the Verdun and Ypres regions, while in Flanders, the British positions at Paschendaele are being heavily bombarded by the enemy.

French Front.
Paris, Nov. 28.—Further progress has been made on the right bank of the Meuse, where the first and second lines of the German defences were captured, on a two mile front. The German efforts to counter attack were checked by the French artillery.

Italian Front.
Rome, Nov. 28.—French and British soldiers have reached the fighting zone on the North Venetian plains to aid the Italians against the invading Austro-German forces. Between the Brenna and the Piave Rivers the Italians are withstanding successfully the massed enemy attacks. Great losses have been inflicted upon the enemy, whose forces have been heavily reinforced. It is estimated that about twenty divisions have been concentrated in the attempt to break the Italian line.

RUSSIA'S GRAIN LANDS IN COSSACKS' CONTROL

Lenine Now Has German Advisers—Bolshevik Rule Said to be a Ghastly Failure.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Nov. 28.—Information has been received here that a number of German staff officers have arrived in Russia and are acting in an advisory capacity to Lenine. To the south and west of Petrograd, the Russian gold and grain lands are in good hands. General Kaledine, Hetman of the United Cossacks, controls all the regions which produce the crops. The Bolshevik rule is said to be just a ghastly failure, and beyond the present chaos, the real forces of the Empire are working to restore order. The transport system has broken down, the troops have no bread. Discontent is rife and the soldiers are almost ready to rush into civil war.

KITCHENER WILL NOT APOLOGISE TO BORDEN

FRED STORK ADDRESSES THE TRADES AND LABOR COUNCIL

LARGELY ATTENDED MEETING LISTENS TO LAURIER CANDIDATE DISCUSSING THE ELECTION ISSUES—REAL MATTERS OF IMPORTANCE TALKED OVER—FREE DISCUSSION

The Carpenters' Hall was filled to capacity last evening at an open meeting of the Prince Rupert Trades and Labor Council. Every union man in the district had been invited to attend, and the invitation was largely taken advantage of. Mr. S. D. Macdonald, president of the Council, presided.

In his opening remarks, the president gave a resume of the steps taken by the Council at previous meetings, by which Labor had decided to support the Laurier candidate. Organized Labor had declared itself in favor of conscription, provided that real conscription was applied, and in addition to manhood, wealth and production were conscripted as well. Recognizing that the winning of the war was the matter of prime importance, the president declared that anything that would take away the support of the boys at the front, he would oppose, and fight vigorously, even in the ranks of Labor.

In order to reduce the high cost of living, Mr. Macdonald emphasized the necessity for Government control of the food factories. With a food controller appointed for the past year, prices had steadily advanced. The Borden Government had actually done nothing to reduce prices. For the production of war material, the Government shops could turn this out cheaper than the profiteering contractors. The Prince Rupert drydock was quoted as an instance of what had not been used. Mr. Macdonald quoted a remark made previously to the effect that had the drydock plant been working since the beginning of the war, it could have helped as much to win the war as the hundred thousand conscripts.

It was thought that if the voluntary system had been given a proper chance and instead of the soldiers being paid \$1.10 per day, and their widows and dependents being left to a great extent to look after themselves, had a decent rate of pay been given and proper provision made for dependents, there would have been no lack of recruits. Instances were given of the working of the Patriotic Fund, which had caused great dissatisfaction.

"Labor will do everything to help the men at the front," concluded the president, "but the man higher up must do his share as well. Up till now he has done only one thing, which has been to grab every dollar possible, at the expense of the workers."

Questions were invited regarding any points, and were satisfactorily dealt with.

Mr. Fred Stork, the Laurier candidate, then addressed the meeting. He showed how the Laurier programme of 1911 had been unacceptable to the "interests" in Canada and how they had lined up divergent parties to defeat him. The reciprocity issue would have been for the benefit of the people, but that did not suit the moneyed classes. Had Laurier's programme been acceptable to the profiteers, they would not have been so anxious to defeat him. Yet notwithstanding their objection to reciprocity six years ago, the Borden Government had been compelled to introduce it in some measure. The same was to be said regarding the bugbear of conscription which the Borden Government raised in the province of Quebec six years ago. They then had Quebec with them

against conscription. The issues of that election were not discussed on their merits. And on this election, the same tactics were being pursued. The issues were belabored. The real issue now is the record of the Borden Government, the record of the past and the record of its doings. This, however, did not suit the party in power. The war question was the one which would most effectively centre the attention of the people of Canada, to the exclusion of all else, and conscription had been dragged into the situation for the only purpose of befogging the public mind, and to embroil the public in argument.

Mr. Stork questioned the sincerity of the Borden Government with regards to conscription. The urgency of the matter prevented it being put to the people, yet the Military Service Act took 103 days to go through the House, but the bill for the C. N. R. \$10,000,000 steal only took 29 days. Deputy Speaker Rainville assured the people of Quebec that the Military Service Act would not apply to them, while Mr. A. T. Crerar, the Minister of Agriculture, assured the Ontario farmers that it did not apply to them. The Borden Government's idea of conscription left all the other resources of the Dominion untouched. Wealth was severely left alone. The Borden Government refused to conscript excess profits. Yet for winning the war, the burden ought to be placed equally through the

THE REAL ISSUES

The unanimity with which the Conservative party all over Canada has taken up the cry of Union Government at this late date is one of the curious things to be considered at this election. The Tories are all good Unionists—this time. What about three years ago, when the real necessity was? It is only after the Parliament has been dissolved that this new cry came into being, as a popular issue. And it is proving to be anything but popular. The public memory is said to be short, but the people of Canada still remember something of Colonel J. Wesley Allison. They have not yet forgotten about the host of scandals; about paper shoes, the drugs, the Ross rifle, the army truck, the C. N. R. steal, and they are not permitted to forget about Sir Joseph Flavelle.

These are only some of the things which the Borden Government allowed the attempt being made to shove across and get the people of Canada to foot the bills. With Sir Robert Borden and his profiteers returned to power under the new name of a Union Government, the people of the Dominion will probably be mulcted still further.

Just consider the grave dug on Prince Rupert's principal avenue, which the people have to pay to keep drained. It was supposed to be for a post office site, and was purchased at many times its real value. That was one thing which the Borden Government slipped over the people of Prince Rupert. For three years the drydock has stood idle, which in time of national stress, has been permitted by the Borden Government. Rather than see anything develop here, they would rather the city was shut down and be relegated to limbo. Most of the Prince Rupert people came here in the expectation of the city going ahead. Whatever the city has gained has been not because of, but in spite of the Borden Government.

They had the power to set things a humming here. Everything was ready, but rather than have the Prince Rupert

plant, one of the completest on the coast, do anything to win the war, the Borden Government, in collusion with the chairman of the Munitions Board, that arch profiteer, Sir Joseph Flavelle, would rather have new shipyards, machine shops, etc., built in other places.

And when that sly politician, Sir George Foster, came to Prince Rupert, he reported it to be "the town under the curse." The curse was the administration to which he belonged, that is the Borden Government. Once Prince Rupert gets from under that curse, the Borden Government, there will be some hope for progress. That is what the Prince Rupert people have to consider. "Obey the law," said Sir Wilfrid Laurier. The Military Service Act is law. It is being obeyed. That is not the issue. The real issue is the record of the Borden Government, its attitude towards the people of Canada, and to the people of Prince Rupert in particular.

LOYALTY

Words are sometimes bandied back and forth in our daily intercourse until their real meaning and significance are lost. Loyalty is such a word. We hear it used on every side, until we wonder if the true significance of loyalty is understood.

Does loyalty show itself in moving along the line of least resistance and shouting with the crowd when shouting seems to be good? If the waste and carnage in human life counts for nothing, then merely a breath is required to declare our loyalty. But if the sacrifice of hopes, the giving up of lives, of ambitions, just as precious as those we cherish, grips our very souls, makes bleed our hearts and arouses us to fight and fight hard in the struggle for fair play and human rights, then we may say we have an abiding sense of loyalty.

Grant unto us this spirit at the time of our country's greatest need and may we give, even though there is horror in the thought of war, our sweetest

FLIES FROM BRITAIN TO MEDITERRANEAN

London, Nov. 26.—The Admiralty announces that a successful air attack in the vicinity of Constantinople has been successfully accomplished by a large British bombing airplane, which flew from England to a British base in the Mediterranean in a series of eight flights.

The stopping places included Lyons and Rome, and the total distance covered was nearly 2,000 miles.

The machine was actually in the air thirty-one hours. This is believed to be the world's record for a cross-country journey and for the weight carried.

PREPARING THE GERMAN PEOPLE FOR DEFEAT

German Newspapers Declaring British Gains are of no Importance.

Amsterdam, Nov. 26.—The German newspapers are preparing the public for the loss of Jerusalem. The Nord Deutsche Allgemeine Zeitung says that to cling to places "which would bring us no military advantage would be tantamount to the useless sacrifice of numerous Turkish forces and our own troops and would likewise involve serious losses."

After discussing the difficulty of reinforcing the defenders it says:

"Anyway, the abandonment of Jerusalem, which is within the bounds of possibility, certainly would be an extremely painful loss, in view of the city's great historical value, but no military change would be caused by such a course."

Lieut.-General von Ardenne in the Tageblatt, attributes the Turkish retreat from Jaffa to the great range of the guns of the British fleet and adds:

"Jerusalem is not equipped for defense. Therefore it is not improbable that this advanced position would be abandoned by the Turks."

He insists that this will in no way alter the military situation.

Regarding the British drive on the Cambrai front, the Lokal Anzeiger of Berlin says:

"British attempts to break through collapsed entirely in the face of the great bravery of our troops. It went no further than the initial success, an eruption into our positions which must be without effect on the neighboring positions and which the enemy tried to extend in vain owing to the powerful thrusts of our forces."

"The enemy will not succeed by this abortive attack in diverting our attention from Flanders, where he is certain to renew his efforts which now have become a necessity in order to rid himself of the U-boat bases which are so dangerous to him. Moreover, the attacks near Cambrai and Craonne certainly will not exercise the slightest influence on the situation in Italy."

The fire chief has received a telegram today telling of the safe arrival back in Halifax of Andy Hepburn who used to be the comptroller of the Red Devil. It is expected he will arrive here in a few weeks.

people, share and share alike. The matter of the aliens in the country taking up the jobs of the conscripted men was also referred to. The British subject is conscripted for \$1.10 per day, while the alien gets his job at five and six times as much. That is one thing which demands correction.

Mr. Stork scored the Borden Government regarding the local postoffice site, and its joy riding commissions. The fisheries question was also touched upon and with regard to the idle drydock. Mr. Stork said: "We have had six years of the Borden Government and we don't require six years more to find out what they intend doing with the drydock."

At the conclusion of Mr. Stork's address, the president invited questions from any of the audience and many were asked, in reply to which Mr. Stork explained his stand with regard to the subjects mentioned. Among these were tariffs, enemy alien wages, the Patriotic Fund, the repeal of the Military Service Act, and labor questions generally. Replying, Mr. Stork stated that only that day he had been asked if he would support the repealing of the Military Service Act and his answer was "no." With regard to labor questions, these he would judge on their merits, apart altogether from partyism. There were many other speakers taking part in the free discussion before the meeting closed.

McMullin shall be allowed to swear to the death of the said deceased as occurring on the 8th day of July, 1917, after the expiration of one month from the date of the first publication of notice of this order, unless in the meantime proof is furnished to the Registrar of this Court at Prince Rupert, B. C., that the said deceased, Jacob Jarvis, was alive subsequently to the said 8th day of July, 1917.
