THE WHIRLWIND

The fact that from one end of Canada to the other, a strong opposition to the Union Government proposals of Sir Robert Borden is evident, shows that a large section of the people in Canada are suspicious of Sir Robert Borden and his Government in this connection. It can not be said either that the people have no good ground for that suspicion. The whole manner in which this Borden Union Government idea has been staged after the first glance, would make anyone suspicious. It is only when the election is in sight that the Borden Government become so surprisingly strong for Union. True, an impossible offer was made to Sir Wilfrid Laurier in the fore part of the year, but the terms were such that made Union impossible. And Sir Robert Borden well knew what he was about.

The Borden Government have had no use for a strong Union Government since the war broke out until now, just before the election. They didn't want it. Some of the Liberal members of the Union Government might have had something to say regarding what was going on and that couldn't be thought of. The wicked Grits might spill the beans. The Borden Government didn't want the Liberals to join in with them during the past three years particularly. And so little do the Tories want the Liberals to join in with them even yet that the alleged Union candidates were handpicked. Any Union candidate would not do. He must have the seal of approval stamped upon him. Even in British Columbia, two members of the Borden Union Government had to come from the East to tell the people who they were to be allowed to vote for.

The Borden Union Government has got the masses of the people against them in this election. The reason is not hard to find. The Borden Government has deliberately permitted the people to be exploited by the profiteers in the first place and encouraged rather than restrained them. With

the purchasing value of the dollar down to about fifty cents and the Government doing nothing to prevent the other fellow getting away with it, no one can blame the ordinary voter if he thinks that it is time some one else was at the head of a government which would do something to represent the true interests of the people they are supposed to represent.

The people of Prince Rupert have more than that against the Borden Government. They have the sight of an idle dry-dock reproaching them day by day. The Borden Government has permitted this reproach to continue. Instead of fulfilling its destiny and taking a share in the winning of the war, the Prince Rupert plant has done nothing. Time and again has the state of affairs existing here been brought to the attention of the Borden Government. They knew that Prince Rupert has a plant capable of turning out munitions and war material. But they did not even utilize the resources ready at hand, in the hurry of supplying the soldiers at the front. Instead, the Borden Government would prefer to wait until new factories, shipyards and machine shops were built, so that munitions and war supplies could be turned out at a profit for some of their own friends.

Remembering these things, amongst others, amongst many others, the Prince Rupert voter will be able to judge Sir Robert Borden and his Government upon their merits. In less strenuous times almost any one of the issues before the electors would be sufficient to defeat any administration which had handled them in the manner of the Borden Government. The obliquities, however, are many. Very many more numerous than the credit accruing from the desire to win the war.

POINTS OF INTEREST FOR INTENDING VOTERS

There are many points about the Dominion elections act as affected by the war time elections act and the new provisions which will be applicable to the voting in the coming elections.

The following are some points which will be of interest to the voters in the coming federal election:—

Where provincial requirements as to residence cannot be applied at the time of making the lists the residential qualifications of voters is one year in the province and thirty days in the electoral district prior to the issuance of the writ of election.

Wives, widows, mothers, sisters and daughters of persons, male or female, alive or dead, who are serving or who have served outside of Canada in any of the military forces of Canada or Great Britain or within or without Canada in any of the naval forces, excepting such female relatives of persons who have ceased service in otherwise than an honorable manner are entitled to vote. No such relatives of persons who have joined the naval forces of Canada since the passing of the war time election act on September 20, 1917, will have the vote.

Lists to be Posted.

Fifteen days before the polling day (Dec. 17) lists of the voters in each polling subdivision will be posted in said subdivision. The enumerators then sit two hours per day for ten days preceding polling day to revise the list, answer inquiries and execute transfers of votes of election officers and agents whose duties may take them away from the polling subdivision on election day. Up to five days before election the enumerator may upon the representation of any credible person add or strike off the lists any name.

election day electors whose names are not on the lists may appear before the enumerator who sits within or near the polling place. If they are entitled to vote they are given certificates. Any person who is refused a certificate may demand and obtain a written refusal which entitles him to a ballot which is sealed in a envelope and not counted excepting in case of a recount and then only upon proof of his right to vote. Votes of persons challenged are treated in the same manner.

There is an enumerator in each polling subdivision. Entirely new lists are being made out in Prince Rupert. The lists when completed will be posted outside the polling booths or outside the postoffice.

May be Sworn.

Every person, whose name is on the list, can be sworn by candidate, agent, or elector, and if the oath is refused the voter loses the right to cast a vote in the election. The oath is:

"You swear that you are legally qualified to vote at this election, that you are of the (male or female) sex, a British subject, resident of Canada, and of the full age of 21 years. (In case of a female voter the following is added): You do further swear that you are the (wife, widow, mother, sister or daughter as the case may be) of a person who is serving or has served without Canada in the military forces (or within or without Canada in the naval forces) of Canada or of Great Britain in the present war."

The following people are un-qualified to vote:

The judges of every court whose appointment rests with the governor-in-council;

Persons disenfranchised for corrupt practices under the act; Criminals, lunatics, inmates of poor houses and such institutions;

Any person who has applied for exemption from military service on conscientious grounds and who has not been refused;

All Mennonites and Doukhobors excepting those who may have enlisted;

Every naturalized British subject who was born in an enemy country and naturalized subsequent to March, 1902, excepting those who have enlisted and served out of Canada in the Canadian or British armies, or in or without Canada in the navy; or have tried to enlist and been refused because medically unfit; or those who are grandfathers, parents, sons, or brothers of such as who have so enlisted or tried to enlist; or those who are or have been during the present war members of the parliament of Canada or any province; or those Syrians and Armenians who are Christians; or those who are females entitled to the vote through relationship to a soldier.

Every person who has been convicted of an offense against the military service act has no vote.
