RUSSIANS AND HUNS TALK PEACE SUNDAY

NO NEWS FROM WEST FRONT -- GERMANS SWITCH TROOPS ON ITALIAN FRONT

CHANCELLOR IS PROUD AND THANKFUL FOR ARMY'S SUCCESS

ASKS GERMAN PEOPLE TO HOLD OUT -- AIM OF U-BOATS IS REACHED -- RUSSIAN ENVOYS WILL MEET GERMANS ON SUNDAY TO DISCUSS ARMISTICE -- AUSTRIA AND HUNGARY NOW READY FOR PEACE

(Special to The Daily News.)

Berlin, Dec. 1.—The war situation was reviewed before the Reichstag yesterday by the Imperial Chancellor, von Hertling. He asks the people to hold out and declares that the country is ready to enter into peace negotiations with Russia. He says that the U-boat warfare has reached its intended aim. He is proud and thankful that the army has been "successful nearly all the time." He issues a warning to Italy, and intimates that the enemy would do well to listen to reason and humanity.

Ready for Peace.

Amsterdam, Dec. 1.—The Central Empire is now ready for peace. The Austro-Hungarian foreign minister, Czernin, has sent a reply to the Bolshevik proposals regarding an armistice. These form a satisfactory basis upon which to open negotiations. This decision may confirm the disinclination of the United States to declare war upon Austria.

Pay no Attention.

Paris, Dec. 1.—The Allied representatives at Paris pay no attention to the German Chancellor's speech yesterday.

Socialists in Control.

London, Dec. 1.—The Socialists now control Russia. The government of Lenin has fallen. The new coalition cabinet which has been formed, includes Bolshevik members. Russian peace envoys will meet the Germans on Sunday to discuss an armistice. A secret treaty between Britain, France, Russia and Italy has been given out by the Bolsheviks.

AIRMAN SHOULD HAVE BEEN MORE POLITE

British Headquarters in France, Nov. 27.—There has not been much humor in the fighting on the Hindenburg line, but one incident occurred which is making the whole British air service laugh today. One of the youngest British airmen was flying at a low altitude when four of the enemy opened on him. He swooped down and shot three of his opponents as he swept by. The fourth machine gun kept firing and the aviator, in a spirit of boyish mischief, leaned over the side of his car and wriggled his fingers in a joyous derision at the German. Just as he was in the midst of this interesting performance his opponent put a bullet squarely through the palm of the airman's open hand.

The airman presented himself at a dressing station and when queried, admitted the truth with crestfallen face. His consolation for his wound was roars of laughter and advice to be more polite to the Boche in the future.

GERMANS MOVE TROOPS BEHIND THEIR LINES

Rome, Dec. 1.—Italian aviators today reported a heavy movement of troops behind the German-Austrian lines. It is believed that the enemy in despair of success in forcing a breach in the Italian lines, is preparing to move men for blows elsewhere. An intense artillery bombardment all over the Italian front is reported today.

No News From West.

London, Dec. 1.—There is no news from the western front. In Palestine, along the whole front from northwest of Jerusalem to the Mediterranean Sea, the Turks are making demonstrations, but have in no way affected the British positions.

Casualties.

The British casualties during the month of November amounted to 25,844 killed, and 94,445 wounded.

Sammies in France.

Paris, December 1.—National Guardsmen from every state in the Union have arrived safely in France.

INDIANS OBJECT TO THE MILITARY SERVICE ACT

The Port Simpson Band, Kitkatla Band, Hartley Bay Band and Kispiox Band of Indians are objecting to the Military Service Act conscripting Indians, on the grounds that the Indian has never been recognized as a citizen of Canada. They have been treated as minors and wards of the Government, and have not been accorded even the rights of a foreigner to hold property. Under these circumstances they contend that having been considered by the Government in this light and not having the privilege of voting or exercising any say in the laws and government of Canada, they should not be called upon to fight. They agree that this is a war for democracy, but they contend that the Canadian Government has not shown itself to be very democratic toward the Indians and it should not compel those whom it has treated as children to come forward now and take the place of men on the battle fronts of Europe, until it accords these Indians the civil rights which they believe they are entitled to.

These Indians have petitioned Sir Robert Borden and Sir Wilfrid Laurier along these lines. They are also forming a General Council for the purpose of handling all matters of common interest to the Indians.

POLITICAL SCRAP

Sherbrooke, Que., Dec. 1.—Nine Union supporters were under medical treatment today as the result of a fracas at a political meeting here yesterday, when the anti-government mob tried to prevent Ballantyne and Doherty making addresses in support of the Unionist candidates.

THE SITTINGS OF THE ASSIZE COURT

The hearing of the evidence in the charge of sedition against Eric Bruce, of Massett, was resumed yesterday afternoon before Mr. Justice Clement, and the jury in the court house. Constable Emmet was sworn and testified to the words used.

In the cross examination it was brought out that the accused originally came from Leicester in England, where he had received a good education. He could speak several of the European languages and was a splendid musician. This latter fact was borne out by Constable Emmet. He did not remember which port he left, nor which port he arrived at in Canada, but remembered working in a mill at or near Toronto. There was a hiatus between then and his arrival in the Queen Charlotte Islands. He had about 126 names. The accused left himself in the hands of the witnesses. If they said he used the words complained of, he must have said them.

Mr. Fleishman, counsel for the defense, submitted that as the words used by the accused had not weakened the loyalty of the witnesses in any way, there was no sedition. There was no ulterior purpose behind the remarks. This was the view that the jury took, and a verdict of not guilty was brought in, with a rider that the prisoner be taken care of by the authorities.

WHEN THE DEVIL WAS SICK, THE DEVIL A SAINT WOULD BE

Ottawa, Nov. 29.—The feature of the opening sitting of the annual meeting of the Commission of Conservation here was the annual address of the chairman, Sir Clifford Sifton. Probably the most outstanding recommendation made by the chairman was one in regard to waterpower development. He suggested that an international commission should be named as a means of guaranteeing the best and most economical development and division of power between the United States and Canada.

Sir Clifford also dwelt upon the necessity of eliminating political patronage in connection with the forestry work, declaring that there is no branch of the public service that will benefit more by the abolition of patronage.

Sir Clifford announced that it was the purpose of the Commission of Conservation to undertake without delay the preparation of an inventory of the natural resources of Canada.

LORD LANSDOWNE AFRAID PEACE MAY COME TOO LATE

WANTS ALLIES TO REVISE WAR AIMS—FEARS PROLONGATION OF WAR MAY LEAD TO RUIN OF CIVILIZED WORLD—LETTER REPUDIATED BY BONAR LAW—CALLS IT A DISASTER—WORST TIME FOR SUCH

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Dec. 1.—A great sensation has been created throughout Great Britain by the publication of a letter from Lord Lansdowne in which he pleads with the Allies for a revision of their war aims. He is afraid that the prolongation of the war may lead to the ruin of the civilized world and fears that peace may come too late to be a blessing.

Mr. Andrew Bonar Law, Chancellor of the Exchequer, repudiates Lord Lansdowne's letter and referred to it as a disaster. "There can be no discussion of the freedom of the seas," he said, "while the German submarines are at large."

The Morning Post says that Lord Lansdowne could not have chosen a worse time to make his appeal.

WHAT THE VOTERS HAVE TO CONSIDER

SOLDIERS MAY ATTEND POLITICAL MEETINGS

Montreal, Nov. 30.—By reason of a change in the King's Regulations through an Order-in-Council at Ottawa, officers and soldiers will now be able to attend political meetings. Major-General E. A. Wilson yesterday received a letter from Coy. C. S. McInnes, the Deputy Adjutant-General, informing him of this change.

Hitherto the King's Regulations prohibited any officer or soldier instituting or taking part in any meetings, demonstrations or processions for party or political purposes in barracks, quarters, camps or their vicinity and under no circumstances could either attend such meetings wherever held in uniform.

FIRST WINNER OF THE MEDAL BACKS LAURIER

Lieutenant Chuddy, of the C. E. F., the first winner of the Military Medal among the Canadian overseas troops, is running as the straight Laurier candidate in one of the Ontario constituencies. Lieutenant Chuddy believes in winning. After winning the Military Medal, he intends winning this Ontario seat in Parliament for Sir Wilfrid Laurier.

HELD!

The latest information from the battle front in Italy indicates that the great offensive of the Austro-German forces which was successful in sweeping back the Italian armies and recapturing from them in a few days all the gains which they had so laboriously made in two years, was staged by Hindenburg. Having got so far, he finds himself unable to get forward any further. The position is similar to that on the western front. Hindenburg is going to make another line — another Hindenburg line in Italy.

The German troops are digging themselves in and preparing winter quarters, on the line of the Tagliamento river. The Hindenburg line in France has proved to be rather elastic and the Hindenburg line in Italy will be no less invulnerable. Only this week the Italian army has shown that it has not lost its driving force, when it resumed the offensive and caused the enemy to alter his opinion as to spending the winter in Rome. In the west, the British artillery is shelling Cambrai, and the Germans are unable to shake the British hold upon the dominating heights which menace their possession of this important railway junction. The Hun is about due to make another strategic retreat.

THE FLOWING TIDE

The meeting of the voters on Thursday evening, which gathered to hear Mr. Fred Stork, the Liberal Candidate, was significant of public opinion in Prince Rupert. So far as this city is concerned, the popularity of the Borden Government, if there really ever was such a thing, is distinctly on the wane. The voters are beginning to take notice, that there is really some difference between the two parties in this Dominion. The city of Prince Rupert itself is an object lesson. Instead of a stream of workers passing in and out of the gates of the drydock daily; instead of the clang and clatter of the busy ship-

yard building ships to carry the produce of Canada to help the Allies in beating the Germans, we find silence. The \$2,000,000 investment which has been made in this drydock plant is not bearing interest. It is doing nothing to win the war. Why? That is a question that has been asked by the people of Prince Rupert for the last three years. Why?

The Borden Government is asking the loan of money from the people of Canada. The building of new machine shops, boiler shops and shipbuilding yards have all had to be financed during the past three years at a much greater cost than in the pre-war days. And all the time, in Prince Rupert there has been one of the completest and most up to date plants all ready for use, which the Borden Government refuses to use. This failure to utilize one of the resources of the country is not by inadvertence. The matter has been brought to the notice of the Borden Government and to the notice of the Borden Government's side-kicker, Sir Joseph Flavelle, of the Munitions Board, not once, but many times. This ignoring of Prince Rupert must, therefore, be deliberate, of malice aforethought. There is no economic reason. Economically, all the reasons are for having something started. The progress of Prince Rupert at this present juncture depends to a certain extent upon the drydock plant. Up to three years ago, that was the attraction which brought many a man north—many men who have since got tired waiting.

But the Borden Government has done nothing for Prince Rupert, when they could have done so very well, without prejudice to any other city. They have failed in their duty to Prince Rupert. They have failed in their duty to the Dominion by not utilizing this resource which lay to their hands. And now they want Prince Rupert to vote to put them back again in power to keep this plant idle for some time longer. Every vote for Borden will just keep the drydock idle so much longer. Made in Canada.

Bella Coola is STILL UNDER WATER

Victoria, Nov. 30.—Assuring of course that Bella Coola would be free from further floods, at least for a time, Hon. T. D. Pattullo betook himself thither last week for the purpose of taking stock of the damage to this locality and with a view of securing information for the Government in regard to corrective measures in the future. But he took no waders with him, neither did he wire ahead and charter a boat to meet him at the docks. The Minister, however, returned to his office at the Parliament Buildings this morning with the first news that Bella Coola, within a comparatively short period, had had another visitation from the waters of the great Northland.

Had to Wade to Town.

When he reached the town on Wednesday last he was obliged to wade knee deep to the hotel and waist deep to one section of the town he was desirous of reaching. No other means was at his disposal. He was literally penned within a small area and quite unable to proceed to Hagensburg, whither it had been his intent to go on his trip. He waited until Thursday in the hope that the waters would subside sufficiently to permit of the resumption of his journey. A few inches only did they recede and when he left Bella Coola in the evening the town was just like a huge lake with the buildings and wreckage from the former disaster presenting, to say the least of it, a very melancholy appearance.

The Minister reports that the people generally are taking their large share of ill luck as philosophically as possible although it has been an exceedingly trying time, with financial loss not the least of the trouble.

NO CALL COMING TO MARRIED MEN

Toronto, Nov. 29.—The first statement by Sir Robert Borden on his arrival in Toronto was one making it clear that there would be no call of the married men—Class 2—to the overseas army in February, as intimated by Judge Winchester at a Tribunal session held on Tuesday.

"It is anticipated that all requirements can be met out of the class already called up," declared the Premier. "I observed that statement with surprise. There is no authority whatever for any such statement, and there is no necessity, so far as I am aware, for any such course as he outlines. Up to the present time no such course has been under consideration either by the Minister of Militia or the Government as a whole."

BELGIAN RELIEF SHIPS SUNK BY THE GERMANS

Washington, Nov. 29.—In response to the German government's denial of responsibility for the sinking of the Belgian relief ships, the commission for relief in Belgium made public tonight the text of a protest against Germany's submarine warfare methods forwarded to Berlin through the Spanish and Dutch governments last April.

The protest called attention to the fact that nine relief steamers had been attacked, most of which had safe conduct passes. Most of them, when fired upon, it was pointed out, were in the safety zone provided by the German government.
