## AWFUL DESTRUCTION CAUSED IN HALIFAX

### WHOLE BLOCKS LAID FLAT--PROPERTY DAMAGE \$200,000,000--HUNDREDS KILLED

#### HALIFAX IN RUINS THROUGH EXPLOSION AND FLAMES

COMMUNICATION ESTABLISHED WITH DEVASTATED CITY YESTERDAY AFTERNOON—TWELVE HUNDRED KILLED, THOUSANDS INJURED—PROPERTY DAMAGE TWO HUNDRED MILLIONS

(Special to The Daily News.)  
St. John, N. B., Dec. 7.—The city of Halifax is now suffering from one of the greatest catastrophes which has ever happened to any city in Canada. Nearly half of the north end of the city is lying flat. Hardly a building remains. The dead are lying thick in the streets, and all the hospitals are filled to overflowing. Many of the injured have been compelled to walk about untreated, as there is not sufficient accommodation remaining in the city to take care of them. Up to 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon, the flames were raging throughout the ruined portion of the city, but at that time, they were got under control, although vast clouds of smoke are still rising from the holocaust pile.

**Collided.**  
The French munition ship *Mont Blanc* was leaving her pier, early yesterday morning, when in some manner she was rammed by a Norwegian relief ship carrying foodstuffs. The munition ship took fire, and on the flames reached her cargo of munitions, she blew up with a tremendous explosion, the concussion of which caused the contents of the ship to explode as well, and not a house in the city escaped damage. The explosion caused conflagrations to break out over an area of two square miles, which burned furiously till well on into the afternoon.

**Richmond Destroyed.**  
The suburb of Richmond, which lies further up the harbor, is totally destroyed. The force of the explosion was such that pieces of iron and shrapnel were found three miles from the waterfront. The damage to property is estimated at two hundred million dollars and among the buildings destroyed are the new deep water freight terminals belonging to the Canadian government at the north end of the city. No report has yet been received about the ocean terminals, and it is believed that they have escaped undamaged. A number of the C. P. R. operators were among the injured.

**Casualties.**  
The death toll is estimated at about twelve hundred, and is being added to hourly. Two thousand persons have been severely injured, while thousands more with slighter injuries were compelled to wander about helpless through the wrecked streets all day, unable to find accommodation. The civic authorities have organized relief for the sufferers, but with such a large portion of

the city uninhabitable, they have been laboring under extreme difficulties.

**Direct Advice.**  
Direct advice last night from the ruined city stated that the disaster was caused by the blowing up of a French munition ship, which was rammed by a Norwegian ship carrying foodstuffs. Property damage has been enormous. The berth of the cruiser *Niobe* was near the affected area and her fate is unknown. All the buildings along the waterfront were blown to pieces and the area of destruction covers several miles. The Canadian government depot used by the C. P. R. collapsed and the big Government repair plant at Willow Park in the northwestern section of the city was wrecked. The whole section of the city north of the Queens Hotel has been destroyed by fire. Special trains with doctors and nurses are en route to Halifax.

#### BRITISH MAKE GAINS NEAR LAVACQUERIE

London, Dec. 7.—Bourlon is like a pocket of hell today. The ground is pockmarked by the dread disease of war. Corpses are scattered around thickly, while the defenders are too busy to bury them. The horrible stench from these torn and mangled remains rises to mingle with the fumes of exploding shells loaded with Prussian gas, while overhead the Boche shrapnel bursts in an everlasting barrage. The British lines southwest of Lavacquerie have advanced slightly.

#### PRINCE RUPERT BARBERS HAVE RAISED PRICES

A meeting of all the barbers in Prince Rupert was held last evening, when the question of prices was discussed. In view of the ever rising cost of everything used by barbers, it was felt that to equalize things a small raise in the price of haircutting would have to be made.

All barbers' supplies have made sharp advances recently and there is no sign that they have yet reached their maximum. This change in prices will take effect from December 10, but will not affect the prices for children.

#### "THE LOVE THIEF"

#### NOT A SEPARATE BUT GENERAL PEACE WANTED

London, Dec. 7.—Leon Trotsky, the Russian Bolshevik foreign minister, now declares that the Russian government does not desire a separate peace, but a general peace among the belligerents. **Hostilities Suspended.**

Berlin, Dec. 7.—The suspension of hostilities over the whole Russian front for ten days has been arranged, beginning at noon today.

**Discuss Terms.**  
Petrograd, Dec. 7.—The representatives of Germany, Austria-Hungary, Turkey and Bulgaria met the Russian emissaries at Brest Litovsk to discuss the terms of the armistice.

**Trotsky's Threat.**  
Stockholm, Dec. 7.—Trotsky is apparently carrying out his threat to detain in Russia all British subjects, until the Russian prisoners in England are released.

#### VILLAGE OF AIYANSH WIPED OUT BY FLOODS

From further details which have reached town, the floods on the Naas river have been more serious than was at first presumed. The damage and loss has been very extensive. The Indians of the village of Aiyansh, Greenville and another have practically lost all their possessions. Their horses and cattle have all been drowned and the scene is one of devastation everywhere.

The natives of these three villages are now all the guests of the village of Gitiakdamiks, some two miles further up the river, which escaped. The flooded area was covered with water to a depth of from ten to twenty-four feet. Houses, plank walks, the carcasses of the horses and cattle and anything that would float have been carried down the river for miles until they met some obstruction, and all the way down the river is dotted with the wreckage.

The teacher and the nurse appointed by the Department of Indian Affairs had a rather exciting experience. The rising waters had reached the first floor of their house before they were rescued. The Indians were all out in the boats and canoes trying to save as much of their effects as possible, and the two ladies were the last to leave the drowned village. Their stock of provisions for the winter is all gone.

It is now expected that the inhabitants of these four villages will all combine at Gitiakdamiks from now on, which will be one good thing coming from this cataclysm, as it will do away with their tribal feuds.

#### SHIPS SUNK

#### WHAT THE VOTERS HAVE TO CONSIDER

The Military Service Act was alleged to be necessary because the boys were perishing at the front. They were allowed to perish for four months while the bill wended its leisurely way through Parliament. Still, it was to save the boys from perishing!

The C. N. R. steal of up to \$10,000,000 was to save that amount for the financial pirates of Toronto, the friends of MacKenzie and Mann. It passed through Parliament in two months.

The War Time Election Act was to save the election for the Tories and to save the Borden government's skin. It passed in six weeks. And yet some folk wonder who the Borden government is most concerned about, whether their own re-election or the boys at the front.

The idea of a Union government suggests something altogether different from the idea of the Union candidates being opposed in the great majority of the ridings throughout the Dominion, at the coming election. The desire to have Borden leading the alleged Union government cannot be said to be unanimous. It is a queer sight to see Borden crying for union after having done all that he possibly could to divide Canada, to set the English-speaking peoples against French Canada. Borden did it deliberately.

The local Conservatives are the official starters of Colonel Peck in this election campaign. They were in communication with him for a long time before there was any talk of Union Government. Chosen by the Conservatives first to back Borden and the great Conservative party, there is no great difficulty in backing Borden and an alleged Union government, now.

The Borden Government gave the vote to the women relatives of the soldiers and sailors because it thought their vote was sure for them, and not because of any right of the women of Canada. The Borden Government did not give the vote to any other women because it knew that the women had sized them up in the kitchen. A full dinner pail is the best critic a government can have.

Remember, that a vote for the Borden Union Government is a vote for the nine men who control all the banks, insurance and transportation companies in Canada. They control Borden, Laurier would control them. That's why the election contest is so bitter. They want to retain their strategic position, whereby they can continue to hold up all Canada at their pleasure. A vote for Stork will help to bust this ring of profiteers.

#### SAYS LAURIER WILL SWEEP ONTARIO

"There is every evidence," said Mr. McKinnon Stewart, who arrived in the city last evening on a business visit, "that the Unionist candidates throughout Ontario have already the fear of defeat in their hearts. I have attended many of their meetings just before leaving for the west, and beyond their appeals to sentiment and their exaggerated expressions of loyalty, combined with vilification of Quebec and everything French-Canadian, they have no actual argument to put forward for the return of Sir Robert Borden to power.

"The graft scandals and the high cost of living, together with the paltry treatment meted out to the dependents of the soldiers who are already overseas are proving stumbling blocks which the Unionists cannot get over. The argument that no one party is in itself strong enough to curb the profiteer does not go down in Ontario, because the people there know that Borden never even attempted to do anything in this direction. If he had even tried, he would have given some evidence of his good faith in this matter. But he did not.

"I have not depended upon the accounts of the important Liberal meetings as given in the press," continued Mr. Stewart. "I have taken the precaution of attending several of them myself, and what actually happened and the press reports do not always agree. In many cases, these meetings are not reported at all in the big dailies. Public feeling in Ontario is deeply aroused at this election. More so than any other I remember of and my memory goes way back. Dissatisfaction is extreme among the Ontario people with the manner in which the Military Service Act is being carried out. Ontario gets treatment of one kind and Quebec another. Rainville's letter was only too true, and from the way in which the instructions he said were issued are apparently being carried out, it is evident that the Borden Government never intended the Military Service Act to be imposed upon Quebec. The Ontario people are being inflamed against French Canada by the press, which is doing its best to accentuate any feeling between the peoples of the two provinces.

"I cannot understand," went on Mr. Stewart, "how Borden and his supporters can reasonably call themselves Unionists, when they are doing all in their power to cause disunion in eastern Canada. The whole thing is a farce. Mind you, I am not speaking as a Liberal. I voted upon my convictions for Borden at the last election, but there are thousands like-minded as myself this time in Ontario, who will not vote for Borden this time, and from the conviction that he is not the best man to return in the true interests of Canada. Above all, I am a Canadian, and to me the interests of Canada and the Empire come first. If I am any judge, Laurier will sweep Ontario this time."

#### SWISS NEUTRALITY

#### ANOTHER HUN AIR RAID ON LONDON CITY

Twenty-five Enemy Aeroplanes Cross Coast—Six Bomb City and Start Fires—Two Brought Down.

(Special to The Daily News.)  
London, Dec. 7.—Five different squadrons of German aeroplanes made a determined attack upon the city of London early yesterday. Crossing the coast line in different places, six of the enemy machines managed to get above the city at different points. Bombs were dropped which started conflagrations in several districts.

Two of the enemy machines were brought down by the anti-aircraft gunfire and their crews were captured alive. Seven persons were killed and twenty-five were injured severely. The remainder of the Hun aeroplanes were driven off by the British aviators who rose to the attack immediately the alarm was given.

Bombs were dropped at Sheerness, Gravesend, Chatham, Dover and Margate by the enemy machines.

**WHO RULES IN CANADA?**

The people of Canada are about to be given one of the chances, which do not come very often, of expressing their opinion regarding the government of the country. The men who are elected are supposed to be responsible to the voters for their actions in Parliament, just as the members of the Cabinet who are chosen for that high office, are supposed to be responsible to the House. This responsibility, however, is not all one sided. While the member of Parliament is responsible to his electorate, the voters are to a certain extent responsible for their member. They are at least responsible for his election, or rather should be, for under the provisions of the War Time Elections Act, which the Borden Government armed itself with before quitting, it is possible that a whole lot of irresponsible votes may be thrown in to the credit of a candidate whom these particular voters know nothing about.

In this election, the alleged Union Cabinet, composed of fourteen Conservatives and eight Liberals, are appealing for support as being the Union of all that is best in Canadian political life. On the other hand, this alleged Union has been repudiated by Liberals from one end of the country to the other. This is shown by the nomination of 228 straight Liberals to contest the alleged Union candidates. With a minority of Liberals, the Borden Government now calls itself the Borden Union Government, but it remains a Borden Government just the same.

Feeling has been rising all over Canada during the last six years among the people against the doings of the Borden Government. Organized labor, the backbone of the Dominion, is against the Borden Government, and for very good reasons. The Borden Government cannot show any one thing they have done during their period of office which was done in the interests of the people at large. Their policy has always been directed by the big interests, for whom democratic

legislation means the sharing of the great wealth they have heaped up and still continue to heap up. Time and again has the voice of the people been heard in protest against the high costs of living. The demand for the proper treatment of the dependents of the soldiers has remained unanswered. The public indignation against graft and profiteering has been answered with the appointment of white washing commissions which have resulted in nothing being done other than the spending of more of the money which the people have to put up, in joy rides.

But on the other hand, when the manufacturers want a little more profit, they have no difficulty in getting the British preferential tariff removed. They have no difficulty in restraining the food controller from doing anything but tell the people to eat less. They have no difficulty in fact in getting the Borden government to do anything they like to ask. The people of Canada are alive to these things. They have suffered from the misdeeds of the Borden Government for six long years. And the people will be responsible themselves for the kind of government they will get during the next Parliament.

Sir Robert Borden and his cabinet have proved themselves to be no friend of the people. They flimflamed the people of Canada once on the issue of reciprocity by the fear of annexation by the United States. Their argument is now that if Canada does not send 100,000 men to France, the Germans will win the war. That's what it comes to. And at the same time, the Borden Government has deliberately refused to place Canada on a war basis in other things. They have refused to tax adequately the immense war profits. They have refused consistently to utilize the resources of Canada to the fullest extent. Rather than touch the profiteer's ill gotten gains, they will pay 5 1/2 per cent, for the loan of the people's money, which the people will ultimately have to pay

themselves. They have refused to utilize the national shops for the making of war material, which might have been produced at cost. They have refused to utilize the Prince Rupert drydock plant, while financing the building of other shops elsewhere. Their whole history is one of greed and rapacity in their own interests.

Condemned as Conservatives, the Borden Government hopes to get by at the election as Unionists. Let them hope!

Isn't this a funny election? The true patriots, the flag wagers, only want to conscript the man power of Canada, while the "traitors" the party which the Kaiser would vote for want to conscript the whole power of Canada, which includes the profits of the war profiteer, to defeat Germany. Sort of paradoxical, isn't it?

And even the thousands of returned soldiers on board the "Olympic" cried with one voice, "To hell with Borden." That is a most severe judgment to pass upon any man, yet it is given by the boys who have been through hell itself with paper shoes and rifles that jammed! Considering everything, it is no wonder they said "To hell with Borden". Strong language, indeed, but justifiable from strong men.

Peck stands for Borden, who conscripts human life only and lets the rich man off lightly. Stork won't stand for Borden and his profiteering friends any longer and wants conscription—real conscription all round. The ordinary voter can size things up for himself.

The real issues of this election are on the one hand Peck, Borden, profiteering, part conscription; and a divided Canada; or Stork, Laurier, cheaper food, adequate taxation, conscription all round and a United Canada. Which will you choose?

**WHO WOULD THE KAISER VOTE FOR?**

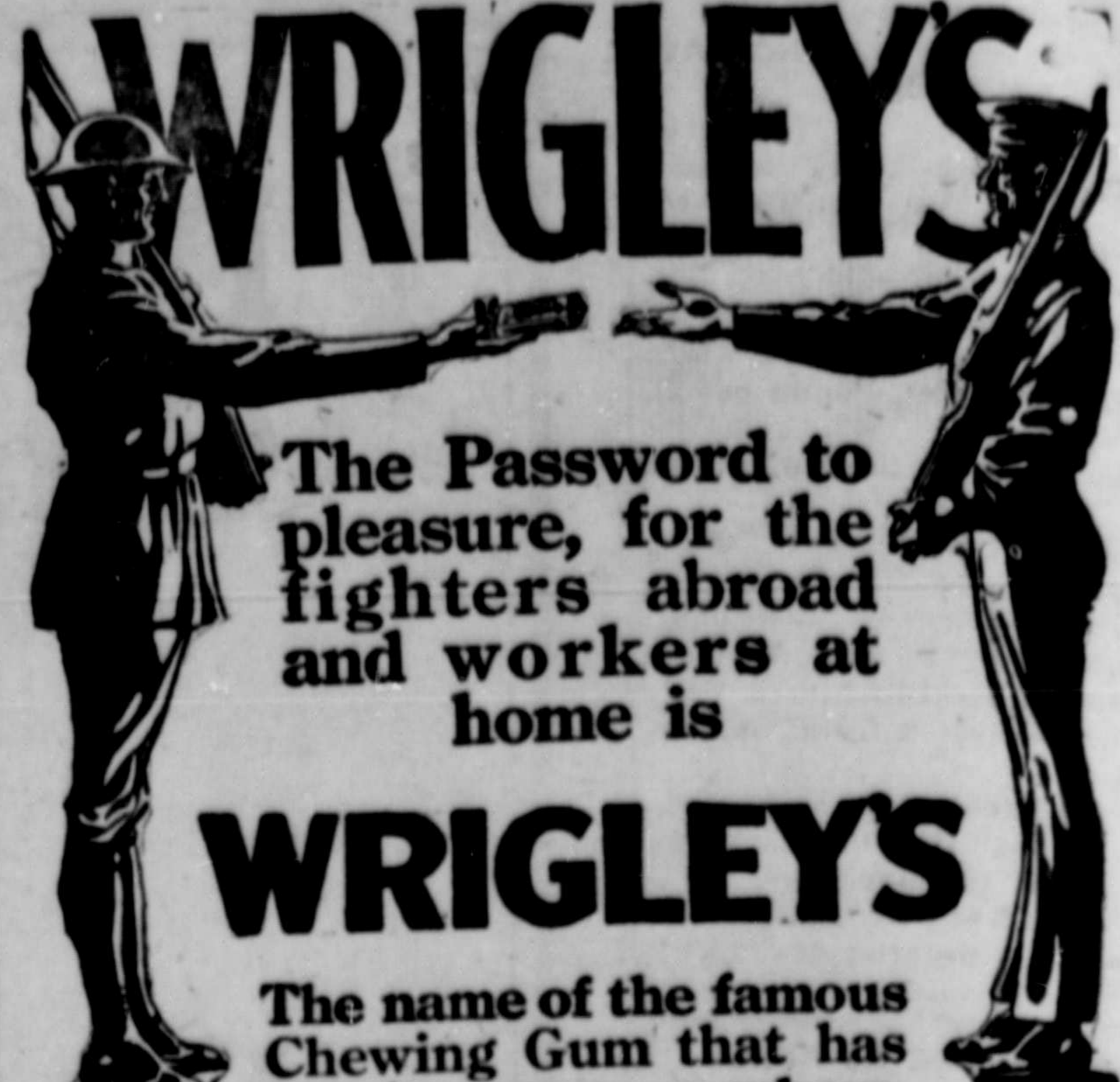

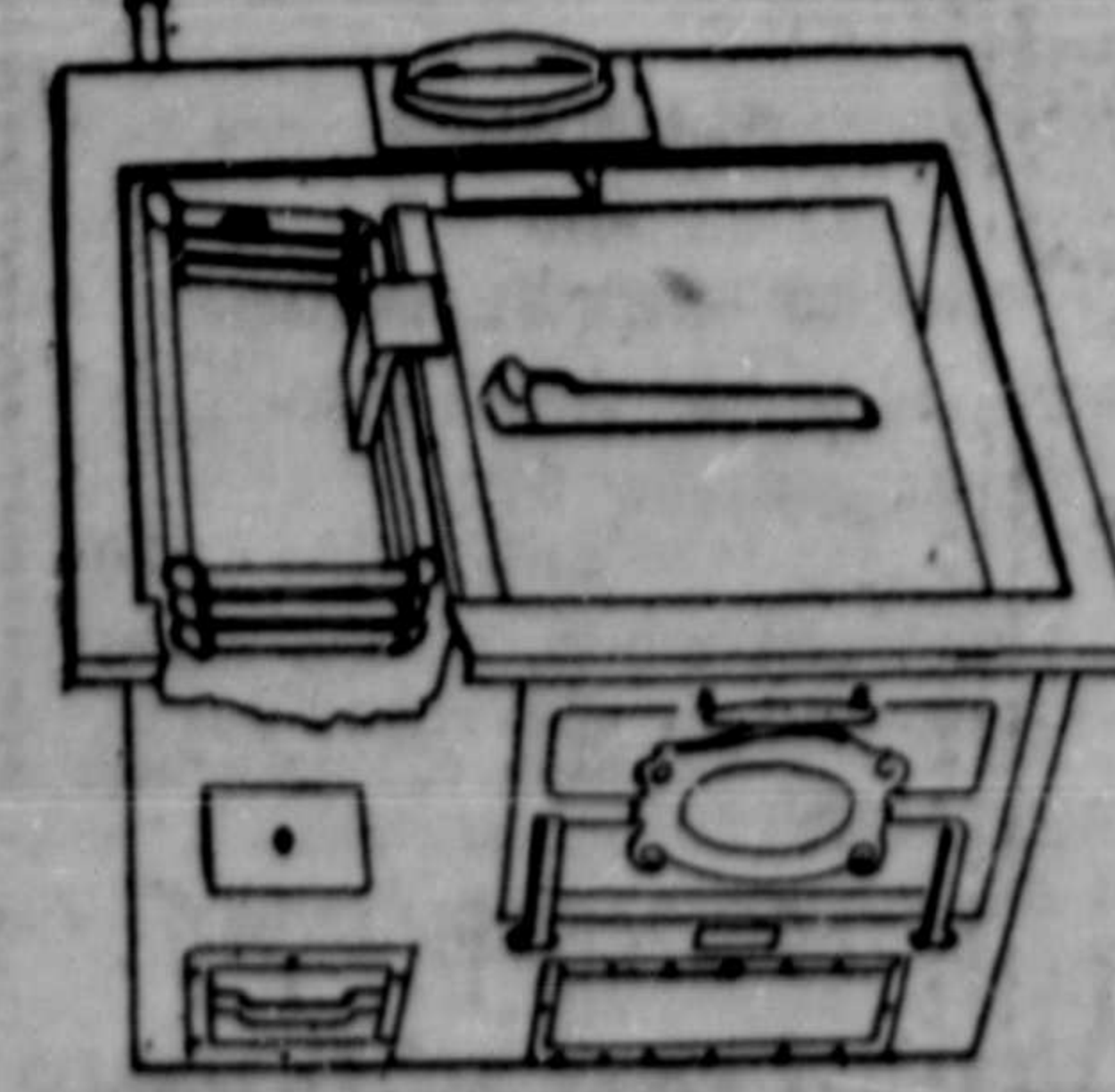
