CZAR IS REPORTED ESCAPED FROM TOBOLSK

GERMANS MAKE GREAT ENDEAVOR BREAK ITALY'S LINE--AWFUL BOMBARDMENT

DEATH ROLL STILL MOUNTING IN THE HALIFAX DISASTER

OFFICIAL ESTIMATE NOW PLACES TOTAL OF KILLED AT FOUR THOUSAND--ACRES OF DEBRIS MAY NOT BE CLEARED FOR MONTHS--RELIEF COMMITTEE ASKS FOR THIRTY MILLION DOLLARS

(Special to The Daily News.)

Halifax, Dec. 10.—Four thousand killed is the result of the explosion of the munitions ship in Halifax harbor on Thursday, according to the latest official estimate. This estimate is higher than any heretofore made and is arrived at after a survey of the devastated district of Richmond, where the acres of debris may not be cleared for months. One undertaking firm has wired to Amherst for four thousand coffins.

Dragged Waterfront.
The men of the naval forces dragged the waterfront on Sunday and recovered the bodies of two hundred sailors, soldiers and workmen. The casualties in the Wellington street barracks are six killed and twenty-seven missing, who are presumed killed, 141 badly wounded, 96 slightly wounded, and 44 unaccounted for. In the married men's quarters, one hundred and sixty women and children are reported killed, wounded and missing. On the cruiser Niobe, thirteen sailors and petty officers were killed, while fifteen others cannot be traced.

Relief Train Stalled.
The relief train from Massachusetts, which has been stalled in the snow drifts on the Nova Scotia border on Sunday with the first contingent of physicians and nurses, together with a large quantity of medical supplies. More than a foot of snow fell yesterday, which added to the difficulties of the relief work. The property loss is estimated at between two and five hundred million dollars. The relief committee have asked for thirty million dollars to take care of the twenty thousand destitute. Premier Borden has arrived in Halifax.

Help from U. S.
Washington, Dec. 10.—One hundred surgeons and physicians and more than a hundred and fifty nurses and social workers have been mobilized under the American Red Cross and sent to the stricken city of Halifax. Supplies for the relief of the sufferers are being rushed from New York and Boston.

For Relief.
Toronto, Dec. 10.—Sir John Eaton has despatched a special train with supplies to Halifax tonight, with a party of nurses and local officials on board. Lee Smith, Grand Master of the Knights Templars of the United States, has wired to C. H. Collins, Grand Master of Canada, to draw on him for five thousand dollars for Halifax relief.

HOW BORDENITES TRY TO BUY VOTES IN NEW BRUNSWICK

With the tide running strongly against supporters of the Borden administration all over Canada, desperate attempts are being made to stem the popular tide in favor of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, and a real win the war government.

One of the most glaring attempts to bribe the electorate by means of the exemption boards, comes from New Brunswick. In the union papers of that province appears an advertisement wherein those who have been refused exemption are boldly told to fill in the published coupon, send it to the union government agents, and "each case will be looked after by the Union Government Committee."

The inference, of course, is that if the man seeking exemption places himself in the hands of the union campaigners, he will be given his exemption.

Here is a fac simile of the advertisement as it appears in the St. John, N. B., Standard, of a recent date.

JOE MERRYFIELD IS PLAYING HIS OLD GAME

Vancouver, December 10.—J. E. Merryfield, formerly of Prince Rupert, is a very busy man in his office in the Vancouver Block here. Merryfield is acting as campaign manager for Colonel C. W. Peck, Unionist candidate in the Skeena riding. He is sending out campaign literature wholesale and his emissaries are being sent out all along the coast with substantial funds to do some fine work for the government. Merryfield was formerly the self-nominated candidate in Skeena, but his activities on behalf of the late Bowers government were so coarse as to make his chance of election a joke and his return to Prince Rupert was considered inadvisable.

For this reason, the Peck campaign is being managed from Vancouver. It is said the Liberals know the man and his methods and are watching his activities closely.

GERMANS ARE CONCENTRATING LARGE FORCES AGAINST ITALY

TERRIFIC FIGHTING ON MOUNTAINOUS NORTHERN ITALIAN FRONT, WHERE ENEMY SUFFERS ENORMOUS LOSSES—COLOSSAL COLLECTION OF ARTILLERY BOMBARDING ITALIANS

(Special to The Daily News.)

Rome, Dec. 10.—The Austro-German invaders have suffered enormous losses in the recent two days' drive. In one instance they were decimated by their own artillery. The Central powers are developing upon the Italian front their maximum military effort of the war. Italian aviators report the continual concentration of Austro-German troops, who are streaming over all the roads that lead to the Asiago plateau, where desperate fighting is still raging.

Retire by Inches.

After three days of terrible fighting, in which entire detachments of the Italian troops sacrificed themselves, the Austro-Germans succeeded in eliminating the arch which constituted the Italian foremost line of defence in the eastern side of the plateau. Although the Teutons employed a colossal quantity of heavy artillery, and made a heavy use of asphyxiating gasses, the Italian retirement was accomplished and every inch of the ground was stubbornly contested.

Air Raids.

The Italians repulsed all enemy attacks on the positions guarding the Frenzela and Gadena bases. In addition to rifle fire in repulsing attacks on these points, the Italians rolled down huge boulders whenever the enemy tried to advance. Over one hundred and fifty aeroplanes raided the enemy's northern sector and dropped two thousand bombs on the assembling forces of the enemy. The enemy formations were scattered, and troop trains were blown up. Railway depots were completely destroyed and great dumps of ammunition were exploded. On the Asiago plateau, a number of enemy soldiers were captured by the Italian patrols.

French Front.

Paris, Dec. 10.—Heavy losses were inflicted upon the enemy when he attempted to advance near Bezonvaux. The Germans were also repulsed north of Anizy les Chalen. Near Dixmude, successful work was accomplished by French aeroplanes behind the German lines.

FIRST DRAFT UNDER MILITARY SERVICE ACT

Ottawa, Dec. 10.—The first draft of men under the provisions of the Military Service Act will be called to the colors on the third day of January. The delay is on account of the registrars' and tribunals' work not being sufficiently advanced to make it practicable to call the draft until the date indicated.

Deshington, Dec. 10.—The American Consul at Tiflis has reported that the late Czar has escaped from Tobolsk, where he was incarcerated by the revolutionists.

HONESTY

One of the principle arguments put up in this election campaign is that if the Liberals are elected, Canada will drop out of the war, which anyone who thinks for a minute knows to be rubbish.

In the manifesto which was issued by Sir Wilfrid Laurier, he states that the first duty of a Laurier administration would be to "find the men, money and resources necessary to ensure the fullest measure of support to our heroic soldiers at the front and to enable Canada to continue to the very end to do her part to win the war."

That is what Sir Wilfrid Laurier is out to do, but that is not all. Sir Wilfrid takes heed to the other necessities of the Dominion. He continues: "In this election, the supreme end is to assist in the tremendous struggle in which we are engaged, to avoid the divisions and discords, which, for many years kept in check, are now unfortunately again looming up dangerously and threateningly; resolutely to face the economic situation with the view of avoiding and lessening the privations and sufferings which should not exist in a country so richly endowed by nature as our country."

The Tories read into this statement, of course, the "betrayal" of the soldiers in the trenches, and the dropping out of Canada from doing her share in the Empire's hour of need. This of course, is done for a specific purpose. The loyal Tories, who now call themselves Unionists, take unto themselves a corner in loyalty. They deny that such exists among the Liberals. They have it all. Laurier, who they denounced from one end of Quebec to the other six years ago, as too British, is now a traitor. This tremendous solicitude for winning the war, and the ex-

treme protestations of loyalty, together with the aspersions cast upon the Liberals is for the one and only purpose which is to distract attention from Canada's economic situation. While the people are arguing about conscription their minds are occupied, and they will be too interested to consider the delinquencies of the Borden government. The economic situation of the Dominion is one that will require to be faced "resolutely." The whole scheme of taxation requires to be revised, as well as the tariff. Taxation and tariffs have to be brought up to date. They concern the people. The Tories bluffed the electorate six years ago on that very same question. But they cannot do it twice. Instead of being in the interests of one little class of the community, as at present, these have to be revised in the interests of the people. This, however, the profiteers and the Canadian manufacturers have no desire for. This is why such a strenuous effort is being made to poison the public mind against Laurier, one of the Empire's statesmen. They have not the common honesty to fight for their position upon its merits, but have it camouflaged first with the win the war movement and the adoption of all methods, even the name of the Kaiser, to burke the real issue.

Profits and the continuance of their plundering the people at their pleasure are more to these loyalists than the welfare of Canada. What matters it if Canada is torn with internecine strife? So much the better for them, if the creation of racial enmities will help to keep them in power.

According to Sir Sam Hughes the plan of forming the so-called Union government was evolved by Sir Joseph Flavelle and Sir Thomas White. It was their hand which Sir Robert Borden played, and well they knew that Laurier would not lend his name to the carrying out of an autocratic policy with the formation of which he had no say. No honest man could do otherwise. Borden's Union government can hardly be classed as being representative

of the United people of Canada, seeing that there are 227 straight Liberals opposing the Union candidates through the country. Considering everything, it is no wonder the feeling of distrust is abroad in Canada with the actions of the Borden government.

CHINA MAKES MONEY OUT OF HUN SHIPPING

London, Dec. 8.—Advices from China state that Premier Tuan has agreed to sublet all the enemy ships seized by China to the Entente at from 40 to 45 shillings per ton. China is determined to allow the Entente to have the ships, as it is the only effective way in which she can assist the Allies.

It is reported that the Chinese Government has decided to hand over nine enemy ships, aggregating approximately 30,000 tons, to Great Britain at the rates agreed upon for charter. The vessels to be turned over to the Entente by China are: Albenga, Bohemia, China, Kathe, Deike Riekmers, Triumph, Helene, Sexta and Silesia.

BANK OF ENGLAND BREAKS PRECEDENTS

New York, Dec. 8.—The Bank of England, according to private advices received here yesterday, has broken all precedents, and is now paying 4 1/2 per cent. interest on deposits by banks for foreign account. It is understood that the Bank of England decided upon this movement for the purpose of attracting funds. For some time past the principal London banks have been paying higher interest rates on balances of foreign accounts than on domestic funds, but heretofore the Bank of England has not paid any interest whatever on any accounts.

POINTS OF INTEREST FOR INTENDING VOTERS

There are many points about the Dominion elections act as affected by the war time elections act and the new provisions which will be applicable to the voting in the coming elections.

The following are some points which will be of interest to the voters in the coming federal election:—

Where provincial requirements as to residence cannot be applied at the time of making the lists the residential qualifications of voters is one year in the province and thirty days in the electoral district prior to the issuance of the writ of election.

Wives, widows, mothers, sisters and daughters of persons, male or female, alive or dead, who are serving or who have served outside of Canada in any of the military forces of Canada or Great Britain or within or without Canada in any of the naval forces, excepting such female relatives of persons who have ceased service in otherwise than an honorable manner are entitled to vote. No such relatives of persons who have joined the naval forces of Canada since the passing of the war time election act on September 20, 1917, will have the vote.

Lists to be Posted.

Fifteen days before the polling day (Dec. 17) lists of the voters in each polling subdivision will be posted in said subdivision. The enumerators then sit two hours per day for ten days preceding polling day to revise the list, answer inquiries and execute transfers of votes of election officers and agents whose duties may take them away from the polling subdivision on election day. Up to five days before election the enumerator may upon the representation of any credible person add or strike off the lists any name.

There are no printed lists. On election day electors whose names are not on the lists may appear before the enumerator who sits within or near the polling place. If they are entitled to vote they are given certificates. Any person who is refused a certificate may demand and obtain a written refusal which entitles him to a ballot which is sealed in a envelope and not counted excepting in case of a recount and then only upon proof of his right to vote. Votes of persons challenged are treated in the same manner.

There is an enumerator in each polling subdivision. Entirely new lists are being made out in Prince Rupert. The lists when completed will be posted outside the polling booths or outside the postoffice.

May be Sworn.

Every person, whose name is on the list, can be sworn by candidate, agent, or elector, and if the oath is refused the voter loses the right to cast a vote in the election. The oath is:

"You swear that you are legally qualified to vote at this election, that you are of the (male or female) sex, a British subject, resident of Canada, and of the full age of 21 years. (In case of a female voter the following is added): You do further swear that you are the (wife, widow, mother, sister or daughter as the case may be) of a person who is serving or has served without Canada in the military forces (or within or without Canada in the naval forces) of Canada or of Great Britain in the present war."

The following people are un-qualified to vote:

The judges of every court whose appointment rests with the governor-in-council;

Persons disenfranchised for corrupt practices under the act;

Criminals, lunatics, inmates of

poor houses and such institutions;

Any person who has applied for exemption from military service on conscientious grounds and who has not been refused;

All Mennonites and Doukhobors excepting those who may have enlisted;

Every naturalized British subject who was born in an enemy country and naturalized subsequent to March, 1902, excepting those who have enlisted and served out of Canada in the Canadian or British armies, or in or without Canada in the navy; or have tried to enlist and been refused because medically unfit; or those who are grandparents, parents, sons, or brothers of such as who have so enlisted or tried to enlist; or those who are or have been during the present war members of the parliament of Canada or any province; or those Syrians and Armenians who are Christians; or those who are females entitled to the vote through relationship to a soldier.

Every person who has been convicted of an offense against the military service act has no vote.

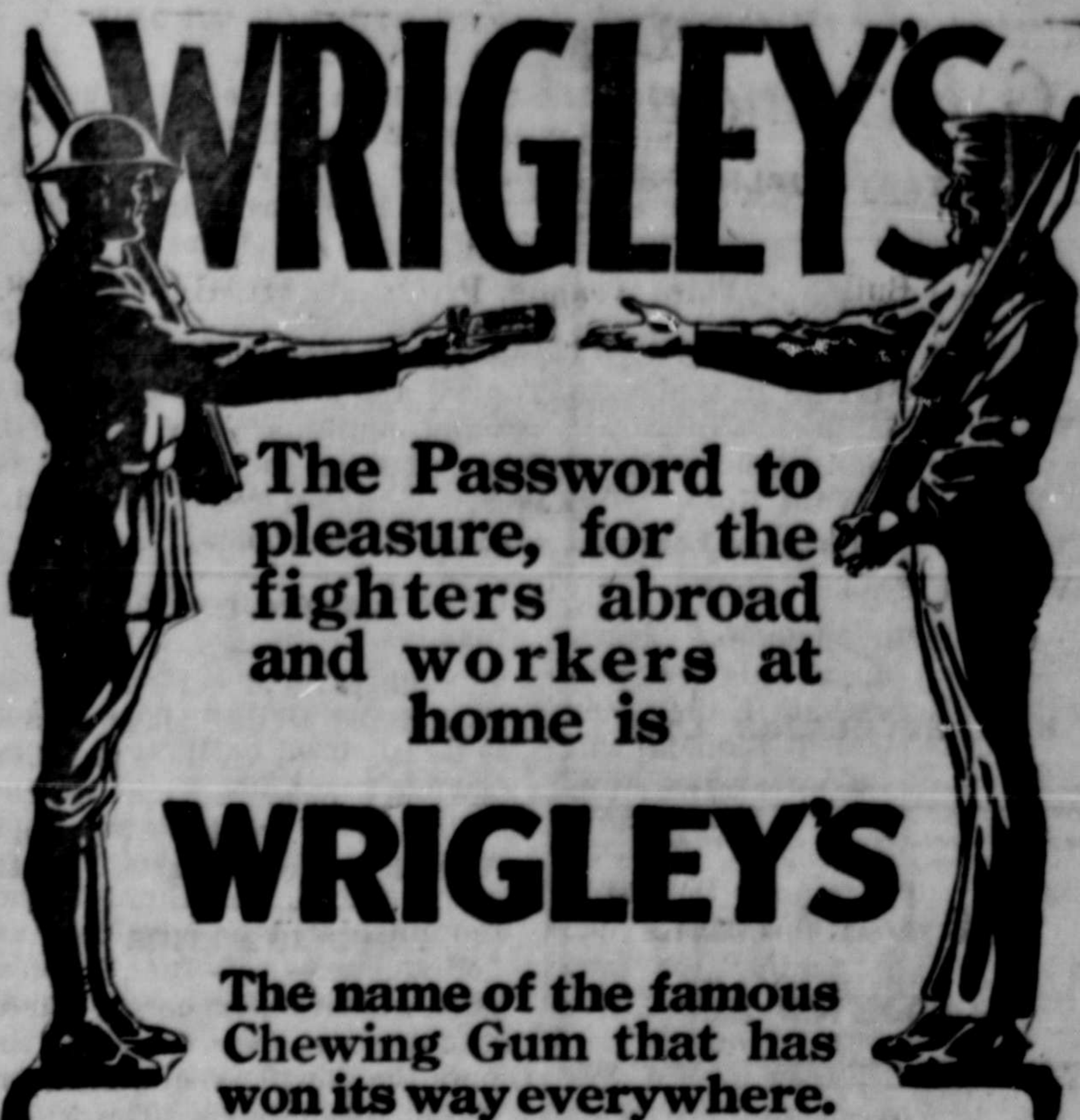
