AUSTRO-GERMANS HELD ON ITALY'S EDGE

KORNILOFF ON THE WAR PATH AGAINST BOLSHEVIKI—HALIFAX ASKS FOR HELP

KORNILOFF RAISES COUNTER REVOLUTION IN RUSSIA

ASSISTED BY METMAN KALEDINES AND COSSACKS KORNILOFF DECLARES WAR UPON BOLSHEVIKI—WORKMEN'S AND SOLDIERS' COUNCIL ISSUES DECREES TO ATTACK COSSACKS ON SIGHT

London, Dec. 11.—A proclamation to the Russian nation has been issued by the Russian government announcing that Kaledines and Korniloff, assisted by the Imperialists, and constitutional democratic party, has raised the standard of revolt against the power of the Bolsheviki and has declared war in the Don provinces against the people and the revolution.

The proclamation adds that the Constitutional Democrats and the Bourgeoisie are supplying the revolting generals with scores of millions in money. The Workmen's and Soldiers' Council of delegates has ordered the necessary movement of troops against the counter-revolution and has issued decrees authorizing the local forces to attack the enemies of the people without awaiting orders from the supreme authorities. The Council of Delegates has also forbidden any attempt at mediation.

JOSEPH THE PROFITEER IS STILL ON THE JOB

Excerpts From the Prayers of Sir Joseph Flavelle, the Great Profit Monger.

Addressing a meeting of Provincial Canadian Munitions Manufacturers in the Board of Trade, Toronto, Sir Joseph stated:

"As I stood in the trenches beside our brave Canadian boys, I said to myself, 'My God, what have I done in return for what these boys are doing for me.'"

And a little later on in his address he added:

"What have we to do with profits in this war, I would like to send profits to the hell where they belong."

Speaking before the Canadian Club in Ottawa, on December 16, 1916, Sir Joseph stated:

"I ask you, gentlemen, I ask you in this Capital city, I ask you, do you mean to play a worthy part—to be worthy of these men?"

"Gentlemen, may I urge that you will seek to remove everything that is mean, and nasty, and despicable, and partisan that we may commonly serve."

Speaking before the Canadian Club in Toronto on Dec. 14, 1916, Mr. Flavelle is reported to have said:

"I ask you in place of soolding Governments and finding fault with profiteers, to ask yourself 'what part have I played in the game worthy of the men who are over yonder?'"

And this man got no less a sum than \$1,685,345 from the bacon industry alone, at the expense of the people of the mother land and the people of Canada, or at the rate of 80 per cent. on the paid up capital of his company.

Union government has not been strong enough to rid the people of this octopus. It is only in some Unions there is strength—not in this one.

When Joe Merryfield abandoned a forlorn hope he set an example that was worthy of emulation by those whose chances were no better, and thus it happens that the Empire man is back to his favorite pastime of hurling coarse abuse at those who can not see eye to eye with him on grave political questions.

It is sad to see a man act thus in his declining years, and his case brings to my mind the Scriptural passage which reads: "As a dog returneth to his vomit, so a fool returneth to his folly."

HUNS STOPPED IN DESCENT UPON ITALY

Italian Army After a Terrific Battle Checks German Thrust Towards the Plains.

Rome, Dec. 11.—The battle of Asiago is virtually suspended with the enemy checked, if not defeated in his main design of breaking through to the Branta valley, and the plains beyond. All the same, he succeeded in advancing his lines for a short distance when the Italians fell back to their new positions.

The Air Raid.

The air raid carried out yesterday was an exceptionally large one. The fleet of aeroplanes comprised one hundred and fifty machines. This huge fleet flew low and scattered more than two thousand bombs, which caused most extensive damage to the enemy in the northern sector, where the enemy was assembling his forces and supplies. The falling bombs scattered the enemy troops on the march and blew up moving troop trains. Great explosions were seen coming from the enemy's ammunition dumps.

In Mesopotamia.

London, Dec. 11.—After securing the Sakalutan pass on Tuesday, the Turks were pursued to the village of Kara Tepeh, which lies twenty-five miles north of Deli Abbas, on the Djalala river, through which the enemy were driven. The British took 227 prisoners, including the commander of the Turkish forces.

WHAT A LIBERAL GOVT. MEANS FOR RUPERT

To the Editor "Daily News."

Dear Sir,—If you permit me, I would like to pen a few words upon the grave questions before the people of all Canada today, namely, War and Elections.

In the Skeena riding, Fred Stork is endorsed by the Liberals and Lt.-Col. Peck brought out by the Conservatives. For the past year or more, both J. E. Merryfield and Sam Newton called themselves Conservative candidates. The Conservative clique in Rupert, however, found there was not the least chance of either of these being elected, hence they fell back upon Col. Peck as a more likely man to poll a strong vote.

Fred Stork, the Liberal, was the first in the field. He was a business man and captain of the Earl Grey's Rifles, which he organized before the war. He secured over a hundred volunteers and fully expected to go with his regiment to the front, but the Conservative clique in Rupert got busy. They said he was a Liberal and they could not afford to let him have the honor of taking his regiment to the front. The telegraph wires began to get hot between Rupert and Ottawa with the result that between the clique in Rupert and the powers in Ottawa, Mr. Stork was told his services were no longer required. Thereupon Mr. Peck, as he then was, accepted the job.

The same clique is now at work again. Fred Stork's name has been before the electors since 1915 as the Liberal candidate, but the "clique" thought he was too strong a man for either Merryfield or Newton or even both together, so they were deposed and Col. Peck chosen. Now the question for the electors is which of the two candidates they should support. Fred Stork is on the ground to support the Liberal policy with Sir Wilfrid Laurier as leader. The same Sir Wilfrid who has been called in England one of the Empire's statesmen.

Under his wise and farsighted rule, Canada made more progress during his fifteen years of office than she did from the time of Confederation. He is still the ablest statesman in Canada today. He is the one man who can save Canada from being split in two by internal trouble. It was his farsighted policy that caused the building of the National Transcontinental Railway. It was he who saw the urgent necessity for Canada having another transcontinental line running from the Atlantic to the Pacific.

It is safe to say that had Sir Wilfrid been in power during the last six years, Prince Rupert would today be a city of twenty thousand people instead of four thousand. And every town and hamlet from Rupert eastward would be humming. There would be more settlers and much greater production. Prince Rupert's drydock plant would be in operation and it would be more than nominally a terminal city.

But Sir Robert Borden and the Conservatives got the majority in 1911. Since then the retrograde movement has been in progress and hard times are now being felt in B. C., just as they were up to 1896. The multiplicity of war orders helped out some to the east, but B. C. felt the pinch and was hit more than any of the other provinces. Why? Because the Borden Government at Ottawa are in the hands of and are controlled by the capitalists and manufacturers who would allow B. C. to get but a small portion of war orders. The east wanted it all for themselves, and they saw that they got it. Who is to (Continued on Page Two)

RELIEF ASKED FOR SUFFERING HALIFAX CITY

Appeal Made for Twenty-five Million Dollars by Mayors of Halifax and Dartmouth for the Sufferers.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Halifax, Dec. 11.—An appeal for \$25,000,000 is made to the people of Canada by the mayors of Halifax and Dartmouth today. This figure is taken as representing only part of the material damage done by the explosion of the cargo of the steamer Mont Blanc last Thursday. The Dominion government has announced that a preliminary million dollars has been given by the local relief committee of the Dominion government. The survivors of the Belgian relief steamer Imo, which collided with the Mont Blanc, together with Pilot MacKay and Captain Lameduc of the French vessel, are being detained by the British Admiralty authorities pending an official enquiry, which should open tomorrow.

It is estimated that at least fifteen hundred dwellings and their contents have been wiped out of existence. As many more are partly destroyed and from fifteen to twenty thousand people homeless. It is feared that two thousand persons have been killed. Thousands have been injured and in all cases the families in the devastated areas have been left penniless and destitute.

In Dartmouth a number of manufacturing plants were destroyed and several rows of houses were blown down. The loss of life is known to be one hundred and fifty. The big buildings destroyed were the Dartmouth Rink, Emmanuel Church, Consumers Cordage Co., Star Manufacturing Co., Dominion Molasses Co. The houses destroyed were on George, Pleasant, Jameson and Hector streets.

military gain might be offset by a greater political loss. Which suggests one of the differences between statesmanship and mere politics.

The same situation exists in Canada today, but only to a certain extent. In Ireland Great Britain has a problem. They have a people with national aspirations. They have a strong and troublesome Nationalist party, which wants Home Rule. But notwithstanding that in Ireland the percentage of the population enlisted is small compared with Great Britain, its people are not excommunicated as traitors to the Empire even if a section of them did rebel, and racial strife and animosity created to embitter the existence of an Irishman, wherever he goes.

Instead of accentuating racial animosities, no matter how old standing, a time like this calls for very different treatment, which, however, a Tory is incapable of appreciating. Canadian law is modelled upon that of Great Britain and in government Sir Robert Borden has a great deal yet to learn from that same little country. Sir Robert has shown that he is unable to preserve the unity of the different parts of the Dominion, and at a time,

blame for the stagnant condition of Prince Rupert and the G. T. P.? Who but the Borden Government? Recently orders for a few ships have been placed in B. C. at Vancouver and Victoria, because the east could not supply the demand; but no orders came to Prince Rupert. The G. T. P. got no extra war traffic to carry. Why has the Prince Rupert drydock plant, costing two and a half million dollars, been allowed to stand idle since it was built, instead of doing its share to win the war? Because the Borden Government and the C. N. R. have been bucking the G. T. P. and Prince Rupert, because it was a Laurier road and Laurier town. Prince Rupert and the country tributary to the G. T. P. will never come to its own until the country gets rid of the Borden Government. In order to do this it is up to the electors to vote for Stork and Laurier.

Prince Rupert and the National Transcontinental was the ambition of Sir Wilfrid Laurier. His ambition was realized and he will yet see its further development. His return to power means restored confidence in northern B. C. and the rapid growth of Prince Rupert, which is destined to become one of the largest cities on the Pacific Coast. Its development means the development of the hinterland as well.

The Tories once styled themselves Conservatives, then they robbed the Liberals and called themselves Liberal Conservatives. Now seeing they are discredited before the people under their former name, they call themselves Unionists. Borden has got six Liberals to join him in a Cabinet of Twenty-two. This he calls a Union Government. It is that in name only and the name is one calculated to deceive the electors. The Tories want to win this election under the guise of Unionists, by hook or by crook, and to gain their end, they armed themselves, at the tail end of the last session of Parliament with one of the basest and most outrageous acts ever placed upon the statute book. By its means they hoped to cut out half a million good Liberal votes and also hope to have enough floating soldiers' votes to apply wherever they want them. They are loud in their denunciation of the Liberals, who they claim do not wish to win the war. But winning the war is really a secondary consideration with the Borden Government. They want to win the election first. Which by means of the War Time Elec.
