NO PEACE UNTIL PRUSSIAN MENACE GONE

ASQUITH AND CHURCHILL MAKE STATEMENTS -- GREAT BATTLE IMPENDING

WESTERN LINE THUNDERS WITH BIG GUN FIRE

From Ypres to Switzerland Bombardment on Both Sides is Intense Ever Yet Before Attack.

(Special to The Daily News.)
London, Dec. 13.—From Ypres to Cambrai on the British front and from St. Quentin to the border of Switzerland along the lines held by the French troops, the artillery and aerial battle has reached a pitch of intensity that is seldom attained except upon the eve of a great infantry action. From the evidence given in the official statements issued last night not only the Germans but the British also are preparing for a great attack in the west. The exact scene of the coming struggle is yet in doubt, as the opposing guns are thundering on virtually every part of the far-flung front.

French Front.
Paris, Dec. 13.—German parties have felt the French lines at points northwest of Rheims last night. There is no activity of any importance, except artillery battles, which are especially severe on the Verdun front.

In a Hurry.
Austrians are being hurried to the western front, and the enemy is making great preparations for an offensive against the British and the French before the Americans arrive. They apparently intend to deal a staggering blow, staking all upon it, so that peace may soon come. Food and labor shortage and internal troubles in Germany are making that country war weary.

Roumanian Armistice.
Jassy, Dec. 13.—An official announcement was made yesterday of the signing of an armistice, in accordance with which hostilities were suspended at 10:30 p.m. yesterday until further notice.

An Investigation.
London, Dec. 13.—General Maurice has frankly described the German success at Cambrai as being due to lack of co-ordination. The reason for the break is being investigated.

BRITISH FINANCE
(Special to The Daily News.)
London, Dec. 13.—Bonar Law, chancellor of the exchequer, has asked Parliament for a vote of five hundred and fifty million pounds. The average daily expenditure for the past two months has been £6,794,000. The first duty of the exchequer is to devise some means of additional taxation.

UNIONIST PARTY IN THE WESTHOLME

The Westholme Theatre was well filled last evening with an interested audience to listen to the speakers put up by the supporters of Colonel Peck, D.S.O. Mr. W. P. Lynch was chairman of the meeting, and on the platform were Messrs. O. H. Nelson, G. W. Morrow, J. S. Cowper, Lt.-Col. J. M. McMillan and Sergeant-Major Robinson, D. C. M. Mr. S. M. Newton, who graced the platform at their last meeting, was not in evidence last evening, the one platform being apparently unable to hold both him and Mr. Nelson at the same time.

Mr. O. H. Nelson was the curtain-raiser. He had two things to speak about. These were O. H. Nelson and the drydock. He wanted to deny the imputation that he was receiving any financial consideration for his services upon the Fisheries Advisory Board, except his expenses when he went to Ottawa and for the days he was actually there. He blamed Ald. Casey for stating that he was getting \$150 per month for this job, which he only wished was the case. However, he did not indicate for what other job he received any remuneration, if for any job at all, nor did he indicate the source of his wealth.

His other point was the drydock. His defence was of the government and the G. T. P. No one was to blame. The government was powerless. The G. T. P. was powerless. Nothing could be done. The Union Iron Works were powerless to get steel. Nobody could do anything. After Mr. Nelson's pronouncement, Rupert citizens might as well give up hope—if they believed him. And before sitting down, he had the usual Tory dig at Stork.

Lt.-Col. McMillan.
The next speaker was Lt.-Col. McMillan, who spoke very well as a soldier and from the point of view of a soldier and an old friend of Col. Peck's. His experiences in the trenches were much appreciated. "Conscription we must have," said Lt.-Col. McMillan. "If the Liberal party is returned, what assurance have we? I am not here to talk politics, nor to tell you what to do, but to plead with you to send assistance to the men in the trenches."

Mr. J. S. Cowper, M.P.P.
The chairman then introduced Mr. J. S. Cowper to the meeting as a Liberal who could not be made to dance at the crack of the party whip. Mr. Cowper bowed. He was no stranger to Prince Rupert and he had recollections of the last Dominion election six years ago. Mr. Cowper had his own opinions dressed up very plausibly as facts, and in the course of his speech, which was the longest of the evening, had many interruptions on that account. He made some rather far-fetched statements, which caused the chairman to rise from his seat several times to restrain the audience. He alleged that there was no question of party politics in this campaign, which was his own opinion, of course. But the audience didn't agree.

Prince Rupert's idle drydock he claimed was not an issue in this election—not even for the Prince Rupert people. Neither was the enfranchisement of women. "Food Prices is not an issue in this campaign, either," which brought forth a volume of groans of disappointment, which were so prolonged as to cause the chairman to arise, who was greeted with cries of "sit down, Bill." FURTHER DETAILS OF HALIFAX DISASTER

(Special to The Daily News.)
Halifax, Dec. 13.—There will be from three to five hundred persons totally or partially blind and two hundred orphans as the result of the explosion on the Mont Blanc. The dead are known to number eight hundred, while it is estimated that another thousand still lie beneath the debris of the shattered or burned houses.

Five hundred houses have been totally destroyed, other five hundred have been rendered useless while a thousand will be habitable only after very extensive repairs. **For Relief.**

London, Dec. 13.—The British government has contributed £1,000,000 for the relief of the citizens of Halifax.

EN MASSE TO HONOR SIR WILFRID LAURIER

Regina, Dec. 13.—The great West turned out en masse to do honor to Sir Wilfrid Laurier upon his arrival here. Four meetings were held in as many different halls in the city and all were crowded to hear the ex-Premier of Canada state his side of the case at the coming election. He spoke first at the Metropolitan Church and thousands of persons stood with him and cheered incessantly for five minutes. He says he will never desert the cause of Canada or of the Empire, and that the Union government is the same old Conservative party with the same old veneer.

CAPT. RORVIK ON THE FISHERY QUESTION

To the Editor,—Will you kindly allow me space to make a few comments upon the message conveyed by Mr. Morrow to the fishermen at his meeting held in Col. Peck's committee rooms last Saturday night.

Mr. Morrow made a statement that the Laurier Government granted the New England Fish Co. an exclusive right to land fish at Vancouver, to buy bait and take on supplies. This statement is entirely incorrect. The New England Fish Co. made representations to the Laurier government, that if they would grant them permission, they would use Vancouver as a base for operations instead of Seattle. This permission was granted, but it did not specify that it was exclusive to them.

On the other hand, the Borden government granted to the New England Fish Co. practically all of the west coast of the Queen Charlotte Islands. And this in the face of all the protests against exclusive rights that have gone from here. When this was put to the Department of Fisheries, about two months ago, they replied, "We have no apologies to make for having granted these concessions, as these people agreed to develop them." I ask when did the fishermen ever have a chance at developing that or any other territory? I was granted a licence in 1916 on the west coast. I spent about three weeks in prospecting for fish that year with little success and considerable expenditure. In March of this year, I put in my application for a renewal, together with a deposit of the price of the licence. I was given to understand that I would get a renewal. When Mr. Cunningham was here with the Fishery Commission, he told me I would get a licence either on the east or west coast, but he would advise me definitely after his return to Vancouver. Instead of this, he wired Mr. Williams to cancel my licence. Notwithstanding this, when Mr. Winch and others went to the Islands for salmon, I started fishing without a licence and sold my fish to McLean and Winch. But they fined me \$100 for fishing without a licence, after the Federal government had held my money for about five months. And all this time a Jap outfit was there from Vancouver, which salted thousands of tons for shipment to Russia, while the Borden Government refused to permit these fish to be taken and frozen for bait. This is why the fishing fleet is tied up.

In 1909 the late Hon. Mr. Templeman, in answering a communication from the Prince Rupert Board of Trade, as to whether the New England Fish Company's concession was open to any American company or boat, replied that it would be granted upon application. It did not specify the New England Fish Company exclusively. As the railroad did not get in here until 1913 nothing more was done on this until that year. Then when the matter was taken up, the Borden Government advanced the argument that there was an order in council permitting American boats to land their catch under permit. The people of Prince Rupert contended that that was too great an inconvenience, as a boat coming in here who did not have this permit would have to communicate with Ottawa before obtaining same.

You will remember that it was necessary to put up a strong fight before this concession was granted. Some months after the granting of same, the collector at this port was informed that it did not permit of shipment by water to

BRITISH WAR AIMS DEFINED ONCE AGAIN

Mr. Asquith at Birmingham and Mr. Winston Churchill at Bedford Reiterate the Allied Aims.

(Special to The Daily News.)
London, Dec. 13.—Two important pronouncements on the war aims of Great Britain have just been made. Mr. Asquith speaking at Birmingham, and Mr. Winston Churchill in a speech at Bedford both declared that the war must continue until the menace of Prussianism is removed. Otherwise, the tremendous sacrifices of the British people will have been made in vain.

The British government may make an appeal to the country. It feels its position to be insecure and many rumors are in circulation of impending political crises. The discontented section of the House may unite against the ministry, while the Northcliffe organs have taken a radical attitude towards the government. It is hinted that Mr. Asquith intends to give his unqualified support to Lord Lansdowne's policy, and his decision is waited upon with great interest.

IT'S UP TO YOU

The election day is not very far away now, when the voters will exercise their franchise in voting for their representative to be sent to the council of the Dominion. It were well that the voters consider what the result of their voting will mean to the Empire and the Dominion first, to British Columbia and to Prince Rupert. The voters in Northern British Columbia should be vitally interested in this election, because it means so much to them, in particular.

The late Conservative Government, headed by Sir Robert Borden has embodied within itself six Liberals, and by the virtue of these six stalwarts, has changed its name from Conservative to Union. The late Conservative party has changed its name to the Union party, but it remains a party still. The people of Canada are not at all unanimous in their desire for a Conservative Union Government. This is plainly shown by the fact of 227 straight opposition candidates opposing the Union nominees.

The one issue which is put forward by the Union government—they practically deny all others—is conscription of man power. The premier himself and other candidates have repeatedly stated that this is the only issue before the electors. It is the only issue put forward by the Borden Union Government. To this end they passed a bill months ago and secured the support of many Liberals on the plea that reinforcements were very urgently required. But not one man is yet in uniform or in training, although the necessity and urgency was said to be so great and pressing.

On the other hand, Sir Wilfrid Laurier maintains that he can make the voluntary system a decided success and obtain sufficient reinforcements without the necessity of conscription. His forty years' record in public life, his wide knowledge, and his position in Canada are such as to clothe his words with authority. The policy he has submitted to the

people is one that commands respect. It is democratic. It concerns the welfare of the masses of the people. He would reform the tariff, which unnecessarily raises the price of commodities for the masses for the benefit of the few. He would control food supplies and prices, against which every housewife in Canada has a grievance. He would cut out profiteering and would place all manufacturing of war supplies under control, as has been done in Great Britain. He will form a real national government of the ablest men in the country representing all classes to form a cabinet whose first object will be to find the men, money and resources necessary to ensure the fullest measure of support to the men at the front and to enable Canada to continue to the very end in the war.

He says the measures now in force for the maintenance, care and comfort of the soldiers dependents and families are not adequate or equitable. The soldier is the first consideration and his dependents are the next most deserving of the State's solicitude and care, which should not be left to public charity. Laurier is the man who can preserve the unity of Canada, which is threatened with disruption by the present arbitrary administration. He is the man who had the vision of Prince Rupert being the Pacific terminus of a great national transcontinental railroad, with its fleet trading with the East. He is the man who believes in the democratic principle of obeying the will of the people, and in the giving of the fullest expression to that will. In fact, his policy is the antithesis of that of the Borden Government's.

It is to the interest of the Empire that Canada remain united and that racial strife within her borders be eliminated. It is in the interests of the Dominion that her sons remain free and that democratic institutions be maintained. It is in the interests of British Columbia and Prince Rupert that the country served by the N. T. R. be developed and that Prince Rupert become the en-



treport of trade that Sir Wilfrid designed. The voters have to consider but for a very little to decide whether Borden or Laurier has been and is the better man to guide and control the destinies of Canada, and to get the most out of the Dominion for the winning of the war.

CAPTAIN RORVIK ON THE FISHERY QUESTION

Seattle, that any American fish landed at this port must be shipped by rail to the United States. On the face of this it was a most unreasonable contention for any government to put up. Wherein the difference lies between shipping fish by rail or boat is beyond understanding. I believe that I am right in stating that there has never yet been an order in council passed permitting these fish to be shipped by boat to Seattle, but that these fish are permitted to go this way, is acknowledged by the department.

Is Mr. Morrow prepared to say that the concession granted to the New England Fish Company, and which was open to any other company, was not beneficial to Vancouver in particular, and Canada at large?

As to his statement that the New England Fish Company were the only people who could buy halibut, I must again accuse him of side-stepping the truth. Anyone could buy halibut, but up to 1909 very few halibut were caught other than those landed by the boats of the New England Fish Company, and the Canadian Fishing Company. This latter company supplied the Canadian market, and sold the greater part of their surplus to the New England Fish Company. Mr. Morrow stated that the fishermen got two cents per pound. They did not sell by the pound, but by the fish, which were twenty-five cents each. I might say that in those days it only took two or three days to catch a load, and a fisherman during the season would share anywhere from \$2,000 to \$3,000. Of course the comparing of the price for halibut in those days as compared with that obtainable today is ridiculous in the extreme and an insult to the intelligence of the fishermen.

Regarding boat ratings in District Number 2. It is true that

these were put into effect under the Laurier Government, in conjunction with the Bowser-McBride Government. At the time this went into effect, there were very few fishermen in District Number 2, other than Indians, and not a sufficient number of them to catch the fish and man the canneries. It was therefore necessary for the canneries to bring in a large number of their fishermen from the southern part of the province. They claimed that it was not fair to them to hunt up fishermen, provide them with boats, gear, transportation, etc., and then have them free to fish for their competitors when the season opened. This argument was put up strongly to the authorities at Ottawa, and as no protest was made against it, it was granted.

Now I would like to ask why Mr. Morrow, as Indian Agent, and being specially charged with the protection of the Indians, for which he was paid a salary, did not enter a protest to the Indian Department against the Indians being made vassals of the canneries. Again, as a citizen, and a supporter of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, and one of the "first" white men in this district it would have seemed only natural that Mr. Morrow would have advised Sir Wilfrid Laurier of the pernicious legislation he was being asked to enact by the canneries. As Mr. Morrow made no protest, it can only be taken for granted that it had his support. The Hon. Mr. Sloan was then representing this district and naturally as no protest came from these men, Sir Wilfrid Laurier should not be held responsible. The responsibility rests entirely with Mr. Morrow and the Liberals who then resided in northern British Columbia. I ask you, fellow fishermen, to ask yourselves who these Liberals were, and act accordingly. But (Continued on Page Three.)

CAPTAIN RORVIK ON THE FISHERY QUESTION

(Continued from Page two.)

we are not interested with what has gone before, we are interested with what has been done by the Borden administration since conditions have changed—changes that have made it possible for the canneries to get a sufficient supply of men for fishing in this district, when they pay prices on a par with those paid on the Fraser river. For the last three years we have repeatedly made requests to the Borden Government to grant equal rights to all in District No. 2. The only one that has been granted is the permit of gas boats on the Skeena. I am not sure that this order in council specifies District No. 2. I understand that this order in council was passed last May, yet until Mr. Morrow made it public Saturday night, no one, including Mr. Morrow, was aware of the fact. I would ask Mr. Morrow to explain the reason the department had in not making this public.

Mr. Morrow was one of a committee that went to Ottawa to get certain concessions. He came back and gave us to believe that he had gained several. I ask him to tell us what they are outside of this one for gas boats on the Skeena, which is of questionable value in view of the secrecy maintained in connection with same.

I am prepared to state that the canneries are satisfied that if the Borden Government is returned to power that they will have the boat rating maintained, including the Prince Rupert and Sunnyside Canneries, thus making the combination we have to fight very much stronger.

As to cannery licenses, I question if the Dominion Government has ever refused a license on the Skeena river. In proof of my statement I wish to point to the Prince Rupert Cannery and the Sunnyside Cannery, who were granted licenses by the Federal government, and refused by the McBride-Borden government. Mr. Morrow claims he was refused a license. Evidently Mr. Morrow wanted a number of licenses, as he obtained a license together with some others for the Cassiar Canneries. This was prior to 1909. The fact that he was interested in the Cassiar Cannery probably accounts for his not making any protest to Ottawa for the granting of boat ratings, etc. No, Mr. Morrow, the fishermen need look for nothing from a government headed by Sir Robert Borden. While you at a meeting some two weeks ago, stated that in voting for Peck you were not voting for Sir Robert Borden, permit me to point out that that statement requires some explanation. Sir Robert Borden is just as much at the head of this so-called Union Government as he was at the head of the Tory party when they appealed to the electorate in 1911, and made the unholy alliance with Bourassa and the other Nationalists who are responsible for the situation as it exists in Quebec today.

POINTS OF INTEREST FOR INTENDING VOTERS

There are many points about the Dominion elections act as affected by the war time elections act and the new provisions which will be applicable to the voting in the coming elections.

The following are some points which will be of interest to the voters in the coming federal election:—

Where provincial requirements as to residence cannot be applied the time of making the lists the residential qualifications of voters is one year in the province and thirty days in the electoral district prior to the issuance of the writ of election.

Wives, widows, mothers, sisters and daughters of persons, male or female, alive or dead, who are serving or who have served outside of Canada in any of the military forces of Canada or Great Britain or within or without Canada in any of the naval forces, excepting such female relatives of persons who have ceased service in otherwise than an honorable manner are entitled to vote. No such relatives of persons who have joined the naval forces of Canada since the passing of the war time election act on September 20, 1917, will have the vote.

Lists to be Posted.

Fifteen days before the polling day (Dec. 17) lists of the voters in each polling subdivision will be posted in said subdivision. The enumerators then sit two hours per day for ten days preceding polling day to revise the list, answer inquiries and execute transfers of votes of election officers and agents whose duties may take them away from the polling subdivision on election day. Up to five days before election the enumerator may upon the representation of any credible person add or strike off the lists any name.

There are no printed lists. On election day electors whose names are not on the lists may appear before the enumerator who sits within or near the polling place. If they are entitled to vote they are given certificates. Any person who is refused a certificate may demand and obtain a written refusal which entitles him to a ballot which is sealed in a envelope and not counted excepting in case of a recount and then only upon proof of his right to vote. Votes of persons challenged are treated in the same manner.

There is an enumerator in each polling subdivision. Entirely new lists are being made out in Prince Rupert. The lists when completed will be posted outside the polling booths or outside the postoffice.

May be Sworn.

Every person, whose name is on the list, can be sworn by candidate, agent, or elector, and if the oath is refused the voter loses the right to cast a vote in the election. The oath is:

"You swear that you are legally qualified to vote at this election, that you are of the (male or female) sex, a British subject, resident of Canada, and of the full age of 21 years. (In case of a female voter the following is added): You do further swear that you are the (wife, widow, mother, sister or daughter as the case may be) of a person who is serving or has served without Canada in the military forces (or within or without Canada in the naval forces) of Canada or of Great Britain in the present war."

The following people are unqualified to vote:

The judges of every court whose appointment rests with the governor-in-council;

Persons disenfranchised for corrupt practices under the act; Criminals, lunatics, inmates of

SEVERE WEATHER ISOLATES RUPERT

Yesterday morning in the city snow was falling and in the outside districts, it was falling much heavier. In the Skeena valley, throughout the night, it was blowing very hard, and the result is that today Prince Rupert is without telegraphic communication either the Government line or the G.T.P.

The blizzards on the prairies are responsible for tonight's train being thirty hours late. She is not expected to arrive until some time during tomorrow night. There are many passengers on board escaping from the rigors of the cold winter in the interior. They are making their way to the milder climate of the south, and on their account, the steamer which should leave tonight, will be held for their arrival.

The storm last night was quite severe around Kwinitsa, where the first break in the telegraph lines is and just how bad conditions are further east cannot be ascertained in the meantime.

Cowper agreed that Flavelle's 80 per cent profits were not right, but he claimed that these had not increased the price of bacon by one cent per lb. This brought forth more protest from the audience, which caused the chairman to rise again.

Regarding the question of wealth, which Mr. Stork is pledged to, he asked if it was proposed to confiscate all the Prince Rupert lots and the capital of the country. Whereupon a lady interjected: "Permit me, sir, you must think that Mr. Stork goes to the Borden school," and the house rocked with cheers. Mr. Cowper then showed what the alleged Union government had done since its inception eight weeks ago, and then he came to the one great thing which his party claims this election is about and that is conscription—of men. He made the same old appeal to sentiment and patriotism quite suitable for a recruiting meeting, but which was no argument in view of the condition of the Empire at this moment. He insisted that the conscription measure should be enforced, but was careful to add "if need be" and he claimed that the election of Mr. Stork was "tantamount and paramount" to Canada dropping out of the war.

Sergt.-Major Robinson, D.C.M.

In introducing the Sergeant-Major, the chairman had to remark that Mr. Stork was promising goods that he could not deliver. The Sergeant-Major made his appeal for reinforcements. He had no leader and no party. In supporting the Borden Union Government, he was choosing the least of two evils. He was strong for the conscription of wealth and the confiscation of all excess profits made since the beginning of the war. All aliens, he said, should be conscripted, whether enemy or otherwise and placed at the disposal of the government. He was sore at Quebec and made a great plea for votes for his friend, Lieut.-Col. Peck, D. S. O.

The meeting then closed with the singing of the National Anthem.
