## LAURIER GOT FINE RECEPTION IN CALGARY

### THOUSANDS WAIT UP ALL NIGHT TO HEAR LIBERAL LEADER -- GREAT OVATION

#### ALL CALGARY TURNS OUT TO GREET SIR WILFRID LAURIER

TRAIN BEARING LIBERAL CHIEF WEST DELAYED BY BLIZZARDS -- ARRIVES IN CALGARY AT 11 P. M. -- THOUSANDS WAIT TO HEAR HIS SPEECHES -- AT 2 A. M., ANOTHER THOUSAND INSIST TO HEAR HIM

Calgary, Dec. 14.—Calgary turned out en masse to greet the arrival of Sir Wilfrid Laurier here on his tour of the West. On account of the heavy snowstorms, the train carrying the Liberal chief was running behind schedule and did not get in until 11 p. m. As was the case in Winnipeg and Regina, the great Canadian statesman received a rousing welcome from the prairie people. The largest assemblage ever gathered in southern Alberta was contained in Calgary to hear him speak.

The Knox Church was crowded, and the largest theatre was packed with eager supporters of Sir Wilfrid. Both meetings were most enthusiastic and cheered Sir Wilfrid to the echo. Owing to the lateness of the hour of Sir Wilfrid's arrival thousands more who had gathered in nearby halls were forced to return to their homes disappointed.

However, at 2 a. m. another thousand people in the Paget Hall insisted upon Sir Wilfrid addressing them, which he did. He criticised the programme and policy of the Union Government and repeated his declaration that he has been for winning the war from the first, and would be to the last. He challenged anyone to find in his conduct any anti-war sentiment.

Notwithstanding the early

morning hour, thousands accompanied Sir Wilfrid to his train amid scenes of the greatest enthusiasm, and as the train left the depot amid the driving snow, the cheers of the immense gathering of Liberal voters followed him to further successes on the coast.

#### PROFITEERS' TAXES THROWN ON PEOPLE

The tax on war profits comes to an end on December 31st, 1917. The income tax, which, to a very large extent, will relieve the profiteers of their burdens, supersedes it. We quote the words of the announcement made by Sir Thos. White, finance minister, in the House of Commons, on July 25th, 1917:

"The House is aware that the liability to the Business Profits War Tax Act of 1916 and the amendments thereto of this year come to an end on December 31st this year, and it is not the intention to renew this measure." (See Uncevised Hansard, July 25, 1917, page 3915).

Under the new tax, the Ford Motor Co.'s taxation drops from \$1,782,095 to \$127,987; the Canadian Explosives from \$1,337,631 to \$123,656. All other war profiteers are relieved of taxation in the same proportion. The taxes taken off their shoulders will be paid by the common people.

#### TERRIBLE CONDITIONS EXISTING IN RUSSIA

London, Dec. 14.—The iron hand of Germany has been dealing Russia an awful blow through the Bolsheviks. The last hope of the peaceful settlement of the differences between the Russian peoples has passed and henceforth force must decide everything in that troubled country. Many of the former members of the secret political police are in the ranks of the party handling the power, and are sowing dissension broadcast. Their methods are horrible.

The corpses of seven thousand persons who were not drowned have been fished out of the rivers and women have been stripped of their hair, which is sold. The Russian Church is again independent.

General Korniloff has been wounded in a battle which took place between Bielgorod and Sumu.

#### THE CHRISTENING OF THE UNIONIST ASSOCN.

The meeting which had been advertised to take place in the Empress Theatre last night for the purpose of the formation of a local Unionist Association was largely attended by the members of the late Conservative Association, and very few were there, at that. At one time, it was possible to count fifty-one heads. The officers elected are: Hon. President, Col. Cy Peck; Pres., Mr. W. P. Lynch; First Vice-Pres., Mr. Geo. Frizzell; Second Vice-Pres., Mr. J. H. Thompson; Secretary, Mr. Geo. Hill; Treas., Mr. E. Doyle. Nominations for the executive numbered thirty names, and acceptance will doubtless depend upon the result of the election.

Mr. W. O. Fulton was chairman of the meeting, and the chief speakers last night were Mr. W. P. Lynch, and the active members of the late Conservative party. Liberals who attended could be counted upon one hand.

#### UNION PARTY HAS NO CHANCE IN NOVA SCOTIA

(Special to The Daily News.)  
Vancouver, Dec. 14.—Hon. C. W. Cross, attorney-general of Alberta after spending several days here and in Victoria in conference with government officials and Liberal candidates of the mainland and Vancouver Island, has departed for Edmonton. Mr. Cross, before leaving, expressed his confidence that British Columbia would elect a majority of Liberal members. Liberal candidates who conferred with Mr. Cross are expressing great confidence in the outlook for the election of a majority of Liberals. In response to an inquiry from the east as to the situation here, wires have been dispatched claiming nine out of 13 seats for the Liberal and Labor candidates.

In a letter to local Liberals, E. M. Macdonald, former member for Pictou, N. S., who with George P. Graham, visited this coast last March in the interests of the Liberal party, say that the conscription law has created a great furor in Nova Scotia and that the fight there is being waged on straight party lines. Mr. Macdonald expresses the belief the Liberals will win 10 out of the 16 seats in the rock-ribbed province. The general impression in the east, he declares, is that the Union Government cannot possibly be elected by any means.

This applies all the more to soldiers, when requested by their superior officers, but one thing certain is that these soldiers will be able to mark the secret ballot, uninfluenced either by the government in power, or by their superior officers.

#### GERMANS HELD BY THE BRITISH AT BULLECOURT

Most Formidable Attack Made by Germans Falls—Italians Maintain Positions in Great Fight.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Dec. 14.—The British forces have apparently stopped the Crown Prince Rupprecht's long prepared attempt to break the British hold-around Bullecourt. Fighting is continuing fiercely. The Germans only succeeded in advancing for a few yards. This attack was the most formidable that the British have had to sustain in this sector.

An Investigation.

The British government will investigate into the reasons for the British reverse on the southern end of the Cambrai salient recently. General Haig will be asked to explain. Joseph Dillon, the Irish Nationalist, is caustic in his remarks and says that the enemy were in the village before the British knew it.

French Front.

Paris, Dec. 14.—Active artillery fighting is in progress along the whole front. There is no infantry activity. Nine German aeroplanes were brought down yesterday.

The Armistice.

Berlin, Dec. 14.—Negotiations for the armistice to replace the existing truce on the Russian front began at headquarters today, according to the announcement. (continued on Page Four.)

#### THIS IS THE VOICE OF PECK'S COMMITTEE

The Laurier candidate, Mr. Stork, and his friends say: Look at our drydock. Read what Mr. E. J. Chamberlin, President of the G. T. P. Railway Co. and the Grand Trunk Railway System, said about the drydock on July 7th of this year, and decide for yourself what the trouble is.

Union Government can do as much to start the drydock as can Mr. Stork.

Montreal, Que., July 7, 1917. (Personal)

Enclosed I hand you copy of some correspondence with the Union Iron Works, San Francisco, relative to leasing of Prince Rupert drydock, which I will be glad to have you show to the people of Prince Rupert, as there seems to be a feeling in Prince Rupert that this company is not willing to put the drydock in operation. It is true that we have felt that it would be unwise to lease the dock to amateurs who desire it only for promotion purposes, but we have tried faithfully to put the dock in operation through legitimate concerns. We would have arranged with Messrs. Swan, Hunter, Wigham Richardson but found they were unable to secure any deliveries of steel within a year of their application, and I assume that the reason the Union Iron Works of San Francisco have thrown down the proposition is that they were unable to secure material, and as they are sup-

posed to be associated with the Bethlehem Steel Corporation, which has nearly twice the capacity of Krupp's of Germany, it would seem there would be small prospect of the Northwestern Steel Company of Portland, Ore., being able to negotiate if they desire to take up the question.

I also desire to say in this connection, that there is no cause for the people of Prince Rupert blaming the government or the Railway Commission relative to the delay in putting the drydock in operation. In the first place neither the Railway Commission nor the Government have any jurisdiction over the Prince Rupert drydock any more than they have over any other manufacturing plant on the British Columbia coast. This plant is owned by the Grand Trunk Pacific Development Company and not by the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway, and does not come under the jurisdiction of the Railway Commission, neither have the Government paid one cent towards its construction and maintenance, either directly or indirectly. I would say that both the Government and the Railway Commission have used their influence at all times to assist as much as possible in getting the drydock in operation.

## FOR THE PARTY

Sir Robert Borden has re-pudiated the suggestion that he acquired the idea of putting conscription of men into force in Canada, from his visit to Great Britain in the early part of this year. Until he went there, however, he repeatedly stated that conscription would never come in Canada. He was not back, however, for four days before he went back upon his former declarations. Sir Robert's idea of Imperialism must have been deepened by his coming in contact with the Old Country Tories. He must have got slightly out of touch with the spirit of Canada during his four months' sojourn in Europe. Impressionable natures change quickly, and the close association during these four months with Bob Rogers apparently had borne fruit.

As minister of elections, Bob Rogers is second only to Sir Clifford Sifton, and they found in the conscription cry an election issue of the finest kind—for them. Posing as a Union government, achieved by the co-operation of six Liberals, they hoped to split the opposition and return to power for another five years, maybe. The big interests, who have controlled the Borden government during the last parliament, expect to have another spell of the same plundering of the people as has gone on during that time.

And if the people stand for it, that's what they will get.

## FOR THE EMPIRE

In his tour of the West, Sir Wilfrid Laurier has been welcomed by the people en masse. In his speech at Regina, he emphasized that he will never desert the cause of Canada, or of the Empire. His record for the last forty years has been unblemished as a "statesman of the Empire." He was accused during the last election from one end of Quebec to the other by the emissaries of the Tories of being "too British." Now the same people cause him to be called from one end of the Dominion to the other as

being too French. His support in Quebec at the last election was divided by the fear which was fostered in the minds of the French-Canadians that he would introduce conscription because of his naval policy, which was "too British." The greatest statesman in Canada is today too British to desert the cause of Canada and of the Empire. And he has the people with him.

## TOO TALL!

The overstated and exaggerated claims which are being put forward by the alleged Unionist party to the effect that Canada will quit her share in the struggle of the Empire, unless votes are cast for the Union candidates, can only be regarded as insults to the intelligence of the voters. Statements of this kind are false, and these false statements are made knowingly. The belief that all is fair in love and elections dies hard. Each succeeding generation gets a little bit wiser than the preceding one, and arguments that would get by at an election say fifty years ago are scrutinized just a little bit closer these days. The very extremity of the statements made about Laurier and the Liberals tend to defeat their own ends. Laurier has declared for putting Canada upon a proper war basis, wherein all shall help in bearing the burden of the war in proportion as they can.

His policy is constructive and far-reaching. By having the industries of Canada co-ordinated under Government control for the production of war supplies and for the supply of food for the people at home and the allies overseas, the elimination of profiteering, and Canada united, the Dominion will be in a far better position to do her full share in the winning of the war than under Borden and his henchmen. A vote for Stork and Laurier is a vote for a resumption of the prosperity of Canada and for a united and contented people, pulling together towards one end, and with one aim, to win the war at the earliest possible moment.

The votes of five hundred thousand women, mostly poor women, the wives, daughters, mothers, and sisters of the soldiers, will not save a government, even with a changed name, that is hand in glove with Sir Joseph Flavelle, the man who takes every dollar they can scrape together for food to put into the mouths of their little children. The man is at the front earning his dollar ten a day, with blood and toil. The women at home find that dollar worth only fifty cents, largely through the efforts of the Borden government and its profiteering friends. Yet the alleged Unionists say that food prices is not an issue in this election.

Baron Rhondaga can fine a man \$27,500 for charging too much for potatoes, but Food Controller Hanna doesn't pull any of that rough stuff in Canada. It isn't done here. It's bad form. Mr. Hanna's idea of food control is really self control. From time to time he issues a manifesto full of kind words. He tells the people to draw their belts tighter and face starvation cheerfully. And then when his office is criticised, he says it is the "organized efforts of German agents." He's some controller.

**WHAT OF THE FUTURE OF PRINCE RUPERT**

Editor News:—I came to Prince Rupert in the early days and invested my meagre savings in city property. The prospects for a great future for this town were then bright, and I expected to spend my declining years in comfort here. But now it is a question with me, and with the rest of us, whether we are to remain here or not.

It may be true—as that blatant and hypocritical Knight, Sir Geo. E. Foster said at the Empire Club in Toronto, that this town is accursed and that we are hanging on by our eyebrows, and by the skin of our teeth. If we are, it is no fault of ours, for we came here in good faith. However, the wish was father to the thought with Sir George for he was only voicing the sentiment of the Borden Government when he gave forth the utterance.

If the Tory—Borden Union—Government is again returned to power how will you and I fare, Mr. Editor? Just consider the matter; turn it over in your mind and reflect before you cast your vote next Monday.

If you are a fisherman you may consider this: Borden sent an emissary here a few months ago and at a heavy cost, to find out to a fraction of a cent what it cost to land a pound of fish here. When that is known you will likely be allowed a small margin over that cost, and the profiteers who are paying the cost of the present Union campaign will take the rest. The price of fish to the consumer will remain the same—you may depend on that.

If you are a G. T. P. employee, read over Borden's manifesto and see what he says about tearing up parallel tracks. He will not tear up any of the C. N. R. tracks for the government now owns that junk, lock, stock and barrel. Only the other day Sir Thomas White paid off C. N. R. obligations amounting to \$25,000,000 and took as collateral a block of stock that Sir Henry Drayton said was not worth a tinker's damn. Next to the cataclysm at Halifax this is the greatest tragedy in Canadian history. It is not only a tragedy, but a burning shame as well.

But to go no further; if the so-called Union Government is returned to power, Prince Rupert is off the map, and we may as well pull up stakes and get out. Our drydock will remain a pile of rusting steel and our proud transcontinental railway will be converted into a jerk-water line, and this will truly become a land of peace and quietness—without the milk and honey.

This may be a gloomy prospect, but it will happen as sure as night follows day if Borden is permitted to hang on to power, even by his eyebrows. But all is not lost. It is up to us, the electors, to put our shoulders to the wheel and put an end to this farce of a government by relegating Borden and his gang of grafters to everlasting oblivion, and I think we can do it next Monday. **Italian Front.**

Rome, Dec. 14.—Von Buelow's troops have joined the Austrians and Bohemians under Field Marshall von Hoetzendorf in a series of heavy assaults during the last two days between the Brenta and Piave rivers. Fighting has been most severe and attended with large losses, but the Italian line has been sustained with one slight indentation at Mont Sponziosa. There the enemy secured a temporary footing, which is still being contested by the Italians. The fourth Austrian division and a number of Bohemian regiments fighting here are fresh from the Russo-Galician front.

**TRYING TO SWITCH THE OVERSEAS VOTE**

Mr. Fred Pearson, of the Halifax Chronicle, wired recently to Mr. J. E. Atkinson, of the Toronto Star, which is strongly supporting Union Government, as follows:

"Halifax, Dec. 2nd, 1917. J. E. Atkinson, The Star, Toronto, Ont.—Trustworthy advices received here from overseas indicate very strong sentiment among the soldiers at the treatment which they have experienced from Parley and the headquarters staff. This feeling, coupled with war weariness, is likely to result in their voting very strongly against Union Government, Borden being very generally condemned. What do you think of the idea of Liberal newspapers supporting the principles of Union Government joining in a cable message to overseas forces to the effect that our attitude has been dictated by our desire to back up the boys at the front and that we believe, if returned to power, the Union Government will become an effective instrument to remedy the intolerable conditions which have so far obtained? Message to be published prominently in all the British papers. If you agree will you take the matter up with Ontario papers?—Am writing Dafoe (editor of the Winnipeg Free Press). Please advise, if possible, what you think.—G. FRED PEARSON, Halifax Chronicle."

The above dispatch gives the lie direct to the F. E. McKenzie dispatches from London, stating that the soldiers' vote was being polled solidly for Borden. McKenzie, it will be remembered, is the same correspondent who filled the newspapers of Canada with misleading and false statements to give the idea that all the soldiers at the front were voting against prohibition.

**G. P. GRAHAM SAYS WAR SAVED TORIES**

Ingersoll, Ont., Dec. 8.—Hon. G. P. Graham, speaking here in the interests of Malcolm Schell, declared that men who were clamoring for Union Government were not philanthropists but had in contemplation financial schemes more of individual than national importance. "The war," he said, "had saved Canada, financially, or the minister of finance would have gone to financial destruction in 1914."

**BORDEN IN HALIFAX**

Ottawa, Dec. 14.—Premier Borden relates his experience in the stricken city of Halifax. At least one whole mile of the city has been wiped out. The devastation must be seen to be actually realized. Whole buildings have been twisted and warped as if by a giant hand, while minute particles of glass have destroyed the eyes of many residents.

**THE SUBMARINE MENACE**

London, Dec. 14.—Sir Eric Geddes told the House of Commons yesterday that the Allies were beating the Germans at the submarine war game. But the menace is not yet mastered. During the past week fourteen British ships, over sixteen hundred tons have been lost.
