FIGHTING CONFINED TO THE ITALIAN FRONT

INACTIVITY MARKS OTHER FRONTS --- BOLSHIEVIKI REPORT THE CZAR ESCAPED

GERMANS STILL BATTERING AT ITALY'S LINE

All Assaults Repulsed by Italy's Mountaineers with Heavy Losses—Other Fronts Are Inactive.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Dec. 17.—The Italian front remains the only major field of military operations in which there is more than a local activity on the part of infantry. The Italian line, although almost ceaselessly assailed in the mountain regions, is still intact, and is holding well, except for a small recession here and there, which were forced at the cost of extremely heavy casualties upon the part of the German invaders. Berlin claims having taken over three thousand prisoners in the fighting of the past few days, and also that they have repulsed counter attacks made by the Italians upon the positions won by the Teutons.

Western Front.

London, Dec. 17.—There is no activity on the Franco-Belgian front except for local fighting which is mostly due to German thrusts here and there. These are being delivered by the enemy with the seeming intention of keeping the French command guessing as to where the real attack will take place.

In Palestine.

In Palestine, the British forces have scored further advances against the Turks, who have been driven back in a northeasterly direction from Jerusalem.

NEW NATIONAL SHIP-YARDS IN GREAT BRITAIN

The Old Country's Cry for Ships and Still More Ships Again Reproaches Rupert's Idle Plant.

London, Dec. 17.—"A vast extension of our shipbuilding facilities is necessary if we are successfully to counter the enemy's submarine depredations," said Sir Eric Geddes, first lord of the admiralty in the House of Commons in a speech appealing for men to meet the requirements of the government's ship repairing and shipbuilding programme.

"The demands on our merchant shipping," continued the first lord, "are greater than they have ever been. The submarine menace is, in my opinion, held, but not yet mastered. Our shipbuilding is not yet replacing our losses. If, following the tradition of our race, we put forth all our power and relax no effort to defeat the submarines, then the war can only end in victory. But we must have ships, more ships and still more ships, and now I want men to build them."

"Our plans are laid. We have got the steel and I want the men. Unless I have entirely mistaken the spirit of the country, we will have a response which will demonstrate to the world that our grip tightens as the great struggle continues."

The first lord described three new national shipyards which were being built on the river Severn. The first keels, he said, would be laid there during the early part of the year of a more highly standardized ship than had heretofore been undertaken. A great deal of the steel work would be done in bridge yards, and a considerable part of the labor would be performed by prisoners of war and unskilled help.

RUMORS OF ESCAPE OF THE CZAR NICHOLAS

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Dec. 17.—The escape of the former Czar Nicholas is reported by the Bolsheviki. This statement was denied later, but it has aroused considerable speculation. Many refuse to credit it. It is also rumored the return of Nicholas to the throne of the Czars has been designedly planned. Correspondents in Petrograd believe that the Bolsheviki will take this course just so soon as they have got themselves established.

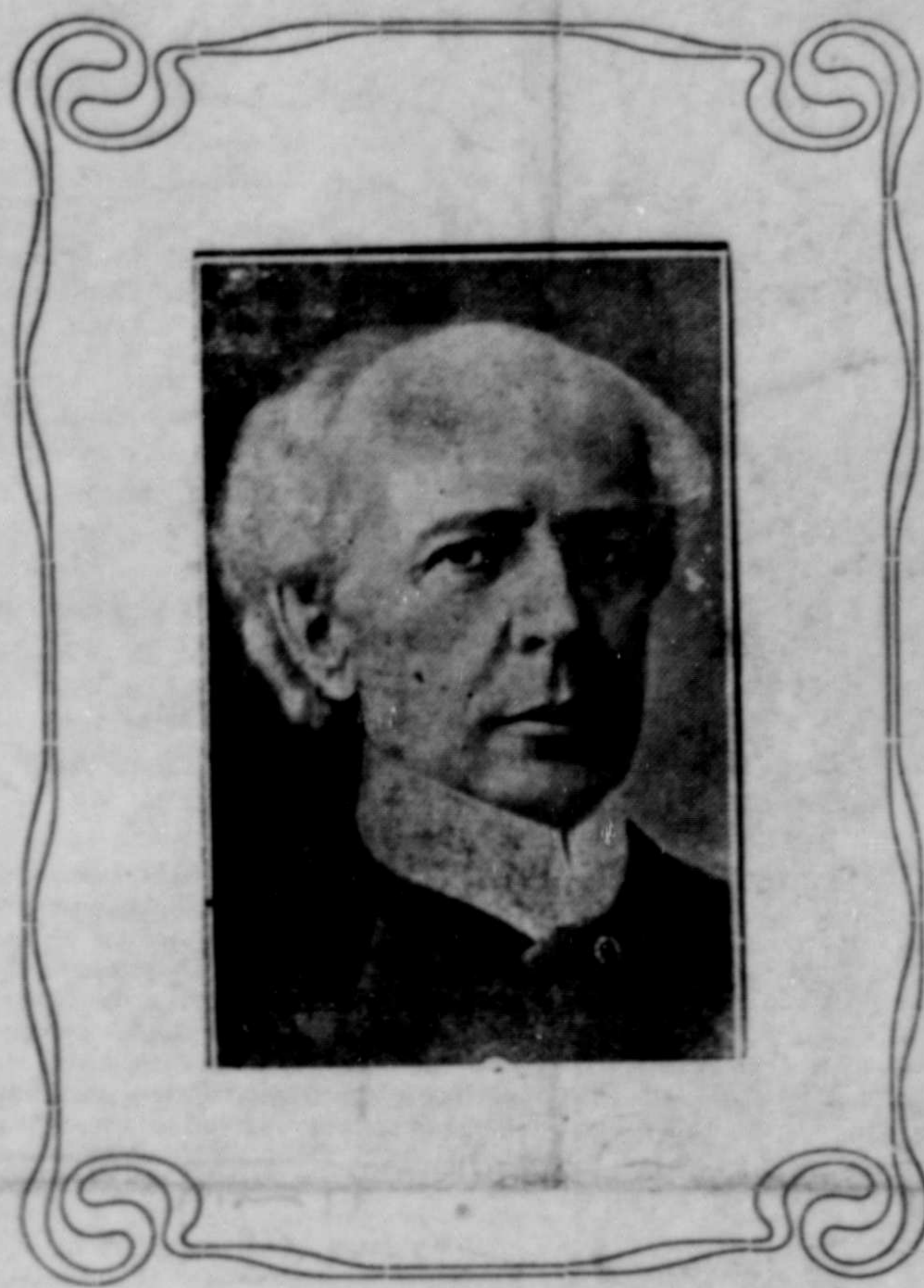

SIR WILFRID ON THE WAR

On the FIRST DAY of the EMERGENCY SESSION of Parliament in August, 1914, Sir Wilfrid said in the House:—

"It is our duty, more pressing upon us than all other duties . . . to let Great Britain know, and to let the friends and foes of Great Britain know, that there is in Canada but one mind and one heart, and that all Canadians stand behind the mother country, conscious and proud that she had engaged in this war, not from any selfish motive, for any purposes of aggrandisement, but to maintain untarnished the honor of her name, to fulfill her obligations to her allies, to maintain her treaty obligations and to save civilization from the unbridled lust of conquest and power."

For three whole years of the war, Sir Wilfrid did all that a leader of the Opposition could do to uphold the Government of the day, in carrying on the war. And speaking at QUEBEC at the OPENING OF THIS ELECTION CAMPAIGN, Sir Wilfrid used these words:—

"My compatriots, men and women," he cried, "the war is still going on. France is still under the heel of Germany. Britain is still heroically fighting, and fighting the foe on the soil of old France. What will we French-Canadians do? I come to speak to you frankly, with the same honesty as ever. I never deceived you and I have confidence in my compatriots. With pleasure or pain I always spoke the language of the truth. I shall do the same today."

"I believe that our first and pressing duty is to share in the fight. I believe that it is our immediate duty to help our armies who have covered themselves with glory. We must support them with men. We must feed them."

"The great and dominating question, the one question," he declared, "is the problem of the prosecution of the war. Every other issue is swallowed up in this."

FIXING UP THE RUSSO-GERMAN ARMISTICE

Berlin, Dec. 17.—The protocol commission, which will ratify the armistice between Germany and Russia on the eastern front is sitting today. At the last sitting, a full conference of representatives of nations agreed upon a draft.

LOSS TO GERMANY EQUALS A DEFEAT

London, Dec. 15.—In connection with the report of November 22 that the large chemical works at Griesheim-Elektron near Frankfurt had been destroyed by an explosion, it is authoritatively stated now that it is certain that the explosion destroyed one of the greatest munitions factories in the world. The factory covered 54 acres and was of prime importance as a source of synthetic nitrates. It also played a leading part in the production of poison gas, tear shells and poison shells, of which it was the greatest centre of manufacture in Germany, producing nearly 600,000 cubic feet of poison gas daily in 1916.

The factory also supplied quantities of electrolytic hydrogen for the inflation of Zeppelins and possessed three reservoir gasometers which had a total capacity of more than 300,000 cubic feet. So important was it in this respect that Zeppelin sheds usually containing two or three airships were erected close to the works.

They are as follows, and constitute the most conservative estimate thus far given out by any Liberal of prominence:

This estimate gives to the Liberals 107 seats in the eastern provinces. The Liberals claim that they will carry the west.

MR. H. S. WALLACE'S FAMILY IN HALIFAX ARE SAFE

The welcome news has come through to Mr. H. S. Wallace that his family, who were at school in Halifax have escaped any injury from the recent explosion which killed and injured so many thousands recently.

They were at school there, and although the building was partially wrecked from the force of the explosion, they are not hurt in the slightest.

So far, Mr. George Morrow has not received any information as to the safety or otherwise of his mother and two sisters, who resided in the ruined city. However, no news he considers is good news.

TIRPITZ GIVES IN

Amsterdam, Dec. 17.—Admiral Tirpitz, at a meeting of the Hamburg branch of the Fatherland League, declared that up to the present Great Britain has won in the war, rather than lost. This admission coming from such a source, is considered symptomatic of an early change in the attitude of the German government.

THE GUILLOTINE

Petrograd, Dec. 17.—Trotzky is now claiming a reign of terror for Russia and that within a month, the guillotine will be in use in Russia and scenes similar to those of the French revolution may be expected.

ELECTIONS

Now that the election campaigns are over, and after the excitement which is sure to be evidenced this evening, when the results of the polls begin to arrive, to a certain extent, interest in matters political begins to taper off, among the rank and file. At least, that is what happens usually. But it is questionable if the interest taken by what some people are fond of calling "the proletariat" in the political life of the country will fade away so readily on this occasion. There are so many matters of deep import, and which come home to every one in the community, demanding instant attention, that unless remedies are applied, and that speedily, something is likely to happen. For that reason, it is safe to say that the interest, which is getting wider year by year, taken in the actions of the elected of the people, will not so readily disappear on this occasion.

Were a greater interest, and a more intelligent interest taken in the affairs of the nation by the bulk of the people who have a vote, a great many of the anomalous things which are at present existing would not continue. The greater number of voters who make their interest felt in the actions of their representative, the better representation they are going to get. When a member knows that he is going to be criticised extensively throughout his riding, and when he knows that every voter is keeping tab upon him, then he is the more apt to remember the wishes of his electors.

Public interest in public questions is deepening with each succeeding generation. No longer is there a ruling class, as existed in other countries up to less than a hundred years ago. That which Sir Leicester Dedlock was afraid of has come to pass. "The floodgates of society are opened," yet without the disastrous results to the community, which he feared for his own class. Although the floodgates of society are opened, they are not yet ex-

tended to their fullest extent, although sufficient, possibly, unto the day. The people are said to elect their own representatives. It may be questioned often whether they do. For economic reasons often they are unable to elect the representatives they would like. Still, it is left with the people to elect or reject the candidates who stand for the honor that the people have to bestow. But at the best, this is an indirect manner in giving expression to the collective will of the people. There is great room for electoral reform.

Notwithstanding the war still going, and they are much nearer the seat of war and affected thereby than we in Canada, it looks very like as if there will be an election in Great Britain in the near future. Even with their National Government there, there is a party of kickers in the British House of Commons and Lloyd George is being dared to test the confidence of the nation by an appeal to the country. It is safe to say that the great little Welshman will retain the confidence reposed in him by the people there. And one thing that will be of considerable interest to Canadians is the kind of War Time Elections Act which his government will bring in.

Will Great Britain disenfranchise naturalized citizens as the Borden government did? Will Great Britain take away the vote from the women and give it only to the relatives of the soldiers overseas? We throw not. Notwithstanding their vested interests over there, and their landed aristocracy, and the other relics from the feudal age, which survive and oftentimes clog the wheels of progress, the spirit of democracy is more evident there as each day passes. That mother of parliaments can still create precedents, even in that land where precedent is revered. And there are some parliamentary reforms and governmental reforms about due, which will still serve as a model for the younger nations of the Empire.

Following the lead of Australia and Canada, they are thinking of an election in Great Britain too.

No matter who is elected, whether Laurier or Borden, Canada is in the war to the end, with men, money and resources.

The new State of Siberia has put an embargo upon the export of foodstuffs into European Russia for fear they might find their way into Germany. Korniloff controls the greater part of the food producing part of Russia. The Bolsheviks in Petrograd will be up against it soon.

Russia wants to exchange German civilian prisoners for some four thousand Russian officers, prisoners in Germany. But these German civilians are mostly in captivity in Siberia, which has declared its independence of Russia. The Bolsheviks may have some difficulty in handing them over.

To get rid of the Portuguese Borden-Government required another revolution. The government troops were defeated after forty-eight hours' fighting. If such methods were approved in Canada, there would have been forty-eight hours' fighting long ago.

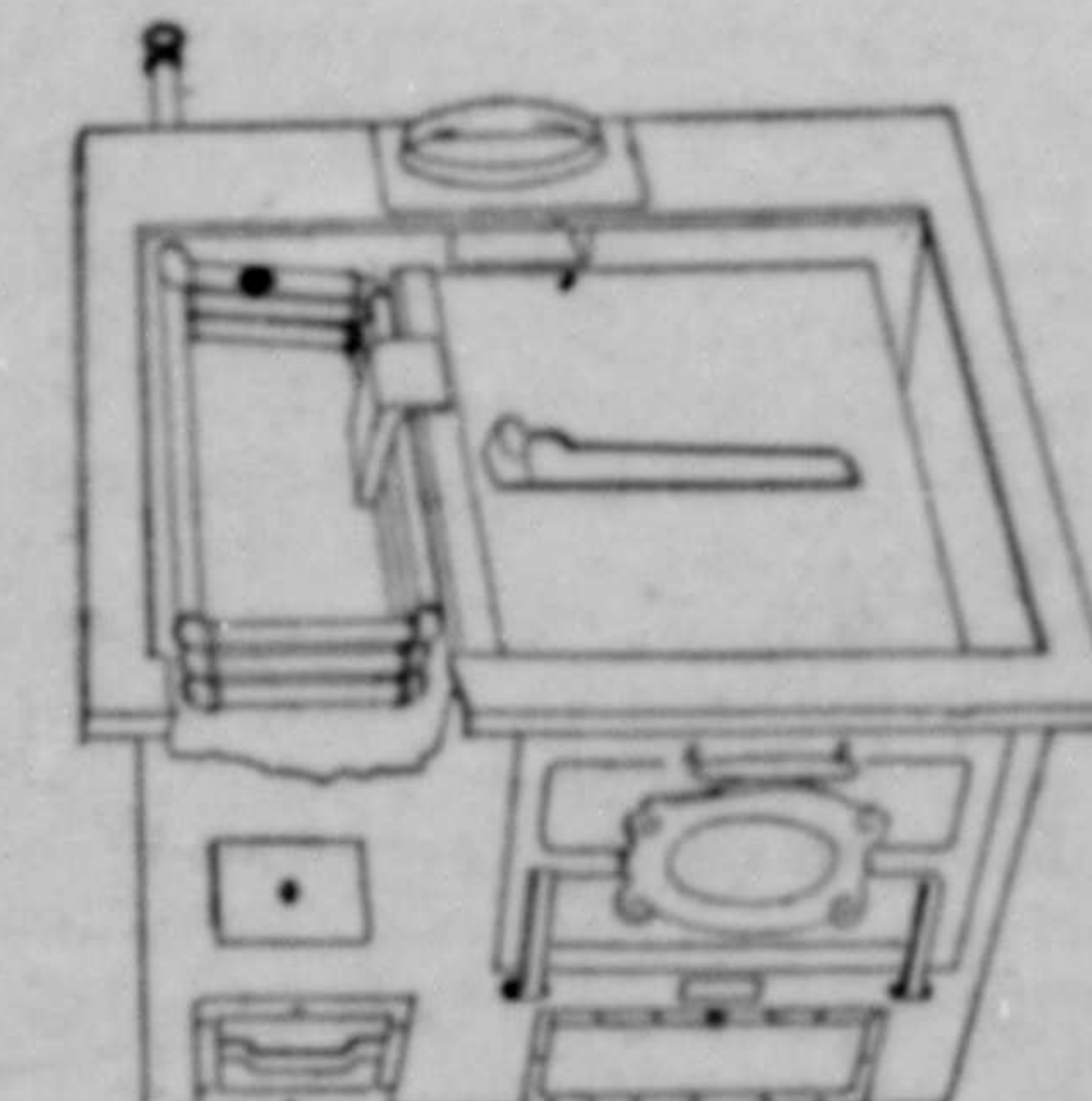

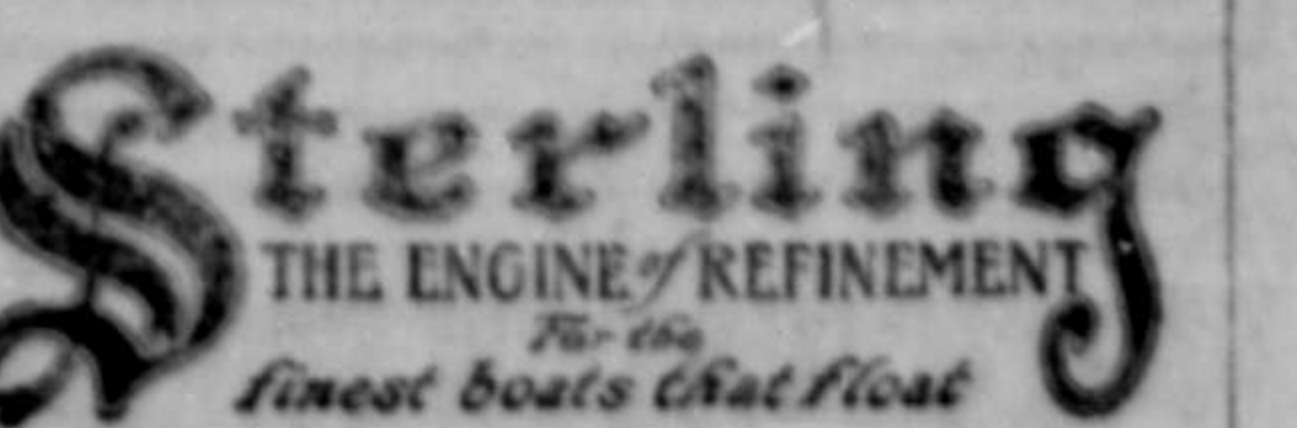
