HUNS RAID ANOTHER CONVOY IN NORTH SEA

KERENSKY AGAIN SHOWS UP FIGHTING -- ARTILLERY ACTIONS ON WEST FRONT

GERMAN WARSHIPS ATTACK CONVOY ON NORTH SEA

ELEVEN VESSELS SUNK BY ENEMY RAIDERS' DASH OUT FROM THE DEFENCES OF HELIGOLAND--NO FIGHTING OF ANY INTEREST IS REPORTED FROM ANY FRONT--KERENSKY OUT FIGHTING AGAIN

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Dec. 19.—Another successful attack has been made by German warships on the North Sea, which has resulted in the sinking of eleven vessels. This has come as an uncomfortable surprise to the British public and it is expected to cause a revival of a serious criticism of the Admiralty.

In addition to this, another raid was made off the Tyne last Wednesday by German warships. Their tactics are to make a dash across the North Sea at full speed so as much damage as they can in a few minutes and then dash back again to the shelter of the defences of Heligoland before the swift cruisers of the British Grand Fleet can intercept their return.

The sailings of the convoys, their times and ports of departure are apparently known by the Germans, owing to their system of espionage all through Scandinavia, and it is somewhat remarkable that more of these raids have not taken place.

British Front.

There is nothing of special interest to report along the western front beyond the usual artillery activity.

French Front.

Paris, Dec. 19.—Artillery is extremely active along the Rhone-Alpine canal. A German official statement has been made announcing the capture of American soldiers located near the Rhone-Alpine canal on November 3. The only activity reported by the war office was the repulse of German attacks to the south of Givencourt.

Italy Calls More Men.

Rome, Dec. 19.—New contingents have been called up by the Government. The classes of troops already mobilized consist of all eligible and fit men between the ages of 18 and 43.

Want to Declare War.

Buenos Aires, Dec. 19.—A committee of notable citizens, representing Juvenile committee composed of a hundred prominent Argentines, have adopted formal resolutions urging upon the Argentine government to declare war upon Germany.

KERENSKY IS IN THE FIELD ONCE MORE

(Special to The Daily News.)

Copenhagen, Dec. 19.—Kerensky has appeared near Petrograd at the head of several thousand troops. The Bolsheviks have sent armed forces to meet this newest of the counter revolutions against their usurped authority. From the details which have come through, it cannot be ascertained whether Kerensky is operating in conjunction with Korniloff and Kaledines, who have fought pitched battles with the Bolshevik forces to the south of Moscow.

The Bolsheviks are having their hands full in maintaining their authority even in the little part of Russia which they do control.

GERMANY'S ECONOMIC RUIN IS PRESAGED

London.—Reuter's representative last evening had an interview with Lord Robert Cecil. Speaking of the Italian situation, the Minister of Blockade said:—Politically all our information is that the spirit of Italy is quite untouched. It would be foolish to deny that there has been a serious reverse but our information is very specific that it has increased public courage and brought the whole people together. There is no sign of disagreement or panic at the reverse, but only a strengthened determination to finish the fight. As for the Allies, they are doing and will do all that is possible, for we regard the front as one front. What has happened only means that we and others have got to make all the stronger exertions. There is not the least reason to suppose that the result of the war will be affected. With our enormous power—if all exert their influence together—we could do an immense amount. The Germans fully recognize the immense power of the economic offensive. There is one aspect of the economic situation that merits the very close attention of the Germans. That is the mere economic fact that there is an increasing danger of a world shortage of essentials, partly due to the direct and partly due to the indirect results of the war, and this is bound to increase as the war goes on. The opponents of Germany command the sources of a vast proportion of these essentials, and it is quite evident that after the war they will first have to consider their own needs, then those of neutrals, and finally perhaps, if there is anything left, the needs of those who were our enemies. The latter must, however, inevitably come last, and the longer the war continues the less there will be to go round. That is not a question of policy, but an inevitable and essential fact, that should be brought to the knowledge of all. I am not now discussing whether or not in what way the allies should use the economic powers that they possess. That is another question, but quite apart from the Central Powers are in a very precarious condition already, and I see nothing but greater economic ruin for them after the war."

TORIES PATTING THEMSELVES ON THE BACK AT RESULTS

HAVE AN UNBOUNDED BELIEF THAT SOLDIERS' VOTE WILL HELP THEM FURTHER, BUT THEY MAY BE SURPRISED INSTEAD—HOPE FOR GOVERNMENT MAJORITY OF SIXTY WHEN HOUSE MEETS

(Special to The Daily News.)

According to advices received from Ottawa, in official circles there it is confidently expected that when the parliament meets again in February next, the Borden Government will have a majority of about sixty. This, of course, is the Tory calculation, and the wish is doubtless the father to the thought. It has to be remembered that in accounting for the Unionist majority, some 37 are Liberal Unionists. These, combined with the Laurier Liberals, have got the old Conservatives in the minority. Sir Robert Borden, if he is to remain the leader of the administration, will have to quicken his pace considerably with such a majority of Liberals in the house. The anomaly of a Conservative leader holding in leash a majority of Liberals will be watched with great interest.

In discussing the results from the different provinces, the official circles in Ottawa are hoping for

great things yet to come by virtue of the soldiers' vote. Where there are at present Liberal majorities, they expect that these will be wiped out. If hoping could do so, it would certainly be done. The winning of ten seats by Laurier in Ontario is ascribed to French-Canadian or "German" influence. Even in apparent success, the Tory politicians cannot desist from slander.

The going solid for Laurier in Prince Edward Island is excused by the statement that Union government never was popular there, and the result is not regarded as a surprise, while in New Brunswick the Liberal members there are too accounted for by the racial division of the population. In Nova Scotia, the two Halifax seats and the soldiers' vote are to swing that province into line. In Alberta, where there are three Liberals leading, these seats are still regarded as "in doubt." They are the constituencies of Bow River, Battle River and Victoria.

FREE AND EASY IS THE RUSSIAN STYLE

The Happy Go Lucky Standard by Which Men and Women Live — Broad Latitude Everywhere

The wide and willing acceptance of the brotherhood of man as a fact, not as a theory, is part of the Russian character. Snobbery is unknown in Russia. No respect is paid to birth. A title confers no dignity.

Nor is there a money standard to exalt the rich. A cabman will ask a General to give him a light for his cigarette; and the General gives it with a friendly word. Matters between men and women are arranged upon what are often described as natural lines. If a husband and wife cease to find each others' society congenial, and if each takes another mate, no comment is offered. There are no rules today in Russia for the regulation of existence.

They get up when they feel like it, and they go to bed at any hour, preferably three or four in the morning. They seldom keep appointments to time; often, they forget all about them. They do not have rigidly fixed hours for meals. At dinner parties, the guests dress as they please. "Do as you please" is the plan that suits them.—Hamilton Fyfe in Evening Post.

SERBIA GALLANT LITTLE NATION

Victoria Nurse Recounts Her Impressions After a Year in Balkan Battle Line

"The Serbs are nature's gentlemen. Even the humblest peasant has a native dignity and courtesy. They are, moreover, fine looking fellows, of strong physique."

This is the tribute paid the people of one of the Allied nations by Mrs. Eric Colborne, of Victoria, who has returned from the eastern front, where she has been nursing since August, 1916.

Mrs. Colborne is instilled of her praise of the Serbs, and this after seeing them under their present distressful conditions, without a country, homeless, portionless, and often as in in the hospital under intense physical suffering is no mean tribute to a people who have proved their national metal in so splendid a way in this war.

"We were just behind the Serbian reserve lines," said Mrs. Colborne. "In the Battle of Kaymatichalan, in September, 1916, in which the Serbs with great gallantry stormed and captured the mountain of that name, we were able quite plainly to see the troops advancing up the steep, rocky slopes of the hill. The bombardment before the advance took place was terrific, and even where we were the ground seemed to shake under our feet and the noise was deafening."

CANADA'S BUSINESS

Now that Sir Robert Borden and his idea of compulsory service has been endorsed by the majority of the voters in Canada,—you will note we did not say the people of Canada—it is to be expected that immediate steps will again be taken to put the Military Service Act into operation. Notwithstanding that Sir Wilfrid Laurier declared that he could make the voluntary system of recruiting a decided success, the majority of the voters of Canada, by returning at the polls the supporters of Sir Robert Borden, by their votes, have voiced their opinion that Canada needs to be compelled by law to do her share in bearing the burden of the Empire. The Borden party has reduced the issue to one of reinforcements for the Canadian divisions at the front. That, they said, was the one, the only issue. The high price of food, the profiteering, the graft, the idle Prince Rupert drydock plant, the non-combatant officers with the Canadian forces who sometimes got "near the front" and the discontent among the people generally, like "the flowers that bloom in the spring" have nothing to do with the case. All that this election was about, in their opinion, was whether Canada should send reinforcements voluntarily, or whether Canada should send reinforcements compulsorily.

The peculiar thing in this election was that the issue chosen by Sir Robert Borden and his ministers of elections was already law. It was really a dead issue. The Borden government, however, preferred to keep it alive, by not enforcing the provisions of the act which they themselves spent some months in passing through parliament. The date when the first draft was to have been called to the colors was the 10th day of December, only one week before the date of the general election. It was not convenient, however, to enforce the law on this date, and the time for the first draft has been put off until January.

In fairness to the other

provinces of Canada, who have supported the Union government, the conscription law will have to be applied to the province of Quebec in the same proportion as to the other parts of Canada. The letter of the Deputy Speaker, Mr. Rainville, assured the French-Canadians that the Military Service Act did not apply to the sons of the farmers or to the factory workers. Sir Robert Borden neither denied nor admitted that this was the intention of the government when taxed with this matter on the floor of the house. It will be of interest to see whether the conscription law is applied in one manner in upper Canada and in another manner in lower Canada. Mr. Rainville seemed fairly sure of his ground when writing his famous letter, and coming from a member of the government, it ought to have some authority.

Notwithstanding all the pre-election speeches as to what was and was not an issue in the election, it is safe to say that if the authority of the government is not made evident in the matter of the high cost of living, in an improvement of the treatment meted out to the returned soldiers, and the dependents of those who have not yet returned, and also of those who will never return, of summary action with regard to the profiteers, and grafters, then this new government will be regarded as no better than the old Borden government.

If it is no better, then it will not retain the confidence of the people long, and it cannot last.
