RUSSIANS PREPARE TO FIGHT FOR PEACE

NEGOTIATIONS WITH GERMANY BROKEN OFF—FIRST DRAFT CALLED UP TODAY

RUSSIANS BREAK OFF PEACE NEGOTIATIONS WITH GERMANY

BOLSHEVIKI MAKING PREPARATIONS FOR DEFENCE AGAINST GERMANS, WHO REFUSE TO WITHDRAW TROOPS FROM POLAND—BRITISH TROOPS FIGHTING IN ITALY—HUNS ROUTED

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Jan. 3.—Notwithstanding all the progress made in the negotiations at Brest-Litovsk at the peace conference, the Bolshevik government are now making preparations for defence against the Germans and have broken off the peace negotiations. This is because Germany will not withdraw her troops from the occupied areas of Poland and the other sections of Russia presently in German hands.

The proposals of the Russian government were that in return for the withdrawal of the Russian troops from all parts of Austria-Hungary, Turkey and Persia, where they were in occupation, Germany should withdraw hers from Poland.

Russia's Proposal.

"In accordance with the principles of the Russian government which has declared the right of all peoples living in Russia to self-determination, including even separation, the populations of these districts will be given an opportunity within the shortest possible period of deciding entirely and freely the question of their union with one or the other empire, or their formation into independent states. The presence of any troops in the territories which are voting shall not be permissible until this question is decided."

As Germany cannot see her way clear to agree to this proposal of the Bolshevik government, Russia is again preparing to fight for her idea of freedom and democracy.

CHANGES IN BRITISH DIPLOMATIC CORPS

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, January 3.—Sir Cecil Spring Rice and Lord Bertie, British ambassadors to Washington and Paris, will shortly retire. It is rumored that Sir George Buchanan, the British ambassador to Petrograd, is about to resign.

COMPULSORY RATIONING WANTED IN GREAT BRITAIN

London, Jan. 2.—The national convention of the Trades Union Labor Party and War Emergency Workers adopted resolutions protesting against "the sufferings now being unnecessarily inflicted upon the mass of urban consumers by the prolonged delay of the Government in organizing an equitable system of distribution of the supplies of food," and demanding equal sharing among all families without distinction as to wealth or class, and compulsory rationing.

W. T. MUSE BRINGS IN PORPOISE MEAT

In addition to whale meat, which heretofore has not been so popular as it is today as an article of diet, the porpoise is being looked upon as a hitherto untapped source of human sustenance. In several of the southern cities, porpoise meat has been placed upon the market, with considerable success. Arriving in town last evening from a trip up the coast, Mr. W. T. Muse, the well known contractor, brought with him a porpoise which he got near to Green Island, off Port Simpson. He has tried it and finds it most palatable.

The porpoise itself looks altogether different when out of the water than might be expected. When seen in the sea rolling along, all that is apparent is his snout and a hiss. When in mid-ocean, however, he becomes more lively and jumps clear out of the water altogether. In form, he is very like a porker, and his flesh is a dark color and odorless. It tastes not in the least fishy, and even better than whale meat. It is tender and juicy, with a fine beef flavor.

Porpoise steaks may yet vie with the tenderloin as a choice morsel in popularity and the dwellers on the coast may soon be independent of the cold storage steer for butcher meat.

MINE EXPLODES ON SHORE, KILLING MANY

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Jan. 3.—Seven persons were killed and twenty-four injured by the explosion of a mine which was washed ashore yesterday between Ramsgate and Deal. The explosion occurred when the men were trying to haul it out of the water onto land. One of its projection knobs came in violent contact with the shore, causing the mine to explode, just as if a ship had struck it.

THE DELAYED TRAINS MAY ARRIVE TONIGHT

Considerable progress has been made with the clearing of the railroad track and the latest information is that it is possible that the trains due here on Sunday and Tuesday may arrive in the city tonight somewhere around midnight. It is expected that the train due in tonight in ordinary course will reach here tomorrow.

From Terrace east the line is clear and a No. 2 train was despatched from there yesterday, taking up the regular run from Terrace east, instead of from Prince Rupert.

ANNUAL CONVENTION OF LABOR FEDERATION

Vancouver, Jan. 2.—The eighth annual convention of the B. C. Federation of Labor will be held in the Labor Temple here on Monday, January 28, when it is expected that delegates from all parts of the province will be present.

In the official "call" issued by Secretary-Treasurer Wells, reference is made to the policy of the Federation in placing candidates in the field at the recent Federal elections, and he suggests the necessity for further action along political lines. Referring to the recent election and the Military Service Act, the document says that therein lies a danger to industrial unions. Special emphasis is laid upon the necessity of organized labor forming plans now to meet post-war problems.

CARSON WOULD BOMB THE HUNS' BUSINESSES

Sir Edward in London Advocates the Persuasive Force of Economic Offensive.

Speaking in London recently, Sir Edward Carson, after showing Lord Northcliffe where he was getting off at as the result of his visit to the United States, made a novel proposal for the treatment of Germany for her continuance in the war. Sir Edward said:

This morning I attended an historical meeting—the meeting of the British Cabinet with the American Mission. It was in Downing Street, in the old room, I believe, in which the foolish policy of taxing our Colony was agreed upon, and in the same room in which was considered and decided the question of peace and the independence of America. It was quite a notable gathering. I saw there our American cousins who I do not imagine came into the city simply to please you or to please me or to please this nation or this Empire, but who have come into the war with the far greater stimulus of asserting those lessons of liberty which have been handed down from us to them—who have come in to prosecute to the end the same ideals of freedom and to put an end forever to the horrors of Prussian domination, to the law of force as against the law of reason. And let our imagination go a little further and see what this all means. Just fancy the school books of America which ended probably with the bad relations of America with this country, which thrust upon them a war of independence which was wrung from their oppressors, and the glory they had in breaking away from England. But the future historian would tell them that together the English-speaking race, when war was going badly and when liberty and freedom were in the balance, were once more shaking hands across the Atlantic, and became one family. And that whatever might happen to any other nation, we together would see it through for the future of mankind. So far as I am concerned I am full of hope. I know and believe that we have the cards in our own hands. It is not merely a question of battalions and a question of munitions. There are greater forces behind that. There are the moral forces of civilization, and if that is not enough there is the persuasive force of economic offensive. We hear a great deal about the bombing of Hun buildings. For my part a far more effective offensive is the bombing of Huns' businesses. Let us bomb now. Let us bomb them so hard that they won't be in existence after the war. Let us bomb them so hard that the foundations of them won't be there. To my mind between the United States and our own Empire, not to talk of France and Italy and our other Allies, we hold in our hands the halter we can put round the German neck, and we are going to do it. When men say "Give notice that for every week or month that the war continues we will have a boycott for a year after that," or something of that kind, I answer that that will depend upon the terms of peace, but we can let the Germans see now each day that goes along that we are doing something which will render their position irrecoverable in the end. That to my mind is the true policy and taking that and the bravery of our sailors and soldiers in the field, who beat the enemy every time they meet them, I say that with these facts before us, not only ought we not to despair but

GERMAN RAIDS COMPLETE ROUTS IN FLANDERS

Artillery Activity in Champagne—Good Progress made in Palestine by British—German Attempt Fails.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Jan. 3.—The British troops in the neighborhood of Mericourt yesterday evening turned into a triple raid by the Germans into a complete rout. Very heavy losses were inflicted upon the Germans, and few escaped back to their own lines unscathed. During the month of December, the British forces in France have captured a total of 1,016 German prisoners, including twelve officers, four guns, three trench mortars and 103 machine guns.

In Palestine.

The British forces have occupied more than three hundred square miles of territory and are still making good progress.

French Front.

Paris, Jan. 3.—There has been spirited artillery fighting in the Champagne sector. Elsewhere quiet prevails.

Italian Front.

Rome, January 3.—The British troops joined in an allied offensive against the Teuton lines in Italy yesterday. British patrols attacked the advanced posts of the enemy, inflicting considerable losses and capturing many prisoners. Another attempt of the Huns to get across to the western side of the Piave river has been defeated by the Italians.

PEACE NEGOTIATIONS

There is something farcical in the peace terms put forth at the Brest-Litovsk conference between the representatives of Russia and of Germany. The policy of no annexations and no indemnities is to be agreed upon, but before a general peace can be signed, Russia is required to obtain her allies' consent to these terms. Needless to say, the war will still go on. While the policy of no annexations and no indemnities may be suitable to Russia, it cannot be said by any means that it would be good for the other of the allies.

German East Africa and West Africa cannot be returned to the German Empire. In the first place, from the menace they would form to the more important British possessions already colonized, and in the second place, the Germans have displayed that they do not possess the genius for colonization. They do not know how to govern subject races. In Australasia, too, their possessions there already form part of the Commonwealth. Neither can Germany be allowed to retain Alsace nor Lorraine, while Japan will never permit her to go again into Kiau Chau.

It would be a fine thing, doubtless, for Germany were the Allies to agree to no annexations and no indemnities. She would then be better off than the Allies after the war. And what about Belgium? There is where is required a greater indemnity than all Germany could ever pay, for the damage and destruction, sorrow and affliction which she has caused to that unhappy nation. Great Britain fought all Europe to a standstill in previous centuries for what she considered to be right, and the people of the British Empire are prepared to do the same thing again if need be, together with their brethren in the United States, so that the accused thing called war may never again afflict humanity.

This can only be done by the placing of Germany and her war-mad emperor in such a position that she will never

again be able to start anything. What the Allies have to do is to "win the war" as soon as possible. With a German peace the Allies would lose the war. The Allies must make the peace terms and Germany must accept them. Belgium demands indemnities. She has need of them. France demands indemnities for the damage the Germans have caused to that fair land. When the Kaiser asks for peace terms, the war might end.

NOTES AND COMMENTS

The Fraser Valley and the lower coast cities have been having a slight taste of what is more common up here. To have the telegraph wires down and the train service interrupted is no longer a novelty, now.

Now that the City Council have served nearly their full term, public interest in municipal matters is becoming more marked. Slamming the men whom the people themselves elected is the favorite pastime. If the electors don't like their council, let them kick themselves. They did the electing.

Observers at Washington are convinced that the process of nationalization of public utilities will not stop with the railroads. On the contrary, they think that it has only just begun, and that before long, the Government will take over the telegraphs and the express services, not already part of the railroad systems. And the nationalization of utilities will not stop there, either.

One of the leading naval experts in Germany, Captain Persius, admits that the U-boats are not starving Great Britain. He now thinks that the submarines have some considerable task to perform, and that no sensible man will put a time limit upon their doings. The Germans are like the Missourians—they have to be shown. And they will only believe they cannot win the war when their boasted military organization is thrown pell mell across the Rhine.

CHINESE TERRITORY OCCUPIED BY JAPAN

This action by Japan, thus replacing the military regime with a civil administration was the subject of a protest lodged recently at Tokio by China.

PRINCE RUPERT CAN STAND BIG INCREASE

"I predict a wonderful future for the Canadian fisheries," said Major Hugh Green, officer in charge of the fish supplies for the overseas Canadian army, and the Imperial Board of Trade recently, before leaving Montreal for England. "All the fish sent over is headed and dressed and packed in 200-lb. cases all ready for the army cook to de-frost and prepare, just as if they were fresh out of the water," said the major. "Three-quarters of what is being supplied to the armies today was never considered worth while before. In the maritime provinces the fishermen have hitherto only brought in such fish as cod, haddock, etc., to sell on shore. All their catches have been thrown back into the water. Now they are bringing in everything they can get, and are receiving almost as large prices for these formerly despised varieties as they do for cod and haddock from the army. There is no doubt but that the fisherman will reap great benefit as time goes on from this overseas business that has opened up for him."

British Grounds Depleted.

"Do I think that this trade with Great Britain will be permanent? Let me tell you that if the war were to end tomorrow the British fish industry would not be re-organized for at least five years. So many fishing smacks and trawlers have been lost, and so many fishermen have joined the army and have been killed or wounded, that the trade is at a standstill. Then it will probably be found after this war is over that the British grounds are greatly depleted, and that where formerly there were enormous shoals of fish there are none today."

"As far as the Canadian frozen fish trade is concerned, it is very probable that it will be as successful as the New Zealand frozen meat business. England is bound to look to Canada for foodstuffs for years to come. What is needed is new and modern methods of production, the same as they have in the old country. The British admiralty was able to take some 6,000 trawlers and boats from the fisheries for naval use. Contrast this with the four modern steam trawlers in use in Canada. And yet the fishing area in Canada in comparison with the British Isles is like Lake Superior to a duck pond. In 1914 the government statistics show that the money value of the Dogger Bank yield amounted to \$25,000,000, which is only one of many British fishing grounds."

"In Canada we have hundreds of Dogger Banks that have never had a steam trawler near them. For the past 20 years Canada has practically stood still as regards her fisheries. What we need are steam trawlers and cold storage houses along the coast to take care of the fish as soon as it leaves the boats. The Canadian fisheries should produce \$100,000,000 annually instead of the \$34,000,000 being produced today."—Exchange.

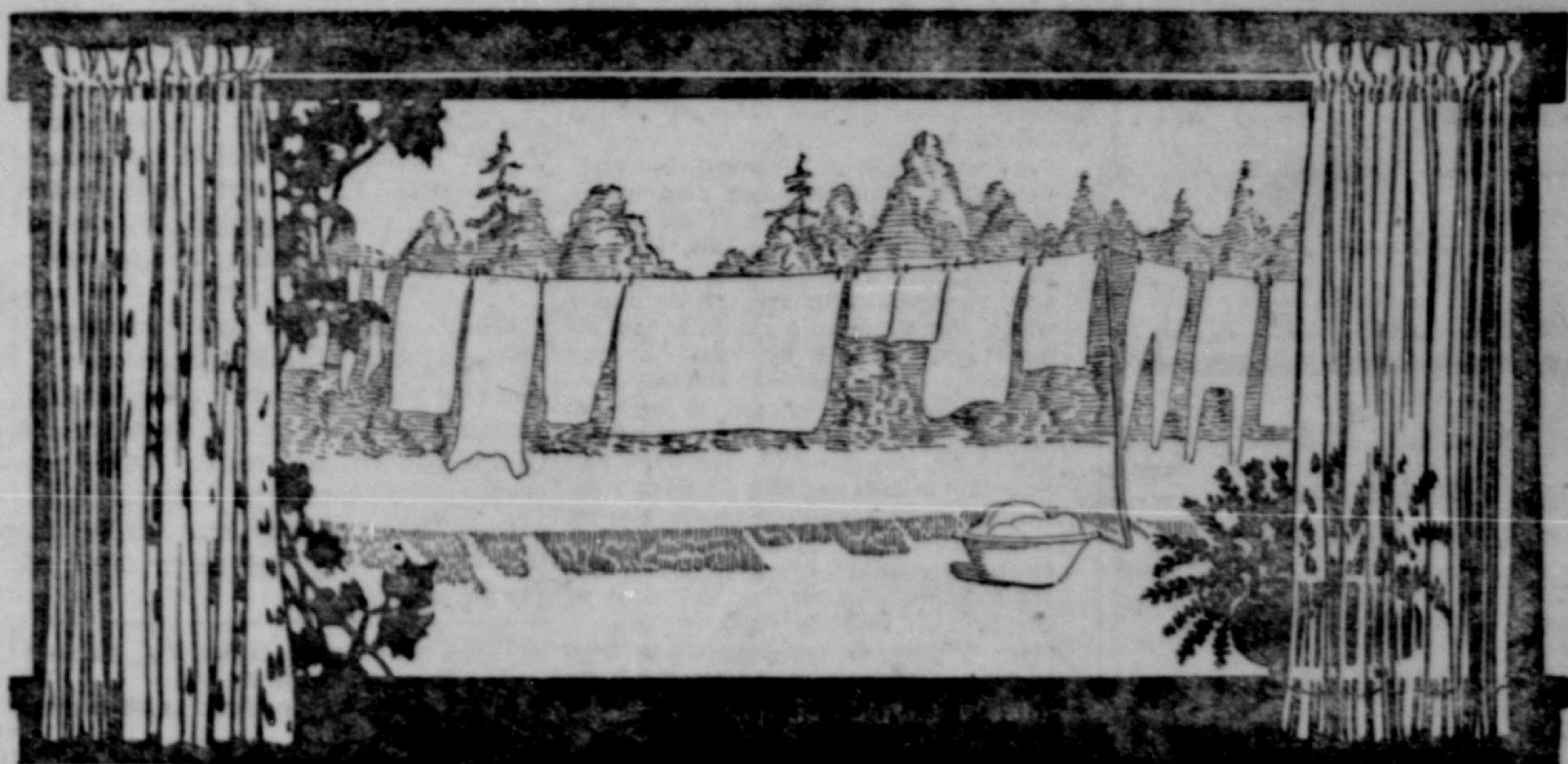
