#### THE SEPARATE PEACE

The Bolsheviki Government of Russia has found out at last that there exist "irreconcilable differences" between the two countries. It is now feared that these will force the discontinuence of the separate peace negotiations, now in progress between the two countries. It has taken the idealists in the Slav capital a long time to make sure that these differences did exist. So long as they remain, it is hardly likely that the two countries will make any real peace. The armistice on the Russian front was for the space of one month, and was for the ostensible purpose of conducting the negotiations, in which has now come the hitch. If that armistice is not renewed, the state of war will continue between the two countries. But whether the war will be prosecuted or not, remains with the Russians.

There is little information coming to hand as to the situation on the Russian battlefront. It is known that Germany has removed her best troops therefrom, and it is also known that a whole lot of the Russian soldiers have gone home. But in what strength their line is held, or whether their line is held at all, are things which can but be conjectured of

It is possible, however, that the breakdown in the peace negotiations may wake up the Russian dreamers of the millenium to the need for action first. Having got over their sickness caused by their overdose of freedom, it is possible that Russia may yet provide a solid front to the common enemy of democracy and all may yet be in at the final peace ing. negotiations, when the Empoint of the bayonet.



Washington, Jan. 4 .- Information has reached Washington that the British Government has appointed a special committee with a view to preparing for financial arrangements to be made after the end of the war. Sir Richard V. Vassar-Smith of Lloyds Bank is Chairman of the committee, whose duties are defined as follows:

"To consider and report whether the normal arrangements for the provision of financial facilities for trade by means of existing banking and financial institutions will be adequate to meet the needs of British industry during the period immediately following the tremination of the war, and, if not, by what emergency arrangement they should be supplemented, regard being had in particular to the general assistance which may be necessary.


