RUSSIANS PREPARE TO FIGHT FOR PEACE

WINTRY CONDITIONS ON THE WESTERN FRONT -- FIGHTING CONTINUES IN ITALY

BOLSHEVIKI WANT A WILLING ARMY TO FIGHT FOR IDEAL

PEACE NEGOTIATIONS AT RUSSO-GERMAN CONFERENCE NOW CONCLUDED AT BREST LITOVSK -- RUSSIANS DESIRE NO HELP--THEIR STRENGTH LIES IN THEIR WEAKNESS, SAYS RADOK

(Special to The Daily News.)
Amsterdam, January 8.—Notice that the Russo-German peace negotiations at Brest Litovsk have now been concluded is contained in a wireless message, which the German delegates have sent to the Russians today. Because of the Russian request for the transfer of peace parliaments from enemy to neutral soil, and Stockholm for preference, the Central Powers have temporarily suspended their negotiations with Russia.

Russians Will Fight.
London, Jan. 8.—The Bolsheviks are definitely strengthening their front, according to advices received from Petrograd today. Deputy Radok, one of the Russians who took a prominent part in the negotiations with the Austrians and Germans says that the Bolsheviks intend to send home all soldiers who do not wish to fight, so that they would then have an army willing to fight for their ideal. He says "We desire no help. Our strength lies in our weakness, and if we accepted assistance of the allies, the significance of our position would be destroyed."

Hopes Dwindling.
Germany now sees her hopes of peace dwindling. Herr Harden in Die Zukunft, that outspoken journal which has had so many vicissitudes, says, "The time has come for the German nation to tell the world exactly what it wants." He says that outsiders remain unconvinced that the German aims are sincere. The Reichstag should be assembled immediately, otherwise the chances of the Russian peace are lost.

THE MAYOR CHALLENGED BY ALDERMAN NELSON

There was quite an interesting incident at last night's meeting of the city council, which, however, passed off without any blows being struck. At the last week's council meeting, Ald. Nelson brought in a resolution regarding the filling in of Cow Bay, and his worship fixed the date for its consideration at thirty days from thence. This did not suit Ald. Nelson last week, and last evening it did not suit him any better, for he posted notice of motion for the reconsideration of his resolution last evening. Ald. Nelson brought the matter up again last evening on a question of privilege and wanted to go ahead with the reconsideration of his motion.

"I referred the matter back for thirty days," said the mayor, "and I am quite prepared to leave the matter in the hands of the city solicitor for his interpretation of the Municipal Act, as I have done for the past two years." "On a point of order," cried Ald. Nelson, "I take exception to your ruling." The city solicitor thereupon read the section of the Municipal Act, and confirmed the ruling as given by his worship.

"I have given a ruling," said the mayor, "and I am backed up by the city solicitor, and I don't think you have any right to object to that ruling."

"I am a member of this council," retorted Ald. Nelson belligerently, "and have rights just the same as the mayor."

"Pardon me," interposed his worship suavely, "you have no right to discuss that ruling. If you are going to ride roughshod over the mayor and the city solicitor, I don't know where you are going to get off at."

"I have a perfect right to appeal from your ruling," came back the alderman. "I take exception altogether to the interpretation of the Act. You cannot give notice that thirty days from now, when you are out of office."

"You don't know that I will be out of office," interjected his worship, which rather nonplussed Ald. Nelson for a second, and caused great laughter. "I don't know how to keep you quiet," went on the mayor, "unless I get a muzzle for you. You are taking a very arbitrary course at the end of the season."

"I appeal from the ruling of the chair," persisted Ald. Nelson. "You are out of office and we are all out of office in a few days." Ald. Dybhavn apparently thinking that the comedy had gone far enough, moved that the council sustain the ruling of the chair.

Upon Ald. Nelson rising again, he was kindly asked by his worship if he wanted the chair. "I will state my objection to your ruling, Mr. Mayor," went on Ald. Nelson, unperturbed. "This matter is to be reconsidered by this council, and to have it reconsidered, I make an appeal from the chair. I move that the chair be not sustained."

"We will pass on to the next business, which is the report of the city treasurer," said the mayor. Ald. Casey thereupon arose and enquired whether such arbitrary authority was really conferred upon the mayor by the

BRITISH FORCE PASSAGE OF THE PIAVE RIVER

Enemy Alarmed for His Safety—by Conditions on Western Front—British Bomb Enemy Depots.

(Special to The Daily News.)
Rome, January 8.—The British patrols have again crossed the Piave river. They forced a passage at several points, causing great consternation in the enemy lines.

On the Asiago.
Effective attacks were made on the enemy transports and troops on the Asiago plateau, and heavy losses were inflicted upon Austro-German columns on the march, when caught by the Italian artillery. North of Hill 304, a raid attempted by the German shock troops was repulsed before reaching the Italian lines. Both French and British batteries have been busily engaged in shelling the Hun positions between Vidor and Parte del Fruiti, and accomplished extensive destruction of the enemy establishments. Between Praso and Cimago Guidicaria valley, the artillery fire on both sides has been intense, with the advantage lying with the allies. Direct hits were registered upon several of the enemy batteries, destroying the guns and their crews, notwithstanding their skillful camouflage.

In the district of Lagerio local fighting is continuous. The Austro-Germans are being constantly harassed by infantry raids, artillery fire and aeroplane attacks.

British Front.
London, Jan. 8.—British troops on Saturday night attacked and recaptured many Germans in a trench section which the Teutons occupied earlier in the day to the east of Bullecourt. Freezing temperatures continue to hold the British front in its icy grip.

Bombing Trips.
British aviators have dropped large quantities of bombs upon the enemy depots in Belgium and in Lorraine.

Casualties.
The Imperial casualties for the past week number nearly nineteen thousand. This includes killed, wounded and missing.

German Revolt.
Twenty-five thousand German soldiers are said to have revolted in the region east of Kovno.

BRITISH REPRESENTATIVE TO THE UNITED STATES

London, Jan. 8.—Lord Reading will go to the United States as the direct representative of the British War Cabinet. He will not handle the lesser affairs of the office in Washington, which will be taken care of by Attache Col. Swinton, one of the originators of the British Tanks.

NOTES FROM THE COUNCIL CHAMBER

The second last meeting of the city council, as it is at present constituted, took place last evening in the city hall. His worship the mayor and all the aldermen were present. After the adoption of the minutes of the previous meeting, the first business attended to was a letter from Messrs. Patmore & Fulton in regard to injuries sustained by one of their clients, Mr. Chas. Hecker, through falling off a sidewalk between 7th and 8th Avenues during the month of November. It was claimed that he was so severely hurt that he is only now able to walk around. An offer of compensation was asked from the city. The fall was attributed to poor lighting and it is alleged that attention had been drawn to this state of affairs previously. The city clerk read his reply to Messrs. Patmore & Fulton, which was concurred in by the council.

An Employment Agency.
An application for a licence for an employment agency came next. Mr. Geo. Sutherland was the applicant. Ald. Dybhavn moved that the city clerk write Mr. Sutherland affording him all information. Ald. Casey thought that the matter of an employment bureau should be the object of municipal enterprise, and to be operated without charge to the workers. He moved an amendment that action on this application be deferred and that the matter be turned over to the new council.

Ald. Montgomery was heartily in favor of the idea put forward by Ald. Casey, yet at the same time, he would not like to see any monopoly in this matter, not even if the city had it. However, he did not see any chance of the city going into the business, so he would not like to see this application refused. Ald. Casey's amendment was lost, and the motion carried.

The Drydock.
The draft of a telegram which the mayor had prepared to send to Mr. C. C. Ballantyne, minister of marine and fisheries, regarding the Dominion's shipbuilding programme and the facilities at Prince Rupert, was then read. According to press information, it appears that the Dominion government is about to inaugurate a more vigorous prosecution of shipbuilding, and the mayor drew the attention of the minister to the plant in Prince Rupert with its drydock facilities in this connection. It was agreed that the telegram be sent.

Replanking.
Then came an application for the replanking of the sidewalk from Fulton Street to Taylor Street signed by the residents in the vicinity which was referred to the Board of Public Works.

The Cadet Corps.
Mr. J. C. Brady, principal of the high school, asked permission to address the council. His request was one which concerned the young boys of the city. The Cadet Corps, owing to the limited accommodation available in the school building, could not accept all the applicants for membership. More accommodation was necessary, together with the provision of a rifle range. Mr. Brady knew of premises, which at a small cost, could be made very suitable at an expense of say \$50, which would go a long way towards the continued education of the boys. The matter was referred to the incoming council.

UNIVERSAL APPROVAL GIVEN TO SPEECH BY LLOYD GEORGE

ALLIES ARE SOLIDLY BEHIND PREMIER IN HIS RESTATEMENT OF WAR AIMS—HAILED AS EMINENTLY SATISFACTORY—CORDIAL APPROVAL OF UNITED STATES—WELCOMED BY LABOR

(Special to The Daily News.)
London, Jan. 8.—The whole British press approves of the speech of Premier Lloyd George. Never before has the Premier received such universal approval for any public utterance. His statement of the war aims of the allies is hailed as eminently satisfactory, and it is said to have performed the most important service to the nation. The people are solidly behind it.

The Daily Express declares that the Premier has spoken the mind of the entente. "The most important document of the war," declares the Times. The London

Observer describes the speech as "epoch making and fateful." Mr. Arthur Henderson, the leader of British labor, in a speech in the House of Commons, stated his opinion that Lloyd George's speech on the allies' war aims would be welcomed by labor. Labor stands for the absolute freedom and integrity of Belgium, Serbia, Roumania and Montenegro, and for the establishment on a firm basis, a league of nations and peoples for disarmament and the prevention of future wars.

WILL THIS INCLUDE PRINCE RUPERT'S ONE?

Ottawa, Jan. 7.—Hon. C. C. Ballantyne, minister of marine and fisheries, has made the important announcement that the government has decided to inaugurate a progressive shipbuilding programme.

A decision has been reached to utilize to full capacity all existing shipyards in Canada in the production of modern steel cargo steamers of the most approved types for the use of the government and for registry in Canada.

He also announced that, to overcome difficulty in regard to securing suitable steel plates, negotiations were under way with responsible persons for the establishment of mills for rolling steel ship plates. A definite announcement will be made shortly. The naval constructor's branch of the department of marine and fisheries is busily engaged in the development of the details of the contemplated programme. There will be three types of vessels from 3,000 to 10,000 tons each.

FRENCH RECOGNIZE THE PARTITION OF RUSSIA

Paris, Jan. 8.—Le Matin announces that the French government intends soon to recognize the independence of the Ukrainians as a free people with their own government, apart from that of St. Petersburg. France has already given recognition to the new government of Finland.

THE CANNERY COMBINE

In the preliminary draft of its final report, the Fisheries Commission which recently visited here recommends that no further licences for any more canneries in Northern British Columbia be granted for at least five years. For that space of time, the monopoly which exists virtually in these northern coasts is to be permitted to continue unbroken. This commission which took evidence at first hand from any fisherman or fishman who desired to give same, makes this recommendation in all seriousness to the government.

It means that no matter how much money a man or a company may have to invest in the cannery business, the government if it adopts this recommendation, will not permit him. The development of the fishing industry is to be held back for five years more, until the present monopoly has secured a few more millions, through no competition, in the canning business. The whole essence of this recommendation is the protection of the canneries. It is not for the protection of the fish. There are other regulations regarding them.

This commission also recommends that no gas boats be allowed to operate in the salmon fishing industry for the next five years either. So that the independent fisherman may not be encouraged, who possesses his own gas boat, as so many of them do.

The coho fishing is still in its infancy on this coast, and it gives promise of attaining to a much greater volume year by year. Yet with all the increase and development of the fisheries by the fishermen, there is to be no development among the canneries. The same old crowd are to reap all the benefit, for the next five years, if this Fisheries Commission can have their way.

There is no restriction placed upon the activities of any person who wants to start a news-

paper, or a grocery or hardware store. If the first floor of every building in Prince Rupert were converted into a store, it would mean that they could only be between them sell as much goods as the transportation companies could handle in bringing into the city. The position is the same on the coast with regard to canneries. The canneries can only handle as much fish as the fishermen bring in. To say that the fishing grounds would be fished out is rubbish, according to the testimony of the fishermen themselves. On the Skeena river, for instance, there is only room for a certain number of nets at a time, which is governed by the number of licences issued. If there is a big run, the canneries are few, and down goes the price to the fishermen, but the price of the salmon in the can varies little.

Speedy action must be taken on this matter by every association capable of bringing pressure to bear upon the government, that such a recommendation be not acted upon. It will not be for the good of Northern British Columbia as a whole nor Prince Rupert in particular. What is wanted is canneries and more canneries and still more canneries. Not plants either that are open for only a few months in the year to can salmon. Their machinery could be well used in canning herring, and other species of edible fish which infest these waters.

This is no time for the continuation of any monopoly even by government sanction. This recommendation of the Commission is in the interests of the existing cannerymen pure and simple. A cannery nowadays seems to be such a good proposition that they don't want to be interfered with in any way with outside competition. The trust must be busted.

have in the further fighting powers of the Russians.

The good use of captured territory to Germany is exemplified in the removal of some 300,000 Poles and Lithuanians from their own land into the interior of Germany. The apostles of kultur make slaves of civilian enemy subjects. Something more Kaiser Wilhelm will have to answer for.

Lloyd George's latest speech on the war aims of the allies is reported to contain the expression that we are not fighting to deprive Turkey her capital or her rich lands in Asia Minor, and Thrace. It would seem that if we are not fighting for possession of these lands, we are fighting that the Turk may not remain in possession of them. That Constantinople remain longer in the hands of the Turk would leave no one interested in European affairs, satisfied.

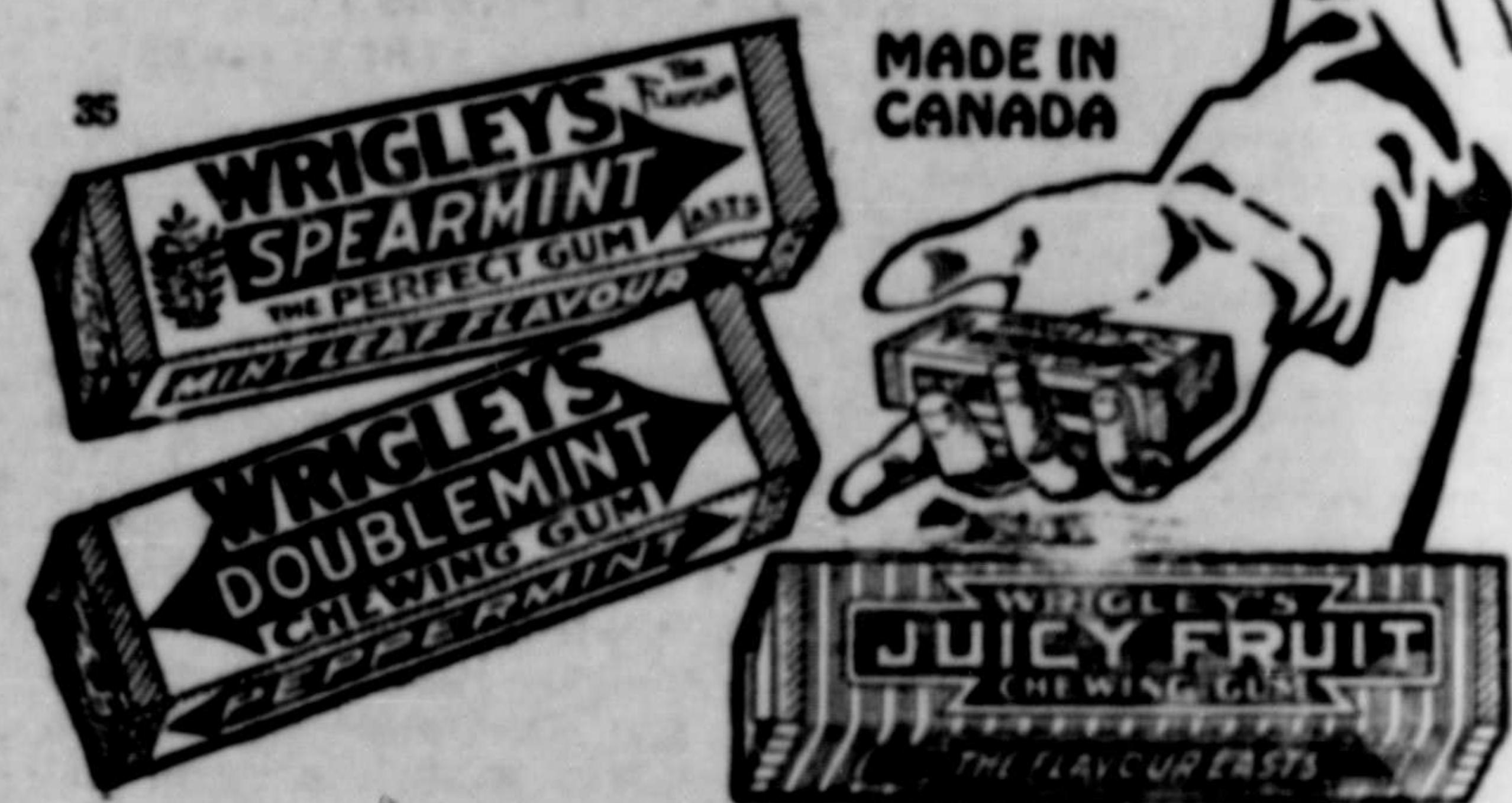

SEATTLE IS TO HAVE GREAT STEEL PLANT

Seattle, Jan. 7.—E. K. Struve, a Seattle banker, who is associated with W. H. Crocker, Herbert Fleischhacker and S. B. F. Morse, of San Francisco, and B. L. Thane of the Gastineau Mining Company, in the project, announced upon his return from Washington, D.C., that work on a \$25,000,000 steel plant, to be located at some point between Seattle and Tacoma, would start within ninety days, and that units of the plant would be in operation within one year.

Mr. Struve said the Federal Priority Board had assured the promoters that they could have, without delay, all the machinery necessary to equip the plant.

FRENCH GOVT. MAKES DRASTIC FOOD LAWS

Paris, Jan. 2.—Three drastic measures for the conservation of food and other supplies in France have been decided upon by the Minister of Provisions, Victor Boret. All shops of confectioners and pastry cooks are to be closed, restrictions will be placed on restaurants which charge high prices to prevent them from outbidding the more popular establishments in purchasing supplies, and the private use of automobiles will be prohibited. These measures will be put into effect as soon as the Senate passes the necessary bill, already voted by the Chamber of Deputies.
