DESTROY FRENCH VILLAGES BY WHOLESALE

GERMANY'S PEACE TERMS ARE GIVEN OUT BY CHANCELLOR

WANTS RETURN OF GERMANY'S COLONIES—INTEGRITY OF TURKEY TO BE RESPECTED—BELGIUM TO BE RESTORED—WOULD ASK OCCUPIED DEPARTMENTS OF FRANCE REGARDING RESTORATION

(Special to The Daily News.)
Paris, Jan. 10.—According to a dispatch received from Zurich in Switzerland, Baron von Hertling, the Kaiser's Chancellor, has announced the following terms which will be acceptable to the Imperial German Empire as the basis of peace. First the establishment of an international tribunal for future arbitration be-

tween nations, and to provide for disarmament. Second, the return of Germany's colonies. Third, the political integrity of Turkey to be respected. Fourth, Belgium to be restored to her pre-war basis of constitutional autonomy. Fifth, the occupied Departments in northern France to be given the right of self determination on the question of restoration.

THE UKRAINE IS THE GRANERY OF RUSSIA

"One of the richest parts of this whole world is to be found in the southern provinces of Russia in Europe right today," said Mr. George Syrotuck, yesterday afternoon, while talking over the Russian situation. "The Ukraine is a most wonderfully fertile land, and yields great crops. Some people think that Russia is a land of eternal snows, but that is just as true of Russia as it is of Canada. Why, the Ukraine is a grape country, and they grow in the open, and every other kind of crop can be grown there, except those belonging to the tropics. "Grapes and tobacco and almost every other class of grain are largely raised. You do not see the Russian farmer growing wheat only, as so many of them do in Canada. Corn, millet, hemp, beans and so forth are most valuable. The way they do it there is to grow four crops in the one field. There will be a row of corn, a row of beans and a row of hemp and a row of pumpkins all one after the other. First they will reap the beans, then the hemp, and after the corn is gathered, the whole field will be yellow with great pumpkins.

"From the latest accounts I have received, the Russia of the Czar is now divided into twelve different states. The different peoples have regained that autonomy which Peter the Great took away from them hundreds of years ago. The Ukrainians are a different people from the White Russians, and from the Muscovites, while there are the Finlanders, the Lithuanians, the Estonians and the Poles, who have all retained their individuality. These different peoples are national entities, and it seems like as if they will now be able to give expression to their national ideals."

With peace assured, conscription removed, and the corrupt government of the Czar gone, Russia will develop very rapidly. It will be a country well worth living in very soon.

FIELD MARSHAL HAIG'S REPORT THOUGHT GOOD

(Special to The Daily News.)
London, Jan. 10.—The optimistic report of Field Marshal Haig continues to give great interest. According to what the General says, the defeat of the German army is only a matter of time, and the assistance he has received from the transference of the many battalions from his eastern frontier is already largely discounted. The whole story of the year's work shows the steady continuation of British successes, notwithstanding the handicaps in the matter of bad weather and mud.

GREAT INCREASE OF CRIME IN GERMANY

Amsterdam, Jan. 9.—A rapid increase in the number of crimes committed in all parts of Germany is reported by the German press, and newspapers report a similar condition in Austria. Theodor Wolff, in The Tageblatt, says that robbery and theft now amounts to a calamity and that insurance companies have increased their premiums from fifty to a hundred per cent. All classes are affected, the thieves frequently enjoying immunity owing to fear of revenge.

The Liepsig police report that in the large towns numerous thefts by house breaking occur daily.

HOSPITAL SHIP TRPEDOED BY A HUN SUBMARINE

In Bristol Channel, S. S. Rewa Sinks—Wounded Transferred to Patrol Vessels—Three of Crew Missing.

(Special to The Daily News.)
London, Jan. 10.—The British hospital ship Rewa, of 7,308 tons, has been sunk by a German submarine in the Bristol Channel. The Rewa was on her way to England from Gibraltar with wounded. She was plainly marked as a hospital ship, and could not be mistaken for anything else. Being so near to her destination all danger was supposed to be past, when suddenly without any warning, a torpedo struck the vessel. The wounded were at once transferred to patrol boats, and conveyed to the nearest port. Three of the crew are missing.

GERMANS BELIEVE U. S. HAS BEEN INVADED

Baltimore, Jan. 9.—That Germany, in an effort to strengthen the morale of her soldiers in the trenches, is circulating the report that the imperial army has invaded the United States, captured New York and is marching on to Washington is the information given by several German prisoners to boys of the One Hundred and Seventeenth Trench Mortar Battery, the Baltimore contingent in the Rainbow Division, serving in France.
Another of the German prisoners said that the soldiers had been led to believe that the American boys were British soldiers wearing the uniform of the American Army. It seems that the soldiers were told that the Allies were trying to deceive the Germans into believing that the American army had not arrived. When we go at them in the big drive those Huns will know we are over here.

FRENCH TROOPS MAKE SORTIE SUCCESSFULLY

Penetrate German Positions on a Mile Front and Take Many Prisoners—Machine Guns Captured.

(Special to The Daily News.)
Paris, Jan. 10.—The French troops in the Woivre region enlivened the virtual inactivity on the whole western front by successfully completing a sortie into the German lines east of St. Mihiel. The French soldiers penetrated the German positions on a mile front, capturing one hundred and seventy-eight prisoners and several machine guns. In the Champagne region, we repulsed an enemy attack before his troops reached our lines. The French barrage caught the attackers in the open. They could neither advance nor retire and few were left to return to their own lines. In the Aviaucourt and Bezonvaux sectors, artillery fire is particularly active.

More Destruction.

According to reliable information, Hindenburg has given orders to wipe out one hundred and thirty villages behind the German lines in the region of St. Quentin. It is alleged this is necessary for the better defence of the German lines to the rear.

The Departments.

Notwithstanding the denials given out by the German government, only one-third of the three hundred thousand Belgians who were deported to Germany have been permitted to return to their homes.

French General Dead.

The French General Lize, commanding the artillery on the Italian front, has been killed.

RUSSIAN ENTHUSIASM MAY SURPRISE GERMANY

Toronto, Jan. 9.—Arnodosh Fleuret, in a Petrograd special cable to the Mail and Empire, says:

"Russia has again turned to war. Realizing now that Germany will give Russia a democratic peace only if Germany succeeds in gaining a general peace, Russia sees anew the necessity of continuing the fight. I have asked delegates to the Soviets what America should do in the new situation. The answer has been: 'If you want to fight for us, for the freedom of the world, state your peace terms and show you are with us.'"

"My feeling is—and this is said in light of the army's condition—that this enthusiasm is preparing a tremendous surprise for Germany. Fourteen of the fifteen armies at the front were represented at the meeting. Of these, thirteen reported that the soldiers are ready to return to the fighting line."

LYLLOD GEORGE'S SPEECH RINGS THRO' EUROPE

In Every Allied Country His Words are Acquired in—Speeches From Other of Allied Leaders Hoped for.

(Special to The Daily News.)
London, Jan. 10.—President Wilson's speech to Congress a few days ago takes the leading place in the news and editorial columns of London's press. One newspaper describes it as "Magna Charta of future peace." Others of the allied leaders will very shortly fire further salvos of verbal artillery. Lloyd George's words are still ringing through Europe where from every corner of the allied country they evoke echoes of praise and acquiescence. There has been no official reply so far to Lloyd George's speech from the enemy. Vienna comment is against accepting his terms as they stand.

Trotsky Suspicious.

Trotsky, the foreign minister of the Bolsheviki government is now suspicious of the allies. He thinks that the Entente wants Germany to make an advantageous peace with Russia, so that Germany would then be more moderate in the terms she made with the other powers.

The view of the German Socialists regarding the speech of Lloyd George is apparently being censored. No copies of Vorwaerts have been permitted to reach the border, but Berlin is sending out extracts, which have all the earmarks of being "cooked" to the taste of Potsdam.

Labor Support.

British labor issued a manifesto yesterday, giving wholehearted support to the programme presented in President Wilson's speech.

FURTHER DISCOVERIES OF GERMAN PLOTTING

London, Jan. 9.—In the archives of the Russian Foreign Office there have been discovered documents of unusual interest dealing with negotiations between the German Government and the late Imperial Russian Government in regard to a national convention to combat Socialism, according to the Petrograd correspondent of the Exchange Telegraph Company. Other curious documents relating to the origin of the war throw light on certain aspects of the German policy. These papers will be published as soon as they have been classified.

WAR AIMS

There is little chance left for any ambiguity remaining in the minds of the Kaiser and his government as to what are the real aims of the Allies in the continuance of warfare. The Kaiser has been informed in no uncertain terms, not once, but many times what the terms are upon which the allies will consider peace. The latest speeches both by Premier Lloyd George and of President Wilson have removed the last vestige of uncertainty which may have lingered in their minds, and the ever-growing army lined up against the Hun hordes from the English Channel to the Adriatic Sea goes to back up the speeches of the allied statesmen.

The sanctity of treaties, and respect for the rights of small nations is insisted upon, and territorial settlements only "with the consent of the governed." These terms, together with the limitation of armaments, are the minimum which have been put forward by the allies. They are unanimous on these. While there are many other things to be considered at a peace conference, still these are the fundamentals, without which any others would be useless.

The materialistic Teuton mind may find, and possibly will find it disagreeable to be set right by the allies in this fashion. To have to treat with Belgium and Roumania upon an equality after the evil treatment which they themselves have meted out to these smaller and peaceably inclined nations will hurt some, and to have their weapons of war taken from them will hurt the Huns still more, even more so than the economic ruin which they will find staring them in the face at the same time.

It will be the severest blow to the pride of the All Highest when he finds that the people of Alsace and Lorraine, of Poland and of Slesvig and Holsten prefer another government than that of the Imperial German Empire; when Luxem-

bourg, too, declines to remain in the family compact which was the first string binding the small states together, into the empire.

Yes the Kaiser must swallow his pride, and his fire-eating chancellors and ex-chancellors and Hindenburgs and Ludendorffs, and all the rest of his fine soldiers will find to a great extent their occupation gone.

ASKS DOMINION TO PAY COSTS OF HALIFAX

Halifax, Jan. 9.—The Halifax Commercial Club has adopted a resolution expressing the view that the Dominion Government should make full reparation to Halifax for the loss suffered in the recent explosion and fire. The resolution sets forth that the dreadful occurrence was one for which the people of Halifax were in no wise responsible and that, therefore, its cost should be assumed by the country as a whole.

Last night the following resolution, seconded by the heads of thirty-six religious, educational, patriotic and philanthropic societies, was telegraphed to Sir Robert Borden:

"Resolution passed by Commercial Club, of Halifax, wherein it asks for full and complete reparation for damage done to property and persons, is endorsed by us and quick action is asked for, as people here are entirely in the dark as to future. Citizens are anxiously inquiring what they are to expect and prompt announcement of Government's intention to make full reparation asked for is due those so grievously afflicted."

Snuff boxes are said to be coming back into fashion in England, but with the difference that they now contain sugar instead of snuff. The sugar rationing is expected to make it necessary for visitors to carry around their own sugar and the old tightly fitting snuff boxes, of silver, enamel and inlaid wood are being brought to light for this purpose. There is said to be also a demand for futurist boxes with weird effects painted on them.

GOVERNMENT MAY RUN THE PACKING HOUSES FOR DURATION OF WAR

Toronto, Jan. 7.—Government operation of Canadian packing houses for the duration of the war was hinted at in the County Judge's Criminal Court here by Mr. Gideon Grant, counsel for several West Toronto abattoir companies, which were charged with creating a nuisance. In the course of the evidence, Mr. Grant said he understood the Government contemplated passing an order in Council which would place all the Canadian packing houses under the jurisdiction of the Food Controller before the first of March next. In the meantime, Mr. Grant said the companies were doing their best to abate the nuisance. The concerns in question were the Harris Abattoir, Gunns Limited, and the Swift Canadian Company.

AUSTRIAN POPULATION GETS ITALIAN FOOD

Washington, January 9.—The Austrian population is being fed with food taken from the Italians, according to an official despatch from Rome today, which read: "Two military automobilists who were captured during the first onrush of the Austro-Germans have succeeded in escaping, and have joined the Italian forces by swimming the Piave. They have brought information about the ill-treatment inflicted by the invaders on the civil population of the invaded province. "All money found in possession of the civil population has been confiscated by the enemy, who distributed bread cards. Men, women and children have been forced to work in the construction of wire entanglements and all sorts of defensive work. "The Vienna Zeit relates that the Austrian population is being fed with food captured from the Italians. The Berlin press publishes a list of art treasures stolen in the invaded province of Italy, and gives the names of the German personalities who have visited the exhibition of these works of art.

ITALIAN AVIATORS MAKE REPRISALS

Italian Headquarters, Jan. 7.—The Italian airmen have shown that they know how to counter to the Austro-German attacks of the last few nights upon the cities of the Venetian plain. Sunday night as the official communique has related, they made their way, while enemy machines were out on evil work, to the nests from which these night-birds came, and found the Austrian aerodromes all lighted up in the expectation of the return of the raiders. The Italian airmen dropped a few bombs, but that was only a reconnaissance. Monday night, while the Austrians were out again the Italians set off once more, heavily laden with incendiary and explosive bombs. They made for Aviano, which is the location of the Austrian aerodrome and for Comina.

Coming down low in the darkness the Italians deliberately chose their marks, and let go their bombs. The result was that the Comina aerodrome was severely damaged, the sheds were smashed and buried, and there were several explosions, probably in the bomb dump. So complete was the devastation that an Italian machine was able to go back today and photograph the ruins at 1,500 feet.

Aviano, too, was badly wrecked, and the Italian fliers when they reached their own aerodromes again got out of their machines with a shout of satisfaction.

SPAIN TROUBLED BY REVOLUTIONARIES

Madrid, Jan. 9.—The government has been acquainted of the details of a revolutionary plot, which was on the point of being put into effect. The ramifications of the plotters were most widespread and if it had been permitted to come to a head, the plans were so well laid that it would most likely have been successful in overthrowing the dynasty. This much is practically admitted.

Great precautions were taken by the government, when they became aware of the danger, and all telephone and telegraphic communication was suspended, which together with the other action taken by the government, completely spoiled the coup d'etat.

Revolutionary outbreaks were planned to take place in many different parts of the country, simultaneously, but the suspension of the telegraphic and telephone service prevented this happening. The premier announced that the government was master of the situation. Enquiries are now being made by the judicial authorities.

U. S. GOVT. MAKES GREAT APPEAL TO LOGGERS

Portland, Ore., Jan. 9.—Colonel Brice P. Disque, head of the Spruce Production work has sent a statement and an appeal to the Loyal Legion of Loggers and Lumbermen. This organization numbers 25,000 in the northwestern states.

"The headquarters of this division," says Colonel Disque, "looks to you to prevent all acts of sedition on the part of employer, employee and others."

"Germany is obtaining airplane material with forced labor in invaded Russian forests which do not belong to her. Thousands of helpless persons are driven to work at the point of the bayonet from early dawn until dark."

Loggers are urged to offset Germany's gains by increasing the output in the United States. Colonel Disque's announcement says:

"Your Government asks you to produce 11,000,000 feet of spruce during each month of 1918. Also it asks you to immediately make up the deficiency of the last few months when an average of only about 3,000,000 feet was obtained."

"You are soldiers, just as truly as are the boys, knee deep in the mud of France, stopping the bullets of the enemy. A day's lay-off is two days' work for the Kaiser."

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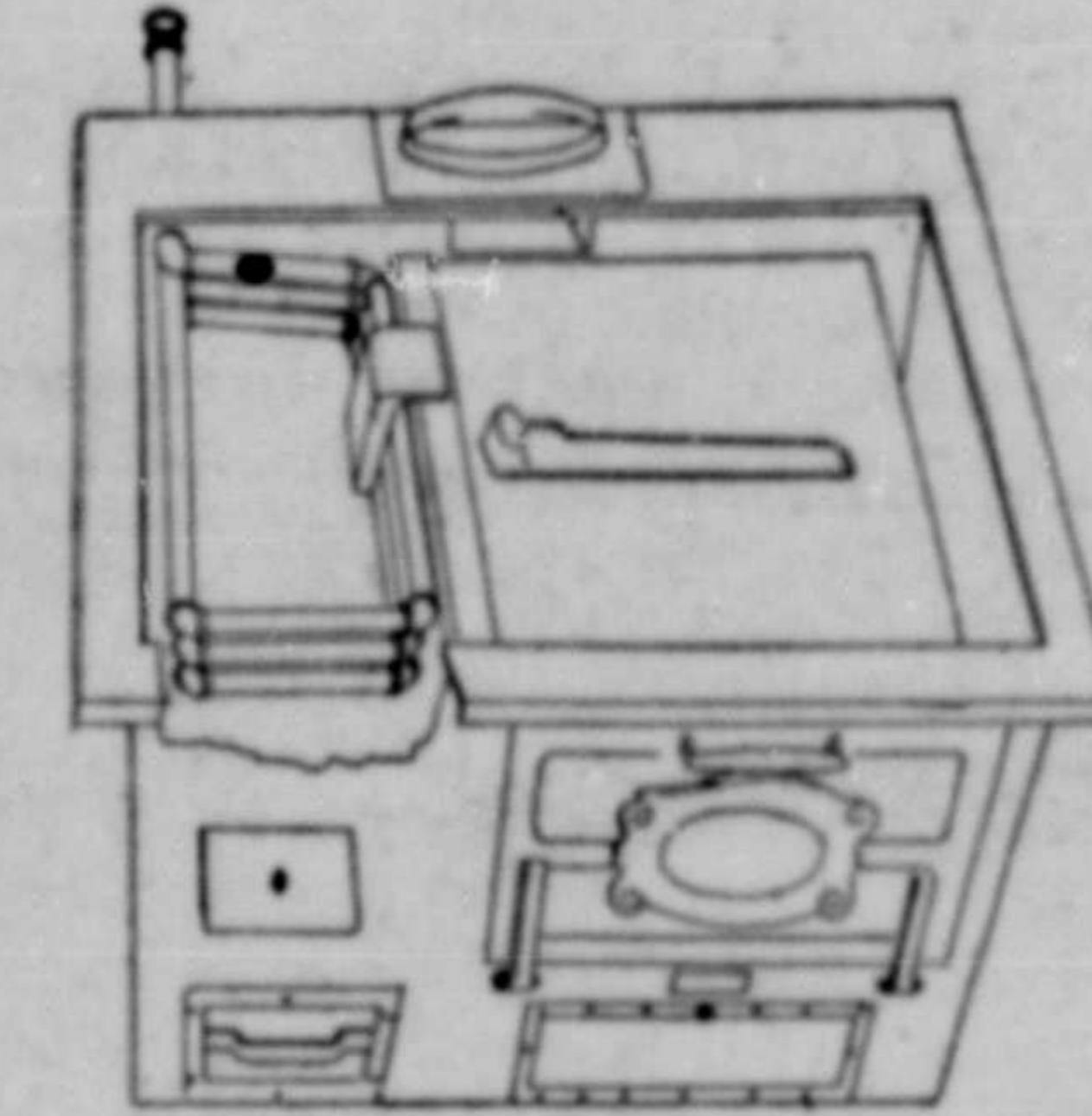
