RUSSIA AND BULGARIA AGREE UPON PEACE

HUNS HELD UP IN MOUNTAINS BY SNOW--TROOPS HUNGRY---RUSSIA DEFAULTS

SEPARATE PEACE SIGNED BY RUSSIANS AND BULGARIANS

PEACE WITH TURKEY REFUSED BY BOLSHEVIKI--DESIRE EXPRESSED THAT SWEDEN BE GO-BETWEEN WITH ALLIES AND HUNS--JUNKERS SCARED AT THE ALLIES' APPEALS TO GERMAN PEOPLE

(Special to The Daily News.)
Petrograd, Jan. 11.—A separate peace agreement has been signed between the Russian and Bulgarian Governments. The German delegation here is reported to have got into touch with the Swedish Legation in Petrograd and to have expressed the desire that Sweden act as the go-between with Great Britain, France and Italy in the preliminary stages of finding a basis for the discussion of peace terms.

Refuse Turks' Terms.
The separate peace proposals made by Turkey have been refused by the Bolsheviki Government. Among the proposals of the wily Turk was the free passage of the Dardanelles for all Russian ships; the evacuation of Turkish territory by the Russian troops, and the demobilization of the Russian Black Sea fleet. On the other hand, Turkey was to retain her active army, and her warships in commission in consequence of the continuation of the war against the Entente. These terms, however, would give Turkey virtually control of the Euxine, and would place the Armenian population in the Caucasus once again at their mercy, which Trotsky would not agree to.

Pan German's Panic.
The Hague, Jan. 11.—The Pan German element in Germany is showing signs of panic inasmuch as the tactics of President Wilson of the United States, and Premier Lloyd George of Great Britain, in appealing to the masses of the German people will, they realize, crystallize into a definite demand by Germany's people for immediate peace.

LA PRESSE ON THE CALL TO CONSCRIPTS

Montreal, Jan. 10.—La Presse, discussing the enforcement of the Military Service Act, says: "This is not the time when we should discuss the merits of the law. Each one of us will understand that the wisest way out is to conform to the law which the authorities judge to be the best one for the country. The sacrifice is a great one, of course, for families as well as individuals, but a courageous and worthy submission to the law of the land always brings its own reward. Let our men especially avoid being guided by the fear of persecution, as a sentiment of having accomplished a duty, painful though it may be, yet assigned to us by the leaders of the nation."
"We consider in fact that the conscript has even more merit than his brother-in-arms, the volunteer. Under the volunteer system, in a great number of cases, the departure of the citizen for the front is subject to all sorts of considerations which have nothing to do with patriotism or devotion to the great cause. Taste for adventure, family jars and other reasons have determined many volunteers to take part in the present war. This will not, however, prevent either the one or the other signaling by brave acts as much devotion to the country as any other soldier."

VERY HEAVY TRAVEL ON G. T. P. FROM PRAIRIES

This morning the tall masts and the smoke stacks of the G. T. P. "Prince Rupert" were to be seen above the freight sheds at the wharf, although the big steamer was billed to sail last evening. On account of the very heavy travel arising from the prairie provinces, whence the farmers who can get out, are fleeing before the severity of winter, the train due last night had to be run in two portions. The first part of the train arrived early this morning in a heavy rain, carrying a large number of through passengers for the south, while the second portion, which is carrying the mails, and making the regular stops, was not expected to arrive until noon, or thereabouts.

There are nearly three hundred travellers from the interior provinces going south, and the accommodation of the steamer is being taxed to the limit. There are many more passengers than there are berths available for, but as many of the travellers desire to make this connection, whether they get berths or not, the steamer is being held for them.

DISINTEGRATION OF OLD RUSSIAN EMPIRE

Washington, Jan. 10.—Delegates to the various Lithuanian parties at Stockholm have issued a proclamation demanding independence for Lithuania. According to an official dispatch received here today, they declare that Lithuania must be occupied by its own army and that the Lithuanian parts of Russia must be joined to the new state. The promise is made, the dispatch states, that the Lithuanian seaports will be freely open to the commerce of countries that are without openings to the sea, notably Russia, if she should be so situated.

Paris, Jan. 11.—M. Pinchou, the French Minister of Foreign Affairs, will speak outlining the war aims of France tomorrow. The deputies in the French house are pledged to insist upon the restoration of Alsace and Lorraine.

RELIC OF MAMMOTH FROM THE ARCTIC

San Francisco, Jan. 10.—On her belated return from the "Farthest North" a few days ago, the power schooner Herman brought among its valuable cargo from the Arctic the lower jaw of a mammoth, which is said to be the only similar relic of the extinct elephant in existence. This memento of the immense animals that roamed the northern latitudes thousands of years ago was dug out of the snow by the natives of Point Barrow.

The importers of the cargo said that the jaw would be presented to an eastern museum. Black fox, silver fox furs, whalebone and whale oil made up the bulk of the cargo of the Herman. A live polar bear cub was captured near the point Barrow Fur station, and was brought down on the schooner. One of the seamen made the mistake of fondling the little white fellow, and had several fingers almost bitten off.
The Herman left here last April for its annual voyage to the north and very rough weather was experienced on the homeward voyage, which, however, was accomplished in safety.

PROGRESS OF THE NEW SEAL COVE SAWMILL

Regarding the sawmill being built at Seal Cove by the Prince Rupert Lumber Company, in which Mr. J. S. Emerson and Mr. E. F. Duby are interested, a very fine account of it appears in the December number of "The Timberman."

Although Mr. Emerson had retired from the lumber business with the intention of remaining out of business permanently, the virgin stands of spruce in Northern British Columbia and the increasing demand for spruce lumber presented an opportunity possessing extraordinary possibilities, to the astute mind of this keen business man, says "The Timberman."

The mill at Seal Cove is admirably adapted to the requirements of modern and up-to-date sawmill operation. Its wharf has water deep enough for the largest of ocean-going vessels to lie alongside, to carry lumber to any part of the world, while railroad tracks run into the mill yard from the G. T. P. The rapid development of Prince Rupert and the country adjacent thereto is looked to to provide a market for ever-increasing supplies of lumber and shingles, besides which the growth of the fishing industry will create a big demand for box lumber.

There are several distinguishing features about the equipment of this new mill which make it one of the most up to date ones on the whole Pacific coast. The log lift, the electrically driven set works, and the mechanical spotter for lining up the lumber in front of the edger are innovations which are duly noticed, while for the moving of the lumber in the mill itself until it is loaded for shipment will be done by the monorail system, which system, in combination with a transfer crane, has been evolved to meet the particular conditions presented.

The fuel storage is another of the many points mentioned as worthy of particular attention. It is designed in such a manner that one man will be enabled to handle the entire boiler plant on either day or night shift, while the conveyor system does away with the drudgery of shovelling fuel into the furnaces.

Consistent efficiency was the chief aim of the designers of the plant, and it is considered eminently possible for this mill to produce lumber at a minimum cost.

The construction work and equipment of the mill is going ahead in fine shape, and it will not be very long until sawing will be in operation.

HUN CAMPAIGN IN ITALY HELD UP BY SNOWS

Heavy Snow Falls During last Few Days Tie up His Communications Through Mountain Passes.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Rome, Jan. 11.—The enemy's winter campaign appears to have been interrupted seriously, if not halted definitely by the heavy snow falls during the last few days, and particularly during the last twenty-four hours. On the mountain front, the snow has covered everything to a depth of from three to five feet. Several of the Austro-German supply trains are stalled in the mountain regions, and extreme difficulty is being experienced in feeding the troops now in the field. The lines of communication from the Hun depots to the front are so long and exposed that train after train is on the way, but cannot proceed further. Meantime, the soldiers at the front are beginning to feel the pinch of hunger.

French Front.

Paris, Jan. 11.—French troops repulsed a German raid to the east of the upper Couchy forest. There has been very active artillery fighting in the region of Vaixillon. On the right bank of the Meuse, there has been reciprocal artillery actions. Calm prevails elsewhere.

British Front.

London, Jan. 11.—There is no news from the western front.

Penticton, B. UNIONISM

The hope has been expressed in many quarters that a permanent Union Government would be a good thing for the country at large, with the old political landmarks swept away.

What those who hope for a permanent Union Government want is doubtless what one section in Great Britain have been wanting for a long time, and that is a Business Government.

The present coalition which has been formed in Canada is held up in certain quarters as an example of what might be done even in peace time, but it is hardly likely that the Union Government as presently constituted would survive long the signing of peace.

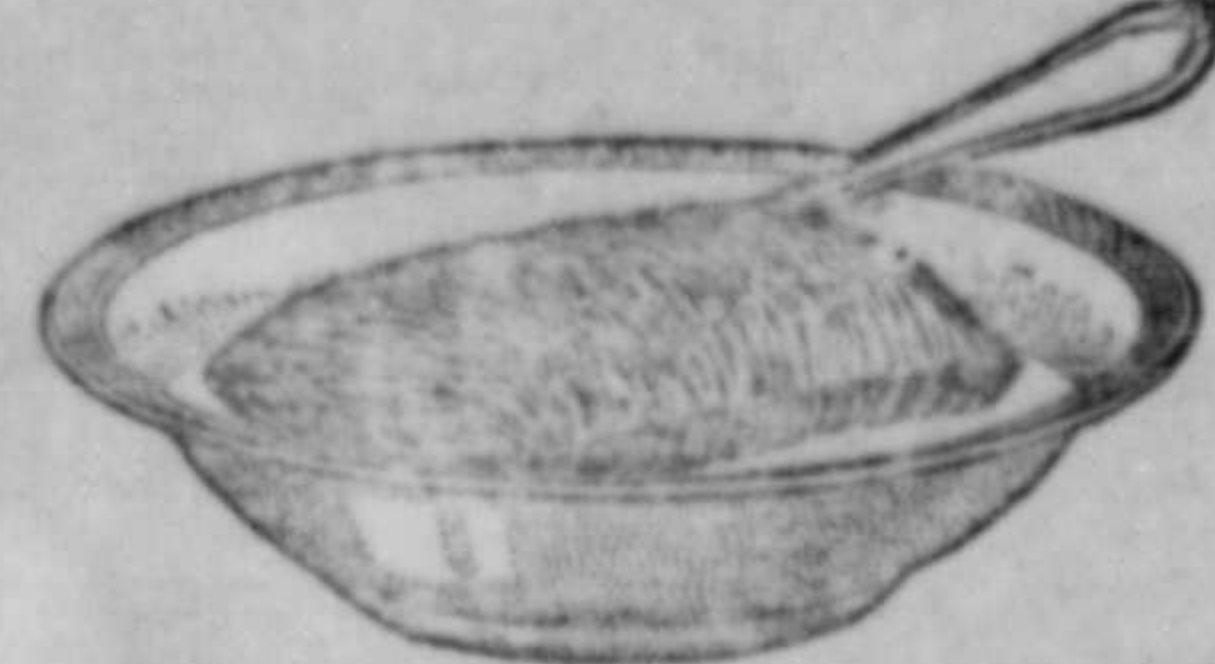

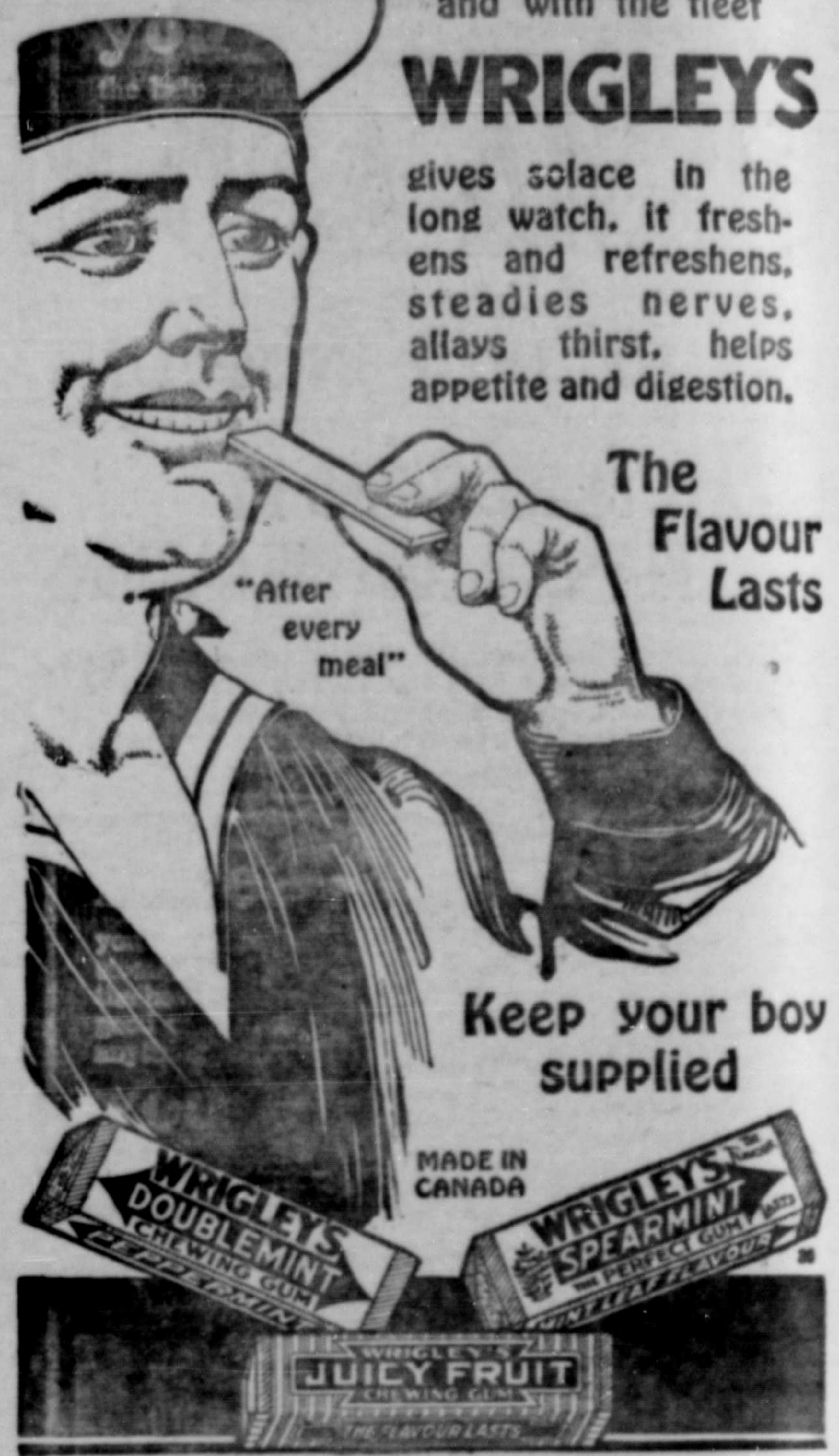

CANADIAN RED CROSS' GOOD WORK AT HALIFAX

Of special interest to all who realize the wonderful organization and work of the Canadian Red Cross Society, both in its basic function as an emergency supply and in its wider sphere of war work will be the accounts published in the Halifax press of the part played by the organization following the Halifax disaster.

The Halifax Mail says in part: "Hereafter the praises of the Canadian Red Cross will not be left alone for the soldiers to sing. This great organization made possible the care of thousands of wounded with a swiftness that has saved many lives. The Canadian Red Cross were the first to arrive on the ground with any adequate supply of hospital supplies, dressings, etc., and since Saturday, December 8th, all urgent requirements of the different hospitals have been promptly met."

Mr. H. Millburn, chairman of the medical supplies of the Red Cross, was in St. John when the accident occurred. He acted with all speed and used every power of the organization to aid the sufferers. Two car loads of emergency supplies for hospital use were dispatched at once to the stricken city, and from the Red Cross Headquarters in Halifax literally hundreds of blankets, shirts, boots and clothing of all descriptions, dressing gowns and stockings, oil heaters, felt slippers, hot water bags, bovril and cocoa were handed out.

Over three hundred ladies were at work sewing on the second floor of the building continually. When the American Red Cross saw how effectively the Canadian Red Cross was working, they turned over all supplies into their hands for distribution.

FURTHER OPPRESSION OF BELGIAN PEOPLE

Washington, January 10.—The Belgian legation yesterday received a dispatch from Havre stating that the international committee of the Red Cross in Switzerland had failed in its effort to obtain from the German Government permission for the inhabitants of Belgium to enjoy the privileges of corresponding with their relatives outside of Belgium, a privilege allowed to the inhabitants of Roumania and of the occupied parts of France.

The governor-general of Belgium, the dispatch adds, has issued the following order: "All transmission of news, even indirect, by the inhabitants of Belgium and their relations domiciled in countries enemy to Germany is forbidden."

THE MUNICIPAL ELECTION

One of the noticeable features of this election is that so far the slate put forward by the Trades and Labor Council contains the majority of the candidates who have declared themselves out for election, for municipal honors.

The Trades and Labor Council has certainly shown themselves greatly interested in municipal matters, and if they are successful in having their candidates returned, such success is coming to them. They have gone out after it.

RATIONING SCHEME FOR GREAT BRITAIN

London, Jan. 9.—Compulsory rationing is to be put into effect in this country at an early date, according to Lord Rhondda, the Food Controller. Speaking at Silvertown, he prefaced this announcement by saying that he was afraid that compulsory rationing would have to come, and that it was on its way. He then declared that his department had completed a scheme, and that after the sanction of the Cabinet had been received it would be carried out.

Lord Rhondda warned his hearers that there would continue to be a shortage though the conditions would improve steadily.

"There is nothing alarming in the situation," he said. "You have only to tighten your belt. The people of this country are undergoing nothing like the privations in Germany. There they have less than a pound of meat a week."

The Food Controller strongly supported communal kitchens, and said that Government grants would be made. He incidentally disclosed the fact that Lady Rhondda had obtained the Christmas dinner for the family from one of these kitchens, and added: "What is good enough for my old woman is quite good enough for anyone."

The director of meat supplies announced that Tuesday will be the meatless day in London and Wednesday in the provinces.

Mr. Lloyd George has issued a return appeal to the agricultural laborers of the United Kingdom to do their utmost to increase the production of foodstuffs. He declared that the world shortage means that "we may be compelled to feed the army and navy as well as ourselves on what we are able to grow at home."

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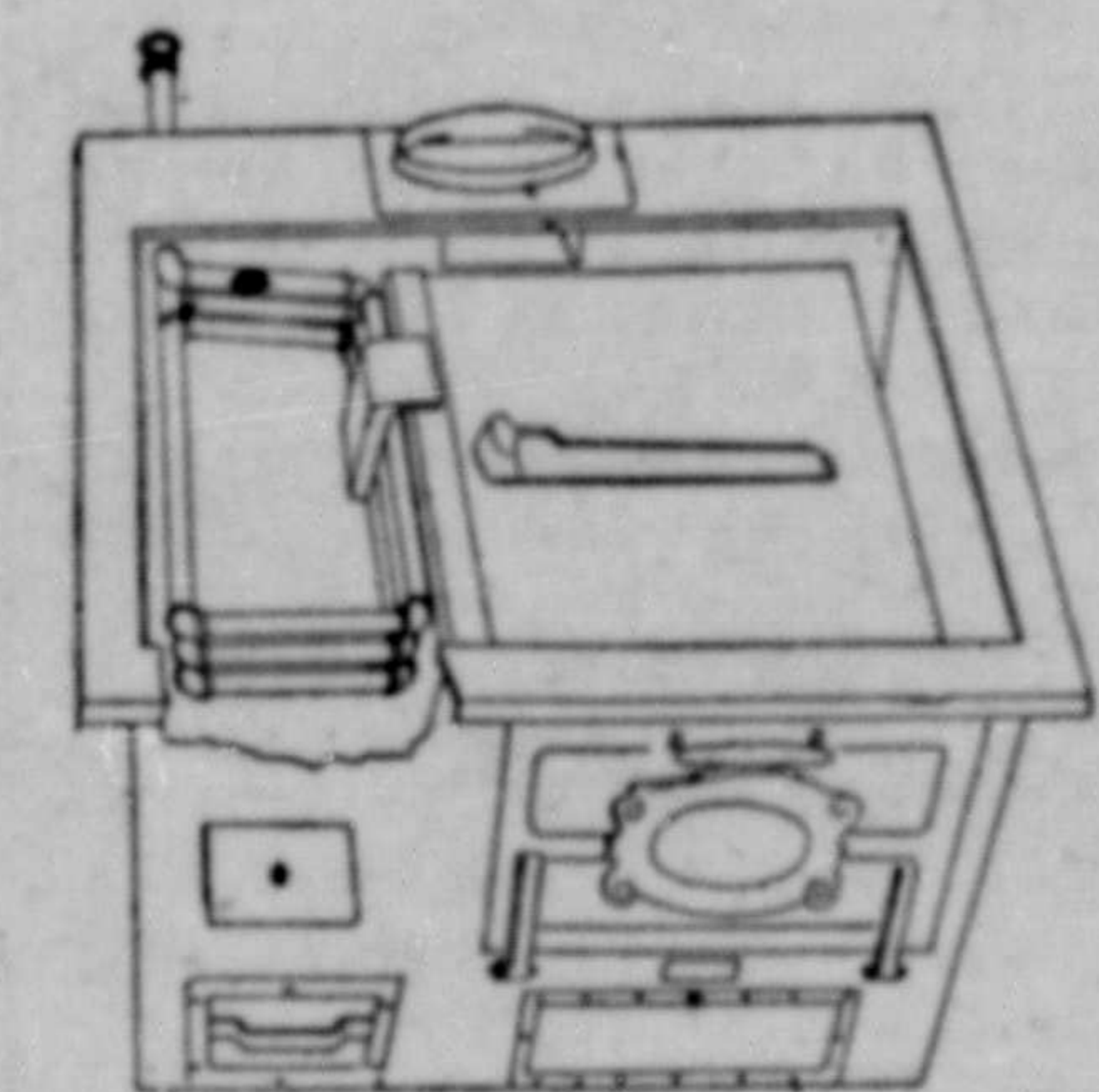
