CRUISER SUBMARINES ARE HUNS' LATEST

BRITISH AVIATORS BRING DOWN GERMAN AIRPLANES — WESTERN FRONT QUIET

SUPER SUBS NOW HAVE BIG GUNS TO SINK SHIPS

New Phase of Submarine Warfare on Allied Shipping—Cost of Torpedoes Becomes Prohibitive.

(Special to The Daily News.)
London, Jan. 12.—The time of test for the people of Great Britain is now at hand, says the Hon. Mr. Barnes. It is expected that Germany's U-boats will make another great effort soon. He appeals to all workers to do everything possible in the fight for freedom.

Big Cruisers.
The sinkings of merchant vessels by German submarines is now caused mostly by big gun fire. The submarine warfare upon the shipping of the allies has entered upon a new phase. Only U-boats of the cruiser type are now engaged upon the work of destruction. They carry 5.9 in. guns, and sixteen torpedoes each. This super-submarine can remain at sea for six weeks at a stretch, and is ready for action as soon as her deck comes awash.

The difficulty of manufacture and the great cost of torpedoes is the cause of the German U-boats husbanding their supply of these deadly weapons. They are only fired when an enemy ship cannot be sunk by gunfire. The big guns are usually able to do the work.

BRITISH AIRMEN GET EIGHT HUN MACHINES

London, Jan. 12.—Hostile artillery has been active during yesterday to the south of Bullecourt, west of Lens, and east of Ypres. Four hostile aeroplanes were brought down.

Paris, Jan. 12.—The French troops carried out raids last night in the Argonne and in the Vosges regions, bringing back prisoners in each case.

Nivelle for Algiers.
General Nivelle has been appointed in command of the army serving in Algeria.

Morals Improving.
London, Jan. 12.—Mr. Arthur Balfour, in addressing a war aims meeting in Edinburgh last night, declared that a German made peace would not prevail. He said that although the enemy morals are improving, they were not yet sufficiently so.

Bolo's Trial.
Paris, Jan. 12.—Bolo Pasha, charged with conducting German propaganda in France, will be tried by court martial on February 4th.

SCHEME SOLVES FOOD SUPPLY & NATIONAL DEBT

Colonization of Vast Untilled Wheat Lands of Western Canada by Imperial Government.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Jan. 12.—The Royal Colonial Institute yesterday listened to the unfolding of a scheme for the colonization of the vast untilled wheat lands of the western provinces of Canada, through the joint co-operation of the Imperial and Canadian governments. This same idea has been discussed tentatively on many occasions at the meetings of the Institute, which is doing a great pioneer and educative work in Great Britain in drawing public attention to the many opportunities and possibilities of the resources of the Empire, and in putting forth definite plans for their fulfilment.

This scheme which was gone into fully yesterday is not an entirely new one, and it is alleged that it would solve the food question for the allies, besides wiping out the national debt of both Canada and the United Kingdom in a comparatively short space of time.

It is expected that the plans of the Institute will be made the subject of legislation in the immediate future, both in London and in Ottawa.

GERMAN PRESS MISREPRESENT WILSON'S AIMS

War Aims of Allies Ridiculed and Deliberately Misinterpreted by Austro-German Newspapers.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Amsterdam, Jan. 12.—The war aims of the Entente as given forth by the recent speeches of Premier Lloyd George and President Wilson are ridiculed by the journals throughout the Central Empires. It is alleged that the conditions imposed by President Wilson's speech would mean the complete disruption of the alliance of the Teutonic powers, which is the last thing they want to think of.

President Wilson is termed as superior even to Lloyd George as a deceiver of nations. Another newspaper alleges he is "more brutal than the British Premier." This deliberate misrepresentation of the speeches of the two leaders of democracy is the last efforts of the autocracy to bolster up in the minds of the people that belief and trust in themselves, which the bureaucrats find to be slowly and gradually departing.

Verboten.
An uprising of the German people against the autocracy is "verboten," says a noted writer in one of the leading Berlin papers. Germany will not revolt. Every German knows that a machine-gun death awaits the disturber of the peace. Hindenburg is all powerful. His influence is greater than that of the Kaiser himself. He has now absolute control of the civil and military operations of the nation, and he will not permit the least whisper of distrust as to the methods he employs. It is "verboten."

The docile German mind is expected to be cowed into subjection by articles of this kind.

BIG BUSINESS

Among the first of the results of the return to power of the Union Government is the increase in the railway freight rates. According to all accounts, there exists extreme dissatisfaction among the Western provinces over this deal, and most of the dissatisfaction is being expressed in the prairie provinces. These are the provinces which did so much to elect the Union Government, and already they are not pleased with its doings. They know that any government headed by Sir Robert Borden, and having in its personnel men like Sir George Foster and particularly with a man like Tom White as minister of finance, would be purely and simply a government representing Big Business. Any government with these men at the head of it means a government of Big Business for Big Business. Government of the people for the people is something they refuse to admit they know anything about. In the school these men were raised in such doctrines were not taught. And in the circles they move in back in Ottawa and Toronto, to have democratic ideas is not considered good form. If one thing more than another proved the necessity for the increase in the freight rates—or the reverse—it would be the dividends paid by the C. P. R. It can hardly be said that that company which will benefit to the extent of about twenty millions of dollars annually, requires this amount to pay a dividend. Their stock pays so well that it can only be purchased at a great premium. It is simply the mulcting of the common people of further sums of money—for their own good, of course.

Some time ago the people were informed that the government through the food controller had made some arrangement with the packing houses in the direction of government control, whereby they would not be making quite as much profit. But so far, no details of this arrangement have been given out. It would be inter-

esting to know whether Sir Joseph Flavelle is still administering the post cure to his bacon, and charging two bits a pound for salt water.

Even in the matter of the prohibition of transportation of intoxicating liquor from one province to another, there are two aspects to this also. This does not take place until April first, but the importation of such liquor into the Dominion is prohibited from December 24, thus giving a monopoly to the Canadian distillers. There is lots of time during these three months for Sir Robert Borden to change his mind regarding the transportation. He can change his mind easily. He has done it before. Meanwhile, Canadian distillers have absolute protection from foreign competition. The distillers have the more reason to feel gratitude to Borden than the Blue Ribbon men.

So far it would seem that Canada is just as much as ever in the power of the interests, and the rights of a democracy, which the allies are fighting for in Europe, in the form of a really democratic government, are just as far away as ever.

This may further be shown by the usurpation by the finance minister, that same Tom White, of the powers of Imperial Parliament. Sir Thomas has decreed that no province, municipality, nor school board may issue bonds, or other securities without his permission. He needs the money. Should any one else need some money, too, he will have to give the proposition the once over first. And this notwithstanding that the several provinces of Canada have sovereign rights and responsibilities conferred upon them by the constitution of the Dominion, that is the British North America Act. But that doesn't trouble the Borden Government. Respect for the rights of others never has been the strong point of any administration he was connected with.

MAYORALTY CANDIDATE
—TO THE CITY ELECTORS

To the Electors of Prince Rupert, Ladies and Gentlemen—Having entered the contest for the Mayoralty of your city for 1918, it is my duty to place a platform in front of you for your consideration. I submit the following:—

1. Open up the question of our agreement with the G. T. P. Railway Company with a view of getting an understanding with the newly appointed officials of that company, as to their attitude towards the Prince Rupert agreement. This matter to be pursued with the best intentions as regards the interests of the railway company and Prince Rupert which I consider are one.

2. I am opposed to purchasing the power rights of the Prince Rupert Hydro-Electric Co., situated on Falls River. I consider this is too expensive an undertaking for the city to enter into at present; also too expensive to buy and hold for an indefinite period. If the proposals made by the present council are accepted by that company, I will consider it my duty to have a by-law drafted, and submitted to the people for their consideration.

3. Cow Bay. My policy has always been against the closing up of Cow Bay, because it is the only outlet the city possesses to the waterfront. It is the only place for repairing small boats on the townsite, as Seal Cove will be interfered with in the near future.

4. Adopt a policy whereby lands (Continued on page three.)

which have become the property of the city through tax sales shall become revenue producing, so as to relieve the general taxpayer. This to be carried out with the view of supplying industrial sites wherever possible at a reasonable figure.

5. To enforce prohibition to the letter, and all other laws and by-laws, irrespective of who may be affected; the same to be carried out at a reasonable expense. We are now paying 200 per cent. more than similar cities in this province are paying, and in Prince Rupert we are not getting value for our money.

6. To place the city's utilities upon a self-supporting basis, and to remove the cause of our present deficit, which I claim is due to bad administration.

7. To adopt grading where practicable so as to abolish as far as possible planking on our city streets.

8. Economy with efficiency shall be my policy with all city business.

9. It shall be my ambition to protect the general public in regard to prices, quality and sufficient supply of the commodities necessary for their use. Where private enterprise fails to supply these commodities at a reasonable price, it shall be my duty to find ways and means to overcome obstacles which appear to render the city powerless to act. On such occasions I will not hesitate to take action.

10. I can see no reason why permission cannot be granted to householders to cut a supply of wood for their homes, where timber is not available for lumber. This will assist the coal supply in this city, which has not been satisfactory of late owing to the difficulty in obtaining supplies and in their transportation. I shall attempt to obtain permission and to assist with roadways if possible.

11. I shall consider it my duty to assist in every way possible any and all legitimate industries, which will be in any way an asset and shall try all ways and means to provide sites and power for such enterprises.

Ladies and Gentlemen, you have got my record for investigation for five terms as alderman for your city, which I rely on, and if you find it satisfactory, I ask for your support on election day. If I am elected, I shall devote my whole time to the city business, with which I am familiar. I will give you a progressive, sane and fair administration for 1918.
