## BRITISH RAID KARLSRUHE BY DAYLIGHT

### ITALIANS HIT HUNS HARD--BRITISH FRONT IS QUIET--YARMOUTH BOMBARDED

#### YARMOUTH IS BOMBARDED BY NIGHT FROM SEA

Enemy Raider Could not be Seen—Several Killed and Injured—Raid on Karlsruhe Made by Daylight.

(Special to The Daily News.) London, Jan. 16.—Yarmouth was bombarded from the sea last night, it is announced officially. About twenty shells fell in the city. Three persons were killed and ten injured. The enemy craft was presumably a submarine, or a light cruiser. Owing to the blackness of the night, the enemy was not seen.

In Broad Daylight. The official statement regarding the raid made upon the city of Karlsruhe in Germany indicates that this was one of the most daring and successful raids yet carried out by the British aviators. The raid was carried out in broad daylight and much damage done. The official statement reads as follows: "Today one of our air squadrons carried out a most successful raid into Germany in broad daylight. The objectives were the railway station and the munition factories at Karlsruhe. One and a quarter tons of bombs were dropped. Bursts of flame were observed on the buildings, and from the sidings of the main railway junction in the centre of the town. All our aeroplanes reached their objectives and returned in safety."

#### BRITAIN NEEDS MORE MEN TILL U.S. IS READY

(Special to The Daily News.) London, Jan. 16.—Nearly half a million more men are to be recruited from Great Britain alone into the British army at the earliest possible date, and it is possible that many more may be added to that number during the coming months. These comprise the younger men, who up to the present time have been exempt, because of their employment in industries essential to war services.

The Empire has enrolled 7,500,000 fighting and labor battalion forces during the war, according to the statement of Sir Auckland Geddes, Minister of National Service, and now has 4,000,000 more enrolled, but more men are needed to hold our own against the enemy until American strength is available.

#### ARGENTINE WHEAT FOR THE ALLIES

Buenos Aires, Jan. 16.—The Foreign Minister today signed an agreement with the British and French ministers to sell 2,500,000 tons of wheat to the Entente allies.

#### BRITISH WERE NOT SURPRISED AT CAMBRAI

Official Enquiry Exonerates the British Staff—Italians Active and Cause Heavy Losses to Huns.

(Special to The Daily News.) London, Jan. 16.—Mr. Bonar Law announced in the House of Commons yesterday that as the result of Field Marshal Haig's enquiry the General Staff, the War Cabinet and the government considered that the British Higher Army had not been surprised by the German attack in the Cambrai region on November 30, and that all proper and adequate dispositions had been made to meet it. Bonar Law denied the truth of the report that Field Marshal Haig might be recalled.

#### Italian Front.

London, Jan. 16.—Successful operations were carried out yesterday by the Italian troops around Monte Asolone, Monte Spinocci, and Camposile, according to a report received today from General Flumer, commanding the British troops in Italy. The Italians gained considerable advantage over the enemy, and inflicted very severe losses, taking many prisoners.

#### British Front.

London, Jan. 16.—The report from General Haig's headquarters in France says: "Early this morning the enemy raided one of our posts southeast of Armentieres. A few of our men are missing. Hostile artillery has been active in the St. Julien area and southeast of Hargicourt."

#### CANADA WILL STAY TILL LAST GUN IS FIRED

(Special to The Daily News.) New York, Jan. 16.—Speaking as the guest of honor before the Canadian Club at New York last night, the Hon. F. B. Carvell, Canadian minister of public works, stated that Canada would remain in the war until the last gun was fired. "Our love of liberty, the love of liberty that we Canadians cherish in our hearts," the speaker said, "caused us to send with the colors battalions more than 400,000 strong. Seventy thousand of our soldiers have fallen in battle, but thousands more will fill the ranks until final victory comes."

#### "TILLAMOOK" HAS HER ANNUAL OVERHAUL

The G. T. P. freighter Tillamook is now in Seattle undergoing her annual overhaul, and will probably be out of the water for a month. Several alterations are being made to the vessel. She will have a new pilot house, steam-heating plant, and two electric winches each of five tons capacity.

The Tillamook is the largest of Pacific motor-ships operating in the coastwise trade. There is only one larger, which is the motorship Oregon, and she is now in the trans-Pacific service.

The chief business of the Tillamook during last year had been carrying canned salmon from Alaskan ports to Prince Rupert for shipment east. She carried about 14,000 cases per trip, and it is estimated that altogether she brought to Prince Rupert something like 150,000 cases of Salmon.

#### BOLSHEVIKI DENOUNCED AS URURPERS

Social Revolutionary Members of Constituent Assembly Issue Manifesto—Are Dissatisfied.

Petrograd, Jan. 16.—The Social Revolutionary members of the Constituent Assembly have issued a manifesto denouncing the Bolsheviki as "Usurpers of power, who have precipitated the country into the abyss of civil war and anarchy."

While placing the restoration of peace at the head of their own programme, the signers of this manifesto reproach the Bolsheviki for having deluded the worn-out soldiers with the hope of immediate peace, instead of which, the manifesto says, "They have opened the front door to the enemy, and brought the country to the verge of a new and an overwhelming war, caused by the rupture of relations with the Entente, thus leaving Russia to her fate."

POWER

There have been many opinions among the municipal candidates during the past few days regarding the power situation in connection with this city. The majority of these opinions have been regarding what the givers would not do. But what they intend to do is another story. The fact remains that Prince Rupert would be up against it for power to supply should one or two new industrial companies settle here in the immediate future.

Alderman Casey seems to be the only one of the candidates who can foresee the necessity of getting down to business regarding the power situation at once. If another consumer of power came to town this week and wanted the same amount of power as the Emerson mill—and that is not such a tremendously big institution that we need not expect a bigger—it is questionable if the city could supply the quantity demanded.

Thus the necessity exists for getting a hold of more power and at once. It is all very well to have power at Wark Channel or at Falls river, but if that power is allowed to remain there, it won't do Prince Rupert any good. Prince Rupert wants industries, but it is no good waiting for them to come along. With the present utility working nearly at its maximum, it can hardly be said that Prince Rupert is even in the position to take care of any new industries which would require power, if they came along tomorrow. So before this city can reasonably go out and get after prospective industries for location here, we must have the wherewithal to supply their needs in the matter of power. The suggestion made by Ald. Casey that we ought to find out just what we have got at Wark Channel is most timely. The

power is there, but what the extent of it is no one knows in detail. It has been secured for the city, and an estimate of its capacity and of the cost of its transmission of that power to this city would seem to be within the range of practical politics at this time.

But at the same time, sight should not be lost of the Falls river proposition. Steps should be taken to have the government give the city the refusal of this power, when the present lease of the Prince Rupert Hydro-Electric Company expires. With the growth of Prince Rupert, both Wark Channel and Falls river powers will doubtless be required to meet the demand for electrical energy. It were well to remember that in the near future there will be a great increase in the domestic consumption of power, both for cooking and heating, as well as lighting.

Foresight and vision are prime necessities in dealing with the question, and proper provision for the future years must be made. The city has started off well in the ownership of its utilities, and having taken up the responsibility, the city will have to carry the principle out to its logical conclusion.

It will be the duty of the new mayor and council to see that the fullest preparations are made for the future development of the city in this connection. The necessity is immediate, as our present hydro-electric utility is operating to almost its maximum capacity.

NOTES AND COMMENTS

There will be three still potential, but temporarily disappointed mayors in this city tomorrow night.

Both Saskatchewan and Quebec have protested against the action of the minister of finance in prohibiting the issuing of provincial or municipal securities without his gracious acquiescence. ernment can overrule, even if it is war time. The protest from these two provinces is not meant to hamper the Dominion government in any way, but merely to preserve these rights intact. If this precedent is allowed to pass unchallenged, there is no saying where the thing might end.

Still another break off from Russia is reported. General Kaledines, Hetman of the Cossacks, is president and prime minister of the new republic of Don, Russia is not so large as Canada, and they evidently find there that democracy flourishes best in smaller communities.

It has been recommended to the city council of Montreal that all bachelors over 21 be subjected to a special tax. The city of Montreal is hard up. A graduated tax increasing each year might make many more homes throughout Canada, if the Dominion considered this as a source of revenue.

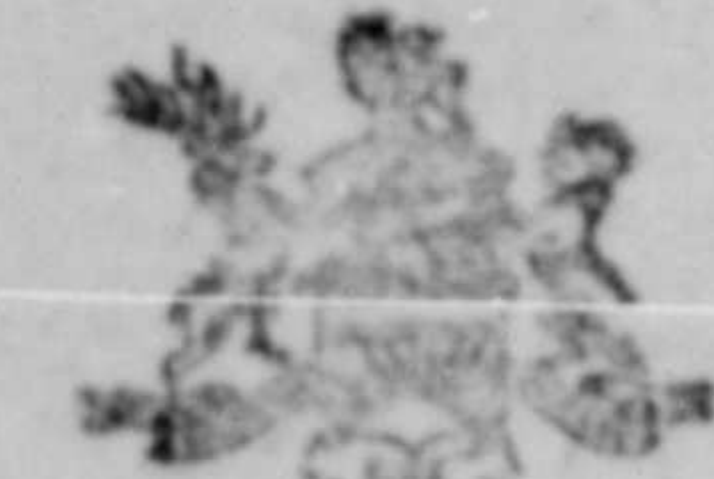
