

RUSSIA SENDS ULTIMATUM TO ROUMANIA

SUCCESSFUL RAID BY CANADIANS -- HUN ATTACK ON FRENCH LINES REPULSED

CAILLAUX PLANNED TO HAVE DICTATORSHIP IN FRANCE

SAFE CONTAINING INTERESTING DOCUMENTS DISCOVERED IN FLORENCE, SHOWING PLANS OF CAILLAUX AND HIS FRIENDS FOR THEIR OUP D'ETAT -- PLANS GO INTO VERY FULL DETAIL

(Special to The Daily News.)

Paris, Jan. 17.—Le Matin today insists that the famous safe which was reported to have been discovered in Florence, held under the name of one of Caillaux's various aliases, contains the complete plans for the new French government projected by Caillaux, including radical changes in various governmental posts. The names of President Poincare and Premier Clemenceau, the newspaper insisted, are mentioned in these documents.

Caillaux also planned for the dissolution of the Chamber of Deputies. Sarraill was to be commander in chief of the French armies, according to plans found in Rome.

The Dictator.

Two regiments to be recruited were to be brought to Paris under the command of two generals, both friends of Caillaux, then after a last military effort, Caillaux planned to submit the question of peace to a popular referendum. All foreign ambassadors were to be replaced also. Part of the documents revealing the plans of Caillaux have been sent to Paris, while the remainder is being kept in Italy in the meantime. According to a wireless message received today from Rome, the documents found in the strong box belonging to Caillaux show that he planned to assume dictatorial powers, if he were made premier of France, to arrest President Poincare, Premier Briand, and other statesmen.

MANY CHINESE WORK BEHIND ALLIES' LINES

New York, Jan. 16.—China already has 125,000 men behind the firing lines in Mesopotamia and France, Dr. Wellington Koo, Chinese Ambassador to this country, said in an address here before the Chamber of Commerce of the State of New York. When the Chinese Commission now in the United States return to their own country their advice to their government, Dr. Koo said, undoubtedly would result in increased military activity. "China intends doing her utmost in this struggle against autocracy," the Ambassador declared.

IRISH CONVENTION CONCLUDES THIS WEEK

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Jan. 17.—Several of the morning newspapers refer to the expected conclusion of the Irish conference this week. One paper thinks that today's session is to be the fateful meeting, and will decide whether the convention is to be regarded as a success or a failure.

A Dublin dispatch to the Times says that matters have taken a disappointing turn, which that newspaper interprets as meaning that the prospect of agreement is more remote.

PROBLEM NOW IS TO GET SAILORS

Victoria, Jan. 16.—Now that British Columbia has started delivering hulls under construction on this coast under the existing shipbuilding programme, the problem of adequately manning these ships is at once a serious one and one that should receive consideration at the hands of the responsible authorities without delay. This is the opinion that is freely expressed in shipping circles, it being pointed out that with the scarcity of fully qualified seamen at the present time, not a little difficulty will be experienced in signing on competent men to navigate and fully man these vessels.

In these days when everybody is talking about conserving food-stuffs in order that more supplies may be shipped overseas, and ships are being constructed for the express purpose of shipping the necessities of life to the war area, the present scarcity of seamen appears to have been completely overlooked.

But the fact remains that if the vessels now building in Canada are to be of any use it will be essential that sufficient seafarers be found to adequately man the ships being turned out.

The twenty-seven steamers that are being built on this coast to the order of the Imperial Munitions Board are destined for the Imperial Government, and in view of that fact it is not improbable that the officers at least will be sent out from the United Kingdom to man the mas they are completed. Sailors, however, are none too plentiful anywhere, and in this time of stress the Mother Country can ill spare the men necessary to take over the ships that are building in Canada.

It is maintained in shipping circles that it is a great mistake to conscript seamen on this coast for military service, especially in view of the fact that there is such a scarcity of seafarers at this time.

Already the crews of the various coasting vessels have been sadly depleted by the army draft and the steamship companies are experiencing considerable difficulty in finding men competent to take their places. For this reason the curtailment of coast services has been under consideration by some of the steamship companies.

BRITISH MAKE AIR RAID ON LORRAINE

London, Jan. 17.—Following up the air raid upon the city of Karlsruhe, which was so successful, the British aviators, the next evening, paid a visit to Lorraine, and called on the fortress of Metz and the steel works of Thionville. Thionville is famous for its steel works, which have been greatly enlarged since the outbreak of the war. But its production of steel will be decreased for some time, owing to the damage done by the bombs which the British air squadron rained upon the factories. Great damage was inflicted, and building after building was seen to burst into flame as the British squadron hovered over the city.

In Metz considerable damage was done to the railroad and to the depots there. Metz is an important railway junction and a distributing point for munitions for the German front. Several of the Hun ammunition dumps were exploded, causing widespread destruction. The tracks will be impassable for trains for some considerable period. All the British machines returned in safety to their headquarters.

U. S. NOW PURCHASING SUPPLIES IN EUROPE

Paris, Jan. 16.—The goods purchased in Europe by the general purchasing board of the American Expeditionary Force up to December 15 is estimated at 1,804,000 tons.

Most materials for the Americans have been purchased in France, but quantities also have been obtained in England, Italy and Portugal, and even in neutral countries, such as Spain and Switzerland.

In addition to an organized search for supplies in England the purpose of saving tonnage, the board is engaged in devising methods for the saving of shipping space. At present the board is negotiating for the acquisition of Belgian locomotives and timber products, which will involve the saving in the two articles alone of 150,000 tons of cargo space. The board estimates that this amount of material, if brought from the United States, would require the services of 30 ships, each of 5,000 tons capacity, for a period probably exceeding sixty days.

The growing seriousness of the submarine situation has made the problem of saving tonnage one of vital importance.

RUSSIA GIVES AN ULTIMATUM TO ROUMANIA

Gives Little Nation Twenty-four Hours to Release Russian Troops Who Pillaged Their Property.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Petrograd, Jan. 17.—War on Roumania, unless that little nation, within twenty-four hours, releases the Russian officers held by her, was the threatening ultimatum served by the Bolsheviki Government today. This ultimatum declared: "We are informed that the Roumanians surrounded and disarmed the 194th and the 49th Russian regiments and arrested a committee of the 195th Regiment, also visiting Austrian officers. Failure to release these persons, and failure to punish those responsible within twenty-four hours will result in our considering relations between the two countries ruptured, and in taking the most energetic military measures."

AEROPLANE AND SUB COMBINED

Norfolk, Va., Jan. 16.—Lieut. Resnati, the Italian aviator, will endeavor shortly to add more laurels to his crown with a new kind of machine.

Resnati is preparing to fly in a new Italian car that can dive under water as well as sail through the air. The machine is said to be the only one of its kind in existence, and when submerged can go much faster than a submarine.

JAPANESE FLEET AT VLADIVOSTOK IN THE ALLIES' INTERESTS

(Special to The Daily News.)

Tokio, Jan. 17.—Warships of the Japanese fleet have been dispatched to Vladivostok for the protection of the allied interests there. This action follows the long continued requests of the citizens in the Russian port for adequate protection, not only to their own lives and property, but to the tremendous quantities of war munitions supplied by the allies, and still stored in the port.

Fighting between the Bolsheviki and the Cossacks has been in progress in and around the city for weeks past, and still continues.

MAN FOUND DEAD ON ISLAND NEAR ALASKA

The provincial police department received advice this morning from Port Simpson that a man had been found dead on one of the little islands between Wales Island and the Alaskan border. Wales Island lies at the mouth of the Portland Inlet and the international boundary runs immediately to the north of it.

Full details have not yet been received, but it is known that the man had a dog with him. The dog was still alive, so the accident could not have occurred very long ago.

The coroner, Dr. Large, reports that it will be a difficult matter getting across the mouth of the inlet today on account of the high seas and the southwest gale blowing. Investigations will be made at the soonest possible moment.

FARMERS OBJECT TO FOOD PROFITEERS

Brandon, Jan. 16.—Following a long discussion at the Manitoba Grain Growers' convention, the following resolution on hog production was unanimously passed: "That while we grain growers declare our desire to do everything possible in our power to furnish food for Great Britain and her allies, even at a monetary loss to ourselves, we would strongly urge upon the Government that it take all possible care to see that the results of our sacrifice shall not be absorbed by those interests who hitherto have fattened upon the farmers on the one hand and the consumers on the other hand."

CANADIANS GIVE SURPRISE TO HUNS AT LENS

After a Quiet Time Surprise Raid Accomplishes Its Object—Hun Attack on French Lines Fails.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Canadian Headquarters in France, January 17.—After its week of comparative rest, the Canadian troops are giving the enemy a real taste of its mettle. On Sunday night, a raiding party just after dark entered the Hun lines north of Lens and captured nearly half its own strength without suffering a single casualty. The enemy was taken completely by surprise, and was easily overcome. Eleven prisoners were captured.

French Front.

Paris, Jan. 17.—The German troops who attacked the French lines on a front of nearly two hundred metres in the Chaume Wood, north east of Verdun today succeeded in getting a footing in some of the advanced elements. They were finally driven out by the French soldiers. In Lorraine, a raid made by the French resulted in the capture of 20 Germans.

NO CHANGE IN HUN PEACE CONDITIONS

Berlin, Jan. 17.—The Under-Secretary for Foreign Affairs has informed the Reichstag Main Committee today that there has been no alteration in the instructions given to Foreign Secretary Kuehlmann, for the peace negotiations at Brest-Litovsk.

THE ELECTION

There is as little excitement in the city this year as last over the municipal election. Time was when an election meant something which caused some stir, but in war time, it seems to be taken as a matter of course. The retiring council are not without credit for their year's labors. They have done a lot, and they have attempted more. They have cleared the ground for the accomplishment of several things, which it rests with their successors to pursue. Public opinion in many matters moves slowly. But the late council has done a great deal of educative work. They have brought the matter of waterfront for the city to the fore. They have raised the question of a municipal coal yard. They have convinced the community of the necessity of more electrical power, although they have not agreed as to the source of the new supply. They have also proved to the satisfaction of everyone that it is useless to pass any more resolutions or writing the government, or the G. T. P. regarding the getting of the drydock plant into commission for the building of ships. The new council will benefit by the experience of this last one, the more so as there will in all likelihood be some of the old councillors re-elected. It has been found out that the city can enter into the coal business—if it likes. To do this will require a wharf with suitable bunkers, for which waterfront is necessary. They know they can procure waterfront, on certain terms. The new council will also realize that their first duty is to take immediate steps, to which the action of the late council has led, to have a deputa-tion of our fighting citizens sent to Ottawa, to have the curse removed from this city, in the shape of the pall of idleness hovering over the equipment at Hay's Cove. That is their first and bounden duty. With a national government appointed to office in Ottawa, who may possibly and will most probably regard matters from

a different aspect from the last government, the people of Prince Rupert should be able to lay their case before a government who will look at the matter from a business point of view. It cannot be regarded as good business anywhere, not even in Ottawa, to keep an investment of over two millions lying idle, without bringing in a return. The more so when ships, more ships, and still more ships are required. The government applied for loans, and Victory loans to win the war. They did not ask the people for all these millions to tie it up. The sooner the millions invested in the equipment of our drydock plant are put to work for the winning of the war, the sooner the war will be ended, and the sooner Prince Rupert will be utilizing her resources to this end. It's got to come sometime, and there is no time better than the present, nor any time when activity there was more needed. With the way cleared for them, the new council can get right down to business, and have a meeting of every resident in the city to choose that that deputa-tion, which it will be necessary to send east. This is not a matter for the city council alone. It is not a matter for the Board of Trade alone. Nor yet of both of these institutions together. It is a matter for the whole population of this city. With every resident in the city behind them, as well as every public and semi-public body, the deputa-tion would be able to speak with some authority, and their hands would be strengthened. If we have to fight the whole of Canada, and even be turned down finally, we will then have had the satisfaction of having done all that within us lay for that which is reasonably ours. But we won't be turned down, if we get after this thing strongly enough. Therefore, let's get after it.

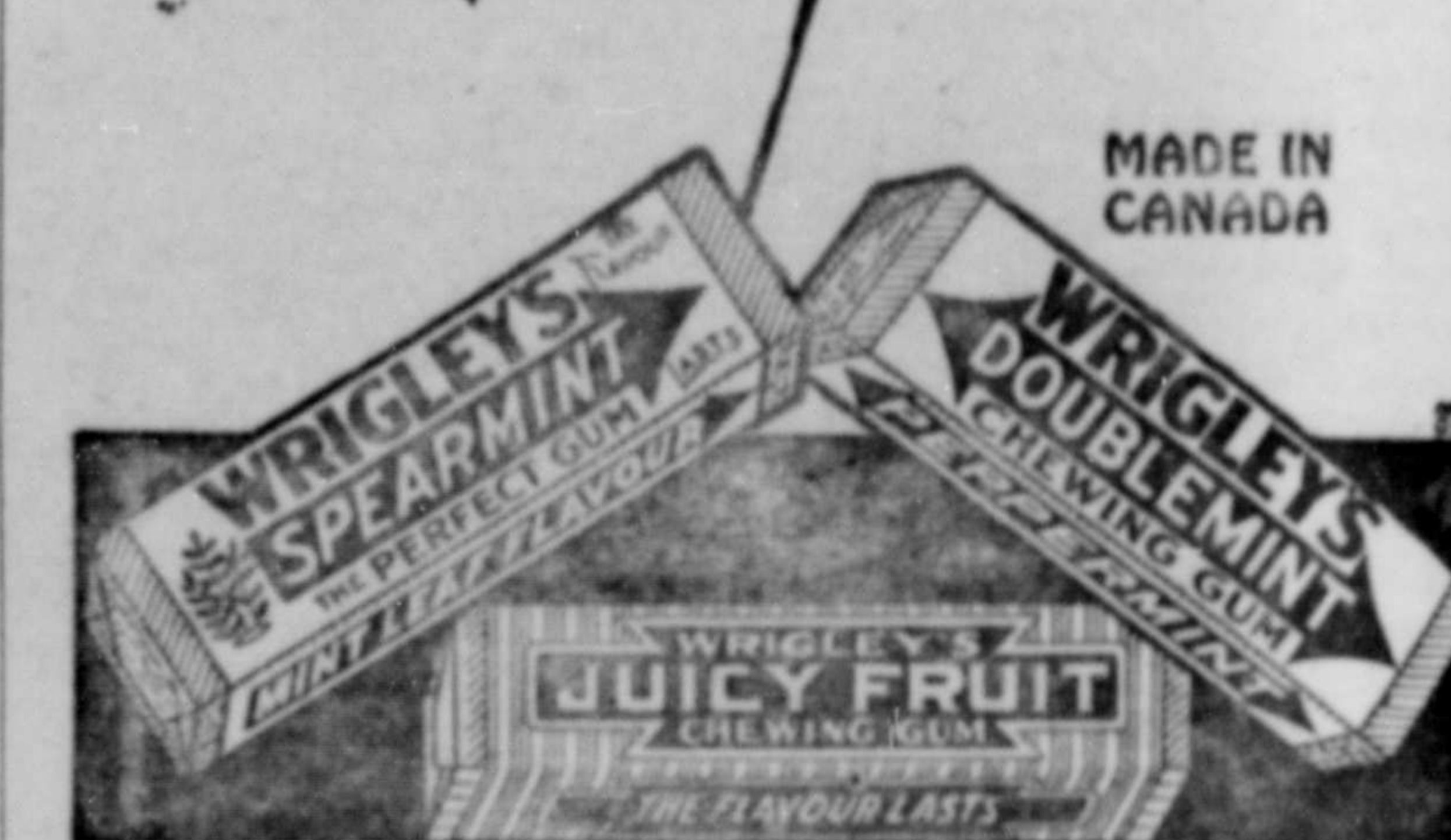

HOW THE SOLDIER'S VOTE IS ALLOCATED

The dubiety which apparently is existing in certain quarters with regard to the soldiers' vote and how they will be dealt with is cleared away by the statement of Mr. W. F. O'Connor, the general returning officer, in a statement issued at Ottawa last week. Mr. O'Connor says:

"The impression appears to have been created in some quarters that the government is empowered under the War Times Election Act to allocate certain soldier votes to particular constituencies as it may seem expedient. This is entirely incorrect. The government, as a matter of fact, is precisely in the same position with regard to the votes of soldiers. The act permits a soldier, who is a British subject and has no domicile in Canada, to designate the constituency in which his vote is to be counted. It also permits him, if he knows only the name of a place and not the name of the constituency in which it is situated, to indicate the name of the place, and the ballot is duly accredited to the proper constituency. But in every case the matter is settled by the soldier himself at the time he votes. Neither the government nor the opposition has power to change the vote of a single soldier or to allocate it to any constituency other than that which the soldier has chosen at the time of voting. The vote is counted and allocated to its proper constituency in the presence of election officers, representing both government and opposition, duly appointed under the provisions of the War Time Election Act."

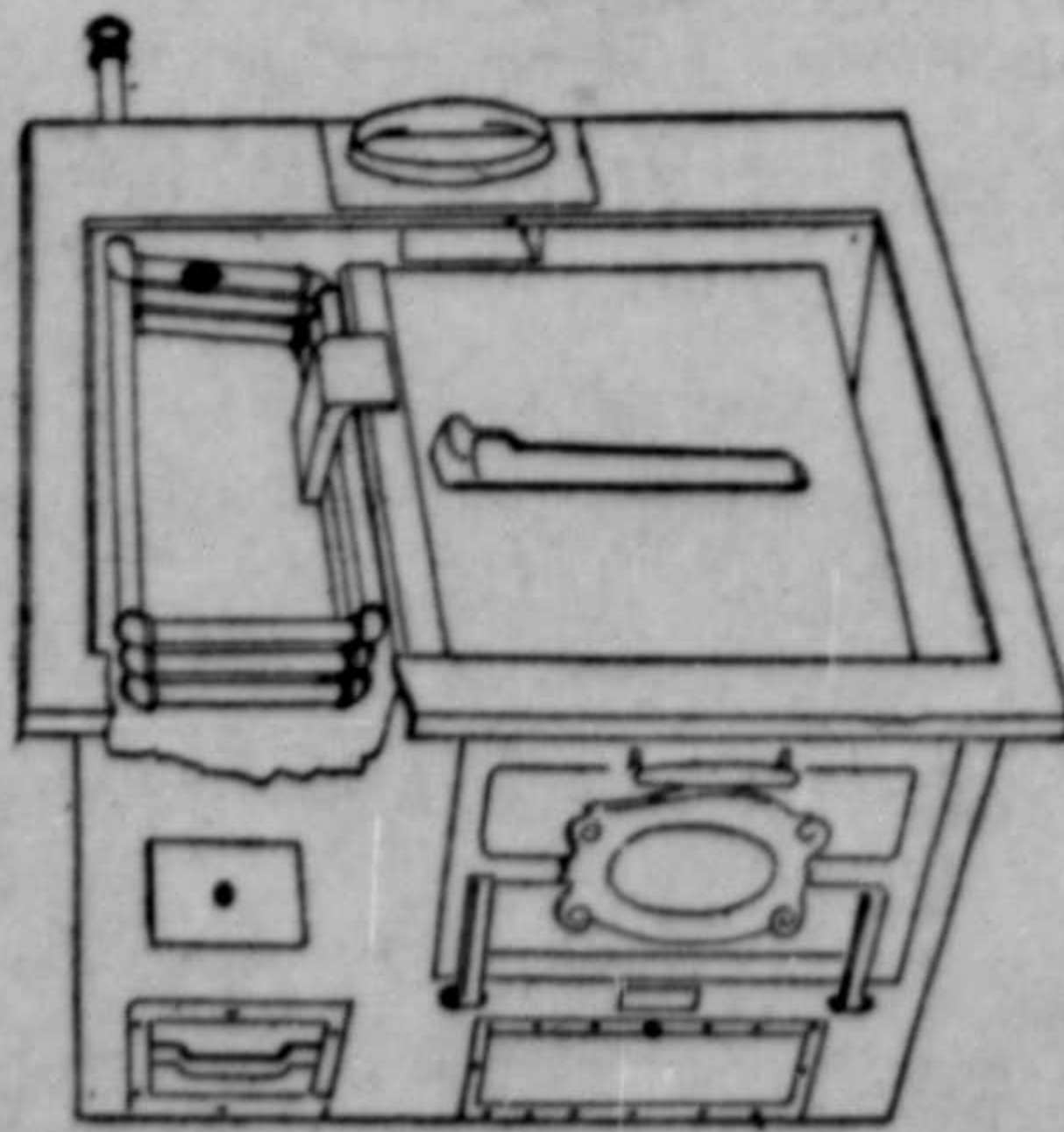
