MUTINY OF HUN SUBMARINE CREWS AT KIEL

BOLSHEVIKI WOULD ARREST KING OF ROUMANIA --- BRITISH DESTROYERS LOST

HIGH HANDED ACTION BY BOLSHEVIKI GOVERNMENT

ORDER SIGNED FOR ARREST OF KING FERDINAND OF RUMANIA --- WILL BE SENT TO KRONSTADT FORTRESS FOR IMPRISONMENT---LITTLE PROGRESS WITH PEACE NEGOTIATIONS

(Special to The Daily News.)
Petrograd, Jan. 18.—An order threatening the arrest of King Ferdinand of Roumania has been issued by the Bolsheviki government. Premier Lenine has signed the order today for the arrest of Ferdinand, who when seized, will be sent to Petrograd for imprisonment in the fortress of St. Peter and St. Paul. The Bolsheviki government believe that they have sufficient forces on the Roumanian front to carry out the arrest in several quarters in Petrograd. The action on the part of the Bolsheviki is looked upon with favor. It is not considered that there will be any interference possible with the carrying out of their decree by any other nation, notwithstanding that this is a direct violation of the sovereign rights of the Roumanian people.

Terms Inacceptable.
Berlin, January 18.—An official statement has been issued today giving the reply by the Central Powers to the Russian proposals made at Brest-Litovsk on Monday. It says that the Russian proposals concerning the regions occupied by the Central Powers diverge in such a degree from the views of the Central Powers that their present form they are inacceptable.

Uncertain Results.
London, Jan. 18.—While the German newspapers report the resumption of the peace negotiations at Brest-Litovsk, any official confirmation is lacking. The result of the conference at Berlin is also uncertain. Both the military and the non-militarist newspapers in Germany claim a victory for their representatives. Nothing official will probably be forthcoming until Chancellor Hertling makes his statement to the Reichstag main committee tomorrow. It is assumed in London that the hurried meetings of the military and political leaders in Berlin did not result in any definite change in the peace policy.

300,000 BRIGANDS IN TURKEY ARE ROVING ABOUT FOR PILLAGE

Geneva, Jan. 17.—A Constantinople report received here says that within the Ottoman Empire there are roving bands of brigands estimated to number 300,000. They are mostly armed deserters from the army and are bent on pillage. They even venture near towns and sometimes attack regular troops in order to get arms and food.

GERMANS NOW CONCENTRATE ON WEST FRONT

Heavy Troop Trains Pouring through Belgium—All Other Traffic Suspended—Battle-front Quiet.

(Special to The Daily News.)
Stockholm, Jan. 18.—Despite the severity of the weather, which has seized all Europe in an icy grip, the Germans are making enormous concentrations of troops on the western front. Their piling up of reserve battalions is about complete. For days past heavy troop trains have been pouring through Belgium ceaselessly, carrying picked troops. Practically all civilian transportation is suspended meantime. The same conditions prevail upon the front between Armentieres and Douai.

Quiet Prevails.
Paris, Jan. 18.—An official communication issued by the War Office last night says: "There was slight activity over the whole front. In the region east of St. Quentin, an enemy raid upon one of our small positions completely failed. In the eastern theater, there was quite spirited artillery actions on both sides of the Cerna Bend. There was no event of importance on the rest of the front."

Bitter Cold.
Amsterdam, Jan. 18.—All Europe is suffering from a bitter cold wave which is passing over the whole continent. Fighting on all fronts is practically suspended in the effort of the various troops to keep warm. In southern France there have been several deaths among civilians through the extreme cold.

Destroyers Lost.
London, Jan. 18.—The Admiralty announces the loss of two torpedo boat destroyers. During a violent gale in a heavy snow-storm both vessels ran ashore on the Scottish coast, and were totally wrecked. Every life was lost excepting one.

THE MOST STUPID OF ALL NATIONS

Cleveland, Jan. 16.—"It is always unwise to predict the result of an unknown peril," said Sir Frederick E. Smith, the British Attorney-General, in an address here last night, referring to the massing of German legions on the Western front, "but the allies await the attack with supreme confidence."

"Three and one-half years of war have taught the French and British soldiers that, man for man, they can whip the Germans anywhere."
"The superiority of the German as a fighting unit is an exploded myth. The psychological effect of this knowledge is far greater than that of calculated terrorism."
"As guessers of human psychology," Sir Frederick characterized the Teutons as "the stupidest of all nations."

CREWS OF GERMAN WAR-SHIPS MUTINY AT KIEL

(Special to The Daily News.)
London, Jan. 18.—A mutiny among the submarine crews of the German naval base at Kiel on January 7 is reported in an Exchange Telegraph dispatch from Geneva. Thirty-eight officers are said to have been killed. The dispatch adds: "Although the mutiny was local, it shows that the German naval men are dissatisfied, especially with the submarine service, as the number of U-boats returning to the German ports is decreasing every month."

HUN PLAN TO DESTROY WHEAT CROPS IN U. S.

San Francisco, Jan. 18.—Germany's latest attempts to destroy the wheat crops of California and other states has taken the form of shipment to this country of a powerful poisonous pollen. This is to be distributed by German agents in such a manner as to kill the entire wheat output of this state.

EX-CZAR AND FAMILY ESCAPE FROM TOBOLSK

(Special to The Daily News.)
London, Jan. 18.—Nicholas Romanoff, the former emperor of all the Russias, and his family have escaped from their prison near Tobolsk. This is reported by Reuter's Petrograd correspondent at Petrograd, but the report lacks confirmation.

SIR WILLIAM REID PUT UNDER ARREST

St. John's, Nfld., Jan. 16.—Sir William Reid, head of the Newfoundland Railways, was arrested here on a charge of criminal libel made by William Coaker, a member of the new Lloyd ministry, and president of the Fishermen's Protective Union. The action was taken by Coaker as a result of the publication of a letter from Sir William to Lord Shaughnessy of Montreal, stating that Coaker was brought to Ottawa early in 1916 to be posted on matters relating to the proposed confederation of Newfoundland with the Dominion of Canada.

Inasmuch as the subject of a proposed confederation between Newfoundland and Canada has aroused bitter controversy in this colony, sensational developments are expected.

THE BEGINNING OF THE AERIAL POSTAL SERVICE

London, Jan. 16.—Plans for the establishment of an aerial postal service between France and England are rapidly approaching realization, and it is now believed that such a service, on a limited scale, will be put into effect without waiting for the end of the war.

ALDERMAN McCLYMONT IS NEW MAYOR FOR THIS YEAR

MUNICIPAL ELECTION PASSES OFF QUIETLY, AND RESULTS GIVE GENERAL SATISFACTION—ALD. McCLYMONT HAD MAJORITY OF FORTY—LADY ALDERMAN ALSO ELECTED TO CHAMBER

The municipal election has resulted in the return of five of last year's council for another term, with three new aldermen, while of the four mayorality candidates, Alderman McClymont now becomes mayor, with a majority of forty votes. Mr. Harry B. Rochester, one of the new aldermen, headed the poll with 324 votes, while Alderman McClymont polled 212 votes. The figures in the mayorality contest are as follows:

MANUFACTURERS ASK A WAR INDUSTRIES BOARD FOR CANADA

Ottawa, Jan. 16.—The creation of a war industries board was urged upon the Government yesterday by a large delegation representing the Canadian Manufacturers' Association. Such a board, the Government was informed, had become necessary in view of the greater difficulties encountered by Canadian manufacturers in securing materials from the United States since the entry of that country into the war.

It was suggested that the board should consist of five members, whose duties it would be to collate and co-ordinate the needs of Canadian industries. The board would be assisted by sub-committees representative of the industries involved and composed of expert men.

Hon. N. W. Rowell promised the delegation the request would receive the sympathetic consideration of the Government. "I am sure," he said, "that we all realize the difficulties created for Canadian industry by reason of the entry of the United States into the war."

London, Jan. 17.—The Bolsheviki Government, a Reuter dispatch from Petrograd says, has issued a decree suspending all payments of dividends by private companies. The Government also has forbidden transactions in stocks pending the issuance of ordinances relating to the further nationalization of production and determining the amount of interest payable by private companies.

REPRISALS

The recent accounts of the British air raids on German cities, which succeeded each other so rapidly, will be welcomed by all the allies. At first, this form of attacking the enemy was considered to be "un-British" and was placed on a par with the torpedoing of ships by submarines without warning. Gradually, however, the apparently phlegmatic British mind was brought round to consider a policy of reprisals, similar to that which had been adopted by the French government. This policy meant that for every air raid made on Great Britain, the British aviators would make one back on Germany in return. This was all right, of course, so far as it went. But it did not go far enough. Reprisals are better than no reprisals, but attack, and continuous attack is better than reprisals, if we want to demoralize the enemy. The German idea of air raids upon open towns was so to scare and demoralize the civil population that there would spring up a universal cry for peace, which would hamper the government. This, of course, applies to the German people as well as to any of the allied countries. There is no doubt that a systematic bombardment of the German cities and towns from the air, and the continuous blowing up of his railroad communications would go a long way towards bringing pressure to bear upon the Kaiser and his government. They do not want peace just now. They are still of the hope that the allies will weary of the slaughter and quit, before the German armies are finally and decisively beaten.

But with the German people from one end of the country to the other clamoring for peace, and the cessation of the allies' air raids, the Kaiser would have to make overtures, or else have to deal with his own people. The mastery of the air is the only means whereby the allies can chase the German fleet out from its safe anchorage behind Heligoland. The British ships cannot penetrate through the

maze of mine fields protecting these treacherous waters, with any degree of safety. The only method left is to destroy their bases, and to bomb the warships from the anchorages. From the manner in which the allies are building aeroplanes, it is evident that they have already perceived this to be the case. They have the world to draw upon for supplies of material for aeroplane construction, and should be able to beat the Germans so far as speed of construction is concerned. It would seem as if important developments will be witnessed in the air in the immediate future.

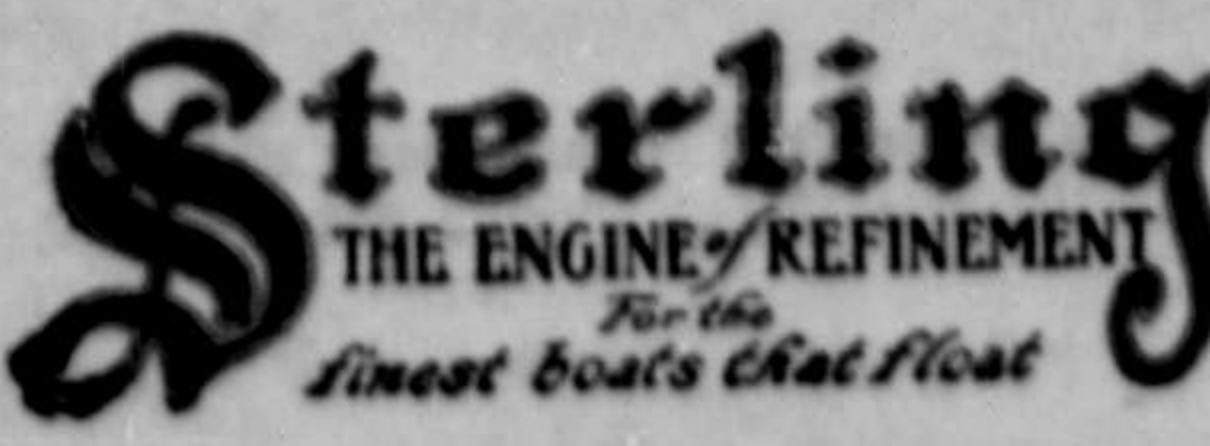
