BRAZIL'S SOLDIERS GET READY FOR FRANCE

HUN CONCENTRATION IN BELGIUM -- STRIKE IN AUSTRIA FOR IMMEDIATE PEACE

BRITISH HIGHER COMMAND CRITICISED IN LONDON PRESS

LONDON DAILY MAIL GETS AFTER GOVERNMENT AND GENERAL STAFF REGARDING CAMBRAI INCIDENT — EARL OF DERBY AND SIR WM. ROBERTSON BLAMED — ARMY CLIQUE IN CONTROL

(Special to The Daily News.)
London, Jan. 22.—The London Daily Mail publishes a long contributed article which vehemently attacks the government and the general staff in connection with the finding of the staff, as announced in the House of Commons on Tuesday last, that the British Higher Command had not been surprised when the Germans attacked on the Cambrai front on November 30th. The British on that occasion lost part of the ground gained on their offensive a few days earlier.

The article says that the government, under pressure of the general staff, is hushing up the incident, while the Germans claim that they captured or destroyed one hundred and thirty-two tanks and to have taken nine thousand prisoners and one hundred guns. The writer adds: "A particular army clique has had the supreme military control for the past two years, and has repeatedly failed to fulfill its own expectations and promises."

The Daily Mail endorses the writer, blaming the Earl of Derby and General Sir William Robertson, the chief of the general staff, whose removal it suggests as desirable. It declares that the public would like to see a man of the type of Sir Eric Geddes, who is now first lord of the Admiralty, at the war office.

EIGHT HUNDRED TONS COAL LOST EN ROUTE

According to a telegram received by Messrs. Albert & McCaffery this morning, the tug Dola, which had in tow two scows laden with eight hundred tons of coal, reports the loss of the coal. There is no information as to the loss of the scows. The accident happened in the Queen Charlotte Sound. The wire was received from the towing company, and it referred to the coal only. Messrs. Albert & McCaffery, however, have a good supply of coal on hand, and do not expect to run short until further supplies can be brought up.

RESIGNATION OF SIR EDWARD CARSON

London, Jan. 22.—Sir Edward Carson has resigned from his position on the War Cabinet. This is said to be on account of the Irish question and has nothing to do with the government's conduct of the war.

BELGIUM SWARMING WITH GERMAN TROOPS

(Special to The Daily News.)
Paris, Jan. 22.—Several hundred thousand German troops have been brought to Belgium during the past few weeks. The little kingdom has literally been crowded with men and munitions, according to word received here today. The French military critics believe that the British line in Flanders will soon be subjected to intense pressure.

British Front.
London, Jan. 22.—Increased artillery and aerial activity on the western front has been accompanied by more frequent raids on both sides.

Italian Front.
On the Italian front, there has been only artillery fighting, most marked on the Monte Asolone sector and along the Piave.
Hun Planes Downed.
Sixteen German aeroplanes were brought down on Sunday in France by the British and French airmen. Entente warships have again bombarded Ostend.

THE LIQUOR APPEALS

The appeals from the conviction made by Magistrate Carss in the police court were heard again this morning before his honor Judge Young in the County Court. It will be remembered that the first hearing of the cases took up several weeks before the police court magistrate. Today, however, the appeals of two of the accused were sustained and the conviction squashed, chiefly on account of their being insufficient corroborative evidence. Lulu de Vance, and Harry Taylor are, therefore, free. Judgment in the appeals of Ernest Braybrook, Charles Taylor, and Karl Anderson is reserved.

OBITUARY

The death is recorded in London, England, of the mother of Mr. H. D. Robinson, of this city, at the age of 72 years. The decease of Mrs. Robinson was much hastened by the recent German air raids, and in a description received from her recently, she described them as both deafening and nerve racking.

Her family are now largely distributed over the world. British Columbia claiming two, South Africa one, Alberta one, France one, England six, and a son is buried in Kling Kiang in China. Mrs. Robinson, nee Dixon, was born at King William College, Isle of Man, and cherished many memories of that insular locality, where a successful type of home rule has quietly existed for many years.

ALDERMAN CASEY'S SUGGESTIONS FOR 1918

After the regular business of the first meeting of the new council had been got through last evening, Ald. Casey, after congratulating his worship the mayor upon his appointment to his high civic office, had a few suggestions to offer in the way of progress for the incoming year. These, he thought, the members of the new council might take into consideration, and think them over. The members of the council, he thought, were all imbued with the same purpose, which was to give the best service to the public.

Lighting.
The lighting department was the first matter which the alderman touched upon. The matter of meters against the flat rate was discussed. Ald. Casey did not think it fair that some of the citizens should get off lightly with a flat rate, while others had to pay for every kilowatt they used, thanks to the meter. He considered that the whole city should be on the same level, either all meters, or else all on a flat rate. Doubtless most of the citizens would prefer the latter.

Indigent Relief.
Relief, the alderman considered, should not be left any longer in the hands of the police department. He did not think it proper. Some cases of real distress had been passed up. He personally knew of children going to school without food, and being actually hungry. He considered that the council should assume the responsibility of looking into such cases themselves, instead of passing it on to any department.

Departmental Reports.
A monthly report, Ald. Casey considered was desirable from several of the departments in the city hall, showing the expenditure tabulated. This was specially applicable to the board of works and the light and telephone departments. The appointment of an industrial committee of the council was also another matter for which he asked consideration. This committee would be able to give all information detailed and accelerate the settling of industries here. For instance, take a fertilizer plant. Who knows the amount of fish waste that is available here each month? There is a large quantity, but who could tell any prospective fertilizer company what quantities they might get?

The Smelter.
The necessity for the establishment of a smelter was again urged by the alderman, also Prince Rupert as the logical site. The taking steps for getting a Carnegie public library was also emphasized. The getting wood out of the bush at the rear avenues of the city, the establishment of a swimming pond were other points urged. Ald. Casey concluded with the request for the beginning of the laying out of a public park. Even if only an acre were cleared this year, it would always be a commencement, and it would be somewhere for the citizens to go to, when out walking. A few flowerbeds would be enough for a start. It was evident that this suggestion threw several of the council into a reverie. Their thoughts were visible. They were away back years ago, in parks in other places, where there were long vistas of well cared for avenues, bright gardens, flag poles and military bands, the scent of flowers, and the smell of new-mown grass and so forth.

However, this concluded Ald. Casey's suggestions, which certainly made up a constructive programme.

STRIKES ARE GENERAL IN AUSTRIA NOW

Strikers are Openly Anti-German and are Aimed at Peace—One Hundred Thousand Men Have Quit Work.

(Special to The Daily News.)
London, Jan. 22.—A general strike is on throughout Austria, according to an Exchange Telegraph dispatch from Paris today. It reports that one hundred thousand men are quitting work in Vienna and Neustadt, and have closed down all the war factories. The strikes are described as openly anti-German, and the movement is both political and economic, and is especially aimed at securing peace.

SPRUCE TIMBER LIMITS TO BE COMMANDEERED

Important Order—in Council is Passed by Provincial Government.

Victoria, Jan. 21.—An Order-in-Council has been passed by the Provincial Executive which will revolutionize the logging industry in this province, particularly with regard to the output of spruce logs for aeroplane construction. This order grants power to the government to arrange with the Imperial Munitions Board for the immediate logging of aeroplane spruce upon all vacant areas of crown lands and calls upon such holders to proceed with the necessary operations forthwith.

The policy embodied in the Order-in-Council is the result of exhaustive enquiries made by the minister of lands in conjunction with similar investigation from the more technical standpoint made by the western representative of the Imperial Munitions Board. Mr. Pattullo knows of the vast quantities of this much-needed commodity which is possessed by the province of British Columbia, and the fruition of carefully made plans will now result in the tapping of valuable resources to the benefit of the Empire's cause. The operative clauses of the order are as follows: "That the minister of lands be and he is hereby authorized and empowered to forthwith arrange with the Imperial Munitions Board for the immediate logging of aeroplane spruce upon all areas of vacant Crown Land that may be judged suitable for the purpose by the Department of Lands, as well as upon coal leases, coal licenses and mineral claims, to which Crown grant or surface rights has not been issued.

"To call upon all holders of Crown Timber held under license or lease which is judged by the Lands Department to be suitable for the purpose, to proceed immediately with the logging of aeroplane spruce, and in default of compliance the minister shall instruct the Department of Lands to arrange for such logging in cooperation with the Imperial Munitions Board. To arrange with the Imperial Munitions Board an adequate compensation to be paid for timber so cut from any license or lease."

NOTES FROM THE COUNCIL CHAMBER

After the first meeting of the new council was called to order last evening, the first business of the meeting was a report from the city clerk, giving the results of the election last Thursday, and declaring those who were present to have been duly elected. The public interest in the proceedings was so great that there were actually some of the citizens in attendance to witness the conduct of the meeting.

His worship the mayor made special reference to the election of Alderman Kirkpatrick, who was the first woman alderman in this city. This the mayor considered was a move in the right direction, and he expected to see a great extension of women's activities in public affairs in the near future.

Standing Committees.
The members of the standing committees were named, and are as follows: Finance, Aldermen McRae, Rochester, and Kirkpatrick. The first named in each case to be chairman. Board of Works and Health: Aldermen Dybhavn, McMeekin, and McRae. Hospital: Aldermen Kirkpatrick, and Barrie, to sit with the hospital committee. Agriculture: Aldermen Smith and Rochester, to sit with the Association board. Fisheries: Aldermen Casey and Dybhavn. Reading room: Alderman McRae, together with Messrs. Rev. W. Wright, R. J. Y. Rose, and E. E. La Casse.

The mayor impressed upon the respective members the necessity of attending committee meetings, which he considered was of more importance to the city than attending the council meetings. This importance, however, is reversed in connection with the members.

The Steel Industry.
The city clerk then read a letter from the city of North Vancouver, appending a resolution which that council had passed calling upon the provincial and Dominion governments for assistance in having established upon the Pacific coast iron and steel works. The Union of B. C. Municipalities was pressing the government for a subsidy or other assistance in the establishment of this industry, which would mean the greater prosperity of the coast. It was agreed that the letter be concurred in.

The Rifle Range.
Then came up again the matter of the establishment of a rifle range for the Cadets, which the late council had passed on for the new one to deal with. The finance committee will report upon this matter.

Raising Bacon.
A letter from the deputy minister of agriculture was again brought up, having been passed on by the late council, too. This letter called upon the city to repeal any bylaws prohibiting the raising of pigs within the city, consistent with the health regulations. The matter had been referred to the city solicitor, who said there were no bylaws to repeal. The health officer, and the Board of Health had also pronounced upon the matter. Apparently from trials already given the proposition was not a paying one, with feed to be imported. However, the matter was referred to the Board of Health for report.

New Sidewalks.
After hearing the report of the medical health officer for the past two months, the matter of the replanking of the sidewalk between Sixth and Seventh Avenues again came up for reconsideration by the new council. The petition was signed by Mr. L. W. Patmore and other property owners. The new board of works will report.

BRAZIL HAS THOUSANDS FOR FRANCE

Several Hundred Thousand Men Be Ready in a Few Months and Two Millions by End of Year.

(Special to The Daily News.)
Paris, Jan. 22.—Within a few months, Brazil will have an army of several hundred thousand men ready to take their places in France beside the Allies, and by the end of this year, she will have assembled an army of two million men. This statement was made by the Brazilian senator, De Mello Machado, in a recent interview published by the Paris "Petit Journal."

"It is a question of honor with us," declared Senator Machado, "for my country to come to the fighting front in France in order to take part in the defence of the liberty of the world. Germany seems to have considered our declaration of war as a matter of small importance. We must make her change her tone."

THE DESTRUCTION OF TURKISH WARSHIPS

(Special to The Daily News.)
London, January 22.—In the naval action between the British and the Turkish naval forces at the entrance to the Dardanelles, wherein the two former German cruisers Goeben and Breslau were destroyed, the British losses were very slight. According to the announcement of the British Admiralty, the Goeben, which was beached, is being bombed by British aeroplanes and naval aircraft. The losses sustained by the British forces consist of the monitor Raglan and a small monitor, the M-28. The monitor Raglan was commanded by Viscount Brume, nephew of the late Earl Kitchener.

On the west coast of the Queen Charlotte Islands, while it was blowing a gale, the D. C. F. "Kitwanmar" broke from her moorings and drove on the rocks. A little while afterwards, she disappeared entirely. Her crew had gone for assistance and when they returned they could find no trace of their vessel at all. They have only just reached town. CANNERY FOR WHALE MEAT ON VANCOUVER IS.

Victoria, Jan. 22.—Simultaneous with the opening of the 1918 whaling season the Victoria Whaling Company will have in operation at Kyuquot, west coast of Vancouver Island, a modern plant equipped with the most approved type of machinery for the canning of whale meats. Some weeks ago it was announced that the local whaling concern contemplated the establishment of a cannery in connection with its whaling stations and these plans have since been consummated and the preliminary construction operations put under way.

Material for Plant.
 When the company's steamer Gray leaves port she will carry the first shipment of building materials and supplies for the initial work on the new plant at Kyuquot. It is understood that the new cannery, the first of its kind to be established on the Pacific coast, or, for that matter, anywhere in the world, will be completed by the end of April and ready for operation by the time the steam whalers get away from this port on the annual hunt for the whale. In the past canneries have not been considered necessary for the preservation of juicy whale steaks, simply because there has been no demand for this nutritive food product of the sea.

It was only during the past year that the excellent qualities of whale meat became to be recognized, and when the Victoria Whaling Company introduced the new food delicacy to Pacific coast consumers the demand exceeded the supply. Soon the whale meat was heard of abroad and when enquiries began to drift in from various countries relative to the new food product the company realized the necessity of establishing canning plants to cater to the demand.

Initial Capacity.
 The cannery to be erected at Kyuquot is more or less in the nature of an experiment, but as the new industry is developed the company proposes to extend its plants.

The whale meat cannery to be operated at Kyuquot will have at the outset a capacity of from 30,000 to 50,000 cases for the season. Scrupulous cleanliness will be a feature of the operation of the new plant and only the youngest whales will be utilized for canning purposes.

The cost of meat is the heavy item in the food bill.
 Poultry and Eggs will help take the place of meat.
 The food that goes to the garbage pail from the average table will provide one-third the feed for a flock of 8 to 10 hens.
 Poultry will thrive where vegetables will not grow. The outlay is small. A few minutes a day is all the time required.
 A small flock in your back yard will go far to keep you supplied with eggs, broilers and roasters.

How to go about it
 BUY eggs for hatching or day-old chicks; borrow or buy a broody hen or an artificial brooder. A slatted packing-box will house the hen and chicks. Feed the chicks bread crumbs soaked in milk and squeezed dry. Feed five times a day, alternating with prepared chick feed, only as much as they will eat up clean. Remember that a hungry chick is a healthy chick.
 CAUTION: Chicks must not be fed until at least 48 hours old, and then only sparingly.
 If you can, start now with eggs or chicks; if not, arrange at once with the local poultry association for pullets in the fall.
