## GOVERNMENT MAY START TRAWLING HERE

### RECOMMENDATION MADE TO FOOD CONTROL --- NORTHCLIFFE CAUSES FURORE

#### WOULD COMMANDEER THE RUPERT TRAWLER CARRUTHERS

PROVINCIAL FOOD CONTROL COMMITTEE RECOMMENDS TO DOMINION FOOD CONTROLLER THAT TRAWLER AND FISHERMEN BE COMMANDEERED TO ENSURE CHEAP SUPPLY OF FISH FOOD

Victoria, Jan. 23.—A letter has been addressed to the Dominion Food Controller from the office of the Provincial Committee of Food Production, Conservation and Control, and forms the report of the sub-committee on fish. It is signed by John Wallace in his capacity as chairman of the committee, and says in part that in order to substitute fish food in the place of beef and bacon among the population of the inland provinces, it must be provided at popular prices. Price is essential in getting the people to use fish. The trawler James Carruthers of the Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Co. is available either to be operated by the company, or to be commandeered by the Department of Food Control. This report calculates that if the fishermen are given half a cent per pound they will average \$200 a month wages, with board. This is considered fair. If, however, it is impossible to get the Union to furnish men on these terms, the provincial authorities recommend that the Department of Food Control should ask for volunteers, or conscript the necessary number of fishermen for this vessel on the justified ground of a fair wage and the national interest. This whole matter will not interfere with the long line fishing, or the dory fishing in any way, and should be treated as a separate and distinct project by itself. It is calculated that the trawler will have a minimum catch of 400,000 lbs. per month, and a maximum catch of 640,000 lbs. per month. It is recommended that trawling be put into operation at once, and that the fish be frozen for better handling.

#### ROUMANIANS ARE STILL IN GOOD SHAPE

London, Jan. 22.—While official circles are reticent concerning the curious dispute which has broken out between the Bolsheviks and Roumania, it is believed here that it would be a great mistake to consider the plucky little Latin kingdom as a negligible factor in the war situation. It has not been infected by the Bolshevik propaganda. Its army, though small, is now well organized, efficient, and by no means badly off for munitions.

The Roumanians, it is believed, hold good defensive positions, which present an awkward problem for the Central Powers. No doubt Hindenburg could crush them if he would spare the men and transport, but at a moment when he is preparing his big offensive in the West he is unlikely to want to undertake an expensive sideshow. On the other hand, the Roumanians are probably well able to take care of such forces as Austria alone can easily bring against them and remain a small threatening factor in her rear.

#### INTUITION OF HUN MINISTER IS CONVINCING

Although Unable to Prove That U. S. Won't Fight, He Remains Convinced—Others Are Not Impressed.

Amsterdam, Jan. 23.—In the lower house of the Prussian Diet on Saturday, Dr. Franz Mehring, an independent Socialist, made the following enquiry: "If Canada, with less than nine million inhabitants, has been able to throw a quarter of a million soldiers into Europe, who were not able to fly nor swim, what grounds has the Foreign Minister for denying to the United States, with one hundred and ten million inhabitants, any military capacity?" The Minister in replying admitted that he was unable to prove the statement concerning the American army, but was still convinced that it could not come over.

#### RESIGNATION OF THE AUSTRIAN MINISTRY

(Special to The Daily News.)  
Amsterdam, Jan. 23.—The Austrian Ministry has resigned, according to a Vienna dispatch to the Berliner Morgenpost. Count von Toggenburg, the Minister of the Interior, has been charged with the task of forming the new cabinet. The brief dispatch does not make it absolutely clear which of the ministers has resigned, whether the Imperial Ministry, of which Count Czernin is the head, holding the portfolio of Minister of Foreign Affairs, or the minor body of which Dr. von Seydler is president. But the fact that Count Toggenburg, who held the post of Minister of the Interior in the von Seydler cabinet, having been asked to organize the new ministry would indicate that it is the latter.

#### RAID BY THE FRENCH GETS MANY PRISONERS

(Special to The Daily News.)  
Paris, January 23.—The enemy made a raid on one of the French posts north of Rheims, but their raiding party was discovered and beaten back before reaching their objective. The French troops raided the German lines west of the Navarin farm. The enemy trench was laid waste and many prisoners were brought back.

#### HALF OF TURK ARMY DESERTS FALKENHAYN

On Road from Constantinople to Palestine the Reorganized Army Loses Half its Effectives.

Washington, January 23.—One hundred and sixty thousand Turkish troops, constituting more than fifty per cent of General Falkenhayn's reorganized Turkish army, deserted from the ranks during the recent journey from Constantinople to Palestine, it is declared in official dispatches today.

#### AMBASSADOR FROM BOLSHEVIKI GOVT. HAS GREAT WELCOME

London, Jan. 23.—The preliminary annual conference of the British Labor party commences at Nottingham today. Arthur Henderson, the British labor leader, said that he was expecting to go into a conference that will arise in a peace settlement. His circular declares that all the Socialist parties in Europe are in accord in all essentials with the Bolshevik Government. A great reception was accorded to the Bolshevik ambassador. As a memorial of peace and freedom, and in commemoration of the heroic deeds of their comrades, organized labor is arranging to have a great international Labor Temple built in London.

#### INDIANS EXEMPTED FROM CONSCRIPTION

Ottawa, Jan. 22.—Canada's Indians are being exempted from the operation of the Military Service Act. The Indians have not the full rights of citizenship, since they have not the right to vote. Consequently the government, acting in accordance with representations received from Indian councils, especially in British Columbia, has decided that the Indians, being the nation's wards, should not be compelled to join the colors. An order in Council is being passed placing them in the same category as conscientious objectors.

#### ROUMANIAN KING IS PROTECTED BY ALLIES

London, Jan. 22.—King Ferdinand of Roumania, whose arrest has been ordered by the Bolshevik government, is now under the protection of the allies, according to a Petrograd dispatch to the Daily Express.

It is thought probable that the king has taken refuge in the allied embassy. Jassy is 350 miles from the British lines in Macedonia, and it may be that the king had been taken to Saloniki by airplane.

#### NORTHCLIFFE'S ATTACK ON GOVERNMENT MAKES BIG STIR

COLONEL REPINGTON, "TIMES" MILITARY CORRESPONDENT, RESIGNS AS PROTEST AGAINST POLITICIANS INTRIGUING AGAINST THE ARMY—IF PERMITTED TO CONTINUE, WILL WRECK SERVICE

(Special to The Daily News.)  
London, Jan. 23.—The bitter attack on the War Office and the higher command in the army by the "Daily Mail" has made a decided stir throughout the country. Coincident with this comes the announcement of the resignation of Colonel Repington, the military correspondent of the London Times. Both The Times and the Daily Mail are under the control and direction of Lord Northcliffe, and the two incidents are being coupled together by the public. Colonel Repington told interviewers today that he resigned on public grounds, and protested strongly against what he termed intrigues against the army by politicians. He said: "The government has lost the confidence, not only of Labor, but of the great majority of the people, and if the existing methods are allowed to continue, will succeed in wrecking both the military and naval services. The great crime of the present government is that it will not tell the nation the truth."

#### SIR EDWARD CARSON ADVOCATES A LEAGUE OF BRITISH NATIONS

Speaking at a Royal Colonial Institute meeting in London recently, Sir Edward Carson, a member of the War Cabinet, who presided, said:—"I believe that in addition to our splendid Army and Navy we hold at the present moment in our hands a weapon that is almost equal in importance to anything we can do in the field or on the seas. That weapon is the economic one. Just look round and see the conditions in which we stand with our colonies in the economic world. They talk of a League of Nations. Let us start with a League of British Nations. To what you can do with a prepared League of British Nations there is, in my opinion no limit. Take the question of raw material. When this war is over there will be lack of raw material to go round to rebuild the areas which have been devastated by the Hun. The Germans are removing from Belgium every particle of machinery which can be of use to them and which might be of use in the reconstruction of the country. Everywhere they go they do the same thing. At the same time they know perfectly well that there is no doubt that when reconstruction comes the raw material will be controlled by the British Empire and her allies. Now I am not preaching the gospel of boycott after the war. When we come to the terms of peace it will be time enough to talk of that. But I am preaching this emphatically. We ought by our legislation and our administration to make it perfectly clear to Germany that the longer the war goes on and the more devastation which is caused the greater will be their loss. We ought to make that perfectly clear, not merely in words but in acts. But nothing surprised him more, he continued, than when a bill was before the House of Commons the previous night which had for its object the bringing about of that result they should have met with a discussion as to whether it would not be better to say to this Christian-like German, "We take you to our arms when the war is over." That was not business. Sir Edward also went on to point out that the same principle should be applied to shipbuilding after the war, and said no ships should be built in this country for the Germans until all ours had been replaced to remedy the deficiency caused by the U-boat campaign. In conclusion, he said:—"We are taking up the economic offensive. I once called it bombing Hun businesses. Bomb them until there is not a brick in the foundation left. It is

#### THE RESIGNATION OF SIR EDWARD CARSON

London, Jan. 23.—Sir Edward Carson, in a letter to the Premier, tendering his resignation, says that when he joined the cabinet he had no consideration in his mind except the prosecution of the war, and had not anticipated that the Irish question would have been reopened during wartime. He says that he thinks it would be advantageous for the war cabinet to discuss the Irish question without his presence.

#### RUSSIA'S SOCIALIST ARMY ENTHUSIASTIC

Petrograd, Jan. 22.—The first 5,000 volunteers of the new Socialist army left for the front today, sped by one of the most enthusiastic demonstrations the city has seen in months. Red flags lined the route of the parade and scores of bands played revolutionary music. Ten thousand other volunteers for the new "army of democracy" are now enrolling in the Petrograd district alone. The volunteers are responding to a special appeal to the people issued by the Bolshevik Government and by the Russian Commander-in-chief, Ensign Krylenko.

## PROGRESS

The announcement of Mayor McClymont at the first meeting of the new council that he considers the time is now past for "sitting tight" will be appreciated by the people of Prince Rupert, inasmuch as it reflects the growing business of the province. There is a time for everything. A time for sitting tight, and a time for getting up, as the preacher might have said. There is no doubt that under the circumstances attending the past two years, there has been but little else to do but sit tight, and the tighter the better. But conditions now are very different from what they were two years ago, and it is now time for more progress to be made with the development of the city of Prince Rupert, and of the district contiguous.

Everything points to the great development of the natural resources with which this part of the province has been favored. Logging operations on a scale hitherto undreamed of may be looked for in the immediate future in the surrounding districts, of which a great quantity will pass over the line of the G. T. P. This lumber has to be seasoned, and it would save a great deal of haulage were this seasoned and culled here, before shipping. The modern system of seasoning as used in certain parts of the United States accomplishes this process in a much shorter space of time than formerly, and it is quite an industry in itself. That proposed industrial committee might very well look into this proposition when they get started.

Then there is fishing. The expansion of this trade will be an undoubted factor in the growth of this city. The Premier himself has recommended trawling for the varieties of fish which are at present practically unmarketable in large quantities. A large increase in the number of trawlers will be necessary to make up the fish supply demanded on account of the scarcity of meat.

The present price of metal will be in itself a sufficient incentive for the quickest development of the many prospects which there are in this northern country. And very many of the prospects are nearly at the proved mine stage.

Mayor McClymont has realized that there is yet something which the people can do to draw attention to this port as a centre for shipbuilding, and if no developments take place at once, that something will have to be done. Together with this there is a great deal of construction work which the G. T. P. have in their minds to do during this incoming summer.

With the expansion of these industries, and with the new mill at Seal Cove starting operations, there will be a decided increase in the population of the city, good wages and better business all round. It would seem that there is every reason to look forward to the incoming year with good grounds for believing that the faith and hope which have sustained us in the past will be rewarded.
