## GERMAN AND AUSTRIAN SOLDIERS FIGHT

### FRATERNIZING IS DANGEROUS FOR GERMAN GOVERNMENT--AFRAID OF EFFECTS

#### NATIONALIZATION OF ALL RAILWAYS IS PROBABLE

MATTER IS FREELY DISCUSSED IN OTTAWA CIRCLES AND RESOLVES ITSELF INTO A BUSINESS OF FINANCE--IF POSSIBLE, C. P. R., G. T., AND G. T. P. MAY BE TAKEN BY GOVERNMENT

Ottawa, Jan. 24.—The nationalization of all Canadian railways is freely discussed here, as the solution of the problem created by the decision of the railway commission in increasing the railway freight rates by some 15 per cent. It is generally believed that, if such a stupendous scheme can be financed, the Canadian Pacific, Grand Trunk and the Grand Trunk Pacific will be added to the government system, which now comprises the Intercolonial, the transcontinental system of the Canadian Northern, and the Hudson Bay Railway. But whatever the desire of the government, or of the majority of the members, that desire can only be fulfilled

if the people of Canada can finance the hundreds of millions required for this purpose, in addition to the current war expenditures. In many quarters it is considered that as the nationalization of all railroads is only a matter of time anyway, this time is as good as any other. The financing of the project would not give the government of Canada any more difficulty than it did to the British government when it took over the railroads in Great Britain. The benefits to be derived from the placing of all roads under the one control especially at this time, the cutting out of competition, etc., would go a long way towards the more efficient working of all the Canadian roads.

#### NEW GERMAN SUBMARINE CAMPAIGN

Paris, Jan. 24.—Germany is recalling her submarine boats to their bases, preparatory to adopting a new plan of campaign, according to reports reaching here today. One suggestion is that the older submarines are to be replaced with a new armored U-boat.

#### MUNS COMMIT 5,000 MURDERS IN BELGIUM

Ottawa, Jan. 23.—Speaking at a Canadian Club luncheon at the Chateau Laurier, Sir Cecil Spring-Rice, former British ambassador at Washington, who is now on his way home to England, told of the efforts of the Hun permanently to destroy Belgium. He said that the number of civilians murdered was 5,000. Houses had been burned to the number of 2,600. This murder and destruction had taken place at the instigation of the military authorities because they knew they must ultimately evacuate Belgium and they intended to leave it a desolate country. They could not murder all the people, because there were too many witnesses. Therefore, they destroyed the country.

#### THE VANCOUVER SUN TALKS ABOUT FISH

A recent issue of the Vancouver Sun has the following to say about fish, Prince Rupert and the Cold Storage Co. All Vancouver knows it now. The article says, in part:

The greatest producers of fresh halibut in America are the Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Company of Prince Rupert. This is due to the fact that Prince Rupert is in the geographical and transportation centre of the largest halibut fishing grounds in the world and the company's pack supplies, in addition to British Columbia, all the northern part of the continent as far east as New York.

Eleven large halibut fishing boats are operated by the Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Company. In addition it buys from nearly a hundred other deep sea fishing craft that seek the northern port to outfit and dispose of their catches.

A quarter of the total halibut production of the Pacific coast is packed by the plant and it takes care of two-thirds of all the fish brought to Prince Rupert.

The company's cold storage plant has a capacity of 14,000,000 pounds, which means that it can freeze and store 7,000 tons of fish. It makes 160,000 pounds, or 80 tons, of ice daily. Three million pounds of herring are stored for bait.

While the most valuable work of the Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Company has been the introduction of fresh fish on the inland markets and the popularization of this food as a means of reducing the cost of living credit is also due to it for several innovations in the methods of catching and packing fish. For instance, Mr. Johnson introduced the otter trawl in the Northern Pacific and this is now recognized as the most satisfactory method. Considerable progress has been made by the company and there is every reason to believe that this will be maintained.

#### A GERMAN GAIN

Paris, Jan. 24.—As the result of an important raid which the Germans made in Belgium after an intense bombardment today, they gained a footing in an advanced position on our first line to the east of Neuport, it is announced by the War Office.

#### RIGOROUS CENSORSHIP IMPOSED BY AUSTRIA

London, Jan. 24.—The Austrian Premier's conciliatory attitude and his statement to the labor leaders has had the effect of temporarily allaying ferment among the Austrian workers, but it is feared that the trouble is too deep-rooted not to come up again probably in an aggravated form. Today darkness beclouds the Austrian situation.

#### Censorship.

Amsterdam, Jan. 24.—A dispatch received here last night says that owing to the vigorous censorship, there is no news today, and that the German newspapers, at the request of the Austrian government, were printing no news from Vienna.

#### PRESBYTERIANS ELECT OFFICERS

There must have been nearly one hundred and fifty people in the Presbyterian Church Hall last evening about half past six, when supper was served on the occasion of the annual meeting of the congregation. The hall was finely decorated and the long tables were groaning under the quantities of real food provided for the refreshment of those attending. After the feeding of the multitude, the Rev. Dr. Grant addressed his flock in short measure, and threw the meeting open for the election of the officials of the church for the ensuing year.

The minutes of the last annual meeting were read by Mr. A. M. Manson, the congregational secretary, and adopted, and the reports from the different branches of the church's activity were given. Mr. L. M. Fuller reported that the work of the Sunday School was growing, there being a noticeable increase in its membership. The Ladies Aid also had done good work, and their financial standing was of the best. The financial report of the past year, while showing an increase in assets over the previous year, still it did not show as great an increase as had been done the year previous. This to some extent was to be accounted for by the removal from the city of several of the church members. The church trustees were re-elected, and to the board of managers Mr. J. G. Steen was elected, vice Mr. J. H. Thompson. The thanks of the congregation were accorded to the Ladies Aid, and to Mrs. Grant, its president, and to the church choir for their valuable work.

There were several short speeches, suitable to the occasion, and the meeting concluded shortly after eight o'clock.

#### GERMANS WANT CESSATION OF FRATERNIZING

Severe Fighting on Eastern Front When German Troops Seek to Prevent Austrians and Russians Visiting.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Petrograd, Jan. 24.—Fighting has broken out between the German and Austro-Hungarian soldiers on the eastern front, according to a report received here. German troops were used to try to stop the wholesale fraternizing between the Austro-Hungarian and Russian troops. When the Germans tried to clear the Russian trenches of the Austrians, and the Austro-Hungarian trenches of the Russians, they were fired upon. A pitched battle developed in which artillery was used, and a large number of soldiers were killed.

The spirit of fraternity which the German High Command was keen to institute between the opposing armies in previous stages of the war has been having its due effect. The Russians have now out-fraternized the Germans. The German propaganda is tending to refrain that cessation of hostilities. Stringent measures have been taken by the German government to prevent the spread of the revolutionary literature with which the Russian front line trenches are well supplied. But now the Austrian and Hungarian soldiers, and some of the German regiments are seeking more of it, and are smuggling copies of the Russian publications, which are printed in German, into the interior.

The effect of this literature was so evident that the German government is now afraid of it, and will stamp out every sign of sympathy with Russia and its people in their republican ways.

#### MANY LIVES LOST

London, Jan. 24.—By the sinking of two steamers by an enemy submarine, about three weeks ago in the Mediterranean, 708 lives were lost, it was announced officially today.

#### DISCONTINUENCE OF PEACE NEGOTIATIONS FORECAST

ALL BOLSHIEVIKI NEWSPAPERS ARE UNANIMOUS, WHICH INDICATES AUTHORITY INFORMATION—GRAND ADMIRAL TIRPITZ TALKS ABOUT THE BEAUTIFUL GOAL FOR GERMANS

(Special to The Daily News.)

Petrograd, Jan. 24.—The breaking off of peace negotiations at Brest-Litovsk was the forecast of all the Bolshevik newspapers yesterday. Their unanimity would appear to indicate that this prediction came from an authoritative source. The Bolshevik view is that the only good accomplished by the negotiations has been to unmask the real Imperialistic nature of the enemy demands. According to comment here, nothing more can possibly be expected from further discussion of peace with the Germans, or their allies.

#### Tirpitz Talks.

Amsterdam, Jan. 24.—Grand Admiral Tirpitz, speaking at a

meeting of the Fatherland party, declared "Our stand at the Brest-Litovsk conference shows that the will to win is not weakened among the German people or their allies, and that not a single muscle is softened. The battles are great, but the goals are beautiful," he concluded. The meeting adopted a resolution that peace must assure Germany's free development and culture.

Admiral Tirpitz has been more fortunate in securing a hearing in northern Germany than he was in the south. He and his platform speakers in many places were refused a hearing, and his meetings were taken charge of by his opponents, and in many instances, turned into peace meetings.

#### ANOTHER TRAWLER GETS READY FOR SEA

The intimation given of the recommendation made to the food controller for the commandeering of the Prince Rupert trawler to supply cheap fish has caused quite a lot of discussion in the city. There is much being said both for and against the proposal of the provincial committee. Trawling, of course, is but in its infancy on this coast. It was first instituted several years ago by the Doughty outfit from Hull, England. This trial was not quite successful, chiefly because, in the first place, there was a lack of knowledge of the proper fishing grounds. By fishing on rocky bottoms, many of the trawls were lost, and damaged. And in the second place, there was no market established at that time, for the varieties of fish caught. The demand then was for halibut, and halibut only.

Under economic pressure, nowadays, however, these conditions are altered. Considerable prospecting work has been done. The trawler skippers know where to go. They know where are the sea bottoms suitable for their particular kind of fishing, and given proper publicity work by the government, there should be a big enough demand for the trawled varieties of fish to make this industry a permanent one.

Only a matter of five hours sail from Prince Rupert, it is possible to get a boat load of fish in a day or two, in good weather and there is every sign that trawlers will be the more numerous in the very near future.

The Atlin Fisheries Company have had their boat, the "Zorra," fitted with an otter trawl. She has already made several prospecting trips, and good localities for trawling are now known. She is at present being fitted up with a heavier winch for hauling in her trawl, and it is expected that she will be ready to go out in a very few days from now. While she is only a small boat, she has already proved that trawling is profitable for boats of 20,000 pounds capacity. The Atlin Fisheries, Ltd., have been establishing their own market for these ground fish among their own customers and hope to be able to dispose of all the "scrap" fish that the trawler brings in.

With the increasing demand for these varieties, it is certain that other boats will be fitted up for trawling, and the subsidiary industries of curing and smoking fish are bound to increase largely in this city.

#### NO CONSCRIPTION FOR THE NATION'S WARDS

The following telegram from Ottawa has been received here by Mr. C. C. Perry, the Indian agent. "Ottawa, January 22.—Indians come within the Military Service Act, but by order in council dated the 17th of January, are exempted from combatant military service. "All Indians must, however, register, and Indian agents should immediately put in claims for exemption to the registrar who is empowered to grant them without reference to the tribunals."

#### ORIENTAL TRADE BY JAPANESE LINERS

For some time past there has been some talk of a line of Japanese steamers plying between Oriental ports and Prince Rupert. There is a growing trade between the Orient and the North American continent, and the strategic position held by Prince Rupert as a point of transshipment for the freight to and from the eastern part of this continent and the Oriental countries is receiving consideration.

Some little time ago, the Japanese consul of Vancouver paid a visit to this city. He came, he saw, and he went away again, and there is every reason to believe that his visit was not insignificant. There is no doubt that sooner or later, Prince Rupert will have ocean liners calling on a regular schedule from trans-Pacific points, and this will perhaps materialize sooner than may be expected. This will call for some considerable construction work on the waterfront. Proper facilities will require to be provided for the handling of the freight direct from the steamers to the cars, which doubtless will be made available when the demand arises.

## CHEAP FISH

The recommendation which the provincial committee has made to the Dominion Food Controller regarding the operation of trawling and trawlers out of Prince Rupert will doubtless have some effect in drawing attention in high places to the vast quantities of fish food which are available on this coast for the getting. It is realized that in order to substitute fish for beef and bacon, which are so urgently required elsewhere, fish must be offered at prices which will appeal to the consumer. If the price of fish approximates that of beef, there is not much chance that it will be used to the same extent. By selling two pounds of fish for fifteen cents as is recommended, there will be created a demand for these cheaper varieties, which for delicacy and flavor in many cases are superior to halibut. It is considered that a market could be found, and a large market at that, for Pacific fish as far east as Winnipeg. It has to be remembered that there are very many people in Canada who come from countries where there is a great variety of fish food consumed. They know these different varieties. While there are many people in Canada who cannot tell the difference between a haddock and a codling, and who have never seen a flounder or a crab except in picture books, there are very many more who do know these distinctions, and who would be ready purchasers could they get them to buy.

Taken hold of in the right fashion, there is little doubt but that trawling will eventually be as popular a method of fishing on this Pacific coast as it is on the North Sea. It is popular there because it is economical, and there is always a demand for the varieties of fish caught and offered for sale. The creation of a market for these fish should be easier at this time than at any other, seeing that meat products are scarce and high priced. It should afford a first-class opportunity for the establishment of a permanent trade in these other varieties of fish.

The problem of the fish waste which has been going on on this coast for so many years should also be tackled at this time. Fishermen find that there is little or no demand for black or red cod. If they do bring their catches of these varieties into port, they do not receive the same price for cod as they do for halibut. So if they have struck a good fishing ground, rather than fill their vessels up with cod, there are thrown away and only halibut kept, which obtains the higher price. The food value of black or red cod is but little different from halibut, and if it were known just what quantities of these varieties the fishermen discard as waste during the course of the year, it would be quite surprising. It is simple waste of food, when the necessity for the conservation of food supplies is most necessary. But if the fishermen cannot dispose of their catches, or else get but a small price compared with halibut, there is little can be done until the demand comes for them. Fishermen are not fishing for their health, nor yet for the purpose of supplying food primarily. They are out risking their lives for as much as they can make. So long as they can make more by catching halibut, they will do so. And just so soon as they can get as much for cod as for halibut, then they will bring in what heretofore they have thrown away.

If the Food Controller would arrange for the handling of all the fish that is landed, and arrange for the purchase of fish, as fish, he would get all he wanted, which would go a long way towards making up the deficient food supplies of the world at the present moment. The Food Controller has the power, or if he thinks he has not, he is in the best possible position to get it, for the adequate attention being paid to this, our chief industry.

## POLYGLOT BAGDAD

There are so many different languages and forms of religion in Bagdad today that one of the necessities imposed on the military authorities has been the provision of five temporary churches. In one of the churches in which Indian services are held, Anglicans, Nonconformists, and Roman Catholics occupy the building in succession. Altogether as many as seven services in various languages on one day are held—English, Urdu, Latin, Tamil and Punjabi. In the four other churches services are conducted at the same time in Chaldaic, Syrian, Arabic, and Armenian. One of the chaplains of the Indian troops states that on one Sunday he had men representing five different races. As they did not understand one another's language, he had to use a sixth language understood by them all, and that was English.

## CANADIANS BUILD A TOWN IN FRANCE

### First Sawmill Post Behind the Lines Grows to Fair-sized Lumber City.

The following are extracts from articles by Mr. Roland Hill, who has been specially deputed to describe the work of the various Canadian units behind the lines.

Somewhere in France you will find an ever-growing Canadian village. Less than a year ago a company of the Canadian Forestry Corps were sent to the assistance of the French army, which was then badly in need of lumber for their camps and trenches. The men from overseas found splendid, almost virgin, forests on the mountain sides. When the timber famine came along the extreme east of the French lines and fortresses, like Belfort, were pleading as urgently for timber for dugouts and emplacements as the rest. There was no one to cut the rich mountain forests. Heavy timber meant the saving of Frenchmen's lives, and at the Allied Timber Conference the Canadians were asked to go to the assistance of the French. The Canadian lumberjacks and millmen came. They were completely outfitted with even the machinery and boilers from the far-away Dominion. From the start the scheme was a great success. The front was relieved and kept well supplied all through an almost Alpine winter. One company grew to three, then to seven and a dozen. The one little mill was augmented until there are now seven working night and day, and the few huts grew into a fair-sized town, with thousands of Canadian inhabitants.

The little station that before their advent seldom stopped a train to load a trunk is now a busy centre. The Canadians have designed and built their own sidings—busted out of solid rock. The little bungalows of unpainted pine on the hillside that shelter the headquarters staffs are the envy of the French officer. "Speed" is the motto under which the foresters work. The output has sometimes reached the 300,000 feet mark per day. The French generals and their friends come out frequently to inspect the mills, and are lavish in their praises. The only little experimental mill has developed into one of the wonders of the war. Its product now goes all over France. One sees the empty trucks that have come heavy laden with supplies go back loaded with this Canadian-made lumber labelled for Paris, or Bordeaux, or Marseilles.

### How to go about it

BUY eggs for hatching or day-old chicks; borrow or buy a broody hen or an artificial brooder. A slatted packing-box will house the hen and chicks. Feed the chicks bread crumbs soaked in milk and squeezed dry. Feed five times a day, alternating with prepared chick feed, only as much as they will eat up clean. Remember that a hungry chick is a healthy chick.

CAUTION: Chicks must not be fed until at least 48 hours old, and then only sparingly.

If you can, start now with eggs or chicks; if not, arrange at once with the local poultry association for pullets in the fall.

Dear Sir:—In your issue of today, you carry an advertisement from the Rupert Table Supply Co. with a heading in prominent type, "Wake up, G. T. P., Pay your employees promptly," and strange to say, enclosed in a deep black border. Needless to state, it aroused the indignation of the G. T. P. shop employees, when they read this advertisement, and it was agreed by the said employees that it was only fit and proper that the true facts of the case should be presented to the public in your next issue.

With regard to the B. C. legislation, making it compulsory for all companies to pay their employees semi-monthly, the G. T. P. Co. have already paid some of their employees wages due them up to the 15th of this month, but through an oversight, which had to be corrected, the shop men have only received the pay due till Dec. 31, 1917, and needless to state, hope to receive their wages due to the 15th of this month by the next passenger train in.

But what we wish to emphasize is that the G. T. P. shop employees and carmen are a hundred per cent organized union men and have a schedule of rules with our company, which governs both company and employees, and we deeply resent any interference from any outside person or persons, not connected with the railroad, or with our affairs.

In conclusion we wish to state that the wages from the G. T. P. shop employees, from a business point of view, must be worth catering for, and in this case, it does not pay to advertise.

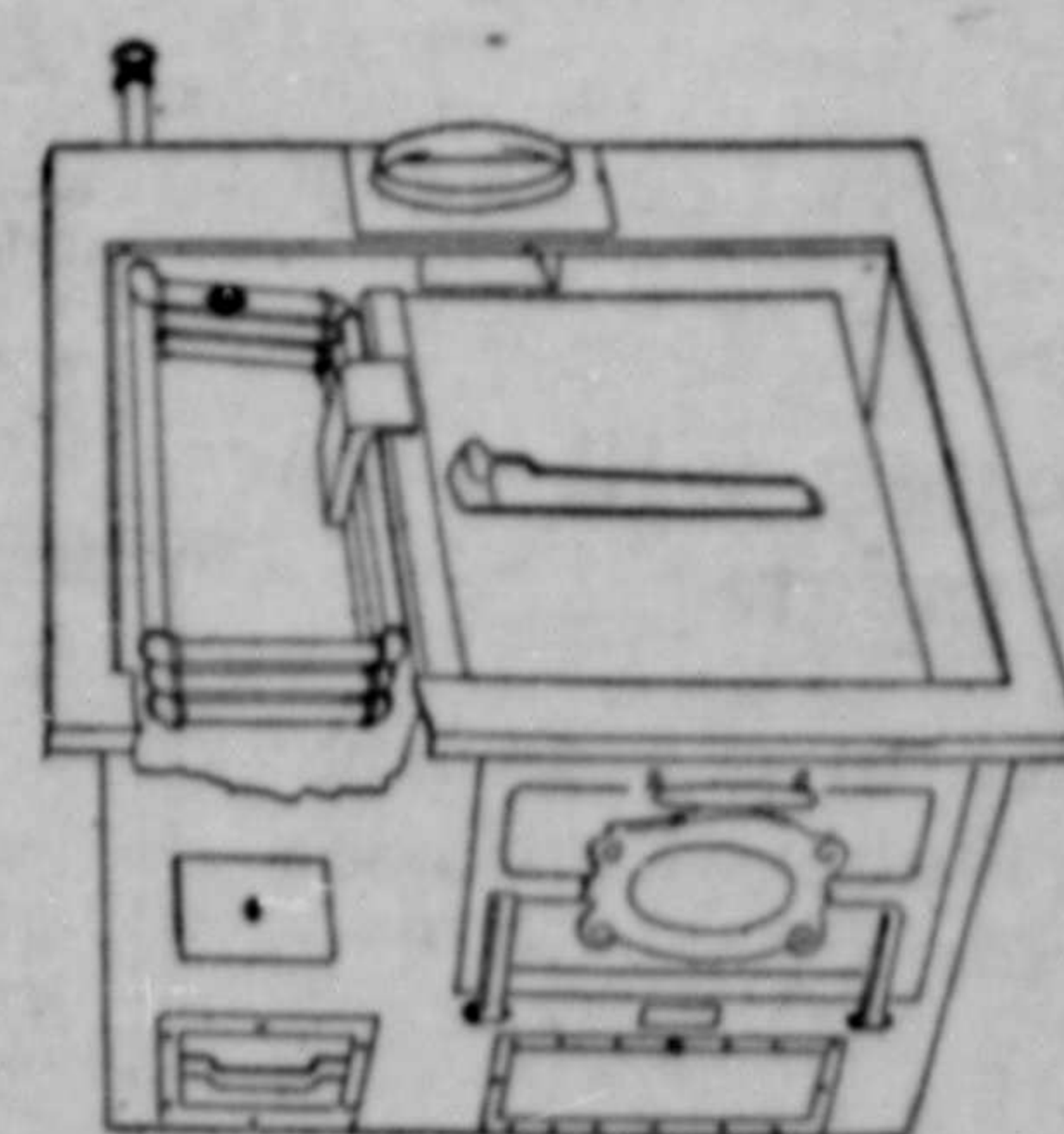
