## FISHERY QUESTION DEMANDS ATTENTION

### REFORMS REQUIRED BEFORE ANOTHER SEASON OPENS—NOW IS TIME TO ACT.

#### CLAIMS FISHERY OFFICIAL TOO FAVORABLE TO CANNERS

PLAIN SPEAKING ON FISHERIES QUESTION AT A VANCOUVER MEETING LAST WEEK—CANNERY COMBINE ALLEGED TO BE RESTRICTING OUTPUT OF FISH FOOD FOR THEIR OWN BENEFIT

At a meeting held in Vancouver last week to consider the question of the supply of cheap fish, some remarkable allegations were made. The meeting had been called by Mayor Gale, and among those present were Mr. J. C. Cunningham, president of the B. C. Manufacturers Association; Mr. John Wallace, representing the fish sub-committee of the provincial food conservation committee, and several others. The meeting was the outcome of the report made by Mr. Wallace to the Dominion food controller regarding trawling to supply the interior provinces with fish at a low price, and thus to relieve the demand for meat products.

Mr. Cunningham in the course of the discussion, alleged that the great fishing interests of British Columbia would neither fish themselves nor let anyone else fish in certain areas, that they stood between the consumer and a supply of fish at a moderate price, and between the overseas and any supply forth mentioning, and that they had even been able to defeat the efforts of the food controller.

**Hand in Glove.**  
Mr. Cunningham declared that the cannerymen dictated to the Department of Fisheries. Mr. Babcock, of that department, he said, was hand in glove with them and he looked more to the interests of the cannerymen than to the interests of the industry. One firm, with a big equipment and able to employ some three hundred men had been unable to obtain a licence from the department, which reported that it had no equipment. Mr. Hanna had overridden the Department and had told this firm to go ahead and fish. When they got to the ground it was found that it was held by licencees, who were not fishing themselves and would let no one else fish.

**Turned Down.**  
Some time ago, Sir Edward Kemp had wired him, wanting to place an order for fish for shipment overseas. He had taken it up with all the big concerns, and one after another they had turned him down. Finally, Mr. Hager had supplied half a million pounds but that was a mere bagatelle. The big interests would not even quote. They did not want the business, and they would not let anyone else have it.

**Change Required.**  
Nothing could be done until they overrode the Fisheries Department. People had to go to wholesale grocers for fishing licencees. They still had to go to some of them. They should strike at the root of the whole question and let the government know that the people demanded a change.

There was some further discussion on the matter, when it

was said that whenever any big question came up, there was so many telegrams and representations made from this province that the government officials did not know what to believe. The suggestion was made that a representative should be sent to Ottawa direct, but this was left over.

#### GERMAN PLAN TO SPLIT BELGIUM

Amsterdam, Jan. 26.—Advices received here from Brussels say that the self-constituted "Council of Flanders" announces that it will hold an election for the purpose of giving the Flemish people the opportunity of expressing their will regarding full independence.

The despatch adds that a deputation of the Council which waited on the German Minister of the Interior, Herr Wallraf, received a sympathetic reply, the Secretary expressing his best wishes for the further cultivation of Flemish aims for autonomy.

#### BRITAIN PROHIBITS EXPORT OF CAPITAL

London, Jan. 26.—A proclamation published in the "London Gazette" prohibits the importation into the United Kingdom of all bonds, debentures, stocks, or share certificates, scrip and other documents of title relating to any stocks, shares, or other securities, with the exception of matured bonds redeemable in the United Kingdom and coupons falling due for payment in the United Kingdom; or the subscribing to any loan or issue of capital, purchasing any stock, shares, or securities, or any property other than merchandise, if securities or property are not in the United Kingdom, or purchasing any foreign currency to be held with a view to appreciation in value. Bankers as a condition of sending any remittance out of the United Kingdom must require the person concerned to make a written declaration as to the purpose of the remittance.

#### THE POLICE COURT

Acting upon information received, the police made a raid upon the Skeena Club, situated underground on Sixth Street late last night and roped in nine men, who were arraigned this morning before Magistrate Cars under the gaming act. The case was adjourned until tomorrow.

Two men, named V. Reda and Peter Bomben, were also charged with doing damage to the water-main, whereby the reservoir on Acropolis Hill was emptied. They had been felling a tree for wood, which fell across the main, breaking it, which fact they did not report, nor did they repair the pipe. The case was adjourned until the 31st, to give them a chance to pay for the damage.

#### THE RESIGNATION OF MR. W. J. HANNA

Ottawa, Jan. 26.—Mr. W. J. Hanna, in his letter of resignation to the Prime Minister, said that the scope of the work of food controller has so broadened, and the duties have so multiplied as to call for absolutely undivided and uninterrupted service to the exclusion of all other duties and obligations. This Mr. Hanna finds it practically impossible at present.

Sir Robert Borden, in accepting Mr. Hanna's resignation, expressed his regret at the action, and paid a great tribute to the ability and devotion which Mr. Hanna brought to his work.

Mr. H. B. Thomson, who has been appointed instead of Mr. Hanna, is one of Victoria's well known business men. He was one of the members of the commission appointed by the late government to investigate into the fishery regulations obtaining on this part of the British Columbia coast, and which has reported against the concessions which Prince Rupert's delegation obtained from Ottawa previously. Mr. Thomson will be remembered as the big Irishman with the rough voice, who seemed to think that Prince Rupert would never be anything else than a fishing village.

#### CANADA MAKING MANY AEROPLANE ENGINES

Ottawa, Jan. 26.—The first airplane engine manufactured in Canada was successfully tested in Toronto, according to a telegram received by Sir Joseph Flavelle, Chairman of the Imperial Munitions Board. A thousand of these engines will be delivered, and installed in the completed machines this year.

#### FISHING LICENCES IS A VERY IMPORTANT MATTER FOR RUPERT

CALLS FOR IMMEDIATE ACTION BY ALL CONCERNED IN THE INDUSTRY FOR GREATER SUPPLIES AND FREE FISHING RIGHTS FOR ALL FISHERMEN—DOG IN THE MANGER POLICY MUST GO

#### THE ESTABLISHMENT OF THE STEEL PLANT

Victoria, Jan. 26.—On his arrival back in the city, Premier Brewster, replying to questions from the press representatives, said that the matter of establishing an iron and steel plant in British Columbia was a subject which had engaged the particular attention of the Government and of himself personally. With the object of directing every particle of energy on Ottawa in this connection, Mr. Brewster has taken the matter up with Sir Robert Borden and a number of his ministers.

Mr. Brewster stated definitely that the question of location had not been discussed and that when such a time arrived the matter would demand very careful consideration. In fact, it would have to be shown why such and such a location would be better than the other. The whole province, he said, would have to be considered and not one particular locality.

#### MORE ROLLING STOCK FOR CANADA'S RAILWAYS

Ottawa, Jan. 28.—The Railway Department will shortly place orders for \$7,000,000 worth of new rolling stock. Contracts for \$4,000,000 worth of new locomotives, cars, etc., were let some months ago, and deliveries are now being made. Parliament voted last session \$25,000,000 for additional equipment for Canada's railways, and the contracts are being placed as rapidly as the steel companies can handle them. Although the new cars are primarily for use on the Government railways, they will be loaned to the Canadian Northern, Grand Trunk and other roads as occasion requires. The new orders will be for \$3,000,000 worth of passenger cars, with \$4,000,000 for box cars and locomotives.

#### SHIPS WILL HAVE FOOD IN EVERY INCH OF SPACE

London, Jan. 26.—The Ministry of Food has submitted to a conference of shipowners a scheme by which, through their co-operation, additional supplies of food may be brought into the country. The Director of Ships Stores, Mr. T. G. Jones, presided over the conference, at which sixty of the leading London firms were represented. The scheme was unanimously accepted.

Every ship, large and small, coming into British ports will use such spare store room or other accommodation available—every passenger state-room when unoccupied—for the conveyance of food stuffs.

All surplus stores brought in this way will be pooled.

The pool will be controlled on co-operative lines by a committee of shipowners at the large ports, and these pooled supplies will be put in or taken out at actual cost price, including insurance.

Home supplies will be drawn from as little as possible.

The meeting recently held in Vancouver, which is noticed in another column, brings up a vital question, which will be settled some time or other, and in the opinion of the fishermen, ought to have been settled long ago. It concerns the parcelling out of the British Columbia coast, by licences, among a certain very small number of firms for the sole and exclusive rights to fish therein. Practically all the creeks which flow into the ocean from here to Vancouver have been taken up by these firms and any outsider is denied the privilege or right to fish for salmon therein. It does not matter whether the holders of these licences are fishing themselves or not, and in a very many cases they do not fish themselves, but by the system of licences, they are enabled to prevent any other persons from fishing in these particular waters.

It is safe to say that were the fishing free and open, subject of course to the regulations for the protection of the fish, that something like twenty times the quantity of salmon might be landed in B. C., which would go a long way to help in the present stringency of the food supplies, and this too without any fear of depleting the supplies of fish.

One thing which the Provincial Department will not do, and that is to show just what areas are held by these corporations, the B. C. packers, Bell-Irving and a few others. Only recently practically the whole of the west coast of the Queen Charlotte Islands was granted to one firm. Local fishermen, who attempted to fish in these waters were fined. By increasing the catch of salmon, there would be no difficulty in securing a market. The market is there already, and by cheapening the price, which would come naturally by the increasing of the supply, a much greater demand would ensue. Dog salmon and humpbacks are fit to eat, and are good food, either fresh or frozen, as well as canned.

Prince Rupert fought a lone hand nearly a year ago, and obtained concessions from Ottawa. This time Prince Rupert will have Vancouver with her, and time is now ripe for a determined effort being put forth to break the combine which has throttled the fishing on this coast for so long. Let there be protection for the fish, by all means, but no protection for the cannerymen. We have no representatives yet in Ottawa, and the new food controller, by virtue of the report which the commission he was on, is favorably inclined to the cannerymen, therefore, it is up to those interested in the progress of the fishing industry to have representatives sent to Ottawa to deal with the government direct. It is necessary that this be done soon, as the time is at hand when these exclusive licences call for renewal.

## PEACE TERMS

The German Chancellor has spoken. He thinks that the concrete proposals of the allies regarding peace terms are unsatisfactory. That is unsatisfactory for Germany, or rather, what he has more in mind, they are unsatisfactory for Germany's present rulers. Count von Hertling apparently does not take into consideration that that is quite what the allies intended they should do. The peace terms which will be imposed upon Germany and her allies must be made so unsatisfactory to the Junkers that they will never think of breaking the peace again, just in case that unsatisfactoriness is made greater at some future date.

The thorough freedom of navigation during times of war as well as in times of peace is one of the German's naive demands. In order that this might be accomplished, all that has to be done is for Great Britain to relinquish her fortified naval stations, which girdle the globe. With no foreign bases of supply, the British fleet would be, except for numbers, more upon an equality with that of Germany. Chancellor von Hertling knows what he would like. He would doubtless also like to see the scrapping of the British and allied warships. Also the dismantlement of all coast defences, that the German race of pirates would be able to sail the seven seas unmolested, carrying fire and destruction wherever they went. All they want is the freedom to get doing what they want, whether it is in accord with their pledged word or not, or whether it is right, or whether the rights of other nations are respected.

Germany has shown just how much she is to be trusted. In tropical countries, when a man runs amuck, the police do not supply him with weapons. They rather put him where he can do no harm. And that is what has to be done with Germany and her present day rulers. The power for doing harm has to be taken from

them. The will to do harm cannot be removed. That much must be left for the Germans themselves.

The chancellor's argument that the evacuation of Russian territory is a matter between the Germans and Russians, and concerns them only, will not hold good. It is as much a matter for the others of the allies as Belgium is for Russia. Russia joined in the conflict as an ally, and at various times afforded great assistance. The allies are allies still, and Russia in the weakness of her rebirth cannot be thrown over by her late friends.

The only satisfactory manner to deal with the Germans is as they would deal with other people. After the conflict with France in 1870, every time the French representatives disagreed, harsher terms were imposed, in the arriving at peace. Every time that the Germans find that the peace proposals of the allies are unsatisfactory, the only way to bring them to terms would be to give them a little bit more to think about.

## THE FOOD QUESTION

The cable which the British food controller has sent to Mr. Hoover in Washington is significant. It calls for the increased production in the United States of 75,000,000 bushels more of wheat. The increase which will be demanded from Canada has not yet been given out, but doubtless increased supplies will be requested. This is one of the things that can be done in Canada. The acreage is here. The seed wheat is here, and with the proper mobilization of her resources of man power, the necessary labor for this increasing task could be made available. But this requires proper mobilization of the man power in the Dominion. The cutting out of non-essential businesses has been advocated as one means of releasing a great number for war work. Production of food and the things necessary for warfare are the prime essentials at this time, and the hands of every allied government may yet be forced in the direction

## LOOT WAREHOUSE IS ESTABLISHED IN BERLIN

French Army Headquarters, Jan. 25.—Great opportunities are now being offered to the war profiteers of Berlin to acquire the spoils gathered by the German soldiers in France and Belgium from the houses and farms of the conquered civilians of those countries, who have been deported to various parts of Germany to work for their captors.

Official recognition has been given by the German Government to the practice of the German troops of laying hands on everything valuable belonging to the people of the invaded countries, for it has founded in Berlin a ware booty office to which all the articles thus acquired may be sent for sale. Here, connoisseurs may select from large quantities of ancient jewellery, clocks, furniture, etc.

Whether the price paid go to the German Government or to the officer or soldier who forwarded the consignment for disposal is not ascertainable here.

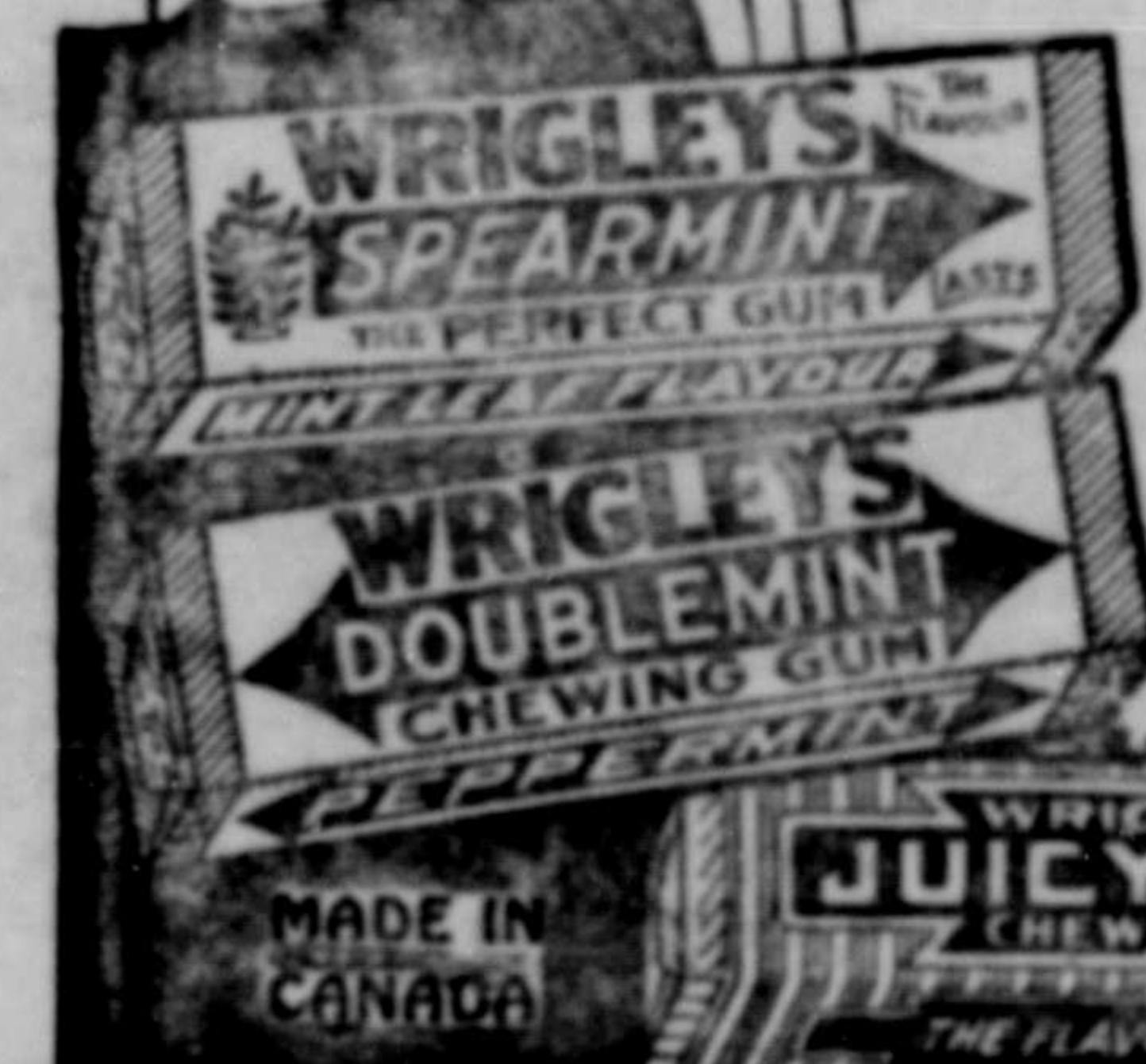

# WOULD UNITE ALLIES' WEALTH TO WIN WAR

Paris, Jan. 24. — Charles Gide of the Faculty of the University of Paris, and one of the foremost authorities on finance and economics in Europe, has outlined a plan for the finance-unity of the allies, which, judging from the source from which it emanates, may receive a careful hearing at the next allied conference.

In making the proposal he says that financial unity is just as essential as unity of the front command or unity of aims. He proposes a common purse for the allies out of which to pay the expenses of the war. Basing his calculations on another year of war, he says the combined cost will total about a hundred and forty billion dollars which amount capitalized equals ten per cent. of the general income of all the allies. Each nation, therefore, would contribute ten per cent. of its entire income.

Professor Gide adds: "In this hypothesis the share of America will be too great in proportion to the effort and length of time in action, so that France cannot agree to such a proposition. I suggest that in fairness to America France should abandon its colonies in America to the United States as compensation. France already has too many colonies and such an arrangement would be appropriate in view of the logical redistribution of colonies which will follow after the war."

## SAYS AUSTRALIANS HAVE LONG MEMORIES

Mr. C. E. W. Bean, official press correspondent with the Australian Imperial Force in France, states in a despatch dated Tuesday that last week the Germans pounded with 100 huge shells a large country town nearly 20 miles behind the British line. Many civilians were killed. The main reason for the bombardment, he says, appears to be to cause French civilians to tire of the war. The German knows we cannot retaliate except at a few military points, because our shells falling in towns beyond the lines would harm other French or Belgians. Listening for two days to these shattering explosions, many Australians thanked providence that Australians have seen in towns in France.

**PRESIDENT GOMPERS ON A RADICAL MEASURE**

Washington, Jan. 28.—"The shutting down of all industries for five continuous days is only warranted if based upon immediate emergency, and I have some doubt if five continuous days is the best measure," said Samuel Gompers, president of the A. F. of L. "It certainly seems a very radical measure to meet the problems of transportation."

"I am in receipt of a large number of telegraphic protests from workers in several parts of the country, declaring that the effect of the orders will throw their men out of employment that due to the high cost of living they have been unable to lay anything aside and that their suffering during this period will be very great."

"I am strongly of the opinion that to place the industries of the country upon an eight-hour basis work day, at least during the war and as a war measure, would have been a much wiser and more practical course."

"The working people of America will maintain their loyal stand despite their sufferings and sacrifices, which they may be called upon to bear; and yet I see something must be done to see that they are not made to suffer."

**MESOPOTAMIA HAS NOW COOLED OFF A BIT**

Bagdad, Dec. 14.—(By mail.) An abnormally hot summer has been followed by an abnormally cold winter. Twelve degrees of frost have been registered at Samarra and 6.6 at Bagdad. This means a difference of 100 degrees in maximum and minimum records during the last five months. The lowest temperature recorded in the Bagdad district previously this year is 18.6. While returning from Qara Tepe the water in my basin froze to a solid block. Snow has fallen on the hills. Troops marching north of Bagdad had ice in their water bottles. The winter rains are late. Since the week or two before our entry into Bagdad on March 11 there has not been a shower sufficient to lay the dust. The total rainfall in Bagdad during the last nine months amounts to .09 of an inch. Still, it is healthy weather. The cold has killed the germs of cholera, of which we had a few sporadic cases before the cold weather set in.

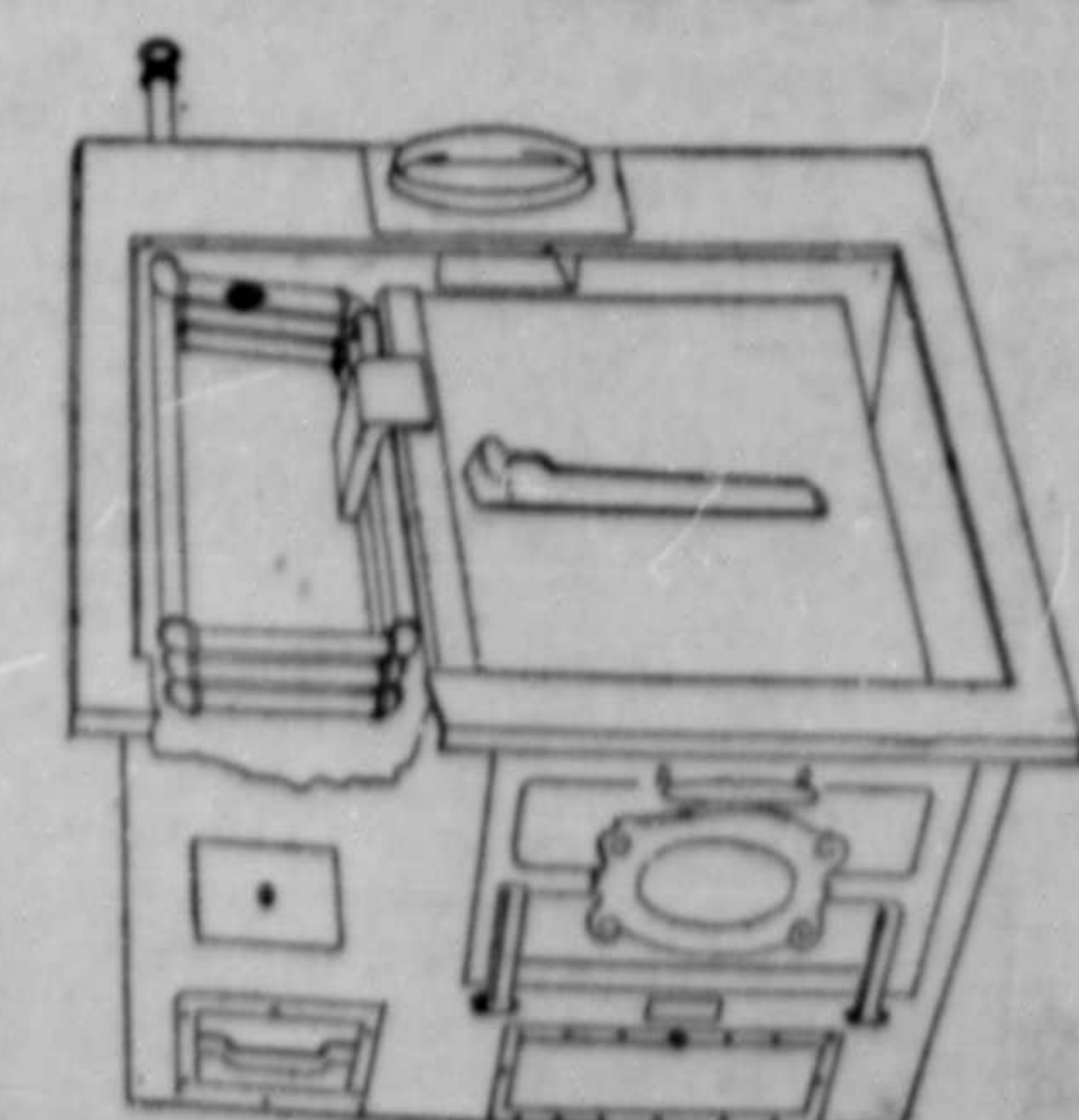
